## Zeeland Man Dies in Crash

HUDSONVILLE — A rural Zeeland man was killed and his wife seriously injured in a car-truck accident here at 7:15 p.m. Tuesday. The death is Ottawa county's second traffic fatality of the year.

Albert Lanning, 81, of 4665 Adams St., Zeeland, was pronounced dead on arrival at Butterworth Hospital, Grand Rapids, of injuries received in the crash at the intersection of 36th Ave. and Chicago Dr.

Lanning's wife, Allie, 78, received multiple injuries and is undergoing treatment in the intensive care unit at Butterworth Hospital. Hospital officials said today her condition was serious.

The driver of the truck, David Steenwyk, 18, of 144th Ave., Holland, was not injured. The flatbed truck was loaded with shipping skids, none of which fell off in the accident.

Hudsonville Police Chief Ron Board reported the Lanning vehicle was northbound on 36th Ave. when it was struck broadside by the eastbound truck.

Board, who investigated the accident with Patrolman Erwin Gruppen said Steenwyk was not held.

Lanning was a retired farmer and had lived in the Drenthe area all his life. He was a member of the Drenthe Christian Reformed Church and a member of its men's society. He had also been a former Cohistory member and a Sunday school teacher there for many years.

Surviving besides the wife are one son, Harvey of Zeeland; one daughter, Mrs. Jacob (Lois) Newhouse of Drenthe; seven grandchildren; four great-grandchildren; one brother, Ben of Holland; one sister, Mrs. James Molenaar of Lansing, Ill.

**Grant Judgment In Circuit Court**

GRAND HAVEN — A judgment was granted in Ottawa Circuit Court Tuesday by Judge Raymond L. Smith for the state of Michigan and the State Water Resources Commission against a Borculo turkey-processing business.

The attorney general's office started the suit Oct. 25, 1968, seeking an order from Circuit Court against the Bil-Mar Foods, Inc., which has a processing plant near Borculo.

The suit sought an order to cease pollution of surface or underground waters of the state. The plaintiff claims the company was using streams and drains for disposal of sewage and waste from its business and that fish were being destroyed in nearby Pigeon river.

The order issued Tuesday said that the defendant must cease pollution of the waters, must submit plans for pollution control facilities to the commission's engineers by April 1 and must complete the facilities by Nov. 1, 1969.

## Saugatuck Man Held in Shooting

SAUGATUCK — A Douglas man wounded when a fight broke out while target shooting late Saturday remained in critical condition today as his companion faces charges of assault with intent to commit murder.

James Buswell, 24, of 142 Spring St., Douglas, remains in serious condition at Grand Rapids Butterworth Hospital where he underwent emergency surgery late Sunday. He was transferred there from Douglas Community Hospital. He had been shot in the back at least four times with a .22 caliber rifle at a target range in Saugatuck township, according to Allegan county sheriff's deputies.

Authorities said they are holding David Arndt, 21, Saugatuck, who was to be arraigned later Monday before District Judge Elizabeth Ramsey.

Elizabeth Ramsey. He demanded examination and was being held in the Allegan County jail in lieu of \$10,000 bond. Preliminary examination is Feb. 25.

## Capt. Rose Is Awarded Bronze Star

Captain Calvin R. Rose of Holland was awarded the Bronze Star Medal in Vietnam recently for "meritorious achievement" as an aircraft supply officer.

The medal citation said Capt. Rose was awarded the medal for "meritorious achievement during the period 11 September 1968 to 1 December 1968, while serving as the Aircraft Technical Supply Officer."

Captain Rose distinguished himself through his significant contribution to the technical supply operation in reducing the Division NORS rate and thereby improving the aircraft availability rate within the Division. Captain Rose's achievements reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, the 25th Infantry Division, and the United States Army.

The medal is signed by Major-General Ellis W. Williamson.

Capt. Rose has been in Vietnam near Cam Ranh Bay and Cu Chi since Sept. 11, 1968. Before going to Vietnam he was commander of the 200th, a Hawk air defense detachment of the Missile and Munitions Center at the Redstone Arsenal in Huntsville, Ala.

Capt. Rose, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Rose, 179 West 19th St., is married to the former Bonnie Kolenda, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Al Kolenda, 993 West 32nd St. The Roses have two sons, Jeffrey, 7, and Gary, 1. Mrs. Rose and the two sons have been living with her parents while he is in Vietnam.

## Council Has Brief Meeting

City Council Wednesday night gave assurances to Buss Machine Works that water and sanitary sewer works will be available next summer for a new 100,000-square-foot plant the company plans to build in Holland's Industrial Park. Copies of the proceedings will be sent to the Board of Public Works, the city engineer and Holland Economic Development Corp. (HEDCOR).

Council voted to retain the services of Dickinson, Wright, McKean and Cudlip if Detroit as bond attorneys for special assessment bonds totaling \$136,000 for paving and parking lot projects.

On request of Councilman Jacob Smith, City Manager Herb Holt reported that South Shore Dr. is open except for one segment where sanitary sewers are under construction following completion Jan. 1 of base stabilization. He said two or three gravity sewers and a force main are expected to be completed at Azalea and South Shore Dr. by Feb. 15 after which the road will be open to through traffic. South Shore Dr. paving is not included in the special assessment bonds for paving and parking lots.

Oaths of office for Jack Leenhouts and Gordon Cunningham as officer members of the Board of Review were filed.

A copy of the letter addressed to Ward Hansen and James Pollock from the Liquor Control Commission stating that their request for an SDM license at 505 West 17th St. was denied was ordered filed.

A letter from Charles Conrad called attention to a paper presented by Marvin C. Lindeman concerning progress and planning for the Holland area. The city manager was requested to make copies available to members of Council and the Planning Commission.

Three change orders were approved for the Board of Public Works in light plant construction, one for Elzinga and Volkens for a coating on all floor grating, brickwork on the north wall, enclosing entryway and site improvements at an additional cost of \$23,717.70; another for the Clement Electric Co. for miscellaneous wiring and addition of relays at an additional cost of \$751.57, and to the contract of Seither and Cherry for canvas jacket on all insulation and supports on gas burners at an additional cost of \$643.20.

Council approved certifications for Councilman Lamb, Inc., engineering department \$242.42; Councilman Smith, Wade Drug Co., police and street department, \$19.51; Councilman Dyk, Holland Litho, Planning Commission, \$3.60.

Meyer was taken to Holland Hospital by ambulance and released after treatment. A passenger riding with Meyer, William J. Bronkhorst, 19, of 5612 Byron Rd., Zeeland, was not injured.

## Band Home After Memorable Trip

Christian High School band members, numbering 140, returned to Holland 9:15 a.m. Tuesday after a memorable four-day trip to Washington, D.C., climaxed by marching in President Nixon's Inaugural Parade.

Band members were weary today following an all-night trip home from the nation's capital, but there was no school since it was between semesters.

The greatest thrill was marching on historic Pennsylvania Ave., past President Nixon's reviewing stand with Band Director Henry Vander Linde, Drum Major Tom Freeman and all the majorettes giving a smart "eyes left" to the new President, to be rewarded by a hearty smile and wave. The band was playing the University of Michigan fight song "The Victors" at 4:45 p.m., when it passed in review.

Local leaders were particularly impressed by excellent organization for the parade and inaugural activities. The band's day started with a rehearsal at the motel at Arlington, the first time in uniform and carrying instruments, sharing the court with bands from Arkansas and the Highland Kilts of Anderson, Ind.

At 12:15 p.m. a police escort arrived to escort the three bands in 10 buses to Bolling Air Force base, the starting area for all marching units, a fantastic scene of 300 buses went to their places by signs, following a pattern similar to the line of march.

Then at 2:15 p.m. the 300 buses left in a 6½-mile procession to the assembly area on the Mall, arriving at 2:45 p.m. After unloading, all buses then went to the dispersal area at the end of the parade, the four Holland buses assigned at Pennsylvania Ave. and 19th St. where the local band members literally marched in step to the waiting buses.

About half of the local chaperones went to the office of U.S. Rep. Guy Vander Jagt where they received standing room passes for the inauguration, and then returned to the Vander Jagt office for lunch. Vander Jagt was assisted by James Mudge of his staff and others. Then the local chaperones received standing room tickets for the parade route on Pennsylvania Ave.

The other half of the chaperones stayed with Director Vander Linde and the band, going with the bus to the dispersal area and walking back on the parade route to 17th St. and Pennsylvania Ave., the spot where all the governors watched the parade.

Accustomed to Michigan winters, Holland people knew how to dress for cold weather parades. A good share of the marchers wore regular suits under their uniforms and a good share turned to insulated underwear. Even Director Vander Linde wore a borrowed sweater under his uniform. All fared quite well.

Along the line of march, bands were identified often over public address systems, and the local band was described as receiving top honors for the last 11 years in Michigan. It was the first time the band wore plumes on the hats, acquired specially for the parade. The members also learned this was the first private school band ever to march in an inaugural parade.

Marchers and chaperones took their places soon in waiting buses after the parade and were given a police escort out of Washington. All buses stopped at Breezewood Pa., where band members changed into street clothes and all uniforms and

band instruments were put into a van.

Certificates for honorary members of the Holland Christian Presidential Inaugural Band were given many persons. The certificates were signed by Vander Jagt, Vander Linde and Vander Ark, the latter for Mark Vander Ark, superintendent of Christian Schools.

Band members stopped at Bedford, Pa., for supper. High spirits leveled off after a time and most members tried to sleep the rest of the way home. New drivers took over the buses in Elyria, Ohio, and members who were awake found snow on the ground in Indiana, the first snow in four days. There had been a bad stretch of snow and sleet about 90 miles earlier on the Pennsylvania Turnpike between Bedford and Pittsburgh.

Excellent advance planning paid off well, and band and chaperones were grateful for excellent cooperation of bus accommodations, aid from the Vander Jagt office and courtesies shown in Gettysburg, Annapolis and Washington.

## Three Minors Are Charged

Holland police arrested three persons Thursday night and charged them with being minors in possession following an incident in the Civic Center parking lot.

Two of them, Mark Allen Ebel, 20, and Lane Knoll, 17, both of West Olive, were released from jail on bond and are to appear in Holland District Court Jan. 21 at 10 a.m. The third person, Richard C. Van Voorst, 18, also from West Olive, who is AWOL from the U.S. Army, was also charged with malicious destruction of property.

Van Voorst appeared in Holland District Court today and pleaded guilty to both charges. For being a minor in possession he was fined \$33. A 15-day jail sentence was suspended.

On the other charge, which stemmed from breaking a car window, Van Voorst was fined \$38, given a 30-day suspended jail sentence and ordered to make restitution of \$100.

## Kenyons Advised To 'Buy More Time'

CAPE TOWN, South Africa—

Fourteen-year-old Mark Kenyon and his parents were reportedly heading back to the United States Monday after doctors said the boy was not strong enough to undergo heart surgery at the present time for a serious heart ailment.

Mark who has a congenital heart condition and his mother and father flew to Cape Town with hopes of consulting the famed Dr. Christiaan Barnard who pioneered heart transplant surgery, about the boy's condition.

Doctors say the boy's condition has lessened since he underwent open heart surgery five years ago to correct a defective valve.

Since that time, Dr. Donald Waterman, a Grand Rapids physician who has been attending the boy, advised another operation to replace two of the boy's valves.

Reports said members of Barnard's heart team said they could not help Mark because he is not strong enough to undergo heart surgery. They advised his parents "to buy him time"

until it is possible for him to undergo further open heart surgery.

They were unable to confer with Dr. Barnard who had been in France and was to visit the United States before returning to Cape Town later this month or early in February.

Mark's father, Robert, a Grand Rapids furniture company executive, said the trip had not been "a waste of time."

"The heart team and Dr. Philip Blalberg, the world's longest surviving heart transplant patient, have given Mark renewed hope that he will live," Kenyon said.

"When Mark saw Dr. Blalberg he got the hope of life all over again — and the doctors, too, have been a wonderful inspiration for him," Kenyon added.

"They have decided we must buy time until Mark can stand an operation," he said.

The family flew Mark to South Africa last Tuesday after hearing of Barnard's success in rebuilding the heart of Aileen Brassil, a 7-year-old Irish girl now promised a virtually normal life.

With these two propositions, a total of seven city propositions will appear on the April 7 ballot, most of them technical changes.

One proposition would limit members of the Board of Public Works, Hospital Board and Library Board to two consecutive five-year terms.

Another would require the Board of Public Works appointments to be made in June instead of May.

Another would spell out relationships of the Holland Hospital staff and board at the request of the Joint Commission on Accreditation.

Still another would require the Hospital Board to submit its budget by Feb. 15 instead of the second Monday in March to coincide with budgets of other boards.

The seventh proposition, also authorized Wednesday night, would amend the charter to increase the interest rate that may be charged on unpaid special assessments from 5 to 6 percent, the same limitation currently set by state law.

## Vote Set On Pay Hike For Mayor

### Second Proposition Calls For Increase For Councilmen

City residents will have an opportunity to vote raises for mayor and council in the April 7 spring election.

City Council decided Wednesday night to submit two propositions: one to pay the mayor \$1,500 a year, and the other to pay councilmen \$750 a year.

Mayor and councilmen presently are paid \$5 a meeting not to exceed \$180 a year but averaging \$150, and the mayor is paid an extra \$100.

The new propositions would include no pay per meeting as such.

Vote on both issues were 7 to 2, with Councilman L. W. Lamb Jr. and Alvin Dyk dissenting.

The new figure for the mayor is an amendment from a resolution last Aug. 21 setting the mayor's salary at \$750 as recommended by a citizens committee. It was one of five charter amendments postponed when it appeared there was insufficient room on voting machines.

Although no allusion was made to the \$2,500 annual salary voted for the Ottawa County Board of Supervisors, it was felt interest in increases for mayor and council stemmed from county developments.

Lamb felt Council should abide by the recommendation of the citizens committee, but Councilman Morris Peerbolt pointed out that a study two years ago placed Holland fourth from the lowest in mayor's salary in 46 cities in Michigan in the 10,000 to 50,000 population bracket. He said at that time the average pay for mayor was just over \$1,400. He said it is nice to ask dedicated people to work for nothing, but it is not unreasonable to ask some compensation. He said he was expressing this opinion at the risk of criticism since he is running unopposed for reelection.

Councilman Hollis Clark who is not seeking reelection said the \$5 paid per meeting attended was so little that it made little difference whether councilmen received pay.

Councilman Robert Dykstra said he consulted a political science professor at the University of Michigan who assured him the figures considered were fair, that it was democratic and that council was on safe ground, adding it should not be made difficult to serve as councilman or mayor.

In discussing increases for councilmen, Lamb pointed out the \$750 proposition was defeated two years ago and questioned why council should be paid when most other boards and commissions serve free. "Possibly I am an idealist but I consider it a privilege and duty to serve," he said.

Peerbolt felt Lamb should not assume local residents were all opposed to an increase, stating some people feel the \$150 salary for councilmen is ridiculous. He said it is traditional to pay elected officials charged with running the government, and not to pay administrative officials. He said \$750 was average pay for councilmen in 46 cities two years ago. City Attorney Gordon Cunningham said the charter amendments would have to be approved by the governor's office.

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## Arrest Six For Fighting On Street

Holland police arrested six persons Saturday and charged them with disorderly conduct, fighting on a public street, following a fracas that broke out on 16th St. just west of River Ave.

Cause of the brawl was not immediately known. Police received the call around 3:28 a.m. today.

The unruly fist fight sent one of the six arrested, Albert Chavez, 18, of 128 Reed Ave., to Holland Hospital for treatment of multiple bruises and abrasions. He was admitted and reported in good condition today.

The others charged include Luis Garcia Ramirez, 28, of Muskegon, Nicolas M. Garcia, 22, of 286 West 14th St.; Joseph Canales, 27, of Muskegon, and Mike Vera, 18, of 219 West 10th St.

The other person is a Holland juvenile and he is being held by juvenile authorities.

Police said both Muskegon residents and Ramirez were released from jail on \$50 bond each. The others were being held in jail as of this morning.

It is expected the six arrested will appear in Holland District Court Monday.

Police said they are continuing their investigation and more arrests may be made.

# Brower, Haven Lead Christian Past Panthers

## Hard Nosed Defense Keys 60-49 Win

Holland Christian's basketball team utilized a hard nosed man to man defense in the Holland Civic Center Thursday night to defeat the West Ottawa Panthers for the seventh time in the eight meetings between the two schools, 60-49.

The Maroons were especially effective in the second quarter, the turning point of the game, when they held the Panthers to six points on four free throws and one of nine field goal attempts while also dominating the boards, 14-6.

Meanwhile the Maroons displayed their best shooting of the night, nine of 20 to come from a 14-13 deficit after the opening quarter and lead, 31-20 at the half.

West Ottawa jumped off to an early lead, the widest margin being 11-5, on the basis of good rebounding which resulted in a fast break offensive for the Panthers. Christian, on the other hand seemed tense at the outset.

The Panthers attempted to maintain their first quarter pace in the second period but were guilty of numerous turnovers at the quarter's outset in an attempt to utilize the fast break offense which had clicked in the opening quarter.

Led by Dan Brower's eight points the Maroons gained momentum and took control of the game.

With 2:07 left in the first half Brower picked up his third personal foul and was removed from the game by coach Art Tuls.

When the second half started Brower was still on the bench, not to re-enter the game until 0:20 remained in the third quarter. West Ottawa dominated the boards (15-10) cutting the margin to 45-37 at the close of the third quarter as Panther center Lynn Loncki netted 11 points.

Although the Panthers garnered eight field goals in the quarter to only three for the Maroons, Christian was able to maintain an eight point lead on some fine free throw shooting, converting eight of 12 attempts with Bob Haven hitting six of eight.

This was in marked contrast to the Panthers cold second quarter, when although they connected for only one field goal, they could have been with in better striking distance had they connected for more than the four of 10 free shot attempts they made.

As so often happens when a team is trailing they foul and the Maroons, although having a cold shooting night much the same as the Panthers, managed to convert 14 free shots, 11 in the second half.

West Ottawa never could get closer than eight points in the final period although Loncki, who had 18 of his game high 22 points in the second half, kept the Panthers in the game just as Brower spearheaded the Maroon attack.

Les Sommermaand, the leading Panther scorer entering the game, added 10 points to West Ottawa's attack, while Christian was led by Brower's 20 points and Haven's 15, nine of them coming from 15 free throw attempts.

In the game West Ottawa hit just 32 per cent of their shots on quarters of five of 12, one of nine, eight of 23 and five of 15 for a game total of 19 of 59 shot attempts.

Holland Christian wasn't much sharper hitting 23 of 65 shots for 35 per cent on quarters of five of 16, nine of 20, three of 12, and six of 17.

The game was evenly matched on the boards where the Maroons registered 44 rebounds to the Panthers 40.

Loncki was the game's leading board man with 15 followed by teammate Mark Scheerhorn's 11.

The Maroons were led by substitute center Dick Frens with 10, Bruck Klaasen and Haven with eight and Brower with seven.

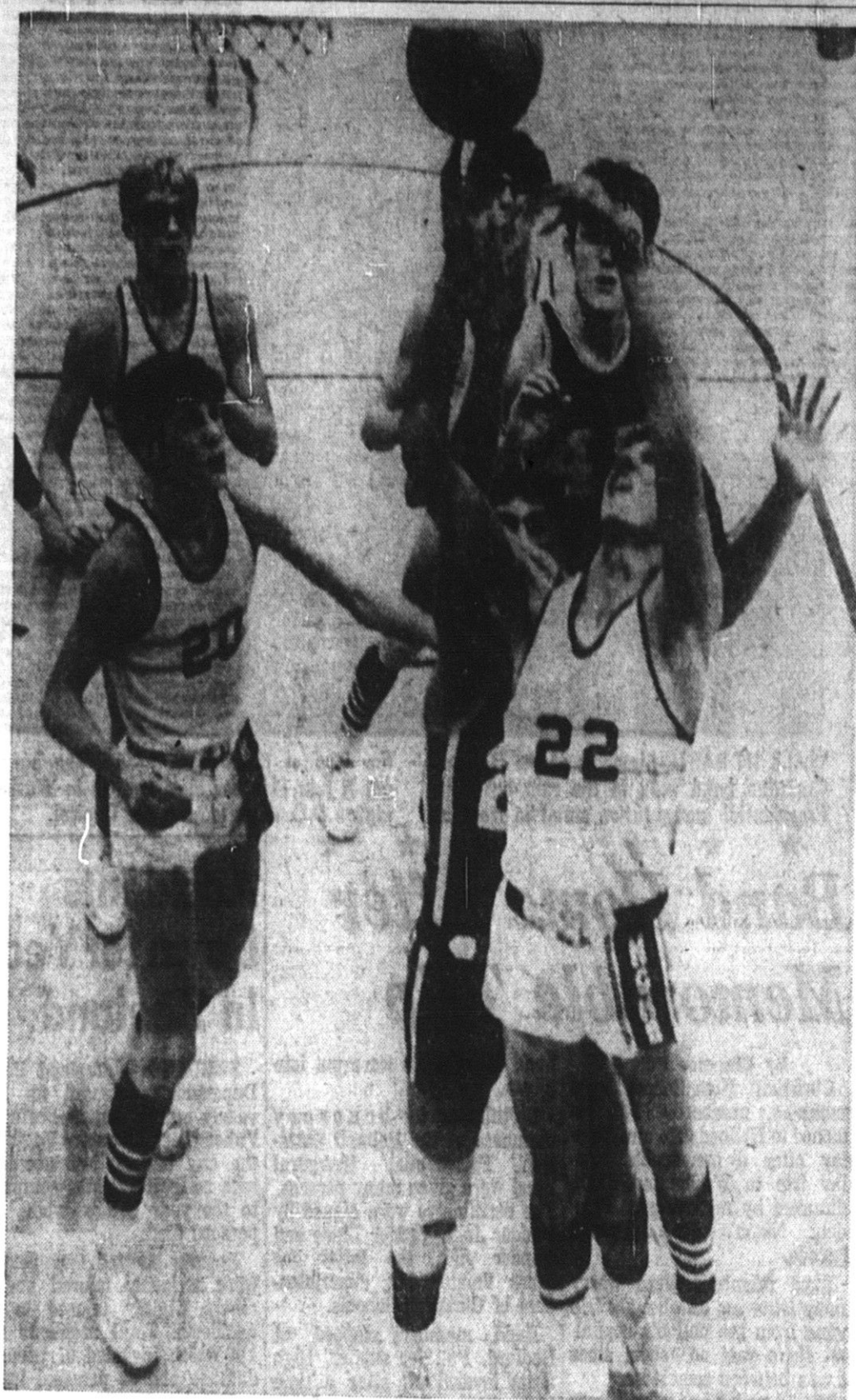
The win extended Christian's Civic Center winning string to 20 and upped the Maroons season record to 7-3. West Ottawa now stands 6-2 for the year.

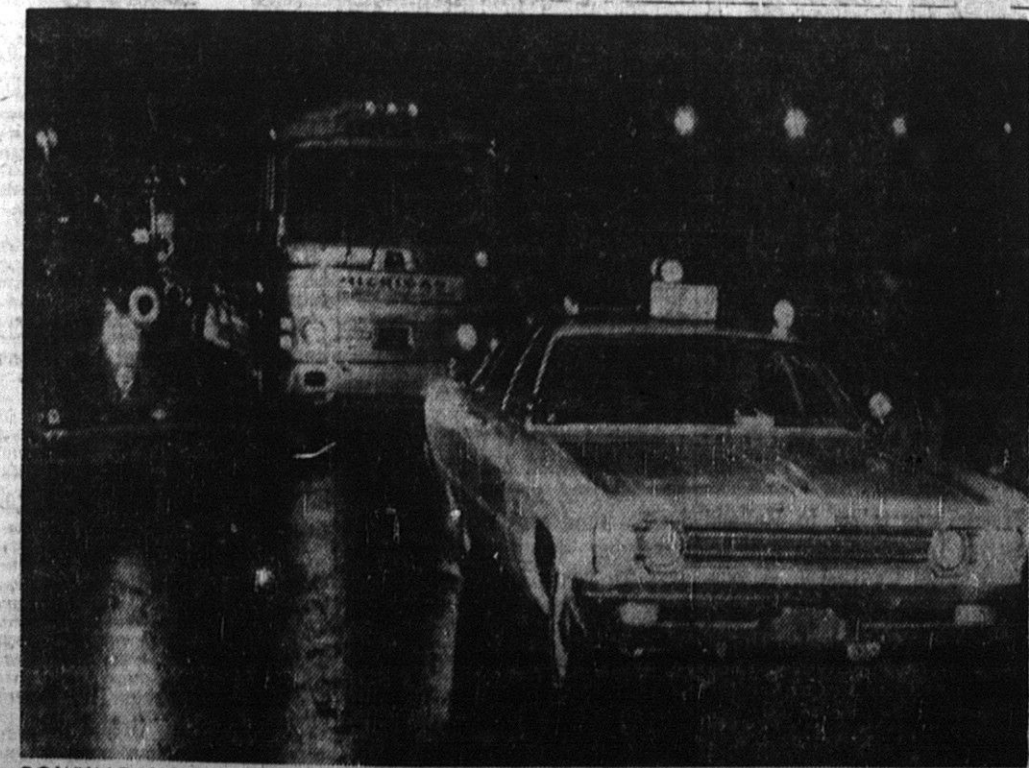

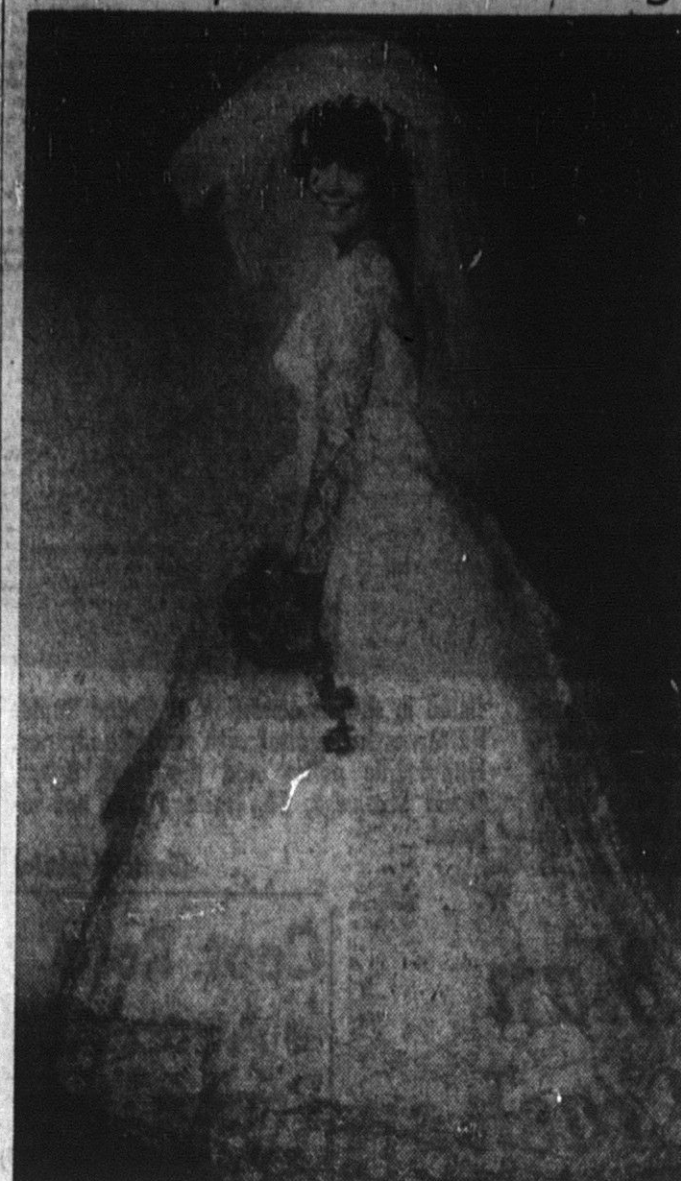

As speaker, Dr. Donald H. Bouma, professor of sociology at Western Michigan University, said the hardest thing to accomplish today is to keep people interested in the welfare of their own communities in a world of startling change. He pointed to the mixed-up reasoning of the past 18 months, the protest of race and young people who admit they are not concerned with individual issues but only with the Establishment.

Stating that common sense is not very common, Dr. Bouma said the only thing worse is the so-called horse sense, a leftover problem of bygone days. Another problem is that while the world faces the same old problems, they have new faces — for instance poverty, narcotics and race issues.

Up to a year and a half ago, non-whites were insisting on being called Negroes but now they want to be called blacks, and instead of an integrated society many are building self respect on a hate basis. As for student protest, young people who previously ate goldfish or complained about dormitory food, now attack The System with no goals and regard "getting ahead" as phony.

He put in a strong plug for family planning, stating that an unwanted child on welfare can cost \$18,000 to taxpayers. He pointed to a classic case of one woman with 19 illegitimate children whose older children are now producing illegitimate children.

President Van Raalte asked all citizens to be alert to changing conditions and do their part. "What happened in Detroit and Chicago can happen in Holland," he said.

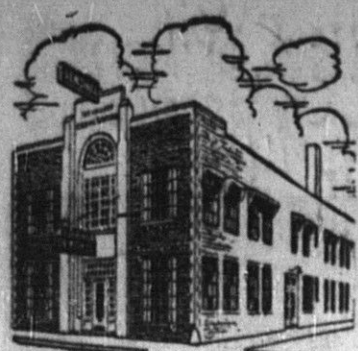

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Jan. 26  
People Misunderstand Jesus  
Mark 3:20-27, 31-35  
By C. P. Dame

A university professor was scheduled to conduct a class on "The Problem of Jesus." Jesus may be a problem to unbelievers but He solves problems for believers. True, He is misunderstood but they who yield themselves to Him learn to know Him better and better.

I. His own family misjudged Jesus. After a tour through Galilee, Jesus returned to Capernaum and as soon as it was known many came to Him, some out of curiosity, some to be healed, some to bring friends to be healed, Jesus was so busy that He did not have time to eat. His friends got concerned and "went out to lay hold on Him; for they said, He is beside Himself." They feared Jesus was losing His mind. Recall that Festus the Roman governor said that Paul was mad (Acts 26:24).

The relatives and friends of Jesus were not in sympathy with His way of life. He had left the village carpenter shop. He was traveling here and there and by His preaching He was arousing the hatred of the religious leaders. Evidently they thought it was time for Jesus to go home and that is why they had come to Him.

II. It is dangerous to discredit Jesus. Some scribes came from Jerusalem to Capernaum to investigate. They said that Jesus was "possessed by Beelzebub and by the prince of the demons he casts out demons." Jesus pointed out their stupidity and wickedness. "How can Satan cast out Satan?" He does not fight against himself.

"No one can enter into a strong man's house and spoil his goods except he first bind the strong man; and then will he spoil his house." It is ridiculous to say that Satan was helping Jesus who was robbing him of power and possessions. Jesus is the strong man. The scribes were attributing the work of Jesus to the devil—this was dangerous. Those who do not want to repent make themselves unable to obtain forgiveness of their sins.

III. The spiritual family abides. While Jesus was preaching His mother and brothers called Him. After Jesus had been told this He asked, "Who is my mother and brethren?" Without waiting for an answer He said, "Behold, my mother and brethren. For whosoever shall do the will of God, the same is my brother and sister, and mother."

Two families were represented in this scene—the natural family to which He and His brothers belonged and the spiritual family to which all who do the will of God belong. We become members of one family by natural birth, by spiritual birth, membership, in the Lord's household.

By our conduct we show to what family we belong. Doing God's will—repenting of our sins, trusting Jesus for salvation, and glorifying God—these things people who do God's will do gladly. It is not always easy to do God's will in a wicked world by people who still have an old self to contend with, but it pays.

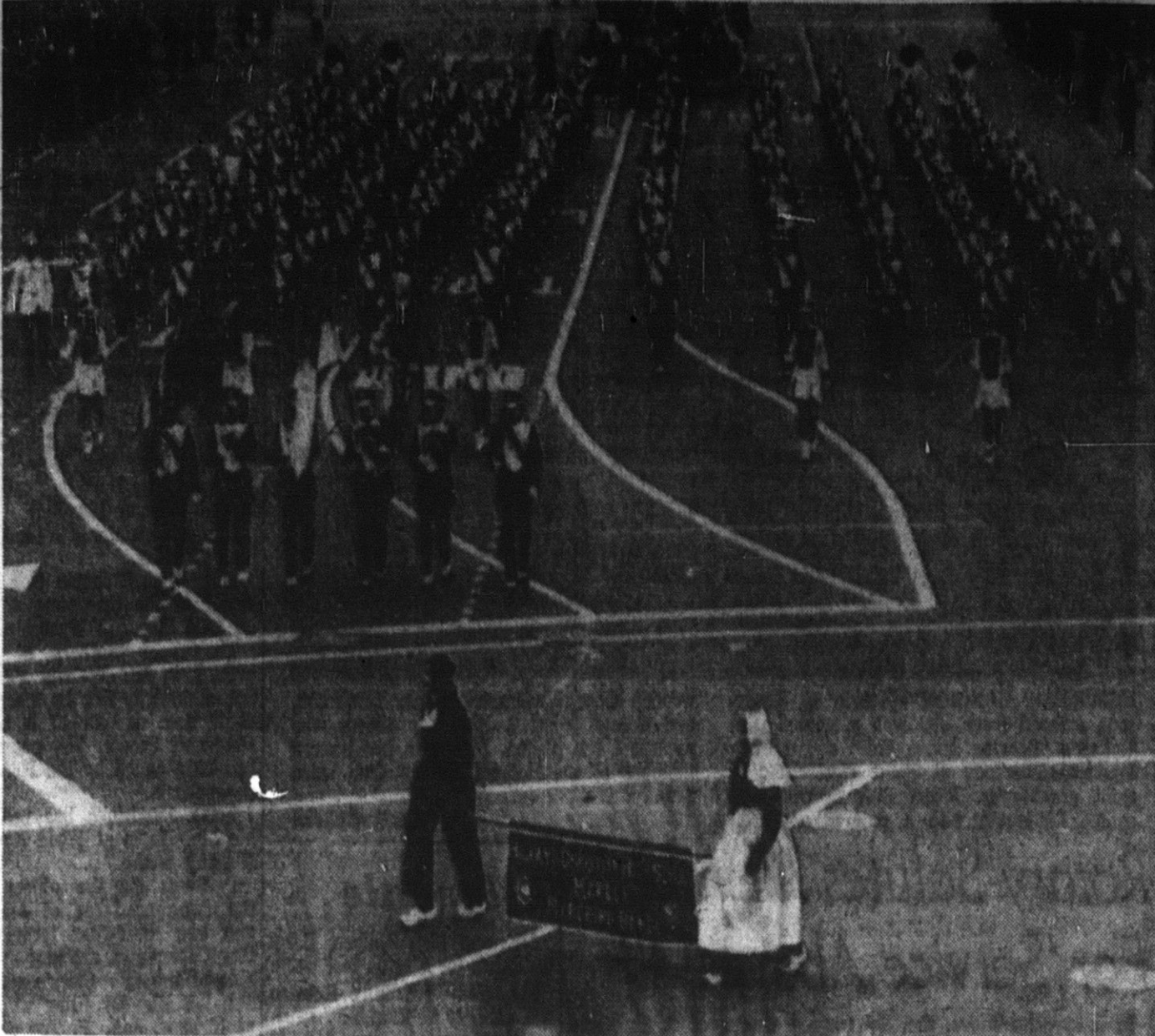

## Christian Band Conduct Praised

WASHINGTON — There were two reasons for Holland to be especially proud when Richard M. Nixon became President with a "sacred commitment" to devote himself and his high office to peace in our time.

Obviously the first reason was the part Holland Christian High School Band had in the inaugural ceremonies. The second was the quiet behind-the-scenes work of chaperones who made the trip and the Band-Parents organization.

The band turned in a flawless performance during the parade which was given a mixed welcome by tourists, unruly demonstrators and tense troops.

But the crude jeers, bitter anti-war signs and army rifles along parts of the parade route were forgotten when the band marched and played with pride for Mr. Nixon and his reviewing stand at the White House. The colorful parade climaxed nearly four days of adventure for the band. Before taking part in the inaugural, band members had done more and seen more than many other visiting musicians, thanks to the work and planning of their elders.

Band Director Henry P. Vander Linde, the chaperones and the Band Parents group conducted the five-day tour in a manner that won high praise in many places.

Part of the success story is shown in a 47-page set of instructions that detailed an almost hour by hour plan and record of the trip.

Included in the details operating manual were departure times from motels, rules of conduct, a few restrictions, the number of miles between stops and even a running cost of the trip. There were even seating charts for the buses. Band members knew before they left Holland who would be roommates in motels.

The advance work was done by businessman Donald Stoltz who came to Washington early for conferences with Congressman Guy Vander Jagt and his staff. When the buses rolled into Washington Saturday from Gettysburg everything was ready for a tour of the Capitol, the city itself and many of the famous historic landmarks.

All during the journey the band left "thank you's" in the form of honorary Band Member Certificates, engraved wooden shoes for each of Vander Jagt's staff and a pair each for Gov. George Romney and President Nixon who will get their klompes later.

There were congratulations and praise for the band's performance and their good conduct.

In a way this should make Holland and all of Michigan proud. The band responded to the advice their director had given before leaving home.

"You are old enough," Vander Linde said, "to accept your responsibility to your organization and school." The fine young people who represented Michigan in the Historic Inaugural Parade did just that.

Today in Washington they're still talking about the Holland Christian High School Band.

Vander Jagt said "Michigan, Holland, parents and the school have many reasons to be proud. I salute the band and all the people who worked so hard to make the trip what it was—a grand success."

## Allegan Boosts Its 'No' Votes In Time Recount

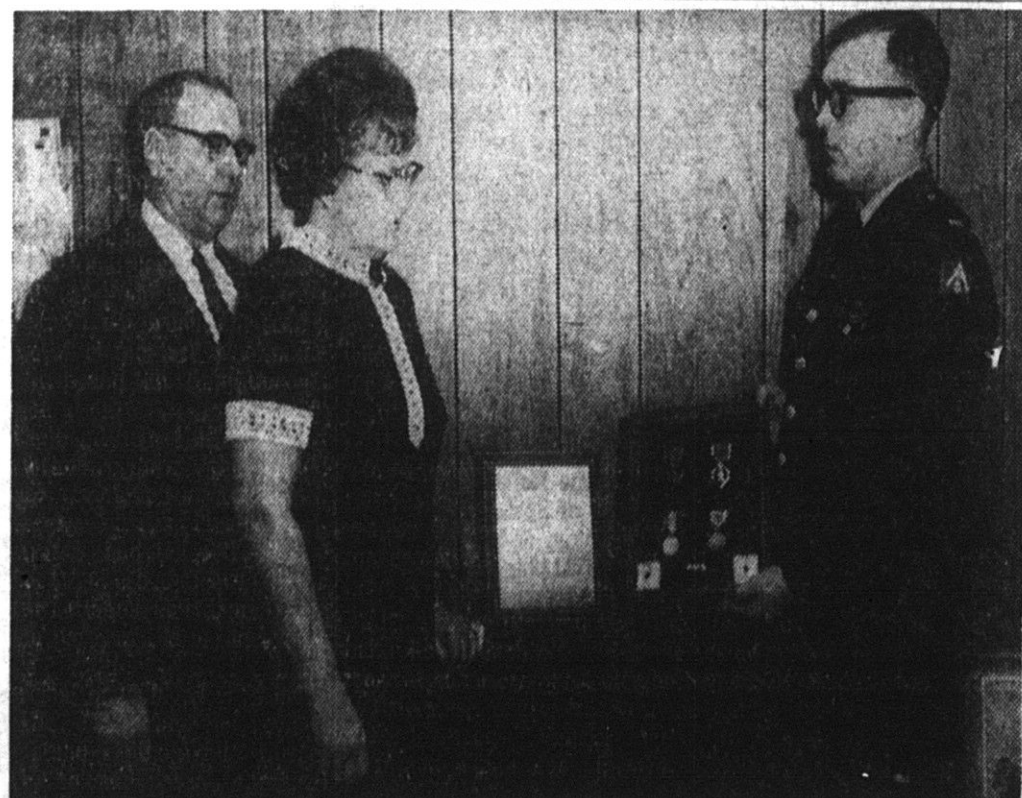
ALLEGAN — Proponents of Daylight Savings Time lost a net of 22 votes in the recount of Allegan county's 37 precincts and three counting boards here last week.

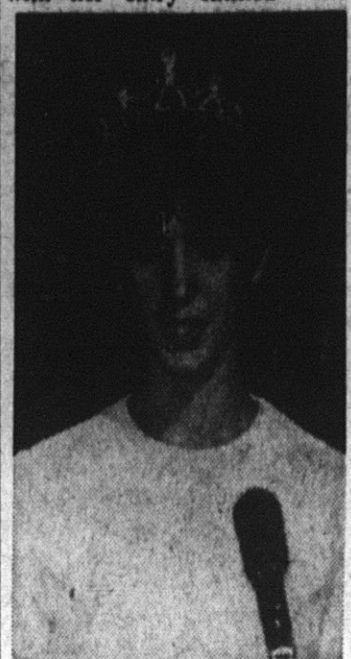

## Demands Exam On Shooting Incident Charge

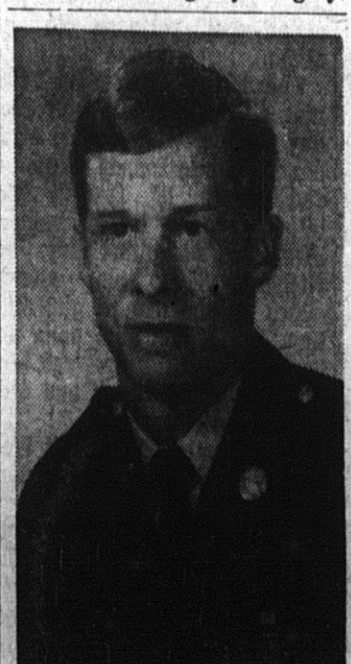

## New Service Organized For Children

GRAND HAVEN — A meeting to acquaint county agencies which deal with problems involving children was held at the Ottawa county building Monday afternoon, called by the juvenile court and the Ottawa intermediate school office. Fifty attended, according to Don Meindertsma, juvenile court welfare agent.

Personnel from many offices in the county were informed of services available through a new department, the Children's Protective Service, which operates under Director Larry Hildore of the Department of Social Services at Holland. "Child welfare services have changed and expanded," Meindertsma said, "and the use of these changes would result in improved services to families where no help was available previously."

Hildore explained the new "Protective Services" and introduced his staff. It was explained that through police departments the agency can remove children from their homes and place them in foster homes, should they be subject to neglect or bad treatment.

Those attending the meeting included officials from Holland, Grand Haven and West Ottawa public schools, department of social welfare, juvenile court, the county education office, the new mental health services board, health department and the sanitation department.

Speakers were Probate Judge F. T. Miles, Sanitarian Leslie Toth, Catherine Groenvelt of the health department and Hildore. Periodic meetings are planned by the sponsors of Monday's meeting.

# Hornets Sting Hope in Overtime

## Hope Loses 4th MIAA Game, 81-79

Kalamazoo College's basketball team all but eliminated any title hopes Hope College may have had as the Hornets registered an 81-79 overtime victory over the Flying Dutchmen here Saturday.

Hope now stands 24 in MIAA action after suffering three consecutive losses to the league's top teams, Calvin, Alma and Kalamazoo.

After Hope led briefly 6-2, with Ken Hendrix scoring Hope's first six points, Kalamazoo streaked to a 26-19 lead at the half's ten minute mark as guard Gene Nusbaum, the Hornets' leading scorer, hit his first four shots.

Hope, playing lackluster basketball, came to life as coach Russ De Vette inserted an entire new lineup and scored eight consecutive points to take a 27-26 lead.

Kalamazoo came back strong behind the play of forward Jim Katona and guard Dan Laskoski to take a 40-35 halftime lead.

Katona netted 11 points in the half while Laskoski had 12. Hope was paced by Marty Snoop with 12 and Hendrix with eight.

Kalamazoo employed a 1-2-3 box zone defense throughout the game and it was especially effective in preventing the Hope guards, Dan Shinabarger, Tom Dykstra and Randy Adolphs, from playing their driving type of game.

Hope also had a hard time employing its man to man defense against the weaving Hornet offense which also employed an occasional high post pick, from which Laskoski operated.

Toughening up in the second half the Dutchmen caught the Hornets behind the scoring of Shinabarger and Hendrix and some inspired board work by Bruce Van Huis and Snoop.

With 0:50 remaining and Kalamazoo ahead 73-71 Hope got control of the ball as Snoop won a jump ball tip.

Snoop then attempted a shot but missed and Dick Winkley rebounded for the Hornets but lost the ball to Van Huis who fed Hendrix underneath for a bucket with 0:26 remaining.

With 0:12 left and the game tied the Hornets worked a side court out of bounds play with Laskoski getting a ten foot shot from the baseline. Van Huis was there to partially block the attempt but Winkley got the rebound only to miss a turn around eight footer and send the game into overtime.

The overtime period was all Kalamazoo as they never trailed. Hope wasn't able to hit a field goal attempt until only 1:01 remained in the overtime.

Although Hope connected on three field goals to Kalamazoo's one, the Hornets hit six of nine free shots while Hope didn't convert any in only one attempt.

In the game Hope hit 44 percent on 33 of 76 shot attempts, while the Hornets hit 30 of 68 shots for the same 44 percent.

Kalamazoo, however, converted 21 of 33 free throw attempts while Hope received only 19 opportunities at the charity stripe and hit 13.

The Flying Dutchmen had a difficult time stopping the outside shooting of Laskoski, who finished with a game high 20 points with the rest of Kalamazoo's starting lineup all placing in double figures.

Hope was led by Hendrix with 19 while Snoop and Shinabarger each added 17.

Hope was outrebounded for the third straight game as Kalamazoo pulled down 51 rebounds to Hope's 49.

Snoop led Hope with 14 while Van Huis added 10 and Hendrix, Hope's other front liner, had only three.

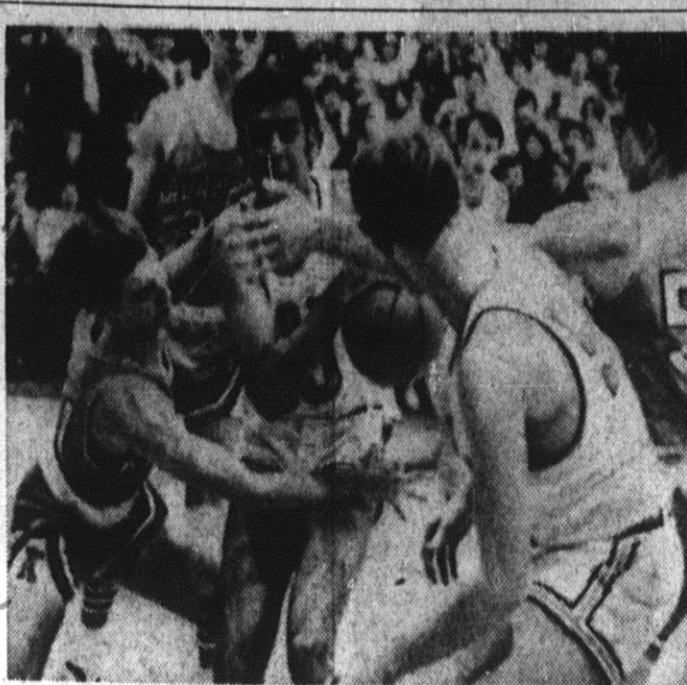

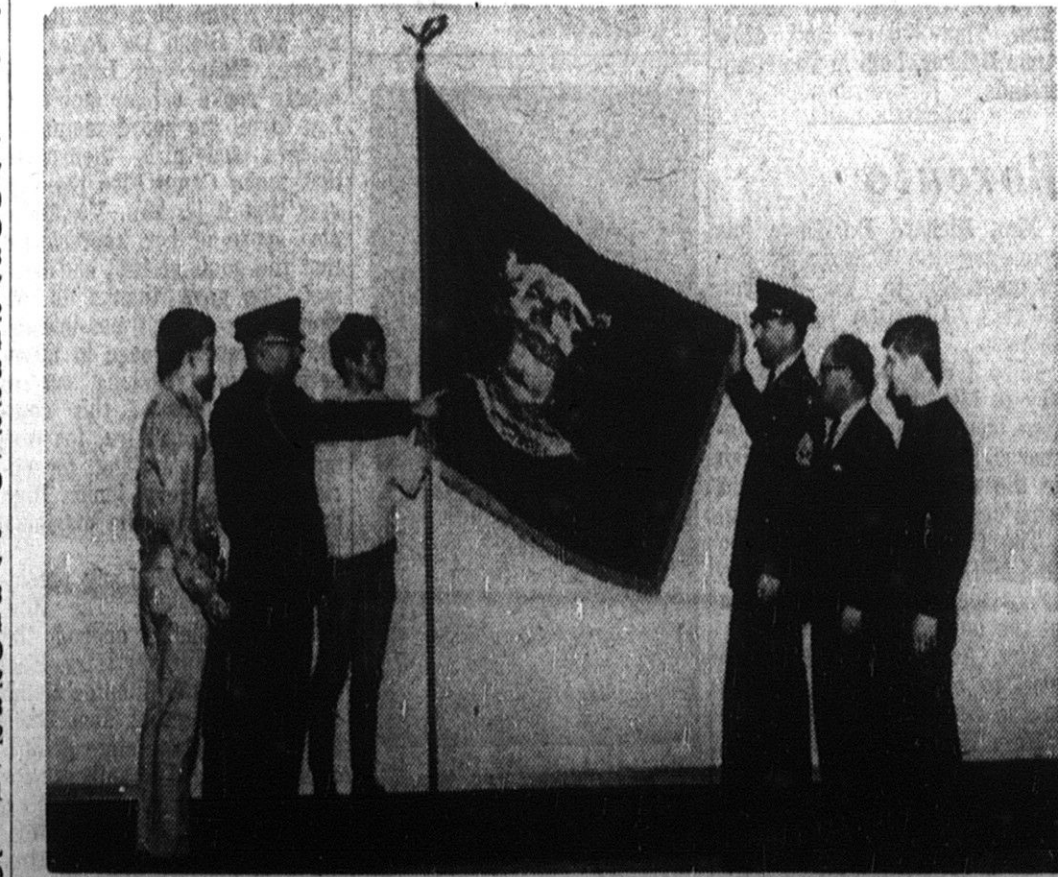

**MUSKOGON** — Scoring 20 points or better per game has become a nostalgia for Holland guard Dave De Witt.

So after hitting for the magic 20 in six straight games, De Witt ripped the cords for 34 points here Friday to lead Holland to its sixth VCC win without defeat, 85-67 over the Mona Shores Sailors.

Add to this the rebounding strength and added scoring punch of front line men Dave Gosselar, Rick Zwerling and Max Glupker and the bench strength of Tom Pete, Dick Boeve and Fritz Steininger and you have a happy Holland coach, Don Piersma, who said after the contest, "Now we're back where we belong."

## Hand Holland Second Loss In Nine Starts

"They run, pass and shoot well. They're a fundamentally sound ball club and you don't beat teams like that."

That was Holland coach Don Piersma's explanation of his team's 87-72 loss to fifth ranked Class B Wyoming Godwin here Tuesday night before a jam packed fieldhouse crowd.

The loss was Holland's first in eight games and their second in nine starts this season. "The first quarter killed us. We only hit 24 per cent."

Godwin, utilizing a pressing man for man defense, along with some fine guard play by Phil De Zwaan and Jose Hernandez, raced to a 21-11 margin which was too much for the Dutch to ever surmount.

Godwin utilized long out of bounds passes, usually by center Dana Snoop, following Holland baskets on which the guards De Zwaan and Hernandez were able to register some easy baskets.

Godwin capitalized on anywhere from six to 10 of these type of buckets to provide the game's margin of victory.

But that wasn't the only phase of the game in which the Dutch were bested.

With Godwin shooting 49 per cent on 34 of 70 shots, which cut down on rebound opportunities. Holland was able to out-rebound the Wolverines by only two, 44-42, a majority of the rebounds coming on the defensive boards while on the offensive boards the Dutch weren't afforded many opportunities for a second shot.

Godwin built its lead to 42-29 at the half as Holland forward Dave Gosselaar, who did a fine job defending Snoop, picked up his third foul of the game with 2:59 remaining in the half.

With Gosselaar on the bench Snoop enjoyed his finest quarter scoring eight of his 21 point total.

Godwin came back strong in the third quarter, racing to a 65-40 lead near the end of the quarter.

Godwin was maintaining its style of ball with De Zwaan and Hernandez scoring the easy baskets while Holland was never really able to get its running game going.

Any hopes the Dutch had of catching Godwin faded when Gosselaar left the game via the foul route with 6:59 remaining. Gosselaar played a fine game, scoring 19 points and adding 12 rebounds while seeing limited action.

The Dutch were led in scoring by Dave De Witt's 20 points despite some fine defense by Godwin's guards which cut off much of De Witt's baseline driving. Max Glupker added 18 points, 12 in the final quarter. In the game Holland hit 27 of 64 field goal attempts for 43 per cent compared to Godwin's 49 per cent.

Holland converted 24 of 32 free throws while Godwin attempted 30 charity tosses and made 19. Snoop led the Wolverine rebounders with 10 before fouling out late in the game.

Holland, now 7-2 for the year, gets back to VCC competition Friday night when the Dutch host Muskegon Heights at 7:45 p.m.

WASHINGTON — The Ma-ron Marching band of Chris-tian High School of Holland, Mich., proudly took its place in President Nixon's Inaugural Parade Monday, marching in the 5th division headed by the U.S. Navy Band.

The Holland band members lined up at 1:30 p.m. at the former Bolling Air Base just east of the Capitol, and plans called for it to be marching on historic Pennsylvania Ave. around 3 p.m., playing the Uni-versity of Michigan Victors' Song while passing the White House.

Band Director Henry P. Van-der Linde said the parade route is just twice as long as Holland's Parade of Bands route during Tulip Time. For Tulip Time, the band lines up at 10th St. and Columbia Ave. and marches west on Eighth St. to Kollen Park.

In customary fashion, Vander Linde has been putting the band through brisk rehearsals. His parting pep talk at the Arling-ton motel Sunday was: This is what we came here for. . . we want you to know we're repre-senting the State of Michigan here tomorrow."

Saturday morning the band rehearsed in the fieldhouse of Eisenhower College at Gettys-burg when rain interrupted the scheduled practice at the motel court. After a two-hour tour of the historic battlefield, the buses rolled toward Washing-ton, arriving at the Capitol to be greeted by Cong. Guy Van-der Jagt on the floor of the House of Representatives.

In the Capitol, the Holland delegation also met Minority Leader Gerald R. Ford Jr. of Grand Rapids, who represented Holland in the House many years. Also at the Capitol was Col. Gerald Naber, formerly of Holland and a Christian High

graduate, currently in Intelli-gence at the Pentagon. Col. Naber graduated from West Point. Rep. Vander Jagt was presented with wooden shoes in the House of Representatives.

Vander Jagt took the band members into Statuary Hall and addressed them in the Capitol Rotunda. Later Vander Jagt and some of his staff including James Mudge served as guides on a bus tour of historic places in the Nation's Capital.

An unexpected pleasure was witnessing a premier showing of NASA's latest Apollo 8 film in the Space and Aeronautics room of the Sam Rayburn House building. While in the area, the band visited the in-aural area at the east en-trance of the Capitol.

On Sunday, band members joined a good share of 2,000 Midshipmen at a Protestant service in the U.S. Naval Academy Chapel at Annapolis con-ducted by Chaplain Robert Mc Cormas who welcomed the Hol-land delegation.

Later, the Holland students had walking tours of the acade-my grounds, 20 to a group, arranged by Lee and Betty Huizenga, former Holland resi-dents. Later the Holland crowd was welcomed at a reception arranged by the Huizengas at the Reformed Presbyterian Church in Annapolis. The Rev. Charles Steenstra, pastor of Faith Christian Reformed Church of Holland and president of the Holland School Board, participated in the church service.

The band presented Chaplain McCormas with wooden shoes. Wooden shoes also went to the mayor of Annapolis and representatives of the Annapolis Historical Society.

All trees near the Capitol are ringed with 10-foot square plat-forms to prevent persons from climbing trees.

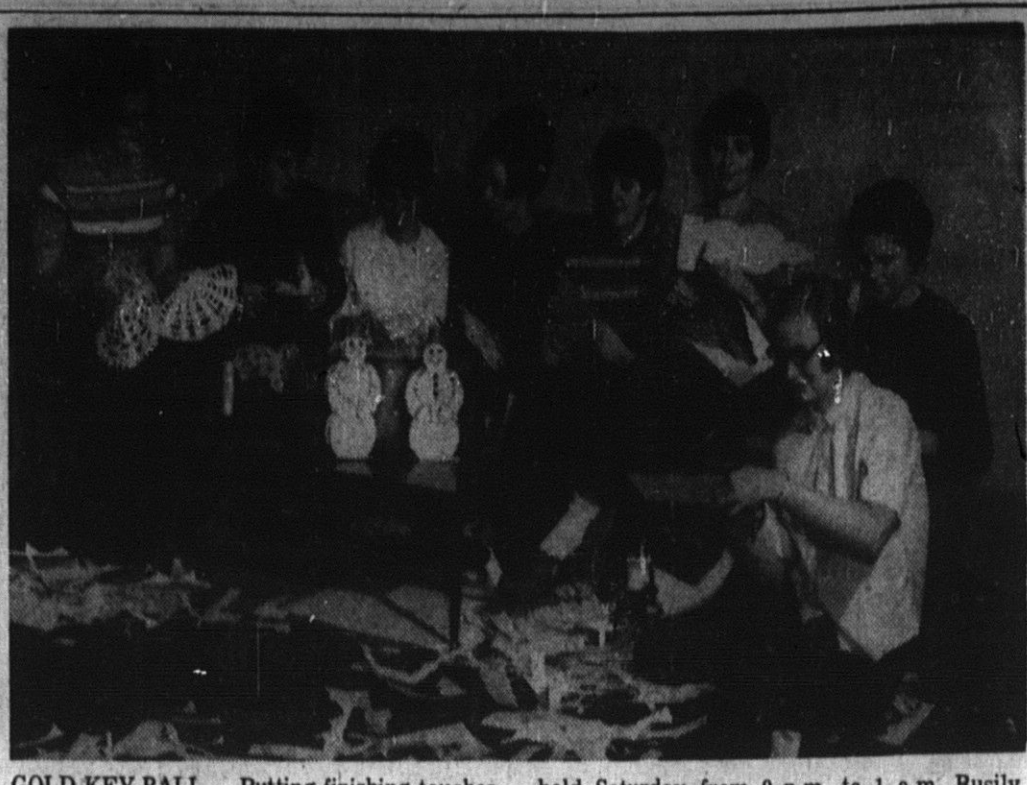
