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Brochure on Millage Issue Coming Soon

A brochure explaining the special 2.5 operating millage vote Feb. 18 for Holland district, prepared jointly by the Board of Education and the Committee on Educational Assistance, will be ready by the end of the week, the Board of Education was informed at its regular monthly meeting Monday night in Holland High School Library.

Vice President Harvey Buter, presiding in the absence of Bernard Arendshorst who is in New York City on business, said enough copies of the millage brochure will be available to provide every home in the district. The millage election is scheduled Feb. 18 coinciding with the spring primaries of the city.

The school system has been on an austerity program the current year after a 2.9 millage issue was defeated last May. The 2.5 mills on equalized valuation amounts to \$4.57 per \$1,000 on assessed valuation. The issue defeated last May had called for \$5.31 per \$1,000 assessed valuation.

On recommendation of Supt. Walter W. Scott, the board approved a request of Holland High School Principal Jay Formis to close the first semester Jan. 25 instead of Jan. 18. This extension was requested mainly because of the four days of enforced vacation during December snowstorms. A survey revealed the extension would not conflict with junior high or elementary schedules.

The January superintendent's bulletin gave a complete outline of all renovations for Junior High School now fully completed with the exception of the language library. Renovation of Junior High including both east and west buildings and the annex was covered in the bond issue which also built the new high school.

Among changes in the annex were accommodations for the superintendent and the administrative staff, all on the second floor. The telephone number has been changed to 394-8331 serving the superintendent's office, the business office and the special education department. The latter three offices previously had been in Thomas Jefferson School. The new mailing address of the school administrative office is 61 West 16th St.

Meanwhile, the old administrative offices at 340 Pine Ave. will be offered for sale by bids in a few weeks, the structure again reverting to use as a residence. The Bontekoe store on 15th St. also will be vacated in about a month after new places are located for stored records. Since this building is infested with termites, it will be razed.

The bulletin also called attention to occupying the new addition at Lakeview School. Open house is planned at the January PTA meeting Jan. 29.

Announcement also was made that Gladys Wiskamp and Ruby Calvert of the high school faculty have been appointed as travel representatives for the National Education Association for Holland and other communities in Western Michigan. The two local teachers will help inform teachers of the educational travel projects and seminars offered through the cooperation of the two education associations, the NEA and MEA.

A report of the finance committee and schools committee clarified certain questions regarding Maplewood's scheduled election Feb. 18 on a \$288,000 bond issue for a new elementary school building and voting 6 mills for one year to finance school operations and reduce present debts.

These proposals are preliminary to seeking annexation to Holland school district, and are similar to procedures taken by both Lakeview and Van Raalte districts which passed bond issues before seeking annexation to the local district. Lakeview already has annexed and Van Raalte district is in the process of annexation. Apple Avenue and Montello Park districts annexed to Holland district some years ago.

The board also accepted a resolution passed by Harrington Board of Education that the local district accept eighth graders and possibly seventh graders for the 63-64 school year only with acceptance in subsequent years dependent upon negotiations with the Harrington Board seeking full and complete annexation of the school district.

On recommendation of the superintendent, the board granted a graduation equivalency certificate to David Lee Bronson who some years ago entered military service before completing high school, and became a dental technician and took other training in the United States Armed Forces Institute. He attended Junior College in Grand Rapids for a year and is graduating from Hope College next June with a 3.1 average. He sought a high school diploma after being advised by the University of Michigan School of Medicine that his entrance to that school would be facilitated by a high school diploma.

The board also clarified an agreement with Holland Jaycees to

sponsor the klompen dancers during the year 1963. This involves \$300 for instruction and \$100 to the home economics teacher for supervising costumes.

Supt. Scott also acknowledged publicly the unselfish service and assistance of several qualified teachers and a large number of volunteers since the opening of school in September in providing certain services on elementary levels which had been eliminated in the austerity program. These services provided teaching art, music, physical education as well as operating school libraries, aiding in clerical work and in one school operating a hot lunch program.

The personnel committee reported on a request from the executive committee of MEA for the board to adopt a policy to issue teachers' contracts on or before March 15 for the following year of work, and that any teacher under contract may assume if no written communication to the contrary is received by the board by March 15 that he or she will be under contract the following year.

The board approved the committee's recommendation that by spring vacation the board will either issue each teacher a contract for the following year or a statement notifying the teacher of his or her release because of inadequate service.

January bills were estimated at \$143,981.61 including \$103,500 for teachers salaries.

All members were present except Bernard Arendshorst and Wendell Miles. Invocation was given by Ted Boeve. The meeting lasted an hour and 45 minutes.

Allegan Picks Dog Warden

ALLEGAN — George Wolters, Ferndale, will be Allegan county's new dog warden and the county dog pound will be located at his farm in Ganges Township.

Appointment of Wolters was announced here Tuesday by Francis Cronen, Otsego; Bernard Miller, Monterey, and Grover Grigsby of Trowbridge, members of the board of supervisors special dog committee.

Wolters will be responsible directly to the committee under a new arrangement approved by the board at its October session.

The county dog warden formerly was employed by and responsible to the sheriff.

The board took no action on an offer from the Allegan County Society for the Prevention of Cruelty which offered use of its animal shelter, just west of Otsego, as a county dog pound. A letter indicated that the society is no longer financially able to operate the shelter which soon will be closed.

Supervisors Tuesday approved a \$2 impounding fee, plus \$1 a day for each dog. State law requires that each dog impounded must be kept 72 hours before it is destroyed.

The post of county dog warden pays \$3,120 a year, with the county providing a pickup truck and other necessary equipment.

Also on Tuesday the board approved transfer of \$90,000 to cover direct relief and hospitalization costs of the social welfare department for the first quarter of the year, but vetoed a request that the balance of the \$250,000 appropriated for 1963 be transferred quarterly on an automatic basis.

Sheriff Robert Whitcomb's requests for authorization to buy handcuffs, snow tires and a patrol car warning light were approved by the board.

Couple Injured When Car Rams Into Tree

GRAND HAVEN — A man and his wife were seriously injured when their pickup truck went out of control at 7:16 p.m. Monday at 130th Ave. and M-104 in Crocker township and struck a tree.

The driver, George F. Lambert, 58, of 13335 Green St., Grand Haven, fell against the steering wheel and his head went through the windshield. His wife, Rachel, 67, was thrown through the windshield. Both were taken to Grand Haven Municipal Hospital by a passing motorist. Lambert received several broken ribs and internal injuries and his wife broken ribs and severe facial lacerations. Sheriff's deputies said the truck traveled 143 feet off the roadway before hitting a tree. Deputies said Lambert would be charged with excessive speed for conditions.

On Van Meer Public Vote No Action

GRAND HAVEN — No action on setting an election to incorporate the city of Van Meer in Holland Township was taken by the Ottawa County Board of Supervisors Tuesday afternoon because of pending litigation in Circuit Court. The suit questions the validity of the Van Meer petitions on several points.

Likewise, no action was taken on a Zealand city annexation issue involving an area known as the "south end" lying in Holland Township. This area also is included in the Van Meer proposal.

Action was taken on one request. The board set April 1 as date for a special election on the incorporation of the village of Ferrysburg in Spring Lake as a 5th class city after Prosecutor James W. Bussard ruled the petitions were valid. This decision ended a long legal hassle in which owners of the Holiday Hills development near Ferrysburg claimed the incorporation petitions were not valid. This section had requested annexation to Grand Haven city.

The Ferrysburg incorporation issue also will include selection of nine members to a charter commission for Ferrysburg.

The board approved the new sanitary code for the county as it was proposed by the health department Monday. Approval was given after the prosecutor ruled it was legal.

The board approved the transfer of \$125,000 to the improvement fund after Henry Slaughter, Tallmadge supervisor, chairman of the ways and means committee, announced fees returned to the county in 1962 amounted to \$104,248.72 and interest on the improvement fund totaled \$27,602.

Three veteran members announced they are not seeking reelection this year. They are John Hassold of Chester Township, a member for 29 years; Albert Walcott of Wright Township, a member for 14 years, and William Kennedy, Allegan Township, a member for 10 years. The latter plans to expand his farm operations.

Prosecutor Bussard told the board he was unable at this time to give an opinion on the county's purchase of U.S. government land for recreation purposes. Purchase of this land again will be proposed at the April session.

A request of Grand Haven School Supt. R. M. Van Volkinburg to form a county-wide Civil Defense Council was referred to the board's Civil Defense committee of which Kennedy is chairman. Van Volkinburg said Kent County has such a council and is attempting to delegate responsibilities in protecting school children and factory workers in case of a natural or man-made disaster. Van Volkinburg felt a county council could give some uniformity to all CD activities in the county. He said CD Director Hans Suzenaar favors such a council.

New Plat Approved By Council

City Council Wednesday night approved a new plat known as Legion Park addition No. 1 developed by Russel A. Michmershuizen off East Eighth St. some distance east of Calvary Reformed Church. City Manager Herb Holt pointed out that this is the first subdivision in the city in which complete improvements are put in by the developer, and Holt felt it was in the best interests of the city to share in the cost of improving the approach to the subdivision, on which abutting property is not under the control of the developer.

Council was mindful that it might be setting some sort of a precedent, but felt that fully serviced subdivisions certainly were to be encouraged, and would add materially to the city's tax base. Cost for paving the approach and reimbursement to Michmershuizen for some of the improvements will amount to some \$3,800 when work is completed. It is expected the subdivision will yield some \$6,000 a year in taxes.

Included in the documents submitted with the plat was a copy and contract with West Shore Construction Co. for grading and paving streets.

All details of the development had been carefully worked out with the Planning Commission. The approach to the plat is 66 feet wide and 208 feet long is being given to the city for road purposes. It is this part of the paving that the city will assume the cost. The new street will be known as Orlando Ave.

Council also accepted a quit claim deed from William and Harriet Boersma for a 33-foot strip of property representing the south half of 31st St. for a distance of 122 feet west of Ottawa Ave. It was indicated the Board of Appeals granted permission to Mr. Boersma to divide a parcel of land on the northwest corner of 32nd St. and Ottawa Ave. into four lots provided the property could not be subdivided until a deed was presented to the city for the south half of 31st St. as it abuts the property in question.

Council okayed three recommendations from the Traffic and Safety Commission. These called for eliminating parking on the north side of 27th St. between Van Raalte and Harrison and on the north side of Eighth St. Between Hope and Dartmouth Ave., and placing a yield sign on Crescent Dr., at 16th St.

A resolution from the Traffic and Safety Commission suggesting that the Board of Public Works, Planning Commission, Traffic and Safety Commission, Chamber of Commerce and others join in a study that would lead to lighting improvements comparable to the excellent Eighth St. project already completed, was discussed at some length. It was pointed out that considerable progress already has been made in such a study.

Among places the resolution listed were Eighth St. and/or Chicago Dr. from Columbia Ave. to the US-31 bypass (in cooperation with township and county officials); Michigan Ave. from 28th St. south to US-31, and River Ave. from Eighth St. to the Black River bridge. Washington Square previously had been mentioned, it was pointed out.

A petition from Seymour and Stuart Padnos requesting that Fifth St. between River and Pine Ave. be vacated subject to easements for utility purposes was referred to the Planning Commission for study and report.

A claim from Roger Koning, 556 West 29th St., was referred to the insurance carrier and city attorney.

The Hospital Board reported the following gifts: stirrups for delivery table valued at \$128, and a crib for pediatrics department valued at \$188.25 from the Abraham Leenhouts guild; a used examining table, stand and stool and two arm chairs from Dr. John K. Men Students Must Live on Hope Campus

All Hope College men students who do not live in Holland or do not commute from nearby communities will live in college dormitories next fall, according to a recent ruling of the college's Board of Trustees announced today by Dr. James Harvey, Dean of Students.

With the opening of five dormitory units for men this fall, plus the 300-man Kollen Hall and the present fraternity houses, the college will have accommodations for 600 men beginning this fall.

This means that for the first time, the college will have adequate accommodations for its male students. Up to now men have been permitted to live in apartments and rooming houses off campus.

Dr. Harvey also announced that each of Hope's five social fraternities will live in a unit of the new dormitory complex when it opens this fall. The present fraternity houses which are owned by the college, may be used for additional men's housing this fall.

A majority vote of the voters of Van Raalte district is required to make the annexation effective.

\$2.8 Million Construction In Townships

Building activity in Holland and Park townships totaled over \$2,800,000 during the year 1962, according to figures compiled by the two zoning administrators, John Van Wieren for Park Township and Raymond Van Den Brink for Holland Township.

Van Wieren reports 183 building permits for Park Township for a total of \$1,365,495.

Van Den Brink reports 223 permits for Holland Township for a total of \$1,446,040.

Construction in Holland city for the same period totaled \$4,605,355. Park township listed 81 new homes for a total of \$1,029,900; 38 garages, \$38,450; 55 repairs and additions, \$76,295; one church, \$189,000; four pools, \$16,800; one public building, \$5,500; 3 farm buildings, \$9,550; total, \$1,365,495.

Holland township listed 65 new houses, \$756,500; one amusement and recreational building, \$80,000; 3 stores, offices, etc., \$159,500; 1 industrial building, \$87,500; 42 garages and carports, \$44,310; 17 non residential structures, \$31,810; 5 service stations and repair garages, \$54,514; one church, \$35,000; 60 alterations and additions to houses, \$83,506; 26 alterations and additions to buildings other than houses, \$113,400; total, \$1,446,040.

Professor Clarence Kleis, chairman of the Physics Department at Hope College for the past 40 years, has requested to be relieved of his responsibilities as chairman of the department effective June 3, 1963, according to an announcement made today by Dr. Irwin J. Lubbers, president.

Lubbers also announced the appointment of Dr. Harry Frissel, professor of physics at Hope since 1948, as Kleis' successor to the chairmanship.

At the end of this school year Mr. Kleis will have completed 50 years of study and teaching on the Hope campus. He spent four years in prep school, four in college, two years as a teacher in the prep school, and 40 years as chairman of the physics department.

"In four decades of faithful ser-

vice to the college," said Lubbers, "Mr. Kleis has contributed immeasurably to the growth of the science program at Hope. We are grateful that he will be remaining as a professor of physics and will be on hand to assist Dr. Frissel in planning the physics program.

Dr. Frissel received his B. A. degree from Hope and his M.S. and Ph. D. degrees from Iowa State College. Prior to joining the Hope staff in 1948 he worked five years as a research physicist at Cornell Aeronautical Laboratory in Buffalo, N.Y.

Both Mr. Kleis and Dr. Frissel have worked closely with architects in planning the new Physics-Mathematics building which is scheduled for construction later this spring.

Willard C. Wichers of the Netherlands Information Bureau has just received a letter which took 13 years for delivery. And the request in it is as valid today as it was in 1949.

It was on Jan. 16, 1949, that Anthony P. Vogelpeel wrote Wichers from Batavia, Dutch East Indies, (now Jakarta, Indonesia) seeking information on Vogelpeels in America in connection with some genealogical research. The air mail envelope was addressed correctly to Willard Wichers of the Netherlands Information Service, but he neglected to add "Holland" before he wrote Michigan.

The letter was addressed in Dutch script and, unfortunately, contained insufficient postage. Nevertheless, it kicked around a long time, and the envelope bore many initials, rubber stamps and other notations.

Finally, it was returned to Vogelpeel's address in the Netherlands, but by that time he had immigrated to Randolph, Mass., and it ended up with a cultural society for immigrants in the Netherlands which traced Vogelpeel to America and also got in touch with Wichers here.

Vogelpeel is still working on his genealogy and still would appreciate any information on Vogelpeels in America.

After checking files in Netherlands Museum, Wichers said he knows of Vogelpeels and Vogelzangs, but no Vogelpeels. Anybody having such information is asked to get in touch with the Netherlands Information Service in City Hall, Holland, Mich.

Albion Falls, 60-57; 6th Win of Season

ALBION—Hope College's basketball team remained unbeaten in MIAA action here Saturday night as the Flying Dutchmen chalked up a 60-57 win over Albion for their fourth straight league win.

The fired-up Britons gave the Dutchmen all kinds of trouble and for the second straight MIAA game Hope had to come from behind in the closing minutes to insure the win.

Last Saturday night at Alma, the Scots led until late in the game when the Dutchmen responded with a rally and took a seven-point win.

Against the Britons, Hope never was more than eight points behind and caught Albion with about 2½ minutes to go, 51-51 and never again trailed. Hope was 16 points down against the Scots.

Albion had its eight-point lead with about three minutes gone in the second half after lead, 31-26 at half. In the early minutes of the game Hope had held slim leads and dropped behind, 17 - 15 and Albion led the rest of the half.

Jim Vander Hill, who led Hope with 23 points, sparked the second half drive with 16 points including a drive-in shot that gave Hope its final basket.

But when the Dutchmen pulled within two of the Britons, Coach Russ De Vette had a second unit in the game consisting of freshmen Bill Potter and Clare Van Wieren, sophomore Dean Overman and junior Art Kramer along with regular Glenn Van Wieren.

Gary Nederveld was reinserted into the lineup and scored two free throws to knot the score, 51-51 and Overman added a field goal. Nederveld then scored his only field goals of the game as Hope pushed to a six-point lead.

Vander Hill sat out part of the second half with four fouls. "Spider" sank 11 baskets in the game and his shooting was the best since the Olivet game when he tallied 31 points.

Nederveld did a good job of rebounding for the winners in the first half but the Dutchmen again had trouble with several missed passes. Hope also committed 20 fouls, the most made in a game this season. But Albion was charged 23 times.

Hope sank 14 out of 28 free shots and the losers made 17 of 22. Emil De Grazia led the Britons with eight free throws, including five in the second half.

De Grazia scored 18 points and his five baskets were jump shots from around the foul circle. He hit five baskets in the first half but didn't score a field goal in the final 20 minutes.

Jerry Chandler, Albion's leading scorer, finished second with 17. The loss was Albion's first in five games and gives the Britons a 4-8 record and 2-3 in the MIAA.

Glenn Van Wieren tallied 13 and was the only other Hope player in double figures. The victory was Hope's sixth in 10 starts.

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"LET'S DO WHAT WE CAN - ROMNEY"

Someone once said that the fine art of politics was compromise. Gov. Romney said the same thing in his state-of-the-state message. He called for an end to that kind of legislative course which opposes the possible while crying vainly and loudly for the impossible.

The governor sought to break the inertia which has been descriptive of past legislative sessions. He called for swift and decisive action on these matters that must and can be carried out. On the other hand, he insisted that Michigan put its finances in order and keep them that way. He said this was necessary to maintain a climate in which industry could expand and grow.

One ought not to overlook in the Governor's message his recognition that there should be certain legislation in the domain of public welfare. He called for a new look at the Michigan workmen's compensation program, for future amendments which would give Michigan more participation under the Kerr-Mills program, including an amendment to remove claims of the state against the estates of persons who have received aid, for consideration of legislation providing a reasonable exemption of property tax for citizens over 65, and immediate legislation to qualify Michigan for federal funds available for aid to dependent children of unemployed parents.

The governor was direct in noting that some of these proposals could not be carried out at this time. However he was of the opinion that Michigan should put its financial house in order so that these programs could be carried out.

The Governor's address was notable for its direction and goals. Michigan needs both. And it needs leadership in the legislative branch to help further these goals.

Woltman Runs For Council

Leslie N. Woltman, of 1194 Lakeview Dr., announced Wednesday he was a candidate for 4th ward Councilman in the Feb. 18 city primaries.

So far, he is the first to seek the 4th ward post. Incumbent John Beltman announced last week he would not seek reelection. Woltman indicated he would withdraw if Beltman would reconsider.

A life-long resident of Holland, Woltman is manager of the North River Ave. office equipment branch of Fris store. He has been with the Fris company for 12 years. He is president of the American Legion Band.

So far, Mayor Nelson Bosman is the only candidate to file petitions for reelection. There are three candidates for councilman-at-large, Ernest Phillips, Cornelius Huizenga and John Van Eerden. A dog killed and injured 135 turkeys worth a total of \$2,430 Monday evening at the Bill's and Marv's Turkey Farm on 96th Ave., route 1, Zealand, according to the Ottawa County Sheriff's deputies. Marv De Witt, route 1, told deputies he checked the turkeys at the pens on Polk St. and 96th Ave. at noon on Monday and returned at 4 p.m. for another check. De Witt said he found a large collie dog in the coop with the turkeys.

When he returned with a gun the dog was gone leaving the 135 birds, averaging 35 pounds apiece, killed and injured. De Witt said the birds were breeder toms that he was keeping in a separate coop. The marauding dog was not found.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, January 20
Resistance to the Work of Christ
Mark 2:3-7, 15-17; 3:1-6
By C. P. Dame

Our lesson text is composed of three interesting stories. All three tell about the concern of Jesus for needy people. Jesus does not change and hence we know that He is also concerned about people who are in need today. And there are many.

1. People with faith please Jesus. After making a tour of Galilee, Jesus returned to Capernaum. It was soon noised about that He was at a home, perhaps the home of Simon. A great crowd came so that the house was full and the doorway blocked.

When four men carrying a paralytic came to the house and tried to get in they were not able to do so. They did not turn around and go home. Some people gave up easily but not these men. They climbed on the roof and removed some tile from it and let their friend down on his bed, right in front of Jesus as He was teaching. These four men were determined to bring their friend to Jesus and succeeded.

Every congregation needs members who have the spirit and faith of these four.

"When Jesus saw their faith"—whose faith? That of the five—they all had faith. We do not know the names of these men, nor their social position, or their degree of education, but we are told about their faith.

The first thing Jesus said to the paralytic was, "Son, thy sins be forgiven thee." We have no right to assume that this man was a paralytic because of a sinful past.

Jesus knew what troubled this man. In the house there were some scribes and they took offense at the words of Jesus who knowing what they reasoned in their hearts healed the man of his paralysis and showed that He had supernatural power to heal the body and forgive sins.

II. Jesus calls and fellowships with the needy.

One day Jesus called a publican, named Matthew, as he was working in his office to follow Him and he obeyed. When he realized what Jesus had done for him he invited all his old friends, all tax collectors to a banquet, and meet Jesus and they came. The scribes and Pharisees saw Jesus eating with publicans and sinners and they objected to His disciples.

Jesus gave them a good answer: "They that are whole have no need of a physician, but they that are sick: I came not to call the righteous but sinners to repentance." The religious leaders shunned the wayward and the sinners but Jesus sought them. It is the mission of the church to seek sinners.

III. Jesus always tried to make people useful.

One Sabbath day Jesus healed a man with a withered hand in a synagogue. It may be that the critics planted the man there for they watched Jesus "whether He would heal him on the Sabbath day; that they might accuse Him." The attitude of the critics angered Jesus and the hardness of their hearts grieved Him. The Lord told the handicapped man to stretch forth his hand, which he did, and it was "restored whole as the other."

Tradition says this man was a bricklayer and thus Jesus made it possible for him to work again and support his family and be a useful member of society.

This healing on the Sabbath day, in a synagogue made the critics so angry that they took counsel with the Herodians to take Jesus. The Pharisees opposed Roman rule, the Herodians supported it, but the two joined forces in their common opposition to Jesus.

Religion as well as politics makes strange bedfellows. The concern of the Pharisees differed much from the concern of Jesus. What is the nature of our concern?

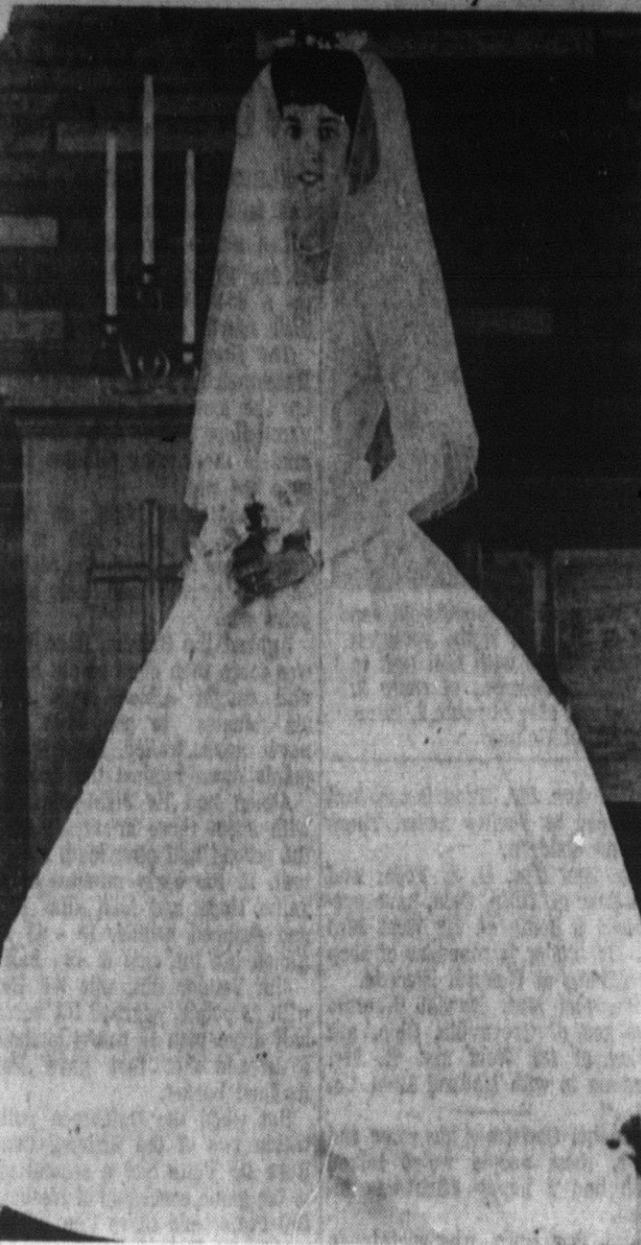
Spring Lake Man Succumbs at 69

Hope-Calvin Game Sidelights

Pleased with Hope College's basketball victory over Calvin College Tuesday night in the Civic Center, Coach Russ De Vette was quick to point out "that our ball handling left much to be desired."

"We threw the ball away on their zone press much more than we should have," De Vette said, and "we gave them the ball with our mistakes many times."

Hope used a man-to-man defense. "We played our defense too loose," De Vette said, "and gave them many outside shots and they were hitting."

Coach Barney Steen of Calvin said it was "the best game we have played this year." They played their hardest from the start to finish.

"We scored 89 points and that's usually good enough to win most games," Steen quipped, "but our defense gave us problems." Calvin was called 26 times for fouls.

Steen praised Hope's "poise and experience" and lauded Jim Vander Hill's shooting. This was Vander Hill's best scoring effort in seven Calvin games.

"Our freshmen Paul Tuls, Jim Fredricks and Jim Langeveld (all of Holland) are playing good ball for us," Steen added. "They are coming real well, are good students, and learning fast how to play varsity basketball in college."

The 99-89 score was the largest since 1952-53 when Hope won the game 100-90, for the highest combined score in the long series. Tuesday's score was the second highest combined score. The 1952-53 game is the only time in the long series that a team hit 100 points. Calvin hit 98 and 97 in 1960-61.

Hope now holds a 35-19 edge in the series and has won 11 of 19 games since Calvin joined the MIAA in 1953. Hope leads 20-14 since the series was resumed in 1942-43.

Ken Fletcher, 6'5" Kalamazoo sophomore, was called for his fourth foul with 5:29 left in the first half. On this particular foul, Steen and the Calvin bench felt the foul had been committed by another Calvin player. Fletcher fouled out with 7:24 left.

Six times in the first half Calvin fouled a Hope player under the Calvin basket and the players had to walk the length of the floor to shoot the free throw.

Hope out rebounded the Knights, 54-33. Hope players were credited with 24 in the first half to 16 for Calvin and 17 in the second half to nine for the Knights. Hope had 13 team rebounds and Calvin had eight.

Gary Nederveld and Vander Hill each grabbed four of Hope's 14 defensive rebounds in the first half. Calvin had nine defensive rebounds in the first half.

The 6'5" Nederveld got five defensive and three offensive in the second half and 6'4" Tom Vander Woude led Calvin with three defensive in the second half.

Vander Hill Scores 39; 5th MIAA Win

Rolling to its highest total of the season, behind J.L.A. Vander Hill's 39 points, Hope College's basketball team defeated a determined Calvin team, 99-89 Tuesday night in the Civic Center for its fifth MIAA victory before 2,300 fans.

The slender senior had his best night of the season as he made 16 baskets in 25 attempts, including jump shots, driving layups and off-balance push shots, and added seven straight free shots all in the first half. He made eight of 12 in the first half from the floor and eight of 13 in the last 20 minutes.

Vander Hill's shooting helped the Flying Dutchmen chalk up a 53 per cent shooting mark with 39 baskets in 75 attempts. But the Knights, who have won only one game in 10 starts this season, were a shade behind with 38 baskets in 74 tries for 51 per cent.

Several times in the game, especially in the first half, Hope lost the ball on poor passes and frequently they missed defensive assignments.

A pesky Calvin zone press gave the Dutchmen some trouble but Hope took the lead for good, 31-30 with 4:51 left in the first half. The Dutchmen never again

trailed and pushed the margin to 44-35 at half. Calvin never got any closer than eight points in the second half but the Hope offense "jerked" at times in the second half when passes went awry or were stolen.

Leading by eight, 59-51 with 15:15 left, Hope moved into high gear and for the next four minutes rattled the basket and with 11:45 remaining the score stood 72-55. The Dutchmen scored 33 points in 10 minutes and the 10-minute score was 77-42.

Hope kept 12 to 19-point leads for the next six minutes with the biggest margin, 83-64 with 8:17 left before the Knights again began to trim the score and slashed it to eight, 95-87 with 1:30 left and 10 at the end.

Vander Hill scored the initial basket after intercepting a Calvin pass and Glenn Van Wieren added a free shot. Then Calvin, led by Ken Fletcher's five points, took a 7-3 lead and led 21-18 at the 10-minute mark.

Scoring seven straight points on two baskets and three free throws, Vander Hill put Hope into a 25-21 lead with 7:25 left in the first half. The teams tied three times in the next three minutes before Hope took its lead for good, 31-30.

Gary Nederveld's free shot put Hope in the lead. Hope made 14 of 21 free shots in the first half and added seven of 11 in the second half for 21 of 33.

Hope's loose man-to-man defense didn't give the Knights many free throws and Calvin didn't get a bonus until 19 seconds remained in the first half. Calvin hit five of six free throws in the first half and made 13 of 19 in the game.

In the scoring outburst in the first 10 minutes of the second half, Vander Hill and Nederveld each had four baskets while Glenn and freshman Clare Van Wieren, each made three and Glenn added three charity tosses. Two of Glenn's baskets were tips.

In the second half, Hope hit 62 per cent with 24 of 39 while they had 15 of 36 in the first half. Calvin, led by Tom Vander Woude's eight baskets, sank 62 per cent in the second half on 23 of 37 after hitting 15 of 37 for 41 per cent in the first half. Sophomore Vander Woude led the losers with 25, 20 in the second half.

The win was Hope's seventh in 11 starts this season. The Flying Dutchmen entertain Adrian Saturday in the Civic Center in an MIAA game.

Snow Cuts Visibility To Minimum

Parking Restrictions Still in Effect; Drifts Close County Roads

Street crews fought a losing battle with Mother Nature Monday as gale-like winds whipped up a new four-inch snowfall into drifts three to four feet high in many roads in Holland area.

With visibility reduced to a bare minimum, it was only a matter of minutes before roads cleared in outlying areas became blocked again with drifts.

It was 9 degrees above zero at 11 a.m. Monday. Accompanied by a biting wind, the weather was such that only those who had to go outside went. Holland schools remained open and attendance was down only slightly.

But many other schools were closed, among them Sherbourne, Drenthe, North Holland, Waverly, West Olive, West Crisp, Robert, East Holland, Hamilton Schools, Allendale Christian, Coopersville public, Agnew, Perishing, High Point, Cherry Lane Nursery, South Olive, Fennville, St. Peter's in Douglas, Boreo public and Christian, Maple Grove, Huyser, Vriesland and Hawthorne.

Most West Ottawa schools were open, but school buses generally kept to primary roads. All rural schools in Grand Haven area were closed and attendance in some city schools was down 50 per cent. Elementary schools in Ferrysburg and Spring Lake also were closed.

Shifting winds during the night left both east-west and north-south roads clogged in many areas. In general, north-south roads seemed to be in worse condition this morning. In some areas, the big V-plows were unable to break through the drifts and the heavy grader was being pushed to the maximum, City Engineer Laverne Serne said.

He said there were several close calls with parked cars, and he asked motorists wherever possible not to park on roads, particularly in outlying areas.

Many cars were stalled in drifts on US-31 both north and south of Holland. Swirling whiteouts sent many cars into the snow banks, some of them in the median strip.

Holland Armory was open Sunday night for stranded motorists. A mother and her three children who were unable to get out to the Castle Park area took advantage of the offer. A former guardsman also put up at the Armory for the night after turning back some distance south of the city.

Rural mail carriers experienced some difficulty in mail deliveries Monday.

Drive On to Reduce Bad Checks in City

Police began issuing large placards to merchants today in a drive to cut down on the number of bad checks cashed in Holland places of business.

The placards, to be placed near cash stands, announce that people who expect to cash checks with the particular store must make proper and thorough identification which will be sent to the Holland police department.

Merchants themselves initiated the idea, police said, and the placards were made up from models which are recommended in FBI schools and seminars in Michigan.

Along with the placards the merchants are issued the identification blanks themselves. These blanks ask for name and address, physical characteristics, birth date, car model, license number, drivers license number, social security number, a signature, and a thumb print of the casher.

Police said that such information will protect the prospective check casher as well as the firm which cashes the check. Also the amount of detailed information asked for may discourage many from attempting to cash questionable checks, police said.

He was a veteran of World War II and was a member of the VFW. He was employed by Bastian Blessing Co.

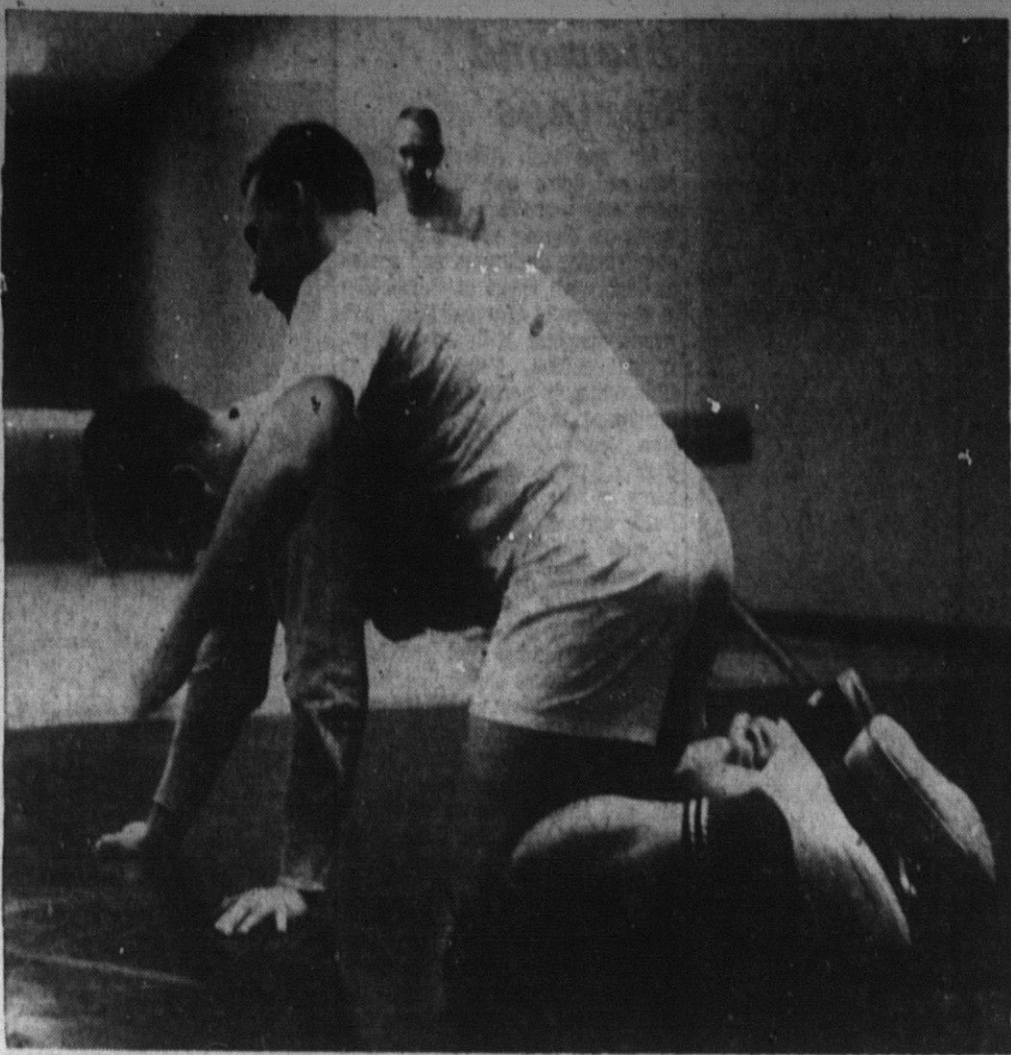

Law Enforcement Officers Attend Physical Training

Ottawa County Sheriff's deputies and police from Holland and Zeeland began participating in a physical conditioning program Monday at the West Ottawa High School Gym.

The program is sponsored by the Ottawa County Sheriff's department with the purpose of getting the participants into top physical condition and making it easier to stay that way. The program is built around exercises which are designed to improve the circulatory and respiratory system.

The program runs Monday and Wednesday nights from 7 to 9 p.m. for the next 10 weeks and participation, although quite heavy, is entirely voluntary. The men are put through the paces by West Ottawa gym instructors Doug Waldran and Henry Reest.

The program is set up around stations with the men breaking up into a number of groups and then rotating from station to station throughout the evening.

The stations include rope climbing, weight lifting, wrestling, running and swimming. The men can also jump rope, work out with basketballs, and participate in gym drills and relays supervised by the instructors.

Participation at each station requires the meeting of minimum standards which gradually spiral upwards as the schedule continues. Age differences are compensated for in the requirements and no man is asked to extend himself beyond what he feels to be his own personal physical capacity.

A vigorous 15 minutes of calisthenics start off every meeting followed by running up and down the steps which lead to the gym balconies, and more running on the gym floor.

After the first hour or so the men go into the swimming pool for an hour of swimming. Nearly one half of that time is devoted to meeting requirements in swimming distances back and forth across the pool width. The remaining time is given to free swimming and some terrific water polo contests.

Many of the officers and deputies have attested to the strenuousness of the program by citing aching muscles upon completion of the first two sessions, but the spirits are high and the men are going all out, according to one deputy. Instructors Reest and Waldran have commended the response of the men.

Some of the men are even undertaking a little "home work" by doing recommended calisthenics at their homes before breakfast in the mornings.

Each individual police department finances the costs of its own participants.

Saugatuck Store Suffers Fire, Loss

SAUGATUCK — A fire attributed to faulty wiring broke out Saturday in a back room of the grocery store section of Lee's Restaurant, four miles north of Saugatuck on US-31 doing \$7,000 damage to the building, Saugatuck fire officials said.

Firemen said they answered a call from Mrs. Lee Wenzel, wife of the owner of the restaurant at 7:45 a.m. Firemen had extinguished the flames by 9:30 a.m. after calling for an additional pumper from the Laketown township.

Mrs. Wenzel reported that she had come to the restaurant to open up when she saw smoke coming from the rear of the building and phoned firemen.

The store contents were believed damaged by smoke and heat beyond salvage, Saugatuck Fire Chief Bill Wilson said. Estimates of the size of the inventory could run between \$4,000 and \$5,000 he said.

The building and store were insured, Mrs. Wenzel said. Firemen reported only minor smoke damage to the restaurant section of the building.

Lee Wenzel, owner, was in Elkhart, Ind., when the fire occurred and is returning immediately, his wife said. Wenzel and his wife owned the restaurant in March, 1961 when the building was totally destroyed by a fire.

No one was injured in the blaze, firemen said.

Firemen Fight Home Blaze For Four Hours

An explosion from an oil burner furnace ignited flames Monday at 3 a.m. which gutted the seven-room home of Howard (Bing) Miller, of 384 Lakeshore Dr., leaving the house a burned out shell on the shore of Lake Michigan.

Firemen battled the blaze four hours in sub-freezing temperatures and against 30-40 m.p.h. winds before the intense heat and flames were subdued.

Fire Chief Jake De Feyter of Park Township Station No. 1, directed men from the two Park Township fire stations and described the fire as one of the worst he had experienced in which the building was not burned completely to the ground.

Miller and his wife Ella suffered very minor burns in the fire. The couple said they were alerted after being told by their milkman of smoke and Miller checked the attic where flames had shot up an unused chimney and ignited the wooden upper frame.

The couple phoned the fire department and began carrying out furniture until firemen arrived and the fire became too intense to stay in the building.

Inside the building the walls were scorched, the ceiling was gone in many places or was caving in with charred rafters. Smoke and water had damaged all the furniture and burned rubble covered the floor. The intense heat of the fire was demonstrated by the melted glass over the clocks scattered through the house.

Fire Chief De Feyter and Miller refused to estimate the damage to the home but Miller said the building was partially covered by insurance.

Two firemen suffered nausea from smoke and Chief De Feyter reported that when the men first reached the flaming house they were unable to enter even though wearing smoke masks.

Mr. and Mrs. Miller are staying with nearby neighbors, Miller said. He also said that he plans to rebuild his home.

Approximately 17 firemen fought the blaze and got it under control at 7 a.m.

Three Are Injured In Highway Crash

Three persons were injured, one seriously, in a two-car crash on icy M-40 about 2½ miles north of Hamilton Friday at 1:40 p.m.

The driver of one of the cars, Mrs. Dorothy Fredrickson, 44, of 230 West 11th St., Holland, was in fairly good condition Saturday at Holland Hospital with a fractured pelvis and multiple lacerations and abrasions.

The other driver, Thomas Kool, 23, of Grand Haven, and his passenger, Arlen Hartman, 20, of Muskegon, were discharged from the Hospital after treatment for cuts and bruises. Officials said Hartman, also received two broken teeth.

Allegan County Sheriff Bob Whitcomb, who investigated, said the two cars collided almost head-on. He said both drivers apparently had their visibility impaired by snow blown up by a snowplow working along the roads.

Whitcomb said both cars were total losses.

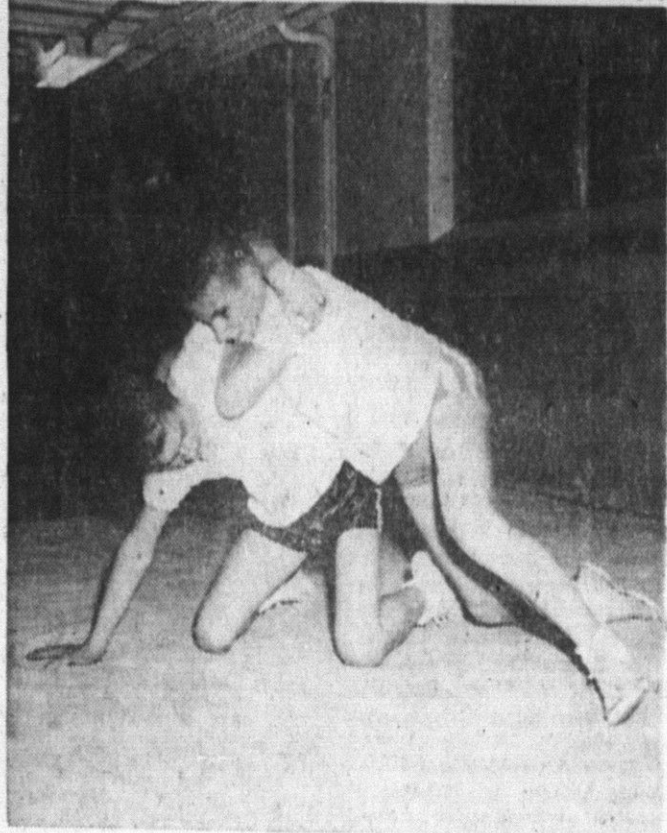

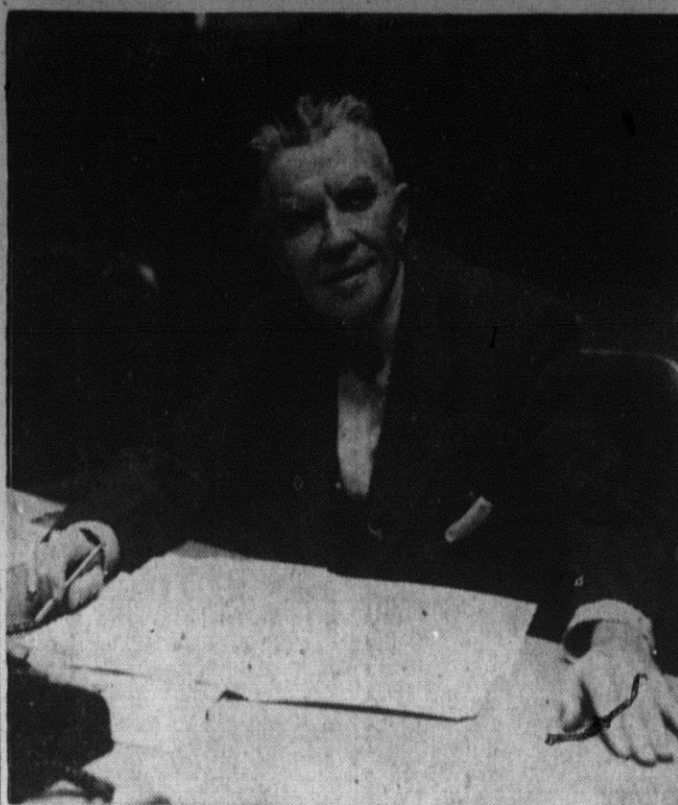

Snow Removal Is Expensive In Allegan

ALLEGAN — Snowfall totaling more than 80 inches has been recorded officially in Allegan county thus far this winter, but unpaid bills have been mounting even higher for the county road commission, according to Engineer-Manager Donald Rutekin.

Ratekin told members of the board of supervisors at a joint meeting here Wednesday that unpaid bills now total \$237,209.

He said snow removal costs for the last three weeks of December alone totaled \$63,351 as compared to \$149,779 for the previous eleven months of 1962. Cost of snow removal for the year thus exceeded \$213,130, nearly a fourth of the road commission's 1962 budget.

The current snow storm has dumped an additional 12 to 14 inches of snow on the county. Combined with high winds resulting in 6 to 7 foot drifts, the job of coping with the present storm has been nearly as costly as the heavier snowfall in December, according to Ratekin.

The commission made no formal request for financial aid from the county, but members agreed that the choice lay between minimum maintenance for the balance of the year or emergency financing from some source.

Ratekin admitted the commission has been snubbed under by complaints. He said much of the problem stemmed from the fact that former city residents—"who moved to the country to avoid higher municipal taxes"—expect the same snow removal service they got in the city.

"They expect us to have their roads plowed out by 6 a.m. every morning," he said. "We don't have the personnel to work night and day," he said, adding that it is "impractical to plow snow at night with our equipment."

Ratekin said approximately half of the commission's trucks were small and "virtually useless in this sort of weather." He said bulldozers and heavy motor graders must be used to open up many miles of roads in the county.

A huge, new plow has arrived for use on the county's heavy gravel loader, but he pointed out "this is only one piece of equipment and we have nearly 2,000 miles of primary and township roads to take care of."

Allegan May Vote Against Closing Law

ALLEGAN — Supervisors will vote Friday at 11 a.m. on a resolution which would exempt the county from the so-called "Sunday-closing law" enacted by the legislature last fall.

If the resolution is approved, Allegan county would become the first in the state to remove itself from the provisions of the statute. In fact, the new law is not yet in effect, since it is not scheduled to go on the books until 90 days after adjournment of the legislature.

At a public hearing on the proposed action here Wednesday, supervisors heard comments from ministers who favored the law and from at least one who felt "you can't legislate people into church." A druggist also spoke against the law.

Prosecuting Attorney E. L. Andrews told the board the law would be "impossible to enforce... it's ridiculous."

Actually, it was pointed out, the law would have little effect on Allegan county. Most small businesses are exempt anyway, according to Andrews. Larger stores could remain open seven days a week, but they could not sell certain restricted items — such as furniture, office equipment and major appliances — on consecutive Saturdays and Sundays.

Several board members emphasized the fact that "the law has nothing to do with religion." One member said "Christianity isn't the issue, they are just using it as a gimmick" to legislate against certain businesses," and charged that the law was primarily aimed at hindering large shopping centers in and around metropolitan areas.

Herman Miller Stages Opening At New Plant

ZEELAND — About 200 persons viewed the new Herman Miller, Inc., plant at Byron Road and M-21 through open house held Wednesday. Other plants in Zeeland are located on Washington St., and West McKinley St. Tours were conducted by employees which took about 45 minutes to complete the operation.

The new plant was designed by George Nelson and Co., Inc., of New York. Nelson also designs some of the furniture in the Herman Miller line. Associate architects are J & G Davenport of Grand Rapids. Johnson Construction Co., Inc., of Grand Rapids was the general contractor.

This is the second building in a proposed five building complex. When the complex is completed it will house the central manufacturing plant, technical center and the administration center.

The plant houses dimension mill, finishing mill and the cabinet, finishing, upholstery, production engineering, maintenance and special departments. Lighting for the plant is supplied by 400 watt mercury vapor lights, which cast almost no shadows. The structure is 88,640 square feet made of brick, steel and metal.

Production of furniture through the plant is done in a circle around the inside of the plant. Aisle ways, which are about 10 feet wide, are covered with a sealer and then waxed so boxes and furniture can easily be moved on from one department to another without damage.

Every man who works in this plant has his name somewhere, either on a machine or at the entrance of the section where he works. This is to acquaint visitors and relatives with where people work.

Herman Miller officials announced last week that the company established a new division Jan. 1 to concentrate on the design and marketing of objects, accessories and folk art. This is an extension of a program that began with the company's Textiles and Object Shop in New York. Several objects from the shop were on display in the social area at the end of the tour.

Accidents Close US-31, M-40 for Several Hours

Swirling snows sweeping across highways south of Holland Monday caused 25 accidents on US-31 between Holland-Saugatuck and a half dozen collisions on M-40 from Holland to Allegan.

No one was seriously injured. Both major highways were closed to all traffic on and off during the day and evening for periods ranging up to five hours.

Vehicles were backed up for four miles on US-31 near Holland and north of Saugatuck.

Up to six and seven vehicles were involved in some of the accidents. One crash involving a semi and a wrecker, both which burned, completely blocked traffic on US-31 from late Monday afternoon until 9 p.m.

Allegan County Sheriff Robert Whitcomb said many drivers sought another route to bypass the traffic tie-up on US-31 which resulted after the semi-trailer truck-wrecker accident. The switch of traffic onto M-40 caused 15 vehicles to be involved in accidents on that road.

The accident between the wrecker and truck happened a half mile south of 140th Avenue on US-31 when a third vehicle, a car, was hit from behind by the semi causing the truck to jackknife and skid into the opposite lane and strike the oncoming wrecker.

Wayne O'Neil, 29, of Mecosta, the driver of the semi-trailer, was taken to Douglas Hospital for treatment of abrasions and lacerations. He was to be released today. Alfred Hunt, route 5, Holland, driver of the wrecker, was also taken to Douglas Hospital for shoulder injuries and released. George Bartholemew, 34, of South Haven, the driver of the car, received minor injuries.

O'Neil and Hunt jumped from their trucks when they burst into flames, and burned completely. All that was left was the shell of

the vehicles. Wreckage was not cleared until after midnight.

Other accidents on US-31 included a seven-vehicle chain-reaction crash. A truck driven by Myrel S. Eggers, 46, Michigan City, Ind., collided with an oncoming car, driven by Bobbie L. Snively, 31, Watervliet. Five other vehicles — including three trucks — jammed into the back of the truck driven by Eggers. Two persons received minor injuries. South Haven state police said.

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
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
