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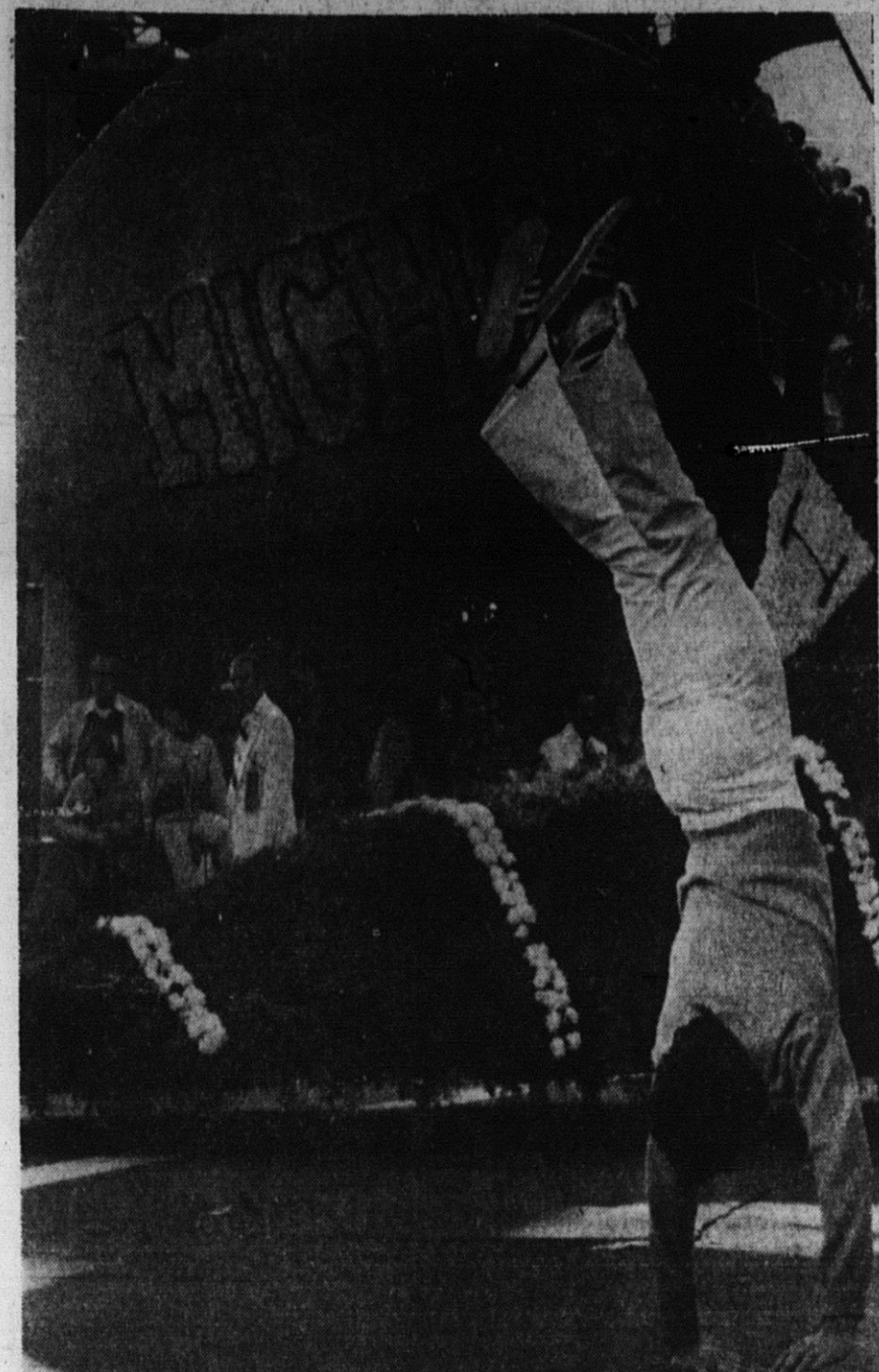

Talks Given On Regional Planning

Functions and purposes of the West Michigan Shoreline Regional Development Commission were explained by two staffers, Jack Koerper and Grant Weaver, at the monthly Chamber of Commerce Early Bird breakfast in Warm Friend Motor Inn this morning. Koerper is senior planner and Weaver is environmental engineer.

The two spokesmen explained that the shoreline development commission acts as a coordinating body for regional inter-county programs as well as a clearing house for plans and public projects dealing with water and its treatment.

It provides input to agencies in the three-county unit of Ottawa, Muskegon and Oceana, working together in a partnership since 1970. Purpose of the three-county unit is to establish guidelines for the development of the region, covering environment, transportation, water quality, social/economic endeavors.

Main aim is to make area waters like Lake Macatawa "fishable and swimmable" by 1983, and a coordinated program could replace existing agencies, although decisions are to be made on the local level, the men said.

Ottawa county members on the three-county commission are Ken Raak of Holland, chairman of the Ottawa County Board of Commissioners, Herbert Wyben of Zeeland and Terry Hofmeyer, city manager of Holland.

The impact of commission work on Holland and the Lake Macatawa watershed was explained in developing local consensus, the men said there are several options: Ottawa county with a large number of separate agencies while Muskegon, which already has a centralized waste treatment program, could be organized on a county basis.

The spokesmen were cognizant of many difficulties in planning, mainly the implementation of theoretical plans, pained and an area map showed Holland city and the east end of Lake Macatawa in "yellow" or fair to good, while the west half of the lake beyond Pine Bay was "green" or good to excellent. The men said water quality in the lake has improved during the last five years, mainly because of up-grading of waste treatment.

Water Line Crossing Wins Grant

A federal jobs program that has pumped \$8½ million into Ottawa County construction projects has provided an additional \$1,795,000 for a water extension program in Park township, township supervisor Jay Van Wieren confirmed Monday.

Van Wieren said the project included a Lake Macatawa crossing to bring water to the south side of Park township and has been under study for several years with Holland city and Laketown township in Allegan county.

The project calls for a transmission line along 168th Ave. in the three-county unit of Ottawa, Muskegon and Oceana, working together in a partnership since 1970. Purpose of the three-county unit is to establish guidelines for the development of the region, covering environment, transportation, water quality, social/economic endeavors.

The grant covers the entire cost of the total project, Van Wieren said, not just Park township's share of the project.

The new lake crossing would provide a second pipeline crossing for the city's water supply system and completes a loop system for the city's system.

The only crossing now bringing fresh water into the city is at the River Ave. bridge.

Holland's 48th annual Tulip Time festival this year will be held May 11-14.

Brochures listing all festival events are available at Tulip Time headquarters in Civic Center and the Chamber of Commerce office. Charles Shidler is the new Tulip Time manager this year, succeeding Dwight Ferris.

Requests for tickets have been coming in in greater numbers than last year, and a sell-out for the Saturday evening program in Civic Center already appears imminent.

Persons going on winter vacations may leave their orders for tickets with check enclosed at Tulip Time headquarters and the tickets will be mailed or held as the buyer prefers. The Tulip Time staff currently is marking tickets for reserved seats.

Parade routes will be the same as last year, with the Saturday Parade of Bands continuing an extra mile south on Van Raalte Ave. to Holland High School.

Margo Moser 'Stranded' in Venezuela

Student's Return Is Sought

"We just want her home," said Mrs. Arthur K. Moser of West Olive whose daughter, Margo, is a foreign exchange student in Venezuela and whose return home is clouded by the financial collapse of the sponsoring agency.

Margo, a West Ottawa student, is one of 21 American students studying in Latin America under the International Cultural Exchange, a non-profit corporation based in Ann Arbor.

Mrs. Moser said she last heard from Margo about a week ago and that she was in Caracas and still expected to return home on a flight Jan. 12 or Jan. 14.

But she apparently does not have a ticket in her possession, only a letter from a Venezuelan government official assuring a flight to Miami.

Council approved a transfer of \$1,130,124.60 from the city of Holland Employees Accumulation fund to the Holland Community Hospital Authority and the Michigan Municipal Employees Retirement System.

The document also transfers the Hospital Employees savings account balances included in the city of Holland employees savings fund to the Hospital Authority Employees Savings Fund. It was stated that the transfer will not affect the city's pension plan and will recognize the Hospital Authority as a participating member of the Municipal Employees Retirement System. The vote was unanimous.

Margo's visa expires Jan. 7 and Mrs. Moser said attempts were being made to have the visa extended.

In November the Mosers sent money to Latin America via American banks but Margo has not received the money. A tracer has been started to locate the money.

"We have heard nothing from International Cultural Exchange," said Mrs. Moser. "All we have heard is from Margo and the Venezuelan government. We just want her home."

Today the U.S. State Department said it may have found a way home for Margo and the 20 other students in Latin America.

Resthaven Hearing Set On Zoning

City Council Wednesday night accepted for first reading an ordinance to rezone a 16-acre site between 12th and 16th Sts. in Holland Heights for a future senior citizens facility as requested by Resthaven Patrons.

A public hearing was scheduled Feb. 2 at 7:30 p.m. The zoning change was recommended by the Planning Commission after considerable study.

In another application, the Planning Commission recommended denial and Council concurred with reservations. It was an application by Joey B. Andrews for rezoning an agricultural parcel on Waverly Rd. near 32nd St. to commercial. The applicant indicated intent to utilize the site for a new office facility for the Michigan Employment Security Commission. The application was denied with the understanding that reconsideration could be given if the applicant can demonstrate that no other suitable alternative is available.

Another Planning Commission report concerned a meeting Nov. 17 attended by two members of Council, two of the Planning Commission, two Board of Education members, school and city administrative officials who met for an informal discussion of street and traffic patterns in the new junior high school.

It was recommended that the city immediately explore the feasibility of acquiring vacant land for street purposes, and, providing adequate land is available, proceed with the construction of the full extension of 24th St. between Ottawa Ave. and Graafschap Rd. The report was accepted for study.

The following applications for rezoning were referred to the Planning Commission: Steven T. Wissink, rezoning property at the rear of 932 Chicago Dr. from agricultural to commercial; Thomas J. Huisman, rezoning property at 1079 Legion Park Dr. from residential to office use; Vogelzang Enterprises, rezoning parcel of about 22 acres at 771 East 16th St. from A-3 residential to C-4 commercial; James L. Jurries, rezoning a parcel of about two acres on the west side of Washington Ave. south of 33rd St. from residential to commercial.

Council confirmed a certification from Councilman Wissink for purchases made by the police department from Commercial Terminal and Transfer Co. in the amount of \$107.32. A request from the hospital to prohibit parking on both sides of Maple Ave. between 24th and 25th Sts. was tabled until next meeting.

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A low of -11 for 1976 was recorded in Holland Friday on the last day of the year.

It was something beloved by winter sports enthusiasts and less so by persons more concerned with shoveling a path than sliding downhill on a sled. And there was the threat of frozen pipes, slippery roads and protesting motor cars. Caution was still the order of the day.

For most people, predictions for slightly moderating temperatures were a welcome sign. The forecast called for more snow tonight and Saturday and a low tonight of about 5 with highs in the teens Saturday.

While -11 is a record for 1976, Holland has experienced colder weather on several occasions. Readings of -19 were recorded in 1936, -17 in 1927 and 1935, -24 in 1912 and 1918, -21 in 1917.

Merger Of Two Banks Announced

ZEELAND — The merger of First Michigan Bank Corp. of Zeeland and Community State Bank of Dowagiac was announced today by Robert J. Den Herder, president of the Zeeland banking firm, and George H. Watkins, Dowagiac bank president.

The merger follows approvals from federal and state regulatory agencies and the approval vote of the Community State Bank shareholders who voted Oct. 28 to accept 2.5 shares of First Michigan Bank Corporation stock for each share of Community State Bank of Dowagiac stock.

Community State Bank, founded in 1961, had year-end assets of approximately \$18 million. Construction in under way on its first branch office which is located in north Niles Township. A spring completion is planned.

In welcoming Community State Bank into the Corporation, Mr. Den Herder said, "Community State Bank is an exceptionally well managed and well organized bank. We are depending upon Community State Bank to continue to offer southwestern Michigan its traditional high caliber of banking service."

Watkins was appointed a director of the Corporation while Den Herder was appointed a Community State Bank director.

First Michigan Bank Corp. was organized in 1973. Its first affiliate was First Michigan Bank and Trust Co., Zeeland. First Michigan Bank and Trust Company has 10 offices serving the greater Holland/Zeeland/Grand Rapids corridor.

On Oct. 1, 1975, First Michigan Bank Corporation opened a de novo bank — First Michigan Bank of Walker, n.a., located on Alpine at Ferris Street, Walker.

Prior to the successful completion of the merger with Community State Bank of Dowagiac, First Michigan Bank Corporation had consolidated assets of over \$160 million.

Grand Haven Man Injured in Crash

Architects to Continue Fire Station Planning

With the announcement that the city's application for \$577,093 for a new fire station had been approved by the Chicago EDA office, City Council Wednesday night approved an addendum to an architectural agreement with Kammeraad-Stroop-van der Leek Inc. for further work on planning for the new fire station on Kollen Park Dr. between 11th and 12th Sts.

Council action Nov. 5 had limited design work to a maximum of \$6,500 and the new action provides a fee of 7 per cent, resulting in an estimated fee of \$40,000 of which \$16,750 is included in the grant application to recover total architectural cost.

The vote was 8-1, Bea Westrate dissenting. Mrs. Westrate said she was not opposed to a new fire station but had strong reservations on federal funds and the strings attached.

Council was informed that the city of Grand Rapids on Jan. 3 obtained a temporary restraining order in the U.S. district court, ordering a halt to the disbursement of \$45 million in public works funds.

City Manager Terry Hofmeyer said that although Holland's grant is included in that amount, he has been informed by the EDA office in Lansing, the "action appears to represent no immediate threat to this project." He added that in the event problems develop as a result of the restraining order, the city will terminate all further architectural work at once.

Council acknowledged the gift of medical equipment for the rescue truck from local 759 of the International Association of Fire Fighters. Value of the equipment was listed at \$100 including oxygen kit, burn kit and related items. Gifts to the hospital and library also were acknowledged.

Claims against the city from Mrs. John Lam and Raymond LeCombe were referred to the insurance carrier and city attorney.

Council approved low bid of United Motor Sales Inc. for a four-wheel drive pickup truck with a plow for use by the street department in net amount of \$5,974.

Council was informed that the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development will receive pre-applications for 1977 community development discretionary funding until Feb. 18. A public meeting on the subject for administrative personnel is being held this afternoon. Two public hearings before Council will be scheduled later. The necessary resolutions were adopted.

A resolution was adopted for reimbursement of \$974.81 from the state as the difference in DART operating assistance, by which the state pays one-third of total expenditures. To date, the city has received \$30,291.74 for expenses incurred during the 1975-76 fiscal year.

Approval was given a contract with Industrial Services Inc. of Holland for storage and cleaning of DART vehicles. The cur-

rent contract expires Feb. 1 and the new contract, negotiated on the same rate structure, will be in effect for five months, bringing the DART program into the city's fiscal year.

City Manager Hofmeyer said the Holland DART system hit an all-time high during December, carrying just under 7,000 passengers, an exceptionally good record for a city Holland's size.

Mayor Hallacy asked about progress on D-1 industrial zoning changes and was informed the Planning Commission has done considerable study and was awaiting input from the Board of Appeals which is expected at the January meeting.

Councilman Hazen Van Kampen asked about study on a sewer for Kenwood Heights and City Manager Terry Hofmeyer said he was well aware of the problems but pointed to the need for a lift station and force main in that development, something that involves considerable financing.

Improved lighting in Council chambers resulted in much better reception on Cablevision, at least on local monitors. Councilman Al Kleis Jr. suggested some change in the lighting since he seemed to be in a particularly well lighted spot.

After the meeting adjourned, Mayor Hallacy announced to Council that because of added responsibilities he has assumed at R. E. Barber as of Jan. 1, he was resigning his post on the Governor's Commission on Criminal Justice and as a trustee on the Michigan Municipal League.

Two Applications Denied by Board

Two applications for zoning variances were denied following public hearings before the Zoning Board of Appeals Thursday in City Hall.

All Metal Welding Inc., 700 Wincrest Dr., has applied for permission to purchase the north 88 feet of a building which has a common wall with another business which leases the south 40 feet of the building. Sideyard setbacks were in question. Dave Ver Burg, 188 East 40th St., had proposed to erect a garage which would be about 14 feet high. The zoning ordinance provides that accessory buildings are not to exceed 12 feet in height.

Pair Asks Examination To Check Passing Count

Debra Kay Edwards, 24, of Logansport, Ind., and Robert L. Spelling, 25, of Detroit, demanded examination in District Court Tuesday to charges of cashing a check under false pretenses. Bond was set at \$15,000 each and the two were held in the Ottawa County jail for hearings Jan. 14.

Police said they took the two into custody after bank officials at the Peoples west side branch reported a worthless check had been cashed and provided a description of a car used by the two.

10 Per Cent Water Hike Given Okay

After considerable discussion, City Council voted 8-1 Wednesday night to approve a recommendation of the Board of Public Works for a 10 per cent increase in water rates, effective Jan. 15. Dissenting vote was cast by Councilman Ken Beelen.

The request was associated with one last July 1 requesting a 30 per cent increase. Council at that time granted a 10 per cent increase with a promise to review the water situation in January, and again next July.

Beelen's opposition was associated with the Touche Ross & Co. annual audit as of June 30, 1976, which listed some \$97,000 in net water earnings. But BPW General Manager Frank Whitney said the operating profit did not reflect depleted assets nor include payments on bond principle, only the interest. Whitney said audit interpretations were a matter of semantics as they relate to profit, loss, reserves, capitalization and cash flow.

Although Council approved the rate increase, plans are being made for a meeting with audit firm representatives to resolve these differences.

A letter from Mrs. Fay R. Kamps, 671 Myrtle Ave., expressing concern for hazards at the five-corner intersection of 32nd, State and Lincoln, spurred further discussion of this controversial traffic tieup. Mayor Lou Hallacy said Council was scheduling a study session with a traffic engineer of the Michigan State Highway Commission and he hoped the matter of a traffic signal at this intersection would be resolved in short order.

Three public hearings were held.

One hearing on proposed vacating of a portion of East 38th St. between Royce and Vassar Aves. brought no opposition and was approved in short order.

The hearing on establishing a plant rehabilitation district as requested by Ex-Cell-O Corp. for property at 201 West Eighth St. involved a question on whether all requirements had been met, and was tabled.

The hearing on construction of a water main in 34th St. from Maple to Pine Aves. brought some opposition, and also was tabled by Council.

Stop signs were approved for Sorrento Dr., Euna Vista Dr. and Sunset Dr. at Eighth St. in Holland Heights, thus making Eighth St. a through street from US-31 bypass to Sunset, except for 12th Ave. and westbound Paw Paw Dr. A stop sign also was approved at Washington and 30th, with Washington stopping for 30th.

Petitions for water and sewer service, also paving, curb and gutter in 15th St. from Settlers Rd. east to Waverly Rd. were referred to the city manager.

Council accepted with regret the resignation of the Rev. Harvey J. Baas from the Human Relations Commission. Rev. Baas is moving to Cedar Springs.

Approval was given a BPW secondary party agreement with Consumers Power, Michigan Consolidated Gas, Michigan Bell Telephone, Detroit Edison and General Telephone for participation in the "Miss Dig" communication system at a cost of approximately \$1,000 a year.

Approval also was given a supplemental agreement with the federal government to permit use of dock space at the James De Young Power plant by the Corps of Engineers for a term of five consecutive navigation seasons. The move extends a current agreement.

Auto Hits Parked Car Pinning Man

Luis Lopez, 28, of 24 West 21st St., suffered a broken right knee and leg when he was struck by a car that pinned him against a stopped auto at the scene of an earlier accident Tuesday at 6:54 a.m. along Chicago Dr. at Highland St.

Lopez was admitted to Holland Hospital where his condition today was listed as "good." Ottawa County deputies said a car involved in an accident moments earlier and was removing flares from the trunk of a car driven by Robert Breuker, 32, of 207 East 26th St., which had stopped to assist.

While Lopez was at the rear of the Breuker car an auto driven by David Lubben, 46, of 364 West 21st St., struck the Breuker car in the rear, pinning Lopez.

Continuing Education Topic for Century Club

"Continuing Education for Women and Men," the program selected by Century Club for its January meeting Monday night at Holland Country Club, was given by Jane Idema and Hugh Allen of Aquinas College in Grand Rapids.

Mrs. Idema, director of Encore, a degree completion course for women, categorized her students as coming from a variety of backgrounds and age range, predominantly interested in preparation for work in health fields and social service agencies. Some graduates, however, are practicing artists, aspiring writers, volunteers in church and community programs, all providing a model of responsible and alive adulthood.

Weekly courses are offered at the college both daytime and evening, and classes for nursing students are taught at St. Mary's and Butterworth hospitals. A new concept, "Ideas," is currently taught via weekly newspaper articles. One third of the enrollment consists of students from communities outside Grand Rapids and there are 10 students from Holland in this group.

Stressing the value of liberal arts education as a basis for lifetime learning, Hugh Allen, vice president for development, described "Career Action," designed primarily for working men in the 25-35 year age group. Evening and Saturday classes

allow the student to complete an academic degree while employed. Teachers include many business men and classes are held in a variety of locations as far away as Muskegon. Approximately 300 students per semester are enrolled in the program.

Aquinas College, a Catholic institution characterized as "hospitable to differences," not only meets the demand for structured educational experience but reaches beyond the classroom to retirement homes where seminars, lectures and independent study are offered to octogenarians, he said. "Emeritus College," a concept designed for the 55-65 year age group, has removed the upper age limit and during the past year enrolled 700 pre-retired and senior citizens. Seminars cover subjects "on demand" as well as those which serve as learning centers and placement centers for those who wish to be active in a "re-tread" experience. Aquinas faculty members are supplemented by teachers from the retiree group.

In their closing remarks the speakers stressed that interaction between age groups was natural and beneficial to all, expressing no resentment in younger students on campus. Mrs. J. A. Stryker offered an invocation before the dinner which preceded the meeting. Century Club's vice president, Fred S. Bertsch, Jr., conducted the meeting.

Students Rush To Enlist Before Benefits Dip

MILWAUKEE (UPI) — Randy Venne of Milwaukee enlisted in the Navy Thursday so that he could finish college — and he was just in time.

Educational benefits under the GI bill will be reduced 33 per cent, effective Saturday, but those who enlist before the first of the year can still obtain the full benefits of the old GI bill. Bo Like Woody

Some people have been saying that Bo Schembechler, the fine University of Michigan football coach, is a lot like his former teacher at Ohio State University, Woody Hayes.

For various reasons, we've never wanted to accept that but it was a little evident that the two are very much alike in some ways.

After driving all the way to Pasadena, Calif., to cover the 1977 Rose Bowl game for Sentinel readers, we were disappointed when Schembechler wouldn't allow any sports writers into the dressing room after the game to interview his griders.

Just because U-M lost to Southern Cal, 14-6, shouldn't give Schembechler the right to close the door on the media, who were just trying to do their job.

One of the officials blocking the lockerroom entrance, said Hayes did the same thing last year after UCLA shocked the Buckeyes.

At least Bo had the courtesy to meet the press. Woody didn't even do that much.

Schembechler will probably go down as one of Michigan's top coaches but his overall 0-4 bowl mark isn't hardly what you call impressive.

Some of the west coast writers were calling for the Pacific-8 to drop the Big Ten from the Rose Bowl field. The coast teams with Southern Cal and UCLA leading the way, have won seven of the last eight encounters.

One of the writers (Jim Murray) at the game even went as far as to say, that the Big Ten should be competing in the Ivy League instead of against west coast teams.

Another said, how does the Big Ten expect to ever win if they view the forward pass, as something that almost doesn't exist. And we intend to agree.

One of Michigan's problems, a big one, is that they really only have one tough game in the regular season (Ohio State) while Pac-8 clubs, have at least four strong league encounters. And to top that, they usually play several rugged Big Eight teams.

Another problem for U-M followers, is that Bo somehow can't understand, that the forward pass is definitely an offensive weapon.

Michigan doesn't need to pass in its weak regular season schedule but it's a new ball game when you play against the likes of UCLA, USC or Oklahoma.

You can't create a passing attack overnight. In routing teams such as Navy, Wake Forest and etc., the Wolverines seldom put the ball in the air. It might be rubbing salt in the wound but if that's what it takes to win a bowl game, Schembechler should do just that.

The west coast teams have an extra advantage of playing in familiar surroundings while the Big Ten representative has to make a big adjustment with the weather. And don't forget all the distractions the Big Ten champion has. It's old stuff for west coast teams but not for mid-westerners.

Some of the writers did indicate that Michigan State University, will soon be back in the running for championship honors, as new coach Darryl Rogers, isn't afraid to put the ball in the air. Rogers came to MSU from San Jose State.

Rogers just might force the

Big Ten to open up its attack

The Big Ten has as good as players as any league in the nation. But until they change their conservative philosophy, will come up short handed in the big one.

USC mixed its offensive attack like a professional team while the usually high potent Wolverines offense resembled a team from the 1930s.

Did Bo have you and other U-M quarterbacks throwing the ball anymore in practice prior to bowl action?

"No, not at all," said Leach. "We had a few new pass plays but basically we went with what was going so well for us during the regular season. I do think I could have been more effective if I had thrown more during the regular season."

Vince Evans, the signal caller for the Trojans, picked apart the Wolves' defensive secondary like a surgeon by connecting on 14 of 20 aerials.

Evans did this even though he isn't considered the top Pac-8 quarterback. On the other hand, Leach, who is considered an All-American prospect by Schembechler, only completed four of 12 passes! Some of his attempts ended up looking like a knuckle ball.

Leach is a proven runner but unless Bo lets him do his over-all thing, game after game, Michigan will come up empty handed in bowl play.

Zeeland Approves Five Year Plan For Improvements

ZEELAND — City Council Monday approved implementation of a five-year capital improvement program and authorized the retaining of an engineering firm and an architectural firm.

Under the program Zeeland city would program at least five years in advance for all necessary capital expenditures. The engineering firm is Moore & Bruggink of Grand Rapids and the architects are Gray, Lundwall, Borgeson of Grand Haven.

Council said it hoped the park could be developed as a county park.

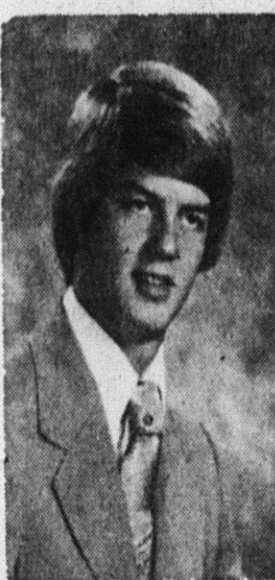
Krystecky Bound To Circuit Court

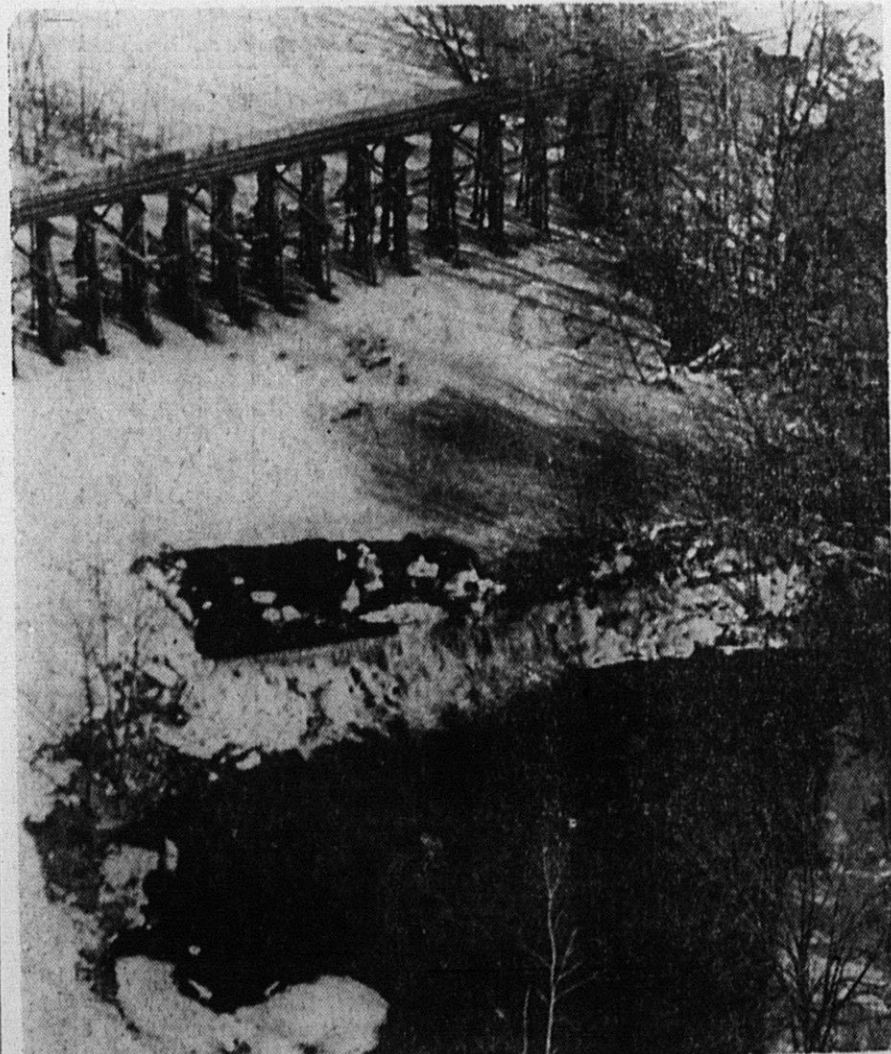

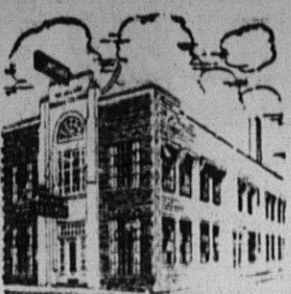

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DOING SOMETHING RIGHT

In this unprecedented cold winter there has been lots of complaint about the weather, the mounting heating bills, and the difficulty of getting around. It isn't easy to adjust to perpetual cold temperatures and fight the ever-mounting piles of snow. Many of us don't quite know how to cope.

Despite this, however, most of us do something right in the cold weather — we shiver. This is a good thing, we are told by Chicago City Health Commissioner Dr. Murray Brown. Shivering, he says, is a way of getting body heat to the muscles. Nature does it for us automatically — she knows — and we shouldn't resist the urge to do it. It keeps us warm. Fat people — Dr. Brown calls them obese — don't shiver as well as lean ones do and thus are likely to be frost-bitten before the skinny people. This despite the myth that fat folk can stand cold better than the thin ones.

You can help nature a bit if you like, according to Dr. Brown. You can flap your arms, keep walking, wriggle your toes, rock back and forth on your feet, because feet are very susceptible to cold. Everybody knows that activity is likely to keep us warmer. What everybody doesn't know is that a snifter of something alcoholic is likely to make you colder rather than warmer. It increases heat loss in the skin and thus makes us colder.

The recipe for keeping warm in this very cold winter seems to be compounded of three things: shivering, activity, and sobriety. We think it is worth trying.

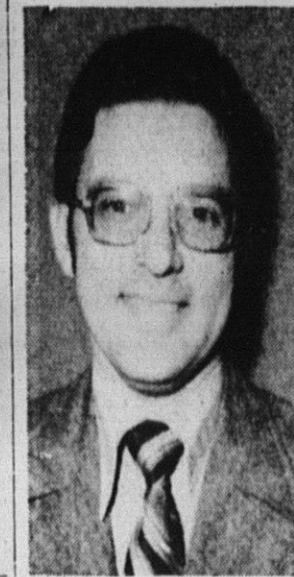

USC Hands Wolverines Second Loss

PASADENA, Calif. — The fourth time wasn't by any means the charm for Coach Bo Schembechler and his mighty Michigan Wolverines.

After losing his first two Rose Bowl encounters and last year's Orange-Bowl game to Oklahoma, Schembechler's Big Ten giants once again lost the big one to Southern California Saturday, 14-6 before 106,182 fans in the granddaddy of all the bowl games, the Rose.

In Schembechler's Rose Bowl appearance in 1970, U-M lost to the same Trojans, 10-3 after the Wolverines' coach suffered a heart attack on the eve of the game. Schembechler returned to Pasadena for the 1972 Rose Bowl and his Wolverines were nipped by Stanford, 13-12.

The Wolverines, who were one touchdown favorites entering the game, closed the season with an overall 10-2 mark. Purdue, which shocked U-M, 16-14, lost to the Trojans, 31-13. USC entered the year 11-1. Missouri gave the Trojans their lone defeat in their season's opener, 46-25.

Schembechler felt that USC would have the advantage in preparing for the game at home, in familiar surroundings, while U-M struggled for the most part in the cold. But after the game in a press conference, Schembechler didn't make any excuses for his team.

"They made the big plays and we didn't," Schembechler said. "They are without a doubt the best team I've seen all season." I won't be voting in the polls for the top team in the country but if I did they would get my nod."

Winning coach John Robinson said, "Quarterback Vince Evans played an outstanding game, his best ever."

Robinson felt his club was every bit as good as Pittsburgh, the probable national champion.

The reporters chuckled when Robinson indicated a final poll (USC) was taken in the Trojan dressing room and indicated his club was number one.

Schembechler admitted he was surprised that USC's defense shut his club off almost completely while Robinson said his defense was "absolutely fantastic."

U-M took its opening drive into Trojan territory before Richie Leach fumbled and Clay Matthews recovered on the 42.

With standout USC tailback Ricky Bell, running strong before getting injured, the Trojans had a great opportunity to score. USC missed its chance with a dezed Bell on the bench when Glenn Walker's 23-yard field goal try was wide.

With Rob Lytle displaying his runnerup Heisman trophy form, the Wolverine senior banged over for the game's first touchdown from the one-yard line with 7:08 left in the second period. Bob Wood's extra point kick was blocked by Walt Underwood.

For Robinson, who owns the best record of any first year coach in Pacific-8 history and the first rookie coach to win the conference and Rose Bowl bid since Chuck Taylor of Stanford in the 1951 season, his first major goal decision was a big one for the Trojans.

Evans faked out the U-M defense on a run around left end on a fourth and goal situation from the one to knot the count 6-6 at the 1:28 mark. Walker's kick was true as the Trojans took a slim 7-6 half-time bulge.

It looked as if USC was going to add to its lead as David Lewis fell on Leach's poor pitchout to Lytle. The Trojans only had eight yards to go to pad to their lead in the third quarter. But on the first play for USC, Michigan's defense end Dom Tedesco scooped up Charles White's miscue to jack up the Wolverine followers.

Robinson, a gambling coach, called on White to pick up a key first down on U-M's 25 on a fourth down play. Michigan's defense stiffened and forced Walker to try a field goal from 45 yards which was no good.

A 20-yard pass from Leach to Jim Smith looked as if it might set up the go-ahead points for Michigan. However Leach was stopped on a fourth and two on the 36 of the Trojans.

Linebacker Calvin O'Neil made a big pass interception of Evans' pass on U-M's one and returned it 21 yards to the 22.

Randy Simmrit's first pass reception of 18 yards and Motti Tatu's 20-yard scamper put the Wolves in deep trouble as the ball was on the seven-yard line. On the following play, White burst the remaining yard for the crucial TD. Walker's kick made it 14-6 with 3:03

5th Defeat For Holland This Season

"If you don't shoot well, you don't play well," a dejected Dwayne (Tiger) Teusink commented Tuesday night in the Holland High fieldhouse.

The Holland basketball coach's premise may be taken one step further. When a team doesn't play well it generally follows that the team loses.

Such was the case with the Dutch Tuesday as they lost to a blustery and speedy Kalamazoo Central squad, 60 - 45 in a non-league contest.

Had Teusink's team shot for a slightly better percentage they may have added one more victory. Holland is now 2 - 5.

Book by Stanley Marcus Comes Alive for Club

Describing her choice as "relaxing and enjoyable," Mrs. John Smalleagan of Zeeland made Stanley Marcus' book, "Minding the Store," come alive for the Woman's Literary Club Tuesday afternoon.

It was the story of the fabulous Nieman-Marcus chain which started as a small specialty store 70 years ago in Dallas, Tex., founded by Herbert Marcus Sr., father of four sons including the author, and his sister, Carrie Marcus Nieman. It was a shop dealing with ladies' outer garments, specialty items and millinery.

A ladies ready-to-wear store was a departure from dry goods and dressmakers, but it was an even bigger decision for the Marcus family since Herbert Sr., rejected an opportunity to go into the Coca Cola business in Missouri and sold his Coca Cola interests for \$25,000, Mrs. Smalleagan said.

In time, the entire family including Aunt Carrie became involved in the business which now has stores in Dallas, Houston, Fort Worth, Bal Harbor, Fla., St. Louis, Mo., and Chicago. Author Stanley Marcus, eldest of the four sons, is currently chairman of the board and his son Dick is president. Stanley's mother is still active at 93.

Describing the business venture as being in the right place at the right time, Mrs. Smalleagan traced the development of the family business which was based on satisfaction and personalized service. It was an innovation to pay more for better quality.

The Great Depression had little effect on Nieman-Marcus since the East Texas oil field discovery came in 1930 and Dallas found itself in the center of east and west oil fields and the influx of new millionaires. Although the store carried up to \$750,000 in past due accounts, nobody really worried since people worth \$10 million or more settled their accounts once a year.

Restrictions on travel during World War II spurred tourist business in Mexico and Nieman-Marcus found itself providing satisfaction for new types of customers, and seeking new specialties.

Although Nieman-Marcus carried ads on \$50,000 sable coats, there usually was an ad for dresses at \$50 on the same page, and it was Stanley Marcus' deep conviction that some of the \$50,000 sable coat rubbed
