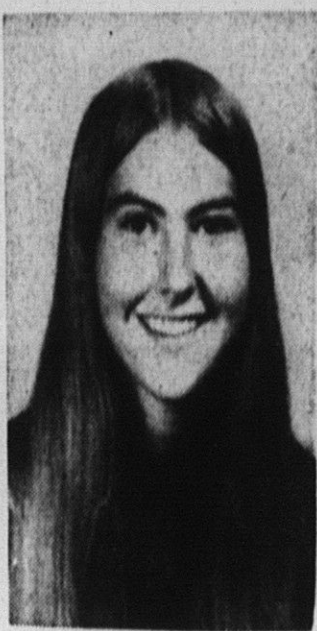

Truck Driver Satisfactory After Crash

Francis Henry Arends, 29, of Sparta, injured in the collision of two semi-trailer trucks and a car along M-21 at 84th Ave. Tuesday at 11:33 a.m., was listed in "satisfactory" condition Wednesday in Butterworth Hospital in Grand Rapids with fractured ribs and contusions and lacerations.

Ottawa County deputies said Arends was driver of a flat-bed truck eastbound in the left lane of M-21 that clipped the rear of a semi-trailer truck stopped in the 84th Ave. median while attempting a left turn from eastbound M-21.

A car driven by Linda Rae Tinkholt, 27, of 6387 Blue Jay Lane, Holland, was in the right lane and was cut off by the Arends truck following the collision and veered off the right side of the road where the car came to rest over a culvert of a ditch. Mrs. Tinkholt and her three children, all wearing seat belts, were not injured.

Arends' truck went into the ditch ahead of the Tinkholt car.

The driver of the trailer-truck carrying bins of metal stampings, Richard Willum Ferguson, 33, of Grand Rapids, was not reported injured. The trailer of the Ferguson truck was overturned in the median and the stampings were spilled about the roadway. The debris was cleared by 4:30 p.m.

Philosophy of Religion Expressed in Paintings

Dennis Matheis who has been teaching art in Holland Christian High School for over three years is an artist who tries to express his philosophy of religion and education through his paintings.

He feels that the realities of life are such that any solution must be oriented in the religious faith.

"What is life?" he asks. "Look at tv commercials, products and dress...and it's a lot of nothing. Life is real, and that's why I paint real things. These real things point me to Christ where we can make some sense out of our existence."

Born and reared in Cleveland, he attended both private and public schools, and after a tour of duty in Korea he worked as a decorator in Cleveland. After receiving an associate's degree in art from Erie College, he attended Calvin College. After graduating in 1969 he came to Holland Christian and since then has been doing extension work at the University of Michigan and Western Michigan University. He is president of the Christian Art Educators Association.

Some of his paintings appear in selected areas of the high school where the art program in three years has grown from three sections to a four-year program with six sections a day. Last year an adult education course was enthusiastically received.

On his philosophy on art, he continued: "I feel the art program should include three aspects, the making of art works involving various materials and processes, the knowledge of art objects in relationship to culture, and the evaluation of art products to see what is said."

"These aspects must be from the slant of a re-formed person in Christ. Then the student can listen, evaluate, respond to and just plain enjoy life. Then with the Psalmist of old we can say, 'Hallelujah, Jehovah! All the way down from heaven and all the way back'...you young fellows, young girls — old and young — Hallelujah to the name of Jehovah because only his name is to be praised."

County Names Hall Assistant Prosecutor

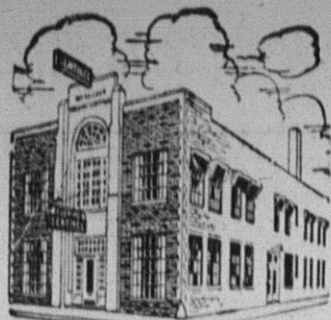
Book Reviewed At Guild Luncheon

LYNDON B. JOHNSON DIES

Lyndon B. Johnson, the 36th President of the United States, will be remembered as one of the most effective presidents on domestic affairs, yet one plagued by a war he could not end.

Thrust into the nation's highest post when President Kennedy was assassinated in 1963, he molded "Great Society" programs and perhaps did more for minorities than any other president. His accomplishments in the field of education and civil justice ran far beyond anything that had gone on before.

But in his zeal to control the threat of Communism he became entrenched in a long, long war which led to unrest at home. Racial resentment, riots and general unrest led to a decision not to seek reelection in 1968.

Lyndon Johnson was not a forgotten man but he became something of a tragic figure. He was content to live quietly on his beloved ranch on the Pedernales River in Texas.

Lyndon Johnson was one of the most skilled politicians Washington has ever known. Working closely with his friend, Sam Rayburn, speaker of the House of Representatives, Johnson was responsible for getting many a job in the U. S. Senate where he spent many happy years in public service.

Since leaving Washington he spent much of his time planning the LBJ library. It is in this building that his body lies in state today. The casket will be taken to Washington Wednesday where the body will lie in state in the Rotunda until Thursday followed by services at the National City Christian Church.

Burial will be in the family cemetery on the banks of the Pedernales River, a quarter-mile from the LBJ ranch house.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Jan. 28
Personal Accountability
Before God
Ezekiel 18:1-4; 25-32
By C. P. Dame

Most people find it easier to blame than to accept blame. The sense of responsibility is weak, especially in our relationship to God. This lesson should deepen our sense of responsibility to God and man and cause us to be ready to accept blame when that is right. I. We all belong to God. "The word of the Lord came to me again," so wrote Ezekiel. God had spoken to him before and God had another message for him to give to the people. A proverb circulated in those days. "The fathers have eaten sour grapes, and the children's teeth are set on edge." This proverb said that the fathers had sinned and the children were suffering from the consequences. God said that the proverb would become obsolete. All souls belong to God and hence every one is personally responsible to God — the father will suffer for his own sins and the son will suffer for his. Neither guilt or merit is passed on.

The Bible also teaches that children suffer for the sins of the parents. Daily life verifies this. Some children are handicapped all their lives because of the folly, ignorance or stubbornness of their parents. Although this is true, the children can't dodge all responsibility — parents, sons, grandsons will die on account of their own sins.

II. God holds every one responsible. The prophet gives the story of three generations. A righteous person will live because of his conduct. The son differs from his father and does wrong. The good deeds of the father will not be credited to the son who will be judged by his own deeds. The unworthy son did not follow in the footsteps of his wicked father but followed after righteousness and won divine approval. The father, the son, the grandson, every one is responsible for his own deeds. No one is the helpless victim of his circumstances.

The people said that God is not fair, but the prophet charged the people with unfairness. One man who lived a good life most of the time turns to evil and dies, another man lives an evil life but at the close of his life turns to righteousness in spite of his past. The prophet teaches the truth that "the final attitude is decisive." What is within will eventually reveal itself and it is this which God considers.

III. The call to repentance is always in order. Israel was making excuses. We do likewise. God calls upon all to repent, to turn away from our sins. This involves recognizing our sins, being sorry for them and showing this by turning away from them. We are not lost because of our past; it can be wiped out; we are not saved because of our godly ancestors. A new heart is essential. We can ask God to give us a new heart, a warm heart of flesh which will respond to God who revealed Himself in Jesus Christ. Important are the words "for why will you die, O house of Israel?" Note the alternatives — death or life, this is the choice that confronts us.

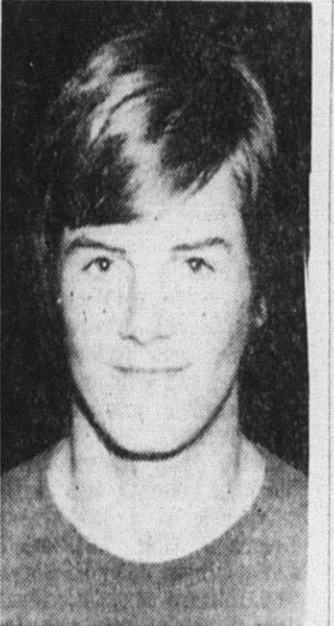

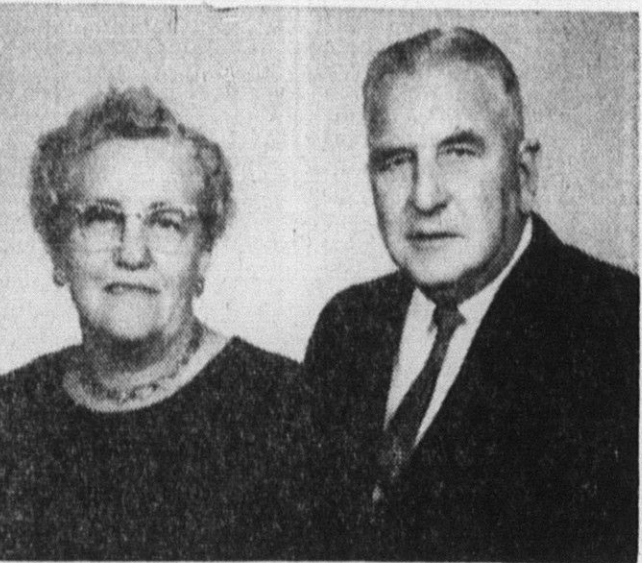

'Beauty in Simplicity' Is Shaker Philosophy

In a day of computers and a machine - made - everything, it is refreshing to know that the Shaker philosophy of "Beauty in Simplicity" is still being practiced by a small group of artists in this country.

Delighting her audience with her clear and simple explanations of the Shaker culture and its historical background was Mrs. Betty Kammeraad of Spring Lake. For her presentation she wore a typical Shaker costume of plain long sleeved dress to the ankles covered by a white apron and white kerchief collar with a small net cap covering her hair.

Her props on the stage of the Woman's Literary Club included a functional spinning wheel, a candle table, a drop leaf table, a Shaker chair and a set of oval boxes which were formed from thin strips of wood cut, steamed and molded. A practical cobbler's candle-labra was also among the displays.

In her presentation, Mrs. Kammeraad told about the beginnings in 1770 in England of the Shakers and Mother Ann Lee who came to this country and established herself near Albany, N.Y. The first winter was difficult. They were imaculate housekeepers and believed thoroughly that "there was no dirt in heaven."

There is an historical marker in Lebanon, N.Y., dated 1787 which serves to note a Shaker colony there. A Great Barn there was a landmark, unfortunately destroyed by fire.

So advanced and progressive were the Shakers that Gail Borden consulted them on his condensed milk formula.

In her explanations, Mrs.

Kammeraad told how once a persons came into the Shaker community he was no longer a sister and the outside world was known as the World's People. They took care of their own and often adopted single persons who had no families. To the best of knowledge, there are only 14 Shaker Sisters left today.

Among the slides shown were many of the built-ins on one wall. Pegs on boards above the floor level allowed the housekeepers to lift chairs and hang them up for easy cleaning. Marvels of architecture were revealed in the round barn with three levels and incorporating a ventilation system.

For Michigan residents, one of the closest areas of Shaker culture is the Portfolio Shop owned and operated by the Kammeraad in Spring Lake. Amneras is Pleasant Hill, Ky., which when completely restored will be a "second Williamsburg."

Mrs. Kammeraad showed the amazing cloak worn by the Shakers which featured a long cape with hood and deep collar. When copied in velvet from the authentic pattern, it has a price tag of \$12.

Shaker furniture, Mrs. Kammeraad said, is truly modern, but still one of the most authentic of Early American.

Preceding the program, a luncheon was held in the club room. Door hosts for the afternoon was Mrs. Gerald Bolhuis.

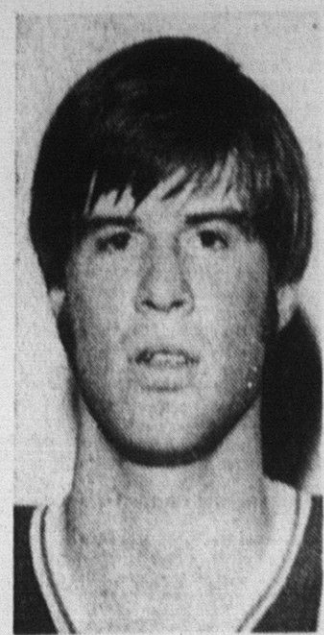

Dr. Hollenbach Writes Article On Arab Literature

An article by Hope College English professor Dr. John W. Hollenbach entitled "The Image of the Arab in Nineteenth Century Literature" appears in the current issue of the quarterly journal "The Muslim World."

The article examines the stereotypes — chiefly negative — of the Arab peoples of the Middle Eastern countries, embodied in the works of English and American fiction writers, travellers and scholars of the nineteenth century.

Dr. Hollenbach is currently on sabbatical leave to continue his research on a larger study of which the "Muslim World" article is a part. He leaves for London next month to work primarily in the British Museum and in neighboring university libraries.

His interest in the Middle East has been generated primarily by the three years he and his family spent there as teacher and administrator at the American Universities of Cairo (1955-57) and Beirut (1953-66). Dr. Hollenbach is on the Middle East advisory committee of the Great Lakes Colleges Association and in recent years has been active in national programs of the Middle East Studies Association.

At Hope he has taught, besides American and world literature, a freshman course entitled "Justice in the Middle East."

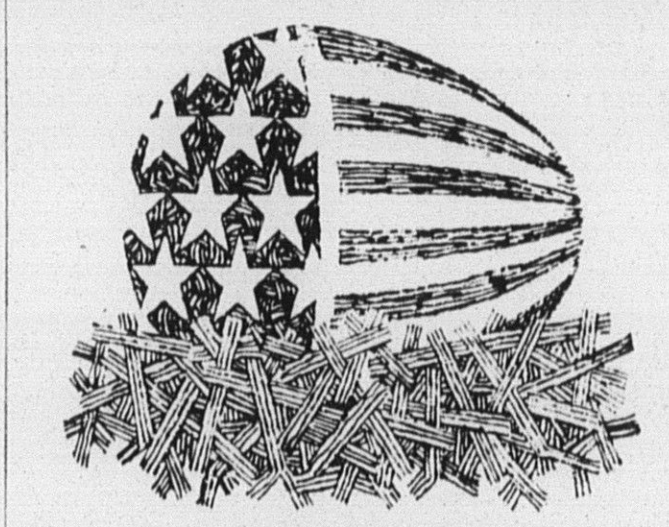

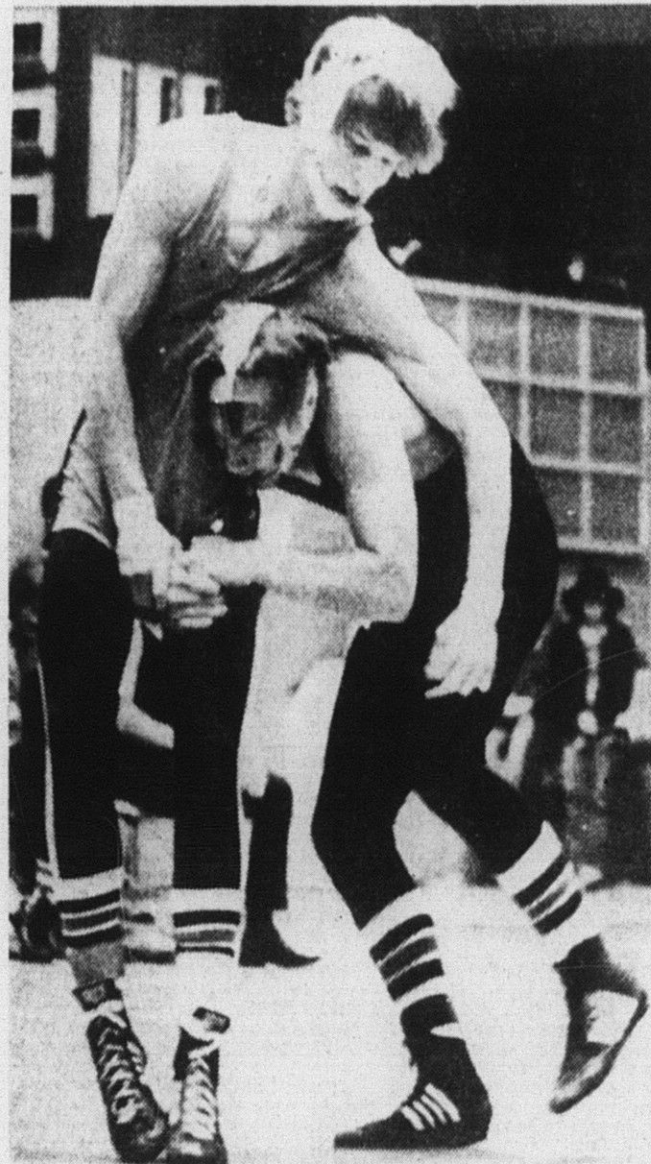

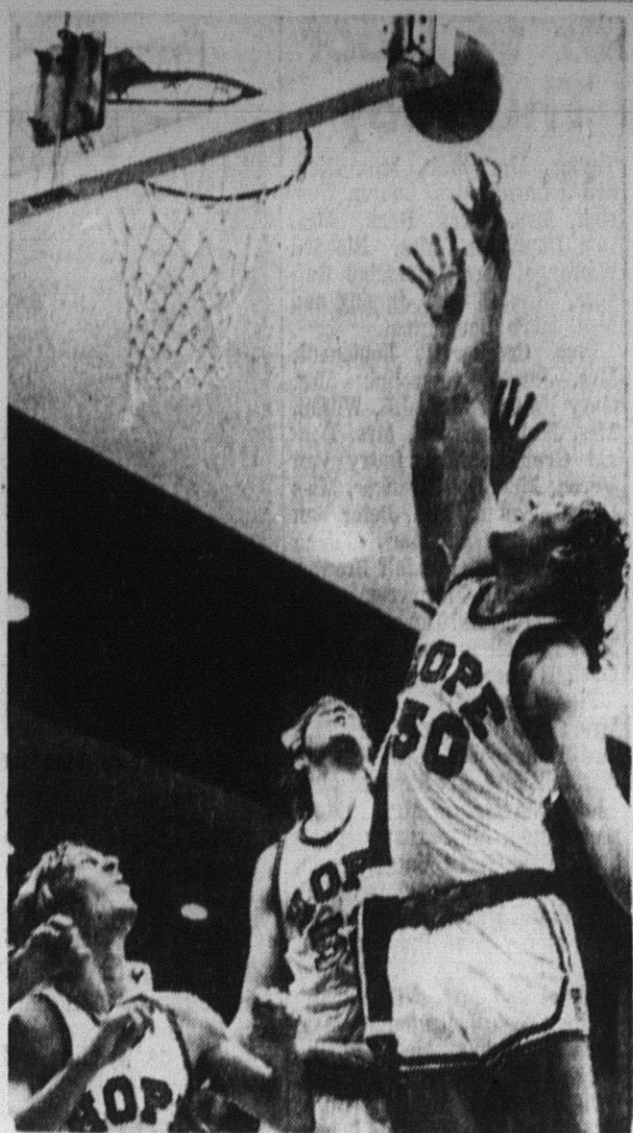
Kamp Kiwanis consists of

Two Phases of Education Told at AAUW Meeting

Members of the Holland Branch of the American Association of University Women were treated with a dual program last Thursday in Durfee Hall.

Eleanor De Kruij, a representative of the Career Education Planning District and Helena Winter of the League of Women Voters presented a brief program about the proposed Area Vocational Center in the Ottawa Intermediate School District.

They explained that the vocational center is a cooperative effort between 13 school districts (11 public and two non-public) to provide occupational training programs for 11th and 12th grade students in a separate facility for one half of their school day. The facility will also be available to provide adult education.

The goal of occupational training is to provide students with job entry skills upon leaving high school. Eight out of 10 young people need this as only two out of 10 go on to college.

The vocational center will be available to 11th and 12th grade students from the 13 area high schools. The Ottawa Intermediate School District will be responsible for the operation of the center. There will be 34 course offerings ranging from accounting to welding.

The vocational center will make it possible for the local high schools to have more programs for their students to enroll in at a minimal cost and local industry will have an increased labor force from which to draw.

All good things have a price tag on them. So, too, does the skill center. The total program will cost 1½ mills for construction, equipment and operation. People with a home valued at \$20,000 will pay \$15 a year for the center, not a high price considering the good it will do for the community, the speakers said.

The vocational center will be located at the corner of US-31 and the Port Sheldon Rd. The facility will provide for approximately 1,600 students, plus adults in the evening program. All registered voters, persons do not have to be property owners, are urged to vote YES on March 8.

Following the presentation on the Vocational Center, Fred R. Comer, MEA Uniserv officer, was introduced by his wife Sally to speak on the controversial subject of school finance. He painted a rather clear picture of the present in school financing and made a projection into the future.

Comer said the present system establishes and maintains substantial inequities in terms of dollars per pupil available to school districts. The range goes from \$500 per pupil to \$1,500 per pupil.

The present system does not assure even minimum funding will be available to finance schools. It allowed Detroit to get an \$80,000,000 deficit.

The property tax which provides 52 per cent of the revenue for schools in Michigan is not fair to many groups of people such as retired citizens, low and lower middle income families, farmers, shopkeepers and small businesses.

Because of the aforementioned

ed things the MEA decided to do something on the ballot; one to give substantial property tax relief, the other to force the legislature to accept its constitutional responsibility to fund schools in an equitable manner. Both proposals lost in the election.

The issue was then turned over to the courts. The majority held the present system of financing the schools does provide inequalities and the inequalities do violate the equal protection clause of the Michigan Constitution.

It was also the courts opinion that control of the public school system is a state matter. It is no part of local self government. Local boards are agents of the state legislature. They also felt state aid formulae have reduced inequalities that exist from district to district but substantial inequalities still remain.

They concluded that the state legislature must devise a means of financing education that will assure equality in per pupil revenue throughout the state. The court did not hold the property tax to be unconstitutional. It will most likely be continued for several years. It said a new means of disbursing funds must be found—not necessarily a new means of collecting funds.
