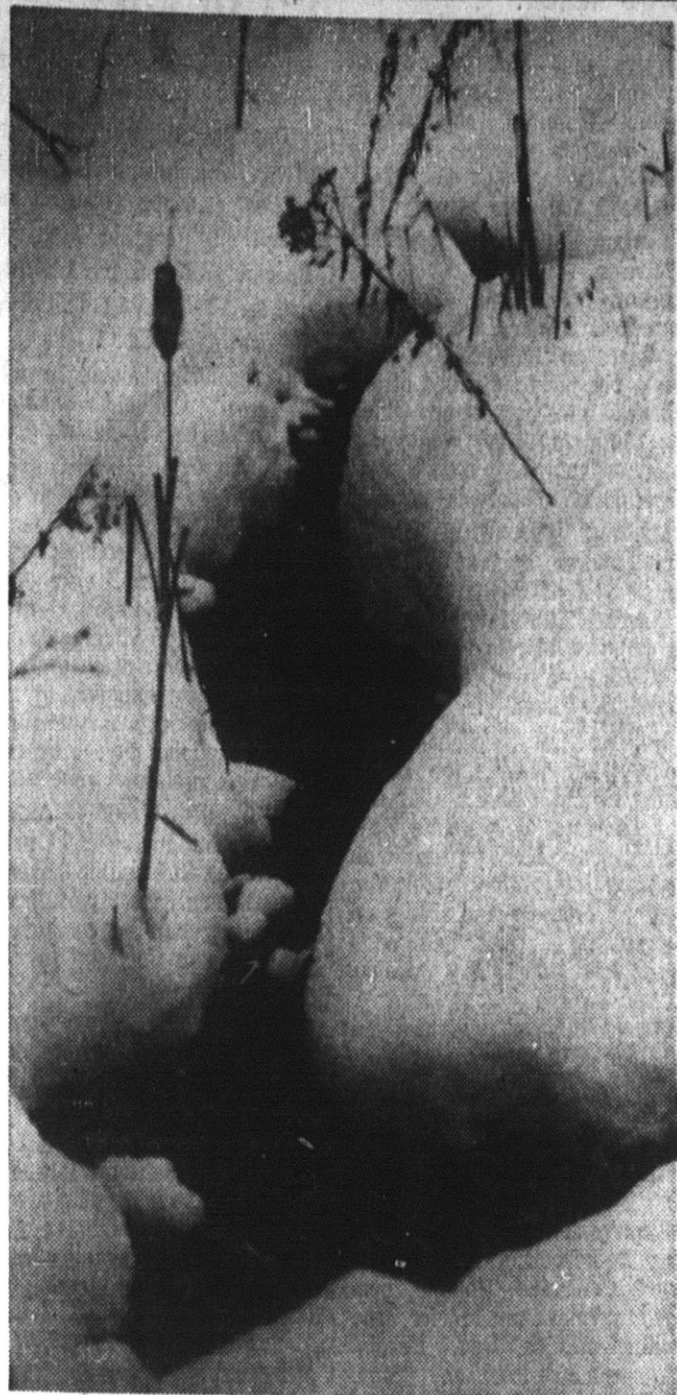

## Holland Continues Digging Out Snow

A good share of Holland residents were getting tired of winter today as intermittent snowfalls continued, boosting ground deposits to 20 inches.

But the young fry reveled in the mounting snow depths, and winter sports fans were even more enthusiastic with plans for skiing and running snowmobiles.

Street department crews worked around the clock keeping streets and walks clear and private operators were kept almost as busy clearing private drives and parking lots.

Cold weather persisted and the 11 a.m. reading was 15 degrees, up two degrees from the 6 a.m. reading of 13. Tuesday's maximum was 26.

Eight inches of snow fell Tuesday plus another inch overnight and while ground deposits were estimated at 20 inches, the compacted snow offered even greater challenge to operators looking for places to dump the snow.

Police Chief Leslie Van Beveren again appealed to motorists to put flags or objects of some kind on car antennas for safety factors as snow banks at curbs continue to mount, particularly at intersections where cross plowing piles up even more snow.

## General Interiors Acquires All Stock Of Baker Furniture

Wednesday, Hollis M. Baker, president of Baker Furniture, Inc., announced that an agreement has been reached in principle for General Interiors, Inc. to acquire all of the common and preferred stock of the Baker company, for cash and stock.

Under the proposed agreement, Baker will become the largest of the "high quality" divisions of General Interiors, which also include Kittinger Company and Dunbar, Inc. Hollis Baker and Frank Van Steenberg will retain their present positions as president and board chairman, respectively, and will also have extended responsibilities in General Interiors' management structure.

The total sales volume of Baker Furniture, Inc. and its wholly-owned subsidiaries approximated \$10,500,000 in fiscal 1968, with earnings of \$800,000. The subsidiary companies are Milling Road Furniture, Barnard and Simonds, Kozak Studios, Gallery Craft Upholstery and showrooms in eight major U.S. cities.

Both Hollis Baker and Colin Carpi, president of General Interiors, expressed enthusiasm for the great potential which will develop from the melding of their companies. They point out that the combined resources of Baker, Kittinger and Dunbar provide a manufacturing and marketing capability that is unique in the top strata of the high-quality furniture field.

Although each division oper-

ates individually, Carpi stressed, General Interiors' top lines will combine to offer an exceedingly wide selection of styles, ranging from reproductions of European and American antiques, through the more sophisticated classic forms, to the contemporary designs in which Dunbar specializes.

Baker Furniture's successful distribution policies through fine retail stores and showrooms, also will make a substantial contribution to future marketing plans; and the resulting availability of manufacturing facilities in the East, Southeast and Midwest promises more efficient service to all customers.

Finally, Baker and Carpi expect the combined organization to create a reservoir of design and manufacturing knowledge that will stimulate many favorable developments in style and technology.

Baker is probably the best-known name in the high-quality traditional furniture field. The company was founded in Allegan, in 1890 by Siebe Baker, grandfather of the current president. The late Hollis S. Baker became president in 1925 and eight years later, moved the company to larger manufacturing facilities in Holland. Frank Van Steenberg, who joined the firm's design department in 1927, served as president from 1953 to 1961, at which time Hollis M. Baker assumed the title and responsibilities.

During the 1930's Baker built an outstanding reputation in 18th century English reproductions and, since that period, has been credited with initiating or giving the first effective stimulus to such furniture fashion trends as Far East, Finn Juhl contemporary, Palladian and related classic styles and "Country Manor" types of French and English furniture.

General Interiors, comprised of a number of leading furniture manufacturing activities serving leading dealers, interior designers and architects, has reported preliminary sales results of 23 million dollars for the fiscal year ending Oct. 31, 1968.

## Supervisors At Allegan Set Salary

ALLEGAN — One of the first official acts of Allegan County's new 21-member board of supervisors Tuesday was to set a \$2,500 annual salary for themselves, plus \$25 per day for special meetings and committee sessions.

Meeting here Tuesday for their organization meeting, the new district supervisors soon made it apparent that the old rural-urban split, a trade mark of the larger board, had been replaced at least temporarily by the new division.

The board named Milton Timmerman, Fillmore township, to continue as chairman by a vote of 11 to 10. Timmerman, one of the 11 members of the old board elected to serve on the new, defeated Fred Edgerton of Plainwell, one of the 10 newcomers.

Thus it appears that the board might divide on many issues along the old board-new board line.

The proposal to set a \$2,500 salary for district supervisors was offered by Edward Reid Barton, an attorney of rural Plainwell. His original motion called for \$2,500 per year plus \$20 for each morning session and \$10 for each afternoon session.

This was amended upon the motion of Robert Irwin, Allegan, to eliminate the payments of per diem supplements for regular meetings, which will be paid only for special sessions and committee meetings.

Fred Edgerton's amendment reducing the per diem supplement to \$15 and \$10 for morning and afternoon sessions also was approved.

The vote on the salary proposal as amended was 14 to 7. Members of the old 39-man board had been serving for \$20 per day. The average supervisor received approximately \$600 a year for board meetings and committee work.

Tuesday's organizational meeting was deemed a special session and the board will reconvene Tuesday, Jan. 14, for the regular monthly meeting.

St. Mary's Hospital officials announced in Grand Rapids today that Mrs. Dekker is now scheduled on the kidney machine at the hospital for eight hour periods each Monday and Thursday.

Treatment is on schedule to enable a February or March kidney transplant at University Hospital, Ann Arbor. Information concerning the fund can be obtained by contacting Robert Bouwman, 1 West Fifth St.

## 7 Arrested On Marijuana Charges

GRAND HAVEN — Seven persons were arrested Friday night and early Saturday morning on marijuana charges following a 72-hour stakeout by city police and Ottawa sheriff's officers which included a raid at 501½ Fulton St. and other developments in a motel room which officers had rented.

At the house raid, officers arrested Michael Swiftney, 21, same address, charged with possession of marijuana after officers confiscated \$150 worth of the drug.

Others arrested for possession of marijuana were Robert Mandigo, 17, Brian Iverson, 17, and Ralph Ryan, 19, all of Muskegon. Arrested on charges of use of marijuana were Michael Reynolds, 17, Fort Dodge, Ia., Thomas Bolema, 17, and Betty Hahn, 19, both of Muskegon.

Officers believe the arrest of the seven persons is associated with the arrest of Donald Kroll, 18, also of Muskegon, who was charged with possession of marijuana by sheriff's officers on New Year's Day. He demanded examination in Grand Haven district court late Thursday. Date was not set.

Miss Hahn pleaded not guilty in district court late Friday and Reynolds and Bolema pleaded not guilty Saturday noon. Unable to pay \$1,000 bond, Miss Hahn was committed to the county jail.

Swiftney, Iverson and Ryan demanded examination when arraigned Saturday and were committed to jail unable to furnish \$1,000 each. Iverson furnished bond Saturday night and was released. Mandigo, Reynolds and Bolema furnished bond Monday and were released.

Under the district court setup, the charge of use of marijuana is regarded as a misdemeanor, not a high misdemeanor, and may be settled in district court, officers said.

## New Sintering Plant Planned For Grand Haven

GRAND HAVEN — Construction Aggregates Corp. of Chicago announced today it will construct a sintering plant to produce expanded clay lightweight aggregate on property it owns near Grand Haven.

The plant is scheduled to be in operation in the third quarter of 1969, according to Ezra Sensibar, president of the Chicago based firm.

Construction Aggregates Corporation, a major producer of sand and gravel, currently operates a sand and gravel plant in the Grand Haven area.

The new plant will be located on a site which contains a large reserve of clay suitable for processing into aggregate used in the manufacture of concrete blocks and will have a capacity of 300,000 tons per year. The location will permit the product to be shipped by rail, truck and self-unloading lake vessels.

## Three Injured In Headon Crash

ALLEDALE — Three persons were injured in a headon collision on M-45 just east of 56th Ave. in Alledale township at 8:58 p.m. Monday. Dale M. Leonard, 63, Grand Rapids, was headed east when his car went over the centerline and struck an oncoming car driven by Benjamin Brower, 54, Alledale.

Leonard received head lacerations and a passenger, Wilma Lyons, 55, of 109 West 19th St., Holland, received fractured ribs. Brower received severe face lacerations and mouth injuries. All were taken by ambulance to Butterworth Hospital in Grand Rapids and were released after treatment.

Ottawa sheriff's officers are investigating.

## Many Schools Close As Snowfall Continues

Nineteen inches of snow blanketed Holland Tuesday, closing outlying schools and blocking secondary roads as another 6½ inches of snow fell overnight.

The snowfall continued unabated Tuesday, and Park department employees helped the flurried street department crews in masterful attempts to keep streets and walks cleared.

Police Chief Leslie Van Beveren appealed to all car drivers to attach an object of some kind to car antennas so that moving vehicles can be seen above the ever mounting banks of snow, many of them at crossings posing safety hazards.

"Please drive very carefully," Van Beveren asks motorists, "particularly in view of children, other pedestrians and other traffic." He said the "object" for car antennas need not be purchased. Anything from a red handkerchief to a styrofoam ball can be used, but it should be easily seen and preferably colorful.

Holland public schools were about the only schools that remained open today. All Holland Christian schools and West Ottawa schools were closed, as well as all Grand Haven, Hudsonville, Spring Lake and Ferrysburg schools.

Also closed were schools in Fennville, Saugatuck and Hamilton along with public and Christian schools in Zeeland. Other schools closed were in Hudsonville, South Olive Christian, Borculo Christian, Seventh Day Adventist and St. Peter's in Douglas.

Cars stuck in ditches and drives caused more problems

Grand Haven reported another five inches of snow. State police said most secondary roads are impassable, adding that 1-96 was a sheet of glare ice and that M-21 was very icy. All primary roads were snow covered and slippery.

It was 20 degrees in Holland at 11 a.m. today, down a degree from the 21-degree reading at 6 a.m. Monday's maximum was 28 and the minimum 21.

Hope College resumed classes Tuesday after the holiday vacation, but many calls were received from students stranded in airports in widely separated areas.

Drifting was reported all over western Michigan from the Indiana border to the Straights of Mackinac, and across to Flint and Port Huron. Snow measured 39 inches at Houghton, 36 inches at Pellston, 26 inches at Traverse City, 17 inches at Muskegon, 16 at Lansing and

Grand Rapids, 8 at Saginaw, 5 at Detroit and 4 at Jackson.

Elsewhere in the nation, storms continued in the North- and Northeast while clear skies dominated most of the plains, the Southwest and the Great Basin.

A storm center off Canada spread rain along the coast of Washington and Oregon. In the east, a storm over Lake Ontario held sway from the Great Lakes to New England. Warm weather was limited to the southern portions of Florida and California.

## Board Will Appoint New Supervisor

GRAND HAVEN — The new Ottawa County Board of Supervisors was slated to hold its first meeting today at 1:30 p.m. but Thursday it was already faced with a change in membership, as determined by the Nov. 5 election.

Clarence Broman, 63, Spring Lake, Thursday announced he must resign because of his health and planned to submit a formal letter of resignation today to County Clerk Harris Nieuwma. The board must now appoint a resident of Broman's district, which includes Ferrysburg city and part of Spring Lake township, to Broman's place. The appointee must be a member of the same party as Broman, Republican.

Broman is well known in north Ottawa county. He retired from the Eagle - Ottawa Leather Co. in 1967 after he served that firm 43 years. When he retired he was assistant treasurer and head of personnel.

In the August primary last year he was nominated over two other Republicans, Claude Olthof and Earl Neault and in the November election defeated Arthur Nadort, the Democratic candidate, for supervisor.

Olthof is the likely appointee as he ran second to Broman in the primary.

## Holland Fireman Burned at Blaze

A Holland fireman, Jack Seidelman, 40, of 17134 Lake Ave., Port Sheldon, burned his right hand while helping extinguish a grease fire at the Ted Kok home, 236 West 18th St., early Wednesday morning.

Seidelman was attempting to move a deep fryer in which grease was burning when the grease spilled over onto his hand, according to firemen.

He was treated at Holland Hospital and released.

Firemen extinguished the small fire which was in the basement of the Kok home. The blaze did about \$50 damage, firemen said.

Firemen also answered an alarm in from Bay Casting Company, 338 West 12th St. at 4:48 a.m. today. The automatic alarm system in the plant was touched off by a blow torch.

There was no damage.

## Band Fund Drive Nears Halfway Mark

The campaign for funds to send the Holland Christian High School band to Washington D. C. for the Presidential inaugural parade has reached \$7,100, Gerald Van Noord, chairman of the finance committee, reported Friday.

"We are almost half way to our goal of \$15,000 which has been budgeted by the planning committee for the trip," he said. A total of \$2,000 has come in through the mail in the last two days as a result of some 500 letters sent out last week to area merchants, industry and professional people, Van Noord said.

"We are certainly gratified by the response from the community as a result of the letters and we hope it continues," he said. The contributions ranged from \$25 to \$100 he said.

Meanwhile, more information has been made available to the local committee from Lansing

and Washington sources. On Tuesday committee members Supt. Mark Vander Ark, Van Noord, Clare Pott, and Sen. Gary Byker conferred with Lt. Gov. William G. Milliken and R. H. Mc Manus, parade coordinator for the state of Michigan.

Mc Manus gave details on the parade route down Pennsylvania Avenue with disbandment northwest of the White House. The parade is expected to be two hours long past a given point. Mc Manus also expressed his pleasure with the plans of the Holland committee, particularly with the elaborate hour by hour schedule of the band, along with cost analysis and all scheduled stops, prepared by Konrad Marcus.

Mc Manus said the Michigan float would consist of a replica of the Tahquamenon Falls of the Upper Peninsula complete with running water. A miniature track around the float will fea-

ture Michigan-made cars. The float will depict Michigan as a wonderful place to live and will feature skiers, fishermen and other sporting activities of the state. Four representatives of labor will also be on the float, he said.

Donald Stolz, personal liaison of Rep. Guy Vander Jagt to the band, also arrived back in Holland from Washington on Wednesday and reported plans are "coming along nicely."

Stolz said he conferred with Col. Paul Miller and Captain E. Bartlett of the national parade committee as well as with Vander Jagt. He said he was informed that the state contingents in the parade would march in the order that a particular state was admitted to the Union. The Michigan unit, including the Holland Christian band, would march in the third division or about halfway in the parade as Michigan was the 26th state to be admitted to the Union.

Police escorts will be provided for the buses taking the band to the marshalling area at Bolling Air Force base and the U. S. Naval station across the Anacostia River just south of the Capitol.

Markers along the parade route will inform the bands when to play and when to remain silent and all bands will do "eyes left" in front of the Presidential reviewing stand.

Final details for the tour to be conducted by Vander Jagt and his staff were also discussed, Stolz said. Vander Jagt plans to meet the band when it arrives at its motel at Arlington, Va. on Saturday from Gettysburg, Pa. Historical sites will be toured beginning with Arlington Cemetery and ending four hours later at the Jefferson Memorial.

Packets filled with historical data are being prepared by Vander Jagt's staff and will be given to each band member, Stolz reported.

## Trio Arraigned In Grand Haven

GRAND HAVEN — Three Grand Rapids youths charged with illegal entry pleaded guilty to charges of entering without permission when arraigned in Grand Haven district court Monday and were assessed \$50 fine, \$11.10 costs or 30 days each.

Unable to pay, Joseph Allan Laske, 20, Douglas Holben, 19, and Teddie B. Nixon, 19, were remanded to the county jail. The trio was arrested early Monday after allegedly breaking into the John Maurer home on North Shore Drive.

Nixon, driver of the car, entered court on crutches because of a broken leg. He did not enter the home but was charged with the same offense as his comrades.



## Mark at 6-2 Following 89-32 Win

The only thing Holland Christian's basketball team couldn't handle here Tuesday night was the traffic in the Civic Center parking lot after the game, as the Maroons rebounded resoundingly from two consecutive road setbacks to wallop Allegan, 89-32.

Christian opened the scoring on a basket by Art Tuls and held the lead 21-10 at the close of the quarter.

Tuls led the Maroons in the quarter with 10 points while Dan Brower was right behind with nine.

Christian increased the margin to 42-21 at the half as Bruce Klaasen netted 10 points in the second quarter to pace the Maroon scoring drive.

The onslaught continued throughout the remainder of the game as the Maroons utilized a 1-2-2 zone defense to force the Tigers to shoot from out.

With Allegan as cold as the weather and the Maroons dominating the boards (a 55-23 margin for the game) Christian easily registered its sixth win in eight starts.

So complete was Christian's domination of the second half that although the Maroons were outshot, 36-35, they outscored the Tigers, 47-11.

Christian was paced in the game by the same three men who have been carrying the brunt of the Maroon scoring attack all year — Tuls, Brower and Klaasen.

Tuls and Brower each netted 22 points while Klaasen added 20 to the Christian attack which saw 10 players enter the scoring column.

The only player to hit double figures for Allegan was Marc Cook who totaled 15 points.

Christian had quarters of 10-21, 8-15, 12-17 and 7-18 for a 52 per cent shooting percentage on 37 of 71 attempts. From the charity stripe the Maroons were very cold hitting just 15 of 31 for 48 per cent.

Allegan attempted 63 shots and hit but nine for 14 per cent. A quarter breakdown was, 4-14, 2-13, 2-18 and 1-18. From the free throw line Allegan connected on 14 of 24 for 58 per cent.

Holland Christian will be on the road again, Friday night when they travel to Hudsonville for an 8 p.m. encounter with Unity Christian. Earlier in the season the Maroons edged Unity 64-63.

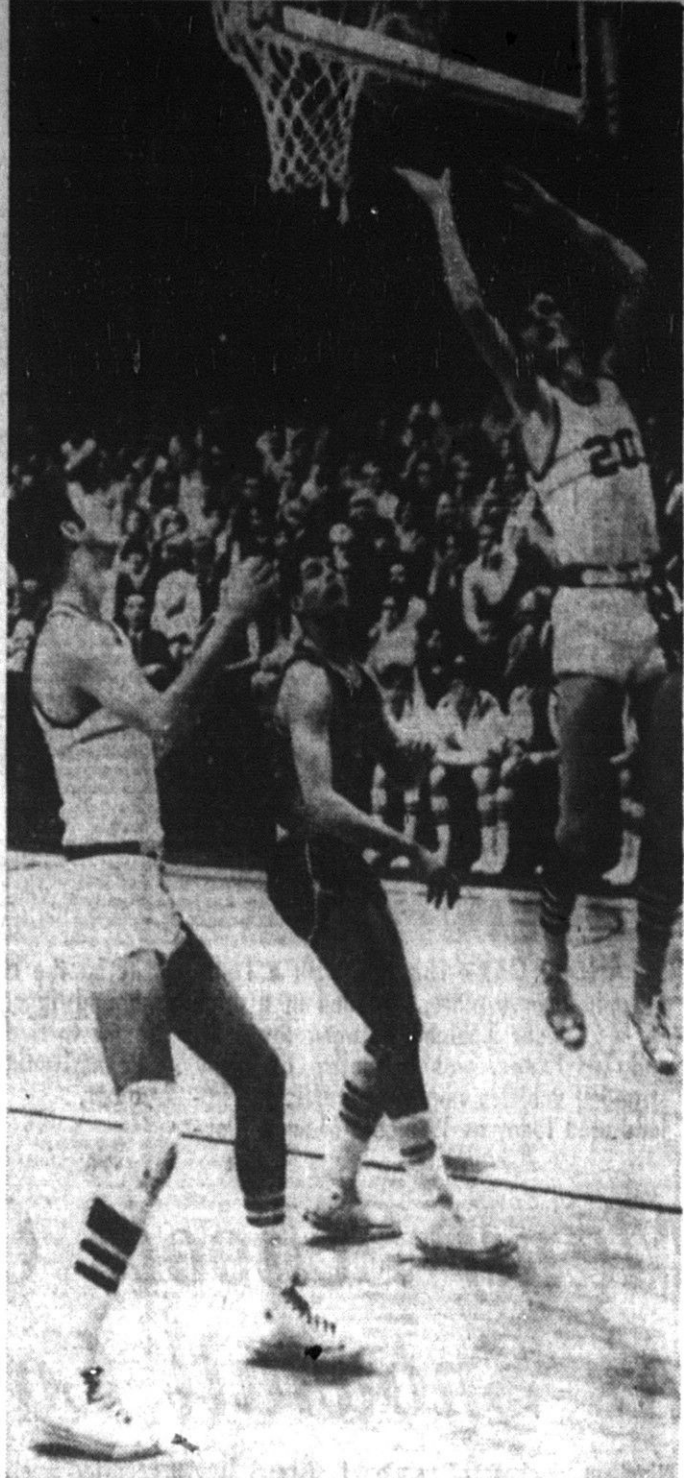

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Jan. 12  
The Authority of Christ  
Mark 1:21-34  
By C. P. Dame

The word "authority" is not  
popular today. We live in a  
rebellious age and hence many  
people disregard all manner of  
authority. This is one of the  
perils of our times. A great  
change would take place in  
our nation if more would rec-  
ognize the authority of Jesus.  
I. Jesus taught with author-  
ity. Several towns and cities  
have become well-known be-  
cause Jesus visited them in  
His ministry. After Herod had  
killed John the Baptist, Jesus  
moved from Judea into Galilee,  
and made Capernaum the cen-  
ter of His ministry. Jesus had  
won a number of disciples. On  
the sabbath day Jesus and the  
newly-won disciples went to the  
synagogue. This was the habit  
of Jesus. The only perfect man  
who ever lived upon this earth  
went to church on the sabbath  
day.

The synagogue was founded  
in the days of exile in Babylon  
to minister to the spiritual  
needs of the Jews. Wherever  
lived ten families a synagogue  
was established. The Temple  
was for worship and sacrifice,  
the synagogue was for teaching  
and instruction. The service  
was composed of the reading  
of God's Word, prayer and the  
exposition of the Word.

Jesus taught in the syna-  
gogue. The Lord taught with  
power. He knew God. His  
teaching was personal. His  
hearers recognized the differ-  
ence between His teaching and  
that of the scribes. He spoke  
with a God-given authority.  
"And they were all amazed" at  
His power to speak and to  
cast out a demon from a  
demon-possessed man who was  
in the synagogue.

II. Jesus healed a sick wom-  
an. After the service Jesus  
went to the home of Peter.  
His mother-in-law was sick with  
a fever and Jesus healed her.  
After she was healed "she  
served them." That was the  
way she expressed her grati-  
tude. Some people fail to use  
their recovered powers after a  
sickness in a way that reveals  
thankfulness. Note that usually  
when people learn to serve in  
a home, they show a readiness  
to serve elsewhere. And there  
are always plenty of opportu-  
nities to serve.

III. Jesus ministered to  
needy people. After sunset,  
which meant the end of the  
sabbath, people brought their  
sick to Jesus to be healed. Two  
kinds of people came — those  
who were troubled with com-  
mon ailments and the demon-  
possessed and Jesus healed  
them all. Jesus would not let  
the demons talk for they knew  
Him. He did not want their  
testimony.

Today many people disregard  
the weekly day of rest and  
use it for all manner of things.  
Jesus worshipped on the sab-  
bath day and served. — He  
healed the sick people. If  
more people would use the day  
for worship and Christian ser-  
vice, ministering to needy, lone-  
ly, sick, handicapped people  
the day would much better  
be used and promote more  
happiness.

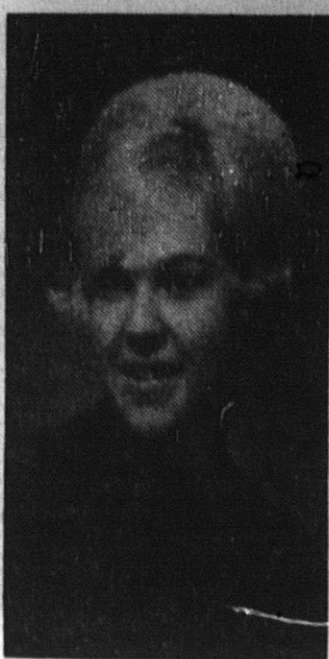

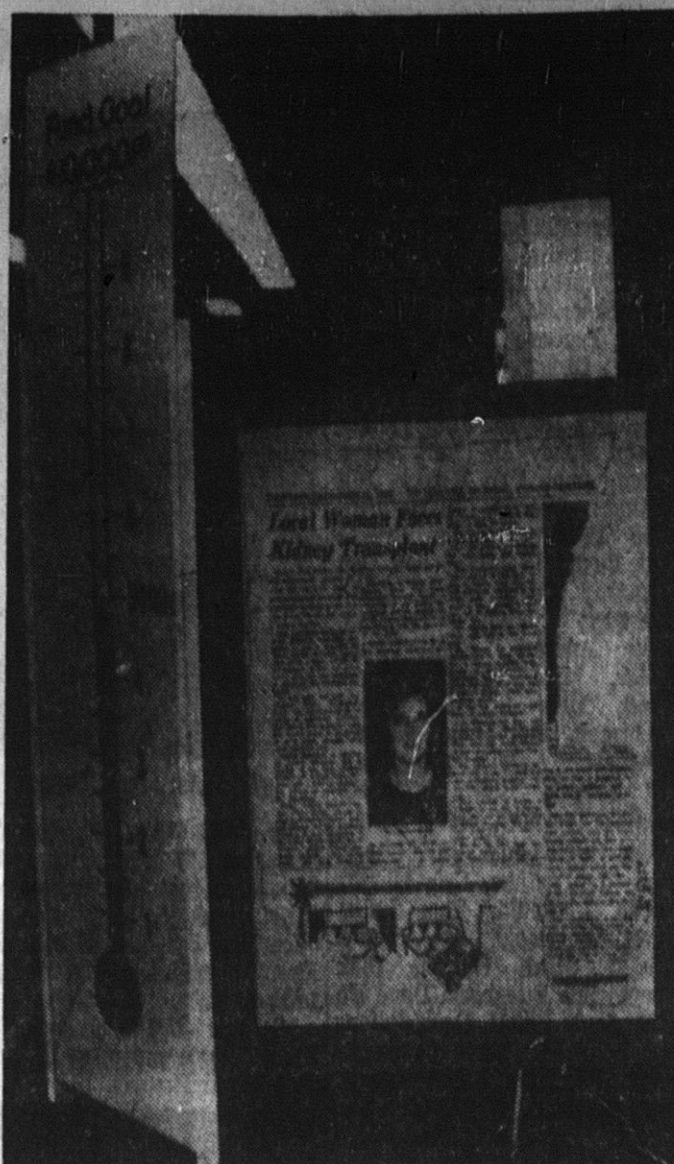
## \$100,000 Sought In Damage Suit

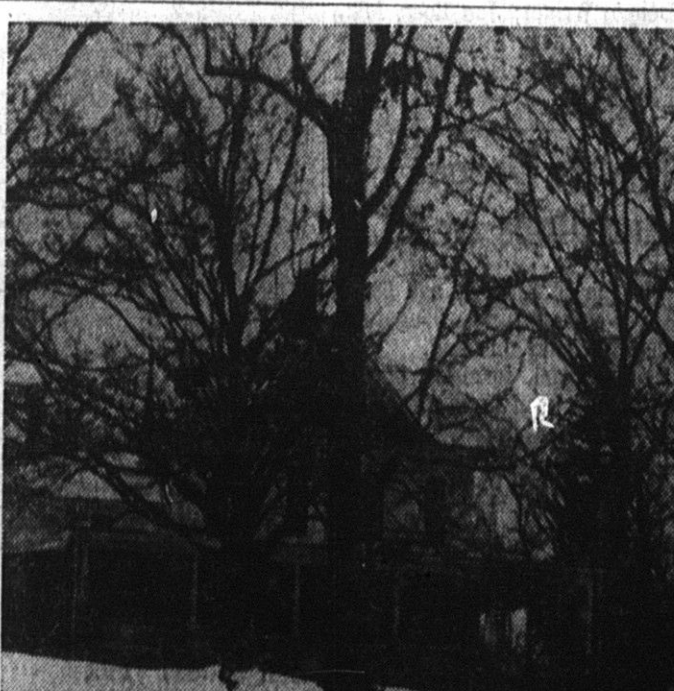

## World Tour Of Local Couple Shown in Films

Following a luncheon Tuesday noon, Woman's Literary Club members were taken on an around-the-world tour in a filmed travelogue narrated by Gerald Rocks of Holland who with Mrs. Rocks had taken the 30,000-mile trip in July and August, 1964, with a group headed by Dr. John Piet of Western Theological Seminary.

Although the tour had included Japan, Hong Kong, Manila, Indonesia, Ceylon, India, Pakistan, the Arab countries, Holy Land, Greece and Ireland, the Rocks films started with Ceylon and dwelt mainly with experiences in the Holy Land.

Rocks noted that children all over the world seem happy. "It takes time to learn how to hate, and the future lies with today's young people," he said.

His films showed the Old Dutch Church in Ceylon, Dr. Ida Scudder's hospital in Vellore, the De Valois Chapel, the aftermath of a mongoose-cobra fight in New Delhi (it lasted only 50 seconds and the camera wasn't ready), the beautiful Taj Mahal, Dr. Gerald Nykerk's grave in Kuwait and the oil refiners in Bahrain.

The Holy Land sequence showed the Stations of the Cross in Jerusalem, the Mosque on the site of Solomon's Temple, the Mount of Olives, Bethlehem, the Jordan River, the Dead Sea scroll area, archeological diggings, Jacob's Well and other historical sites.

After the films, Rocks spoke briefly on new religions in Japan, one particularly of the old Buddhist school of thought but based on the love of Christ with strong leanings on the Mormon religious because of its emphasis on tithing. This particular religion, he said, has grown from a small number 20 years ago to 3½ million today. He also spoke of encroaching problems of missionaries, failure to get visas and troublesome tariffs on supplies.

Then he spoke of the troubled Middle East, an Arab world divided by jealousies and sharply resentful of Israel, the complex political problems and the influence of Communism and the West.

## Early Birds Hear Talk on Drug Abuse

Chamber of Commerce Early Birds received something of a jolt along with their monthly breakfast this morning when Detective Gene Geib of the Holland police department talked about drug abuse.

Geib's brief presentation, largely a question and answer period, followed a 30-minute film, "The Decision," described as an 18-year journey into Hell, the story of a pretty young girl, her experiments with marijuana and her eventual entrapment in heroin.

As for drug prevalence in Holland, Geib said the first arrest in Holland city was made four years ago in what was regarded as an isolated case. Two years later there were four arrests and last year 14 arrests. The increase last year is all the more alarming, Geib said, because six arrests involved heroin, marking a transition from almost unknown marijuana traffic to the worst drug available today.

Geib said Holland police are making every attempt to keep up with educational programs, and are training officers in drug detection. Geib attended a drug school last spring in Washington, D.C., and other officers have been attending various seminars.

He was hopeful that only a small minority is behind the fight to legalize the use of marijuana, but said something must be done to improve the attitude of teenagers. He blamed much of the interest in the legalization program to publicity on controversial LSD, particularly the magazine stories filled with half truths and statements not based on facts.

A cigar box of processed marijuana was passed around the crowd. Also on display was a case containing samples of heroin and marijuana, and such dangerous drugs as barbiturates, amphetamines and hallucinagens. Clayton Ter Haar presided.

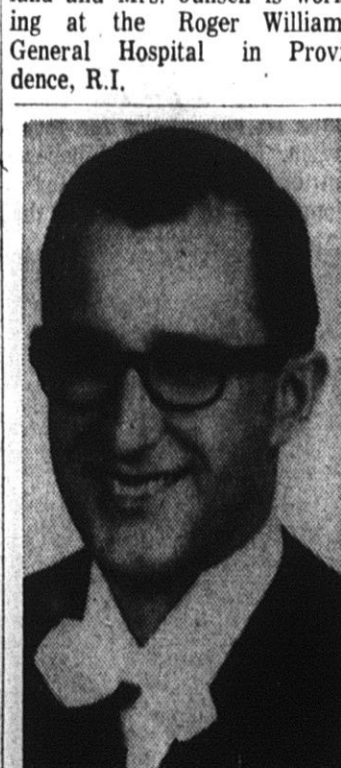

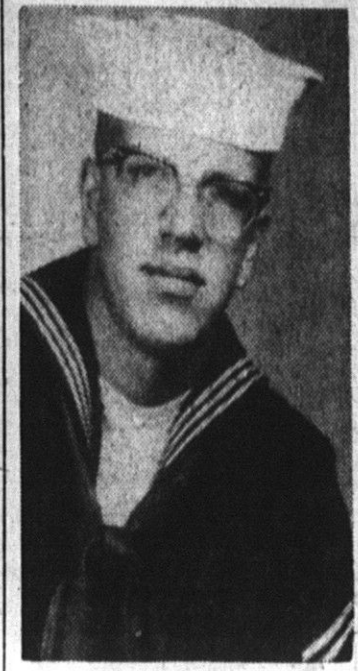

## December Snow Hits 35 Inches

Snowfall in Holland in December totaled 35.25 inches, a review of weather statistics by Weather Observer Lynn P. Wheaton revealed today.

Temperatures also had a wide range, listing a minimum of one above zero Dec. 15 and a high of 51 Dec. 12.

The average temperature was 26.6 degrees, a decrease of 2.8 was 33.5 degrees and the average degrees from the December norm. The average maximum was 33.5 degrees and the average minimum 20.1 degrees.

Precipitation totaled 3.41 inches, or 1.08 inches above normal. Precipitation fell on 21 days. Greatest precipitation in a 24-hour period was .57 inch on Dec. 1 and the greatest snowfall in a 24-hour period was 9.5 inches Dec. 7. Greatest snow depth was 11 inches on Dec. 8.

December had more than its share of strong winds and blizzard conditions.

## Intensive Care Unit Goes Into Operation

Holland Hospital's new intensive care unit went into operation in the hospital's new addition Monday.

Located on the first floor just above the emergency department, the intensive care unit is designed, equipped and staffed to provide round-the-clock care for persons critically ill. By concentrating skilled personnel and equipment in one area, a higher quality of nursing and medical care can be offered patients.

The intensive care unit also serves as a recovery room when the regular recovery room is closed. The recovery room operates from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

The intensive care unit is arranged so that patients can be observed at all times by nurses. The unit is fully air conditioned and the air is humidified and filtered to maintain special conditions for such patients. The unit is designed for eight patients, each to have his own monitor for cardiograms. A master screen at the nurse's station keeps nurses

informed of the patients' heartbeats.

Among the special equipment for the unit is what nurses call a shock chart equipped with a defibrillator and pacemaker for heart patients, plus a stock of emergency drugs.

Acutely ill patients should not have too many visitors, and for this reason, only adult members of the immediate family and clergy may visit a patient in this unit. Only one visitor is permitted for a five-minute period each hour on the half hour. Visitors may wait in the patient lounge adjacent to the intensive care unit between visits.

Since space also is limited, relatives are asked to take all belongings home at the time a patient is admitted to the unit, with the exception of personal care items such as comb, toothbrush.

The hospital requests that no flowers be ordered until the patient is transferred to regular hospital accommodations. Should flowers be delivered, they will be held in the business office to be picked up by

a member of the family. No smoking is allowed in the unit. Nor will there be any telephones, radios or television sets.

Daily service charge for intensive care is \$25 per eight-hour shift — cheaper than hiring special nurses around the clock, administrators pointed out. Oxygen, drugs and intravenous fluids are charged on a use basis. Most insurance policies provide coverage for a major portion of such charges. There is no extra charge for recovery room patients.

Information about patients in the intensive care unit is given only to members of the immediate family. If there are a number of family members, the family is asked to arrange for only one member to call.

Shirley Nivison of the nursing staff is head nurse of the intensive care unit. Two nurses are assigned each eight hours. In case there are no patients, nurses are assigned elsewhere. Some 15 nurses have received special instruction on intensive care unit procedures.

## Talk on Participation Given for Century Club

Members and guests of the Century Club braved the storm Monday evening to hear John Fenlon Donnelly, president of Donnelly Mirrors Inc., speak on the subject of Participative Management at a dinner meeting at Holiday Inn.

In introducing his subject Mr. Donnelly said participative management is the key to survival of Western Civilization. In trying to find a common denominator to our troubled times, "lack of involvement" seems to be responsible for the withdrawal of young people. The great challenge is how to involve them and still have a degree of order.

More and more projects are showing some types of experimental participation by work force relationship to management, he said.

Mr. Donnelly projected charts on two theories, the McGregor Theory and the Likert Theory.

The McGregor Theory on management by participation suggests that man is underutilized in industry, that ingenuity is widely distributed in the work force and should have an opportunity for recognition. McGregor also believes an employee is self-directed if committed to his job and that

there is a direct relationship between commitment and reward.

The Likert Theory is based on studies of what makes one company better than another or one department better than another. Solutions to problems are worked out by group task forces and management meeting in consultation, where a decision is virtually forged. The findings of the Likert studies have proven that productive enterprise is participative enterprise, Mr. Donnelly said.

In summation, Mr. Donnelly said "Management by participation is a way of organizing people so that each person can bring his full competence to bear, where practicable, on problem solving, decision making, goal setting and productive processes of the organization."

During a question period, it was generally conceded that the professions and education could profit by the application of these theories.

**EAST LANSING** — For three quarters of the game Friday night it appeared as if Holland Christian's basketball team might pull off a big win over the East Lansing Trojans on their own floor. However, the Trojans took a 57-50 lead at the six minute mark of the final quarter and led the remainder of the way to win, 73-64.

After East Lansing scored the opening basket, the Maroons countered on buckets by Art Tuls and Dan Brower, and were never again headed until substitute guard Mark Grua connected for the Trojans with 22 seconds left in the third quarter, giving East Lansing a 51-49 lead.

Christian played its best ball of the season in the first half, moving the ball well, and hitting an outstanding 56 per cent of their shots, connecting on 11 of 18 attempts in the first quarter and seven of 14 in the second period.

## Fires Took Huge Toll During Year

The burning death of a rural Fennville woman in a three-car auto accident and a \$3 1/2 million fire which gutted Home Furnace Company, 280 East Sixth St., made 1968 one of the worst years for fires in recent Holland history, according to Holland Fire Chief Dick Brandt.

Mrs. Florence Mears, 46, of route 3, Fennville, was burned to death when the car in which she was riding ignited in a collision at 16th St. and the US-31 bypass Jan. 20. The office and storage area of the furnace company, a division of Lear Siegler Inc., were razed in a fire believed started by two young boys June 15. Another fire March 6 raged through the Kroger Company store, 182 West 31st St., and caused an estimated \$100,000 damage.

The total fire loss for the year listed in Chief Brandt's annual report was \$3,186,705. There was a total of 216 fires in the city during the year and 22 false alarms.

There were 32 auto fires, 62 fires in dwellings, two in house trailers, 11 school fires, 43 grass fires and 66 miscellaneous blazes, Brandt reported.

GRAND HAVEN—One of the 21 members of the new Ottawa County Board of Supervisors, 19 attended the first meeting of the board Friday at the county building and elected William Kennedy of Allendale township as permanent chairman. He was nominated by Raymond Lamb of Holland township.

Elected vice chairman was Franklin Schmidt of Coopersville, a member of the old board of 38 members that was replaced by the new board Jan. 1. Kennedy won out over former Mayor Robert Visscher of Holland. Supervisor Lawrence Wade was nominated from the floor for chairman but withdrew because of business reasons.

Kennedy was a member of the old board from 1953 to 1963 and served on many important committees, including the improvement committee, that planned the new jail and county building. He represents district 7 on the board, Allendale and Tallmadge townships and is now a member of the Grand River watershed council.

Schmidt represents district 5 on the board, Coopersville city and Polkton township and part of Crockery. He had served on the former board two years. He was elected over Raymond Vander Laan of Hudsonville.

The two members who were absent from Friday's meeting were W. F. Winstrom of Park township, who is in Florida and Clarence Broman of Spring Lake, who submitted a letter of resignation because of ill health.

The resignation was accepted and the board voted to postpone the appointment of a replacement until the first regular meeting of the group at 1:30 p.m. Jan. 13. The announcement of Broman's resignation was made Thursday night and three applicants asked that they be considered for the vacancy. As others may wish to be considered, the board decided to delay the appointment. Prosecutor James W. Bussard said the vacancy must be filled in 30 days.

Claude Olthoff, Spring Lake, who was defeated by Broman at the primary election for the Republican nomination for supervisor, A. J. Meusen, a retired Muskegon businessman, and Village Manager William R. Robinson of Spring Lake applied for the position.

Three special committees were named by the new chairman, Ray Lamb of Holland township was named chairman and J. Nyhof Poel and Visscher were named members of an auditing committee that will approve county bills.

A temporary committee, to study the committee structure of the new board, was named and will report at the January session. The group will also recommend the schedule of meetings. Karl Ball of Spring Lake is chairman, and Peter De Kock, Zeeland, Alvin Geerlings of Holland, Harris Schipper, Zeeland and Jamestown township, and Marvin De Witt of the Port Sheldon, Olive and Blendon districts are members.

Another special temporary committee to study salaries for board members was named with Schmidt as chairman, assisted by Lawrence Vredevoogd of Georgetown, Bert Schuitema of Holland township, Hubert Henry of Wright and Thomas De Pree of Holland.

The members were sworn in by Judge Chester A. Ray at the start of the meeting and County Clerk Harris Nieusma conducted the meeting until Franklin Schmidt was elected temporary chairman. Nieusma announced Prosecutor Bussard will attend meetings of the board to advise them on problems and that Mrs. Vivian Nieusma, clerk of the former board, will continue as clerk of the new board.

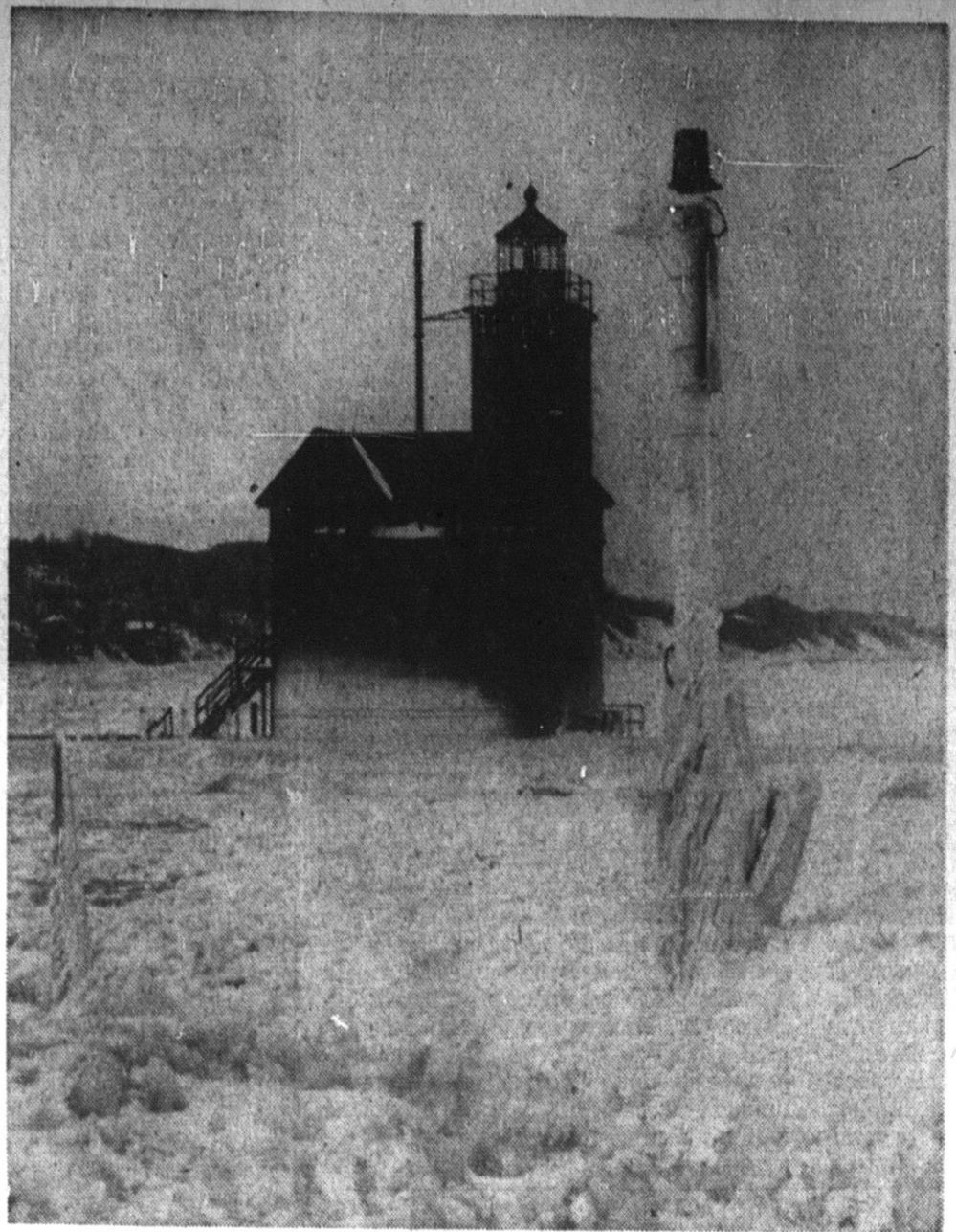

Sgt. Sanger called his mother, Mrs. Thomas Sanger, 58 West Ninth St., between planes in New York Friday night, saying he was one of five American servicemen headed from their station in Crete to Athens and then to the United States.

Sanger said he was not aware a shot had been fired until after the hijacked DC 6 of Aristotle Onassis' Olympic Airways landed in Cairo.

The local man who is in the security division of the Air Force is headed for an Air Force field in Texas for a week's training before coming home next weekend for a 40-day furlough. He has been with the Air Force two years.

After the furlough, he will report to Alaska to be stationed on a small island in the Bering

The 30-year-old hijacker, George Flamurides, immediately requested political asylum in Cairo, but Greek authorities are seeking to extradite him. Cairo authorities are considering his plea. The plane carried 104 persons.
