Charged in Slaying of Officer

Dixon Mute In District Court

ALLEGAN—Richard F. Dixon, 39, of Detroit, stood mute at his District Court arraignment Friday to a first degree murder charge in the slaying of a South Haven police officer earlier in the day.

Dixon was held without bond in the Allegan County jail after a plea of innocent was entered for him.

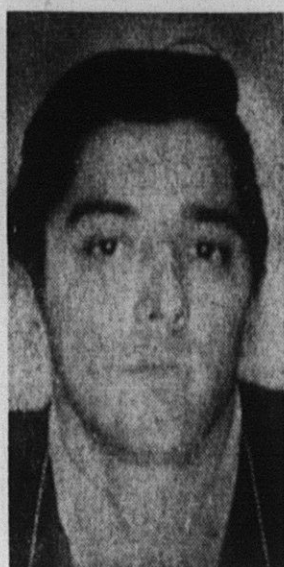
Killed was Patrolman Michael McAllister, 39, who was shot in the heart and stomach early Friday while investigating a report that someone was firing a gun.

Dixon was identified by the FBI as a man who allegedly hijacked a jetliner to Cuba and lived there four years. They said he held a pistol at a stewardess' head and forced the pilot of an Eastern Airlines jet carrying 37 passengers to fly him to Havana Oct. 9, 1971.

South Haven officers who captured Dixon after the fatal shooting said Dixon told them he was wanted by the FBI in that hijacking.

Police said McAllister, a five-year police veteran with five children, found a man walking in the area he was called to check out early Friday.

The man turned and fired a handgun when McAllister or-

dered him to halt, police said. A fellow officer who arrived in time to witness the shooting, Lt. Lawrence Bild, said the gunman also aimed at him but the ammunition clip fell out of the gun.

The assailant fled to a nearby home and officers arrested the intruder inside.

Investigators who interrogated Dixon Friday said he had gone to college and gotten married in Cuba.

Allegan Sheriff Orders Tight Security

Fears Dixon Is Possible Target

ALLEGAN — A Detroit man accused of killing a South Haven policeman and wanted by the FBI for a 1971 airline hijacking could be the target of a communist assassination attempt, Allegan County Sheriff Robert J. Whitcomb said today.

Whitcomb ordered tight security around the Allegan County Jail cell of Richard Dixon, 35, who has been charged with the shooting death Monday of South Haven patrolman Michael McAllister.

Dixon is also accused of hijacking an Eastern Airlines Boeing 727 and its 44 passengers and crew to Havana, Cuba, Oct. 9, 1971. He is believed to have stayed in Cuba for some time before secretly returning to the United States.

Whitcomb said Dixon has described himself as a communist and may have been working for the Cubans.

"We feel that since he is now no longer of use to the

Communist Party he may be a detriment to them," Whitcomb said. "If he suddenly starts talking about what he was doing up here they may want to silence him."

Whitcomb said the tight security is also aimed at protecting Dixon "from any harm that might come to him by a lot of people who may want to get him." He said the security would be maintained "as long as he is kept at this jail."

Dixon is scheduled for preliminary examination in Allegan County Circuit Court later this month on murder charges.

He was arrested in the basement of a house shortly after McAllister was shot to death on a rural South Haven road.

McAllister, 39, of Coloma, was the first South Haven policeman in recent memory to be murdered in the line of duty. He was the father of five children.

Two Arraigned For Break-in

GRAND HAVEN—Two Grand Haven youths demanded examination Monday at their District Court arraignment to charges of breaking into a building at Grand Haven Saturday at 10 p.m.

William Lewis Ten Brink, 18, and Kevin Lee Rowland, 17, were held in the Ottawa County jail in lieu of bonds.

Ottawa County deputies said the two were taken into custody after they were observed entering the Dama Tool and Gauge Co. on 172nd Ave. at Grand Haven. A township constable observed a vehicle parked in the area and noticed footprints in the snow leading to the factory and called deputies who investigated.

Chemetron Seeks Use Of Chemical

LANSING — Three western Michigan companies which manufacture and use a suspected cancer-causing chemical called DCB are seeking an exemption from legislation curtailing its use.

Representatives of the three companies met Tuesday with the House Marine Affairs Committee, which already had approved a bill regulating the use of the industrial chemical PCB and related compounds, to persuade lawmakers to exempt the second chemical from the legislation.

Chairman David Bonior, D-Mount Clemens, said he would hold off action on the legislation to resolve the dispute. The three companies are Lakeway Chemicals Inc. of Muskegon, Chemetron Corp. of Holland, and Eastshore Chemical Co. of Muskegon.

Lakeway manufacturers millions of pounds each year of dichlorobenzidine (DCB) which is used extensively in pigments and dyes. The other two companies use it.

The legislation now before the House, which would give the DNR power to regulate the use of PCB (polychlorinated biphenyl) and eventually outlaw its use in all forms except closed electrical system, could be interpreted also to ban DCB, the industry spokesmen said.

"It could mean millions of dollars worth of business lost of Michigan industry," said Joseph Sandri, vice president of Lakeway Chemicals.

The Department of Natural Resources is testing fish from the Big Black Creek which flows by the Lakeway plant to determine whether DCB has infiltrated into the environment.

There is no scientific evidence that the chemical is actually present in the environment, but DNR experts said it is very similar to PCB (polychlorinated biphenyl), which has been found in alarming levels in Lake Michigan fish.

"We don't know what happens to it (DCB) in the environment," said DNR toxic substances expert John Hesse.

The presence of PCB in fish and animals that eat fish, such as mink and birds, has sparked concern across the nation, reminiscent of the DDT and mercury pollution scares of past years.

"Lakeway has a record of water pollution problems since 1965 and has been the cause of numerous citizen complaints. One DNR report said discharges from the plant have resulted in a three-foot-thick sludge in the Big Black Creek."

Bonior said he would probably support amendments to the legislation that would exempt DCB but would grant the DNR power to implement controls later if it is determined that the chemical is in fact hazardous to human health.

Snow on Ground Now at 11 Inches

Holland had 11 inches of snow on the ground, following an overnight snowfall of three inches which measured only .04 inch precipitation. The overnight low was 11 and the 11 a.m. reading Friday was 18. Thursday's maximum also was 18.

BPW Sees Coal Costs About Same

With less demand for electricity and coal uses, the Holland Board of Public Works was told Monday it may have enough coal supplies at the BPW docks to last until July without additional shipments.

And BPW general manager Frank Whitney said preliminary coal bids for new supplies indicate the cost for coal may remain the same as this year. Normally first shipments arrive in the spring.

Whitney said attempts were being made to determine the exact tonnage of coal on the docks and indicated there may be as much as a 20,000 ton discrepancy between what is in the pile and what is listed in the books.

Less electrical usage was attributed to a decline by industrial users.

The BPW recommended approval of an agreement with Holland Township regarding purchase of water services in the Federal District with one amendment. The BPW raised the fee for fire hydrants from the current \$100 to \$250 per year to cover the cost of water for maintenance and flushing. The recommendation was sent to council.

BPW president Charles Cooper asked the staff to look into methods of billing customers rather than using the mail and wondered whether customers could pay electric, water and sewer bills at one time instead of three separate billings to save postage costs.

The board allowed Whitney to negotiate with financial aides at First Michigan on financing an electrostatic precipitator for the power plant and said cash flow might be used instead of a bond issue.

The board requested an extension in the deadline to file budget items with city council. It sought to move the deadline from Feb. 16 to March 15 because it was difficult to make a six-month projection in February.

Ottawa County deputies said the car was eastbound on Port Sheldon while the truck, driven by Donald James Janssen, 47, of 10223 Ottagan, Holland, was northbound on 84th. Janssen was not reported injured.

Agri-Systems to Rebuild

Cause of Sunday's Fire Not Learned

ZEELAND—Fire officials said today the cause of Sunday's blaze that leveled the wooden building housing Five States Agri-Systems, Inc., was undetermined.

Fire chief Jay Vander Plats said a state fire marshal sifted the ruins for a cause but was unable to determine a definite cause other than to say it did not begin in the furnace room.

The single story wooden structure at 27 North Church St. was destroyed in the fire discovered by a police officer at 3:35 a.m. Sunday.

William Ruga of Allegan, firm president, said loss estimates were placed at \$300,000 and the firm planned to rebuild in the Zeeland area but no site has been selected. The firm continued to operate from offices in the Big Dutchman facility.

Ruga said he left the building at 5:30 p.m. Friday and an employee was believed in the building Saturday, the last person in the building before the fire was discovered.

Other members of the corporation which distributes hog and poultry equipment in Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, Ohio and Kentucky, were Dick Lechler and Carl Harmon.

Access Site Obtained North of Grand Haven

GRAND HAVEN — Land has been purchased for \$50,200 for development of a fisherman's access point to the North Shore pier at Grand Haven Harbor.

State Representatives Edgar A. Geelings (R-Norton Shores) and Melvin DeStigter (R-Allendale) received word from the Natural Resources Commission of the authorization for purchase of the land. About eight-tenths of an acre of land is being acquired for the access point.

The purchase price was part of a \$100,000 appropriation approved in September by the State Legislature. Remaining funds will be used for further land acquisition and development of the access site, which will include sanitation facilities and parking areas, according to the Department of Natural Resources.

Total Loss Estimated At \$400,000

One Firemen Injured; Agri-Systems Building Said Old Fair Structure

ZEELAND — Fire of undetermined origin swept a one-story wood frame structure near downtown Zeeland early Sunday that housed the Five States Agri-System, Inc. offices and warehouse at 27 North Church St.

Zeeland Fire chief Jay Vander Plats said a fire marshal from the State Police was called into the investigation to determine the cause of the fire. Total loss was estimated at \$400,000.

The fire was discovered at 3:35 a.m. Sunday by Zeeland police officer Roger Klunder on patrol. He said flames were confined to the window areas near the roof on the west side of the building.

Firemen were called and when they arrived Vander Plats said the entire roof was engulfed in flames.

"Firemen leaving their homes could see the flames," Vander Plats said who added that flames were about 20 to 30 feet into the air.

Vander Plats said he believed the wooden structure, about 150 by 250 feet, had been moved to the present site in Zeeland from the old Holland Fair Grounds.

One fireman, Arthur Grimes, the city assessor, suffered minor injuries when he stepped on a nail. He was treated in Zeeland Community Hospital and released.

Five States is a distributor of poultry and hog feeding equipment in Michigan, Indiana, Ohio, Illinois and Kentucky and deals with products produced by Big Dutchman and Cyclone International.

Units from Holland township and the Civil Defense assisted Zeeland fire department.

Sentences Meted Out In Court

GRAND HAVEN — Louis Phelps, 29, Grand Haven, charged with receiving and concealing stolen goods, was sentenced to two to five years in southern Michigan prison in Ottawa Circuit Court Monday by Judge Calvin L. Bosman. He was arrested by Grand Haven police.

Roger Way, 20, Allendale, charged with negligent homicide in connection with an accident on M-45 at Allendale last Oct. 22, was placed on delayed sentence status for one year and must pay \$100 costs. He was arrested by sheriff's officers after the accident as the accident resulted in the death of a Grand Valley State College student, Lynn Kraemer.

Ubaldo Mares of 132 West 15th St., Holland, arrested for car theft, was placed on delayed sentence status for one year and must pay \$200 costs.

Larry Kelley, 17, Adams St., Zeeland, arrested for breaking and entering, had his six months jail sentence reviewed by the court and because of a good jail record may be released Wednesday.

Scott Vander Molen, 26, Grand Rapids, charged with felonious assault and carrying a concealed weapon, pleaded innocent. He was arrested following a shooting at the Berlin Bar at Marne in December. Patrick Twork, 27, of 4287 72nd, Zeeland, charged with larceny by trick, pleaded guilty and will be sentenced Feb. 9.

Treated in Holland Hospital and transferred to Hackley Hospital in Muskegon with head injuries, and listed in "satisfactory" condition was Edward Parsekian, 25, of 3765 160th Ave., a passenger in the car driven by Nancy Sherding, 17, of the same address.

She was admitted to Holland Hospital with facial lacerations and listed in "good" condition. The driver of the second car, Mary Wagner, 27, of 640 West 20th St., was treated in Holland Hospital and released.

Ottawa County deputies said the Sherding car was eastbound on Riley St. and the Wagner car was northbound on 152nd Ave. Deputies said the Wagner car slid through a stop sign intersection and was struck broadside by the Sherding auto.

Woman Robbed, Three Sought

ALLEGAN — Three subjects were sought today by Allegan County authorities in connection with an assault and robbery of a 63-year-old woman Sunday at 8:30 p.m. at her home near Allegan.

Deputies said Marion Gaubatz was taken to Allegan General Hospital with lacerations of the head sustained when struck by one of three men who fled with \$150 from her purse. A telephone was ripped from the kitchen wall. Deputies said one of the subjects carried a pistol and all three fled on foot. The house was located on 102nd Ave.

City's 1975 Fire Loss \$210,105

Holland recorded one fire death and a loss of \$210,105 in 1975 and firemen were called out 497 times during the year, according to the annual report issued by fire chief L. Marvin Mokma.

The fire death occurred Feb. 28 when a man and his dog perished in a second floor bedroom in a home at 10 East 15th St.

The total fire loss in the city included \$150,715 in property and \$59,390 in contents. The 1974 total loss amounted to \$47,760.

Grass and rubbish calls amounted to 193, residences, 107; mobile property, 79; industrial, 40; mercantile, 24, and other properties, 32.

Incendiary causes topped the list with 182 fires while hot objects accounted for 45 fires, electrical, 38; heating equipment, 27; open flame, 15; and natural causes, 6.

The fire department, with 30 paid personnel and 30 volunteers, placed into service last January a Sutphen aerial tower at a cost of \$135,336. Delivery of two 1,500 gallon pumps are expected in March and early 1977.

Fulltime firefighters attend training classes during normal duty hours and include classroom and practical training. Volunteers train during scheduled drills in the evenings.

As part of the fire prevention program, inspectors of buildings are conducted and in 1975 personnel conducted 1,224 inspections and supervised 19 fire drills and conducted 55 fire prevention talks and lectures.

In his report to council, chief Mokma asked for consideration of a replacement building for the fire station on Eighth St. and said with the addition of larger pieces of fire fighting equipment the need becomes even more pressing.

Hope Downs Blue Jays For Title; Holwerda MVP

Boyce Also Selected To Tourney Team

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. — Jim Holwerda was named the most valuable player Saturday at Hope College's basketball team defeated John Hopkins, 66-64 for the Suncoast Classic tournament title.

Center Dwayne Boyce of the Flying Dutchmen, joined Holwerda on the all-tourney team. Boyce pulled down 15 of Hope's 38 team caroms against the Blue Jays.

Hope connected on 28 of 61 shots from the field for 46 per cent while John Hopkins was good on 28 of 69 for 40 per cent.

Mike Riksen led Hope in scoring with 15 points. Boyce had 13 and Holwerda and Ed Ryan 10 apiece. Andy Scheinfeld led the losers with 12 points.

The game was tied five times during the first three minutes. John Hopkins scored the next seven points to take a 20-13 margin. However, Hope came back to hold the Blue Jays scoreless over the next four minutes to grab a 23-20 lead.

The contest was tied at 31-all before Hopkins again led 36-31. The Dutchmen battled back to tie the count but ended up behind at the intermission, 40-36.

Dutch Roll Over Defending Big Seven Champions, 62-47

The Holland High Dutch want the Big Seven basketball crown this winter and showed it here Saturday evening by blasting defending league champion Kalamazoo Loy Norrix, 62-47.

Coach Don Piersma's Dutch are now 3-1 in the loop and 6-1 for the season. The victory was their fifth in a row. Loy Norrix has only dropped three games in 10 tries to date but all three of them have come to conference opponents.

Both teams played Friday and routed their foes. The Dutch pasted Hudsonville Unity and the Knights pounded Portage Central.

A goal tending call on Holland gave Loy Norrix a 2-0 lead which was 4-0 moments later. Loren Schrottenboer and Dave Van Wylen canned baskets to tie the count at 4-4.

John Thomasma gave Loy Norrix its last advantage of the night at 6-4 as Holland erupted for the next eight points. Schrottenboer tallied six of those points and Todd De Young two. Schrottenboer gunned in 10 of his game high 26 counters in the first period as the score stood 14-10 in favor of the Dutch.

A nice pass from Dennis Law-

son to Schrottenboer increased Holland's margin to 24-16 in the second quarter. The half ended 26-21 with Piersma's outfit having the higher total.

Shooting a blistering 64 per cent from the field in the third stanza, the Dutch really gave their fans something to cheer about as they were now on top by 15 points, 44-29.

Schrottenboer finished the period by laying in a hook shot over the Knights' star Allen Morehead.

Holland's rugged defense held Loy Norrix to only eight points during that span as Van Wylen was all over Morehead like a blanket. Morehead was named the most valuable player in a recent Greater Kalamazoo Tournament.

The Knights won the holiday tourney but they couldn't turn back the powerful Dutch, who should be rated in the state after their first start.

Lawson followed Schrottenboer in scoring with 15 points. Junior guards Steve DeVette and Dan Molenaar came off the bench and did a good job. It was only the second game for Molenaar since he suffered a foot injury. Morehead closed with 18 markers but they didn't come

easy. The Dutch netted 26 of 63 shots for 39 per cent and Loy Norrix hit on 23 of 71 for 32 per cent. Holland had 21 turnovers and the visitors 22.

While Holland sank 10 of 15 free throws, Loy Norrix only swished one of nine.

Starting guard Tom Borgman fouled out in the third period with his club up a by a 30-25 score.

Coach Don Johnson's reserves stopped the Little Knights in the prelin, 69-39 for their fifth win.

Juniors Del Dozeman and Curt Droogier led the way with 22 and 18 points respectively. Dana Cyrus added 11. Vincent Johnson and Nate Johnson mustered 14 and 11 markers for the losers.

Fluoride Program Set In County

GRAND HAVEN — Paul J. Christenson, M.D., medical director of the Ottawa County Health Department today announced that the Health Department, in cooperation with the Michigan Department of Public Health and the Ottawa County dentists, has implemented a sodium fluoride mouthrinse program for children in grade 1 through 5 in the county's non-fluoridated schools.

The mouthrinse program is an improvement over the previous summer topical fluoride program which was discontinued in 1974, and will be conducted in the schools involved.

The mouthrinse program is conducted by the Health Department's dental hygienist, Pam Bishop, working under the direction of Dr. Roy Patterson, county dentist. Approximately 5,200 children in grades 1 through 5 will receive a 2 per cent neutral sodium fluoride solution for one minute every other week.

The entire procedure takes approximately five minutes of classroom time. It has been reported that such a program should result in a reduction of dental caries, somewhere between 20 to 50 per cent.

Thirty-six non-fluoridated schools are participating in the dental program which involves children from Allendale, Coopersville, Grand Haven, Holland, Hudsonville, Spring Lake, West Ottawa and Zeeland school systems.

Individual participation in the mouthrinse program is voluntary, requiring consent by the parent. The program is partially funded by the Ottawa County Health Department.

Building Activity Edges
\$4 Million Here in 1975

A total of 748 building permits were issued out of City Building Inspector Jack Langfield's office in City Hall during 1975. This involved an outlay of \$3,998,040.

Under residential, there were 42 new single family dwellings for \$1,015,232; five duplexes (10 units), \$119,729; multi-family (a 16-unit condominium), \$300,000; 24 accessory buildings, \$38,362; 13 swimming pools, \$77,763; 78 fences, \$22,219. Residential alterations for 339 dwellings totaled \$509,293, and 47 accessory buildings, \$26,891 for a grand residential total of \$2,109,478.

One new commercial permit amounted to \$85,000 and 80 permits for commercial alterations totaled \$250,026.

Two new industrial permits listed \$460,000 and 24 industrial alterations totaled \$537,552.

One new institutional permit called for \$513,823 and 15 institutional permits listed \$42,150. There also were 53 sign permits

and 28 demolitions.

Thirty-two building permits totaling \$421,260 were issued during December.

The greater share was accounted in a single application for two eight-unit condominiums for \$300,000. There also were four single family houses for \$85,785.

Other classifications list 14 residential alterations, \$16,950; two residential accessory, \$1,275; five commercial alterations, \$11,450; one institutional, \$3,300; one municipal, \$2,000; one fence, \$500.

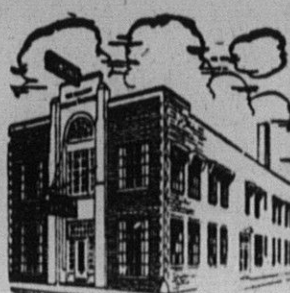

I'LL SPEND MY OWN MONEY

If stories out of Washington
can be taken at face value,
then President Ford will be ask-
ing Congress to link a tax cut
to a budget cut, and return
some \$28 billion back to the
taxpayers. Of course it is high-
ly doubtful that Congress will
do any such thing, since this
would involve many of the pet
projects of congressmen.

It is always interesting to
listen to the arguments coming
out of Congress when there is
talk about cutting the budget,
actually cutting back on spend-
ing, and that means eliminat-
ing some programs, or cutting
back on them. We are told that
if the Federal Government cuts
back on spending this will have
an adverse effect on the na-
tion's economy.

This is an interesting bit of
information. Suppose the gov-
ernment takes from me \$100 in
the way of a tax and then pro-
ceeds to spend this on some
program which doesn't actually
produce anything. The assump-
tion is that if that \$100 isn't
taken from me, it won't be
spent.

Silly, of course. I might well
spend that money for a new
appliance, some new clothes,
or even groceries, and in doing
so I would be putting this money
in circulation.

Suppose I decide to bank this
money. Then the bank would
have \$100 more to lend to some-
one else who might want to buy
something, and the spending
would still go on. What Con-
gress needs most of all is to
learn that the citizen can spend
just as well as the Congress,
and with better sense.

Sunday School Lesson

"Giver of Life and Health"

Text: Matthew 9:18-31

By C. P. Dame

Health, diet, exercises, heal-
ing are popular topics. In this
lesson Jesus is portrayed as the
divine healer who blessed man.
Take note of the fact that Jesus
healed people irrespective of
their standing in society and
that faith played a big part in
the healing. Jesus showed con-
cern in man's needs, of body,
mind and soul.

I. Jesus cares for the needy
privileged. While Jesus was
busy a ruler of the synagogue
begged him to come to his house
and heal his daughter who was
twelve years old and dying. We
may assume that he had
secured the best medical help
but of no avail — The story
of the daughter and the woman
is also recorded in Mark 5:21-42
and in Luke 8:45-56. Jesus
responded to the official's plea
and went with him to the house.

On the way a messenger
reported that the girl had died.
Jesus and Jairus, the father kept
right on going. When they ar-
rived, mourners were in the
house. Jesus pushed them all
aside and with the parents and
Peter, James and John stepped
into the girl's room, touched
her, spoke to her and she came
back to life again. Jesus told
the parents to give her food. The
miracle was told in the whole
community, far and wide.

Recall that Jesus restored two
others to life — the son of the
widow of Nain and Lazarus.
Jesus had power over life and
death.

II. Jesus is concerned about
the ostracized. While Jesus was
on the way to the house of
the official a woman who had
suffered twelve years from
bleeding slipped through the
crowd and touched Jesus. The
condition of this woman had
isolated her from society,
brought about divorce, ex-
communicated her religiously,
and caused her much grief and
money spent on doctors. Her
faith had moved her to believe
that by touching the Lord's gar-
ment she would be healed.

and she was. When Jesus felt
the loss of power he asked who
touched him. The healed woman
told her story. Then Jesus ad-
dressed her as daughter and
pressed her for her faith. The
secret disciple became a con-
fessing follower. Her healing
made it possible for her to re-
sume a place in society.

III. Jesus sees the handicap-
ped. Two blind men called Jesus
for mercy, addressing him as
the son of David, a messianic
term. Jesus asked them whether
they believed he could heal
them and they said he could.
And then Jesus said, "Accord-
ing to your faith be it unto you."
Jesus touched their eyes and
they opened and they saw Jesus,
who told them not to tell about
the healing. Why not? Very
likely because they used a mes-
sianic term, and they had a
wrong idea of the Messiah. Jesus
makes the spiritual blind to see.

County Seeks Support For Hospital

GRAND HAVEN — Ottawa
County Commissioners Tuesday
sought ways to continue support
for the Booth Memorial Hospi-
tal in Grand Rapids operated
by the Salvation Army for girls
having babies out of wedlock.

A question of separation of
church and state was presented
to the commissioners when they
began to allocate \$3,500 to the
hospital for 1976.

Finance committee chairman
Eunice Bareham said the Booth
Hospital provided services to
17 Ottawa County girls in 1975.
Prosecutor Wesley J. Nykamp
said in an opinion the county
did not have the power to al-
locate funds to a private hospi-
tal facility without a purchase
of services contract.

Commissioner Raymond Van-
der Laan of Hudsonville said if
the county failed to support the
Booth Hospital then the hospital
had the right to deny services
to Ottawa County residents and
he said he didn't know of any
other place the girls could go
to obtain the services.

Commissioners referred the
matter of a possible contract
with the Booth hospital to the
Human Services Committee.

The cost of providing ade-
quate malpractice insurance for
the county health department,
mental health department, E-
units and others was estimated
at \$25,000 this year, up from the
\$2,500 a year ago but commis-
sioners said the malpractice
insurance package was still in
negotiations.

A letter was received from
attorney Lawrence Van Til re-
questing an appearance before
the commissioners regarding
claims against the county fol-
lowing the death of his father,
Riemer Van Til, who was coun-
ty treasurer at the time of his
death.

Lawrence Van Til had asked
for the balance of salary for
the uncompleted term of office
of Riemer Van Til but commis-
sioners denied the request.

In his letter, Lawrence asked
for fees collected plus interest
while he was administrator of
the Van Til estate before a
successor was named treasurer.

The letter was referred to the
finance committee and prosecu-
tor and the commission chair-
man was asked to set a time for
an appearance by Van Til be-
fore the commissioners.

After spending much of the
afternoon session discussing the
merits of a computerized tele-
phone system, commissioners
approved additional funds for
the new system.

A contract for a new telephone
system was signed in 1975 with
Michigan Bell at a cost of
\$2,400 a month but Bell officials
said Tuesday rate increases al-
ready hiked the monthly charge
to \$2,700 and the new computer
system has now come on the
market.

For an additional \$180 per
month plus an additional \$4,300
installation charge, the new
system could be installed giving
greater flexibility for county
building telephone users, Bell
officials said.

Commissioners agreed and
amended their original contract
to provide for the computerized
equipment at a monthly charge
of \$3,033.64 for five years. The
new system is to be in opera-
tion in June.

Under the system, callers
reaching a number in the Coun-
ty Building can be transferred
to any of the departments in
the building. Under the current
system outside callers reach
only one telephone and cannot
be switched to another depart-
ment should they reach the
wrong number.

A letter from Kenneth E.
Sebens, psychologist for the
Grand Haven public schools, re-
questing creation of a single
agency to handle youth services
for troubled juveniles referred
by schools, police, courts and
other agencies, was referred to
the Human Services Committee.

Commissioners named Carroll
Lutz of Spring Lake to the un-
expired term of Dr. Mary
Kitchel on the Public Health
Board. The term runs until Dec.
31, 1977. Dr. Kitchel resigned.

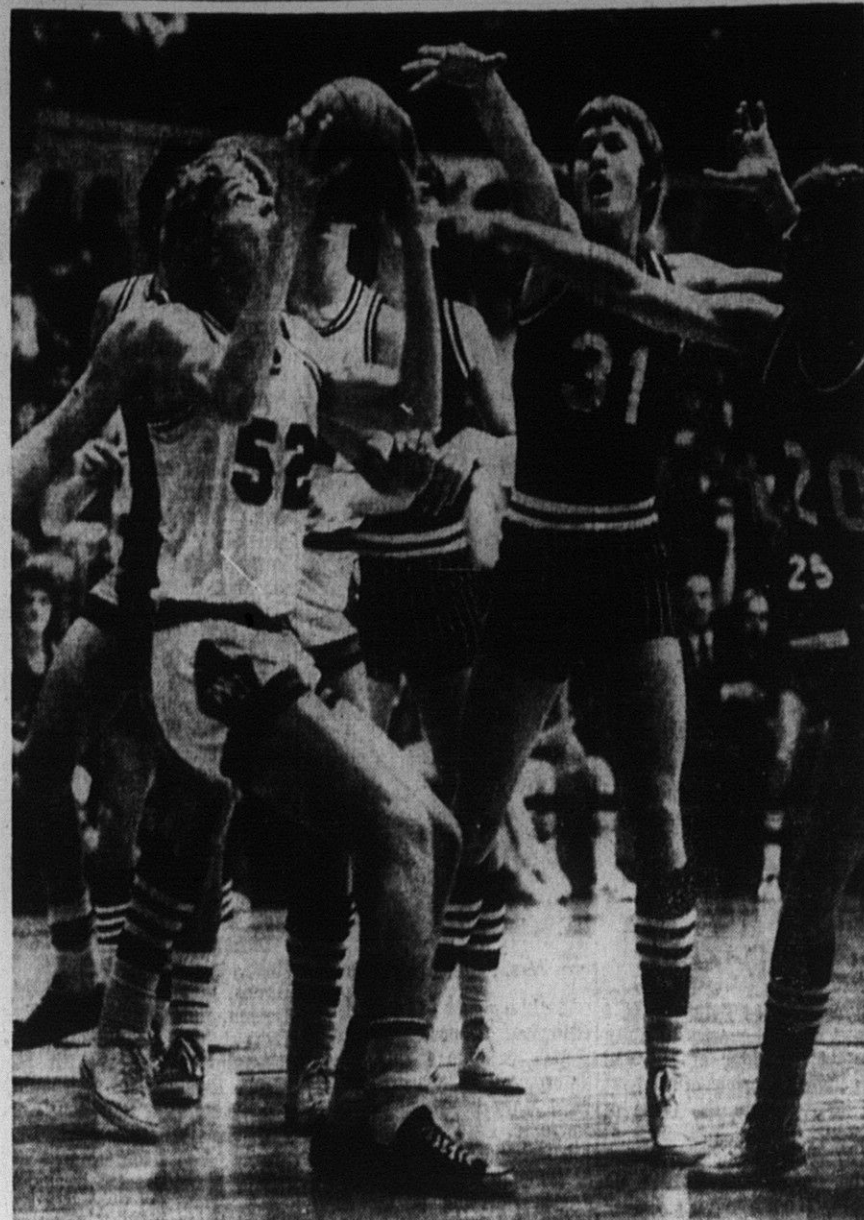

Loren Schrotenboer riddled Hudsonville Unity's defenses all evening Friday night in the Holland Fieldhouse, tromping the Crusaders, 67-38.

With Schrotenboer doing more than his share and zeroing in 12 points in the first quarter, the underdog Crusaders surprised most everyone as the score stood 14-all.

Dennis Lawson, Holland's 6'7" forward tallied the other two points. Lawson just returned from a vacation in Jamaica and was replaced in the starting lineup by junior Frank Petersen. Senior Jay Peters started in Lawson's spot against West Ottawa.

A tremendous zone defense by Holland in the second period broke Unity's back, as they could only net two of 14 shots. On the other hand, the Dutch sank eight of 17 to grab a 34-20 halftime margin.

"One of the reasons we switched from a man-to-man to zone was because of the three first quarter fouls on Dave Van Wylen," said Holland mentor Don Piersma.

The Dutch gunned in 13 unanswered points in the fourth stanza before Unity countered with its first basket at the 3:11 mark by Greg Honderd.

Guard Todd De Young fired in three consecutive baskets during that span and was praised by Piersma after the game for his fine shooting in the second half.

While the Dutch didn't go to Schrotenboer in the second half, like in the first, the 6'5" Holland star, finished with a game high 27 points. Twenty-one of those came in the first 16 minutes.

De Young and Lawson checked in with 12 and 10 respectively while Brian Van Tubergen led Unity with 13 points. Doug Venema, the Crusaders' fine center, chipped in with 10 before fouling out with 3:34 left in the contest.

Holland ended the evening by hitting on 26 of 71 shots for 36 per cent while Unity was a colder than the "goodies" left over from the holidays. Coach Dave Bos' five only managed to swish 16 buckets out of 63 tries for a frigid 25 per cent.

The win was the fourth in a row for Holland and the first of the new year. The Dutch haven't played since they turned back rival West Ottawa back on Dec. 26. For the winter, Piersma's club is 5-1.

Unity's loss ended a two-game winning streak and now gives the Crusaders a 4-5 season record.

Even though the scoreboard only showed one point for starting guard Tom Borgman, Piersma was pleased with his overall game.

"When Tom is in the game, he makes things happen," said Piersma. "He did a nice job of directing our offense for three quarters."

Coach Don Johnson's reserves won their fourth contest by stopping Unity, 69-61.

Kevin Beerthuis and Kurt Drooper were high for the winners with 17 and 15 points. Dana Cyrus and Joe Stille added 11 and 10 total while Jim Aukeman and Bruce Cappel led the losers with 19 and 18 counters.

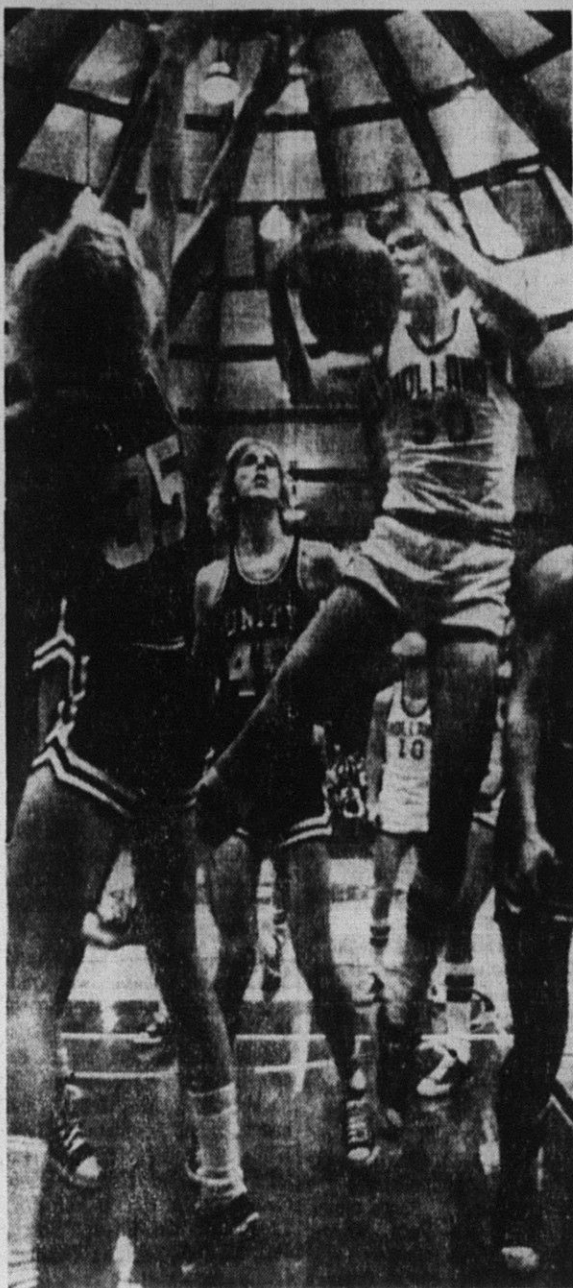
B. G. Veneklasen Succumbs at 82
