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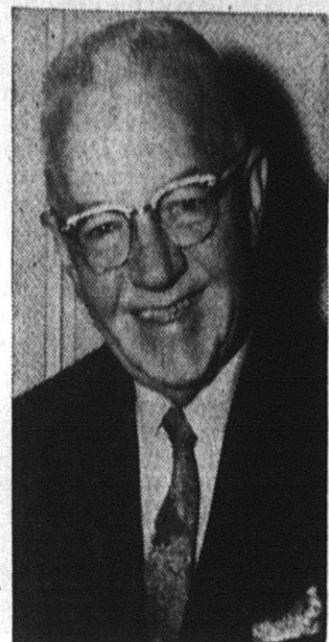
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Dr. Kruithof Retiring From Hope Faculty

Dr. Bastian Kruithof, professor of religion at Hope College the past 15 years, will retire from the fulltime faculty of the college at the end of the semester.

Dr. Kruithof was graduated from Calvin College in 1927, completed his master's degree from the University of Michigan in 1933, and was awarded an honorary doctorate by Hope College in 1951. He completed his Ph. D. at the University of Edinburgh in 1955.

His active and far-ranging career included the serving as pastor of several churches including the Beverly Reformed

Church in Grand Rapids, and the First Reformed Church in Holland. He left the pulpit to join the Hope faculty in 1957.

Dr. Kruithof has taught in a variety of areas including the fine arts and philosophy concentrating on Christian Classics and Ethics.

He has written extensively, publishing six books and countless articles in a wide variety of publications. He is a regular contributor to the Christian Century, the Church Herald, the Reformed Review and the Sunday School Guide, writing expositions on international lessons.

Dr. Kruithof is a member of the Theological Commission of the Reformed Church in America, and is serving many official capacities in the church. He holds local membership in the Third Reformed Church in Holland.

Dr. Kruithof's son, Frederick, is also an ordained minister in the Reformed Church and has served pulpits in Philadelphia and Muskegon.

Recently Dr. Kruithof was honored by being named a "Distinguished Alumnus of Calvin College." As a lecturer and consultant, he has presented papers and conducted conferences for ministers and teachers throughout the country.

Dr. Gordon J. Van Wylen Named Hope President

Engineering Dean of U-M Is Selected

New Head Graduate Of Calvin; Doctoral Degree From M.I.T.

Gordon J. Van Wylen has been appointed the ninth President of Hope College.

Van Wylen, who is Dean of the College of Engineering at the University of Michigan, was selected by a unanimous vote during a meeting of the Hope College Board of Trustees Friday.

His appointment, which will be effective July 1, culminates nearly a two year search for a President of the 106-year-old liberal arts institution. The office has been vacant since August, 1970 when Dr. Calvin A. Vander Werf resigned after serving as President for seven years.

Mrs. Norman Vincent Peale of New York, a member of the Board of Trustees, was chairman of a Presidential Search Committee which considered nearly 150 candidates for the office. The Search Committee was comprised of trustees, alumni, faculty and students.

Dr. Van Wylen was introduced to the Hope College faculty this afternoon during a meeting in Phelps Hall.

Hope College is affiliated with the Reformed Church in America and has an enrollment of 2,101 men and women.

"An eminent scholar and a skilled administrator, Dr. Van Wylen is a man of wide ranging interests warmly devoted to Christian higher education," said Hugh DePree, chairman of the Board of Trustees.

"Colleagues laud his rapport with his faculty and students speak of his humility, integrity and boundless compassion."

"As we begin another era in Hope's remarkable history all of us anticipate new achievements of attainment and service in the fulfillment of our unique role," DePree added.

Dr. Van Wylen has been a member of the University of Michigan faculty since 1951 serving first as an Assistant Professor of Mechanical Engineering.

"We accept Dean Van Wylen's resignation with very deep regret. He is, and has been, one of our outstanding Deans," said University of Michigan President R. W. Fleming.

The Hope Presidency represents a new and different challenge and one which he has decided, after careful consideration, to take. We send with him our warmest best wishes and our complete confidence that he will be a distinguished President."

Dr. Van Wylen, 51, grew up in Grand Rapids, graduating from Ottawa Hills High School in 1937. He attended Calvin College from 1937 to 1940 and The University of Michigan from 1940 to 1942 on the 3-2 plan, and received the A.B. from Calvin College and the B.S.E. (Mechanical Engineering) from The University of Michigan in 1942. Upon graduation, he took a

Hope Welcomes New President

The need for church-related colleges which offer a rich Christian dimension while preserving intellectual freedom was underscored by Dr. Gordon J. Van Wylen, newly appointed president of Hope College, at a press conference on campus Friday afternoon.

Dr. Van Wylen, dean of the College of Engineering at the University of Michigan was named the new president earlier in the day by the Hope College board of trustees in unanimous decision. His appointment is effective July 1.

He said among the many issues and challenges confronting higher education today, new ways are sought to cope with diminishing resources, declining public confidence, student disenchantment with the traditional curriculum, the demand for greater productivity in the educational sector, and the skyrocketing costs of a college education.

Dr. Van Wylen was introduced by Hugh De Pree, president of the board of trustees, who sketched Dr. Wylen's biographical data and also introduced Mrs. Norman Vincent Peale, chairman of the committee which conducted a two-year search for the office which has been vacant since August, 1970, when Dr. Calvin A. Vander Werf resigned after serving as president for seven years.

De Pree also introduced Mrs. Van Wylen, the former Margaret De Witt of Grand Haven, a graduate of Duke University and the University of Michigan Medical School. The Van Wylen's have five children ranging from 8 to college age.

Classing Hope College as one of the truly outstanding liberal arts colleges in the nation, Dr. Van Wylen recognized the challenges the presidency entails, and the new opportunities for personal growth. He also recognized the high quality professional administration of the college headed by Executive Vice President Clarence J. Handlogten which will free him from the details of day-to-day administration and the excellence of the development program and volunteer involvement in soliciting funds for financing Hope's educational program.

He said while leadership is a desirable characteristic for a president, that leadership must involve the collective wisdom of all those who are affected by the decision.

"Hope College has a very bright future. The last 18 months have demonstrated that the college can progress without unifying the decision-making powers and all authority in one person in one office. I intend to share the responsibility for leadership and the guidance of this institution with those who legitimately have a claim to it," he said.

He also pointed to the increasing imbalance in public and private educational institutions. "Though more than half of my years as a student were spent in private institutions, all my academic life has been in the public sector and I now wish to make whatever contribution I can to the private in-

stitutions," he said. He was impressed with the work of Chancellor William Vander Lugt, the trustees who have maintained the forward movement of the college and gave special recognition to Chairman De Pree and Secretary Willard Wichers. Dr. Van Wylen felt that the program of projected growth, 2,700 by 1980, was a reasonable aim, one still retaining the atmosphere of a small college.

Dr. Van Wylen will be the ninth president of Hope College founded in 1866. Serving as president were Philip Phelps Jr., 1866-1878; Charles Scott, 1878-1893; Gerrit J. Kollen, 1893-1911; Ame Vennema, 1911-1918; Edward D. Dimment, 1918-1931; Wynand Wichers, 1931-1945; Irwin J. Lubbers, 1945-1963; Calvin A. Vander Werf, 1963-1970.

Murder Reward To Be Reduced

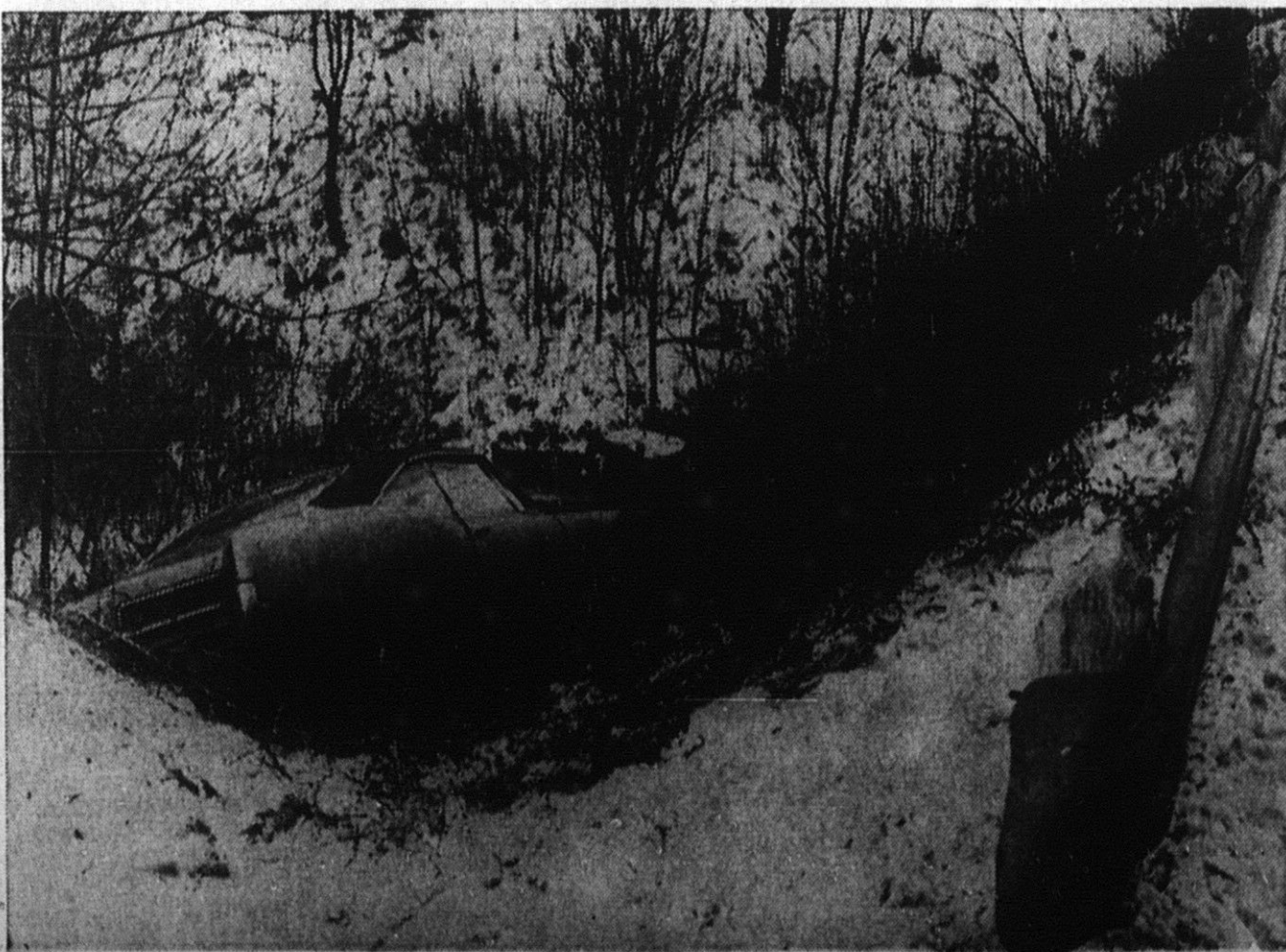
GRAND RAPIDS — A \$10,000 reward for the solution to the slaying of Mrs. Shelley Mills of Grand Rapids will be reduced to \$1,000 on Feb. 1 unless an arrest and conviction is obtained by then, police report Thursday.

Mrs. Mills, a 19-year-old bride of less than a month, was found stabbed to death in her home here Sept. 15, 1970. She had been wounded more than 20 times, authorities said.

The \$10,000 reward had been offered by friends and relatives who gave notice it will be cut to \$1,000 unless solved by Feb. 1.

Volleyballs From Ambush

The death of Rochelle Hudson earlier this week in California stirred many an old Tulip Time memory in Holland. Back in the late 1930s Rochelle was one of the first Hollywood personalities to come to Tulip Time, sponsored by the Holland Furnace Co. In those years, the local company sponsored coast-to-coast broadcasts for Tulip Time.

Among the movie and radio personalities coming to Holland in that era were Richard Arlen, George Raft and bodyguard, Mary Brian, a very young Robert Cummings, Faye Wray, Bill Thompson, Gertrude Niesen, Dorothy Lamour, Professor Quiz, Edmund Lowe, Pat O'Brien, such announcers as Ted Husing and Phil Stewart, and the orchestras of Jim Garber, Ben Bernie, and Herbie Kay.

Events called for a radio broadcast in the Holland Furnace office building on Saturday of Tulip Time. Later the personalities would watch the parade from windows of Hotel Warm Friend.

The December edition of Diesel Equipment Superintendent, a maintenance management magazine devoted to trucks and the like, pictures Earl G. Bolks of Holland on its cover.

Bolks, director of maintenance for Rooks Transfer Lines of Holland, also is the subject of a story about maintenance for short haul feeder lines which form the greater part of the trucking business. Bolks is proud he knows every driver and mechanic by his first name, and he usually can tell the date that each vehicle entered the fleet and the basic specifications for it without looking in the book.

The story deals mostly with the innovations Bolks has brought to the trucking industry, mainly automatic lubrication and other equipment used in checking and maintaining equipment.

The company's longest haul is Muskegon to Chicago, a distance of 200 miles, and a few tractors make two complete turns per day, sometimes running a total of 800 miles in 24 hours for a weekly accumulation of 4,000 miles. Many others average 2,500 miles a week.

Maintenance is done in Holland and in Chicago. Bolks feels many labor saving devices get a poor reputation because the company employing them does not understand how to use them. He believes in having the company send a representative to Holland to install the first one and instruct local personnel in both service and operation. The article has several pictures, one of a trailer promoting the World's Greatest Musical Fountain at Grand Haven.

A letter from Chuck Conrad encloses a copy of the Dec. 13 Congressional Record which carries a paper prepared by Peter Kromann of Holland for the Social Progress Club on the metric system.

Conrad, president of Thermotronics Corp. of Holland, feels the United States should be using the International Standards of measurement, the metric system. He said Kromann did a lot of research in this country and overseas in preparing the paper. Conrad forwarded a copy to U. S. Sen. Robert Griffin who had it read into the Congressional Record.

Kromann, now blind, is familiar with the process of adjusting to the new measurement system since he lived through the changeover from the customary measurement system to the metric system in Denmark.

In the article, Kromann points to the Biblical words, "Meni, Meni, Tekel Upharsin" which King Nebuchadnezzar interpreted as "Weighed in the balance and found wanting." Back in those days, it was customary to use the foot of a grown man as one unit of measurement.

School Accountability Reviewed at AAUW Meet

A full house responded to the topic "Accountability" at the Holland Branch of the American Association of University Women's monthly meeting Thursday night in Durfee Hall. A distinguished panel consisting of Mrs. Robert Bolte representing the parents of the community, Don Ihrman, superintendent of the Holland schools, Paul Vander Hill representing the business community, Lloyd Van Raalte, superintendent of the West Ottawa schools, and Mark Vander Ark, superintendent of the Christian schools was guided by Mrs. Steven Van Grouw, panel moderator.

Opening remarks were made by each panel member concerning school accountability. There was a variety of responses, including being accountable to the Divine Creator as His creatures. The schools' primary responsibility is for those things they can do better than parents and other outside influences. The schools should work harder at preserving natural resources. Gifted children should have their gifts developed and encouraged.

To many, today accountability means measuring educational outcomes through the use of tests. Tests are not the final answer. They don't always measure what they say they will and some things can't be measured by a test.

Schools should have a reasonable amount of authority. They should be accountable to supportive services but most of all to those who they really serve—the children and their parents.

Some very specific questions were also asked. Questions and responses follow:

How involved should teachers, parents and students be in planning and evaluating curriculum? The answers ranged from students should be actively involved because they are good evaluators of teachers and curriculum, to students are too involved in the present to be a good judge of what would be good in the future.

What responsibilities are the schools legally able to assume for student behavior on school property? Schools can make and enforce their own laws if they don't interfere with basic rights of the individual.

The new age of majority ruling also complicates things. Do we have two sets of rules? This wouldn't be very practical so the best alternative would be to have a reasonable set of rules that apply to all. What is reasonable? One of the more practical suggestions was that parents should be responsible for their child's attire and hair.

After diagnosis, what practical programs, materials and personnel are available to meet individual needs? The various special education programs were explained as well as the reading program, the summer schools programs, help for minorities, counseling available and the honors programs.

It was also pointed out that no school exists that can meet all of the needs for all of the children. However, by the use of total cooperation between districts, the use of technology, flexibility of scheduling and the use of community resources, including mothers, much more could be done.

A great deal was said concerning financing of schools. At present, the bulk of the schools' money comes from property tax and the state also supplies some, but this source is on the decline. The Federal government contributes very little. The schools must attempt to plan their budget without knowing how much money they will have or when they will get it. No business venture could operate successfully under these conditions.

The income tax source of in-

come was discussed. At present, the Christian schools are ahead in this area by using a modified version of income tax for their source of revenue. It was not felt however that this would be a perfect solution to the problem either.

Cutting costs of running the schools were discussed but no real solutions were found.

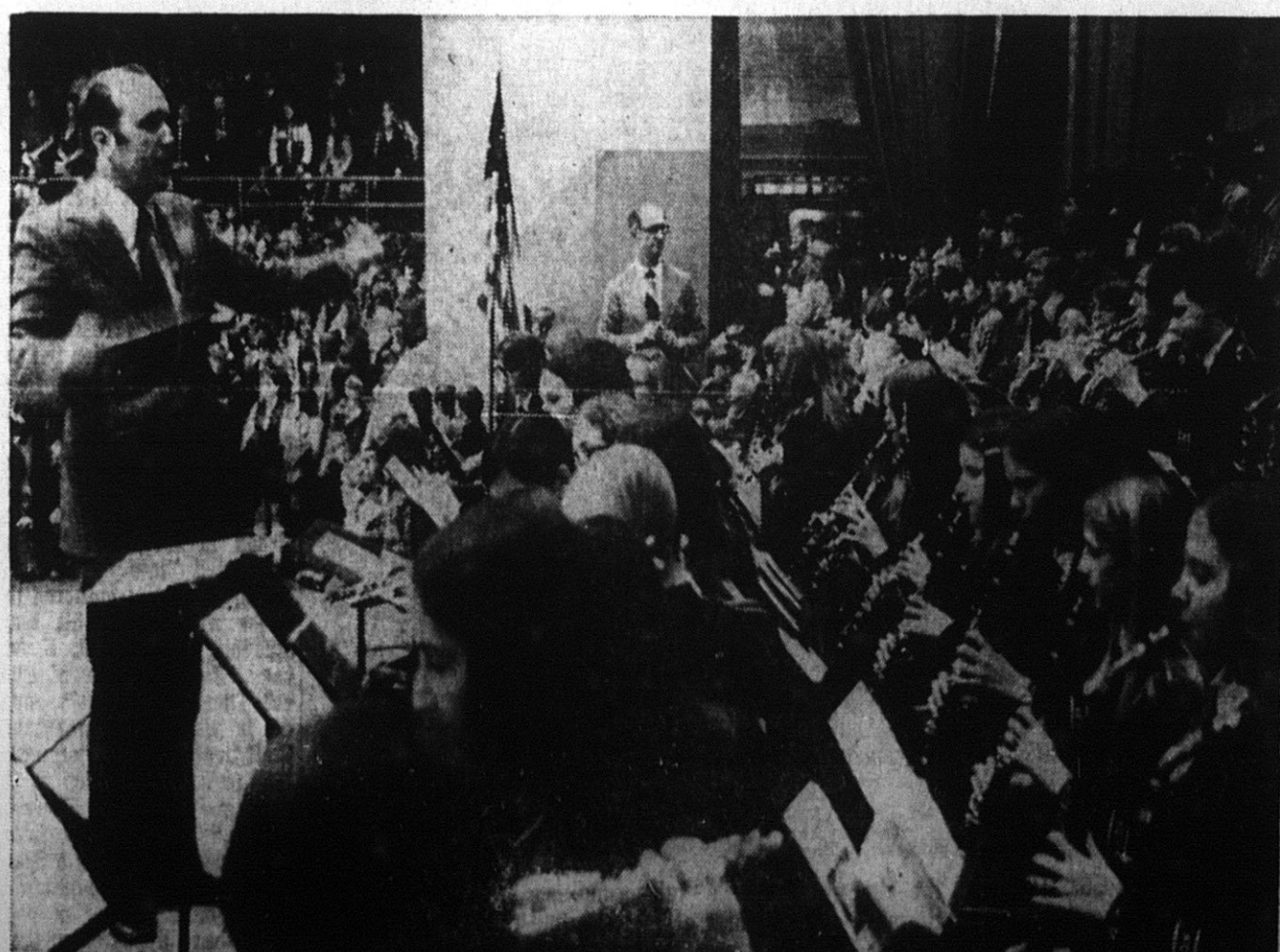

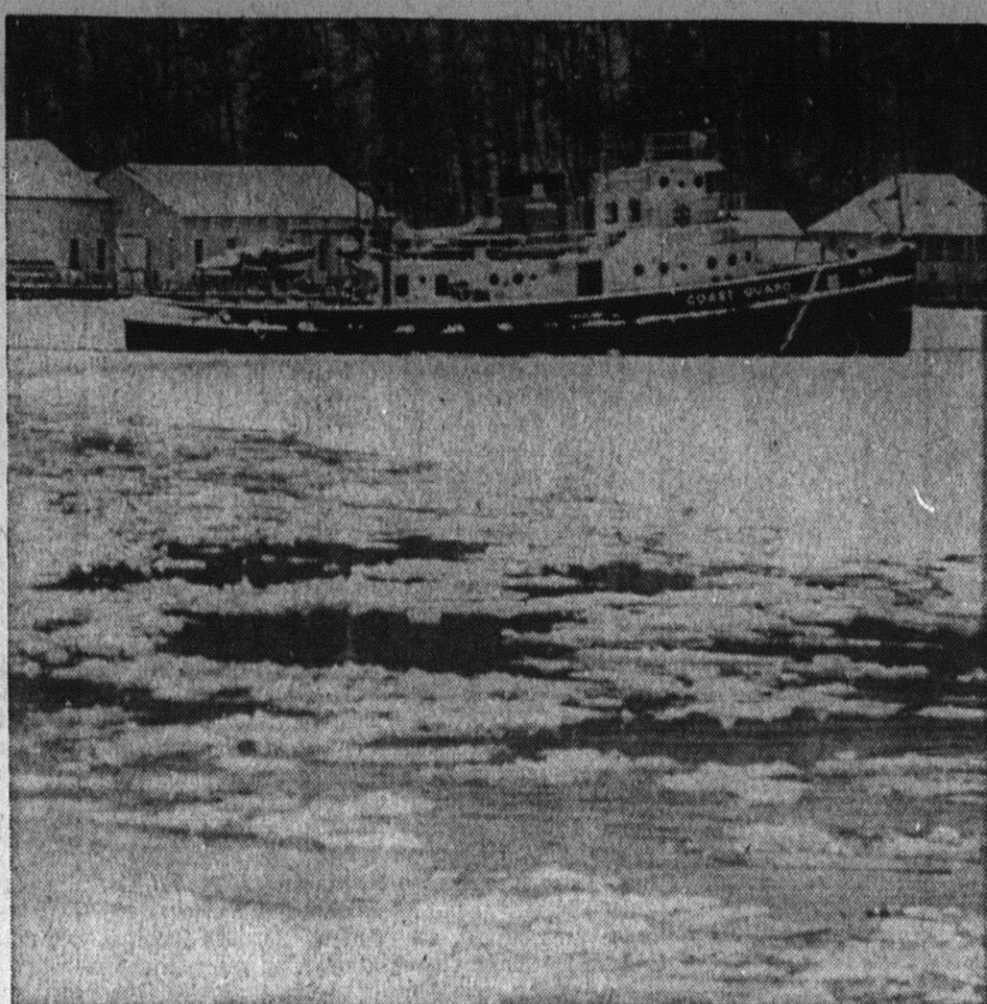

Rev. F. Geiger Dies at 70

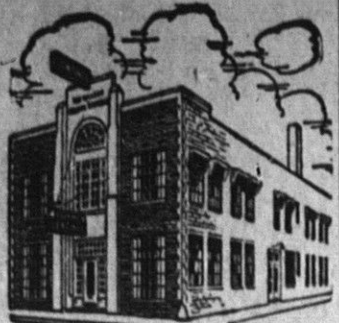

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TOWARD WELL-BEHAVED CARS

One of the great problems that the automotive age has brought with it is the threat of being killed by the irresponsible driver, particularly, our statistics point out, by the drunk driver. All kinds of devices, legal and otherwise, have been suggested as expedients to make the car a less lethal instrument in the hand of undependable man. Even now the State of Michigan is contemplating additional laws to insulate society from the destructive effects of the drunk driver.

Perhaps we are on the wrong track, and perhaps Japan is on the right one. In that country the Honda Motor Company has developed an electronic device which turns off the ignition if the driver gets into the car too far gone on alcohol. It's a sniffing device which senses the change in temperature of the driver's breath resulting from alcohol. So when a misbehaving driver gets into the car, the device detects his inability to drive, behaves well, and turns off the ignition.

The obvious drawback with this sort of device is that it might well turn off the ignition if the driver is sober but his friend is loaded. The Honda Company claims to have overcome this difficulty although it does not divulge how.

If this device really works it would be one of the most important safety improvements to be made in a long time, and very likely more dependable than all the blandishments we use to try to get people to behave responsibly. Honda will begin installing the thing next spring. Perhaps in a short time we'll know whether we can govern ourselves better with will - power or with gadgetry.

Faithful With Possessions
Luke 16:10-15; 20:45
through 21:4

Money is a popular topic. A man stepped into a laundry and someone asked him, "How is everything?" His answer got attention. "Couldn't be any better. A big company declared a dividend." Jesus talked much about money.

This lesson summons us to be faithful in the use of money and our possessions.

1. Fidelity is commendable. After Jesus told the Parable of the Unjust Steward who cheated his employer He said something about the use of money. Jesus said that what a man does in a little matter reveals what he will do in bigger dealings. The use of our possessions tests our character and therefore is the basis on which spiritual riches are bestowed.

What do we value highly? Earthly possessions or spiritual riches? The mammon of unrighteousness—money—can be used for evil and for good. The user of money shows what kind of a person he is by his use of it. One fact is sure; no one can serve two masters. "Ye cannot serve God and mammon."

2. We can't fool God. The Pharisees did not like what Jesus said about money. They thought that God blessed the pious and hence felt that they were entitled to prosperity, and they used the money for themselves. Jesus told the people that they should be on guard against the religious leaders who were really covetous and had no standing with God.

The sharp words Jesus said about the religious leaders of His day are warnings for all religious leaders of today. Religious leaders can be proud, touchy, power-seekers, eager for praise and admiration. 3. Jesus saw the really consecrated. While Jesus was in the temple area He noted how the worshippers were giving. The rich cast much in the treasury. Jesus noted one shabbily dressed poor widow who cast in two mites—all her living. And Jesus praised her saying that she had cast in "more than they all." The rich gave of their abundance. They would not miss anything on account of their giving.

Most people today give and have much left. Sacrificial giving in our land is rare. In many instances the necessities come first, often the luxuries have the priority. We live in a needy world and at the same time in a world that spends freely. This lesson ought to make us all look at the ways we use our money—do we give as Christ wants us to give or do we follow our own pattern?

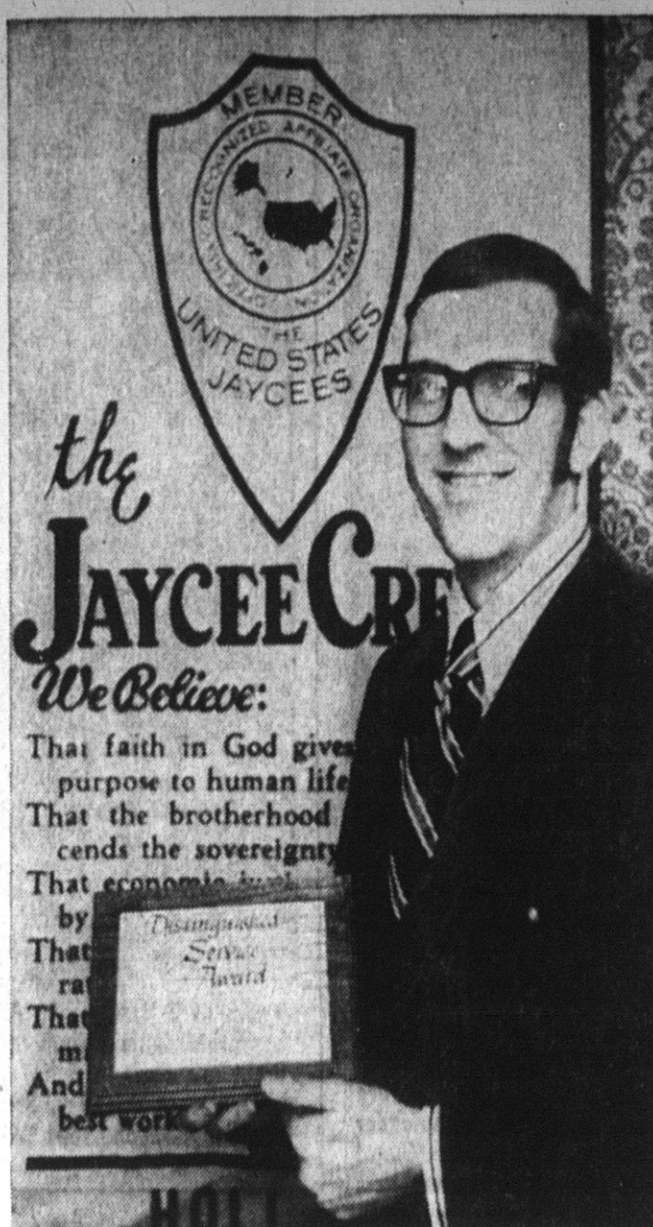

New Assessments In Mail This Week

New assessment figures for 1971 will be mailed this week. The mayor's letter points out that the city tax rate for 1971-72 was down from the previous two years, but taxpayers often confuse school and county tax with city tax since all are paid in City Hall. School tax rates are determined by the Board of Education with considerable portions by direct vote of the public, and the county tax is determined by the County Board of Commissioners.

State law requires all assessments based on 50 per cent of true market value. No revaluation cards will be sent owners of industrial and commercial properties in the Allegan county portion of the city. These properties were reappraised in 1970 and are not a part of the Laird program.

Although they are in the minority, there are some assessments that have been reduced in the new appraisal. From a list of 20 property sales recently in the city, City Assessor Robert Nienhuis lists three calling for increases and three for decreases.

One house assessed at \$12,000 sold for \$32,000, another assessed at \$16,800 sold for \$44,900 and a third assessed for \$17,000 sold for \$43,500.

On reductions, one assessed for \$9,500 sold for \$17,500, another assessed at \$4,500 sold for \$7,000, and a third assessed for \$8,400 sold for \$12,500.

Mayor Lamb asks all persons to read the entire letter since it will answer the greater share of questions. Further recourse is through Laird appointments, the Board of Review and possibly Circuit Court. Councilmen have no voice in assessment changes.

Zeeland Native to Speak At Anniversary Service

Turning to the faith of the forefathers, Holland will usher in its 125th anniversary year with a religious service Sunday, Feb. 6, at 3 p.m. in Dimment Memorial Chapel on Hope campus with Dr. Lester Ronald De Koster, editor of the Christian Reformed Church Banner, as speaker.

Feb. 6 was chosen for the first major observance of the anniversary year since it is the Sunday closest to Feb. 9, the day in 1847 when Dr. A. C. Van Raalte and his scouting party arrived in this area to found the city of Holland, Mich.

Dr. De Koster, a native of Zeeland, who grew up in the Dutch-American tradition of many settlements in Western Michigan, will speak on the subject, "Remember Now—Why?" His message is expected to take about 20 minutes and the remainder of the hour-long service will feature music by the Chapel Choir of Hope College, the chapel organ and the recently installed Dutch Tracker organ in the balcony.

Dr. Bastian Kruihof, professor of religion at Hope College, will preside. He is chairman of the committee arranging the opening religious service. Co-chairmen of the larger anniversary committee are Al Kleis Jr., and John Bloemendaal, both members of City Council.

Dr. De Koster attended Zeeland public schools, Calvin College and took advanced studies at the University of Michigan, University of Chicago and Michigan State University. He taught English and speech at Grand Rapids South High School; was assistant professor of speech at Calvin College from 1947 to 1963, professor of speech in 1964, director of libraries for Calvin College and Seminary 1961-69, and editor of the Banner since 1969. He is the author of several books.

During World War II, he entered the Navy in 1943, served as communications officer for the Naval Air Transport Service in 1944, and was in the Pacific area 1944-46.

Dr. De Koster is married to the former Ruth J. De Vries. They have four children, Leslie, Paul, Mark and Stephen.

Home Bible League Luncheon Attracts 500

More than 500 church women gathered in Christian High School Tuesday noon for the sixth annual luncheon of the Holland-Zeeland division of the World Home Bible League, an event which started in 1965 with some 80 persons in attendance.

Although the event was held on one of the stormiest days of the winter, there was no serious intent to postpone it, something that happened twice last winter because of bad weather. The high school had no classes Tuesday because of midterms.

The Rev. John De Vries, who heads the Home Bible League's program of Bible correspondence courses in countries all over the world, showed slides of a world tour he had taken last summer with William Ackerman, director of the World Home Bible League, which operates out of South Holland, Ill.

Rev. De Vries showed places where the League's scripture gift packs are used in Japan, Taiwan, Hong Kong, Singapore, Ceylon and India. The program covers Bible study in small groups and in correspondence aimed at training laymen to distribute the Bible and teach it to non-Christians.

Mr. Ackerman suffered a heart attack at the close of the tour but has recovered to the extent that he is again handling some of the work of the Bible League. The growing program has a 1972 budget of \$1.6 million, compared with \$1.2 million last year.

The De Vries slides pictured a Japan of a hundred million people so modern it was almost frightening, a land of considerable beauty but with about 1 per cent Christians; Taiwan, a land of 12 million offering sharp contrasts; the Philippines where poverty is appalling; a teeming Hong Kong on the Chinese mainland; a busy Singapore where a single housing complex is designed to house 250,000 persons with one World Home Bible League worker; and Ceylon and India where the number of Christian missionaries is being reduced all the time.

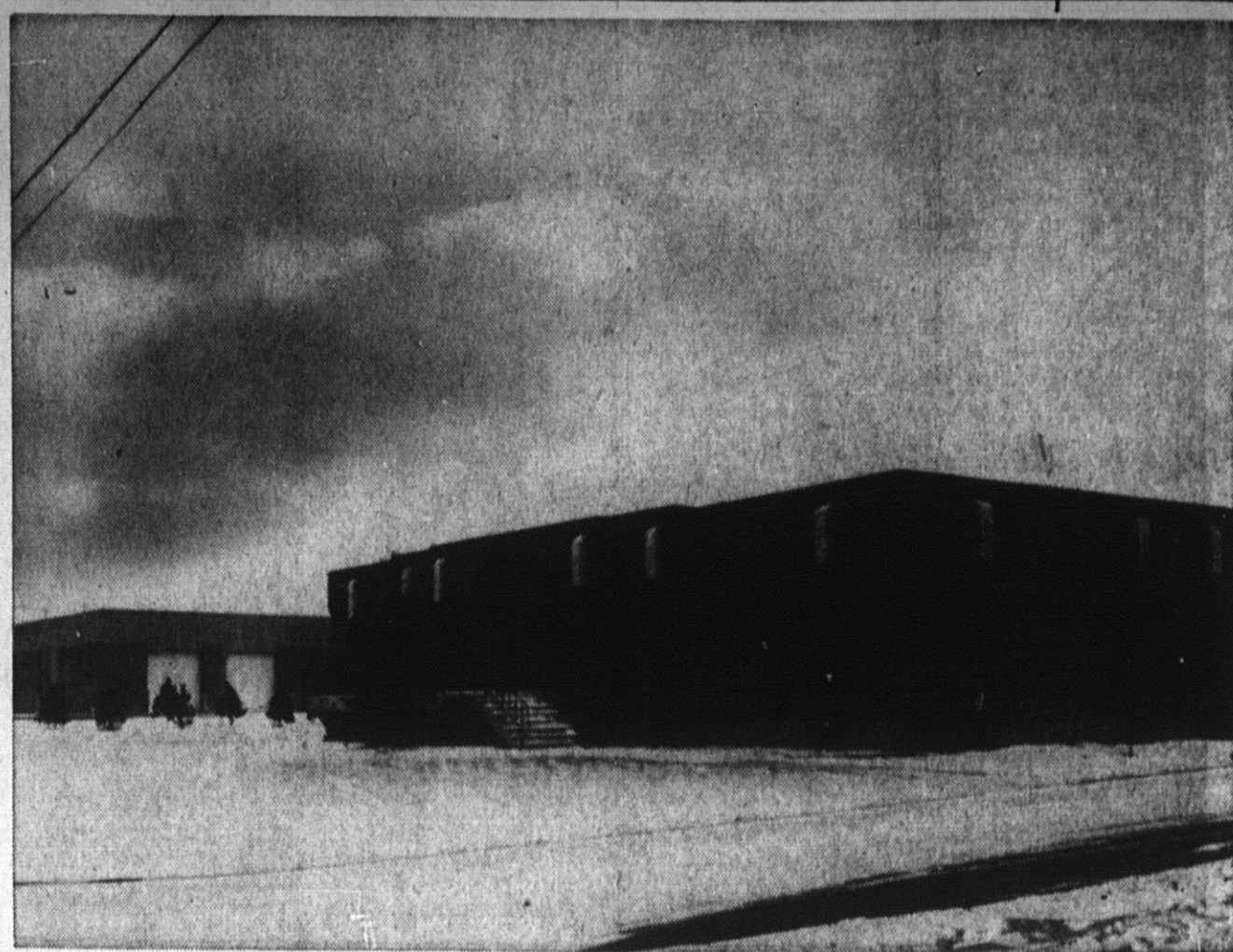

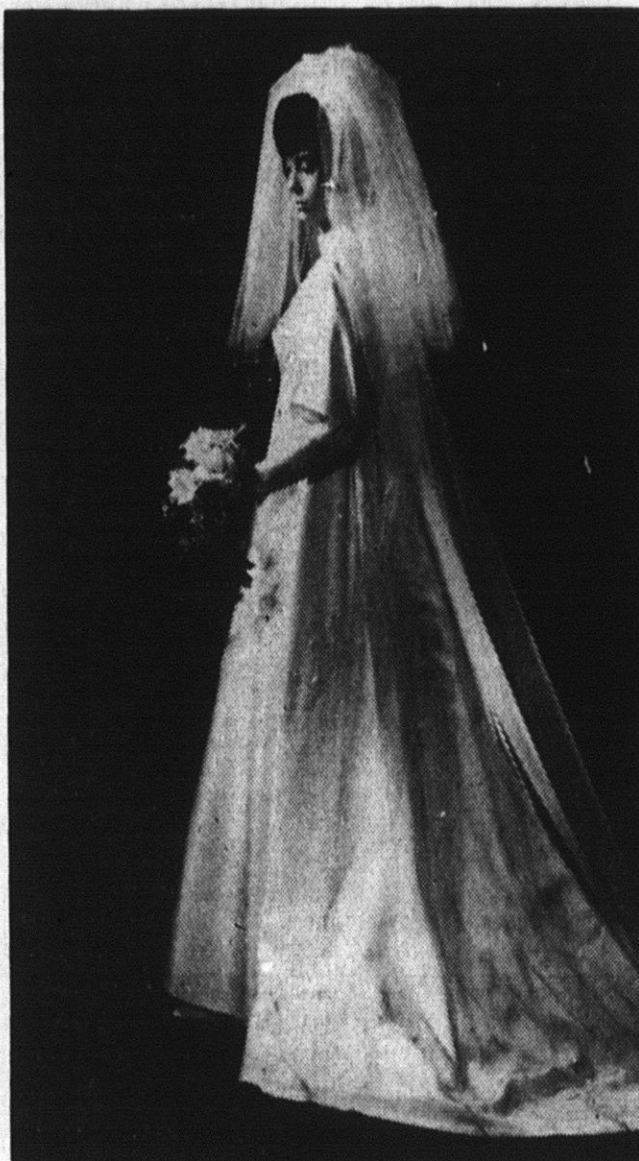

Boy Scout Pack 3020 of New Groningen School met Tuesday evening and several awards were given out.

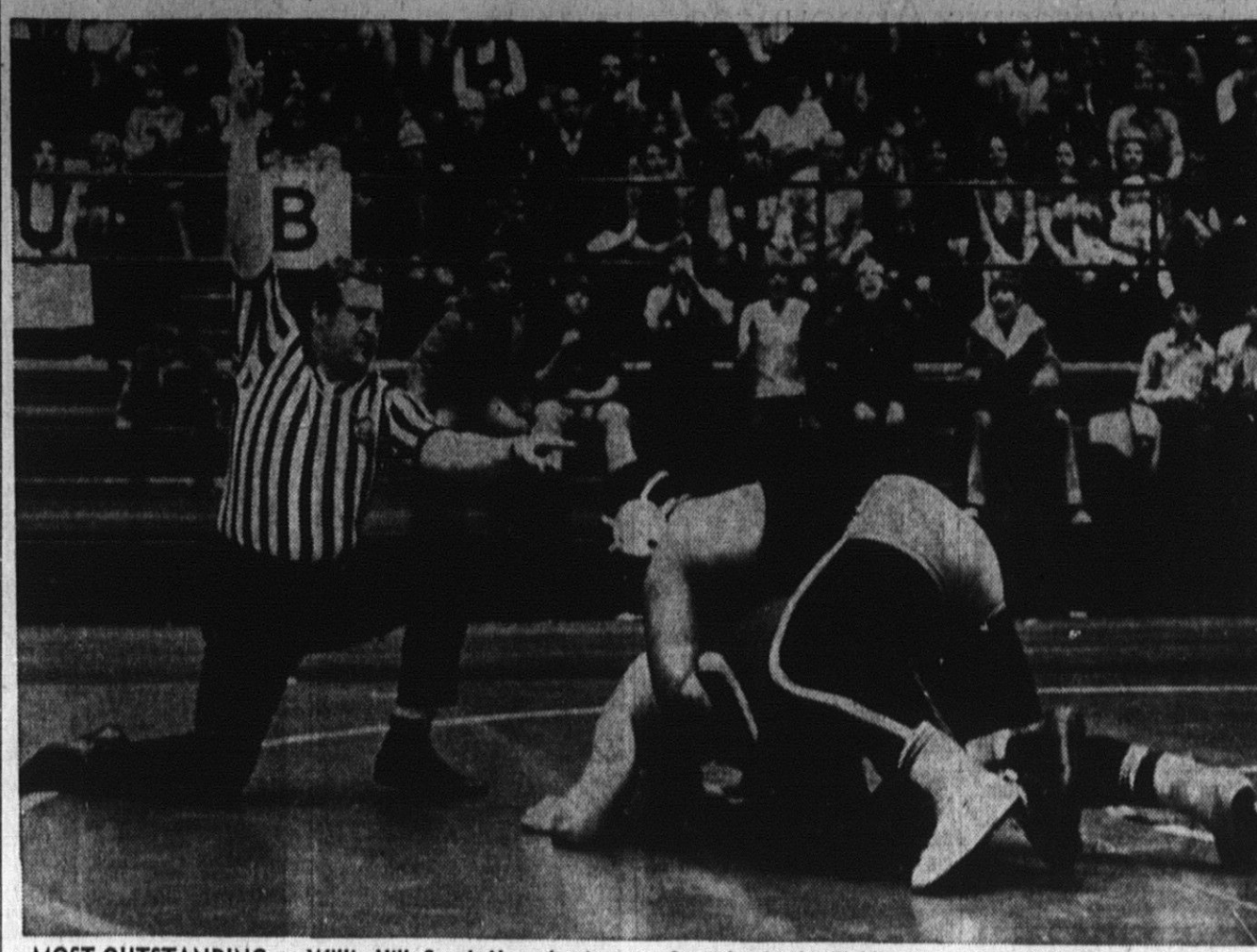

1972 Cancer Crusade Local Chairmen Named

Mrs. Andrew Dalman of Holland and Dr. Tom Rudder of Grand Haven were appointed as south and north Ottawa County Crusade chairmen at the meeting of the American Cancer Society Unit Board of Directors held Monday night at the North Side Peoples Bank in Holland. Mrs. Dalman has served in this capacity for four years and Dr. Rudder served as vice-chairman in 1971. Since April is designated as cancer control month, the Unit will conduct its annual crusade for funds on April 25. These funds are used to carry on the Society's three-fold program of research, education, and service.

A film was shown to the board entitled "Board Member Responsibilities During Crusade" which showed in detail all phases of conducting a successful fund-raising crusade with a board member in charge of each category.

End of year reports were reviewed as presented by Mrs. Eleanor Brunzell and Mrs. Catherine Clark, executive secretaries of the Unit. Record showed that for 1971 there was an average of 145 patients being served by the local Unit. Volunteers made a total of 2,060 dressings and 2,345 dozen were distributed to patients from the stock room.

The Women's Literary Club Civic Health Committee made a total of 884 disposable incontinent pads. Colostomy patients were serviced with 6,340 stoma bags during the year and seven patients were provided with home nursing care. There were 31 patients who were provided with transportation — 21 of these received financial transportation and 10 received volunteer transportation involving 68 trips. All patients received assistance with medication aid while three were allowed assistance for diagnostic X-ray. Low equipment such as hi-low beds, wheel chairs, commodes, etc., were provided for 25 patients.

The newly established Reach to Recovery Program, a rehabilitation program for mastectomy patients, was judged very successful as 17 patients from Ottawa County were provided this free service under the authorization of their surgeons.

In the field of education, the Unit provided 89 programs where films were shown. This would include as many as four films at one program. There were 28,893 pieces of literature distributed, not including the thousands of pieces provided during the residential crusade, and 201 posters were placed. There were 50 exhibits set up during the year.

The Unit secretaries announced the arrival of seven new films. For science classes these include "The Embattled

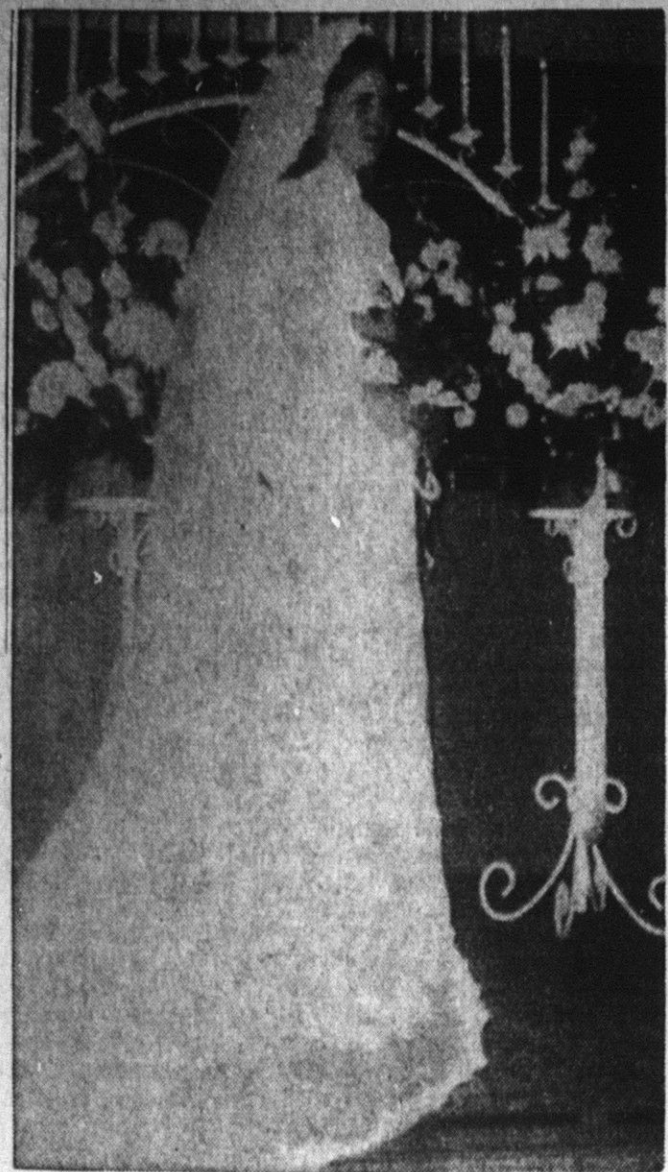

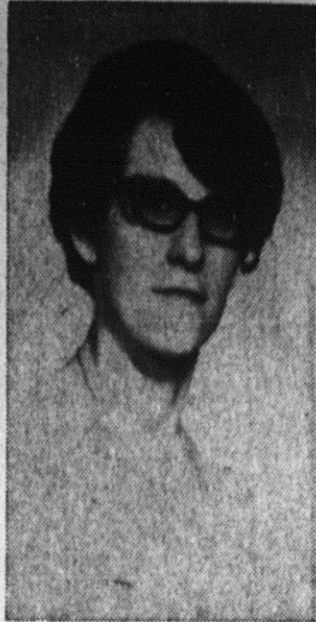

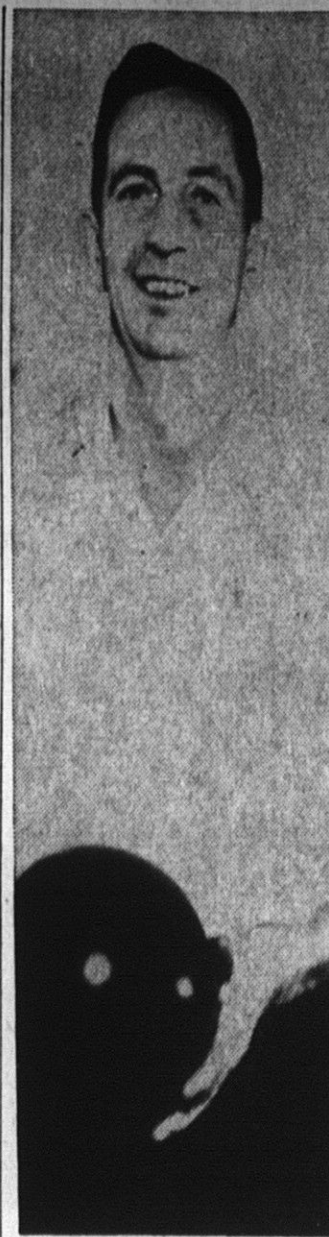
