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Many Items Processed By Council

City Council disposed of considerable routine business at a 55-minute meeting in City Hall Wednesday night.

Two ordinances were approved and will become effective Jan. 23. One redefines a school bus to include the minibuses of the Day Care Center. In recognizing the flashing lights as a schoolbus. One councilman expressed the hope that drivers would use discretion in making their stops and not delay traffic any longer than is necessary.

The other ordinance set a free section in the food services ordinance, classifying establishments by seating capacity and various classes including a vending machine license.

Another ordinance on licenses and permits for taxicabs and buses was accepted for first reading.

Oaths of office were filed for Paul Dalman, Compensation Commission; Simon Sybesma, Hospital Board; Howard Kammeraad and Lawrence Geuder, Planning Commission; Jane Schaap, Board of Canvassers.

A petition bearing 16 signatures representing nine addresses requested sanitary sewer service in Birchwood Ave. A city manager report placed estimated costs of such an improvement at \$112,214, with single residential benefits at \$1,000. A public hearing is scheduled Feb. 6.

The following hospital gifts were acknowledged: framed picture from Mr. and Mrs. Victor Milliken; two paintings valued at \$205, from Holland Friends of Art; painting valued at \$175 from Nate Steinberg; subscription to Reader's Digest from Klaas Veen; salary for the director of volunteers for one year from the Hospital Auxiliary Board.

A transfer of \$17,826.72 from the hospital contingency account to establish a new respiratory therapy department was approved, as was the renewal of existing Emergency Physicians of Holland Inc. agreement for coverage of the hospital emergency room. Vote on the latter was 8-1 with Councilman John Bloemendaal dissenting because he dislikes open-ended contracts in which differences are paid by the people.

The polling place for precinct 5-1, ordinarily Civic Center, will be in Washington School for the special Jan. 22 BPW bonding election. A basketball game is scheduled that night in Civic Center.

Council approved low bid of Owens Body Co. Inc. in net amount of \$9,377.35 for truck related equipment for the street department. Of the amount, \$6,108.11 will come from revenue sharing funds and \$3,269.03 from the Equipment Revolving Fund.

Council renewed its contract with Employers Insurance of Wausau, Wis., for its low bid of Workmen's Compensation, general liability and umbrella liability insurance coverages for 1974. The contract of \$77,787 for Workmen's Compensation, \$60,239 for general liability and \$7,993 for umbrella liability is subject to approval by the Insurance Audit and Inspection Co. The total cost is some \$34,000 up from last year. The greater share of the total package is for Holland Hospital which assumes its share of the costs.

Claims against the city from Ottawa Savings and Loan, 245 Central Ave., and IGA Food Basket, 653 Michigan Ave, were referred to the insurance carrier and city attorney.

Council approved a license for residential care facilities to OAR Inc., known as Ottagon Alcohol Rehabilitation.

Council approved a water main on East 24th St., designed primarily to service a residence at 568 East 24th St., and set Jan. 16 as date for public hearing.

Also approved was a revision to the intersection at Fairbanks and Eighth St., which would cut back the radius of the south-west quadrant. A center lane would be for left turn only for northbound traffic. A right turn lane also would be provided.

John Bloemendaal was appointed local contact person for legislative information from the Michigan Municipal League.

A city manager report advised Council that Ottawa District Court no longer will type complaints and warrants and that each governmental unit will be responsible for preparing the documents. Council approved a plan to have the work done in the city attorney's office at the rate of \$7 per hour.

Council also was informed that the police department now is dispatching fire department personnel through the central switchboard at the police department.

Harold J. Scholten, 52, of 1982 South Shore Dr., formerly of 569 Hiawatha Dr., died Wednesday at 10 p.m. in Muskegon's Hackley Hospital of injuries suffered in an accident Sunday at 7:22 p.m. along South Shore Dr.

Scholten was the city's third traffic fatality of 1973. Police said his car ran off South Shore Dr. east of Allen Dr. and struck a utility pole. Officers said he may have suffered a stroke or heart seizure.

Scholten was an executive with Padnos Iron & Metal Co. and has been associated with Associated Truck Lines, Brewers City Coal Dock and West Shore Construction before joining Padnos in 1964 as assistant to the president.

He was a charter member of Christ Memorial Reformed Church and served on its greater consistory. He was a past president of the Exchange Club and a member of Travelers Protective Association.

Dial-a-Ride Bus Service Starts Feb. 4

Dial-a-Ride Transportation Service for Holland city is scheduled to start Feb. 4. City Council was informed Wednesday night by City Manager William L. Bopf.

Plans provide for door-to-door service in the city with specific points outside the city north of Holland. The minibuses will travel primarily in three basic service areas with each loop connecting with the central business district. Shuttle bus service will be provided to three points north of Holland, Meijer's, the county branch building and the Michigan Employment Security Commission office.

The small buses will be in general service from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m., Monday through Friday. There will be five vehicles with two to four generally in service and the fifth as maintenance spare and peak hour backup. Service will be offered to any points within the city of Holland.

The basic fare will be 50 cents, with a 25-cent fare for those over 65. Children under 12 will ride free with a paying adult. There will be a free transfer to the North River Ave. shuttle bus, and a 25-cent fare to originate on the North River Ave. shuttle.

Service will be provided along East Eighth St. in Holland township, but service to points north of East Eighth St. in the Federal school area will have a 25-cent surcharge.

Jan Meinel of the city's manager's staff has been coordinating Holland's study in cooperation with the Ford Motor Co. Transportation and Research Planning office. She told Councilmen efforts are being made to keep the plan flexible and provide the greatest possible service.

With an early starting time of 6 a.m. it is expected that many persons will desire transportation to and from work. It is expected senior citizens would prefer transportation during off-peak hours, probably between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m.

As yet, there are no plans for Saturday operations, but studies are continuing and every effort is being made to meet any need.

The Social Security office at 16th St. and the bypass will be considered an in-city destination. City Manager Bopf said DART service in Ann Arbor is used 70 per cent by women.

The DART program in Holland will be funded the first year by state and federal funds.

Police Hold Zeeland Man In Accident

A 14-year-old newspaper carrier boy making his rounds on bicycle along 16th St. west of Van Raalte Ave. at 5:22 a.m. today was struck from behind by a car that fled the scene of the personal injury accident.

Holland police broadcast a description of the car and a vehicle fitting the description was stopped about 30 minutes later by Zeeland police and the driver taken into custody.

Injured and treated in Holland Hospital and released was Rudy Mendoza. A 22-year-old Zeeland resident was under questioning by Holland police who said he would be charged with leaving the scene of a personal injury accident, a felony. The name of the subject was not released by police.

Police said Rudy was westbound along the south side of 16th St. when struck from behind by a westbound car that crossed the centerline. Police said a bag of newspapers carried over his back may have saved him from more serious injuries.

Investigating officers said the car went into a snowbank after Rudy was hit and the motorist backed out, went around the injured boy and continued westbound along 16th St.

About a half hour later Zeeland police stopped a 1968 model two door hardtop car at Lincoln and Maple Sts. and took the driver into custody for Holland police.

The subject held by police faced arraignment on the hit and run charges in Holland District Court, officers said.

Resurfacing Program Set By Council

A proposed resurfacing program for 1974 listing \$43,798 for major streets and \$80,287 for local streets was approved by City Council Wednesday night. The program was presented by City Manager William L. Bopf Dec. 19 and taken under study for two weeks.

Streets selected for resurfacing were chosen on the basis of their respective physical needs and traffic volumes. In addition, consideration was given to petitions for utilities and no street has been included that has all utility services installed. Such streets, under Council policy, are handled on a full improvement basis.

The report pointed out that funds are not sufficient to pave all streets in need of improvements, and a priority list was established with an attempt to provide some improvements in almost every segment of the city... the core city area, suburban areas and even a few rural areas.

Absent from the list are two streets which have been targets for a number of complaints, West 40th St. and 64th St. east from Blue Star Highway. Both are sparsely populated and used largely by motorists living outside the city. West 40th St. between Ottawa Ave. and Graafschap Rd. is in poor condition and must be streets having precedence over completely rebuilt. Among 40th St. and 64th St. is Mrtle Ave., a busy, narrow street which has been a matter of concern for several years.

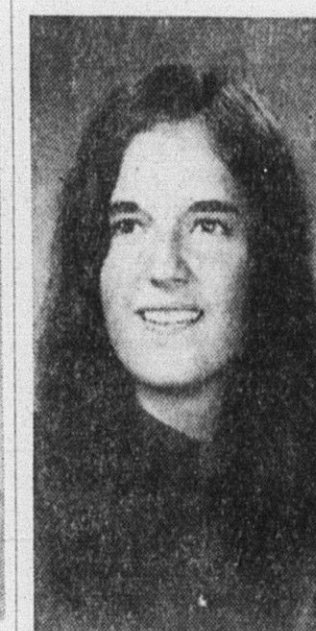

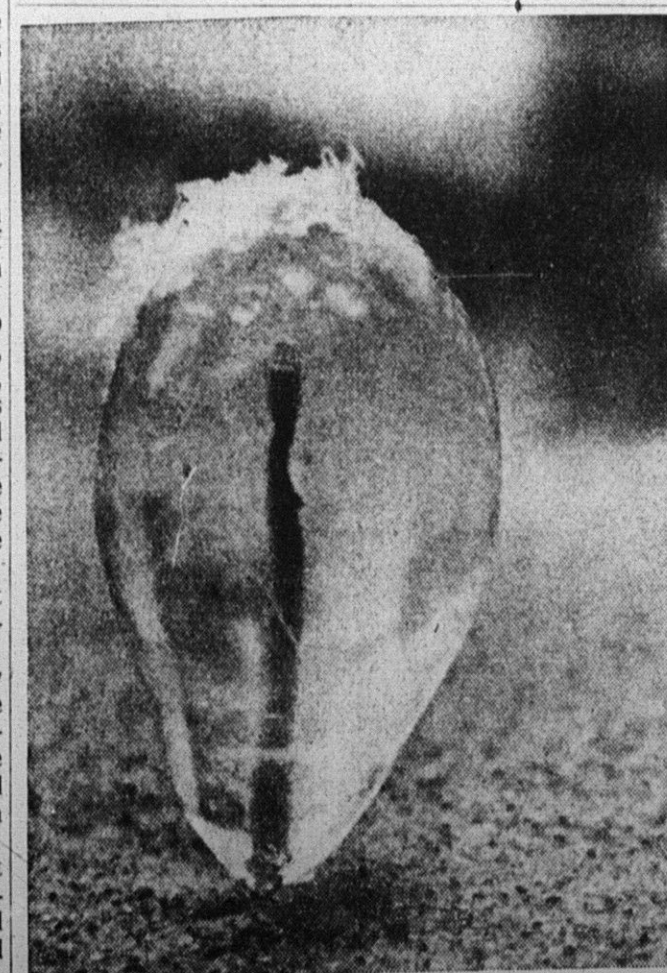

Born in Holland, he had lived there most of his life, working as chef for the Warm Friend Hotel for many years, retiring two years ago. He was a veteran of World War II.

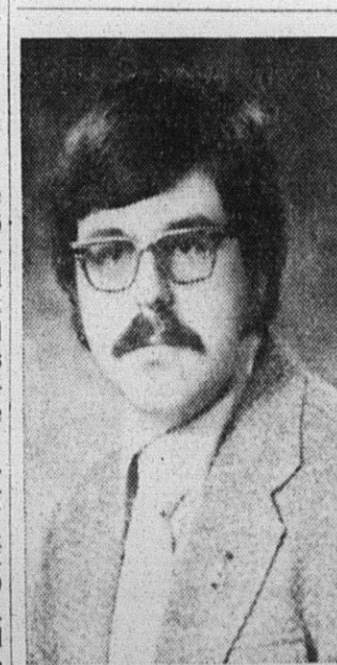

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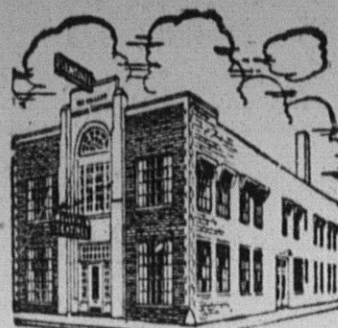
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Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Jan. 6
Bread for the Hungry
John 6:15-51

Many people are hungry. Mankind needs food for the body and the soul. Jesus is God's bread for the souls of people. This timely truth this first lesson of the New Year teaches.

I. Jesus made claims. The first verse of the text states that He claims to be the bread of life and that He satisfies the hungry and thirsty. Chapter 6 tells about the feeding of the five thousand, it is also recorded in Matthew 14:13-21. Mark 6:32-44 and Luke 9:10-17. Only John gives us the teaching of the miracle.

Jesus was in Galilee. The Passover season was close at hand and many people were going to Jerusalem. Many followed Jesus. His teaching and healing made Him popular. Jesus did not want the many people to go home without food, and so with the help of a lad and His apostles He miraculously fed the five thousand. When Jesus sensed that some talked about making Him king He first sent the apostles away by a boat to Capernaum and then withdrew Himself to the hills. While the apostles were battling a storm Jesus walked on the water and stepped into the boat and went along.

II. The lesser appeals. The crowd found Jesus in Capernaum. He knew what they were seeking—more bread for their bodies. Jesus told them to work for the food that "endures to eternal life, which the Son of man will give to you." When the people talked about Moses and the manna, Jesus told them that God who had given their fathers manna now offered them the true bread and when the people asked for it Jesus said: "I am the bread of life." This is the first of the seven "I am" passages—the others are: I am the light of the world, the door, the good shepherd, the resurrection, the way, the truth and the life, and the vine.

III. Jesus is the life-giver. He is essential to real life. Faith in Jesus is as necessary as bread for the body. Faith in Jesus is likened to eating the Lord's flesh and drinking His blood—this implies complete identification with Jesus, a wholehearted surrender to Him and His mission. Bread is essential, so is Jesus; bread must be received, so must Jesus be received; bread must be broken, and Jesus was broken.

Some in the crowd heard but believed not. It is encouraging to know that the Father keeps on drawing His own and some respond. Today millions are concerned only about the physical and the material, the spiritual and eternal are ignored. It is also true that many yield their lives to Christ and discover real living which has no end.

The causes to which land brokers attribute this phenomenal jump are of interest. The leading factor, not surprisingly, is farm commodity price boosts; that makes farming a lot more attractive than it was even a year or two ago. Another significant factor, one which has been steadily evident in recent years, is farm enlargement. A third major influence, according to an Iowa State University news release, is buying pressure from non-farm investors.

Several conclusions can be drawn. One, noted above, is that high farm commodity prices—and, of course, the prospect that world demand will continue to be brisk—increase interest in agriculture. The data also further underscore the trend toward larger and larger holdings, many of them farmed by corporations rather than individual families. It is clear, too, that farm land is becoming an increasingly attractive investment as demand for food burgeons.

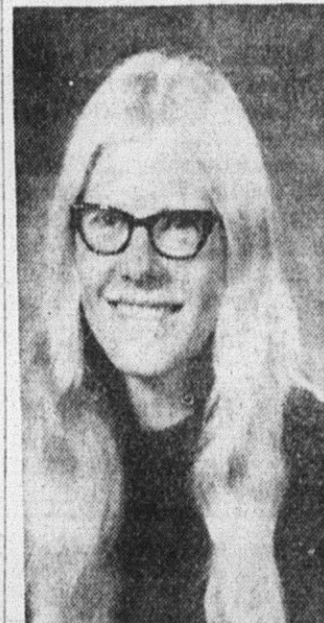

Mass Fire Heads News Stories in '73

The most spectacular story in Holland, during 1973 was the fire that roared through the two-story Mass Furniture Co. late in January, and spread into the second floor offices above Ekster's Paint store, injuring four firemen and causing damage well over a half million dollars.

An investigation by police and fire departments and the state fire marshal's office revealed that a juvenile admitted setting fire to some trash at Reliable Cycle at the other end of the block, but there was no proof that the fire there was connected with the conflagration in the two larger buildings at 10th and River.

The furniture store relocated elsewhere and the office building is being rebuilt for a one - floor structure.

During 1973 Hollanders joined Americans everywhere in rejoicing over the Vietnam cease - fire. About 5,000 in the area wore POW - MIA bracelets.

Late in the year, Holland got a new mayor, Louis Hallacy II, who succeeded L. W. Lamb Jr., who did not seek reelection. New councilmen are James Vande Poel and Kenneth Beelen. Zeeland elected Edward Nagelkirk as mayor, succeeding Frank Hoogland, with Dick Timmer and LaVerne De Vries as new councilmen. Norm Unema, a native of Holland, was elected mayor of Hudsonville.

The 1972-73 winter season brought a light snowfall, a total of 57.45 inches. It is usual for Holland to have close to 100 inches. An early spring resulted in a long blooming season for tulips which were somewhat past their peak but still in fairly good condition for the tulip festival May 16-19. Gov. Milliken joined local burghers in the opening street scrubbing. Stanley Kresge was grand marshal for the Saturday parade.

In November, Holland's Tulip Time festival was selected for the governor's Embassy of Tourism Award for outstanding contributions to Michigan's tourist industry.

Willard C. Wichers was recognized for several achievements in 1973. In January, he was given a testimonial for 21 years on the Planning Commission, plus recognition for many other services to the community. In February he was awarded the "Service Above Self" award from the Rotary Club.

In November he and his wife Nell went to the Netherlands for three weeks and he was presented with a citation and 1,000 guilders (\$385) from the Dutch Tourist Association for devotion to Dutch culture in America and particularly for an outside individual judge act as official judge for that day. The next judging clinic will be held on Feb. 2 instead of Jan. 26.

As we go into the year 1974, we look forward to working with and providing educational experiences to 4-H club members, leaders and families. Over 4,100 boys and girls were enrolled under the leadership of approximately 450 volunteer men and women leaders in 1973.

The 14 council members are: Hudsonville district, Mrs. Denus Ten Broeke, Mrs. Alvin Wolters and Mr. Harvey Avink, with Leon Norris serving a one-year appointed term; Holland-Zeeland district, Mrs. Casey Karsten, Don Poest and Mrs. Willis Zwagerman, Jr., with Mrs. Ed Kampen serving a one-year appointed term; Coopersville district, Mrs. Emmett Schoenborn, Jim Meerman and Sally Lillibridge with Roland Reed serving a one-year appointed term; Grand Haven district, Mrs. James Szymas is serving an elected term and Dave Anderson, another one-year appointed term.

The next meeting of the 4-H Council will be Jan. 10, a dinner meeting at the Holiday Inn on Mercury Dr. in Grand Haven. Western Theological Seminary has a new president. Dr. I. John Hesselink was inaugurated as the 11th president in October at ceremonies in Third Reformed Church. He was a missionary - educator in Japan with the Union Theological Seminary for 10 years before returning to this country.

Dr. Martin Essenburg is the new superintendent of Christian Schools succeeding Mark Vander Ark who accepted a position with the Reformed Bible College in Grand Rapids. Dr. Essenburg was headmaster of Christian Academy in Japan. Hope College had a busy year. In February it conferred a Doctor of Humane Letters degree on U.S. Sen. Mark Hatfield of Oregon. Later in the year it conferred honorary degrees on James W. Miller, president of Western Michigan University, Robert H. Schuller of Garden Grove, Calif., Dr. I. John Hesselink of Western Seminary and Stanley S. Kresge.

In March, the music and drama departments of the college staged a new musical based on Cyrano de Bergerac with Jose Ferrer as director. In October Dr. and Mrs. Norman Vincent Peale of Marble Collegiate Church of New York participated in dedication ceremonies for Peale Science Center. A highly secret visit of President Nixon for the event was cancelled because of the Middle East crisis. The president sent greetings.

Late in October, American Aerosols Inc. gave Hope College its former manufacturing site on the railroad tracks between 12th and 13th Sts. to aid the college in its site acquisition program for a proposed physical education center.

In April, Mr. and Mrs. J. Russel Bouws were revealed as donors of the \$100,000 gift for an outdoor swimming pool in Smallegen Park.

The year 1973 left its mark on continuing erosion of the Lake Michigan shoreline. High

water lines and fierce storms pounded away at already ravaged banks. Most spectacular incident was the collapse of the L. William Siedman cottage at Macatawa in March.

The year also saw continued progress on construction of the I-196 link from Holland to Jenison. The program calls for three interchanges in Ottawa county and several in Allegan county.

The condition of South Shore Dr. remains unchanged. Paving was ordered in by City Council in March after which citizens started suit in Circuit Court. In August, Circuit Judge Harold Van Domelen ruled against the city enjoining it from levying assessments for improvement. Two days later the city filed an appeal in the Michigan Court of Appeals.

One - way streets also remained in effect. A recall vote lost in August by 794 votes.

Fire Chief Dick Brandt retired in August after 46 years with the department, 16 as chief. Marvin Mokma, a 31 - year veteran, was named chief. Mrs. Clara Bartels with 118 descendants celebrated her 100th birthday Nov. 20. She became a U.S. citizen.

A Holland man, David Fairbanks, 35, won \$50,000 in a Michigan lottery super drawing Nov. 1.

George Cook was inducted into the Order of Orange Nassau by order of Her Majesty Queen Juliana of the Netherlands in October.

Herrick Public Library was listed for \$100,000 and the Hazel Forney Herrick Art Center at Holland High School for \$50,000 in the will of the late Ray W. Herrick, 82, a Tecomseh industrialist, who died April 14. The Ronald Ames family of Aurora, Ill., became the 1,000,000th visitor to Windmill Island since its opening in 1965. Wooden shoes, a copy of the Eet Smakelijk cookbook a Windmill Island book and dinner at Point West were prizes.

Plans for a 300 - acre recreational development at Carousel Mountain with up to 1,881 living units were unveiled in February, with costs up to an estimated \$52 million. At yearend the development was still unresolved following a series of hearings and public meetings. Main opposition comes from Laketown township residents.

Holland school district voters twice turned down propositions to build two new junior high schools.

In December came word that U.S. Sen. Robert P. Griffin had recommended that Circuit Judge Wendell A. Miles of Holland be named federal judge

for the western district of Michigan. This awaits nomination by President Nixon and confirmation by the U.S. Senate.

The advent of federal revenue sharing funds left its mark on city and county governments. William Winstrom of Holland in January was elected chairman of the Ottawa County Board of Commissioners by an 11 - member board trimmed from 21. The board purchased Camp Kirk, utilizing an \$80,000 grant from the U.S. Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, as well as many other improvements and land acquisition.

The sand dunes at Tunnel Park, victim of many a lashing storm, were cut down to about half their size in September in hopes of preventing drifting that threatened the picnic area of the park.

Like any American town, Holland felt the influences of Washington in inflation, shortages and Watergate scandals, but excitement ran high in October when U.S. Rep. Gerald R. Ford of Grand Rapids was nominated Vice President. Ford served as Ottawa county's congressman for 16 years from 1948 to 1964 when Ottawa became part of the 9th district. Several Ottawa county persons attended ceremonies in Washington when he took his oath Dec. 6.

Beef shortages and price increases spurred a brief criminal spree of cattle rustling in Ottawa and Allegan counties early in August. Hogs and cattle were reported missing from some farms.

In July, the city retained the services of Larry Harris, Kalamazoo landscape architect, to design downtown beautification for two blocks on Eighth St., River to College. The program calls for planting trees from Columbia to Pine Aves. During December, trees were being planted.

A study of long - range needs for Holland Hospital was released by TriBrook Consultants of Chicago early in August, calling for expansion in two stages during the next 10 years at an estimated cost of some \$11 million.

Holland Christian Schools surpassed a goal of \$400,000 in a "Good Thing" debt retirement drive, culminating in November.

Also in November, flotation booms were used to contain a fuel oil spill near the former Georgian Bay Lines boat dock at 16th St. The oil had leaked from a tank at Bohn Aluminum and Brass Corp.

On June 1, a full service Social Security branch office serving greater Holland area opened at the northwest corner of 16th St. and the bypass.

West Ottawa was colder than yesterday's left-over hash in Friday night's embarrassing 92-60 loss to rival Holland.

The Panthers could only find the basket two times in the first quarter in taking 19 shots for an ice cold 10 per cent average while the Dutch with transfer Jud Hesselink leading the way, threw in seven buckets out of 16 attempts for a 43 per cent clip.

Holland ended the evening by canning 30 baskets out of 64 tries for a 46 per cent mark. West Ottawa made 20 of 79 shots for 25 per cent.

Hesselink showed the Panthers why he was one of the top scorers in Japan last year in the opening period, as he fired in 12 of Holland's 19 points while West Ottawa could only manage nine team markers.

The 6'5" Hesselink added nine more points in the second stanza, as the Dutch increased their lead to 46-21 at the intermission.

During the second period, four Dutch cagers Dennis Lawson, Ken Bauman, Paul Van Oostenburg and Tim Van Tongeren had at least three fouls.

Norm Walker of the Panthers had four personnel during this time while big Mark Visser had three.

Van Tongeren and Bauman both left the game early with fouls as did Walker.

Reserve Paul Noyd tossed in two technical foul shots to give Holland a surprising 89-48 margin in the fourth quarter before the Panthers came back a little.

Holland registered points like the professionals do in evening its season record at 4-4. The Dutch had 19, 27, 25 and 21 to tally while West Ottawa (2-3) had 9, 12, 14 and 25 norms.

Hesselink made nine free throws in a row to give his team a 28-12 lead in the second period. Joe Serrano's long bomb closed out the scoring at the half with Holland in front, 46-21.

It looked as if Hesselink might have a crack at breaking Ron Maat's school record 48 point total, as he ended the third quarter with 33 points. Coach Don Piersma of Holland wasn't about to run up the score in trying for a record, as Hesselink and the rest of the starting teammates didn't see action in the final eight minutes.

"It was nice to give everyone a chance to play," commented a pleased Piersma after the contest. "Hesselink had a great offensive performance while Tim Boeve played his best defensive game ever. I also thought we played great team defense."

Over in the quiet West Ottawa dressing room Coach Jerry Kissman stated, "We just had one of those nights when nothing went right. We couldn't buy a bucket not just from the field but also from the free throw lane."

Kissman was pleased with the performance of junior forward - center Dan Scheerhorn who led the Panthers in scoring with 12 points.

The 6'4" Scheerhorn was playing in his first game this season after coming off knee surgery and if he wasn't on the floor Friday night, the score would have been much worse.

Hesselink paced Holland with 33 markers while Van Tongeren and Bauman followed with 12 and 10 respectively. M. Visser and B. Visser had 10 points apiece for the Panthers.

While Hesselink was controlling both backboards for the Dutch, 6'1" Jim Cross did his best in trying to battle Holland's star and 6'7" Lawson and the 6'4" Boeve.

Holland just wouldn't let the Panthers play their pressing game, as the host team couldn't hit the side of a barn Friday.

Piersma may be thinking of naming Van Oostenburg team captain for the season, as the 6'1" Dutch senior guard has been captain in all four Holland wins this year.

"I'm 5-0 for two years," he shouted happily to his teammates. "Don't forget I was captain last year when we beat Grand Rapids Union."

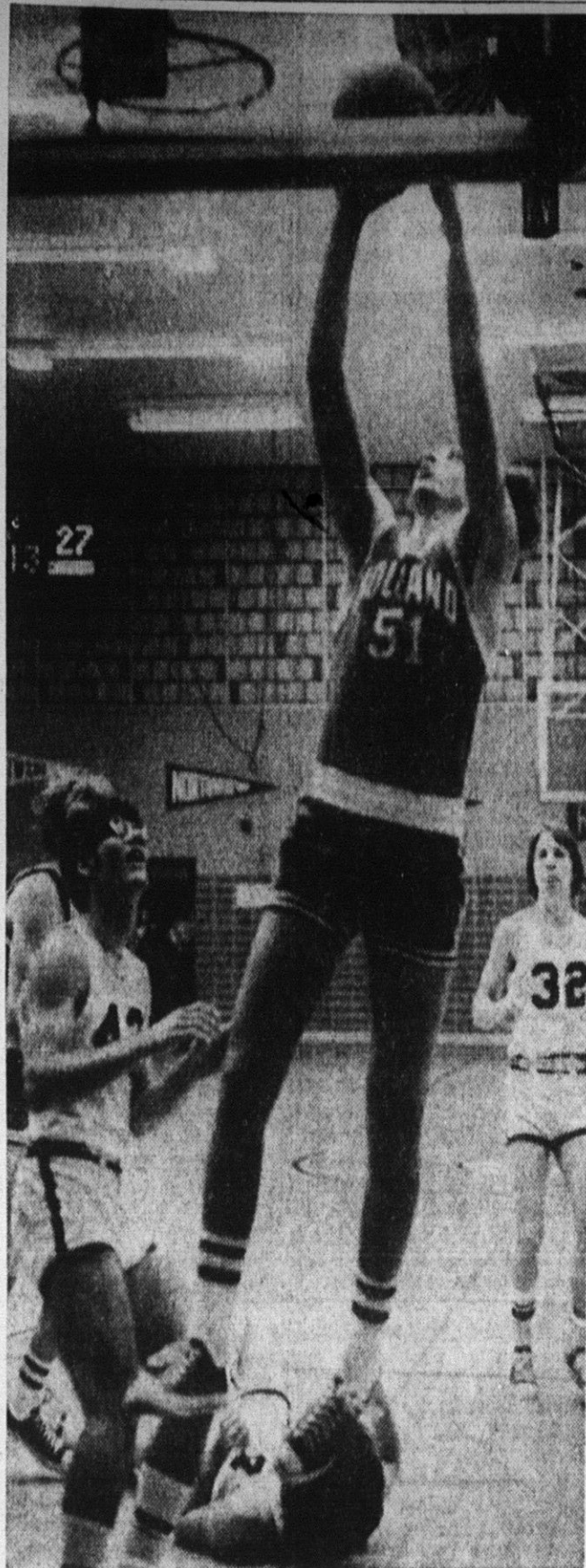
The Dutch will visit St. Joseph next Friday while West Ottawa will travel to Northview.

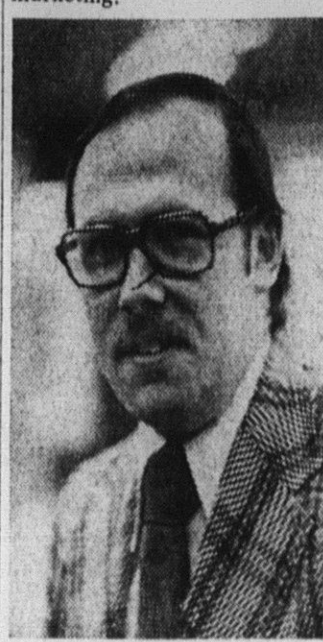
