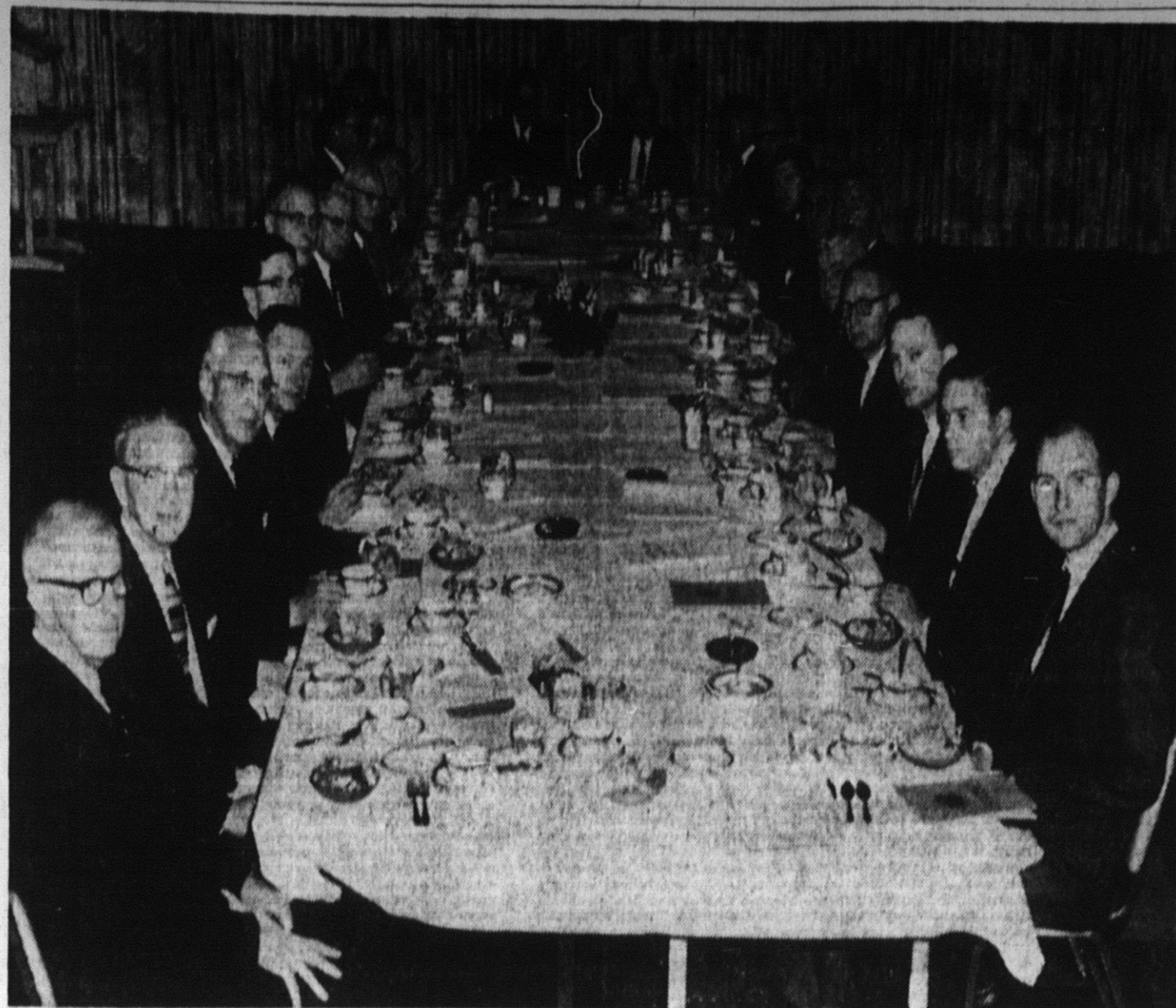

Community Foundation Explained at Luncheon

Marvin C. Lindeman was elected president of the Greater Holland Community Foundation Wednesday at a luncheon meeting in the Tulip Room of the Hotel Warm Friend.

Lindeman succeeds Judge Cornelius vander Meulen who resigned from the Foundation for health reasons. Judge vander Meulen was one of the founders of the Foundation and also helped in the writing of the by-laws.

Re-elected officers were Mrs. Mildred Campbell, vice president; and John Fonger, treasurer. Mrs. Ruth Van Duren was elected to the office of secretary.

Trustees elected for three year terms are Peter Kromann, Ab Martin and James E. Townsend. Elected to a one-year term as trustee to replace vander Meulen was Peter Boter.

Judge vander Meulen explained purposes of the foundation which was organized in Holland in 1951 after several years of study. This community trust is set up to receive gifts, devises or bequests, and to administer such funds according to the wishes of the donor.

Persons who have lived in and found happiness in Holland often want to do something for the community and to such the Greater Holland Community Foundation offers the perfect medium for making a small gift loom large.

The foundation is not a money hoarding enterprise. Any accumulation of funds is solely for the ultimate use of support of cultural, educational and other public welfare projects.

In setting up the foundation, the committee at that time learned some of the pitfalls of unwise bequests. Before the day of automobiles, a wealthy New York citizen left a fund for drinking troughs for horses on Broadway. This fund has never been used. A St. Louis mayor in the time of the gold rush, seeing hundreds of 49ers stranded in the city, left a third of his fortune for "distressed travelers" in his city bound "bona fide to settle for a home in the west." That fund became dormant with a million dollars accumulated.

The list is long and never ending of bequests gone wrong, due to the inability of rightly anticipating the future. The foundation is prepared to advise on how to prevent these philanthropic failures, but more importantly, it offers the advantages of its own corporate powers to meet the situations of the future.

Vernon D. Ten Cate thanked the retiring president for his longtime service in the organization. E. C. Brooks and C. B. McCormick also were given a vote of thanks for their services on the board of trustees. Those at the luncheon were guests of W. A. Butler.

Judge vander Meulen asked for suggestions and Henry S. Maentz suggested that by-laws of the foundation could be studied and brought up to date.

Foundation trustees are Marvin Lindeman, George Heeringa, Mrs. Mildred Campbell, George Tinhoft, Dr. O. van der Velde, James E. Townsend, Peter Kromann, Ab Martin and Peter Boter. Serving on the distribution committee are W. A. Butler, Mrs. Campbell, John F. Donnelly, A. C. Joldersma and Clarence Klaasen. The board of administration for Holland Guidance Center is to be named by the president.

South Haven Council Ponders Appraisal

SOUTH HAVEN—City Council members Monday night tabled a request by city assessor Howard McDougall to hire the J.M. Clemmshaw Co. appraisal firm of Cleveland, Ohio to evaluate South Haven real estate because they could not agree on how much appraisal to buy and at what price.

The aldermen appeared to agree over a necessity to spend \$16,000 to hire the firm to do a reevaluation of city real estate property but were divided over spending an extra \$4,000 to have a personal property appraisal as well.

Old Cannons Scrapped for War Effort

The fate of the Civil War cannons in Centennial Park was learned today, and, as many persons suspected, they were donated for scrap in the war effort.

The Sentinel files reported that on Monday, Aug. 31, 1942, Park department employees with the help of a derrick took the two cannons from the park to a scrap collection pile on the tannery lot, now Civic Center parking lot.

The cannons weighed 2,575 pounds each. In addition, 30 cannon balls previously had been donated to the scrap drive. These balls weighed 80 pounds each for a total weight of 2,400 pounds.

The cannons had been in the park for at least 30 years. At the time they were donated to the scrap drive, Mayor Henry Geerlings recalled that the late G. J. Diekema had obtained the cannons when he was a member of Congress. They arrived the same year Diekema obtained a new post office for Holland.

The cannon balls had been removed some years before the cannons and for a time were stored at Riverview park until they were added to the scrap pile.

Zeeland Bank Trustees Meet

ZEELAND — A record growth pattern was outlined for stockholders Tuesday at the annual meeting of the First Michigan Bank and Trust Company in Zeeland.

President Adrian Vanden Bosch reported resources as of last Dec. 31 were \$32,778,991.16, an increase of 10 per cent over the previous all-time record reported at close of business the previous year.

Vanden Bosch said the bank's total resources had increased 256 per cent in the last 10 years. At the meeting, stockholders voted to increase the amount of capital stock from 80,000 to 100,000 shares with a value of \$1,000,000.

Bank officers reported briefly on various phases of growth in 1963. Robert J. Den Herder, vice president, said activity at the bank's branches in Hamilton and Allendale were at record levels.

Trust Officer Randall Dekker reported a 50 per cent increase in activity over 1962. Cashier Alvin Johnson, personnel director, said a total of 50 persons were now employed in the three First Michigan offices.

All officers and directors were reelected at the meeting which occupied most of Tuesday afternoon. In addition, Joseph Dalmann was named assistant trust officer and special assistant in the mortgage department.

A highlight of the afternoon was the serving cake to all persons present in celebration of the bank's 86th anniversary. Stockholders toured the bank and watched demonstrations of their new automated NCR "Postronic" bookkeeping equipment.

Annexation Hearing Set For Schools

GRAND HAVEN — A petition from the Little Black Lake school district in Muskegon county, to annex to the enlarged Grand Haven district, will be given a hearing before state officials in the office of Dr. Lynn Bartlett, superintendent of public instruction, at Lansing Feb. 25 at 3 p.m.

The petition was first filed two years ago but action has been delayed because of legal difficulties and because the LBL district is just over the Muskegon county line, north of Spring Lake township.

Attending will be men from the Little Black Lake board, Muskegon county board of education and school boards of Grand Haven in Ottawa county and Mona Shores in Muskegon county.

The Grand Haven district, in the past three years, has annexed all districts in Robinson and Grand Haven townships, the small Connell districts in Port Sheldon and the large Ferrysburg district in Spring Lake township. Spring Lake district 1 and Fruitport district, other districts sending high school students on a tuition basis to Grand Haven, are developing their own high school districts.

At a Grand Haven board meeting Tuesday night, it was reported that construction on the first project of the many building projects included in a \$3,500,000 building program will get under way April 1. The new Central elementary school on South Sixth St., costing \$315,000, will be the first project and it is hoped that it will be ready for school classes Sept. 1. It will replace the old Central building on the same site, destroyed by fire Jan. 28, 1963.

If all steps in the approval of the bond sale go according to schedule money from the sale should be available about April 15. Architects and school officials will visit the new high school at Findlay, Ohio, Jan. 29 to inspect several features considered in the plans of a new 2,000,000 junior high building, to be erected on a 30-acre site on South Griffin St. It will take two years to build.

Ottawa Fair Awarded Michigan Futurity Event

The Michigan Futurity, featuring the top two and three-year-old trotters and pacers in Michigan, has been awarded to the Ottawa County Fair and will be raced Tuesday and Wednesday nights, Aug. 4 and 5 at the sixth annual Fair.

Announcement of the awarding of the Futurity was made today by the Michigan Department of Agriculture, sponsors of the event. A total of \$35,000 will be awarded in purses for the Futurity. The Department of Agriculture puts up the purse, most of which is received from the three Michigan pari-mutuel tracks.

Al Looman, Ottawa County Fair president, said a total of four races will be staged in the Futurity, a two-year-old trot and pace and a three-year-old trot and pace.

Juvenile Study Group Appointed

Mayor Nelson Bosman today appointed six persons to the Jaycee committee on juvenile problems in Holland, a group which will study this subject with the aid of resource people and report to City Council at the conclusion of the study.

Roger MacLeod of the Jaycees, who proposed to City Council last week that such a study group be formed, will serve as chairman. Other members will be Vern Edwards, Robert Strabbing, Mrs. Carolyn Eady, Earl Hall, Capt. William Stuart and the mayor.

Edwards and Strabbing are counselors in local high schools and Hall is on the Hope College faculty. Capt. Stuart is the newly appointed head of the local Salvation Army and is arriving here next week from Niles.

City Attorney Gordon Cunningham will serve as legal adviser for the group.

As outlined by MacLeod last week, there is public concern in the areas of juvenile crime and law enforcement and a general disrespect for law among teenagers. In addition, there is an increase in the number of juveniles involved in crimes, a growing number of teenagers driving cars and resultant problems which point to the need of an effective juvenile system.

The committee will collect information on national problems and how they affect the local community, and will obtain information by means of public hearings, private conferences and the use of outside resource material.

FAVORITE PLAYTHING — Back in the early 1940's, Alfred (Mike) Von Ins, then 6 or 7 years old, liked to play on the old cannon in Centennial Park. It was only a couple blocks from his home at 4 West Eighth St. Now 28 years old and owner-operator of Hollander Hotel, Mike recalls it as one of the things he liked best as a youngster. Council minutes reveal two cannons were placed in the park in 1908.

What Happened To Old Cannon?

The fate of the old cannon or cannons in Centennial Park has not been determined, but many people recall their presence.

This snapshot shows Alfred (Mike) Von Ins playing on a cannon back in the early 1940's. Mike was born in 1935, son of Mr. and Mrs. Urs Von Ins, who operated Bristol Hotel at 4 West Eighth St. The park was two blocks away and the youngster spent hours in the park and loved to climb over the cannon.

Minutes in the City Clerk's office of the old Park and Cemetery Board revealed that two howitzers were ordered placed in Centennial Park Aug. 12, 1908, one near the northwest

corner and one near the southeast corner. This photo was taken of the cannon on the northwest corner, since the Temple building is seen in the background.

Minutes also revealed a German cannon was offered for Kollen Park June 2, 1927, but nobody has recalled seeing a cannon there.

Mike Von Ins, now 28, is owner - operator of Hollander Hotel on East Eighth St.

Interest in cannons in the park was revived a few weeks ago when Willard C. Wichers received a request for information from the Detroit Museum which was compiling a list of old cannons in Michigan.

Dutch Set School Mark In 5th Win

EAST GRAND RAPIDS — Setting a school scoring record and playing its best game of the season, Holland High's basketball team rolled to a 97-58 win over East Grand Rapids here Tuesday night before 700 fans in the Reed Waterman gym.

The Dutch have never been hotter this season and they have never been any better on defense. Holland's zone and zone press defense worked to perfection and completely broke up the game.

Coach Don Piersma now hopes the Tuesday night performance will be the trigger to start the Dutch against strong Muskegon Friday night in an LMAC game in the L.C. Walker Arena.

The 97 points broke the school mark of 96 set Jan. 2, 1960 against the same foe, East Grand Rapids. Only the 1960 game was played in the East Junior High gym while Tuesday's game was played in the new Senior High gym, used for the first time this season.

In running up the 96 points, Ron Maat set a Holland individual scoring record of 49 points. Against the Pioneers Tuesday, five players were in double figures with Jim De Neff and Tom Pelon leading with 15 each.

Holland made 42 baskets in 82 attempts for 51 per cent. This was broken into periods of 8-20; 12-20; 11-20 and 11-21. The Pioneers made 43 per cent but only got 51 shots. They hit 22 and had quarters of 7-24; 3-14; 7-14 and 5-19. At the free throw line Holland made 13 of 17 and East, 14 of 24.

Tied four times in the first five minutes, Holland took the lead 10-9 on a De Neff layup nine seconds after East had held its lone lead of the game, 9-8 with 3:35 left in the first period.

Darrel Schuurman led Holland in the first quarter with four baskets, his only field goals of the game, as the Dutch pushed to a 21-15 first period lead. The end started with 6:28 remaining in the first half. Holland made nine straight baskets, including six layups in the next six minutes, and broke the game open.

During the rally, the Dutch were intercepting passes all over the floor and completely upsetting East's play. Piersma pointed out that it was the big men (Schuurman and Ken Thompson) who were coming up and stealing the East passes.

Previously this season the tall duo had been cautious about coming out and going after the ball. But they did against East and it was 43-19 before East knew what hit them. The Dutch ended the half, 47-26.

Holland pushed the margin to 30, 68-38 late in the third quarter. Pelon, Holland's most improved player, led the surge with four baskets and hit the basket to give the Dutch the 30-point bulge. Cal Beltman, working well off the fast break, scored the next basket as the period concluded, 70-44.

Piersma used subs the last quarter and they picked up 27 points in pushing the final spread to 39 points, the biggest bulge of the game.

Jim Thomas led the reserves with four baskets in the last eight minutes including a layup with three seconds left that set the record.

Beltman made 13 points, including four in the last five seconds of the first quarter on a basket and two free throws, while Thompson had 12, three baskets in the third period. Chuck Abbott hit 27 for East.

The victory evened Holland's record at 5-5 while the Pioneers are 5-3.

Holland Christian's basketball squad coasted to its 10th win of the season Friday night in the Civic Center by trimming Kalamazoo Loy Norrix, 72-49 before 2,000 fans.

Coach Art Tuls' club was in command all the way although it did not build up a whopping margin until the final period. Tuls substituted freely in both halves and used all 14 players with 11 breaking into the scoring column. Christian's final margin was its biggest in the contest.

The Maroons were not as sharp as they have been on other occasions this season although Tuls felt that his club adjusted well to a wide assortment of defenses thrown up by Loy Norrix coach Bill Stufberger. The Knights started out in a zone defense and used it for almost a half before adding a zone press. Then in the second half, the losers threw up a man to man defense topped off with a press. Meanwhile the Maroons used a pressing man to man defense all night long.

Tuls used a variety of combinations in the game with juniors playing a good share of the contest. He refused to single out any one performer but said that as a whole the club showed several spurts of top flight play. There were no complaints on the shooting as the locals collected 31 out of 69 tries for an excellent 45 per cent. In the second half the winners hit 55 per cent on 17 out of 31 attempts.

With Don Kronmeyer, who played less than a half, hitting from the corners and Tom Dykema and Tom Deur from the foul circle, the Maroons shot over the zone well in the first half. Then as the Knights switched their defense in the second half, the Maroons used center Jim Otte with good success.

The smaller Knights used strictly a patterned offense making sure of only the good percentage shots. They handled the ball well working on several screens to spring one of its guards loose for an easy layup. Besides scoring on several layups, guard Dick Snow, who led his club with 18 points, also shot well from out. Norrix, a class A school, plays in the Big Five conference and now has a 2-7 record.

The invaders jumped out to their only lead in the game at the outset as they took a 5-2 bulge. Christian then stole two quick passes in the backcourt to take a 7-6 lead and never trailed again. At the end of the slow moving opening stanza, Christian led 13-7.

Otte and Dykema each led the Christian attack with six markers in the time they played.

Norrix had the better of the foul shooting connecting on 17 out of 26 tries, while Christian only managed 10 out of 20. Otte led the Maroons with 15, followed by Kronmeyer and Dykema with 12 each.

PENSIONS

The pension program along with the social security continues to loom ever larger on the horizon. People are living longer and many of them find that they cannot live on their social security in view of the high cost of living today.

We are now at 7 1/4 per cent deduction for social security and in a few years the amount that will be deducted from the earnings of millions of people will amount to 5 per cent and 5 per cent from the employer.

Recently an age limit for members of Congress came up. House Speaker McCormack is 73. Senator Hayden of Arizona, president pro tempore of the Senate is reported to be 86 years of age.

There are many more people on both sides of the Congress that have more than reached the age of three score and ten. If we are to have a pension plan for these people then there should be some way that they will pay into the plan. All pension plans cost money and while there are many people who no doubt have some independent earning program, there is always the taxes that we all must pay in one way or another.

While we are on the subject of retirement and pensions we come to the problem of federal judges and when they reach 70, if they have served for 10 years, they may retire and be paid. If the program works for federal judges then why not think about a plan for the Congressman who serve long after they have reached 70.

We have many problems. We hear much about the budget and just how the cuts will be made. It would be fine if we could come up with some good way to run our government affairs from the township up through the Federal government like we who are charged with operating our own affairs. Just think of all of the things that would be possible. We are just dreaming because we the people are the ones that usually yell the loudest when some of the government services are curtailed.

We think that it is still possible. We the people are the ones that must ever keep working on the government waste. This is a fine time to think about writing to your elected officials. Many people are burning the midnight oil trying to fill out the many forms so that they can pay more taxes.

NO ROYAL ROAD

Scarcely a month goes by without the appearance of some scholarly article on the teaching of foreign languages. The latest innovation was the language laboratory. But now the great emphasis seems to be on getting the student into a foreign country to get his language. A semester, maybe two, and the whole matter should be brought to a successful conclusion. Maybe so, but somehow we can't be quite that optimistic. And we believe we do have some reason for our doubts.

Along with the articles on the teaching of foreign languages we also have those which struggle with the problem of dealing with the foreign student who comes to the college or university with little or no command of the English language. What does one do with him? From what we have observed few schools have made much progress with this problem, and it is not at all unusual to find such foreign students after a year in this country, still struggling to master enough English to understand a lecture. It seems that the educators ought to have a look at the experiment in learning a foreign language which is taking place right under their noses. This might be an opportunity to make some first-hand observations in a realistic laboratory.

In view of the problems we have at home, we are not so sure that a short time overseas will solve the problem of learn-

Zacchaeus and the Rich Young Ruler
Matthew 10:17-22
Luke 19:1-10

In times past there were unhappy rich people and there are a number of them today. The only way a rich person can be truly happy is to accept Jesus as Saviour and Lord. Some rich people realize this and other keep on disbelieving.

I. A good rich man needs Jesus Christ. One day a rich man approached Jesus with the question, "Good Master, what shall I do that I may inherit eternal life?"

The man was young and it was wonderful to see and he was also a ruler which meant that he had a position and prestige, and in addition he had wealth.

When he saw Jesus he ran to Him—he had enthusiasm and he knelt which revealed humility. The question he asked showed that he was interested in the serious things of life—he was not a play-boy.

The three gospels tell the story about this clean-cut young man who said to Jesus, who told him to keep the commandments, that he had kept them from his youth.

The young man addressed Jesus as, "Good Master." Jesus told him that there is but one that is good, that is God. Jesus suggested a fact to the young man which he did not grasp—the deity of Jesus. The young man said he had kept all the commandments.

Hope Leads Colleges In Doctorates Granted

Hope College leads the liberal arts colleges in Michigan in the number of doctorates granted graduates in the past 42 years, it was disclosed in a report recently released by the National Academy of Sciences' National Research Council.

The report, titled "Doctorate Production in United States Universities, 1920-1962" was made by Lindsey Harmon and Herbert Soldz of the Council.

As of last year Hope graduates had earned 218 doctoral degrees in the 42 year period which ranked Hope 11 among 25 leading colleges in the Midwest.

Following Hope's lead in Michigan were Kalamazoo College with 184 degrees; Calvin, 169; Albion 165.

Expansion Of Holland Park Okayed

90-Acre Tract Owned By Martin Michielsen; Study Other Property

The State Conservation Commission, meeting Friday in Lansing, voted to give the green light to the purchase of a 90-acre tract of land near Holland State Park which would make it "one of the foremost parks in the nation for recreation."

The commission voted to spend \$165,000 on additional land at Ottawa Beach and empowered the parks director to negotiate an option with Martin Michielsen, owner of the 90-acre tract. The purchase itself is contingent on acquiring funds from the state legislature.

The commission also is studying the possibility of purchasing other property at Ottawa Beach adjoining the Michielsen property and the 20-acre park site of the Michigan Park Association currently in litigation in the courts.

This additional area would provide good access to the present 43-acre park and eliminate the need for campers to use the public road to get to the beach. Other access would be over one of the highest dunes in the area.

State Rep. Riemer Van Til, R-Holland, told the commission Thursday that the park already has the top state revenues from the areas of concessions, park permits and camp permit sales.

"It attracted over a million visitors last year," Van Til said.

It was Van Til's proposal to study possibilities of purchasing additional land to provide a better integrated development for one of Michigan's most popular state parks. Plans call for using the Michielsen property, site of the old Ottawa Beach golf course, for additional camping area, and using a good share of present camping area for picnicking and use for non-camping visitors.

The Michielsen program also has 1,000 feet of frontage on Lake Macatawa, across the road from the main section. This site was used by the Red Cross for swimming lessons some years ago.

The Michielsen live in what formerly was the clubhouse for the golf course. They have several small cottages on the property which are rented by the week during the summer months.

Michielsen acquired the property in 1942 and has been living there since 1945.

Holland State Park Manager Lou Haney has stated that the present camping area is crowded to capacity each summer, and many, many persons have been turned away on busy weekends.

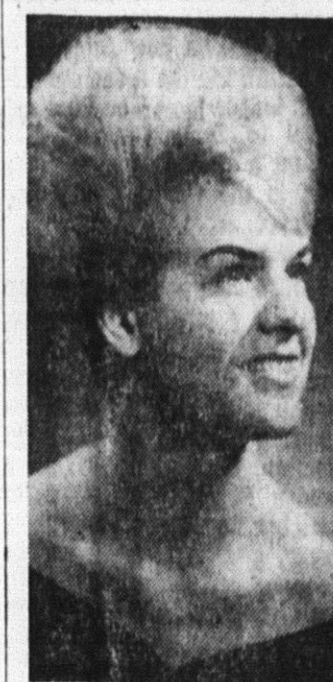

Hope for the second game in a row but time ran out on the Flying Dutchmen.

Behind by 17 points, 57-40 at halftime, Hope picked up in the second half behind the shooting of Ron Venhuizen and with 8:50 left went into the zone press.

The press was effective and Hope was able to intercept the ball often and succeeded in getting the shots. Hope ended making 21 of 40 from the floor in the second half for a fine 52 per cent but they missed key basket attempts that would have tied the score or put them in front.

The two points at the game's close was the closest the losers came in the game. The pattern of the full court zone press in the closing minutes and the big halftime deficit was similar to the game in Kalamazoo last Wednesday night when the Dutchmen chopped a 20-point margin to seven at the final horn.

Hope also had trouble shooting in the first half at Kalamazoo and the same was true Saturday as they hit 16 of 42 for 36 per cent. Hope ended with its best shooting in several games with 37 baskets in 82 tries for 45 per cent.

Venhuizen scored 21 points in the second half on eight baskets and five free shots. Half of his second half field goals were made while the press was on as he hit short jumpers and layups.

Capt. Glenn Van Wieren scored four baskets late in the game and Clare Van Wieren and Carl Walters each made three. Venhuizen led Hope with 26 while Glenn Van Wieren hit 21.

Coach Russ De Vette started 6'7" sophomore Roy Anker at center to compensate for Adrian's 6'8" Dick Seagert. Anker sank one basket and his replacement Bill Potter made nine points.

Also scoring in double figures for Hope were Walters with 15 and Clare Van Wieren with 11. Coach Greg Arbaugh's team provided him with all five starters getting 14 or more points.

Mark Garrett led with 20 and Seagert hit 19. Ron Stevens responded with 15 and the two guards John Hall and Don Numbers each had 14. The win gave Adrian a 5-7 season's mark.

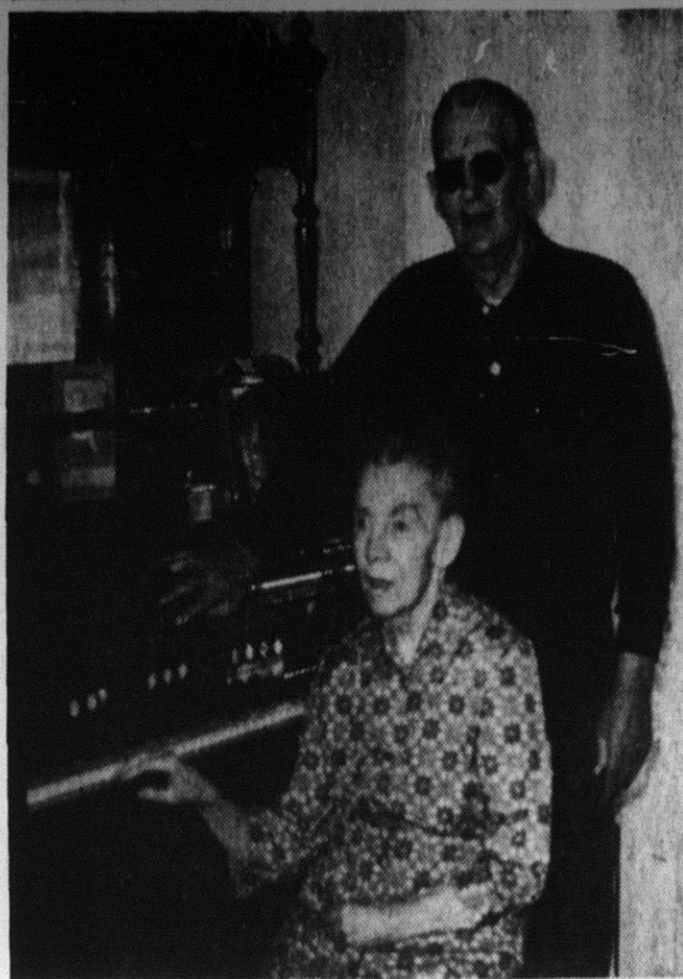

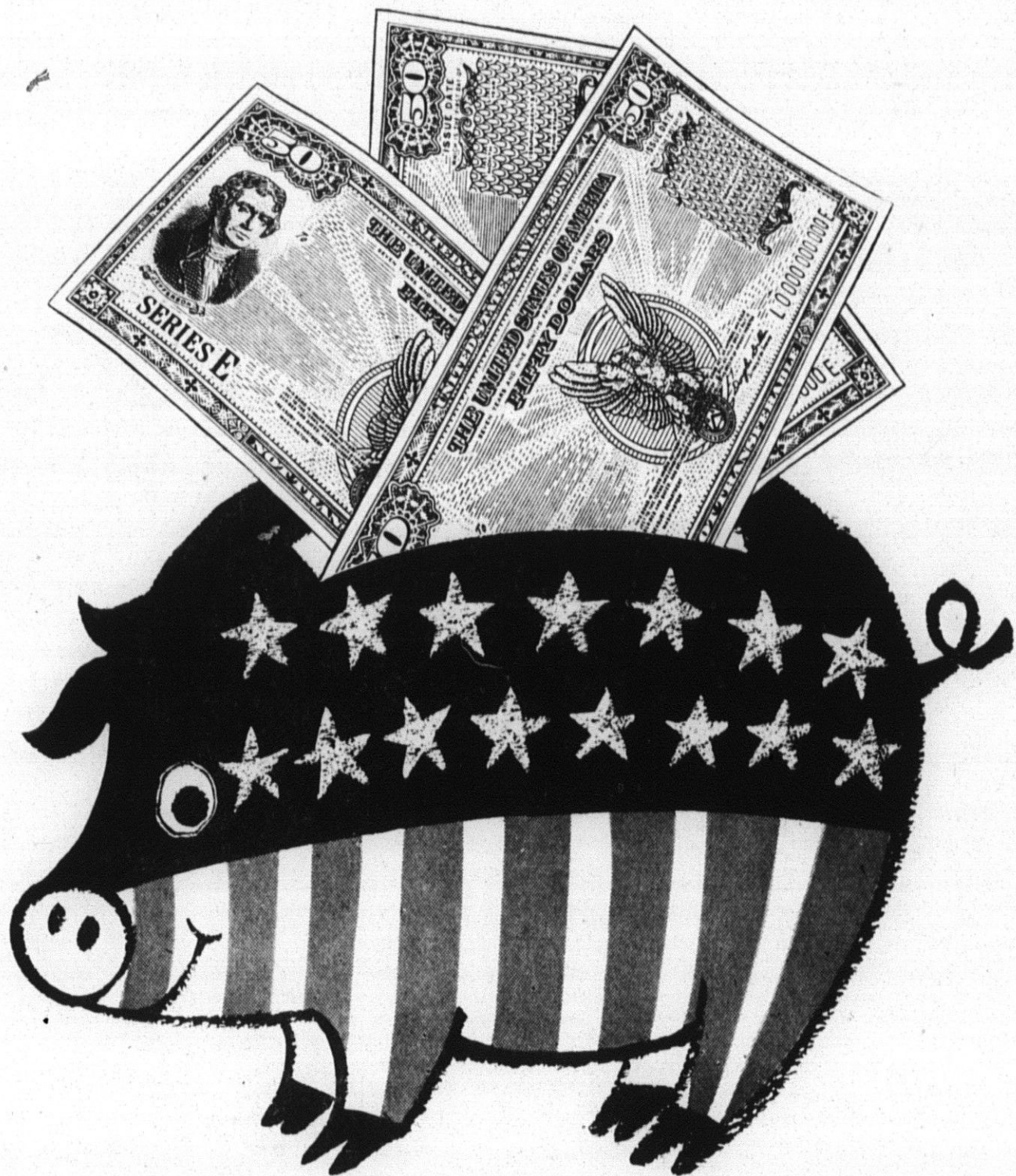

Aaron King Struck Down By Auto

A 23-year-old man was killed at 7:44 p.m. Friday when he was struck by a car on 32nd St. near Lugers Rd.

Aaron LeRoy King, of 867 West 32nd St., formerly of Pullman, was pronounced dead on arrival at Holland Hospital due to injuries received in the mishap. Examining physician was Dr. E. Vander Berg. The cause of death was listed as a skull fracture.

Holland police identified the driver of the car which struck King as Vernon E. Avery, 50, of 763 Park Ave.

Police said King had been walking east on 32nd St., with two youths when the accident occurred, about 200 yards east of Lugers Rd. King's two companions, Russell, 18, and Ivan Van Order, 13, both of 867 West 32nd St., were not injured in the mishap.

The three had been walking single file on the north side of the road facing westbound traffic. The older Van Order youth was at the front of the group, and King was walking at the rear, police said.

Avery was driving east on 32nd St. and was in the left lane of traffic, passing a second vehicle, when the accident occurred, police said.

Investigating officers said King was on the edge of the roadway when he was hit from behind by the left front fender of Avery's auto. Officers said Avery reported he did not see King until an instant before the accident occurred. There are no sidewalks along 32nd St. at this point.

King's body was taken to the Chappell Funeral Home in Fennville.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John King of Allegan; four brothers, Robert of Holland, Charles of Los Angeles, John of Pullman and Michael of Englewood, Calif.; four sisters, Mrs. Dave Webber of Knoxville, Tenn., Miss Mildred King of Allegan, Miss Pat King and Miss Wilma King of Bravo, and his grandmother, Mrs. Lilly King of Fennville.

Report Daily Progress On New Golf Course

Daily progress is being made on the golf course under construction six miles north of Holland on the southwest corner of old US-31 and Port Sheldon Rd.

Nine holes have been built and the fairways have been seeded according to Jerry Hertel of Grand Rapids, co-owner of the course with Ben Bonnema of Byron Center.

Hertel said plans call for the public fee course to be open between Memorial Day and July 4 this year. The course will not be open until there is sufficient turf, Hertel said. Plans call for the course to be open six days a week and closed Sundays.

Hertel, who is in the construction business, has an eight-man crew working daily on the course. Trees are being planted

and plans call for the planting of between 300 and 400 trees this winter.

Fronting on Port Sheldon Rd., the course will cover about 140 acres, Hertel said, and the cost of the course will be about \$100,000. A sprinkling system for watered fairways has been installed.

Plans also call for filling in a swampy area and constructing a clubhouse and a driving range. The course was designed by golf architect Bruce Mathews of Hess Lake.

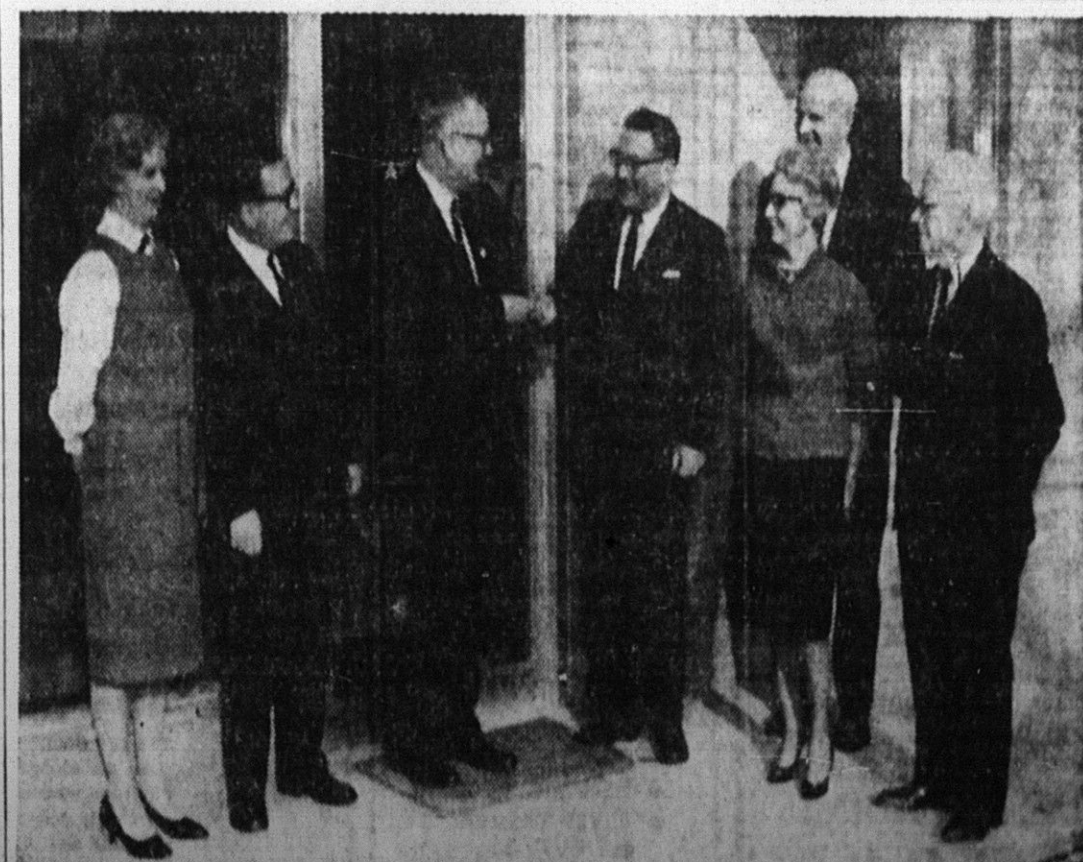
A mahogany "orderly" to make newspaper and magazine reading more pleasant, was a gift from the immediate family of the Mollemas.

West Ottawa Board Studies New Plans

Preliminary sketches of the four classroom addition and storage room for Lakewood School were presented by Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte at a regular meeting of the West Ottawa Board of Education Monday night.

Van Raalte also informed the board that plans for the new 14 classroom elementary school to be erected on James St. west of Division in the Edmeer subdivision will be ready for bids in six weeks.

High School Principal Duane Hooker said projected enrollment figures in the high school show 117 more students would be enrolled in the 10th through 12th grades next year, and said this increase would necessitate extra teachers. Supt. Van Raalte said the district has a low turnover of teachers but said the district would have to continue being competitive with its salary schedule to attract excellent teachers.

Louis Van Slooten said the transportation committee will have a detailed report ready this spring. The committee has been authorized to purchase a new 66-passenger bus for use on an additional route to be determined by the committee.

The board approved a custodial pay schedule starting at \$1.85 an hour ranging to \$2.20 per hour in the fifth year of employment, all based on a 40-hour week. Ten cents an hour will be added for night employment consisting of at least five hours of work between 6 p.m. and 8 a.m. If custodians are required to check buildings in addition to regular working hours such as on weekends and holidays, an extra \$100 annually will be paid for this service. Janitorial work which does not include the responsibility of custodial work will start at \$1.40 per hour with yearly increases.

New balcony bleachers in the gymnasium are expected to be installed by Feb. 15 in time for the class B basketball tournaments there the first week in March. Each balcony will seat in excess of 500 spectators.

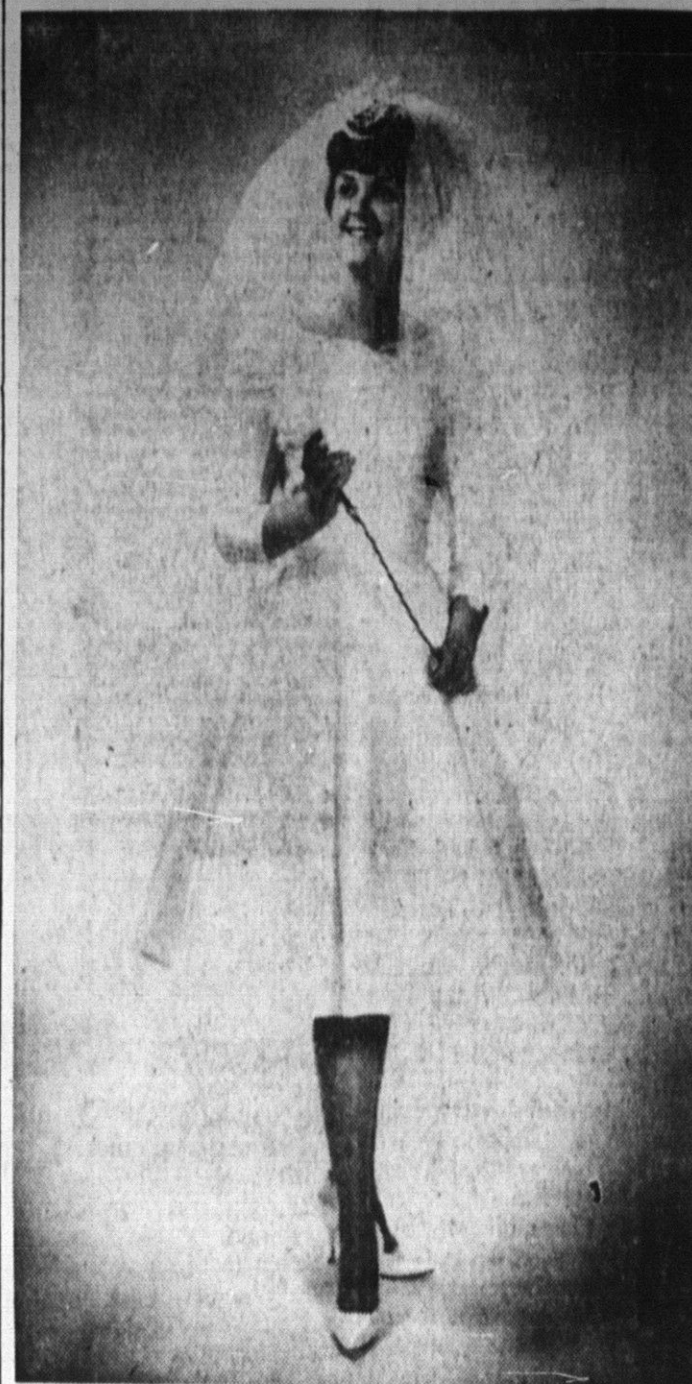
