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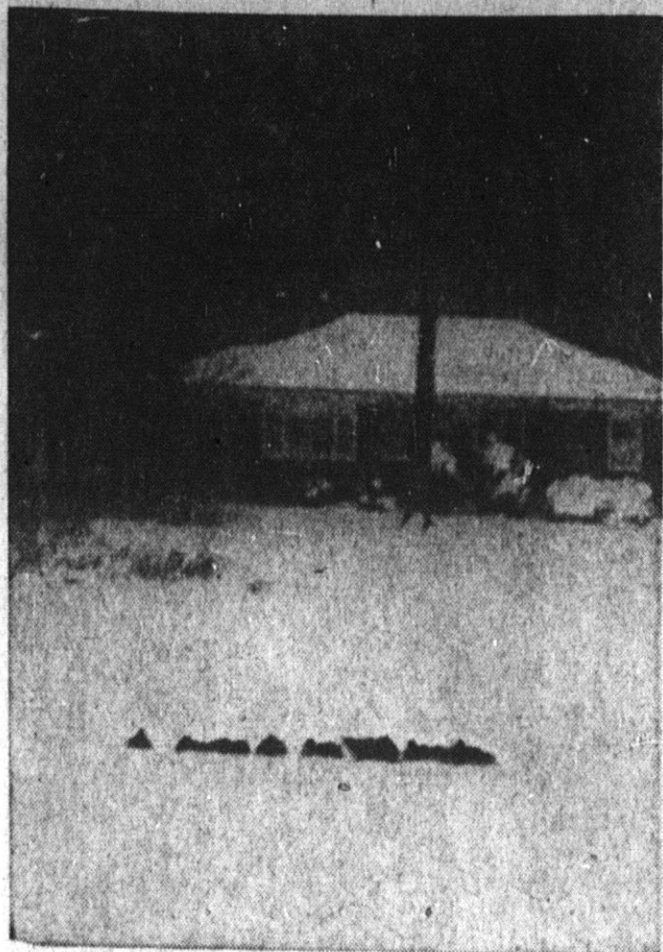

Snowfall at 20.3 Inches In December

A total of 20.3 inches of snow fell in Holland during December, all of it after Dec. 22 except for a one-inch snowfall on Dec. 10 which lasted one day only.

A low of 2 degrees was registered the last day of the year, just in advance of dipping to -9 on Jan. 1.

The maximum of 61 degrees was recorded Dec. 21, a day before winter arrived.

Average temperature was 31.4 degrees or 2 degrees above normal. Precipitation totaled 3.49 inches or 1.16 inches above normal. Precipitation fell on 23 days.

The maximum of 61 compared with 57 in 1966, 58 in 1965, 44 in 1964 and 54 in 1963. The minimum of 2 compared with 1 in 1966, 3 in 1965, 4 in 1964 and -16 in 1963.

Average temperature of 31.4 compared with 28 in 1966, 35.1 in 1965, 26.5 in 1964 and 21.5 in 1963. Average maximum was 37.5, compared with 33.6 in 1966, 41.1 in 1965, 32.2 in 1964 and 29.4 in 1963. Average minimum was 25.3, compared with 22.3 in 1966, 29.1 in 1965, 26.5 in 1964 and 21.5 in 1963.

Precipitation of 3.49 inches compared with 3.38 inches in 1966, 5.16 inches in 1965, 2.04 inches in 1964 and 4.19 inches in 1963. Precipitation fell on 23 days in 1967, 25 days in 1966, 18 days in 1965, 20 days in 1964 and 26 days in 1963.

Greatest precipitation in a 24-hour period was 1.12 inches in 1967, 1.19 inches in 1966, 1.26 inches in 1965, .50 inch in 1964 and 1.90 inches in 1963.

Total snowfall listed 20.3 inches in 1967, 25.1 inches in 1966, 16.1 inches in 1965, 21.2 inches in 1964 and 66 inches in 1963.

Greatest snowfall in a 24-hour period was 7.5 inches on Dec. 31, 3.7 inches in 1966, 6.5 inches in 1965, 6 inches in 1964 and 13 inches in 1963.

Greatest snow depth was 9.7 inches, also on Dec. 31, 9.5 inches in 1966, 6.5 inches in 1965, 7.9 inches in 1964 and 26 inches in 1963.

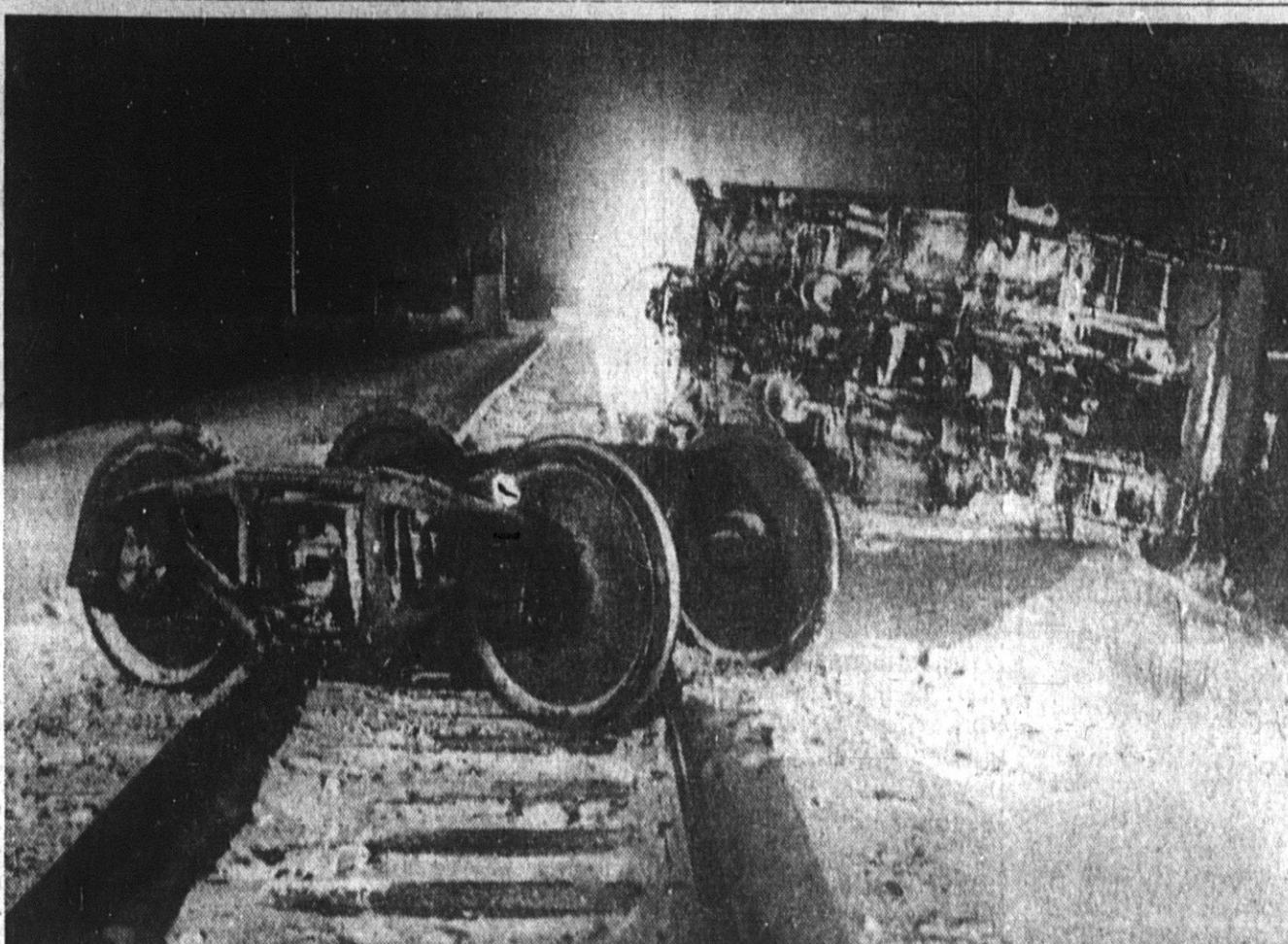
More Snow Falls; First Robin Seen

Light fluffy snow continued to fall in Holland Wednesday—1.75 inches from 8 to 11 a.m.—putting deposits on the ground at 12.75 inches, an inch more than on Tuesday.

The sun broke through just before noon today, just about the same time a robin was seen on West 30th St.

As a harbinger of spring, the first robin often is seen around the turn of the New Year and stirs debates on whether it truly returned from the southern climes or just hadn't gone south at all.

Predictions call for colder tonight and possible snow flurries with lows ranging from 5 above to 5 below zero. The overnight low was 17 degrees. At 6 a.m. it was 20 and at 11 a.m. 21.

Solid Waste Report Ready

GRAND HAVEN — The Board of County Road Commissioners has been informed that the solid waste study for the county has been completed by the engineering firm of Greeley and Hansen and copies of the final draft will be sent members of the County Board of Supervisors for review and study before the report is formally presented at the January session.

Commissions have amended rules and regulations for subdivision development and street construction in Ottawa County plats, to conform to the subdivision control act of the state. New rules and regulations are effective Jan. 1.

The commission was informed that the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation of the State Department of Conservation has approved a land acquisition grant of \$12,500 for purchasing 10 acres immediately south of Hager Park in Georgetown township.

John Dinkeloo, 49, who grew up in Holland and attended Hope College for two years, is pictured in the Jan. 5 issue of Time magazine under the Art section.

He is shown with his teammate, Kevin Roche, 45, in connection with the completion of the new Ford Foundation headquarters at 42nd St. east of Second Ave. in Manhattan.

The two architects, who have carried on the firm of Eero Saarinen since his death in 1961, won over impressive competition in their bold design set on 165-foot columns.

The L-shaped building fronts on the streets and looks inward into a garden landscaped with 30-foot magnolia trees, a water lily pond and 999 different kinds of shrubs.

Dinkeloo, whose father was a painter-decorator in Holland for many years, married the former Thelma Van Dyke of Zeeland, a Hope graduate of 1941. The family lived in Birmingham, Mich. until 1953 when they moved to Mt. Carmel, Conn. A son, Dirk V. Dinkeloo, is a freshman at Hope College.

Council Has 27-Minute Meeting

In a 27-minute meeting Wednesday night, City Council changed two polling places, arranged for 30-minute parking in a section of the City Hall parking lot, eliminated parking on River Ave. north of Sixth St. and approved police department plans for a Safetyville program to instruct young school children in safety.

The polling places changes affect the second precinct of ward 2 and the third precinct of ward 5. Hereafter the precinct in ward 2 will vote in Herrick Public Library instead of E. E. Fell Junior High School and the 5th ward precinct will vote in the new Maplewood public school at 925 Central Ave. instead of in the annex of Maplewood Reformed Church.

The easterly row of parking on the parking lot south of City Hall will be marked for 30-minute parking for the convenience of persons paying utility bills or having other business in City Hall after parking is eliminated in the City Hall block on River Ave. An earlier suggestion of installing parking meters in the lot was abandoned.

Council also passed a resolution eliminating parking on River Ave. north of Sixth St. This consists of seven metered spaces and 12 regular parking spaces between Third and Sixth Sts. No parking is allowed north of Third St.

Council okayed a quit claim deed for its interest in the 18th St. right-of-way just east of Lincoln Ave. releasing the deed to Mr. and Mrs. Gene Nyenhuis for that portion on the site of proposed apartments.

City Manager Herb Holt explained that the city expects to open 17th St. from Lincoln to Hazel Aves. in the future, also parts of 16th St. east and west of Hazel Ave. to allow access to dwellings. Later in the meeting, on motion of Councilman Bill Lamb, Council authorized the city attorney to institute condemnation proceedings to open the streets.

On the Safetyville project of the Holland police department, Council approved transfer of \$1,250 from the contingent fund to police capital outlay for the construction of props and obtaining equipment for the program simulating an actual street with signs, signals, store and home fronts, plus four pedal driven cars.

Police Chief Leslie Van Beveren explained the program with the aid of slides shown by Officer Marty Hardenberg. City funds will supplement funds from other sources in financing the project. Included is a trailer to transport the equipment.

The program is designed to teach kindergartners and first graders in both public and parochial schools. Props are set up in gymnasiums with rubber mats simulating streets. Street signs and signals are used in instructing both pedestrians and motorists in the pedal-driven cars. Van Beveren said art departments are assisting in designing and painting props.

City Attorney Gordon Cunningham and City Treasurer Jack Leenhouts were reappointed citizen members for a three-year term. Council approved a resolution designating hours for meetings the first four days from 9 a.m. to noon and 1 to 4 p.m. Salary was set at \$18 a day.

Accepted for first reading was an amendment to the subdivision ordinance deleting a section requiring the subdivider to plant trees in curb strips. Final action is expected at the next meeting.

A communication from Shirley Volkema and children expressed thanks for Council's expression of sympathy in the recent death of Sen. Harold J. Volkema.

Council approved a Board of Public Works change order to the contract of L. A. Water Conditioning involving demineralization equipment at an additional cost of \$867. Also approved was a hospital change order to the contract of Elzinga and Volkens involving connection of the present vacuum system to the one in the new addition for an increase of \$507.97.

Council acknowledged gift of a cast cutter valued at \$177 to the hospital from Dr. Arnold Dood and Dr. Charles Wang.

Mayor Nelson Bosman presided at the meeting. All Councilmembers were present. The invocation was given by Brigadier G. Stanley Hook of the Salvation Army.

Car Fire Reported

Holland-firemen made a brief run Tuesday night when it was reported a car owned by Harley Kimber of 348 River Ave. was on fire at 14th St. and Van Raalte Ave. 8:25 p.m. Firemen said fire in the 1961 model car was out by the time they arrived. No damage was reported.

Trainmen Hurt In Derailment

Two Chesapeake and Ohio employees were injured when the caboose of a 33-car, Chicago-to-Grand Rapids, freight train derailed at the 141st St. crossing, about two miles south of Holland, at 5:30 p.m. Wednesday.

The derailment was one of three reported in Western Michigan Wednesday and early today and the only one causing injuries.

Robert Koegler, 34, of Wyoming, the C and O train brakeman, was treated at Holland Hospital for lacerations of the hand and abrasions of the left leg. The conductor, Leo Dobe, 60, of Grand Rapids, was treated for first and second degree burns of the body and third degree burns of the right leg and hip.

Hospital officials said Dobe was burned by a coal stove in the caboose. The coals reportedly spilled out when the caboose rolled onto its side after derailling. Both men were riding in the caboose.

Allegan sheriff's deputies said a small fire broke out in the caboose after it rolled down an embankment, but it was quickly extinguished.

The caboose was destroyed when fire flared up again at 11:30 p.m. Hamilton and Graafschap firemen were called to the scene. Firemen said the caboose was almost completely destroyed before they arrived.

Railroad officials said the cause of the derailment is under investigation. No estimate of damage was available.

Officials reported the main line from Chicago was tied up for about two hours before the tracks could be cleared.

Seven Grand Trunk Railroad cars were derailed at Muskegon early today, blocking traffic on busy Henry St. in a factory area.

The derailment occurred at the Grand Trunk freight yards at the Henry St. crossing near the entrance of Campbell, Wyant and Cannon. Traffic was to be rerouted for about 12 to 15 hours, railroad men reported.

Officers said the trucks on one of the freight cars came loose and started the chain derailment.

Early Birds Hear Former FBI Agent

Some of the functions of the FBI were explained by Robert Lalley, a former FBI agent currently with the Michigan National Bank, at an Early Bird Club of Commerce Tuesday morning in Hotel Warm Friend.

Lalley, who left the FBI voluntarily after 22 years of service, expressed concern over the increase in crime — up 16 per cent the first nine months of 1967 compared with the same period in 1966. He said the survey revealed Michigan in third in the nation in crimes of violence and fifth in all crimes, based on a per 100,000 residents.

He also found a Grand Rapids survey disconcerting in that youngsters were not reporting crimes, and said the image of law enforcement must undergo a big change.

Outlining the FBI organization, he said the department in Washington under J. Edgar Hoover is a division of the Department of Justice which is headed by U.S. Attorney General Ramsey Clark. The FBI has 10 divisions, 58 field offices in the United States, 500 resident agencies or branch offices, 16,000 FBI employees and 6,500 special agents.

Fines, savings and recoveries in 1966 amounted to \$278 million or \$1.53 for every \$1 the government appropriated to the FBI for the fiscal year, Lalley said.

Among the many services of the bureau are the fingerprinting function listing 106 million prints and the FBI laboratories described as the finest crime detection laboratory in the world. A new center is under way, Lalley said, whereby a computerized system on criminal investigation will be set up with all states and principal cities. This service will be particularly useful in tracing stolen cars and fugitives. Another service is the FBI training schools for police and sheriff's officers on the local level, a service which both Holland and Ottawa county have used on many occasions.

He spoke highly of local enforcement agencies and said Holland was privileged to have a fine police department — and he was privileged to be an honorary member of the force. He also is proud of being among the 5,000 members of the ex-FBI Society which holds a convention every year.

The speaker was introduced by Chester Kuiper of Holland.

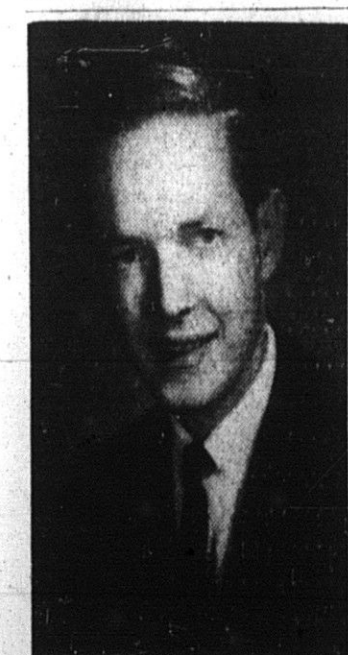
The driver was taken to Zeeland Community Hospital by his parents and was admitted for treatment of lacerations and a possible concussion.

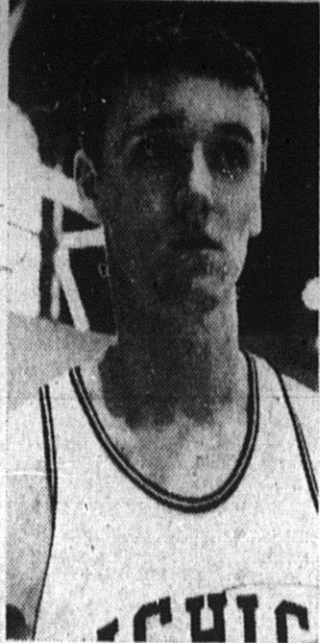
Sorenson was taken by ambulance to Grand Haven Municipal Hospital and was released after treatment for cuts and bruises.

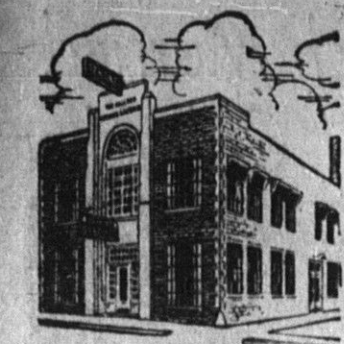

The figures are in for another four-day holiday and 684 persons were killed, about three times the number killed in Vietnam in recent weeks. And the vexing problem of what to do about the whole matter is still with us. According to Michigan authorities about 40 per cent of those killed on the road in Michigan had also been drinking, a figure which reflects the general proportion of death due to drunk driving week after week.

It is interesting to note some figures that have come out of Great Britain. There the authorities report 98 deaths over the holiday. But this figure is 60 less than last year, and, say these people, the saving of 60 lives reflects the use of the new breathalyzer. This is a 40 per cent saving of life. For the United States, this would have meant a saving of about 270 lives, more lives than we have been losing weekly in the war in Vietnam.

There seems to be no way to dramatize our situation and little hope that we will take some positive steps. Michigan's new laws have stepped up arrests but any hope of saving a large number of lives will require direct action, similar to that of the British.

More and more, authorities are speaking out on the causes for death on the road. This at least is reason for some optimism, but until the public demands the removal of all those who are potential killers we are not going to get very far. The question is simply one of life and death and the death is very sudden.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Jan. 7
The Word Became Flesh
John 1:1-14
By C. P. Dame

During the next 15 Sundays we will study the gospel according to John. The writer's aim is to prove the deity of Jesus whose disciple he was.

I. Let's first state a few facts about this gospel. John the writer was the son of Zebedee. He was at one time a disciple of John the Baptist and became a disciple of Jesus, then an apostle, and a member of the inner circle, the disciple whom Jesus loved—this fact is stated five times. There are 27 books in the New Testament; John wrote five, the gospel, three epistles and the book of Revelation. John was the only apostle to die a natural death. He was a fisherman but left his business to follow Jesus.

This gospel differs from the other three. About 90 per cent of the material in it is unique and is not in the others. Matthew wrote for the Jews, Mark for the Romans. Luke stresses the universality of Christ but John teaches the fact of the deity of Jesus. The gospel contains a number of long discourses of Jesus which deal with the subjects of Light, Life, Truth, and Christ's relation with the Father.

The word "believe" appears often and he states that the works of Jesus and His miracles prove His deity. John wrote the gospel about 90 A. D. in Ephesus. It is a great gospel and deserves our best attention and study. May we learn much from it.

II. Jesus Christ reveals God to us. John 1:1-18 is called the prologue, which is an introduction to the whole gospel and summarizes the important truths which the gospel sets forth.

Only John uses the term, "the Word" in reference to Christ about whom he mentions three facts in one sentence—His eternity, personality and deity. John calls Jesus the agent or efficient cause of creation, a proof of His wisdom and power and omnipotence.

John uses the words "light," "life" and "love" frequently. Jesus is the source of all physical, intellectual and spiritual life. By means of Christ we see objects clearly. "The light shineth in darkness"—that is ignorance, sin, guilt and misery, but the darkness has never been able to put the light out. There is a constant conflict between darkness and light.

III. Some reject Christ and some accept Him. John the Baptist was the first witness to the deity of Christ. John summons others in his gospel. The Baptist was a witness to that light. The words, "coming into the world" refer to Christ, not to every man.

The world did not recognize Christ although He made it. The Jewish nation received Him not. He is still rejected by Jews and Gentiles. But those who accepted Him received the power to become the children of God. And how? Through the new birth.

"And the Word became flesh"—this is the miracle. God became man. Jesus assumed flesh and blood. This took place in order that we might become partakers of divine nature. The apostles saw Jesus for He lived with them for a short time and they with Him and saw His glory. This Christ is worthy of our belief and trust. John wrote in order that we all might believe.

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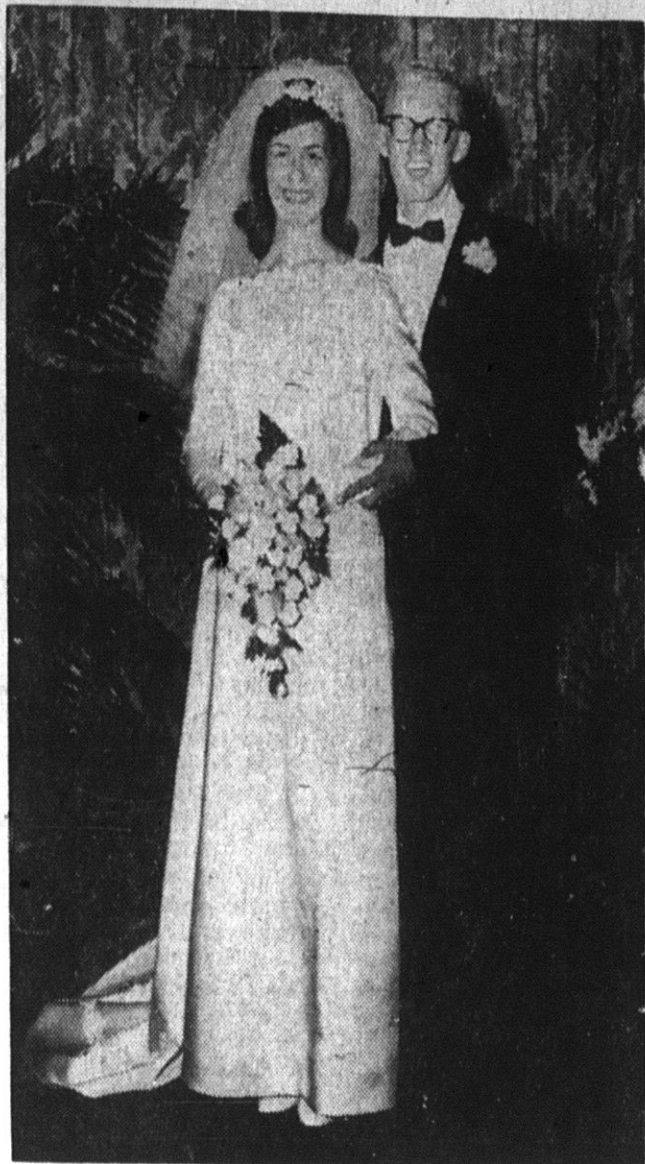

Year in Review Marks Progress for Allegan

ALLEGAN — The year 1967 in Allegan county has been a slow but steady progressive one both in the city and the county.

Last January Action Ambulance Co. owned by Oele Ambulance service of Grand Rapids was placed under contract by Allegan County Supervisors. In April they voided their contract by announcing they would no longer provide service, giving the reason that there was not enough business to pay employees their wages. Temporary service was set up by the Allegan County Sheriff's Department and an ambulance borrowed from the Allegan County Medical Care Facility put into use until July, when Ronald Duchaney and Robert Hiscoc of Allegan began a private enterprise ambulance service. They now serve Allegan County with the exception of Fennville and Hamilton which are served by their local funeral homes.

An architect has been hired and plans are under way by the Allegan County Supervisors Special Building Committee for the proposed new 50 bed Allegan County Medical Care facility.

The State Water Resources Commission has approved an Allegan County Park sewage lagoon, located on Lake Michigan near Ganges.

Final approval by the city councilmen of two ordinances resulting in 100 per cent increase in water and sewer rates. This was the first hike in 12 years.

The Council also agreed to float an \$80,000 bond issue to finance construction of a new maintenance building and 16 T-hanger at Padgham Field. Total cost of the project was \$102,000. Some general fund money was used until such time as the airport could become self-sustaining.

City voters approved sale of their Municipal Power plant to Consumers Power Co. for \$1,750,000. Changeover of the plant is still awaiting transfer of license approval by the Federal Power Commission. The sale is being blocked by a group calling themselves Citizens for Allegan Committee.

Teachers received pay hikes of at least \$700 with base pay being elevated from \$5,100 to \$5,800. An additional 35 teachers were needed this year due to the annexation of 20 rural districts and closing of the Blessed Sacrament school.

James H. Snow, long-time official of the 115-year-old Allegan County Fair, announced he would not seek reelection as president-secretary, an office he held 19 years. Weldon Rumery, formerly assistant secretary, was elected to the post.

Allegan County Probate Judge, Dwight Cheever announced the appointment of the first all-female condemnation commission ever to serve the county.

Allegan shoppers were treated to a month's free parking in December through the co-sponsorship of the Allegan Area

Chamber of Commerce and City Council. A contest was held with school children through the age of 12 entering paper bags artistically designed with Christmas theme pictures, the best of these were used to cover the meters.

Death came to 92 year old Clare E. Hoffman, Allegan county's most cussed and discussed resident. He was a veteran fourth district congressman, having served 28 years until a stroke forced his retirement in 1962.

Allegan County Association for Retarded children took another big step forward with the opening of a combined workshop and "Gift Shop" located downtown.

In the year 1968 Allegan county residents will realize that inflation has hit the cost of local government as well as state and national. County Clerk Esther Hettinger has released a report that the total of all local taxes county residents will be paying comes to nearly \$1 million more than in 1967.

Also on the county's agenda for the coming year are: The Allegan Board of Education in conjunction with the General Committee and the Citizen's Committee hopes to solve the problem of providing adequate classroom space caused by annexation of county schools.

The Allegan County Board of Supervisors anticipates county spending in 1968 will reach \$1,853,667.39. Amendments tacked onto the proposed 1968 budget will result in salary raises totaling \$8,212 for seven county officers. Approved raises will bring annual salaries up to \$9,000 for the county clerk, \$5,500 for the drain commissioner, \$7,000 for the friend of the court, \$9,000 to the county prosecutor and \$8,000 to the register of deeds, county treasurer and county sheriff.

At the half the score was 23-16.

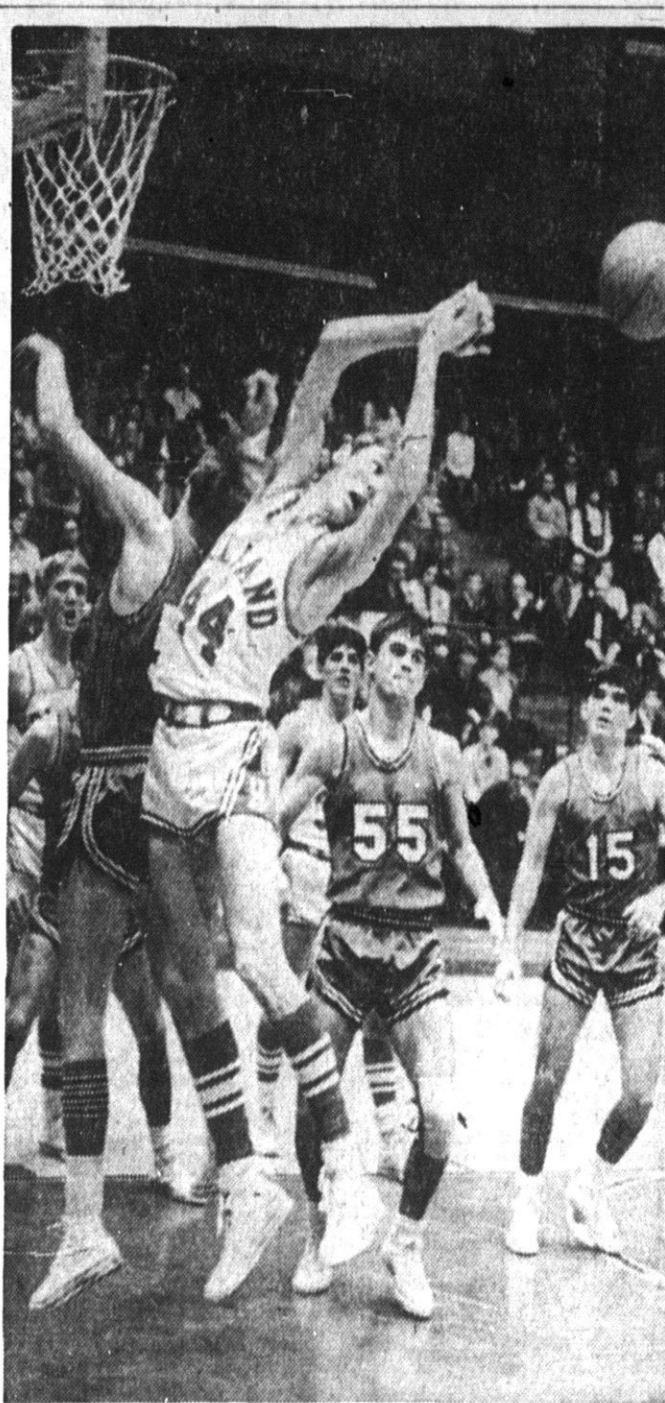

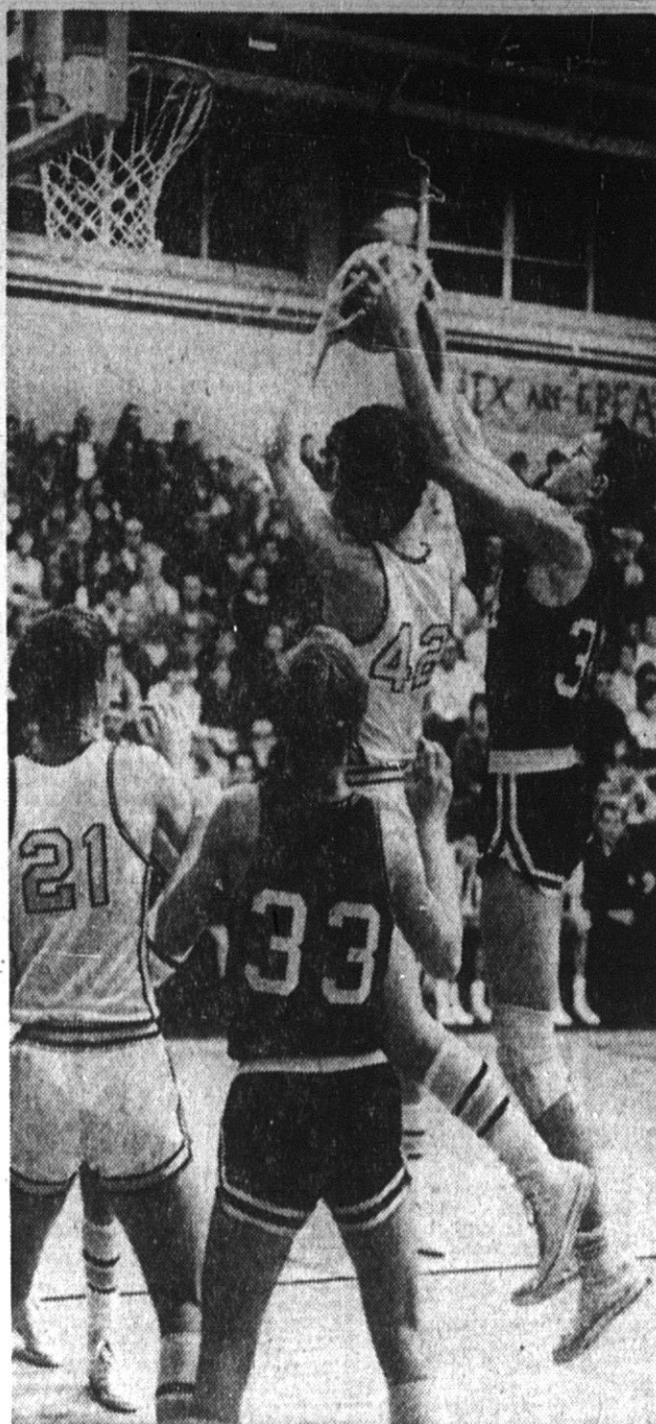

joining the department. Van Beveren said the four recruits bring the total to 37 policemen in Holland.

The No. 1 story in Holland during 1967 was the strike by public school teachers, or, as they called it, "withholding services."

The salary dispute is not yet resolved. Negotiations on a master contract started early in the year and came to a climax late in August when no settlement was reached and it appeared schools might not open Sept. 5.

Despite long negotiating sessions right up to the deadline, no agreement was reached and children remained at home while teachers held four days of sessions arranged by the Holland Education Association at a picnic lodge north of the city.

The Board of Education went to Circuit Court Sept. 6 and obtained an injunction ordering teachers back to the classroom, based generally on the concept that public officials do not have the right to strike. The HEA, backed by the Michigan Education Association and the National Education Association, in the wee hours of the next morning obtained a stay from the Michigan Court of Appeals with the promise of a hearing on the stay the following Saturday, Sept. 9. The Holland case assumed state and national importance since 28 school districts in Michigan were shut down.

The Court of Appeals upheld the Ottawa Circuit Court injunction and teachers reported to school Sept. 11. The MEA moved to kill the court ruling by appealing the decision to the Michigan Supreme Court, filing appeals with six of the eight justices at their homes.

On the night of Sept. 12, the Michigan Supreme Court agreed to hear the Holland case but refused to lift the injunction. It was a 5-3 vote with three of the Democrats on the bench siding with the teachers' no-contract no-work stand, and the fourth Democrat, Justice Eugene Black, agreed with the majority but said Holland teachers their charges.

A 2½-hour hearing was held in the Supreme Court in Lansing Oct. 7. The court opinion is still awaited.

In December, the Board of Education offered a two-year package to the teachers, holding to its stand of no deficit spending for the 1967-68 school year but offering what some regarded as substantial increases the second year. Teachers Dec. 18 voted 95-93 "not to vote" and the offer was tabled. Previous votes had been in the 200-7 range.

On other fronts, building activity continued in Holland during the year. The \$12½ million Beech-Nut plant, financed by revenue bonds floated by the city, was completed and went into production in October. A fine new \$1.2 million Christian High School went into operation with the opening of the fall term, and was dedicated at two gatherings Oct. 30 and Nov. 1. Speakers were Dr. William Spoelhof, president of Calvin College, and U.S. Rep. Guy Vander Jagt. The latter presented a flag which had flown over the U.S. capital.

Three new elementary schools were completed in Holland during the year, and work is progressing on the community swimming pool approved at the same time school building funds were okayed.

Work on the \$3½-million hospital addition has passed the midpoint and the new wing is expected to be completed by mid-1968.

Registration Of Aliens Set For January

Holland post office is among 32,000 in the country assisting in registering about 3½ million aliens in January.

Under the Immigration and Nationality Act of 1952, every post office is responsible for providing registration cards and turning the completed cards over to the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

Cards must be picked up personally by registrants and they may be handed in to the post office when completed or turned in directly to Immigration and Naturalization offices.

Post offices will accept cards only until the end of January. Those not registered by Jan. 31 must deal with Immigration and Naturalization offices.

Alien registrations have been increasing. Registrations a year ago totaled 3.3 million and the total is expected to reach 3.4 million next month.

Aliens are not necessarily restricted to registration at home post offices. Those away from home may register at any post office.

Pfc. Melvin E. Hoffman, 23, of 457 West 23rd St., was killed by sniper fire May 24 while serving with the 1st Cavalry division. Third casualty was Pfc. Jack Elenbaas, 19, of 190 West 205th St., who was killed by hostile fire June 8. Military rites for all three were held in Pilgrim Home cemetery.

Historic Third Reformed Church is undergoing a complete restoration. Work was started in July and is expected to take about eight months. The church marked its centennial during 1967. It was founded in 1867, was destroyed in the big Holland fire of 1871 and was leveled by a windstorm two years later. It changed from Dutch to English in 1896. The extensive restoration program was approved because the church felt this historic building should be preserved.

The death of State Sen. Harold R. Volkema, 37, Dec. 17 shocked Holland and the senator's colleagues in Lansing who flocked in large numbers to funeral services in Faith Christian Reformed church. A special election has been scheduled Feb. 19. Holland elected four new councilmen in the spring election. They are Alvin H. Dyk,

councilman-at-large; L.W. Lamb Jr., second ward; Robert Dykstra, fourth ward, and Jacob Smith, sixth ward. Late in the year, a new office for the mayor was established on the second floor of city hall.

In October, the S.S. South American, luxury cruise ship which had its winter home in Holland for more than 40 years, made its last cruise before becoming a merchant marine training ship on the east coast.

Enrollment at Hope College reached an all-time high in October, listing 1,841 students.

Mrs. Hazel Hayes who re-ed last year as library director in Holland was named librarian of the year at the State Library Convention in Detroit in October.

In February, Holland-Racine Shoes Inc. ceased operations after many years.

In June, the Office of Economic Opportunity approved a federal grant of \$27,411 for the Holland Day Care Center.

The Holland National Guard unit put in 11 days of duty at the Detroit riots in July.

The alewife scourge hit Lake Macatawa beaches this summer when hundreds of thousands of dead fish floated inland from Lake Michigan. There was nothing to do but bury the dead shad. A happier ending was written in the fall when the Coho salmon brought out fishermen from far and wide. Their enthusiasm was described as the best thing that had come to the West Michigan tourist area in many a year.

During 1967, Holland had two traffic fatalities. Ottawa county registered 22 traffic fatalities.

Winter sports enthusiasts were happy over a decision in November to operate Carousal Mountain this season. Extensive improvements were made with emphasis on safety. Snow was late this year but arrived promptly on the first day of winter and skiing started a few days later.

Carvers Notch Wins Over Lansing, Tackers

The Holland Carvers basketball team edged the Grand Rapids Tackers 118-115 Monday night in the Civic Center in an exhibition game. The game, which filled a vacancy in the schedule caused by the Muskegon Panthers dropping out of the North American Basketball League, was played before about 1,600 fans.

The Carvers had trouble finding the hoop in the first quarter and soon found themselves trailing by a 32-16 score, before they began to hit. Led by three baskets by Henry Hughes, the Carvers narrowed the gap at the quarter to 34-28.

Hughes, having regained his early season form, scored the first three Carver baskets in the second quarter, and the Carvers soon caught and passed the Tackers. Hughes scored 19 of his 21 points in the first half to keep the Carvers in the game. The score at the intermission was 60-54 with Holland leading.

With Hubie Marshall taking over the scoring lead in the second half the Carvers continued to roll until they led by as much as 18 points in the third period. Marshall scored five of the 11 field goals made by the Carvers in the quarter, which ended with Nick Mantis hitting a three-point goal for the Tackers from well over half the length of the gym, to cut the Carvers margin to 92-79.

M.C. Burton of the Tackers and Marshall put on a scoring duel in the fourth quarter as each scored 16 points. However the Tackers received help from Mantis and Honderd, and they steadily cut into the Carver lead, getting as close as two points.

However, mainly through the shooting of Marshall, the Carvers managed to hold the lead and go on to the win. At one point in the final quarter Marshall scored 10 straight Carver points, and six straight at another stretch.

The game was extremely rough with three technical fouls being called, one on the Carvers and two on Grand Rapids. Marshall scored 38 points and Willie Merriweather was top re-

bounder with 15. For the Tackers it was all Burton, as he scored 34 points and hauled in 19 rebounds.

Saturday the Carvers return to league action, hosting the Chicago Bombers in the Civic.

Hope Gains Share Of Tourney Title

SCHENECTADY, N. Y. — Hope College's basketball team, sparked by a sizzling second half performance, gained a share of the Union College Holiday Round-robin Tournament title here Saturday night by upsetting Massachusetts Institute of Technology 68-60.

The victory, coupled with a 52-46 win by Lehigh University over host Union, threw the tournament championship in a three-way tie. Hope, Lehigh and MIT all posted 2-1 records in the three day affair. Trailing by a point at half-time, Hope sizzled the nets with a 64 per cent shooting clip in the last 20 minutes to post its sixth victory in eight starts.

MIT led during the entire first half and owned a slim 29-28 intermission advantage. A pair of baskets by Bruce McCreary put Hope ahead for the first time by a 32-31 score.

The score was tied at 32-32 before a short jump shot by Hope's Floyd Brady put the Flying Dutchmen ahead to stay. Hope's biggest lead of the night was a 12-point 60-48 spread.

Hope shot a frigid 29 per cent in the first half, but countered with 16 baskets in just 25 tries during the second. Brady led the Hope scoring attack with 21 points while McCreary added 17 and Gary Rypma tossed in 13. McCreary scored 14 of his 17 points in the second half, mostly on long jump shots.

Brady's performance made him the fifth highest scorer in Hope history. The 6 ft. 3 inch Chicagoan has scored 1,513 points in four seasons to surpass Ray Ritsma who tallied 1,510 points during his collegiate career.

Game scoring honors went to MIT's Dave Jansson who with a 26 point performance became the highest scorer in MIT history. He has scored 1,230 during his three-year varsity career.

Jansson was selected the tournament's most valuable player by a panel of sports-writers and broadcasters.

Named to the all-tournament team were Brady, Jansson,

Bob Lowman of Lehigh, Craig Carlson of Union and Bruce Wheeler of MIT.

Both teams made 28 baskets with Hope winning the contest at the free-throw line. The Flying Dutchmen made 12 of 19 charity tosses and were whistled for only seven personal fouls in the game.

MIT hit four of nine free throws. Hope made 28 of 66 shots for 43 per cent and MIT made 28 of 62 for 45 per cent. Hope led in rebounding, 43-41.

Hope is back in action Saturday in a non-league contest at Lake Forest, Ill. The Flying Dutchmen return home on Saturday, Jan. 13, for an MIAA showdown against perennial rival Calvin. The Knights of Calvin won the Marshall Optimist Holiday Tournament.

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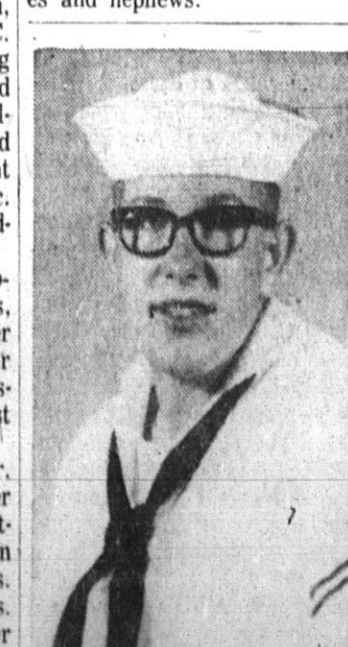
