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## Apartment Rezoning Approved

By a vote of 7 to 1, City Council Wednesday night approved rezoning of a 7.2 acre tract between 28th and 30th Sts. some distance west of Ottawa Ave. from A-1 residential to B-1 apartment to allow development of an 11-unit apartment complex housing 121 two-bedroom apartments.

The public hearing and the Council discussion in the meeting-of-the-whole consumed about one hour of the 1½-hour meeting. A model of the apartment complex including community house and swimming pool was displayed and color slides of a somewhat similar development in Grand Rapids by the developers, Alco Construction Corp. of Lansing, were shown.

Councilman Donald D. Oosterbaan cast the dissenting vote. Councilman L. W. Lamb Jr. was absent.

Opposition was registered by several residents in the area at the public hearing. The position of the Planning Commission which recommended the rezoning after study was explained by Dick Corter of the J. Paul Jones Associates, professional consultant to the planning commission, who cited the need for well planned apartments in the city which he said has 7,600 houses (over half of them built before 1940) and 113 apartment units. He said home ownership in Holland is well above the percentage level for cities of comparable size, particularly in a college town where the demand for apartments generally is greater than in other centers.

During Council's discussion, Oosterbaan questioned the need for more apartments in the city in view of apartment advertising in the local newspaper. Accesses to the apartment site were questioned, and Atty. Donald Hann said the developers would be agreeable to deeding 33 feet of the easterly border (Homestead Ave.) if the Planning Commission deems the street should be opened. The apartment site is immediately north of Birchwood Manor.

In other business, Council unanimously voted to exercise a 30-day option in which all of Mrs. Hazel McLeod's interests in the vacated plot of East Mooreland subdivision south of East 16th St. and east of Lincoln Ave. for \$4,000 including a 110 by 120 foot lot on the north side of 18th St. east of Hazel Ave. Part of the property is needed for opening 17th St. from Lincoln to Hazel Aves. Council earlier had authorized condemnation.

Council also authorized Architects Kammeraad and Stroop to proceed with preliminary plans for a new facility for the police, fire and park departments. The standard fee schedule as recommended by the Michigan Society of Architects was approved less a credit of \$2,000 for work previously performed by the firm of Space Utilization Analysis.

City manager Herb Holt reported on a communication he had received from the Michigan State Highway Department in answer to his inquiry whether widening of US-31 BR in Holland could be given priority in view of increased gas and weight taxes. The answer revealed that recent passage of increased gas and weight taxes has provided a minimal amount of anticipated funds, and the department will be following its decision in 1966 to defer right of way acquisition and construction on the local project until after 1972.

Council unanimously approved an agreement between the city, Lear Siegler Inc. and Mr. and Mrs. John Kempker involving transfer of property in connection with Windmill Island. The agreement involves transfer of a triangular piece of property east of the C and O mainline to the Home Furnace division of Lear Siegler by the owners, Mr. and Mrs. John Kempker with \$1,200 going to the Kempkers. In exchange, the Home Furnace division will deed to the city a triangular piece of property west of the tracks. The city is purchasing the Windmill Island property from the Kempkers.

Two ordinances were accepted for first reading. One repeals the food handlers and food establishment ordinance which is covered by a new ordinance adopted some months ago. The other provides an amended license fee schedule. Final action is slated at the next meeting.

Oaths of office were filed for William H. Vande Water and Alvin W. Vanderbush, board of canvassers, and Gordon Cunningham and Jack Leenhouts, board of review.

Council granted permission to the National Foundation March of Dimes for permission to solicit funds by a peanut sale Jan. 27 and for a Mothers March Jan. 25.

A communication from the Liquor Control Commission advised that unless Council objects to renewal of licenses to sell alcoholic beverages for consumption on the premises that the commission will automatically renew same. This was referred to the city manager for study and report.

A letter from the Water Resources Commission announcing a federal conference on pollution of Lake Michigan and its tributary basin to be held in Chicago Jan. 31 was referred to the Department of Environmental Health.

Certifications were approved as follows: Councilman Lamb, Lamb Inc., engineering, Park and Cemetery departments, \$807.71; Councilman Peerbolt, Peerbolt's Inc., street department, \$2.85; Councilman Smith, Wade Drug Co., police and health departments, \$49.40.

Councilman Hollis Clark submitted a report from the Holland Community Theatre seeking financial aid from Council and suggested it be referred to the city manager to study and report back at the next meeting.

Mayor Nelson Bosman presided at the meeting. City Clerk D. W. Schipper gave the invocation.

## Fluoride Clinics Are Scheduled

Materials have been distributed among schools in Ottawa county for the summer sodium fluoride program, which consists of oral treatments to reduce tooth decay in children's teeth.

Even though fluoride has been added to the water supply, dentists are strongly advising every parent to take advantage of this service.

According to Dr. Richard Schaatsenaar, director of the Ottawa County Health Department, this program has been in operation in the county for 16 years. The program is for children in the second, fifth and eighth grades. Four and five year old pre-schoolers are eligible. Special cases referred by the family dentists also will be accepted.

In Holland, clinics will be located in Washington School, Maplewood Christian School and Montello Park School. In the suburban area, services will be provided in West Ottawa School.

Last year more than 4,000 children were treated in Ottawa county. The entire procedure consists of four visits to the clinic. At the first visit teeth are cleaned and the first application of sodium fluoride is given. On the second, third and fourth appointments the application is repeated.

Application cards properly filled out and the \$3 fee in each case must be returned to the various schools by Feb. 2, in order to set up organization procedures. Persons who did not receive the forms may obtain them by calling the Ottawa County Health Department in Holland or Grand Haven or area chairman.

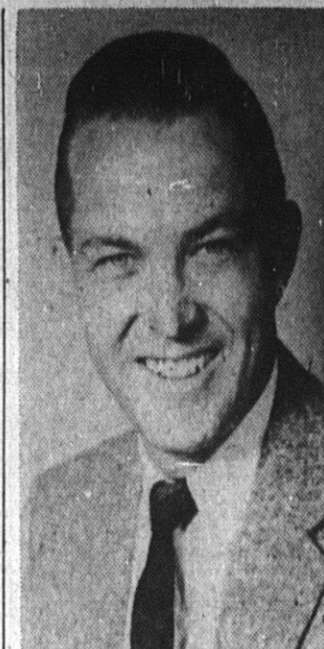
Those involved are asked to pick up the students in the school's parking lot.

The 621 votes cast represented about one-quarter of the registered vote.

The charter move will allow the township to adopt more modern methods as time goes on township officials said. One of the advantages is that as a charter township, Holland township is in a position to attract lower interest rates on bond issues.

## Sp/4 Laarman Gets Medal For Heroism

SAN FRANCISCO — Sp/4 David P. Laarman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Laarman of 367 East Lakewood, was awarded the Bronze Star Medal with "V" Device by the authority of the President under the provisions of executive order for heroism in connection with military operations against a hostile force in Vietnam.

Specialist Laarman distinguished himself by exceptionally valorous actions last Aug. 13 in the Republic of Vietnam. His company, upon making a helicopter assault, was immediately brought under intense hostile fire from an enemy battalion reinforced with heavy

weapons, including mortars. His platoon had moved forward to an exposed position where it could bring more effective fire upon the enemy positions.

One machine gun was immediately knocked out by the enemy fire, wounding all members of the gun crew.

Laarman realizing the increasing danger of the position being overrun, and with complete disregard for his own safety, immediately maneuvered his fire team forward to aid the machine gun crew. He continuously exposed himself to the intense enemy fire and successfully extracted the three man gun crew to safety.

His heroic actions and quick thinking undoubtedly saved the lives of the three men, kept a valuable machine gun from falling into the enemy's hands and prevented penetration of his company's perimeter.

Laarman's devotion to duty and personal courage were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service, and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Army, according to Maj. E. M. Strong, Adjutant General.

## 'No Cause' Verdict Given in Civil Case

GRAND HAVEN — No cause for action was the verdict of a jury in Ottawa Circuit Court Wednesday in a \$50,000 damage suit brought by John Vanden Bosch of Holland against Clarence Looman, also of Holland, in an auto negligence case.

The jury was out 30 minutes. The plaintiff claimed he was injured Jan. 29, 1965, at Eighth St. and Columbia Ave. in Holland when he was operating a tractor. He claims the defendant was driving a wrecker and pulled the tractor over the plaintiff's right foot and ankle, resulting in injuries.

Surviving are the wife; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Blauwkamp of Borculo; four brothers, Robert of Grand Rapids, John R., Tom and Bernard, and four sisters, Alice, Kathy, Jean and Beth, all at home, and a grandfather, Arie Potgeter of Allendale.

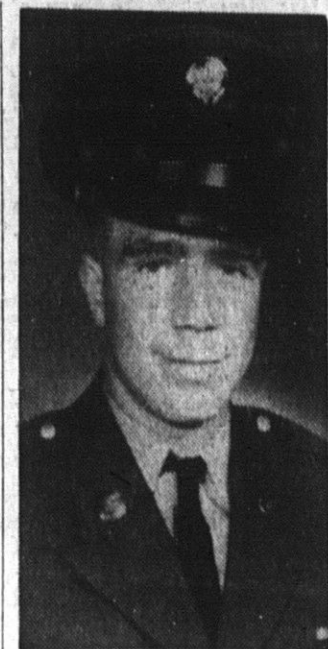

## Man Bound Over In Murder Case

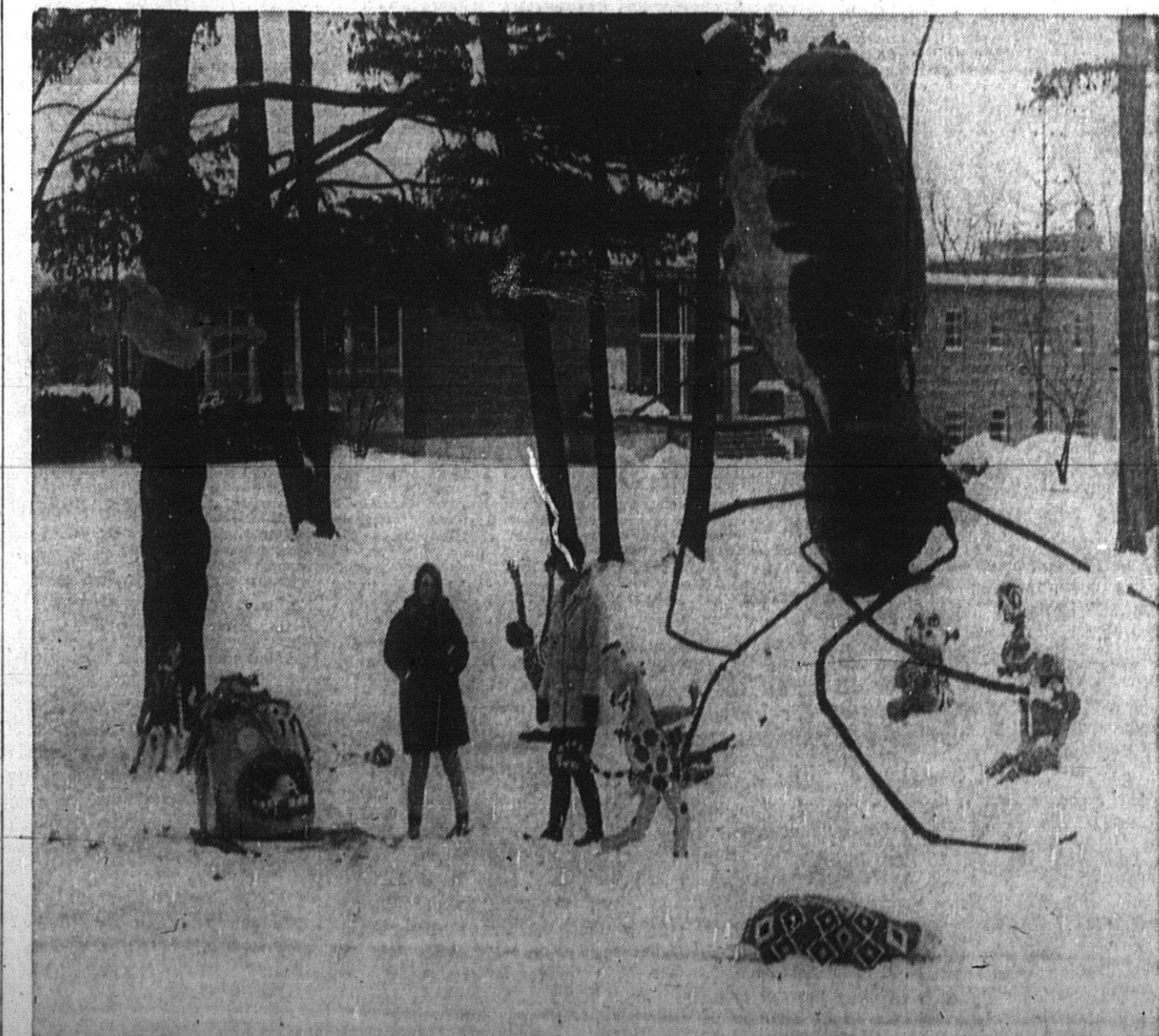

## Holland Takes 7th League Win

The Dutch clipped some wings Friday night and they did it with little restraint.

Holland High's basketball team strolled to an effortless win over the Muskegon Orchard View Cardinals, 102-54, in the high school fieldhouse before a somewhat confident capacity crowd.

The win gave the soaring Dutch seven victories in a row after losing their season opener. Holland now leads the Valley-Coast Conference with a 7-0 mark and are 7-1 over all. The Cardinals lost more than a few feathers as they plunged even deeper into the conference cellar with a 1-5 record and are 2-7 overall.

Holland toyed with the Cardinals as they allowed Orchard View to score the opening two baskets. The Dutch then moved to an insurmountable quarter lead, 24-9.

Throughout the second period Holland maintained its two-to-one scoring ratio. With 3:53 remaining in the period coach Don Piersma utilized all substitutes.

The Holland subs granted little more than foul shots to the Cardinals. Only Dennis De Wall, Orchard View's leading scorer, was able to penetrate the effective Holland defense as he tallied for nine of his 27 points. The half ended with Holland taking a commanding 48-22 lead.

Piersma played the third quarter with his starting five to again widen the margin at the period closing, 72-33.

Senior guard, Dan Shinabarger, scored 12 of his 30 points in the fourth quarter, to help increase the Dutch lead. But Piersma discovered a fine substitute in infrequently used junior guard, Paul Overbeek who scored 10 of his 13 points. It was rightfully Overbeek who scored Holland's last two baskets.

De Wall again was the primary offensive spark for Orchard View as he scored 10 points in the final period. Piersma again used all substitutes in the final three minutes.

For Holland there was little the Dutch could do wrong. Holland hit on 21 of 33 from the floor for 58 per cent in the first half and 19 of 46 for 41 per cent in the second half. Orchard View scored on 14 of 30 for 45 per cent in the first half and 7 of 24 for 29 per cent in the second half.

Dave Gosselaar was a continuous threat on the boards as well as adding 17 points. Offensively Holland grabbed 22 rebounds and took 20 defensively. Orchard View was able to take only 10 offensive and 13 defensive rebounds.

Piersma notes that it was a "good opportunity to use the reserve players. Our starting five did a fine job as well as several of our reserves players, especially Paul Overbeek."

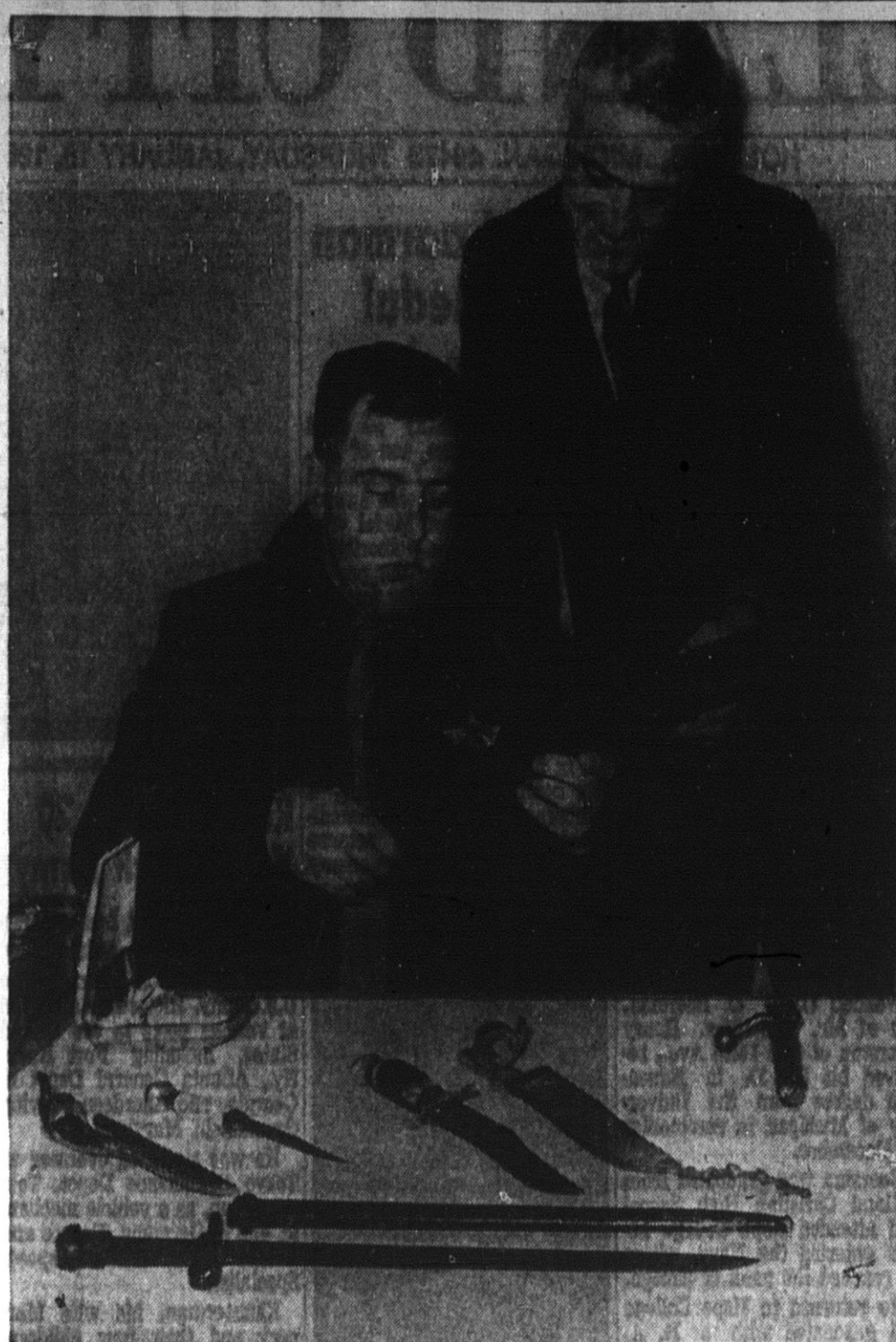

## Summer Grants Awarded To Hope Faculty Members

Eight Hope College faculty members have been awarded summer grants for study and research projects Dr. William Vander Lugt, interim dean for academic affairs, announced today.

The college annually makes grants to faculty members for summer study or research that will help them in their growth as scholarly teachers.

Dr. Richard Brockmeier, assistant professor of physics, has a two-part project planned. The first will consist of the planning and writing of computer programs which will be placed into the Hope College computer library of software available for curricular needs. Some of these programs will be of general application to several fields and the rest will be specifically applied to physics courses taught by Dr. Brockmeier.

The second portion will be the giving of a three-week seminar in computer programming for any Hope faculty member who may wish to become familiar in the use of the computer.

James Zoetewey, instructor in political science, will be delving into an intensive study of the presidential nominating process. He plans to attend both the Republican and Democratic conventions to obtain a first hand look.

## Nehru Family Subject of Book Review

Insight into the remarkable Nehru family of India was given in Herrick Public Library Wednesday when Mrs. Stanley Boven reviewed the book, "We Nehrus," by Krishna Nehru Hethesing, a younger sister of the late Prime Minister Jawaharal Nehru.

The book opens at the time when Nehru at the age of 23 returned from England where he had gone to school, followed through the period of his marriage to the lively 16-year-old Jamala, and a general description of life in the wealthy Nehru household where English and Indian customs existed side by side.

Much of the book was devoted to the Nehru family's involvement with Mahatma Gandhi's drive for independence and the great surge of feeling that permeated India in dissatisfaction over English rule.

Nehru's three sisters and their father all were caught up in the great drive and all served sentences in prisons. In all, Nehru spent 19 years in prisons.

The book told how Nehru in the 1930s considered Imperialism and Fascism as two sides of the same coin, but after the Pearl Harbor attack in 1941, he was completely loyal to the Allies.

Formation of East and West Pakistan in 1947 was explained in the book, separated by 1,000 miles of Indian territory. The panic, the migrations and the inhuman slaughter in the clash between the Hindus and Moslems over formation of Pakistan were vividly described.

Mahatma Gandhi's final fast in January, 1948, lasting only a few days, brought prompt action by the British, but only 17 days later Gandhi was fatally shot by a young Hindu radical. Nehru then succeeded Gandhi. His sister, Madame Pandit, Pakistan's representative to the United Nations, was the first woman to serve as chairman. His daughter, Indira Gandhi, no relation to the mahatma, was elected prime minister in January, 1966.

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Jan. 21  
The Meaning of the New Birth  
John 3:1-15

By C. P. Dame  
John 3, is one of the best known chapters in the Bible for at least two good reasons. The one is because it contains the most familiar verse in the Bible, verse 16, and the other reason is that it tells us about the new birth. In this lesson we shall study about regeneration or the new birth.

I. Some people seek Jesus. Nicodemus sought him. "Now there was a man"—note the word "man," an image bearer of God a member of the human race and of the visible church of that day. Nicodemus was a Pharisee, a member of a strict religious party. Jesus said some harsh things about the Pharisees but not all of them were hypocritical. Nicodemus was a ruler, he belonged to the Sanhedrin, the highest court in the land. He had a position and power, and wealth, and character. Some still seek Jesus.

Why did he go to Jesus? Very likely he had a hidden hunger in his heart which Judaism did not satisfy. He saw something in Jesus which made him take a most important step for a Pharisee. Now he came by night, most likely in order to have an uninterrupted talk. Note that he came! And he paid Jesus a compliment calling Him a rabbi, although Jesus had not gone to school, saying that He was "a teacher come from God!" His works testified to that fact.

II. It pays to seek Jesus. Nicodemus heard about the new birth. "Truly, truly, I say to you, unless one is born anew he cannot see the kingdom of God." Note that Nicodemus was a churchman, a teacher, a pillar in the church and in society, and to this man Jesus spoke about the new birth and its necessity, about a radical change of heart which results in a new mode of life. The language of Jesus sounded strange to Nicodemus as it does to some modern ears. The word "new" is popular, but the words "new birth" are not, even in some churches.

Nicodemus thought it was impossible for a person when he is old to change his life and its course. Jesus said, "Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit he cannot enter into the kingdom of God." Water stands for purification, the Spirit for quickening. The new birth is the work of the Holy Spirit. "That which is born of the flesh is flesh"—that is physical, earthly, which is natural to man. Jesus spoke of the wind which is heard but not seen, yet its effects are visible.

So the works of the Spirit are also able to be seen to those who are spiritually minded. Often the humblest Christians whose knowledge of secular things is very limited see more of what God is doing than some scholarly theologians who spin all manner of theories about Him.

III. Jesus foretold His cross. This He did by referring to an Old Testament prophecy, found in Numbers 21. A suggestion—look it up and read it. "And as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the Son of man be lifted up." Note the facts this story tells.

The Israelites were serpent-bitten, we are poisoned by sin. God provided a remedy for the Israelites. He has provided a remedy for us in Jesus Christ who died on the cross for our sins. The dying Israelites who wanted to be healed, had to look in faith on the brazen serpent, so we must look at the crucified Christ in repentance and in faith in order to be healed—if we refuse we perish.

It was God's love that prompted Him to make healing possible. "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth on Him, should not perish, but have eternal life."

## Understudy to Take Over Lead in 'Music Man'

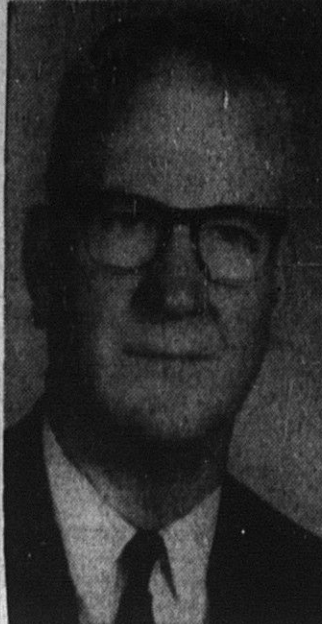

An Ottawa County sheriff's deputy is investigating.

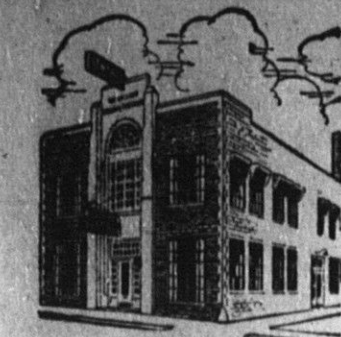

## Holland Wins, 94-85 Over Godwin

WYOMING — Holland High's basketball team shot the Wyoming Godwin Wolverines from the ranks of the undefeated Tuesday night with a 94-85 victory in the Godwin gym.

Both teams now post identical overall records of 8-1. Holland is leading the Valley-Coast Conference with a 7-0 mark while the Wolverines are cemented in first place in the O-K League red division with a 5-0 mark.

Holland shot out to a conservative lead early in the first quarter but ended the period with a ten point margin, 27-17. The score was tied three times in the quarter, but the Dutch were carried to the lead with excellent shooting by junior center Dave Gosselar, who scored nine of his 24 points in this period.

Gosselar poured in the first basket of the second period to give Holland the widest spread of the quarter 29-17. But the Wolverines gnawed at the Dutch lead and with seconds to go in the period were behind by only three points. Marty Snoop, Godwin's senior forward, connected on a basket at the half time buzzer. The questioned basket was eventually ruled allowable, giving Holland a slim one point margin at the half.

In the second half Holland went to a zone defense to stop the momentum and fast break of Godwin. The Dutch scored only 13 points in the third period as the game was tied three times again in this period.

Godwin entered the fourth quarter with a one point edge, 61-60. With their effective zone Holland forced Godwin to shoot from outside in the final two quarters and consequently lowered the Wolverine shooting percentage. In the first half Godwin hit on 19 of 40 for 46 per cent and dropped to 33 per cent from the floor in the second half as they connected on 16 of 49.

Holland fared better from the floor but was still below their shooting average. The Dutch hit on 20 of 45 for 44 per cent in the first half and 18 of 33 for 49 per cent in the second half.

With 6:30 remaining in the fourth quarter Holland ignited for nine quick points to give them a 73-64 lead. The Wolverines tried desperately to hang in contention but saw the Dutch open up the widest margin of the game with a 13 point spread late in the period. Senior guard Dan Shinabarger poured in 14 of his 29 point total to ensure Holland's victory.

Holland played the fourth period with three of their players in foul jeopardy and lost all three during the period.

Errors cost the Dutch several scoring opportunities as they committed 24 turnovers compared with 11 for the Wolverines.

On the boards Holland again dominated as they grabbed 12 offensive and 29 defensive. Godwin collected 10 offensive and 13 defensive rebounds. Gosselar and senior forward Bob Pete, again playing a consistently fine game, were the primary threats on the boards.

Coach Don Piersma, especially pleased with his team's effort, commented on the "fine work of the starting five as well as substitutes Max Bush and Paul Overbeek. Overbeek played most of the final period, stole the ball, and was a threat on defense."

On Friday the Dutch entertained Grand Haven at 7:45 p.m. in the high school gymnasium.

West Ottawa hosts Holland Christian next Friday in non-league action and Hudsonville travels to Wyoming for an O-K Red Division league game.

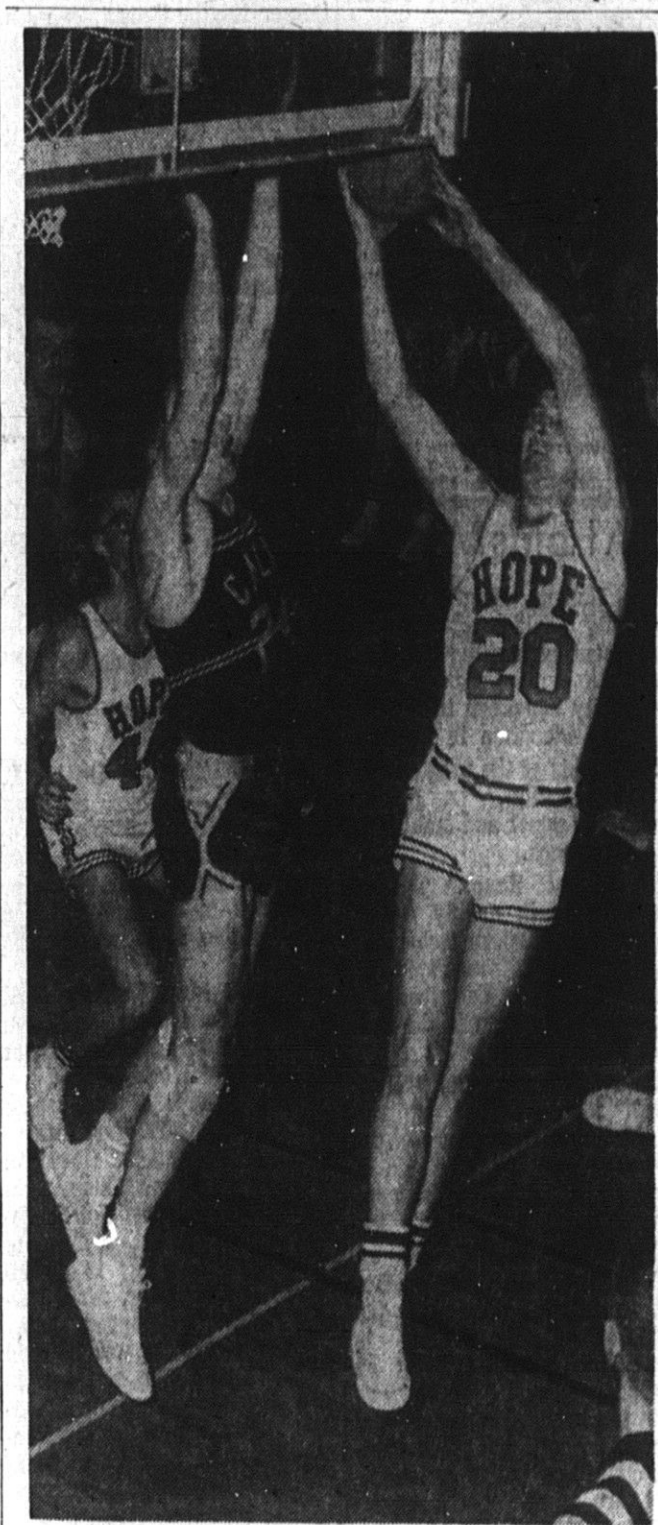

## Dutchmen Win 2nd MIAA Game

Hope College Flying Dutchmen gained sole possession of first place in the MIAA basketball race Saturday night by defeating Calvin College 95-90 before a standing room only crowd of 2,700 in the Civic Center.

Paced by the 43-point performance of Floyd Brady, Hope ignited for 52 tallies in the second after battling the Knights to a 43-43 intermission tie.

Brady scored 33 of his points during a furious second half. The Knights held the MIAA's most valuable player to 10 points in the first half, but the 6' 3" senior responded with 13 field goals and seven free throws in the final 20 minutes to lead the Dutchmen to their eighth victory in 10 games.

Hope remains the only undefeated team in the MIAA. The Flying Dutchmen stand 2-0, half a game ahead of Kalamazoo and Adrian who are 2-1. The defeat dropped Calvin to 0-3 in league play and 5-5 overall.

Seeking its ninth MIAA crown in the last 12 years, Hope plays a pair of crucial away games this week.

Calvin led through most of the first half as forward Wes DeMots sparked the Knight scoring charge with 12 points. Guards Mike Phelps and Dean Douma added to the Calvin scoring punch from their backcourt positions with nine points apiece during the first half.

The Knights' biggest lead of the night was 19-12 as Calvin hit nine of its first 16 field goal attempts. Brady, guarded closely by Calvin center Rich Schrotenboer, didn't collect his first field goal until there was 8:42 left in the opening half.

Hope steadily sliced away the Calvin lead until a basket by Gary Rypma with 6:17 left in the half put the Flying Dutchmen ahead 33-32.

The teams traded basket-for-basket during the rest of the first half and went into the lockerroom deadlocked at 43-43.

The score was tied three times during the early stages of the second half before a three point play by Rypma put the Flying Dutchmen ahead to stay, 56-53.

Brady scored 14 of Hope's next 16 points to keep pace with a hot shooting Calvin quintet. The Knights, on a basket by Douma, trimmed the margin to 62-60, but again Brady put together a flurry of points to put Hope on top 92-82 with 2:23 left to play.

Behind Brady, in the Hope scoring attack was Rypma with 25 points while Holland junior Bruce Van Huis added 13t allies.

Van Huis was instrumental in leading the Flying Dutchmen to a 58-45 edge in rebounds. The 6' 5" junior hauled down a career high of 28 rebounds while Brady followed with 10.

DeMots sparked the Calvin scoring attack with 20 points before he fouled out with three minutes left in the game. Phelps was next with 19 tallies while Douma added 15.

Hope finished with 38 baskets in 89 attempts for a 43 per cent clip while Calvin made 36 of 76 for 47 per cent.

From the free throw line the Knights sank 18 of 21 for a sizzling 85 per cent average while Hope sank 19 of 32 tries for 58 per cent.

De Vette used both Utzinger and freshman Randy Adolphs at the guard spot. Utzinger totaled three points while Adolphs added four.

Gordon Hetrick led Alma in scoring with 17 points while Drake Serges added 14 and John Fuzak 11. Freshman Chuck Hudson, Alma's leading scorer before the game, was limited to seven points — all in the first half.

Hope sank 30 of 64 attempts from the floor for a 46.8 percentage while Alma finished with 32 baskets for a 42.1 clip.

The Flying Dutchmen held a 52-42 edge in rebounds as Brady pulled down 16 and Van Huis 13. Hope is back in action Saturday in a key game at Adrian.

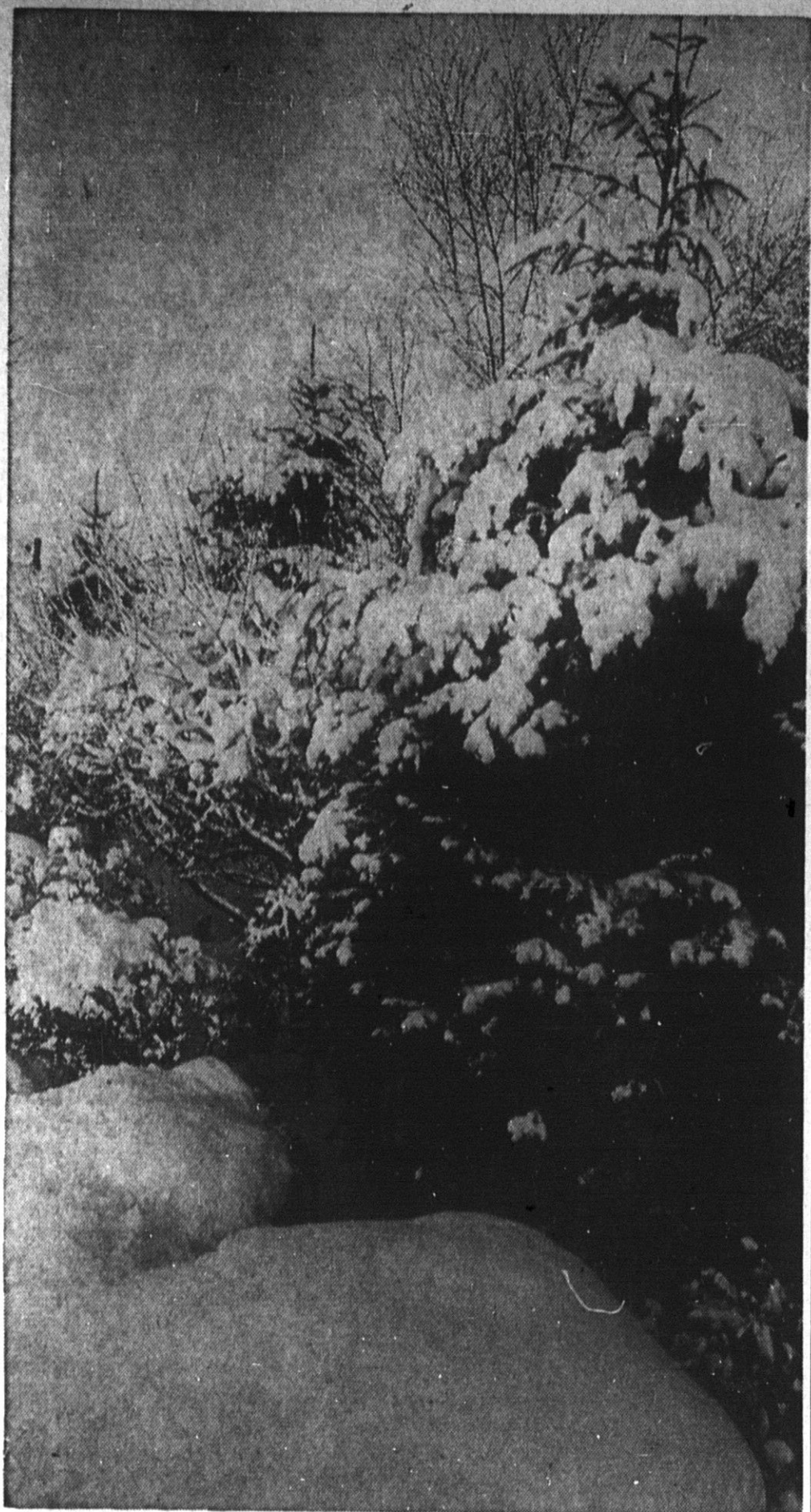
