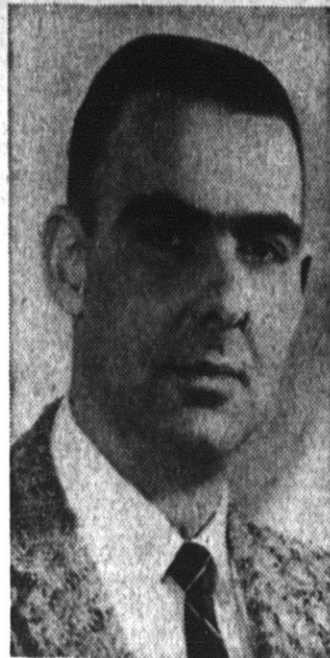

Two Men Under Consideration As Police Chief

City Manager Herb Holt said Tuesday that the International Association of Chiefs of Police have recommended two men, a Holland police officer and the Grand Haven police chief, as "excellent police chief material for the city of Holland."

Emerging out of a field of 13 who took a battery of written tests and oral interviews are Leslie Van Beveren, 34, who has been with the Holland police department for 2½ years, and Richard Klempel, 41, police chief of Grand Haven.

Holt said he would consult City Councilmen and arrange further interviews with the two men before coming to a decision some time in February.

The new chief will succeed Jacob Van Hoff, long-time police chief of Holland who announced last September that he will be retiring. After the new chief takes over, Van Hoff will be retained as consultant for the police department for a two-year period.

After Van Hoff announced he was retiring, Holt arranged for the International Chiefs of Police Association to conduct tests and process applications for the post. A 6½-hour written exam was conducted for 13 applicants Jan. 11 in Civic Center, administered by John E. Ingersoll, director of field operations division.

The next day, Ingersoll along with Police Chief Stanley Scharfel of Cincinnati, Ohio, and Police Chief William Smith of Syracuse, N.Y., conducted oral interviews.

Recommendations were received by the city manager late Monday.

Van Beveren, a native of Chi-

cago, started work as a special policeman with the Holland police department in the spring of 1963. He became the department's first juvenile officer in December, 1964, when the position was created by City Council.

Van Beveren graduated from Lindbloom High School in Chicago in 1948, spent four years with the U.S. Marine Corps spending some time in the Mediterranean and the Caribbean areas. In 1952 he took a position as administrator in the engineering department of General Motors in LaGrange, Ill., working there for eight years.

He attended Chicago Teachers College for one semester in 1960 and then entered Hepe College in February, 1961, graduating in June, 1964, with an A.B. degree. He married the former Carol Staat in 1952. The Van Beverens have three children, Lynn, 12, Teri, 9, and Leslie Jr., 7.

Klempel, a native of Grand Haven, has been with the Grand Haven police department for 19 years, serving the last 10 as chief.

Klempel is married and has six children aged 4 through 14. He is a graduate of Grand Haven High School. He spent 3½ years with the U.S. Army, spending 18 months overseas with the 32nd Red Arrow Division in the Philippines. He was wounded in action and holds the Purple Heart. He emerged from service in 1946 as a lieutenant.

"I'm not displeased with my present position, but I feel the city of Holland offers both advancement and challenge," Klempel said.

Blustery Cold Hits Local Area

It was a blustery, cold day today with temperatures near zero and cutting winds with blinding snow squalls.

Any prospect for improvement was dim, and predictions called for an additional 2 to 5 inches of snow by evening, and a slump in temperatures tonight of zero to -12.

The official low overnight was 6 degrees. The official reading at 11 a.m. was 5 degrees, but unofficially it was 2 downtown. Between 2 and 3 inches of snow fell, putting ground deposits at 9 inches.

The Holland Coast Guard station clocked winds at 10 mph. at midnight, 22 mph. at 4 a.m. and some guests at 35 mph. at 8 a.m.

The combination of low temperatures and cutting winds produces an effect far colder than the temperature indicates.

For instance, a 10-degree reading coupled with a 20-mile wind is equivalent to -25 degrees. The combination of zero and a 20-mile wind is equivalent to -39, weather officials in Grand Rapids said.

Some people may thrive on the cold, but outside activity today in Holland was at a minimum. Those who braved the elements dressed accordingly and school children dawdled far less than usual on their way to and from schools.

East Holland and Benheim schools were closed today. In Hudsonville, all public and Christian schools closed at 12:25 p.m. for the day.

The outlook for Friday was continued cold with diminishing winds and occasional snow flurries.

Allegan Hires Manager for City Airport

ALLEGAN — Allegan City Council has engaged A. J. Noble Jr. of Fennville as operator-manager of Padgham field, Allegan's newly expanded and modernized airport, effective Feb. 1. Arrangements call for Noble to be answerable only to City Council and primarily to City Manager Kenneth Bollinger. A five-year agreement is being drawn up with option to renew for 10 years.

The airport manager's salary of \$300 per month for the first six months will be drawn from surplus airport funds. Thereafter it will be based on net airport income on a sliding scale.

Noble said he plans gradually to "phase out" his Fennville operation, transferring some clients to Allegan.

A certified flight instructor, Noble currently operates his own airport near Fennville in Ganges township. In Allegan he will have sole rights to all concessions. He has stipulated the airport will be attended on a seven-day week basis during daylight hours.

Allegan city will be responsible for erecting a building large enough for maintenance, repair and storage, plus two 12-section rental units for plane storage. Initial expense on the building will be met on a revenue bond basis. Hangars are not included.

Bell Slates \$567,000 For Holland

Michigan Bell Telephone Company announced today it will spend \$567,000 in Holland this year to expand and improve its communications services.

The local outlay is part of Michigan Bell's 1966 construction program totaling a record \$175 million, which surpasses last year's previous high by \$40 million and is about double the amount spent only three years ago.

William M. Day, Michigan Bell president, said in Detroit that much of the capital required to finance the program must come from investors willing to put their money into the telephone business rather than in other investment opportunities. He said the expanded 1966 program will require hundreds of additional employees to supplement the company's present force of some 23,400 men and women. It also will give substantial amounts of additional business to Michigan construction companies and suppliers.

"A program of this magnitude is necessary to keep pace with Michigan's economic boom," Day said. "This boom has led to service demands such as the company never before has experienced."

Day also attributed a good share of the surging demand to higher telephone usage stimulated by increasingly attractive prices. He cited the recent series of rate reductions and service improvements which "are making telephone service a constantly increasing bargain."

As examples, he mentioned the declining costs of both interstate and intrastate calls.

"These economies are promoting people in general to use their telephones more and more," Day said. "In addition, many people without service now are ordering it, and others with lower grades of service are ordering higher lines. This all adds up to the heaviest burden ever placed on our facilities."

"Our 1966 program is designed not only to meet the greater demand for basic telephone service, but to give every Michigan Bell customer the type and quality of service he wants and expects from us."

Carl J. Marcus, Michigan Bell manager here, broke down Holland's \$567,000 outlay as follows:

\$253,000 for outside plant facilities, \$111,000 for telephone equipment in homes and offices, and \$203,000 for central office equipment.

Statewide, the program includes the massive placement of nearly 10 billion conductor feet of cable — and 2 billion more than was ever before constructed in a single year.

Michigan Bell will start nine new telephone buildings during the year along with 22 building additions. One of the major manual-to-dial completions will take place in Calumet where local dial service and Direct Distance Dialing will be inaugurated in May.

Three more communities — Port Huron, Mullen and Scotts — will be tied into the Direct Distance Dialing network this year, bringing to 92 per cent the number of Michigan Bell customers able to dial their own long distance calls.

During the year, the company will continue its program of central office equipment modifications to accommodate Touch-Tone telephones, the new no-dial type which users activate by push-buttons rather than the conventional dial.

Touch-Tone modifications are slated for five more Detroit central offices and 18 outstate areas including Calumet, Auburn Heights, Birmingham, Roseville, Flint, Grand Blanc, Escanaba, Grand Rapids, Iron Mountain, Jackson, Niles, Grand Haven, Plymouth, Pontiac, Rochester, West Bloomfield, Saginaw and Wyandotte.

Missionary Family to Return To Republic of Chad, Africa

The Rev. and Mrs. Earl Dannenberg and family who have been spending a furlough here, will leave next week to resume their missionary work in the Republic of Chad, Africa.

The Dannenbergs who will be living in Fort Archambault, Chad, plan to leave Holland next Friday, for Detroit and the following day will board a plane stopping en route for a few days at Marseilles, France.

Both Rev. and Mrs. Dannenberg teach in the Baptist High School which they helped found in 1962. Rev. Dannenberg is principal of the school. Mrs. Dannenberg is very active in teenage girls' work and as a registered nurse assists in the care of the Africans.

Their four children were born in different countries—John, 9, in France while the Dannenbergs were there for language study; Michael, 8, in the Central African Republic; Carol, 7, in the Republic of Chad; and Robin, 5, in Holland.

Upon their return to the Chad, John and Michael will resume their studies in the Baptist Mission School at Fort Crampel, Central African Republic, which is 200 miles from their home, and Carol and Robin will be taught by

their mother until they are of age to go to Crampel. While in Holland the children attended Van Raalte and Maplewood schools.

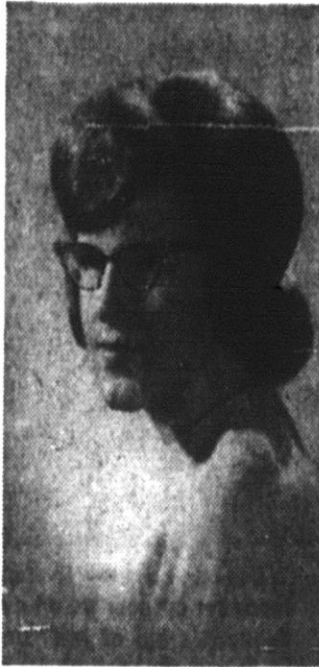

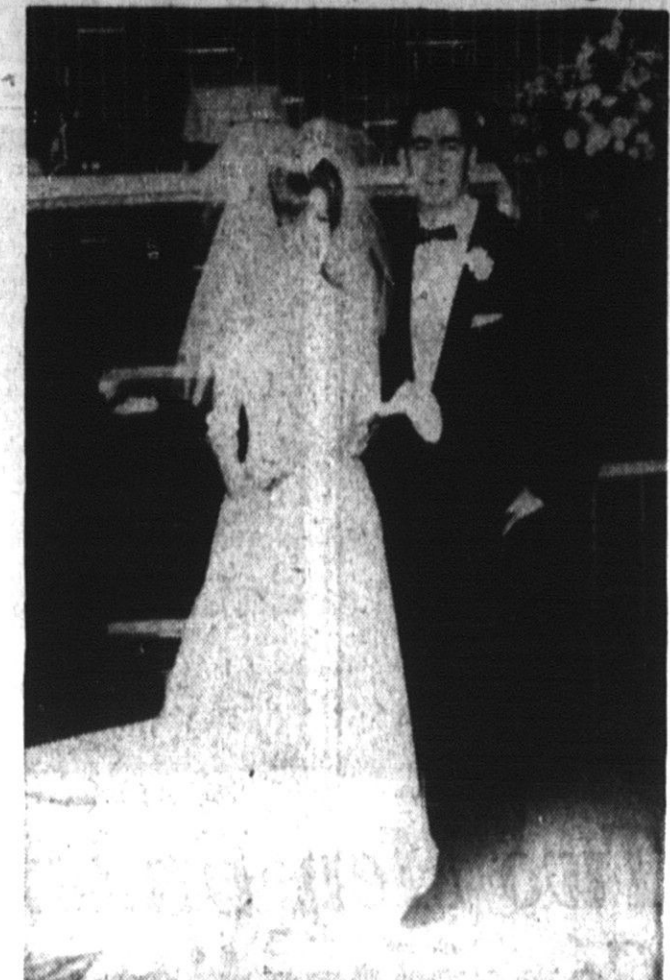

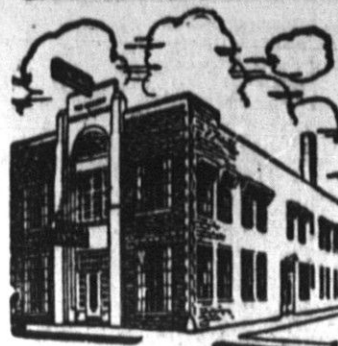

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, January 30
God is Redeemer
Romans 3:21-26;
Hebrews 10:19-22;
Ephesians 1:3-8.

By C. P. Dame
We who believe the Bible believe that God is not dead but much alive and hence active. This lesson tells about the redemptive work of God wrought through Jesus Christ our Saviour and Lord.

I. We are saved by grace. This lesson is composed of three passages of the Bible—one from the Epistle to the Romans, the other from the Epistle to the Hebrews and the other from the Epistle to the Ephesians.

Romans teaches that sin estranged man from God and brought upon him His condemnation. How can this broken relationship be restored again and man become right again in God's sight? Man is unable to do this. The Jews in the days of Jesus thought that by keeping the moral law they could please God. But an imperfect man can't keep a perfect law.

The gospel teaches that although a man is not able to keep the law he can through faith in Christ become righteous in God's sight.

God justifies the sinner who trusts in Christ and looks upon him as if he had never sinned. And why? Because the sinner believes that Christ paid the penalty of his sin on the cross and therefore he has pardon from God against whom he has sinned. Salvation is due to God's grace—not on account of our good works.

II. Christ is our High Priest—this is taught us in Hebrews. There is no pardon without the shedding of blood, this is taught in both the Old and New Testament. All the animal sacrifices of the Old Testament pointed to the Lamb of God—Christ.

In the Old Testament dispensation the High Priest entered the Most Holy Place by passing through the curtain which separated the Most Holy Place from the holy place. Only the high priest was allowed to draw the curtain apart and go into the presence of God. Now, through Jesus all may go into the presence of God. Of course we must go in faith. Christ the High Priest made this possible.

III. God has a chosen people. The passage from Ephesians makes that clear. "According as He hath chosen us in Him before the foundation of the world that we should be holy and without blame before Him in love." God wants believers to be different from other people. This is not easy in age of conformity. Christians are God's adopted children and they are expected to be like their heavenly Father which implies that they are called to be holy. Honors imply responsibilities.

All the spiritual blessings which we have come to us through Christ as the phrases, "he hath made us accepted in the beloved" and "in whom we have redemption through His blood the forgiveness of sins" teach. We are what we are due to our connection with Christ.

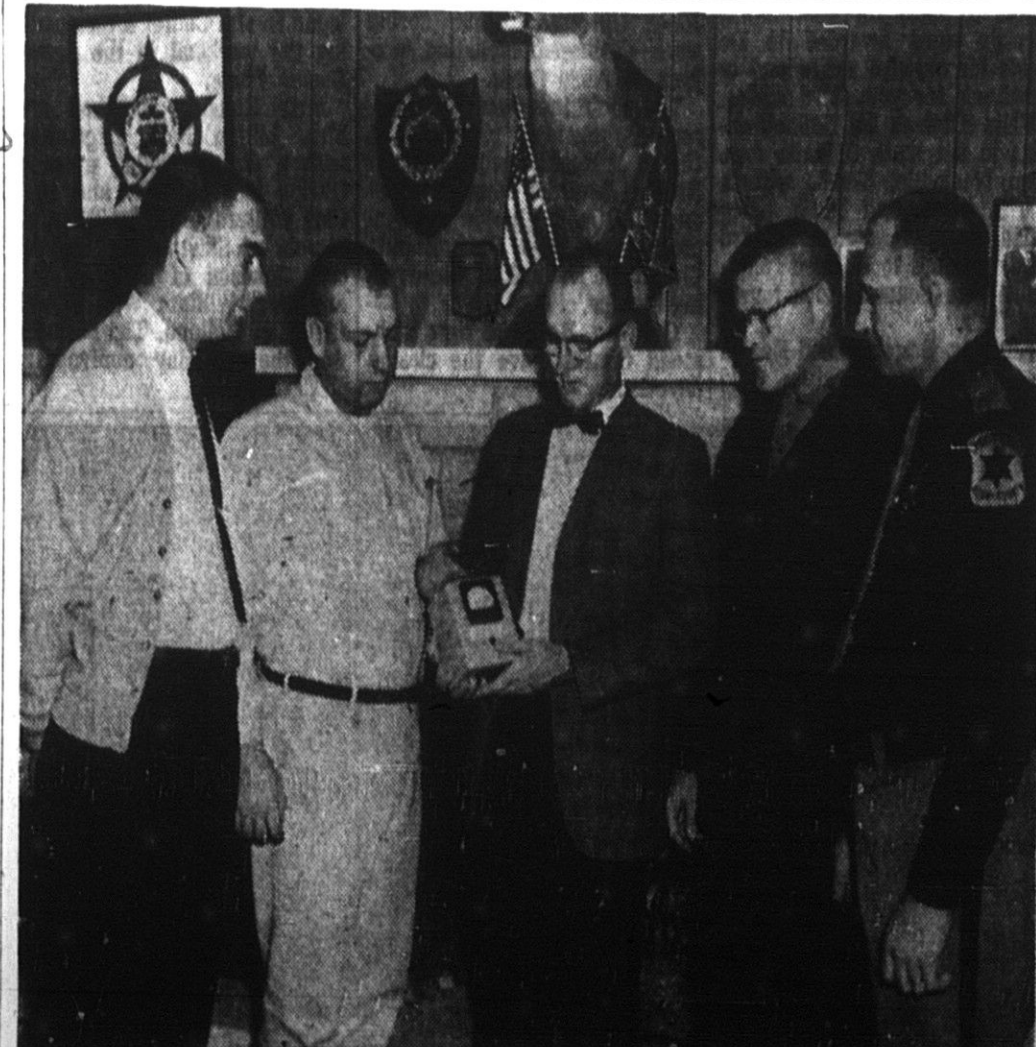

Dutch Crush Harborites For 6th Win

Complete humiliation of the defending Class A state champions was accomplished here Friday night as Holland High's basketball team crushed Benton Harbor, 85-55 before 2,000 satisfied fans in the Holland High gymnasium.

Nothing can be better than to beat the champion and the Dutch had an enjoyable time doing it, recalling the defeats received when the Tigers moved to the conference and state championships. The win kept the Dutch (4-1) in a three-way tie for first place in the LMCA with Muskegon Heights and Muskegon.

Holland's game worked to perfection with excellent defense and outstanding shooting. The Dutch stayed in a tight man-for-man defense throughout and they played it well.

The Dutch clung to their foes and the Tigers weren't able to get off their shots and were forced to make mistakes. The man-for-man, which Coach Don Piersma used exclusively for the first time (other games he has switched between zone and man-for-man) surprised the Tigers and they couldn't hit.

While Benton Harbor wasn't hitting, Holland was using its fast break and control game to earn them good baskets. And they hit a fine 48 per cent with 31 baskets in 65 tries.

The Tigers, with their run and shoot offense, are used to getting lots of shots. But they got only 69, hitting 22 for 32 per cent. And the Dutch also cleaned the boards with a 37-29 advantage, including 11 by Mike Lawson and nine by Dan Colenbrander.

It was the third quarter that broke the Tigers and squelched comeback thoughts. Holland had led 18-10 at the quarter and 35-26 at half, including a 29-12 spread midway in the second period.

The Dutch got the opening third quarter basket on Lawson's tip to Steve Millard, who laid it up. But in the two minutes the Tigers scored six points to Holland's one and the lead was cut to six, 38-32 with 5:55 to go.

Then Holland struck, hitting off the fast break and jumpers from all over the place. Benton Harbor didn't know what happened. Little Millard was around and through the Tigers and he also hit from out, scoring five baskets in the quarter. Lawson added three baskets, Colenbrander two and Larry Pete one. The Dutch led 44-6 in rebounding in the third quarter.

Holland outscored the losers, 27-5 in five minutes and when the quarter ended it was 65-37 and the Tigers were ready to head for home. The winners made 11 of 21 in that quarter after enjoying periods of 6-15 and 7-17 in the first half.

The Dutch controlled the game, working the ball to Lawson in the last period and the 6'10" LMCA scoring leader added four baskets and three free throws. Lawson and the other regulars departed with 1:40 to play and subs Rog Jones, Al (Chip) Millard and Jim Fortney added Holland's final baskets. Holland hit seven of 11 in the last period.

The Dutch also were hot at the free throw line, sinking 14 of 15 in the second half. Holland's 15th try (by Lawson) was missed. The winners made 23 of 31 free throws, including 10 straight by Pete.

Lawson's 29 points gives him 112 in five league games for a 22.2 average. He has scored 193 in leading the Dutch to a 6-3 record. Pete added 24 and Millard 14. Ellis Hull, the LMCA's second leading scorer, got 19 and has 96 in five games. Charles (Boom Boom) Beck added 13.

Dutchmen Drop Sixth This Season

When two teams concentrate on getting good shots the team that shoots best is coming out on top and Wooster College shot a shade better than Hope here Saturday night and took a 76-72 win before 1,500 fans in the Civic Center.

Wooster hit 43 per cent of its attempts, making 31 baskets in 72 tries. Hope got 63 attempts, sank 25 and finished with 40 per cent.

Hope led at the half, 41-39 and had the same margin in shooting percentage. The Flying Dutchmen made 14 of 34 while the Scots sank 16 of 42.

But in the second half, Hope made 11 of 29 for 38 per cent while the winners connected 15 times in 33 tries for 45 per cent. Both teams were interested in ball control and working for good percentage shots. Wooster prides itself on its defense, ranked fifth in the nation (56.2 average) last week.

But Hope succeeded in scoring more points than any other of the 14 foes the Scots have faced this season. The previous high was 65 made by Grove City.

The 76-point total was also the highest the Scots have scored this season in winning 12 of 14 games. The previous high was 74 against Kenyon.

Seven points (Wooster 69-62) with five minutes to play was the biggest margin of the game, which was tied 18 times, 12 in the first half. The final tie was 72-72 with 1:10 to play.

When Hope was trailing by the seven, the Flying Dutchmen succeeded in outscoring the Scots 8-1 in less than three minutes. Clare Van Wieren got two baskets and two free throws in the rally while Tom Pelon added two free tosses. Wooster's lone point was a free throw.

Wooster picked up two free tosses, 10 seconds apart, and with 1:34 left 72-70. Van Wieren was fouled at 1:10 and he tied the game again.

The winners got what proved to be the final basket with 36 seconds to play as George Baker, who previously had sunk seven long shots, pushed through a tip after a missed shot.

Buddy Harris, Wooster's top scorer (24) and rebounder (17), sank the final two free throws with 36 seconds to play. Hope came down the floor and called time out just a second before Floyd Brady hit a basket. The time out nullified the field goal.

Brady sparked with a crowd-pleasing performance. His dunk on a rebound gave Hope a 35-34 margin with 1:32 to play, a lead the Flying Dutchmen kept and led at half, 41-39.

His defensive game was a block off the backboard of center Tim Jordan's shot. Brady led Hope in rebounding with 14 as Hope was edged on the boards, 50-49.

After playing a zone defense, Hope switched to a man-for-man with 13 minutes to play. After the switch Hope got seven straight points to lead 59-55 (its biggest bulge) with 10 minutes left. But Wooster scored four straight baskets and then added three more two pointers, interspersed by Hope's three, to give the winners the 69-62 lead.

Van Wieren led Hope with 25, eight in the last six minutes while Brady had 15, 13 in the first half. Roy Anker chipped in 12. Hope made 21 of 31 free throws and Wooster, 14 of 22.

Hope, now 7-6, hosts Spring Arbor Friday in the Civic Center. Wooster hosts Ohio Northern Wednesday.

Maroons Drop 64-61 Game To Warriors

A determined Holland Christian basketball squad threw a scare at Muskegon Christian's powerful Warriors in the Civic Center Friday night before bowing in the final minute, 64-61 before a sellout crowd of 2,500 Homecoming fans.

After trailing most of the game and by as much as eight points in the last period, Coach Art Tuls' ever improving Maroons narrowed the count to 56-55 with 3:08 left. Every time Holland would narrow the gap to one, the Warriors would notch a fielder to increase the margin. Holland trailed by one point on four different occasions in the last three minutes.

The Maroons had a great chance after the driving tactics of guard Les Hulst had pulled the losers to a 60-50 deficit with 54 seconds left. The winners missed on a charity toss but Christian cooperated by doing the same with 42 seconds left. Reserve guard Dave Kool then came to the Warrior rescue hitting on four straight foul shots in the last 32 seconds to smash the Holland hopes.

Christian's defeat came by the same 64-61 score administered in overtime on New Year's Day by the Warriors. Muskegon is 10-1 and Holland Christian is 4-7.

Coach Elmer Walcott's Warriors are rated the No. 1 team in class C and they deserve it. Anchored by a front line that averages 6'5" when superstar Wes Van Dyke plays the pivot, the Warriors have great shooting, rugged rebounding and plenty of court savvy.

Van Dyke at 6'5" is perhaps the best individual performer that the Maroons have met this season. He hits well from his starting guard post and then flashes an unstoppable hooker from the pivot post when Walcott moves him to the front line. Big and rugged 6'5" Don Hooker is a constant threat at forward and the team's best rebounder. He gets plenty of help from regular center, Dan Oegema at 6'6".

Holland Christian continued its upsurge of recent weeks even in defeat. Tuls continued to get fine efforts out of his entire squad with some excellent performances by sophs Lloyd Dozeman, Steve Bushouse and senior guard Les Hulst. In addition junior sub John Lappenga came in and did a fine job on the boards as well as overall floor play. Junior Ken Vander Kamp also looked good, particularly with some fine shooting in the second quarter.

Although the Maroons battled the taller Warriors to a 30-30 tie on the boards the Warrior size hurt Holland plenty on offensive tips and control of jump ball situations.

Tight defenses by both clubs kept the shooting at a minimum with Holland hitting on 21-57 for

37 per cent and Muskegon 23-56 for 40 per cent.

Both teams hit well in the opening period with Muskegon holding the better of it at the quarter's end with a 22-18 bulge on the strength of some fine work on the part of center Oegema.

Muskegon upped the margin to seven and eight points early in the second period before Christian's press started to swing the tide. Led by Vander Kamp and Bushouse, Christian battled to a 36-36 halftime deadlock.

The Maroons really faltered in the third period, hitting on just two out of 16 tries, at least four of the layup variety. The Warriors weren't doing much better against the good tight defense thrown up by Holland but still managed a 48-42 lead into the last quarter.

Les Hulst led the Maroons comeback with 12 points in the final period with an assist by the fine floor play of Dozeman.

Christian hit 19-30 at the free throw line and Muskegon 18-31.

The Maroons travel to Allegan next Friday and entertain River Rouge on Saturday afternoon.

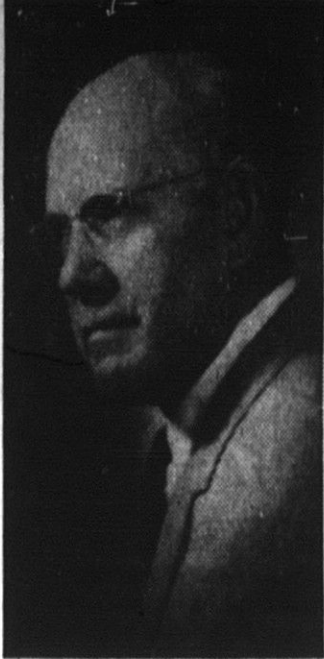

Views From The Campus

A scientist who is also a Christian is frequently asked if he does not find some serious conflict between his Christian faith and his doing of science. In the sense that the question is usually asked, the answer is clearly No. One reason for this is that the questions which are of interest to

him are of a different kind than those which are of interest to the same man as a Christian. The job of a scientist is to formulate theories whose purpose is to answer questions about physical phenomena which inquire only "how."

A Christian theologian formulates "theories" whose purpose is to answer questions about non-physical phenomena which inquire "why" as well as "how." Note that physical phenomena include all those which can be described in terms of such quantities as mass, length, time, and electric charge.

A scientist may be asked many questions which begin with the word "why," but that is quite misleading. An example may serve to demonstrate that the answers usually given to these questions are really answers to "how" and not "why" questions. Begin with the observable that Gemini capsules are able to orbit the earth.

An obvious question that might be asked is: why don't these satellites fall back to the earth instead of orbiting? In answer, a scientist might explain that the earth's gravitational pull is exerted on the satellite in such a manner and under such conditions that the result is to move it in a nearly circular orbit about the earth instead of pulling it in toward the earth.

Precise mathematical statements could be made about the relations between the forces, orbits, and speeds and a description formulated to explain in a very elegant manner "how" the earth-satellite system behaves. But observe that the "why" question still remains to be answered. It is one which is concerned more fundamentally with the reason that the forces, orbits, and speeds are related in just the way that they are observed to be related and not in some completely different way. A scientist has never been able to answer any of these questions correctly which inquire "why" in any other way but to say: "Well, that's the way the universe is constructed."

A Christian theologian attempts to answer questions about non-physical phenomena which do in fact inquire "why." He attempts to explain without benefit of the relatively precise "how" language of mathematics or the clear operational definitions which relate physical measurements to mathematical statements why man is what he is. He attempts to discover why we have come into being and why we must die. He also attempts to answer questions which inquire how we are related to the Creator that he claims has made us and also why we are obliged to serve Him. His premises are obtained not from physical measurements but from the faith of the saints. It should be emphasized, however, that there is no evidence either scientific or other that those phenomena which cannot be measured in a physically meaningful way do not have as much or more significance than those which can.

There can be no conflict in the usual sense then simply because science and theology attempt to answer different types of questions about different kinds of phenomena using information obtained by different means. In an unusual sense, however, there may be a conflict that is not often mentioned. In order to be a superior sci-

entist it is necessary for a man to give much time to his work. In fact, he may spend most of his waking hours thinking about or doing experiments or calculations and give a minimum amount of time to his family and essentially none to his neighbor. He may insist as a matter of faith that the only meaningful phenomena are those which can be measured. In some sense science may become for this man a way of life.

But Christianity, too, is a way of life for all those who accept the fact of the Incarnation. It is a way of life that demands that a man allot some of his time for the study of the Scriptures and for prayer and that he spend time in telling the gospel and visiting the sick. If science (or any other occupation or hobby) were to take so much of a Christian's time that he could not fulfill his first obligation, which is to God, then it would be an idol and in conflict with his faith.

This unusual conflict is one which is in principle, at least, easy to eliminate. In practice, however, it is often true that those scientists who love the security and feeling of near divinity that comes from having all the answers to the "how" questions, close their minds entirely to the questions whose answers are far more important for the humanity they claim to serve.

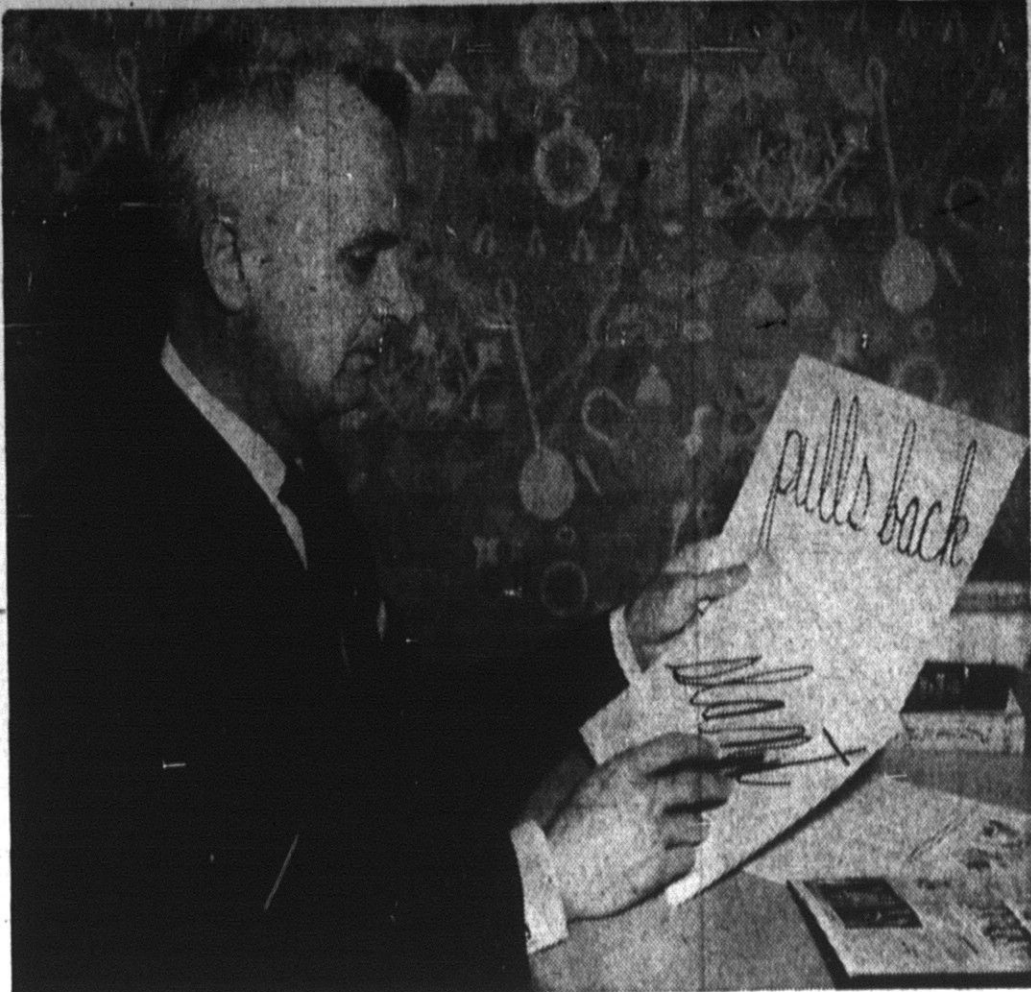

See Personality In Handwriting

The prisoner in a large state penitentiary wrote a letter asking the judge who had sentenced him for burglary to give him another chance. His wife was having a baby, the prisoner told the judge in the letter. He admitted having made a mistake, but he had seen the error of his ways and knew he could "go straight."

One look at the prisoner's letter, however, was enough to convince a graphoanalyst that the prisoner was a bad probation risk. The prisoner's pleading request for "just this one favor" was turned down.

The graphoanalyst, handwriting expert, had seen in the letter that the prisoner was emotionally unstable, couldn't be relied on to tell the truth, and that under the slightest provocation would probably return to law breaking.

This is only one of hundreds of applications of graphoanalysis, the modern science of the study of individual strokes of handwriting to determine character and personality of the writer.

Graphoanalysis is a tool that can be used successfully for assessment of personality traits regardless of whether the writing is done with the toes, artificial hands or mouth.

Psychologists use questionnaires, rating scales and other methods of personality assessment, but an increasing number of them are learning the value of using graphoanalysis as an additional tool.

According to Daniel VanderWerf Jr., of 328 West 30th St., a graphoanalyst who has been Circuit Court reporter for Ottawa and Allegan counties for more than 21 years, graphoanalysis probably has broader application than many psychological tests for determining personality and character traits of individuals.

VanderWerf said that more than 100 personality traits can be revealed through handwriting analysis. Handwriting is really brain writing and reflects the writer's personality.

Part of the value of graphoanalysis as a personality test lies in the fact that handwriting samples can be obtained under non-test conditions.

In most cases tests are given under imposed conditions such as time limits, test instructions and supervision by the examiner. These conditions, imposed on a highly emotional individual, could conceivably affect the results of the test.

In graphoanalysis, however, a person could be evaluated on the basis of a handwriting sample written a week ago or at a time when the person was completely at ease and under no restriction.

The graphoanalyst studies a handwriting sample for formations of strokes, spacing of letters, slant and depth of writing to gain an insight into the personality of the writer.

For example, to the graphoanalyst, an extreme slant might mean the writer is an outgoing person of deep emotions, while a backward slant might indicate an introverted writer and letters slanting in both directions could mean the writer is emotionally unstable.

VanderWerf has been using his skills as a graphoanalyst in working with the Ottawa and Allegan County probation departments in assessing risks among prospective probationers.

VanderWerf became interested in graphoanalysis several years ago after hearing testimony of several handwriting experts during a trial in Ottawa Circuit Court involving a contested will.

After much study, VanderWerf became a certified graphoanalyst and received a scholarship for advanced study leading to a master's degree.

The use of graphoanalysis in

the United States is growing rapidly, VanderWerf said, but it has been more widely practiced in Europe for a considerable longer time.

Among the modern applications of graphoanalysis are its use by personnel departments of some corporations in the hiring of new employees, banks and credit bureaus in determining poor money risks, and by teachers to help them understand their students better.

VanderWerf, vice president of the Michigan chapter of the International Graphoanalysis Society and a past president of the Michigan Court Reporters Association, said he would like eventually to apply his knowledge of graphoanalysis to the legal field of disputed and forged documents.

To the trained observer, VanderWerf said, even a "good" forgery reveals personality traits of the forger.

VanderWerf cited one case in which a bank was suing an elderly woman who apparently had co-signed a note with her granddaughter and her granddaughter's husband. VanderWerf said he had spotted the signature of the elderly woman as a forgery, and after some time the granddaughter confessed to having signed her grandmother's name to the note.

Many talents are also revealed by a person's handwriting. Literary talents, music and manual dexterity can all be seen by the trained observer in a sample of an individual's handwriting, VanderWerf said.

Recently VanderWerf conducted an experiment in art evaluation of a number of handwriting samples. He said he had established a criterion of 10 traits likely to be found in individuals who appreciated art.

Handwriting samples from young school children revealed only one or two of the 10 traits he was looking for, while high school age children who had been exposed to more art courses in school exhibited a much greater number of the 10 traits in their writing.

After studying a handwriting sample from a college professor of art, VanderWerf said he found all 10 of the traits he was seeking revealed in the professor's handwriting.

One of VanderWerf's prized analyses is his evaluation of the handwriting of former Miss America, Vonda Kay Van Dyke. Vande Werf said he found her to be "highly expressive, warm-hearted and friendly."

In his personality analysis he told her, "You have a good sense of humor, blessed with dignified pride, certain degree of independence. You like the simpler things in life, as opposed to the gaudy and artificial."

VanderWerf said Miss Van Dyke's handwriting showed her to be musically inclined and to have a good sense of rhythm. "Had she decided to become a dancer," VanderWerf said, "she would have been a good one."

Many of the things a handwriting expert can tell about a person by studying the person's script are things that person may already know or be aware of himself, VanderWerf said.

"But there are also things the person may be trying to cover up or not even be aware of," he added.

According to VanderWerf, an individual's true personality is revealed by his handwriting regardless of how he may attempt to cover up or try to hide it. A person may fool friends and acquaintances, but not the graphoanalyst.

Two years ago an Ottawa County Circuit Court jury acquitted Mrs. Ruth Reil, 37, of Mundelein, Ill., on a charge of

shoplifting jewelry from a Holland jewelry store.

VanderWerf said he was able to obtain a sample of her handwriting which showed her to be extremely acquisitive with a desire to possess small items.

Mrs. Dell was recently sentenced to 5 to 10 years at the women's reformatory at Dwight, Ill., after police found 129 pairs of men's trousers in her possession. She was charged with taking them from a railroad salvage in Mundelein.

Despite some seemingly bizarre aspects of graphoanalysis, it is a science based on more than 50 years of clinical and empirical research. It is being further validated by statistical studies, both in and outside of some of the nation's leading universities.

Graphoanalysts include among their number such persons as Dr. Albert Schweitzer, noted humanitarian, Sigmund Freud, acknowledged father of modern psychology, and Albert Binet, inventor of the IQ test.

VanderWerf related an incident that happened in a divorce court, illustrating the degree to which handwriting reveals personality.

Two women, each seeking a divorce, appeared in the court. One was young, attractive and stylishly dressed; the other short, somewhat older and much less attractively attired. By comparing handwriting samples from the two women, VanderWerf was able to correctly identify each by name although he had never seen either party before.

The handwriting of the younger one, VanderWerf said, indicated her independence and desire to stand out from the crowd—mirrored precisely by the way she was dressed.

However, VanderWerf stressed that graphoanalysis is not fortune telling and is in no way related to the occult or mysterious. It is a precise science.

Using graphoanalysis as a scientific tool, the graphoanalyst can probably reveal more about one's personality in a short time than one's wife or best friend can learn over a period of years.

What a person's friends and acquaintances see is often only skin deep. The graphoanalyst can see beyond the exterior into the real person.

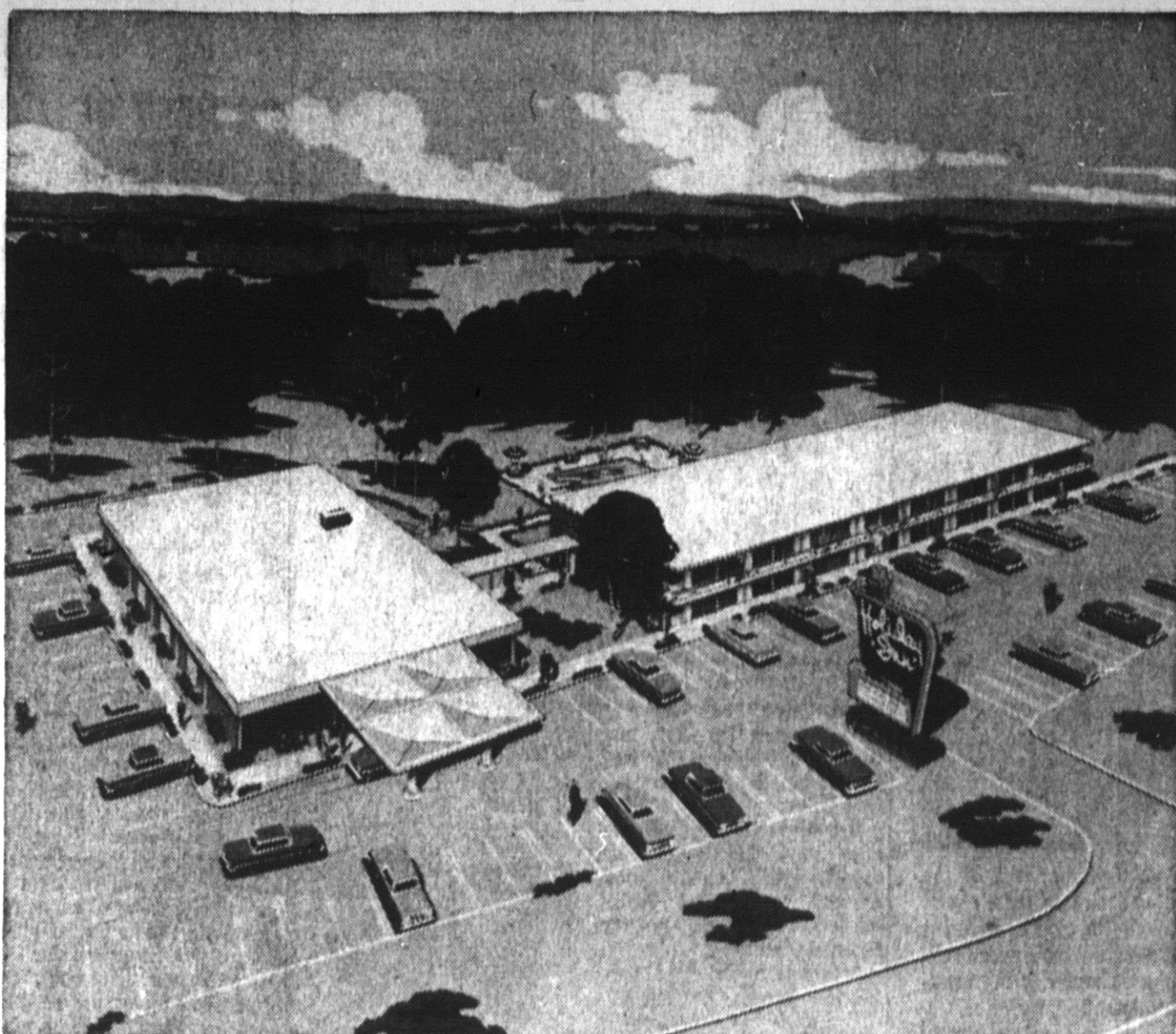

New Motor Inn Set for Holland

A new Holiday Inn motor hotel will be built within the Holland city limits during the next year. Holland Chamber of Commerce officials announced today.

The 80-unit structure will be constructed at the southeast intersection of US-31 and 32nd St., two miles from downtown Holland, as a cost estimated in excess of \$600,000.

Construction of the two-story motor hotel is scheduled to begin April 1, with completion expected by Jan. 1, 1967.

A corporation will be formed to operate the inn under a franchise agreement with Holiday Inns of America, Inc., of Memphis, Tenn. Jay Van Omen of Holland, David Van Omen of Zeeland, Dr. G. J. Plasman and Cornelius Bylenga Jr. of Grand Rapids, Russell Boeve of Holland, and Central Farms Hatcheries, Inc., of Zeeland are franchise-holders for the new inn.

The Holiday Inn will be located near the Holland Industrial Park now under construction. William W. Bond, Jr. and Associates, of Memphis, are the architects for the new inn to be built on a five-acre plot. Construction will be supervised by Holiday Inns of America.

Holland's Holiday Inn will have meeting and banquet facilities for 150 persons and a restaurant which will accommodate 120. There will be 40 single rooms, 38 deluxe double rooms and two executive suites, with parking for 120 cars.

The inn also features a 25-by-50 swimming pool, air conditioning, wall-to-wall carpeting, television in every room, king-size double beds, baby cribs, availability of baby sitters, valet and laundry service, phones in every room, 24-hour switchboard, free dog kennels and a no-charger policy for children under 12 in the same room with their parents, except for rollaway beds.

Additional services will be free advance reservations and complimentary coffee dispensers.

The Holiday Inn chain has grown from one in 1952 to more than 650 in 48 states, Canada, Puerto Rico and the Bahamas. There are now 17 inns open in Michigan.
