Warehouse And Office Total Loss

Oil Furnace May Have Started Fire; Two Men Treated at Scene

A fire destroyed the office and warehouse of the Modern Beverage Co. on 112th Ave. at M-21, and more than \$65,000 in beer and wine Wednesday.

No estimate of the loss to the 136-foot by 46-foot building was immediately available. The building burned to the ground.

An employee of the firm and a Holland Township fireman received minor injuries in the blaze.

Chris Hoogendoorn, the employee, was overcome by smoke when he went into the building with two firemen to pick up \$3,000 in cash in his office. He recovered the money, and was treated at the scene.

Fireman Marvin Bennett received a cut on his hand while battling the blaze. He was also treated at the scene.

The blaze believed to have been started by an exploding oil burner, started in the east end of the wooden building about 9:30 a.m. Fanned by gusts of wind it quickly spread to all parts of the building.

There was no one in the building when the fire started. Several employees were out on business or on coffee breaks when the fire began. An employee of a nearby firm noticed smoke coming from the building, and notified Holland township firemen.

Julius Kempker, manager of the firm, said there was more than 15,000 cases of beer, and quantities of wine and champagne in the warehouse. A truckload of beer was unloaded at the warehouse Tuesday.

Holland Township Fire Chief Andrew Westenbroek said more than 40 firemen from his department battled the fire. Holland city firemen brought their tank truck to the scene while the township tanker was being refilled with water.

Westenbroek said the fire had a good start when the fire department was called. Firemen kept the flames away from a propane gas tank on the north side and fuel oil tanks on the east and west ends of the building. Firemen were at the scene until about 12:40 p.m.

Clouds of white and gray smoke obscured vision on nearby M-21. Ottawa sheriff's deputies directed traffic at the scene.

Many beer cans and bottles exploded in the intense heat of the blaze.

Hold Open House

HUDSONVILLE — The \$350,000 Hudsonville Christian Rest Home will have open house Jan. 22 for its new addition. The home, opened two years ago, has nearly doubled its capacity from 34 to 60 beds with its new facilities.

Allay Fears On Meningitis

Fears of meningitis contagion were allayed today by Dr. Vernon Boersema, speaking for Dr. Ralph Ten Have, director of the Ottawa Health Department, who is out of town.

Dr. Boersema said meningitis, if treated promptly, no longer is the threat it was in the days before antibiotics. He said the strains are very susceptible to penicillin and sulfa and any persons who have been exposed to the disease can escape the disease by taking either drug, or by consulting his physician.

Speculation on meningitis grew late last week in various areas after a person stricken with meningitis was dead on arrival at Holland Hospital. The hospital currently has another patient who is responding to treatment and is in good condition.

Dr. Boersema said treatment of persons exposed to the disease is not legally required, but said the medical professions "bends over backwards" in recommending such treatment. Ordinarily treatment is not given unless there are symptoms.

He said the danger develops only when the disease is undiagnosed and goes untreated for a considerable time. He said meningitis is not an uncommon infection. Persons who have been in contact with a person ill of meningitis are not regarded as carriers.

Andrew Schaafsma, 90, Dies in Grand Haven

GRAND HAVEN — Andrew Schaafsma, 90, 410 Howard St., Grand Haven, died Monday following a two months illness in Grand Haven Municipal Hospital where he was admitted six weeks ago.

He was born in The Netherlands and came to Grand Haven from Grand Rapids 60 years ago. He was a retired harness maker and was also a former custodian of the Second Christian Reformed Church of which he was a member.

He married Jennie Wierenga in Grand Rapids who survives him as do a son Herman, formerly associated with the Grand Haven Daily Tribune and now of Norwalk, Ohio, four daughters, Mrs. Elton Corporon of Grand Rapids, Mrs. Catherine Lake and Miss Ida Mae Schaafsma, manager of the Michigan Title Company, both of Grand Haven and Mrs. James Bosma of Silver Springs, Md.; 17 grandchildren; six great-grandchildren.

Fire Destroys Trailer

ALLEGAN — The rural trailer home of Mrs. Josie Wemus, 29th St., Allegan, was completely destroyed by fire Tuesday morning. Mrs. Wemus, sole occupant of the trailer, was not injured in the blaze but firemen were unable to salvage any of the trailer's contents. Cause of the fire has not been determined.

New Snowfall Dumps 9 Inches On Local Area

The heaviest snowfall of the season hit Holland Wednesday night and early today, dumping nine inches of new snow on an existing two-inch blanket.

All snow removal equipment was out at 2 a.m. Because the early snow was wet and soggy, it was necessary to mount fronted plows on a number of trucks. Crews said much of the snow fell between 1:30 and 3:30 a.m., necessitating a second visit to some sections of the city.

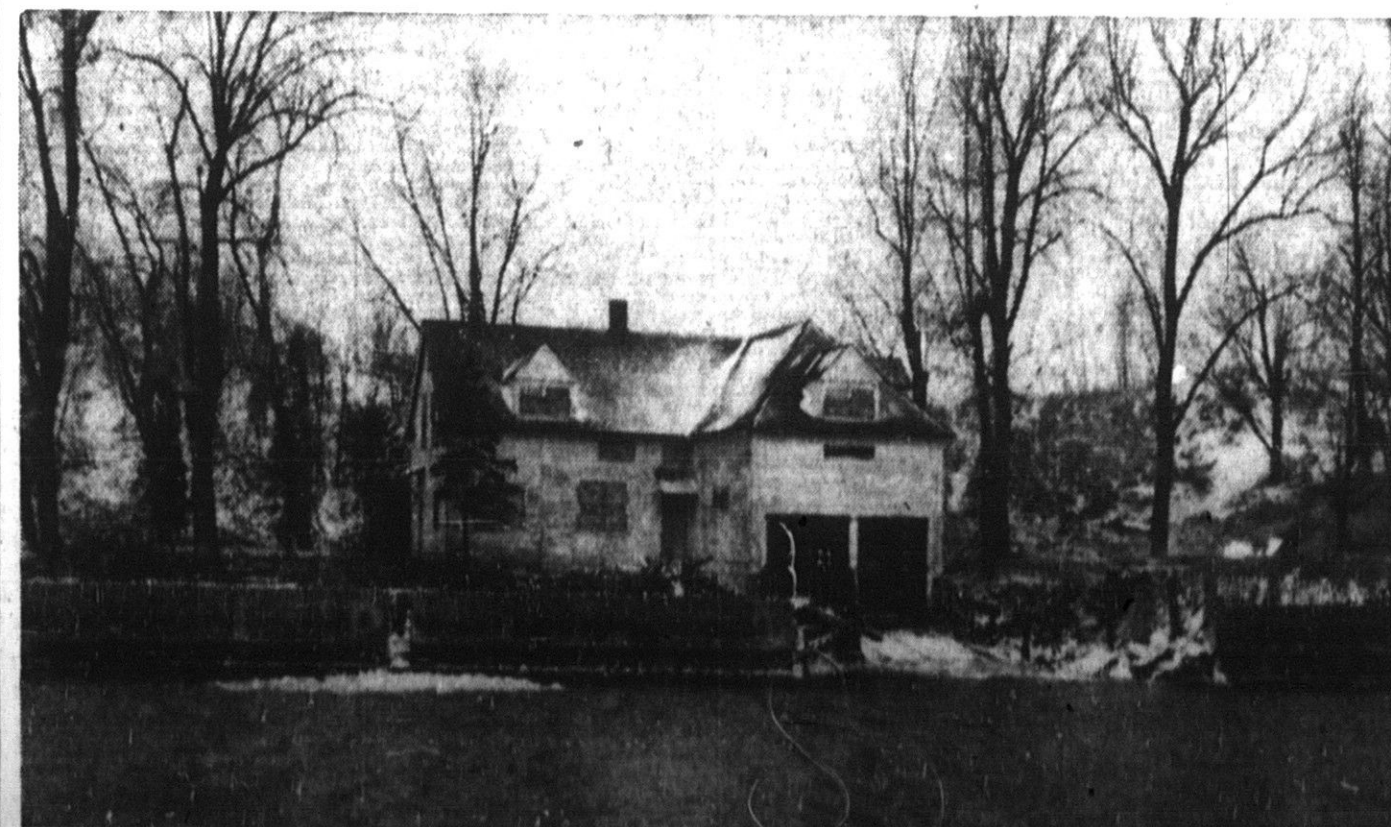
Fire Chief Dick Brandt asked residents to dig out fire hydrants wherever possible.

Ottawa Adopts New Dog System

GRAND HAVEN—The Ottawa County Board of Supervisors Monday adopted a new dog control program for the county calling for hiring two "dog deputies" and acquiring two radio-equipped small trucks to pick up stray dogs, one operating in the north half of the county and the other in the south half.

The new program will not affect Grand Haven or Holland cities which have their own dog control programs.

The recommendation for the new program came from Mayor Nelson Bosman of Holland, chairman of the sheriff's committee, and calls for using \$14,000 now in the dog license fund plus a transfer of \$5,000 from the 1966 contingent fund to finance the program for the year 1966. The \$5,000 from the contingent fund will be reimbursed later.

The sheriff's department will continue to take all dog complaints. A committee of the board and Sheriff Bernard Grysen will screen applicants for the two jobs.

Grysen said a survey shows 37,000 dogs in the county but only 17,000 are listed by supervisors, and of this total some 9,000 are not licensed. A better system of listing a dog census and licensing procedures should bring in enough funds to make the warden system pay its own way, Bosman said.

Through the years, the county board has paid out considerable sums to farmers for poultry losses.

The board granted permission to a blind man to set up a stand in the new county building to sell candy and cigarettes. The request came from David Pusaw of the county education office. The Grand Haven Lions Club will assist the man in setting up the stand.

The board authorized a public address system for the large meeting room.

Chairman Richard Cook will name a committee to study a mental health program proposed by the Ottawa County Medical Society. Cook also was authorized to arrange for the opening of the cornerstone of the old court house now being torn down. The opening will take place at the April session.

Herman Windemuller, chairman of the buildings and grounds committee, presented plans for landscaping a square on the site of the old court house. Plans call for a pool and garden, plus additional parking.

The welfare department was granted permission to use a large vacant room in the county building one day a month for distributing surplus food.

Agricultural Agent Richard Machiele presented his annual report. Board Member Willard Claver read a lengthy report on operations of the County Youth Home.

Ben Folkersma, 86, Dies in Grand Haven

GRAND HAVEN — Ben Folkersma, 86, Vine St., route 2, Spring Lake, died Wednesday evening at Grand Haven Municipal Hospital. He had been ill four days.

He was born in the Netherlands. He was former employee of the Eagle Ottawa Leather Co. and later engaged in raising vegetables and fruit on his farm in the township.

He was a member of St. John's Lutheran Church and the North Ottawa Rod and Gun Club. His wife Minnie died Aug. 7, 1958.

He is survived by a son, Clarence of Spring Lake and a daughter, Mrs. Joseph (Louise) Silver with whom he made his home.

\$250,000 Blaze Boosts Fire Loss In Holland

A \$250,000 fire at the Charles Bowman Co., Dec. 22 boosted the estimated fire loss in Holland during 1965 to \$300,955, according to Fire Chief Dick Brandt.

In comparison there was only \$45,036.00 damage in 1964, and \$17,489.00 in 1963.

Fewer alarms were turned in during 1965 than the previous year. A total of 186 were turned in during 1965 while 242 were turned in during 1964.

The breakdown on fire losses this year was: commercial buildings, \$41,000; contents of commercial buildings, \$240,200; residential buildings, \$10,575; contents of residential buildings, \$4,780; other buildings, \$3,250; contents of other buildings, \$600; and automobiles, \$500.

The breakdown on the kinds of fires follows: 23 car; 46 commercial; 52 residential; four garages; 41 grass and rubbish; three institutions; one outside; seven miscellaneous. In addition nine false alarms were turned in.

The fire department held 33 business meetings and 53 drill meetings during the year.

Review Case Of Vicksburg GI in Viet

ALLEGAN — The long and complicated case of a Vicksburg career soldier convicted of a slaying in Viet Nam is in the process of being reviewed by the military. It was disclosed today by his attorney.

The defendant is Richard Reed, 26, a U.S. Army career sergeant and son of Mr. and Mrs. Roland Reed of Vicksburg.

Atty. Frederick McDonald of Allegan handled Reed's defense, made trips to Viet Nam and engaged in various complicated requirements and investigations involving two continents.

Reed was tried by a military court in California last month, found guilty of involuntary manslaughter, amounting to culpable negligence, a reduction of the original murder charge. He was sentenced to three years confinement, but the case now is in the process of being reviewed by the judge advocate's office.

Reed was actively engaged in advising the South Vietnamese Army on combat operations when another soldier was shot and killed at a training barracks, Bien Hoa, South Viet Nam, Sept. 3. Reed was accused of firing the weapon and the original charge of unpremeditated murder was lodged against him.

Other sources open to Reed and his family on appeals are the Board of Review and the Court of Military Appeals at the Pentagon. They could follow the decision of the judge advocate after his review of the case.

Reed's army record was described as excellent.

New 50 cent fishing licenses for senior citizens 65 or older are on sale now. Younger persons still have to pay \$2 per license.

Persons planning to fish for trout also need a trout stamp. Trout stamps sell for \$2 no matter what the age of the fisherman.

Allegan Finances Now Good

ALLEGAN — Five years ago, Allegan county was juggling its finances. Meeting this year's payroll with next year's tax revenue.

Tuesday, the Board of Supervisors was flooded with fiscal reports showing just how far the county had progressed from those days of deficit financing.

Treasurer James Boyce told the board that the county began 1966 with \$650,549 in the bank—a gain of \$75,042 over the balance of one year ago.

All of this gain—and more—was traceable to the fund over which the board exerts the maximum control, the county's general fund. This balance rose from \$214,838 to \$295,864 for a gain of \$81,026 during the year.

County Clerk Esther W. Hettiger's summary of the budget revealed that more than half of this gain resulted from the fact that general fund expenditures for the year were \$45,348 less than total appropriations.

The nation's general prosperity was also reflected in larger than anticipated tax collections. Budget makers had expected to collect \$55,000 in delinquent taxes, but collections topped this figure by \$25,286.

Departmental revenues — estimated at \$68,081—actually totaled \$123,078, for a general fund gain of \$54,997.

One major item in the treasurer's report stands as a milestone in local government financing—and as a monument to the efforts of one former supervisor who has since gone on to prominence in state government.

It was State Rep. James Farnsworth who—as an Allegan City Supervisor — gradually made it clear to his fellow board members that the county was missing a bet by failing to invest unneeded funds in short-term certificates of deposit and U.S. Treasury Bills.

In 1965, interest from these short-term investments netted the county \$16,964.99. At the close of business on Dec. 31, 1965, Treasurer Boyce's report showed that \$197,500 were invested in certificates of deposit and \$191,500 in U.S. Treasury Bills.

In the days before Farnsworth successfully argued that this money should be earning interest for the county until such time as it was needed, the cash was deposited — for the most part—in noninterest bearing commercial bank accounts.

There are at least two major projects under consideration by the board which would take a large bite out of the general fund surplus. Re-mapping of county plat books and a professional reappraisal of all county real property—to lay the groundwork for a new county equalization department — probably would eat up the general fund balance. But, as most supervisors agree, it also would eliminate once and for all, the charge that some areas of the county bear a disproportionate share of the tax load.

Supervisors Tuesday heard a presentation by L. E. Lope, representing the United Appraisal Co. of Cleveland, Ohio, who estimated that a complete reappraisal would take from 18 to 24 months and cost approximately \$138,000.

Board members also were urged to consider plans for accelerating progress toward a new county medical care facility — currently being financed through a 1-mill levy to build a sinking fund. Robert Hileski, director of the Social Welfare Department, said passage of the federal "medicare" plan put serious pressure on existing facilities. He said the Social Welfare Board hoped the facility could be under construction within three years.

Husband, 21, Slays Wife Then Self

A young Holland man, shot and killed his wife early Saturday and then turned a gun on himself and took his own life as his horrified sister-in-law watched.

Ronald E. Randolph, 21, of 634 Lincoln Ave., shot his wife, Sharon, 24, in the back as she was apparently in the process of changing her baby's diaper in an upstairs bedroom of the couple's home.

Mrs. Randolph's sister, Mrs. Charlene Sisson who had heard the shots from downstairs, ran up to the bedroom and saw Randolph eject a spent cartridge from the lever action .30-30 rifle he had used to slay his wife and send a bullet crashing into his forehead.

Holland police said Mrs. Sisson and a friend had been downstairs when the shooting took place about 1:30 a.m. Police were called at 1:32 a.m. and found the bodies of Randolph and his wife sprawled on the bedroom floor.

Medical examiner, Dr. William Westrate Jr. said a bullet had struck Mrs. Randolph in the heart. Randolph had shot himself just above the left eye.

Police said they found two spent cartridges on the floor besides the one, still in the chamber of the rifle, which had killed Randolph. One bullet lodged in the mattress on the couple's bed near where the baby had been lying. Another bullet was lodged in the wall.

Det. Gene Geib said Randolph apparently was irate after finding a note from his wife informing him that she had left work early and was going out with her sister and her friend, and to expect her home shortly after midnight.

Geib said Mrs. Randolph and Mrs. Sisson each picked up their two children at a babysitter about 1 a.m. and returned to the Randolph home. Randolph was at home waiting for them.

Shortly after his wife arrived at home, Geib said, Randolph said he wanted to see his wife upstairs. Mrs. Randolph took the baby and a diaper and went upstairs with Randolph into the couple's bedroom to talk to him. A few minutes later the fatal shots were fired.

The couple had been married about six months, Geib said. Mrs. Randolph's two children, Bradley, 9 months, and Thomas, 4, were by a previous marriage.

Randolph was employed at Bay Casting Co. and his wife worked for Holland Colorcrafters for the past one and one-half years.

Mrs. Randolph is survived by her children, Thomas Steinberg, 4, and Bradley Steinberg, 9 months; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Gamby of Holland; one sister, Mrs. James (Charlene) Sisson of Glenn; two brothers, Patrick, 8, and Scott, 6, the grandmother, Mrs. Christine Fogarty of Holland; the grandfather, Paul Gamby of New Richmond.

Besides the two stepchildren, Randolph is survived by his mother, Mrs. Florence Randolph of Holland; his father, Miles Randolph of Lisbon, Ohio; five sisters, Mrs. Paul Huff of Columbiana, Ohio, Mrs. Kenneth Workman and Mrs. Everett Vocature, both of New Waterford, Ohio, Mrs. Donald Passage of Lisbon and Mrs. Ronald McMillan of Holland; two brothers, Miles Randolph Jr. with the U.S. Army in Viet Nam and Dennis Randolph of Holland.

Tonnies Funckes, 79, Dies in Holland Hospital

Tonnies Funckes, 79, formerly of 177 East Sixth St., a resident at the Ottawa county infirmary since 1964, died at Holland Hospital Monday after being hospitalized since Thursday.

Born in The Netherlands, he came to this community with his mother as a boy and has lived here ever since. He had been employed in local furniture manufacturing plants and attended Central Avenue Christian Reformed Church.

Surviving are three sisters, Mrs. Tena Hellenenthal and Mrs. Gertrude De Koster both of Holland and Mrs. Reka Sprick of Zeeland; three brothers, John Funckes of St. Petersburg, Fla., Arthur Lemmen of East Saugatuck and Benjamin Lemmen of Holland.

Dutchmen Notch 3rd MIAA Win

A determined team effort resulted in a fun evening for Hope College's basketball squad Wednesday night as the Flying Dutchmen romped to an 89-63 win over Albion before 1,500 fans in the Civic Center.

Hope's determination was evident from the moment they walked on the floor and it carried throughout the game and was rewarded with a standing ovation by the fans when the regulars retired with 5:56 to play.

After last Wednesday's disappointing performance in the loss to Olivet, Hope was anxious to turn in a top flight showing and the result was probably the best game of the season.

This showing served as a preface for Hope's battle with MIAA leader Calvin Saturday at 8 p.m. in the Civic Center. The Knights whipped Alma Wednesday for their fifth straight MIAA win. Hope is in second with a 3-1 mark.

As Coach Russ De Vette pointed out, no one was more disappointed over the Olivet performance than the team and they wanted to show their fans that they were a better club and to play the way the fans thought they could.

The game was tied six times in the first 10 minutes with the final tie 12-12. Then Coach Russ De Vette inserted "his big man team" which meant senior 6'5" Bill Potter replacing starting freshman 5'11" Dave Utzinger.

Hope got the next three baskets and in the next seven minutes outscored the Britons, 21-3. That made the score 33-17 and the only question after that was the final score.

Under De Vette's experiment of trying to play his five best players, regardless of position, he noted that Hope tried to do what this quintet could do best.

This meant slowing down the game, working at a control game and getting good shots. If a team is going to slow down the game and work for the good shots, it has to shoot well. De Vette pointed out, and his team did just that. They hit 54 per cent with 39 baskets in 72 shots on halves of 18 of 34 and 21 of 38.

Carl Walters, banging jumpers from out, hit five of eight in the first half while Floyd Brady also scored five baskets and Clare Van Wieren added four.

When De Vette inserted Potter Hope went into a zone defense and forced the Britons to shoot from out. Hope then concentrated on getting the rebound and setting its own game in motion.

Hope had run the score to 42-23 at half. They continued this pace to open the second half. De Vette had Walters and Brady out in front "because they react better to pressure when given the advantage."

Walters canned three of four shot attempts while Brady had four of seven. Van Wieren had five of seven and Hope had a 30-point bulge (72-42) with 7:29 to play. It was still 30 (76-46) at 5:56 when De Vette inserted another lineup.

Brady led Hope with 22 while Van Wieren had 21 and Walters 17. Tom Balistrere had 10 for Albion as the Britons sank 32 of 76 for 42 per cent on halves of 12 of 36 and 20 of 40. Hope had 11 of 16 free throws and Albion four of 10.

As for rebounding, Hope dominated, 52-35, winning the defensive board battle, 27-16. The win ended Hope's overall mark at 5-5 and left the Britons with a 3-2 MIAA record and 4-7 overall.

Hope sophomore Tom Pelon used the junior varsity game to get in shape, scoring 22 points, and he will dress for the Calvin game. De Vette said. With Pelon, Hope will have 11 varsity players for the Calvin contest.

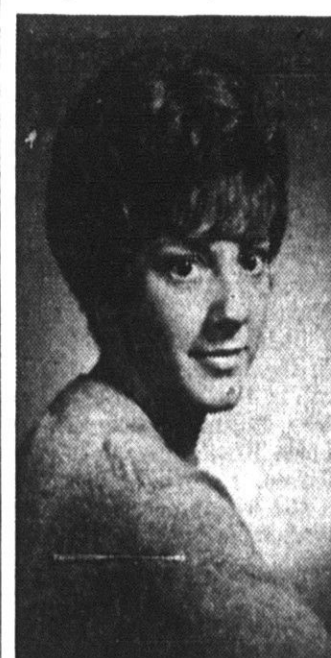

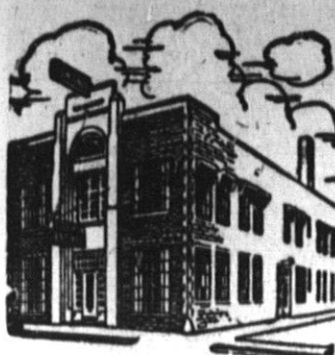

A TIMELY REMINDER

When the atom was split, Pro-
fessor Albert Einstein warned that
it had changed everything about
our lives except our thinking.

The average man-in-the-street
is still too inclined to view the
war-peace problem in pre-
atomic terms, not fully realiz-
ing that a new dimension has
been added with the introduction
of atomic weapons. He may per-
haps have an added feeling of
dread and vague apprehension,
soon forgotten in the feeling that
there is too little influence
any single individual can bring
to bear on the world situation.
Secretary of State Dean Rusk,
in interviews recently, spoke
more forcefully than usual in
reminding us: "There will be
no gathering together after
World War III. There won't be
enough left. Forget it." It was
indeed a timely reminder. An
earlier unknown source has put
the case epigrammatically:
"This is the day of the H-bomb
in which all men are cremated
equal."

The prospect of the incineration
of hundreds of millions of
human beings should give every-
one pause. Those who seek by
every honorable means to avert
this catastrophe, such as the
Quaker American Friends Service
Committee, deserve a better
fate than to be accused of being
"well known as a transmission
belt for the Communist apparatus."

Such was the accusation of a
report issued July 13, 1965 for
the Senate Internal Security Sub-
committee, whose chairman is
Senator Eastland of Mississippi.
Subsequent to its release, Sen-
ators Hugh Scott of Pennsyl-
vania (former Republican Na-
tional Committee Chairman),
Sam J. Ervin, Jr. of North
Carolina, Birch Bayh of Indiana,
Joseph D. Tydings of Maryland,
and Joseph S. Clark of Pennsylv-
ania issued statements from the
Senate floor denouncing the
charge, as also did Senator
Thomas J. Dodd of Connecticut,
well known for his strong anti-
Communist views.

Following the statement,
Colin W. Bell of the AFSC
replied the next day, July 14,
with a statement of which the
following is an excerpt: "When
we speak, write or distribute
literature, we do so under our
own banner. We have no activi-
ties to hide from anyone who
genuinely seeks to know the
truth, and we are neither be-
holden to nor affiliated with any
group, party or movement in
ways that are not open for all
to see."

Considering the reputation of
the AFSC, that "For three hun-
dred years Quakers have prayed
and worked for the nonviolent
ordering of human society," we
are inclined to put more cre-
dence in the reply than in the
original SIS Subcommittee re-
port, chaired by Senator East-
land.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, January 16
God is Holy
I Chronicles 29: 10-13;
Revelation 4: 8-11;
Romans 11: 33-36
By C. P. Dame

In the first two lessons of
the year we studied the na-
ture and basis of our belief
and in the next four lessons
we will consider our beliefs
about God. The first lesson of
this series turns our minds to
the holiness of God, a topic
most timely for this loose age.
I. God is truly great. It is
good to state this seeing that
so much is said today about
man's greatness and power
and wisdom. David wanted to
build a temple but God forbade
him, telling him that his son
Solomon would do that. Al-
though he could not build the
temple he nevertheless wanted
a share in it and so he col-
lected much material and asked
the people to give, which they
generously did. This rejoiced
the king greatly and con-
strained him to thank and
praise God in the presence of
all the people.

In his prayer David says
that riches and honor come
from God. Man's greatness is
but a reflection of God's
greatness. All that man has
comes from God and therefore
he is under obligation to God.
This obligation many today for-
get which is most tragic in-
deed.

II. God merits our worship,
in fact we owe Him worship.
The Book of Revelation was
written by John for the en-
couragement of persecuted
Christians. John told believers
that ultimate victory would be
theirs.

In the vision which John
gives he saw a throne and
four beasts, living creatures,
belonging to the highest rank
of the angels. They were full
of eyes, they saw all things,
they were watchful, had knowl-
edge, were obedient and ever
busy day and night praising
God, saying, "Holy, holy, holy
Lord God Almighty which was,
and is, and is to come."

John also saw twenty-four
elders, falling down before
Him who sat on the throne.
These elders worshipped God
and they "cast their crowns
before the throne." John states
two facts about God — He is
eternal and has final authori-
ty.

III. We can trust God. The
first part of the lesson text
made us think of David, the
second part of John, and now
in the last part we will note
the words Paul wrote about
the wisdom of God. We are
learning more and more about
this world which ought to
teach us that God is wise. All
glory belongs to God, who is
holy. The holiness of God de-
mands reverence from us.

A holy awe in the heart is
too rare today. Since God is
holy He demands that His
people be holy. "Be ye holy
for I am holy." In a time of
a moral landslide when some
church leaders say that the
strict moral standards of his-
toric Christianity need to be
reexamined, it is time to call
for self-discipline instead of
yielding to self-indulgence.

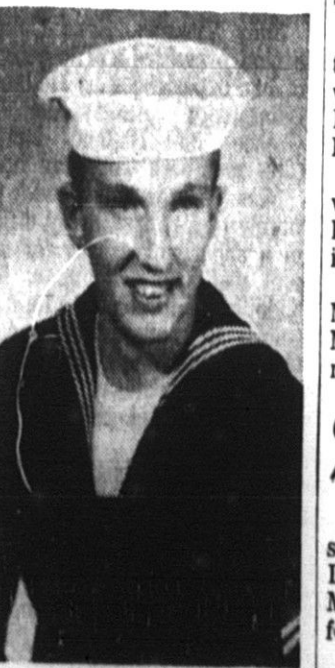

The building was entered by prying out a pane of glass in a side window, reaching through to open the window and crawling in.

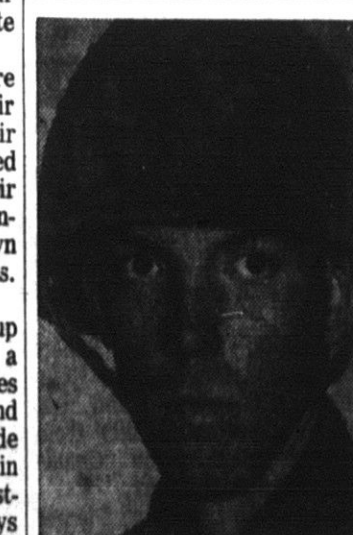

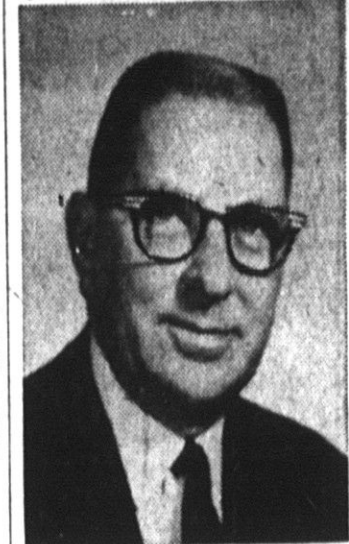

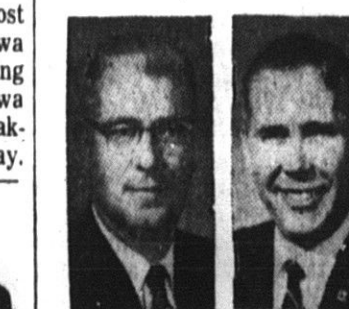

Grand Haven Annexation Vote Loses

GRAND HAVEN — A vote on proposed annexation of 642 acres of land in Grand Haven township to the city of Grand Haven lost by a wide margin Tuesday.

The city vote lost 723 to 401, and the two precincts in the township voted down the proposal 9 to 8. All but the second precinct in the city opposed the proposal.

The defeat was laid to a brisk campaign put on last week by a group of township residents organized in a "committee for mutually planned annexation." This group claimed that the municipal airport which was included in the area made up only half of the area involved. They pointed out that the other half is owned by township residents and only three of the property owners signed the petition to annex.

Proponents in the city sought the annexation because there are few industrial sites left within the city limits.

Douglas Marina Permit Sought

Harding, Oak Park, Ill., has applied to the Corps of Engineers for a federal permit to construct a marina consisting of a pier extending 600 feet lakeward with 15 by 30 foot boat wells on the west side and 20 by 30 foot boat wells on the east side, in Kalamazoo Lake located a half mile west from US-31 highway bridge across Kalamazoo River.

The application also calls for dredging from the shore to the seven-foot contour in Kalamazoo Lake. The dredged material, approximately 1,250 cubic yards, is to be placed on barge barges in accordance with plans outlined in the application.

Any interested party objecting to proposed operations on reasons pertaining to navigation should file written protests not later than Feb. 7 at 4:30 p.m. with the Corps of Engineers of office in Detroit.

Maroons End Five-Game Losing Streak

Holland Christian's basketball squad finished strong after staving off a desperate St. Joseph rally in the final quarter to whip the Bears, 76-68 before 1,900 fans in the Civic Center Tuesday night.

Coach Art Tuls' Maroons saw a 17-point third quarter bulge fade to just three at 53-50 early in the fourth period before they regrouped themselves to build up a safe margin and eventual victory. A good St. Joseph zone press helped the Bears whittle the Maroon lead in a hurry late in the third stanza. However, Holland solved the defense to go in for some easy layups during the pressure-packed final period.

Christian, which has outbounded every opponent this season, finally got the shooting to go with it Tuesday night enabling the Maroons to snap a five game losing streak. Coach Ray Haack's Bears, with perhaps their finest club in many years, now have a 5-2 record compared to Holland's 3-6. Christian has now defeated St. Joseph seven straight times and 11 out of the last 12.

Both clubs had 42 per cent shooting marks. Christian hit on 31 out of 74 tries while the losers managed 29-69. Tuls was particularly pleased by the fact that his club shot well in every quarter, topped by 55 per cent (10-18) in the second period.

The winners took off 44 rebounds compared to 32 for St. Joseph with Junior Don Hulst leading Christian with 16. Hulst played another great game and led both clubs with 25 markers. Christian had four players in double figures. Tuls got a good performance out of all his starters as well as subs Dave Deur and Steve Bushouse. Besides chipping in with eight big points, Deur did a good defensive job on the St. Joseph ace, Don Patzer.

St. Joseph, with hustle and speed to spare, boasts of two fine individual performers in Patzer, a great shooter from outside, and smooth working forward, Mike McGath. The Bears rely mainly on the fast break and outside shooting for their points.

It was all Holland in the second period as the winners steadily pulled away from the Bears. Once again it was Don Hulst, aided by brother Les, along with Ken Vander Kamp and Deur who led the Maroon attack. Christian built up a 16 point lead before settling for a 38-24 halftime bulge.

Holland continued to hold the upper hand during the first half of the third period as it built up its biggest margin at 48-31 with four minutes left in period before a couple of the stanza. Christian led 50-34 with two minutes left in the steals and bad passes permitted the Bears to score 10 straight points. At this point the Maroons rallied to build a 53-44 third period cushion.

St. Joseph scored six points in the first 40 seconds of the last period, but this was as far as their comeback would take them. Aided by the clever floor play of Soph guard Lloyd Dozeman, the Maroons rolled through the St. Joseph press for some easy counters to offset the Bear scoring machine. Christian which had sunk just one out of eight free throws in the first three quarters, hit on 13 out of 19 in the last seven minutes as the desperate Bears attempted to break up the Maroon control tactics.

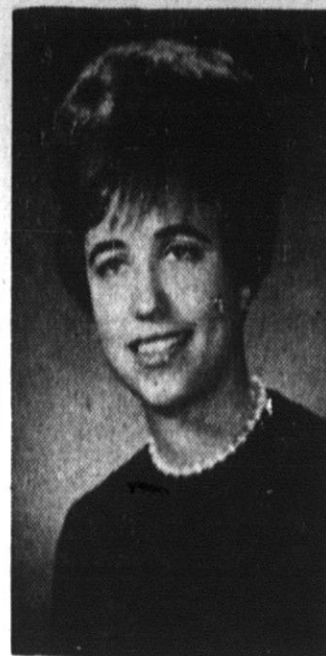

To Enlarge Juvenile Division

GRAND HAVEN — The juvenile division of Ottawa County Probate Court will be enlarged as the result of action taken by the Board of Supervisors Tuesday.

The move to boost the staff to seven members was outlined by City Manager R. V. Terrill of Grand Haven who reported on a meeting last Friday in Holland where Probate Judge Frederick T. Miles explained a program whereby additional state funds are available, provided requirements are met.

L. A. Wade of Holland said the present staff of two persons is unable to handle all referrals on juvenile delinquents, and often nothing is done when juveniles are referred to the court.

Minimum requirements call for at least seven on the staff to qualify for state aid, and the court was instructed to fill two present vacancies and add three workers as soon as possible. Don Meindersma of the juvenile division said one or two workers may be added by July 1. George Steggers of Holland is also on the staff.

Terrill said Ottawa county now has 105,000 residents. Only 10 counties in Michigan do not comply with state requirements and Ottawa is the largest of this group. He said the county lost \$5,000 in state aid in 1965 because standards were not met.

In other business, the board took the first step toward hiring a county equalization director. The officers committee was instructed to obtain information on classification and salary schedule. William Koop of Holland, chairman of the equalization committee, said the size of the county warrants such an office.

Landscaping plans for the new square on the site of the old court house were approved, but a proposed pool and fountain were eliminated.

The board voted \$100 for a telephone in the surveyor's office by a 16-15 vote. Previously the surveyor had worked out of his home.

Zeeland Mayor Frank Hoogland said board members should have an agenda mailed out a week to 10 days before the board session. Board Clerk Vivian Nuismer was instructed to prepare such an agenda and board members were instructed to forward reports and recommendations well in advance.

Placing a public pay telephone in the hall of the new county building was authorized by the board.

Chairman R. L. Cook named George Wessel, Terrill and Clarence Reenders of Grand Haven and Anthony Wolf of Robinson to arrange for the 5th district supervisors convention in Grand Haven March 17.

Cook also appointed Frank Hoogland of Zeeland, Raymond Vander Laan of Hudsonville, Henry Slaughter of Lamont and Wessel of Grand Haven to a committee to study a request of the county medical society for a county-wide mental health program.

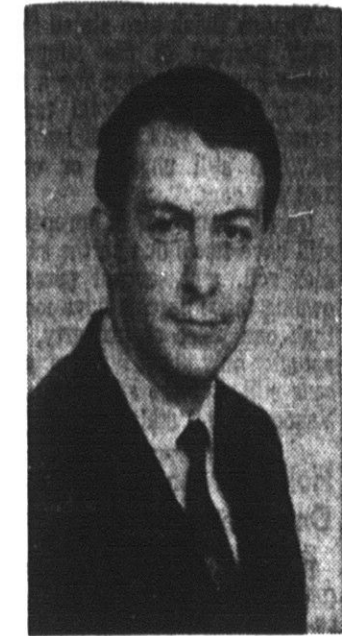

Views From The Campus

I am often asked to compare the students of the United States with those in Britain. To make any comparison valid it is necessary to consider the differences between the systems of higher education in the two countries.

Britain has no equivalent of



the American liberal arts college. Most British colleges provide professional training for teaching and for technical skills. They award diplomas or certificates but do not have the authority to confer degrees, which is a prerogative of the university. Recently, a number of these colleges have been upgraded to university level in an attempt to meet the increasing demand for university education.

Some of the older universities, such as Oxford and Cambridge (founded in the 12th and 13th centuries, respectively), have colleges associated with them. The 31 colleges of Oxford and the 20 of Cambridge are completely autonomous as far as property, finance and internal affairs are concerned, but the universities as a whole confer degrees and provide central libraries, laboratories, and much of the formal instruction. The only other universities based on the collegiate system are those of Durham, London and Wales. London is the largest in the United Kingdom with approximately 25,000 students. Formerly, there were many provincial colleges associated with the University of London. All of these have been granted independent university status in this century and are known as the "red-brick universities."

In spite of the recent increase in the number of university places, there are proportionately far fewer available to the British student than to his American counterpart. Hence, there is considerable pressure on the British high school pupil who wishes to further his education. He is assessed for university entrance on the results of two sets of examinations, taken at the ages of 16 and 18. Specialization occurs early in high schools so that the British high school graduate has detailed knowledge of only three or four closely related subjects.

The successful university applicant may study for a general degree, or, if he passes the qualifying examination, for an honours degree. The honours course is heavily biased towards the major subject. There are few examinations, usually one set per year, and the class of degree is decided by the results of the final examinations, taken at the end of the third year.

Instruction in a British university is by lecture and tutorial. The lectures tend to be more formal than in this country and discussion during the course of a lecture is discouraged. Lectures rarely follow any particular textbook. It is the tutorial, usually conducted weekly with three or four students present, which provides the opportunity for the informal exchange of ideas. Oxford and Cambridge place more emphasis on these tutorials than do most of the other universities.

The "Student's Union" is the centre of social life at a British university. This is a non-residential building devoted entirely to recreational activities, and it is completely controlled by a student council. It comprises lounges, dining and bar facilities, as well as rooms for debates and society meetings. Usually, a student is active in two or three societies (e.g. religious, political, sports). There is no British equivalent of the fraternities and sororities. A few students live in halls of residence (similar to dormitories) but the majority live

with approved families, or in apartments.
The main difference between the two systems of education is that the British system provides a few students with intensive instruction in a limited field, whereas, the American system provides more students with less intensive instruction over a wider field. I feel that the British student specializes at too early an age, but it is a debatable point at what age specialization should begin. In many ways it is ideal to have a broad education up to college graduate level, but I doubt that this will continue to be feasible when future generations will require so much specialized knowledge.

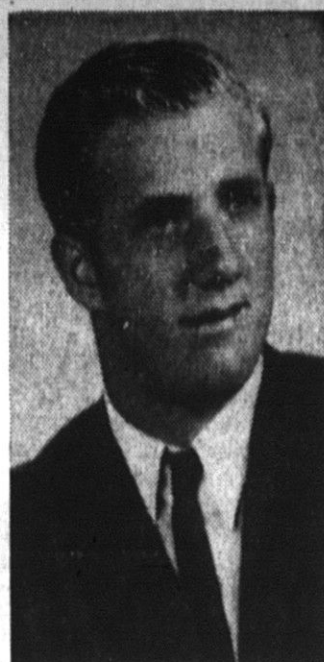
