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

Fair officials attended the Michigan Association of Fairs and Exhibitors Convention this week in Detroit and lined up the special events.

Two performances of the country and Western show will be held Saturday night, Aug. 7 and will be followed by a free aerial fireworks display which will climax the fair.

Dan Fleenor's Auto Thrill Show has been booked again this year for Monday, Aug. 2 and Priscilla Holbrook, Chicago organist, will appear at all grandstand shows.

Jimmy Shannon, "Mr. Sky King," will appear nightly Aug. 3-6 as an added attraction to the harness racing program. Shannon does his act atop a 125-foot high pole.

The Michigan Speed Horse Association will present speed horseback races from the starting gate on Saturday, Aug. 7. Daytime features will be Children's Day Wednesday, Aug. 4 and the 4-H horse show. Mule pulling is slated Thursday afternoon and a pony show will be held Friday. All daytime attractions are free grandstand shows.

Local Man, 43, Killed In Accident

GRAND RAPIDS — A Holland man was killed early Friday when the pickup truck he was driving followed a big semi truck through a bridge railing on I-96 and plunged into the Thornapple River, eight miles east of Grand Rapids.

The body of Raymond L. Heavener, 43, of 703 Apple Ave., Holland, was recovered from the river shortly before 10 a.m. The accident had occurred shortly after 6:30 a.m.

Kent County sheriff's officers said Heavener's truck skidded out of control as he was crossing the ice-covered bridge and plunged over the side of the bridge through a hole which had been ripped out a few minutes earlier when the semi crashed through the side into the water.

Driver of the semi, Charles Shipley, 36, of Maumee, Ohio, was able to crawl out of the cab and onto the ice to safety. He was taken to Blodgett Hospital for treatment of minor injuries.

Heavener's truck was the third vehicle to skid out of control on the bridge within a matter of minutes. Before Heavener's and Shipley's trucks crashed through the bridge railing, a car driven by Norbert Wrubel, 34, of Grand Rapids, had skidded out of control and sideswiped the bridge railing.

Wrubel was not hurt and started flagging down other vehicles approaching the bridge. Wrubel told authorities that while he was waiting for sheriff's men to come to the scene to investigate his accident, the two trucks had gone over the side of the bridge.

Wrubel said one large semi had started skidding but managed to get across the bridge. Shipley's truck jackknifed and crashed through the railing to the water below. A few minutes later, Heavener's pickup truck skidded through the hole in the railing left by Shipley's truck and plunged into the river.

Heavener is survived by his wife, Ila; five sons, Dale, a student at Michigan State University, Dennis, who is attending Allied Tech. Institute in Chicago, Craig, Keith and Glenn at home and his parents Mr. and Mrs. Huling C. Heavener of Marlington, West Virginia.

New Trees Transplanted In City Parks

In the midst of gusting winds and swirling snow, park department crews are transplanting several trees today in Centennial Park.

The trees replace those which have been felled by Dutch elm disease and storms. An electrical storm with winds up to 100 miles per hour struck Holland last June 9, downing trees, limbs and power lines throughout the city.

Four large trees were felled in Centennial Park, three split, and one left precariously leaning. One large tree was struck down in Kollen Park, falling across and damaging the pump house.

Superintendent of Parks and Cemeteries Jacob De Graaf said about 30 trees will be transplanted. Five have already been placed in Smalburg park, 10 are being planted in Centennial Park and 12 to 15 will be planted in Kollen Park. Most of the trees are sugar maples with a few black maples included, De Graaf said.

De Graaf said freezing weather is the best time to transplant the trees because the bulb of soil around their roots holds together better when frozen. In addition, he said, heavy trucks can cross the frozen park grounds without damaging or rutting the turf.

The superintendent said the plantings in Centennial Park will be completed today. The crews will probably move to Kollen Park Friday or Monday. The work should be completed within a week, De Graaf said.

An underground power line for the street lights in Centennial Park was cut Wednesday as a tractor-scoop dug a hole for one of the trees. Guy Bell, superintendent of utilities, said about 125 to 150 feet of the cable will have to be dug out and replaced because patching would not be permanent. He said the line would be spliced together temporarily, however, since weather prohibits digging out and replacing the line now.

Snow Damages BPW Automobile

Snow and ice cascading off the roof at the rear of City Hall Tuesday caused heavy damage to a Board of Public Works automobile parked near the building's rear entrance.

The miniature avalanche smashed the windshield and dented the top, hood and trunk of the car, used by electrical inspector Fred Kobes. Kobes was not in the car when the snow slide struck it. One piece of ice bounced off the car and broke a window in the meter room, located in a garage behind City Hall.

Custodians have put up signs warning pedestrians to watch out for ice and snow at the rear of the building.

Monthly meetings of the directors are held the first Thursday of each month and any member wishing to discuss conservation matters with the directors are invited to attend.

Doctor Awarded \$1,370 Against Holland Youths

GRAND HAVEN—Dr. Byron W. Goldberg, Grand Rapids osteopath who claimed he was assaulted and his car damaged May 30, 1963, at the Macatawa Park resort at Holland, was awarded a judgment of \$1,370.89 in Ottawa circuit court Wednesday.

The plaintiff had sought \$10,000 in damages from Lloyd A. Nyland and Robert C. Hobeck, Holland youths, who allegedly assaulted the doctor. The plaintiff claimed his clothes were ripped, he was treated for injuries and his car was damaged. The defendants must also pay \$40.75 costs.

Schools Set For Fluoride Program

Materials have been distributed among schools in Ottawa county for the summer sodium fluoride program, which consists of oral treatment to reduce decay in children's teeth.

According to Dr. Ralph Ten Have, director of the Ottawa County Health department, this program has been in operation in the county for 13 years. The program is for children in the second, fifth and eighth grades. Four and five-year-old pre-schoolers are eligible. Special cases referred by the family dentists also will be accepted. In Holland, headquarters will be in Washington School and for suburban areas in Montello Park School. Similar services will be set up in West Ottawa Junior High School and in Zeeland.

Last year, 4,208 children were treated in Ottawa county. Included were 789 in Holland and 635 in West Ottawa and Montello Park.

The entire procedure consists of four visits to the clinic. At the first visit, teeth are cleaned and the first application of sodium fluoride is given. On second, third and fourth appointments, the application is repeated.

Application cards properly filled out and the \$3 fee in each case must be returned to the various schools by Feb. 5 in order to set up organization procedures. Persons who did not receive the forms may obtain them by calling the Ottawa County Health department in Holland or Grand Haven or area chairmen.

Safety Story Appearing In Digest

The February Reader's Digest carries a story entitled "What Truckers Say About Your Driving," based on a questionnaire circulated among drivers of the Holland Motor Express here.

Condensed from "Changing Times," the Kiplinger Magazine, the three-page article lists the 11 most common errors of passenger car drivers, ending with the big three (1) failure to signal properly, (2) failure to dim lights and (3) close following or "tailgating" in truckers' language.

A story of the findings of the questionnaire originally ran in the Sentinel Dec. 23, 1964.

Other common errors by passenger car drivers are: ignoring stop signs, crossing the centerline, ignoring traffic lights, slow driving, ignoring yellow no-passing signs, drifting between lanes, excessive speed, failure to pass slow-moving cars.

In a special box are 12 suggestions for safer driving. They follow:

Always fasten your seat belt snugly.

Before driving a strange car, reset the seat and mirror, check the "feel" of the brakes and steering.

Always look for an "out," a place to steer toward if you get in a jam.

Dim the panel lights, and drive at least 10 miles an hour slower at night.

Keep the car moving at a reasonable speed, or get it off the road—completely and then some.

Anticipate stops and slow-downs; don't wait until you're out of adequate space.

In slowing, pump your brakes to flash your taillights.

When passing, wait before cutting back until you can see the passed car in your mirror.

On multi-lane roads, remember that the right-hand lane is likely to be more slippery than the passing lane, especially when wet, because of wear and oil-spatter.

If your windshield is dirty, so are your headlights; be sure the attendant cleans them when you stop for gas.

You pass the peak of your driving efficiency between your fifth and sixth hours at the wheel, near the end of their driving day, the pros always slow down and take it easy.

Never hesitate to yield the right of way, especially if the other driver is at fault. The best place for a faulty driver is out of your way.

Hope Professors Attend History Group Meeting

WASHINGTON — Hope College was well represented at the 79th annual meeting of the American Historical Association in Washington recently. Dr. Paul G. Fried and the Rev. David Clark, both of the college's history department, were joined at the meeting by John Drythout, Jack Elenbaas and Tom Flickema, all recent Hope graduates.

Dr. Donald Bruggink from Western Theological Seminary also attended the conference.

CHICAGO — Attorneys for three men convicted and fined Wednesday in a rare U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals decision said today they will appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court.

The appeals court sentenced P. T. Cheff, former president of the Holland Furnace Co., Holland, Mich., to six months in prison and fined two Holland employees, Richard J. Koerner and Alvin W. Klomprens, \$500 each.

The court also fined the Holland firm \$100,000 for engaging in "deceptive practices." (UPI erred Wednesday in stating the appeals court upheld the sentence and fine, whereas the court levied them that day.)

Attorneys for the three Holland men said they would review and analyze the court opinion before appealing. Motions for a new trial must be made within five days. The trio was released on bonds ranging from \$1,500 to \$2,500.

In Holland, Mich., today, Howard Plaggenmars, present president of the Holland Furnace Co., said company attorneys would seek a new hearing on the \$100,000 fine.

The case was the first of its kind ever heard by the Court of Appeals in Chicago — a criminal contempt prosecution of a firm charged with failing to follow the court's orders.

The appeals court acted against Holland Furnace and its directors for allegedly failing to follow a 1959 order to cease using sales techniques.

Acquitted of the charges were Mrs. Katherine Cheff, a director and principal stockholder of the company and the wife of the former president; Edgar P. Landwehr, Holland, a director and nephew of Mrs. Cheff; John Ames, Lake Forest, Ill., a director; Ralph Boalt, Winona, Minn., a director; Robert H. Trenkamp, Cleveland, general counsel for the company; George Spatta, Buchanan, Mich., a director; Henry Weyenbergh, Holland, chief engineer of the company, and Jay Wabeke, Grand Rapids, chief of the products service department.

The Federal Trade Commission in 1959 ruled the Holland firm was guilty of malpractice, and the company appealed to the Circuit Court of Appeals which upheld the FTC.

Later the FTC told the appeals court that the company was continuing certain malpractices in selling heating equipment and the court then ordered a "full dress" hearing with testimony from witnesses — the first time such a hearing was conducted in the court's history.

Such action gave the appeals court the right to impose sentence and fines on the defendants for failure to comply with the original order.

In closing remarks to the court last November, the principal government lawyer, Emerson K. Elkins of the FTC, said Holland salesmen violated the 1959 order and that "responsible officers" of the firm knew of the violations but took no action. Elkins cited 93 examples of alleged violations.

The hearing was before Judges Elmer J. Schackenberg who presided, and Roger J. Kiley and Luther Swygert.

\$60,000 Sought In Circuit Court

GRAND HAVEN — Essel Vanden Berg, Grand Haven, started a suit in Ottawa Circuit Court Tuesday seeking to recover \$60,000, plus real and personal property, he claims were bequeathed to him by a sister, Margaret Vanden Berg, former owner of the Grand Haven Electric Supply Co., who died at Grand Rapids June 28, 1963.

Plaintiff claims the deceased executed a will Feb. 18, 1963, and that the will is now being probated in Ottawa county.

Following the death of Miss Vanden Berg, the plaintiff claims Cora Marks presented the plaintiff with a bank draft for \$1,000, as his share in the estate.

The plaintiff asks that a temporary injunction be issued against Cora Marks, restraining her from disposing of any assets of Miss Vanden Berg, for whom Cora Marks acted as trustee.

David Mc Laughlin Dies At Nursing Home at 84

David Mc Laughlin, 84, of 326½ West 13th St., died Wednesday evening at Birchwood Manor Nursing Home where he had been a patient for the past three months. Mr. Mc Laughlin had been a Holland resident for the past 14 years.

Surviving are two sons, Ralph and Donald Mc Laughlin, both of Rock Island, Ill.

Dr. E. Fell Begins Work As Medical Missionary

An internationally renowned cardiac surgeon and 1927 Hope College graduate Dr. Egbert Fell, last week flew with his wife, Florence, to Kuwait, Arabia, where they will serve as medical missionaries.

Dr. Fell will replace his fellow Hope alumnus, Dr. Lewis R. Scudder, who was surgeon and medical missionary to the Kuwait hospital until September of 1964 when he received a severe blow on the head and within a short period of time lost control of the left side of his body. Strapped to a stretcher and near death, Scudder was flown to Chicago's Presbyterian-St. Luke Hospital, where he was treated.

The reunion of the two surgeons was momentous and Scudder so interested his friend in the problems of Kuwait and his hospital that Fell promptly announced he would take Scudder's place as soon as possible.

Fell's wife will assist him as his registered nurse.

Following his graduation from Hope College, Dr. Fell studied medicine at the University of Chicago, serving his internship at Presbyterian Hospital. He assisted Dr. Kellogg Speed and Dr. Edwin Miller, both surgeons at Presbyterian. During World War II he served in the medical corps and attained the rank of lieutenant colonel.

So grateful for Dr. Fell's skill as a surgeon, one of his patients in 1954 presented him with a gift of \$50.00, which was used to buy diagnostic equipment for cardiac patients.

After trips to Scotland and The Netherlands to investigate "oxygen therapy under high pressure", he returned to the University of Chicago to accept an award for "outstanding contributions to medicine."

Fell is the father of three children, a daughter Jane Fell Pitner and two "doctor" sons, Jack and Tom.

Scudder was born in India

and was graduated from Hope College in 1931. After his medical training, completed at the Rush Medical School, now a part of the University of Chicago, he started his mission work in 1937 in Kuwait, and has almost continuously served there until his recent illness.

Dr. Scudder is now in Holland recuperating, but with a hospital treating nearly 400 cases per day awaiting his attention, he is looking forward to his return to Kuwait in September, when he will join his colleague Fell in the missionary hospital field.

Scudder's grandfather, father, brother and sister served as medical missionaries before him.

Scudder has two children both graduates of Hope College, Lewis in 1963 and Marilyn in 1961.





Little Damage Is Reported In Local Area

Traffic was down to a minimum Saturday as local residents eyed sleet-covered streets and ice-covered cars with cautious concern.

And those motorists driving cars from protected garages soon faced the problem of fine rain freezing on windshields. Eighth St. had more than its share of parked cars shortly before 8 a.m. with drivers patiently waiting for defrosters to warm up and function at maximum efficiency.

Ice covered wires and icy branches—that combination that causes utility men to shudder—were everywhere, but there were relatively few interruptions.

One occurred south of Holland about 6 a.m. when a wire snapped cutting off electrical service for an area east of the Blue Star Highway (old US-31). This area included the transmitter of radio station WJBL which was off the air until 9:30 a.m. Service was restored about 9 a.m. but it took a half hour to condition the equipment. The station was able to transmit from its FM station north of Holland.

Weather Observer Lynn Wheaton, a member of the WJBL staff, was headed for the studio about 6 a.m. when an overhead electrical wire snapped falling not far from his car, likely the wire that cut off service in the area.

Grand Haven was covered with six inches of snow.

A total of 1.65 inches of precipitation fell Friday and Saturday. Up to 5 p.m. Friday, it measured .7 inch. Since then .95 inch fell in the form of rain, sleet and snow. The snow was described as the "corn" variety — a crystalline texture which slithers rather than packs. Had the precipitation been in the form of common snow, depths would have been well over 10 inches.

Consumers Power office in Grand Rapids which services some local areas was first informed of the interruption south of Holland at 6:30 a.m. There were a few scattered calls from Borculo area, believed caused in a transformer. All service was restored by 9 a.m.

The Holland Board of Public Works received no trouble calls Saturday and the local telephone office only a few scattered calls. General Telephone Co. in Muskegon received very few trouble calls and regarded service as close to normal.

Muskegon received snow rather than sleet. There were a few phone interruptions in Coopersville which received more sleet than snow.

Some areas in the southern part of the state appeared to be harder hit than the local area. Grand Rapids was hit by heavy rain about 9:30 a.m. Saturday when Holland was receiving only light rain and sleet.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday School Lesson for Sunday, Jan. 31
Rejection or Acceptance
Matthew 11:20-30
By C. P. Dame

When Jesus was upon the earth he was accepted by some while others rejected him. Today some accept him as their Saviour and Lord while others refuse to acknowledge him at all.

I. The most privileged are the most responsible. Jesus compares three Jewish cities in which he had done mighty works with three pagan cities. The three Jewish cities had seen the Lord's mighty works but they had not repented. Chorazin is mentioned nowhere else in the New Testament, Bethsaida was the home of Peter, Andrew and Philip, and in Capernaum Jesus lived for a time. Jesus says that if his mighty works had been done in Tyre and Sidon, they would have repented and if they had been done in wicked Sodom it would have remained. The Lord points out that it will be more tolerable in the day of judgment for Tyre and Sidon and Sodom than for these Jewish cities which were highly favored.

What do these severe words mean to us? These Jewish cities were indifferent to Jesus. Today many people are indifferent to our Lord. Many do not attack him, nor do they just slight him. Indifference to Jesus is a grievous sin and will be punished. We are highly privileged and therefore have a great responsibility. Are we conscious of it?

II. God is interested in the immature. Jesus was thankful to God since he had had truths from the wise and prudent, the intellectuals who are sophisticated, and revealed them to babes — those who are eager to learn. Those who are consciously ignorant are the first to learn.

Jesus was ever ready to assert his power and claims. Observe that Jesus says that "no man knoweth the Son but the Father; neither knoweth any man the Father, save the Son, and he to whomsoever the Son will reveal him." Those who reject Jesus do not know God. This may sound narrow but this is the teaching of the New Testament.

III. The Lord promises rest to the weary. In a winsome invitation Jesus invites these who labour and are heavy laden to come to him. Note the three steps in this invitation. First, Jesus says, "Come," and then, "Take my yoke," and next, "Learn of me." We must come to Jesus, submit to Him, and then learn from Him, be teachable.

The rest Jesus promises is freedom from the petty demands of the Law. Jesus claims that His yoke is easy and his burden light for it is carried in love since it is given in love. How necessary it is to learn of Jesus for He can teach us about life and its meaning and purpose. By accepting the Lord's winsome invitation people find rest. Millions can testify to this fact. Those who have not accepted this invitation are strongly urged to do so now.

Zeeland Falls, 57-52 To Panthers

West Ottawa's basketball team dimmed any hopes Zeeland had for the conference title this season as they handed the Chix their second conference defeat 57-52 at the West Ottawa gym Friday night before 1,700 fans.

Coach Jack Bonham knew he would have to stop the high scoring Zeeland quintet so he concentrated on defense this week in practice. His strategy worked as the Panthers held the Chix to 52 points, considerably below their 75 point per game average.

The game was tied twice when the Chix rallied midway in the third quarter to knot the score at 35-35 and 37-37. To many of the West Ottawa fans it looked like a repeat of the last two games when the Panthers have turned cold in the third quarter and watch leads slip away. But the Panthers were not to be

denied as they fought back to a 45-37 third quarter lead.

Zeeland scored first on a set shot by Bob Essink to take a 2-0 lead. Dave Costello then hit on a shot from the corner to build their lead to 4-0. West Ottawa fought back on baskets by Dave Farabee, Bruce Van Huis and Paul Busscher to tie the score at 6-6. Arvin Visser then hit a shot from the side to give the Panthers an 8-6 lead and they were never behind after this.

The Panthers quickly caught fire and built up a 17-7 lead with about two minutes left in the quarter. Farabee added two free throws and Lloyd Schout hit an outcourt shot to make the score 19-9. Essink was fouled at the horn and added a free shot to make the score 19-10 at the end of the first quarter.

Schout, Zeeland's fine guard, found the range in the second quarter and scored four quick points to cut West Ottawa's lead to five points. Zeeland kept cutting the lead until with 3:55 left in the quarter West Ottawa was clinging to a slim 23-22 lead. This was as close as Zeeland could get as West Ottawa pulled away to a 31-26 halftime lead on some fine foul shooting by Dale Boeve and Dave Vizithum. Zeeland was not to be denied and fought back again in the third quarter until they had tied the score at 35-35. Van Huis hit a shot from the key to make it 37-35 but Mark Engle countered with a long set shot to knot the score at 37-37. The teams moved down the floor and Vizithum hit on a long outcourt shot.

Both teams showed the pressure that was building as shots were missed and neither team scored for the next two minutes. With 2:28 left in the quarter things began to happen. Van Huis added a free throw, Farabee hit on a short jump shot from the baseline, Vizithum stole the ball for a driving lay-up, and Farabee made a free shot to give the Panthers a 45-37 lead at the end of the third quarter.

In the fourth quarter Zeeland would cut the Panther lead to three or four points and then watch it increase as the Panthers would hit from the charity line. The Panthers made only two baskets from the floor in the fourth quarter. The first of the two came with 2:12 left in the game on a jump shot by Vizithum. The other was with 32 seconds left when Visser tipped in a basket after a free shot had been missed. However, the Panthers had some timely free throw shooting as Busscher made three for four, Vizithum two for two, and Boeve two for two.


Essink led Zeeland in the fourth quarter with a fine job of rebounding and scoring six points before he fouled out late in the quarter. Schout added a basket and made three out of three foul shots but it was not enough as the Panthers held on to win 57-52.

From the floor Zeeland had quarters of 3-14, 6-15, 5-17, 6-14 for 33 per cent while West Ottawa had quarters of 8-15, 4-12, 6-9, 2-10 for 43 per cent. Both teams made 20 shots from the floor but West Ottawa had 17 out of 34 free throws in comparison to 12 out of 16 for Zeeland.

Schout, who has been averaging 21 points a game, led all scorers with 19 while Essink had 13. Van Huis, who has been averaging 18 points a game, had 18 and Vizithum 10.

The Panthers are 4-5 overall and 1-3 in the league while Zeeland is 4-4 overall and 2-2 in the league. West Ottawa will host league leading Godwin next Friday.

AAUW Hears Talks About Juvenile Work

"Holland's juvenile crime rate is at present below average for a town of its size," was one of the statements Roger MacLeod made in his talk to members of the Holland Branch of the American Association of University Women at their meeting Thursday evening in Durfee Hall. "However," Mr. MacLeod continued, "this is not likely to be true long unless adults become more aware of, and involved in, juvenile problems."

Introduced by Mrs. John Bender, area representative for community problems, Mr. MacLeod, Chairman of the Jaycee committee on juvenile attitudes, and Les Van Beveren, juvenile officer of the Holland Police department, discussed "Juvenile Attitudes Toward the Law."

Mr. MacLeod told how the Jaycees and the Holland City Council joined in a study to discover what juvenile problems were the greatest in the Holland area. He said that the study is not now complete, but will be as soon as the punch card and computer work can be done.

The committee found besides the low crime rate that there are professional people helping with juvenile problems in the area, that the illegitimate birth rate is low, the school drop-out rate is low, the use of narcotics is nil and that there are no known organized gangs.

Mr. Van Beveren explained his duties as juvenile officer to the group. He works with all children under 16 who come to the attention of the police department. He emphasized that the work of the juvenile department is detection, prevention and rehabilitation.

Mr. Van Beveren also showed a collection of weapons taken from juveniles in this area.

Maroons Win Sixth Game This Season

KALAMAZOO — Holland Christian's basketball team scored 33 points in the first quarter here Friday night and then coasted to a convincing 76-53 win over Kalamazoo Loy Norrix before a slim crowd of 500 fans.

Coach Art Tuls' quintet was a great ball club in the opening period as it raced to its sixth win of the season and its fourth in a row. Featuring precision passing and 63 per cent shooting in the opening stanza the Maroons completely overwhelmed the shaky Knights. Consequently the losers were never in the ball game after the first couple of minutes.

Tuls began substituting in the second period and finished both the first half and the game with completely new units. Of the regulars only Tom Deur and Paul Steggerda played three quarters with the other three starters playing slightly more than a half.

For the night's work, the Maroons shot an even 50 per cent on 34-68 tries. Holland had 20 out of 28 in the first half and 14 out of 28 in the last two periods. Rebounding was also a big factor as the Maroons pulled down 52 compared to 21 for the Knights. Although only playing a half, Harold Alferink led with 13 rebounds, while Steggerda had 11 and Tom Wedeven nine. Center Bill McKinney, 6'6", junior led the Knights on the boards. Besides playing a fine board game, Wedeven also led both clubs in scoring with 20 points, during the two and a half quarters that he played. Four Maroons finished in double figures.

Christian's Tom Deur and Larry Klaasen, both clever guards, turned in five games with their harrassing tactics on defense, and fine offensive maneuvers. Klaasen served as the trigger man on the fast break as the Maroons almost ran the Knights out of the gym in the first and third quarters. Sophomore Charlie Fisher was the standout performer for the losers. He handled the ball handling chores and repeatedly set the play for the Knights. In addition he threw in 12 markers for the losing cause.

All five starters scored in the whirlwind opening period for the Maroons, with Wedeven leading the way with 12 points, followed by Klaasen with 10 and Deur with six. With just two minutes gone, Holland led 11-5, giving plenty of indication of what was to follow. Christian upped the margin with 10 straight markers and led 25-8 at the 1:35 mark. A couple of interceptions and a pair of fast breaks gave the Maroons a 33-13 bulge at the horn. Holland hit 14 of 22 in the period.

Christian's scoring machine slowed to a walk in the second period as Coach Bill Stuijbergen's crew went into a 1-3-1 zone defense. Rather than forcing poor shots with the big lead, the Maroons played control ball looking only for the good shots. At 4:53 Christian led 42-15 and was content to just control the play. Reserves finished the play for the Maroons to end the half with a 46-25 lead.

Norrix came out with a zone press to start the second half. The Maroons promptly solved it and scored eight quick points before the losers could find the range. Deur and Wedeven each tallied six in a hurry as the Maroons unleashed their best running attack of the season. Only Stan Oakleaf of the losers could find the range for the Knights as they trailed 66-33 at the end of the third stanza.

Both clubs played on even terms for the first minutes of the last period before Tuls cleared his bench giving the entire 13-player squad a chance to perform. The Knights behind Mark De Young's 11 points in the period took advantage of the inexperience of the Maroon

subs to pad their margin considerably in the closing stages. Christian hight eight out of 16 at the charity stripe while Norrix had nine out of 23. Deur was second high for the Maroons with 16 points while De Young led the losers with 14.

Ottawa County Farm News

We've had several telephone calls this week regarding scale insects on flowering crabapple trees. Scale on most ornamentals can be controlled by using a dormant oil. There are a number of different scales, such as oyster shell, San Jose and lecanium. It is not possible to use oil on all types of ornamental shrubs and trees, as some are damaged by use of oil.

It might be well to know which ones are subject to damage. We might state that maple is one that will not tolerate oil, however on those that do not tolerate oil scale can be controlled by using malathion on following schedule: the second week in May; the second week in June; and on July 1. Or, malathion can be used any time the crawlers hatch. Caution should be used in the use of oil in that it should be done on a bright, sunny day and the material should have a chance to dry before freezing temperatures exist.

One other pest it is well to be prepared for is the maple bladder gall mite which causes a wort-like condition to appear on the maple tree leaves. Galls are caused by the sting of the mite. Dormant spray can be applied before the buds open. Malathion used on a warm day by spraying the trunk and area around the tree, will help control the increase of bladder gall.

An interesting notice has been received from the Department of Agriculture regarding the lagoons used for waste manure disposal for hogs and poultry. The article stated that even though odors may be bad, they are an indication of a rich field of protein waiting to be harvested. Researchers have found in laboratory analysis of algae that grows profusely in lagoons contains 4 per cent crude protein and 2.5 per cent crude fat.

A 1.75 acre lagoon serving 500 hogs or 15,000 laying hens will yield from 400 to 1,750 pounds dry weight of algae per day under average conditions at a cost of one to ten cents per pound. The rate of this protein production in lagoons ranges from 10 to 100 times that of conventional agriculture.

Soybeans yield up to one ton of protein per acre per year and some types of algae may yield an average 12 tons of protein per acre per year. It would be interesting to follow this research work. This material is already being fed. Hogs will readily eat a ration containing 10 per cent algae and sheep will eat a pellet ration containing 50 per cent algae and 50 per cent alfalfa hay.

About 100 persons gathered in the Tulp Room of Hotel Warm Friend Thursday night to welcome the new general secretary of the Holland-Zeeland YMCA, L. Eugene Emerson, and Mrs. Emerson, to Holland.

Paul Goebel of Grand Rapids, a member of the YMCA International World Service committee, outlined YMCA services all over the world. This program which is directed by a committee of U. S. and Canadian business and community leaders, started in 1889. Its original purpose was to launch new "Y" branches overseas, but more recently it has placed more emphasis on "work-help" projects aimed at improving economic and social conditions.

For instance, Goebel said in India local "Y" officials selected 12 Tibetans from 10,000 who had fled their Communist-ruled native land and were interned in refugee camps. The 12 were trained in animal husbandry and fish breeding; they then set up schools at the camps to pass their new knowledge on to other refugees. "Many more Tibetans are surviving as a result of this school," he said.

Since 1960 the World Service Program has been sponsoring summer "work camps" where North American and foreign college students cooperate in building facilities needed by foreign communities. More than 100 North American students have been involved in nine work camps in eight countries to date.

World Service is far older than the Peace Corps and in some cases has been able to aid the Peace Corps through the benefit of its experience, Goebel said.



Views From The Campus

Dr. Adrian J. Klaasen came to Hope College as a part-time professor in 1947, and has been teaching full-time since. He holds an A.M. degree from Michigan State and received his Ph.D. degree in 1961. Klaasen has published several books on marketing, advertising, and economics and is a member of the American Marketing Association and the American Economic Association.

We live in an affluent society. In 1963 the Gross National Product per-capita in the United States was \$2,820, or more than \$7,000 per year per family. In contrast to this, the most affluent nation in Europe had a per-



capita GNP of only \$1,700 and several European countries had averages of less than \$1,000 per-capita. But the United States and parts of Europe stand out in sharp contrast to over two-thirds of the world's population where per-capita incomes are less than \$200 per year. For these 2,000,000,000 people, poverty and misery continue to be inevitable in the foreseeable future.

Whereas our life expectancy is 70 years, the life expectancy of those 2,000,000,000 people is less than 40 years. We are a privileged minority enjoying a fantastically luxurious level of living in a world comprised largely of people who are hungry. They have failed to solve the basic economic problem of subsistence.

How should we react to this knowledge? Should we have a guilty conscience? Should we be embarrassed? Was Arnold Toynbee right when he admonished us to "transfer our spending power from the needs we do not have, to the other half of the world to be used for needs they do have?"

World unrest makes it clear that these large disparities of well-being cannot be ignored. Three suggestions seem relevant.

First, instead of creating a guilt complex regarding our affluence, we ought to feel a great sense of achievement in having solved for all practical purposes the economic problem of filling insatiable wants from limited resources. Secondly, we should study and understand the economic system that made this possible. Thirdly, we should mount a massive campaign to help all peoples of the earth to achieve a similarly high level of productivity and well-being.

From the dawn of history man has been faced with the task of grubbing a subsistence from a parsimonious mother nature. It was recognized early that individual effort was less effective than organized effort. From the time of the cave man to the eighteenth century men were organized either on the basis of tradition or by some authoritarian power. Under these forms of organization only a very small percentage of the group was able to enjoy more than a subsistence level of existence.

The Christian church contributed to the enlightenment which led to a new form of organization, the market system. After centuries during which religious doctrine was "other-world" oriented, St. Ignatius among the Catholics and Luther and Calvin among the Protestants broke down the notion that trade was evil, that work was a form of punishment, and that to accumulate was a sin.

Adam Smith and the rest of the classical economists were quick to point out how man's self interest, acquisitiveness, and self-reliance could be used to solve the problem of scarcity if the market place were left free to respond to price signals. The ethic which attributed to man qualities of individual responsibility and self-reliance and which endorsed the qualities of thriftiness, ambition, and industriousness, while condemning laziness and irresponsibility, created a milieu which was congenial to the ideas of the classical economists.

Today the nations of the world are experiencing a degree of affluence which bears a close relationship to the extent to which each has permitted the ideas of the classical economists

to prevail. It is this discovery, recently confirmed by historical fact, which provides us with the key to solving mankind's most persistent problem — that of scarcity.

To turn this discovery to account for the benefit of all humanity, requires that every beneficiary of such an economic system learn in detail its rationale, its assumptions, and its values as an organizing force. This we have not done.

Ex-Secretary of Commerce, Luther Hodges, in a recent issue of the Saturday Evening Post refers to us as a nation of "economic boobs." Less than 15% of our high school teachers have ever been exposed to a single course in economics and the average college graduate is completely incapable of describing or defending the economic system which has in a large measure made his college education possible.

Having recognized that our affluence is traceable to the efficiency of our economic system, and having then studied the mechanics of this system, it remains the task of our society to disseminate this knowledge so that all peoples may improve their own well-being through increased productivity. A general understanding of our economic system is a pre-requisite to the removal of political barriers, both here and abroad, which often preclude others from enjoying the material blessings which a market-directed economic system can bring to all.

We return to our original question.

Should our affluence fill us with guilt and fear?

No. As an alternate to a policy of nationalism and protection, of production restriction price fixing, of substituting economic isolation for international exchange, we should show the world how to make everyone better off by producing enough for all. Our affluence can be used as an example of how free enterprise can solve the world's problem of poverty.

When they needed it most Hope's basketball team got help from its bench for a come-from-behind 73-70 win over Concordia College of River Forest, Ill., in the Civic Center Saturday before 1,600 fans.

The Flying Dutchmen, playing without Floyd Brady, needed all the help they could get in coming back from a 13-point deficit in the second half. Brady, the second leading scorer and top rebounder for Hope, was confined to the clinic last week with acute tonsillitis.

Concordia which had won nine straight going into Saturday's game opened up a 63-50 lead with about 12 minutes left in the game. Then Hope hit for six straight points.

The Cougars called time out at 10:14, and came back with a revolving offense designed to slow up the game and draw fouls.

It was then that the Hope bench came through to help the regulars bust open the slowing attack. Guard Dave Bruininks, center Jim Poppink and forward Chris Buys helped the regulars hustle after the Cougar players.

Hope took the ball away from Concordia several times, and forced the Cougars to make mistakes. With the score 65-56 Hope got six straight points on a basket by Poppink and two buckets by Bruininks.

At 3:50, Chris Buys came through with a 20-foot jump shot to bring Hope within two points at 68-66. After the Cougars were caught palming the ball, Buys came back with another jumper from about the same spot to tie the score at 68-68 at 3:30 left in the game.

Concordia stuck with their revolving offense, and worked for the last shot. Bruininks then stole the ball.

Hope took time out, and came back with a slowed-down attack of their own. With :51 left guard Don Kronmeyer drove in for a layup. The basket was good, and Kronmeyer was fouled. He sunk the free throw to put Hope ahead 71-68.

Buys sank two of four free throws in the closing seconds to ice the game for Hope.

Hope was led by freshman guard Kronmeyer who played his finest game this season. Kronmeyer sank 21 points, set up several baskets and was instrumental in breaking up the Cougars' slowing attack. He started his second game after being promoted back to the varsity Jan. 14.

Hope Coach Russ De Vette credited center Roy Anker with making a key defensive play. The lanky center blocked a Concordia shot in the closing minutes of the game giving Hope incentive to go ahead.

The first half was a see-saw battle with the score tied seven times. Both teams were cold from the floor.

The Cougars coached by Thomas Faszholz, used a tough man-to-man press at three-quarter and full court part of the game to upset the Hope attack. Hope used both a man-to-man and matchup zone defenses.

County Group Studies Plans On Poverty

GRAND HAVEN — The Ottawa County committee organized under the Federal Economic Opportunity act Monday discussed possible programs for the county at a meeting in the Grand Haven county building.

Jacobs said the EOA was established to set up new areas of aid, not to duplicate present agencies. He pointed out there are more jobs available in Michigan than there are unemployed persons. The problem, he said, is lack of skills and training among the unemployed.

Kennedy said the expanded county committee will meet again within a few weeks to discuss in detail the type of program best suited to the needs in the county.

The meeting will be held on the Grand Valley College campus.
