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3 Mills For 3 Years Is Sought

**Holland Residents
Vote for 4th Time;
Board Cites Need**

Another school millage election will be held in Holland in March.

The Board of Education Monday afternoon unanimously approved a resolution calling for a special election March 24 to vote 3 mills for 3 years for school operations. This is the same issue which was defeated by a narrow margin last Nov. 26.

All school legal issues are based on equalized valuation, and 3 mills on assessed valuation amounts to \$5.49 per \$1,000 assessment.

The special election will be conducted by City Clerk D.W. Schipper and will be held in all 14 precincts in the city. Except for certain areas on tag ends, the school district is very nearly like the city area. Careful records are maintained on those city residents who are not in Holland school district and therefore not eligible to vote in the coming election.

It will be the fourth time the city has voted on school operating millage. In 1962, the issue lost 2 to 1, but the ratio of defeat has narrowed in the two succeeding elections.

Board President Harvey Buter who proposed the fourthcoming election said he had received many requests from citizens and from such groups as the PTA Council for another election. He asked each board member to express his opinions on such an election.

James O. Lamb felt 3 mills was not really adequate to face educational needs, since it would only restore the program to what it had been before the current austerity measures. He pointed to inequities in salaries and the need for further study on increases due to inflation. "Our students should receive a better education than they are getting. I am not saying that our program is not good, but in this competitive world we must provide a better program."

William Gargano was the only board member to make another proposal and he felt 4½ mills for 5 years would more adequately meet the needs, although he did support the 3 mill issue. He felt the greatest need is in the area of elementary schools.

Arthur Seddon felt facts have not changed since the last election and on that basis he felt it was necessary to put the millage issue to the voters again. "Perhaps there will be a time when facts are changed and some specific changes are made on a burdensome real estate taxes, but our responsibility as a school board has not changed." He felt a millage increase is only a stopgap measure and not a true answer to total education needs.

Buter said the board has studied all alternatives and pursued other possible financing but could receive no immediate aid from other sources. "I sympathize with parents of students in parochial schools comprising 30 per cent in Holland, yet I also feel that public education is an American obligation, and we need 3 mills for 3 years for a minimum program," he said.

Harry Frissel said the first concern of austerity cuts was for the children but now he is worried on the effect on the teachers, something which would develop into a greater problem if additional millage is not provided. He spoke of interviewing potential teachers in the east for Hope College and said he always is asked questions about what kind of town Holland is and about its school program. He said he could always give fine answers to these questions but if additional funds are not forthcoming for schools, these answers must be altered.

Frissel added that school financial problems exist throughout the state and country, and these problems can be rectified only by the people. He said 3 mills is not adequate but pointed to the need of being practical.

Buter interjected that of 24 cities in this area of Michigan, only three do not have voted operating millage and these are Holland, Grand Rapids and South Haven. He said Grand Rapids will be \$1,000,000 in arrears this year and is scheduling a millage election in April.

Al Schaafsma said situations such as confront the local school district are the problem of a citizenry willing to respond to the responsibilities of a democracy, yet many protestations of rights come from individuals who deserve them least.

Oral Vaccine Clinic Slated In Allegan

ALLEGAN — A community-wide effort to wipe out polio in Allegan county will be launched by the Allegan County Medical Society Feb. 29, it was announced today.

The Ottawa County Medical Society also is considering similar mass immunization clinics for Ottawa county, possibly on the same day, and final arrangements will be made at a meeting of the society Feb. 7 in Grand Haven.

Fourteen clinics are scheduled in Allegan County operating Feb. 29 from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. and are open to all citizens over three months of age. Clinics are scheduled at Moline, Dorris, Burnips, Wayland, Martin, Plainwell, Otsego, Allegan, Hopkins, Fennville, Pullman, Leisure and Saugatuck-Douglas and Hamilton.

The first dose of the new Sabin oral polio vaccine will be given Feb. 29 and two other doses April 11 and May 16.

Dr. P. Brachman, head of the Allegan Medical Society, said the society has purchased 58,000 doses of each of the three types of Sabin vaccines. This vaccine will be distributed free of charge but a donation of 25 cents or more is requested by those who can afford it to cover the cost of the project.

All children aged 18 or under will require a consent statement signed by one of their parents if they attend the clinic unattended by parents. This form may be obtained from schools and will be printed in newspapers. It must be presented at the clinic.

Dr. Brachman said the vaccine will be administered either by a cup of the mixture of vaccine and distilled water or by a cube of sugar on which vaccine has been dropped.

The bodies will arrive at Dykstra Funeral Home in Holland Friday evening.

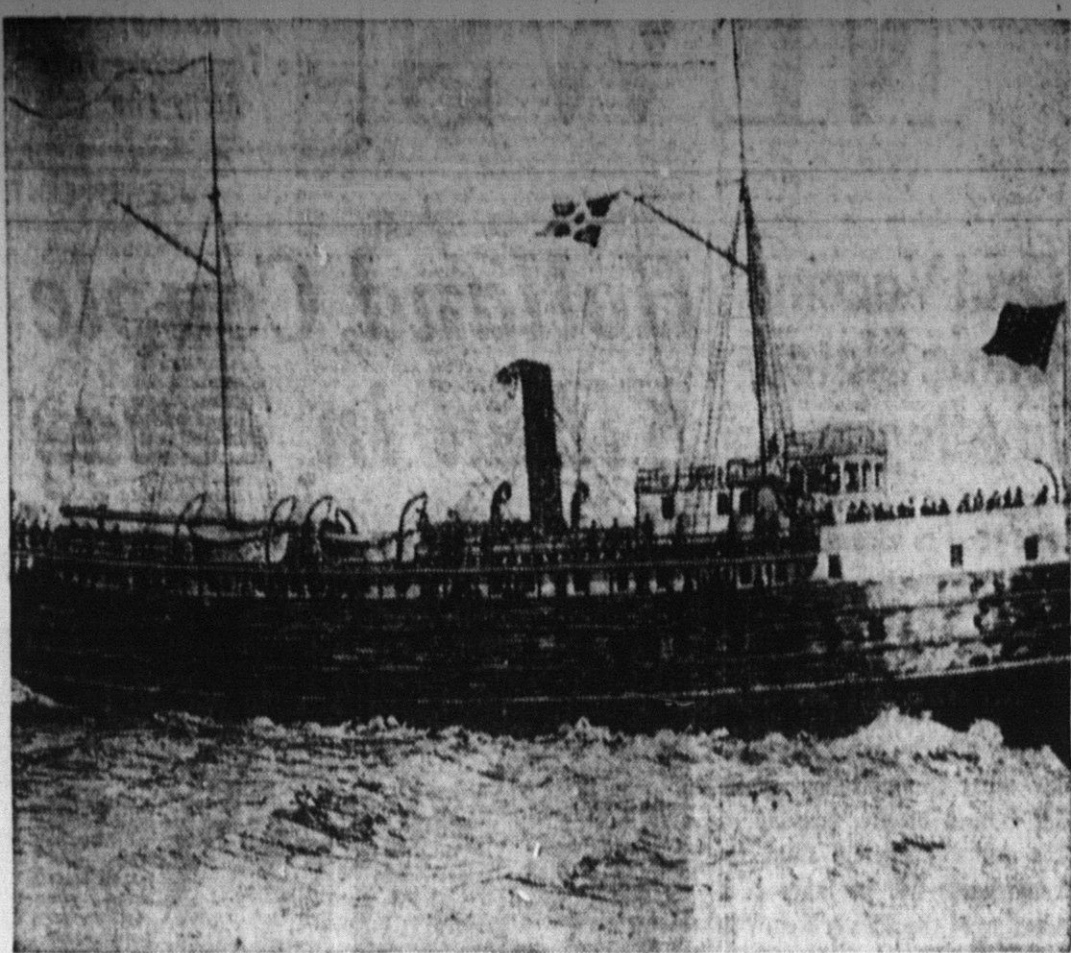

He attended Grunty College, Grundy Center, Iowa, and Princeton Theological Seminary at Princeton, N.J. and was graduated from Western Theological Seminary in 1926.

Chicora Sank Jan. 21, 1895 In Storm on Lake Michigan

It was Jan. 21, 1895 when the Chicora sank in Lake Michigan claiming 24 lives and some of her wreckage washed up on shore along the shoreline south of Holland.

Leaving Milwaukee, the 217-000 217-foot vessel was bound for St. Joseph with a load of 15,000 barrels of flour and other freight.

The ship had 1,300 horsepower steam engine and traveled 17 knots an hour.

At midmorning it began raining and the rain changed to snow. The 24 mile an hour wind at 5 a.m. developed into a gale by noon and sometime that night in a raging snowstorm, whipped by 60 mile an hour winds, the steamer vanished.

Although wreckage was found between Holland and Saugatuck, no one has located her hull or the 24 bodies the Chicora carried to their deaths. Capt. Edward Stines was captain of the three-year-old ship. The ship was built to carry 600 tons of freight and 500 passengers.

Three months after the storm William Hare recalled that he was traveling along the shore from Saugatuck to his home in South Haven during the storm and had seen the ship headed for shore.

He said he was sure it was the Chicora, the stern was down and it appeared to be sinking. He said he saw no signs of life or heard any disaster signals.

Arthur O. Scott reported in 1957 he had seen the vessel battling the storm, south of Glenn and headed toward South Haven. Scott said the ship was rocking heavily and her whistle was blowing. He said he watched for an hour before a huge wave blotted the ship from sight.

Henry R. Gross, who was 16 at the time, said he heard the ship's foghorn sound repeatedly off the coast of Paulville, a point seven miles south of South Haven. Gross recalled later the last one "sounded like one big gurgle."

Gross said no one believed he had heard a horn until the following spring when some 100 barrels of flour floated up on a nearby beach.

For days following the mishap, wreckage was found along the shore from St. Joseph to Holland, much of it charred, giving the theory that fire had caused the tragedy.

On Jan. 27, 1895 off Saugatuck, a group found part of the hurricane deck, a gangplank and oars from the lifeboat. They also picked up both spars which later became part of the flagpole of the village of Douglas.

Herman Hiner of Saugatuck, a boy at the time of the accident, found the cabin shutter. Hiner found the ship's foremast which was later made into the Douglas flagpole. A carving of the ship, made by an Indian in Saugatuck, was at the top of the pole.

Clerk Will J. Hancock of Saugatuck, who had missed the ship on its final voyage, was put in charge of a group that searched the shore from Saugatuck to Michigan City Ind., for the hull or bodies.

Capt. E. E. Napier of South Haven contracted to raise the hull for \$5,000. He never found it. In July 1896, Graham and Morton Lines offered \$10,000 reward for discovery of the hull. Again in August, 1898, Capt. Napier used three tugs to drag off St. Joseph but didn't find the hull.

Holland Takes Third LMAC Win

MUSKEGON — Holland's rapidly improving basketball team knocked Muskegon out of a share of first place in the LMAC here Friday night with a 75-64 win before 2,500 persons in the L. C. Walker Sports Arena.

It was a combination of all-around action that provided the Dutch with their third LMAC victory in six starts and avenged the one-point loss in Holland last month. The loss was Muskegon's second in six LMAC games. Muskegon is 8-2 overall.

Coach Don Piersma used a 2-1-2 zone press and zone defense and his team succeeded in slowing Muskegon's game down. Although the Big Reds got 96 shots in the game, Holland's zone forced the losers to shoot from outside and they proved that they can't hit from out.

Muskegon hit only 30 per cent of its shots and 29 baskets sank. With the zone, Holland had the center clogged and try as they would the Big Reds weren't able to play their fast, driving game.

The alert Dutch also stopped Muskegon's fast break and the Big Reds conceded this and tried to set up patterns for a time in the second half.

Besides the fine defense, the Dutch turned in some fine shooting, hitting 33 of 80 for 41 per cent. Holland had quarters of 9-26; 8-22; 7-15 and 9-17.

Holland also showed tremendous desire and although Muskegon led three times in the game and tied the score six times, it was Holland who came back and got the next basket.

The last time this happened the score was tied 54-54 with 4:50 left and Holland had gone more than three minutes without a basket after leading 54-48 at the third period's close.

Four seconds after Muskegon knotted the score Ken Thompson responded with a basket and Darrel Schuurman hit two baskets in the next 24 seconds. This put Holland up by six.

Muskegon scored two baskets to pull within two, 60-58 but again Holland got six points in a minute on baskets by Tom Pelon and Cal Beltman and two free throws by Jim De Neff.

That eight-point spread was the game and Holland controlled the action the rest of the way in chalking up the 11-point win, the game's biggest margin. The Dutch had by nine, 34-25 with 1:20 left in the first half but slipped to a 36-29 half-time bulge.

Holland's defense was clean-cut as the Dutch committed only two fouls in the second half. Pelon and De Neff led the defense as they frequently anticipated Muskegon passes and intercepted them for baskets or quick passes to teammates. Holland went into its zone with the game three minutes off.

Muskegon played the first quarter without a foul but was charged 13 times in the game, 10 in the second half. The Dutch sank seven of 10 free shots in the second half after Pelon made their only two tries in the first half.

Pelon, Holland's most improved player, was outstanding as he scored 20 points, 10 in each half. He was especially effective stealing passes in the second half and hit five baskets. He was also strong on both boards.

His basket kept Holland in front, 18-16 at the quarter and he added Holland's next five points, including a free throw, after Muskegon had taken its last year, 22-21 with 6:18 left in the second quarter.

De Neff was strong from out-court in the first half and made six baskets. He closed with 16 while Schuurman and Thompson each had 15. Schuurman, tough on the boards, had four baskets in the fourth quarter.

Holland scored 18 points in each of the first three quarters. Jim Hopson, a strong rebounder, led the losers with 22 while John Moore had 15 and Alvertis Crawford, 15. The Big Reds had quarters from the floor of 7-20; 6-21; 8-27 and 8-28. They made six of seven free throws.

The win was Holland's sixth in 11 starts and the Dutch will try to avenge an earlier season's loss to Benton Harbor next Friday night in the Holland High fieldhouse.

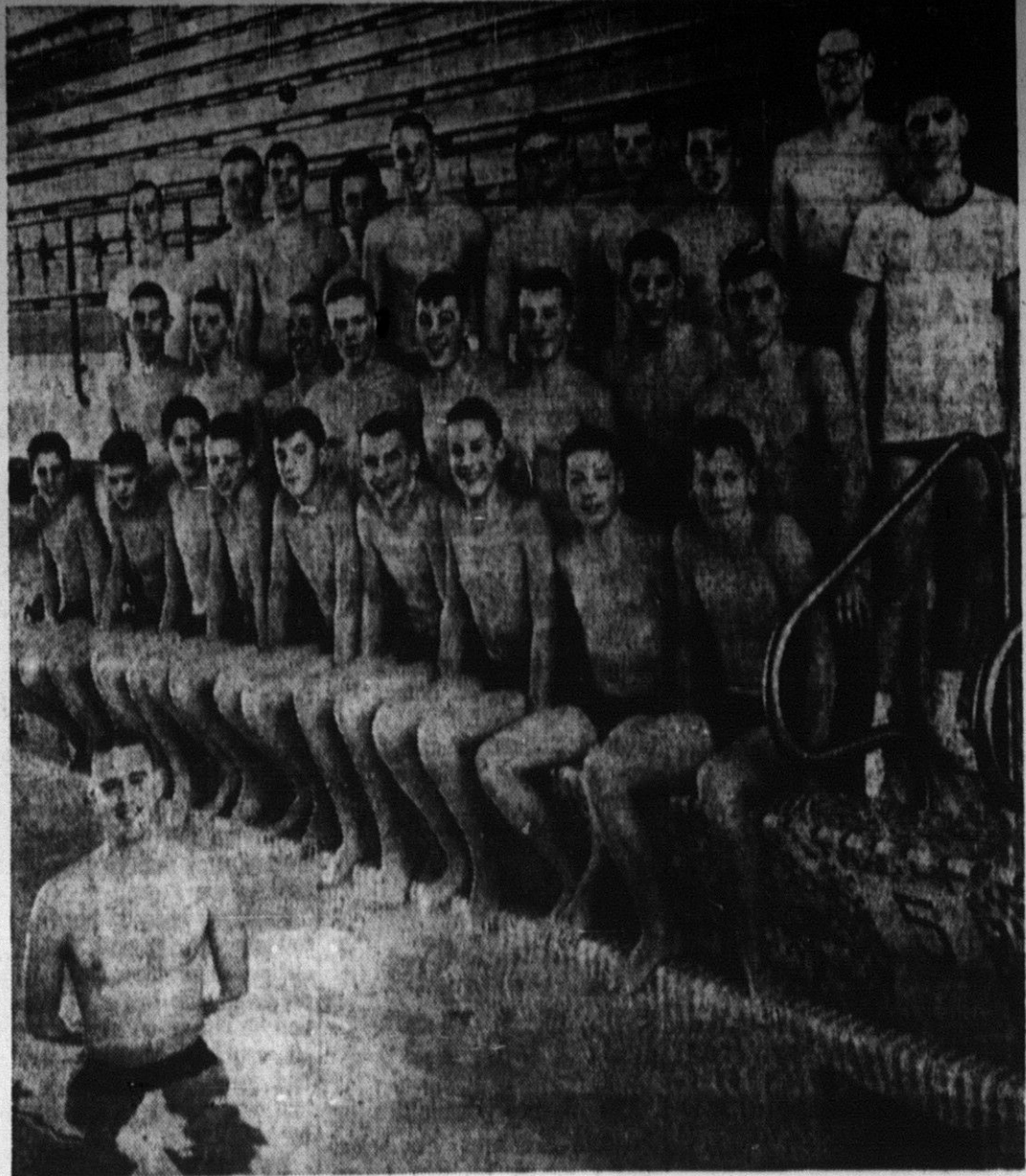

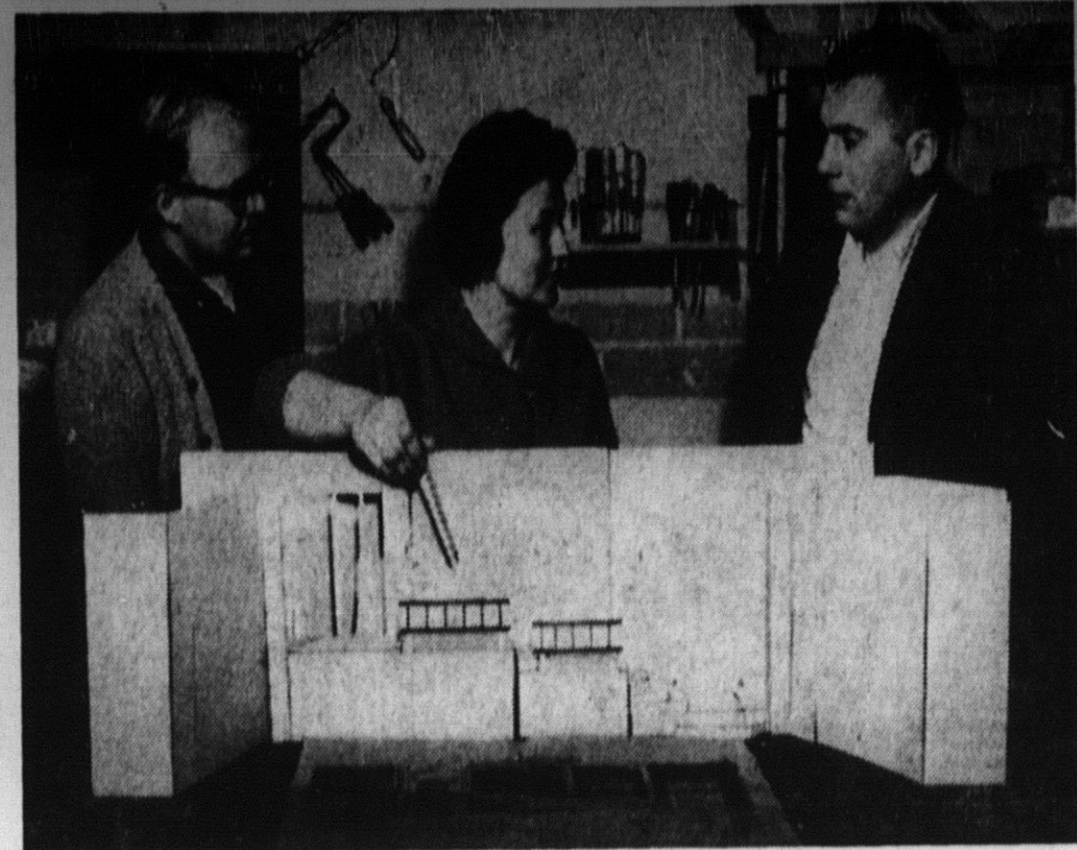

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

A Readers Digest article by John Strohm and Cliff Ganschow - two top writers on agricultural and related subjects - dealt in considerable detail with "The Great Pesticide Controversy." Their purpose was to separate fact from fallacy - and to determine whether or not the food we must eat is being poisoned by chemicals, and whether or not they are a menace to wildlife.

To begin with, they point out that "Without pesticides, food would have to be rationed. Housewives would line up to buy inferior foods, blemished tomatoes, scrawny potatoes and sweet corn picked with wormholes." The price of most food items, according to one authority, would double. Chemical control of these multitudinous pests is essential to an abundant agriculture which can feed the nation at minimum cost.

What of the dangers - a vital question, indeed, in the light of all the controversy this problem has produced?

Messrs. Strohm and Ganschow do not minimize them. They have existed and, no doubt, will continue to exist - nothing in life is totally safe, witness automobile driving. But pesticide dangers seem to have been vastly exaggerated, in the view of leading students and scientists. Moreover, some \$40 million a year is now being spent on pesticide research, in a hunt for better and safer compounds, and a number of dramatic steps forward have already been taken.

At the end of their article, the authors touch the big point.

They agree that there is a need for stricter control and use of certain chemicals. But then say this, and it goes to the root of the matter: "Equally important are certain things we should not do in the emotion of the moment:

"We must not sacrifice proven benefits because of unproven fears.

"Red tape and excessive regulation must not tie the hands of research chemists, who are urgently needed to help meet the greatest challenge of the 20th century - producing enough food for a world in which half of the people are hungry."

LUDINGTON — A smooth working Holland Christian basketball team posted its 11th win in 12 starts here Saturday afternoon by downing an aggressive Ludington squad, 78-59 before 1,200 fans.

Coach Art Tuls' club was sharp in all departments as it never trailed in the contest, but were not able to pull away to a safe margin until the second half started. Christian's shooting and passing was in top form, but particularly pleasing to Tuls was the alert defensive performance. The Maroon's man to man defense kept the Orioles guessing most of the game and gave up few good percentage shots.

Ludington, which had coasted to a fairly easy win over Alma the night before, seemingly showed little ill effects as far as stamina goes as Coach Joe Kowatch's Orioles kept the defensive pressure on the Maroons all over the court. It was mainly through the efforts of the fine guard play of Tom Deur and Tom Dykema that the locals sparked a gainst the press. Kowatch had high praise for the Maroon outfit commenting on the poise and the speed of the Maroons.

The Maroons, besides working some fine patterns off from the set offense, really had their fast break working in the first half, thanks to some fast rebounding by Jim Otte and Herm Johnson, who started his first game at center for the Maroons. Repeatedly the Maroons had a 3-2 fast break which was turned into a neat basket on some clever passing. Both clubs shot well with the Maroons hitting 28 for 71 tries for about 39 per cent while the losers connected on 25-65 for 38 per cent. Once again it was Dykema, Deur and Don Krone-meyer hitting well from out-court while for Ludington it was Owen Evans doing most of the consistent outcourt work. Christian had all five starters in double figures while the Orioles had four.

Ludington's aggressive play took its toll in the foul department as three starters had three personals in the first half. Christian hit on 22-32 attempts while the Orioles managed 11 out of 20.

The Maroons lost no time in grabbing the lead as Deur swished from out in the first few seconds. Otte and Johnson also chipped in to give the Maroons a 7-2 lead in the first two minutes. Ludington, twice on the shooting of Evans and Center Curt Madden, narrowed the gap to one point but could not tie it. Hitting nine out of 11 foul attempts in the quarter, the Maroons were leading 19-12 at the horn.

Christian maintained the advantage during the second stanza and led 26-17 midway in the period. With Dykema, Johnson and Deur getting two baskets apiece, the locals at one stage led by 10, but the Orioles, behind the shooting of Evans narrowed the gap to 38-27 at halftime.

Christian made its move early in the second half and were never headed after that. Paced by Jack Langeland's three out-court swishers along with team foul shooting of seven out of seven in the stanza, the Maroons soon built up a 15-point bulge. With five minutes left in the quarter, the locals were leading 51-36. Fred Bernson, one of the Orioles' top scorers, got his only two baskets of the game in the period. We have word from The American Guernsey Cattle Club that a junior two year-old, Kamplands Candie, registered Guernsey cow, owned by Donald Kamps, Byron Center, Mich., has completed an official DHIR actual production record of 10,360 pounds of milk and 473 pounds of butterfat, in 305 days two times a day milking. The testing was supervised by Michigan State University.

Michigan sheep and lamb producers who wish to apply for incentive payments on wool must do so before Jan. 31 this year. The wool marketing year now ends on Dec. 31 instead of March 31. Applications made through county ASCS offices will cover all wool and unshorn lambs sold from April to Dec. 31 of 1963. Payments under the program will likely begin in April instead of July as has been the case in previous years.

We have received information from Charles F. Reed, Assistant Dean Veterinary Medicine, Extension, M. S. U., that retained blood titers of vaccinated cattle have become a major problem in the Brucellosis control program. Recent research indicates that this problem can be reduced by early vaccination.

Present requirements are that calves to be "officially vaccinated" must be vaccinated between 4 through 8 months of age. The number of retained titers is much greater among cattle vaccinated at 4 to 6 months. The degree of immunity produced when vaccinated at 6 to 8 months.

In order to help reduce the number of retained blood titers among vaccinated cattle, they recommend that calves be vaccinated for brucellosis at 4 to 6 months of age.

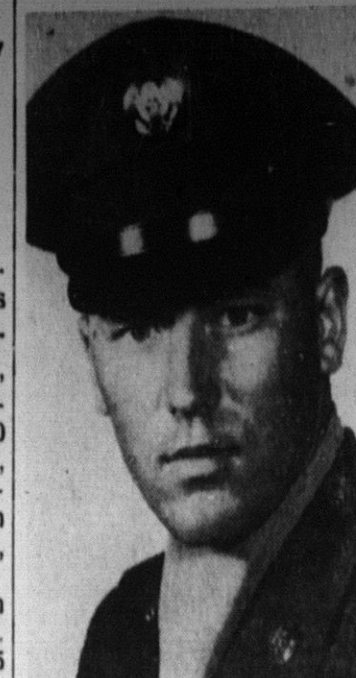

Crusaders Hand Dutch 7th Defeat

WHEATON, Ill.—Riddling the basket for 41 points in the opening 10 minutes of the second half here Tuesday night, Wheaton College's basketball team turned a close game into a rout and scored a 111-71 win over Hope in Centennial gym.

The basket barrage was the best shooting performance put on by the Crusaders in any game this season and it was the worst punishment a Hope team has taken this season.

With John Pfund and Kerry Otterby, the two Wheaton guards leading the way, the Crusaders sank baskets from all over the place. They were getting the rebounds, stealing the ball and completely took over control of the game.

Hope had trailed by three points at half, 44-41 after leading the first 15 minutes of the game. Wheaton caught up and tied the game at 51-51 with 5:11 left in the first half and then moved to the three-point half-time advantage.

In the first 20 minutes, Hope had outscored the winners and aided by Ron Te Beest, playing his first game, and Bill Porter, the Flying Dutchmen succeeded in rebounding Wheaton in the game, 54-47.

Wheaton hit 44 per cent of its shots in the game on 48 baskets in 108 tries. Hope had to settle for a dismal 32 per cent as the Flying Dutchmen made 27 baskets in 82 attempts. From the free throw line, each team had 24 tries with Wheaton hitting 15 and Hope 17. Each team was charged with 18 personals.

Pfund, who has scored more than 1,000 points for the Crusaders in three seasons, maintained his average with 23 points. Otterby added 19. Ron Venhuizen hit 16 for Hope while Potter had 13 and Clare Van Wieren hit 11.

Te Beest, 6'3" senior who joined the club Monday, started at forward. John Simons, Allegan sophomore, started his first game at guard.

The loss evened Hope's record at 7-7. The Flying Dutchmen seek their second win this season tonight over Concordia College in River Forest, Ill. Hope played Tuesday night in an Oak Park, Ill., hotel and will return to Holland by bus after the game tonight.

Wheaton, now 11-6 this season, plays in the Chicago Stadium Saturday night against Tennessee State in the second game of a doubleheader that features Iowa and Loyola of Chicago in the 7:30 p.m. opener.

Airport Development Report Given to Council

Plans for possible airport development for Holland were unfolded by representatives of two engineering firms at a special meeting of City Council Tuesday night to which representatives of press and radio were invited. The airport study, technically known as Air Trade and Airport Site Selection Study for Holland, was authorized by City Council in November, 1962, after Council had studied local airport facilities plus the possibilities of an airport authority. The latter was rejected on the basis of millage limitations under state law.

Hired for the study were Leigh Fisher Associates, Inc., airport consultants of San Francisco, Calif., and Black & Veatch of Michigan, consulting engineers who have supervised several utility projects for Holland. The San Francisco firm was represented at Tuesday's meeting by A. J. Parry and Black and Veatch by Dan McKim.

In explaining high points of the 40-page study Parry said that his firm deals only with the air trade study, economic factors, analysis, resources and forecasts, whereas the Black and Veatch firm deals entirely with engineering, site studies, etc.

Parry, who said 85 per cent of work done by his firm is for

communities the size of Holland or slightly larger, said the local study reveals the need for facilities for business/corporation aircraft, rather than agricultural aircraft, personal and pleasure aircraft, or the type used by federal, state or local governments.

He discounted any great use of passenger trade in view of the proximity of Grand Rapids airport which services lines to most major centers. He defined Holland's air trade area as serving Zeeland city, Saugatuck, six townships in Ottawa county and six townships in Allegan area. Ottawa townships are Park, Holland, Zeeland, Port Sheldon, Olive, and Blendon. Allegan townships are Laketown, Fillmore, Overisel, Saugatuck, Manlius and Heath.

Six possible airport sites were surveyed including the present airport in Park township which would be less costly to enlarge but presents serious problems because one or two township roads would have to be closed and the surrounding land is not particularly compatible to airport use.

In general, the report recommended a new development east of Holland city either to the north or to the south, suggesting five sites in the general area of US-31 bypass, one north of James St., another north of

32nd St., a third south of 32nd St., and the other two a combination south of 48th St. and north of 64th St. The two sites north and south of 32nd St. would be in the vicinity of Holland's industrial park, currently in the planning stage.

A new airport to meet Holland's needs would require about 500 acres and Parry said the first step would be to determine which site would best meet the needs and coming under federal requirements, draft a master plan, and then proceed to acquire the property by purchase or possibly through long-term lease.

Facilities requirements for a recommended airport are a small terminal or administration building, parking lot for 75 cars, fixed base operations plots, tee hangars for 30 to 40 units, non-commercial lease plots, fuel storage area, and industrial sites.

First stage cost of development would range from \$641,900 for the Park township airport to \$1.3 million for the most expensive of the other five sites. With federal aid, Parry pointed out cost to Holland would be \$300,000 to \$400,000, and possibly less, since federal authorities are recognizing the need for more airports for several reasons, including defense.

Ultimate stage developments

would range from \$1.3 million to \$2.3 million several years hence.

In Holland's case, an airport should not be more than 10 minutes from downtown. All sites mentioned come within this figure.

Parry mentioned Federal Aviation Agency's policies on clear and approach zones, stating approaches to main runways should be clear of schools, churches, etc., for at least 1½ miles outboard of the ultimate runway threshold.

Considerable emphasis was given to the economic impact of a well planned general aviation airport. Better airport facilities have long been promoted by the Holland Chamber of Commerce.

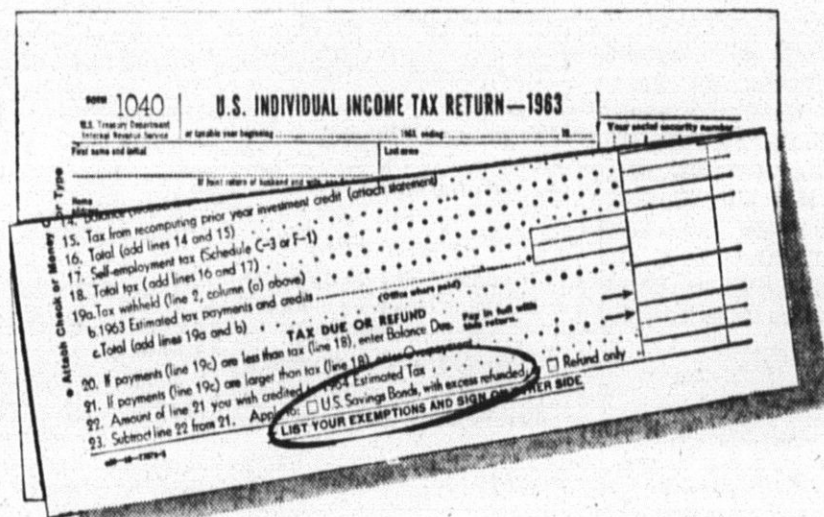
Parry said many communities the size of Holland have become concerned over airport facilities only after they have lost a major industry, and added Holland is to be commended for progressive thinking in studying aviation needs before such a threat occurs.

A recent survey by the Holland Chamber of Commerce indicates a high percentage of Holland-Zeeland commercial/industrial interests use some form of general aviation. These users suggest that the airport to serve Holland area should provide adequate general aviation facilities.

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Board Okays Agreement For Cars

The Board of Education Monday afternoon approved an agreement with the New Car Dealers Association of Holland to provide seven or eight new cars this year for the driver education program at a service fee of \$100 per car. The agreement calls for the association to provide resource personnel to assist in those areas of teaching as appropriate to their experience and background.

The board also okayed an expenditure for providing four 12 by 36-inch "no smoking" signs to be erected in the fieldhouse on orders of the Holland fire inspector.

Changes in fire insurance coverage also were approved by the board. Removed from the contract was coverage on the custodian's office at 84 West 15th St. which was razed. Insurable value of the old East Van Raalte school was established at \$40,000. Contents of Maplewood School are being reviewed.

By a vote of 5 to 1, the board approved hiring a teacher to teach one class in English, involving a general reshuffling to provide a class in senior English drama. This course had always been provided previously, but there was not sufficient flexibility in the current staff to meet all needs. This involves hiring an extra teacher for one class, or 1/2 teacher for the school year. Dissenting vote was cast by Arthur Seddon.

Albert Schaafsma said nobody can predict accurately just what needs are in the future and it is not fair to equate every problem with elementary school or the budget. He said exceptionally cold weather in December cost an additional \$5,000 in heating costs over the budget's figure. He added two weeks of mild weather in January will offset this figure somewhat.

The meeting adjourned at 5:30 p.m.

Sodium Fluoride Program Started

Announcement has been made by Dr. Ralph Ten Have, director of the Ottawa County Health Department, that materials have been distributed in the Ottawa County schools for the Sodium Fluoride program.

The program, under the direction of the Dental Health Committee, providing protection for children's teeth against decay, has been in operation for the past 12 years.

The entire procedure consists of four visits to the clinic. At the first visit the teeth are cleaned and the first application of sodium fluoride is given. On the second, third, and fourth appointments the application is repeated.

It is recommended by the American Dental Association and other dental authorities, for children in the second, fifth, and eighth grades. Also four and five year old pre-schoolers are eligible. Special cases referred by the family dentist will also be accepted.

The fee of \$3 with the application card properly filled out must be returned to the schools by Feb. 7, in order for the application to be accepted.

If persons have not received the necessary forms to enroll a child in this program, he may make application by calling the Ottawa County Health Department in Holland, the Grand Haven Health Department or area chairmen.
