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Thaw Remains; Mercury Hits 40

Aided by an early morning rain, the thaw in Holland continued at a fast pace today as the mercury climbed to 40 degrees at 11 a.m., the first time it has hit the 40's since Dec. 14.

On that day the maximum was 47, the highest for the month. It was in the 40's on three other occasions earlier in December.

Snow depth on the ground, which measured 2 1/2 inches last Friday, was down to 12 inches today, but piles at curbs and parking lots recede more slowly and drivers on residential streets were smart to observe extra caution at intersections and driveways.

Street crews continued cutting back banks in the downtown area and hauling the snow away. The overnight low was 28.

Total snowfall in Holland so far in January is around 60 inches. Snowfall in December was 14.9 inches and in November 21 inches.

Jobless Rate Up a Third From 1969

Unemployment in the Holland area this month is about one third higher than the usual January jobless, Zane Cooper, manager of the local office of the Michigan Employment Security Commission said today.

Cooper said his caseload figures for the week ending Jan. 15 showed 1,105 out of work. He added the figure included 350 workers from a manufacturing firm who have since returned to their jobs.

Cooper said the adjusted jobless figure of 750 compared with the 509 reported out of work in January, 1969.

Seasonal layoffs in construction and other industry whose contracts have ended account for a usually large number of jobless in January, said Cooper, who added that the number out of work this year was higher than normal.

Cooper said about 85 per cent of the layoffs were reported in industry, especially in auto supply firms. He said another ten per cent was from the construction industry while five per cent was reported in the consumer services.

Not included in the figures were those on strike.

Frozen Pipes? BPW Says Keep Water Running

"Keep water running to avoid frozen pipes" is the advice from the Holland Board of Public Works.

Superintendent of Utilities Guy E. Bell said today that an increasing number of calls have been received by the BPW during the past several days regarding frozen pipes. Frozen water services frequently occur in cold weather when the pavements are bare and the sun beats down pushing the frost deeper into the ground. This is likely to occur in certain areas where the customer's water pipes cross the roads to water mains.

Traces of rust in the water is an indication of such freezing and Bell suggested that customers who have had a history of frozen pipes should keep a small stream of water running from faucets to prevent freezing, especially overnight. This condition is likely to continue until the frost is out of the ground and keeping a small stream of water running is the best preventative.

Tri-Country Fire Inspectors Meet

Fire Chiefs and inspectors from municipalities in Ottawa, Muskegon and Kent counties were in Holland today for a bi-monthly meeting of the Tri-Country Fire Inspectors Society.

Henry Parks, head of safety at the Chemtron Corp. Pigments Division plant in Holland was to lead a discussion concerning hazardous materials.

Marve Mokema, Holland's fire inspector and society president, said about 20 persons were expected for the one day meeting at the Holland Country Club.

Hope Will Confer Degree on Borman

Apollo 8 commander Col. Frank Borman will be awarded an honorary Doctor of Science degree by Hope College on Feb. 19, College President Calvin A. VanderWerf announced Wednesday.

Borman will be presented the honorary degree during a convocation in Dimmet Memorial Chapel at 10 a.m.

Borman will be the special guest of the college's sophomore class who have selected him their "Class Hero." The sophomores initiated the idea as a way of expressing their concern over the wave of negativism and anti-hero sentiment that appears to be sweeping over many of the nation's college and university campuses.

The sophomores decided to do something positive and to choose the living American whom they most admire and respect and who, in their judgment, is making a substantial constructive contribution to the life of the nation.

The first human circumnavigation of the moon was accomplished by a three-man crew of American astronauts commanded by Col. Borman of the Air Force in December, 1968.

With Captain James A. Lovell Jr. of the Navy and William A. Anders of the Air Force, Borman made the epic 590,000 mile, 147 hour flight in the spacecraft Apollo 8, which orbited the moon 10 times before it returned to earth.

Previously, in 1965, Borman and Lovell had piloted Gemini 7 in earth orbit for 14 days.

After the Apollo 3 flight, Borman moved to the executive level of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, where he is now deputy director of flight crew operations.

A native of Gary, Ind., Col. Borman was fascinated by aviation from his earliest years when, with his father, he built model airplanes and often won contests with them. When he was 15 he took flying lessons, paying for them by delivering newspapers, working as a stock boy in a grocery store and doing odd jobs.

After finishing high school in Tucson, Ariz., where he quarterbacked a state championship team, Borman entered the United States Academy at West Point. He graduated eighth in a class of 670 in 1950. Upon graduation, he transferred to the United States Air Force and went to Williams Air Force Base in Arizona for flight training.

Between 1951 and 1956 he served successively as a member of the 44th Fighter Bomber Squadron in the Philippines and as an instructor at the Air Force Fighter Weapons School. In 1957 he took an M.A. degree in aeronautical engineering at the California Institute of Technology and became an instructor of thermodynamics and fluid mechanics at West Point.

Preparatory to becoming an astronaut, he took test pilot training at the Air Force Research Pilot School at Edwards Air Force Base in California. An anecdote often quoted to illustrate Borman's fortitude and determination is the story of his reaction to an engine failure in an F-104 that he was flying one day. Instead of bailing out, he stayed in the plane — which was traveling at twice the speed of sound — and revived

the engine sufficiently to bring the F-104 to a safe landing. When his training was completed he remained at the school as a lecturer on rocket propulsion and spacecraft testing.

Col. Borman joined the space program in September, 1962. On December 15, 1965, in its 12th day aloft, Gemini 7 took part in a space rendezvous, flying 185 miles above the earth in formation with, and within three feet of Gemini 6.

At 4:59 a.m. on Dec. 24, 1968, after a "go" signal from Houston, Borman inserted Apollo 8 into lunar orbit. While Borman controlled the spacecraft, keeping it pointed down at the moon, Lovell and Anders took still photographs and motion pictures and made geological observations. In the ninth orbit, on Christmas eve, the crew made their second lunar telecast, sending to earth live pictures of the moon's landscape.

At Borman's suggestion, the telecast included a reading from the story of creation in Genesis by the three astronauts, and Borman closed the transmission with the words: "Good night, good luck, a Merry Christmas, and God bless all of you — all of you on the good earth."

Frank Borman and Susan Bugbee, a high school classmate, were married on July 20, 1950. The Bormans live with their two sons, Frederick and Edwin, in El Lago, Texas, with commuting distance of the Manned Spacecraft Center in Houston.

Truck Carrying Mail Hits Auto

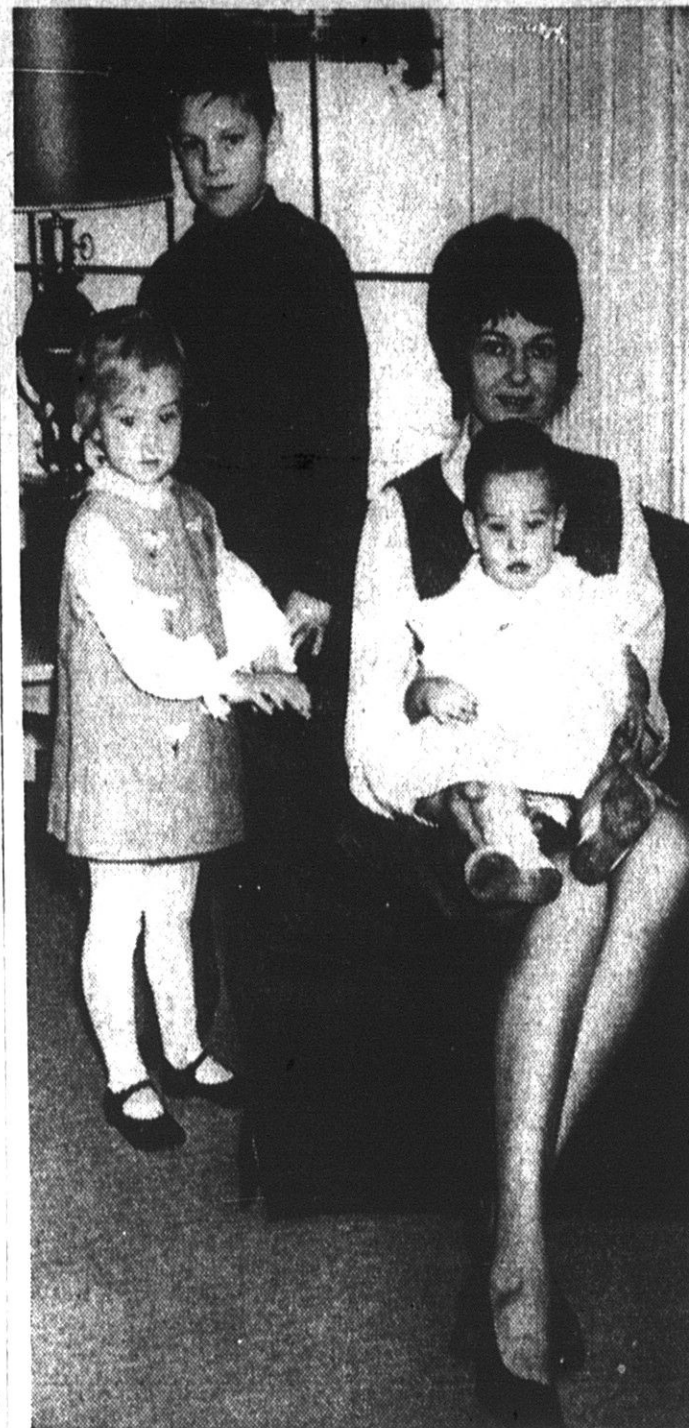

Drug Abuse Education Workshop Set

Holland Jaycees are making plans to present their first drug abuse workshop, an education workshop, on Saturday, March 28.

According to George Steggerda, overall chairman of the Jaycee drug abuse committee, personnel from the Kent County Health Department will conduct the workshop slated from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

James Crozier is the Jaycee chairman of this education workshop program with Mrs. Michael Baker coordinating efforts between the Jaycees and the Jaycee Auxiliary.

Purpose of the education workshop is to "educate the educators" and it will be constructed to develop, increase and strengthen through a team approach the professional competencies and contribution of the classroom teachers, counselors and guidance persons in assisting youth to recognize the drug abuse problem.

Steggerda said the presentation of the workshop will foster sensitivity of school personnel to behavioral characteristics of youth and to understand motivational factors which affect drug abuse. Objectives also include increasing the awareness of drug abuse in the field of mental health as well as establishing and maintaining an information and resource center for consultation in the areas in the use and abuse of drugs.

Discussion areas include display materials, plan and purpose of workshops, the history of drug abuse, types of drug abuse and their effects, panel discussions on the topic: "What happens when a person uses drugs," treatments and solutions, panel discussions, discussions from the floor and distribution of free materials.

Lawyer Leaves \$1,200,000 to Allegan

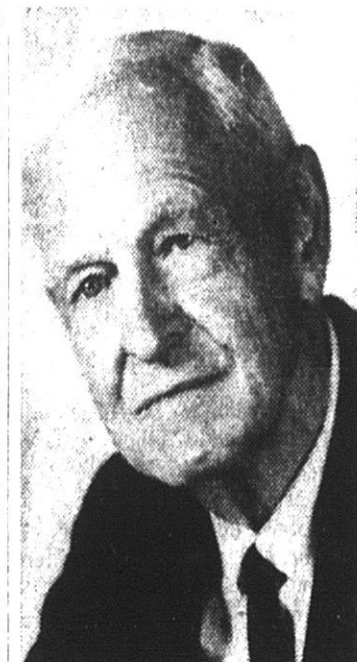
ALLEGAN — A long-time Allegan attorney has left securities valued at more than \$1,200,000 to a recently created philanthropic foundation for the benefit of Allegan county residents.

Friends of the late Ethol W. Stone said the gift to the Allegan Foundation probably totaled far more than the 89-year-old attorney earned from a 65-year practice of law and county abstract business here. Stone died Dec. 3, two months short of his 90th birthday, and was putting in a full day at his office almost up to the day of his death.

Profitable investments accounted for much of his estate, tentatively inventoried at \$2,600,000. Stone's will provided for numerous small bequests to relatives and friends and to institutions in which he had been interested, but the balance was divided almost equally between the new foundation and his only surviving son, Edward Stone, of Walnut Creek, Calif.

Not only were local residents surprised by the size of the estate and the amount of the gift for philanthropic purposes, but by the existence of the Allegan Foundation itself.

The \$1.2 million gift will be the first received by the foundation, which originated without fanfare early in 1965. It was the brainchild of Earl D. DeLano, local banker and industrialist, and Chester A. Ray, now one of the Allegan-Ottawa circuit's two judges. Stone was the third signed of the declaration of trust when it was executed

March 19, 1965.

Judge Ray, indicating the foundation would not actually receive the money until the estate is closed — probably in a year or more — said it was established to promote and encourage gifts and trusts for charitable, benevolent, educational and public uses under a plan which would offer "a reasonable degree of flexibility to meet the ever-changing needs and conditions of the community."

He emphasized that the foundation would be county-wide in scope and that it would afford an opportunity to persons of modest means as well as those of wealth to make their gifts more effective by combining them in a single fund.

The foundation's articles of incorporation provide that in-

come from trusts shall be devoted to "purposes which will in some ways improve the health, general welfare and well being of citizens living within the boundaries of the county."

Officers of the foundation will have no powers with respect to investment or management of trust funds, only to use or distribute the net income. Principal funds can be distributed only in accordance with donors' specific instructions.

Articles of incorporation provide for appointment of one foundation member each by the Allegan county probate judge, the county's presiding circuit judge, mayor of Allegan and the senior officers of the Allegan Branch and Trust Company and the American National Bank and Trust Company, both of Kalamazoo.

Both banks are designated as trustees or "custodians" of funds entrusted to the foundation.

The corporation presently includes Howard Hartman, Allegan, president; Ammon Schreier, Allegan, vice president; Leonard Healey, Otsego, secretary, and Weldon Rumery and Chester Ray, both of Allegan, as members.

Ray said a replacement would have to be named for him shortly since the articles of incorporation prohibit anyone holding public office from serving as a foundation member. His successor will be named by Probate Judge Dwight M. Cheever.

Members of the foundation will serve for five-year terms after the staggered terms of the original appointees expire.

As one of the founders, Stone reportedly had included a substantial bequest to the foundation in his will after it was organized. Intimates said, however, that the \$1.2 million gift was provided only recently, in a codicil drawn last October, two months before his death.

Few Allegan residents had any idea of the size of Stone's estate. He lived modestly in an unpretentious frame house on Marshall St. which had been his home most of his adult life. His law practice — begun in 1904 after he worked his way through the University of Michigan law school — was devoted largely to counseling county residents on business matters, wills and property transfers. Most residents were unaware of his role as an adventurer in the stock market, although it was known that he served on the boards of several area banks and industries.

Born Feb. 7, 1880, in Portland, Mich., he was the descendant of pioneer families in both Allegan and Portland. After receiving his degree he joined a law firm here which had been established by an uncle, Charles R. Wilkes. The present firm, Stone and Francu, occupies offices at 213 Hubbard St. in a building it has used since the 1880's. It was constructed on the site of the original Wilkes homestead where Stone's mother was born.

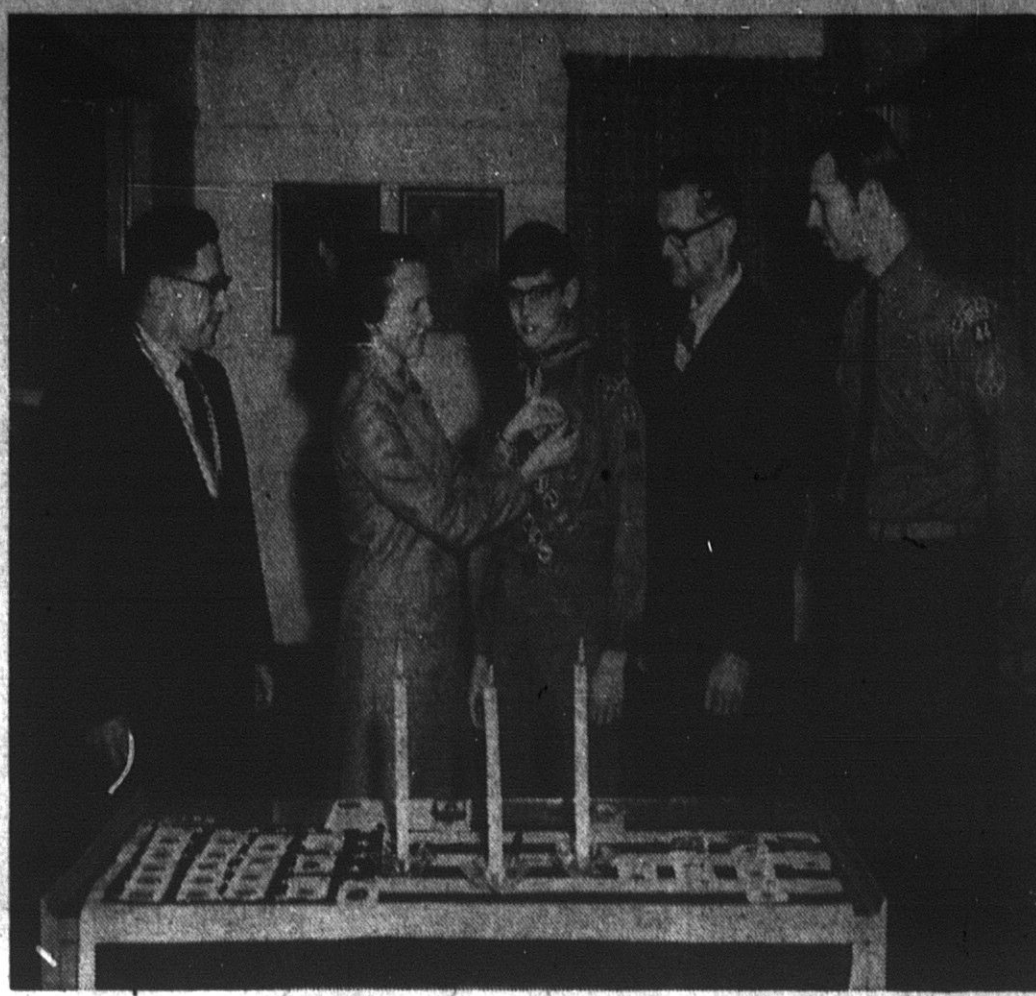
Mrs. J. Alferink Dies at Age 83

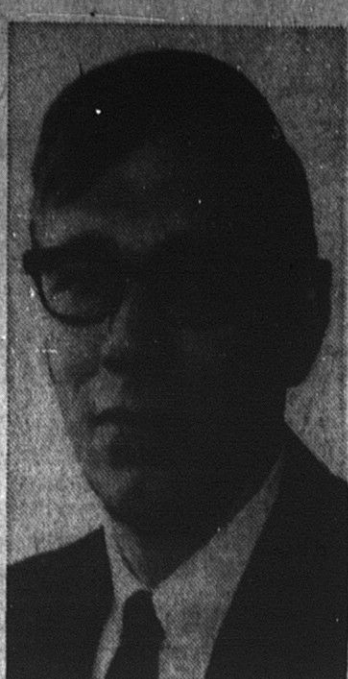

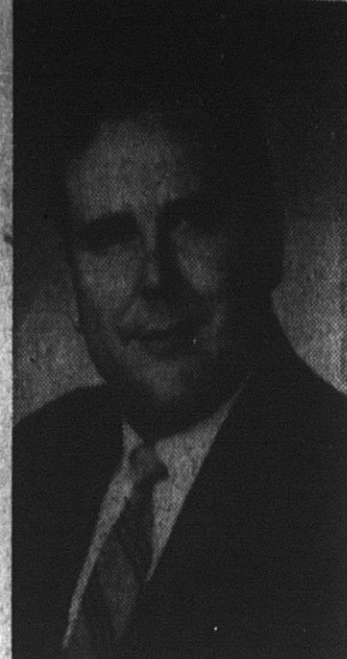
Manitou Beach Man Hurt In Car-Truck Accident

The bridesmaids, Miss Barbara E. Weeber and Mrs. E. David Jones, were attired similarly to the honor attendant.

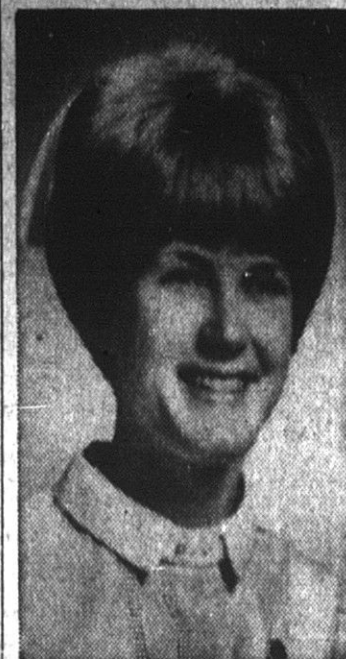

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Feb. 1
Jesus Teaches God's Judgment
Matthew 13:24-30, 36-43
By C. P. Dame

The word "judgment" is not popular today. The many people who are lawless and irresponsible and self-seeking do not care to hear about a coming judgment. The Bible teaches that a judgment day is coming at which there will be a separation between the wicked and the righteous.

I. This lesson tells about two sowings. The owner of a field sowed good seed with the hope of getting a fine crop. Jesus, in explaining this parable, said that the Son of man sowed the good seed. While the owner of the field slept an enemy, by night, sowed bad seed. Solid people work in the day time but the lawless are busy at night. No fault is found in the text because the men slept. The enemy intruded upon another's property and secretly with evil in his heart sowed tares among the wheat. Today some ruffians commit all kinds of evil deeds.

In explaining the parable Jesus says that "the weeds are the sons of the evil one and the enemy who sowed them is the devil" and the good seed are the children of the kingdom. The field is the world. In this world two influences are at work. The Lord has His representatives here and the devil has his agents at work. There is a constant conflict going on between the evil and the good.

II. Some day there will be a separation. The seeds sown grew. The servants of the owner saw the tares among the wheat and reported to the owner. The servants wanted to gather up the tares but the owner objected lest they "root up also the wheat with them" and ordered them to let both grow up together. This is going on now before our eyes.

A person belongs either to the children of the kingdom or to the children of the wicked one. Here people mix and mingle with each other. Some day a separation will take place. The Lord will say to the reapers, "Gather ye together first the tares and bind them in bundles to burn them: but gather the wheat into my barn." This separation is taught in Scripture plainly.

III. A final judgment is sure. The Bible refers to it a number of times. Judgment is ever at work now. Wherever there is a relationship there is a judgment. Nature judges, society judges, and God judges now and will do so finally on the day set apart for it. Some people make light of hell. The severest things recorded in the Bible about hell were said by Jesus. This is worth thinking about.

John Palmbo, 85 Dies at Marne

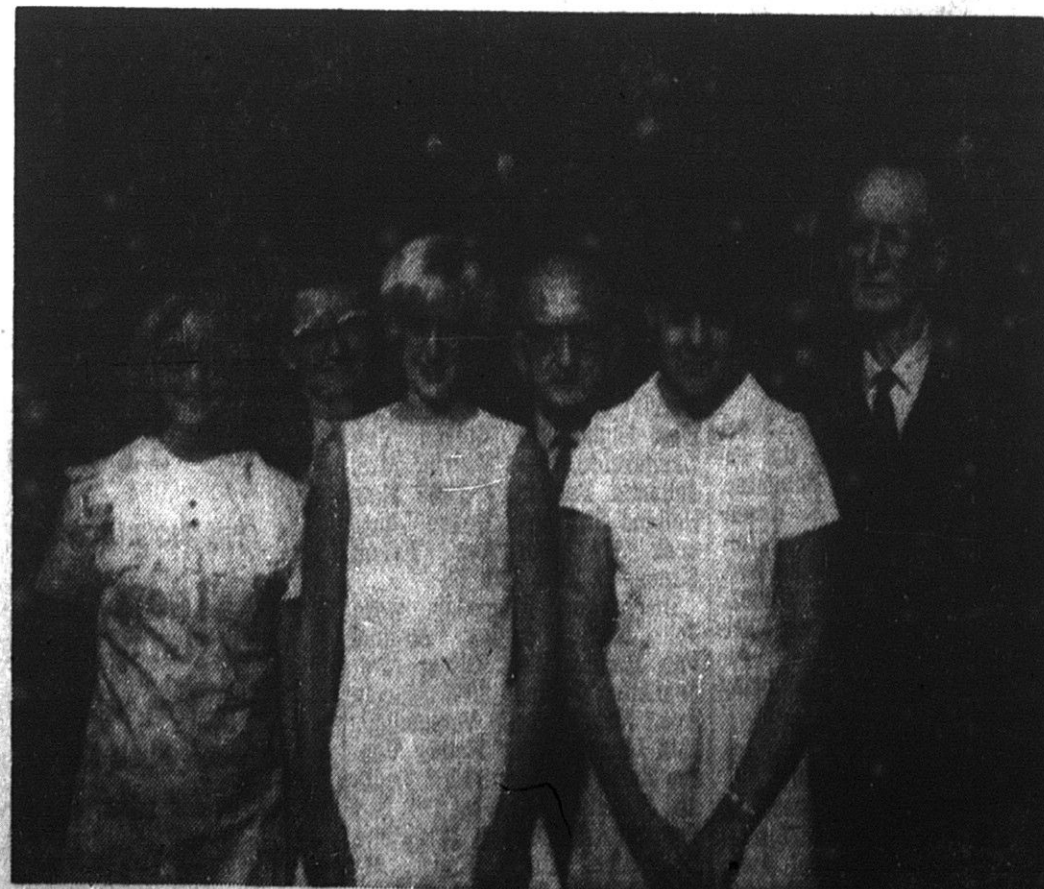

WHITEHALL—Holland Christian's basketball team warmed up for its Saturday engagement with River Rouge by crushing Whitehall Tuesday, 74-30, in the losers' gym, for their ninth win in 11 games.

It was one of those games that comes along every so often when one team does everything right and the other team can't do anything right. Old Metals Discussed At Questers

Household metals, copper, brass and pewter, were the topics of a program presented by Mrs. F. Sinke at the Monday meeting of the Christine Van Raalte Chapter of Questers. The meeting was held at the home of Mrs. Charles Vander Ven with Mrs. Sinke and Mrs. B. Cooper as hostesses.

According to Mrs. Sinke, copper was one of the first metals used by man, and may have been in use for 2,000 years before it was discovered it could be obtained by smelting. Smelting of copper was one of man's great turning points on the road to civilization. Used by the early Egyptians and Roman's it was also discovered by Columbus that the Indians were using small copper hatchets.

Brass was known in Egypt during the first century B.C. During the Middle Ages, brass was used for pins, a vital article of dress and in 1636, the pin-makers of London formed a corporation. Brass articles, whatever their use, were hard to come by, according to Mrs. Sinke, were expected to last a long time and be handed down from one generation to the next. In old Russia, the bride brought enough copper and brass utensils to her new home to last a lifetime.

In discussing pewter, Mrs. Sinke stressed that it too, went back to Greek and Roman times and was also used by the Chinese. During the days of the pewter guilds in England, it took about 450 years for pewter to go from the banquet halls of great castles and manor houses, to lesser dining rooms, to servants' quarters, and finally out the back door to make way for silverplate.

Mrs. Sinke had several articles of brass, copper and pewter on display, among them a Dutch brass charcoal iron, a Chinese brass charcoal iron, an English brass jelly pan; and old Dutch decorated pewter urn and a brass tobacco box owned by her husband's grandfather.

The two fortunate persons are Earl Johnson now 75 years old who lives at 28 East 14th St. and Chris Korose who is 80 years young and resides in the Hotel Netherlands.

In case some of you were wondering, the Palace Hall was located in the same building on Eighth Street that the City Mission is now located.

Yes, according to Johnson, "this used to be our hangout." "We never had too much to do in those days, surely not like people do today, so when I couldn't play pool, I didn't know what to do with myself, Johnson said.

Johnson played in the first pool tournament in Palace Hall in 1915. Ironically, Korose was the manager of the hall at the time, along with being one of the city's finest pool players.

If you asked me to play pool

now, I surely would object because after I got married, I sort of lost all my desire to play pool," said Johnson.

As it eventually turned out, Johnson won the first straight pool tournament by defeating Will Blom, Jake Jappinga, Dick Dogger and Jack West. The only game that Johnson dropped was to John Post. The jubilant Johnson said, "I won a fancy cue stick and boy was I tickled." And at 75 years of age you could still tell that he was quite proud of his victory.

With Korose managing the hall until 1930 when it folded up, Johnson insists, "it was an all-right place." I guess it folded up sometime in the '30's," Johnson remarked.

The owner of the building was the deceased Herbert Harrington.

Johnson graduated from Holland High in 1916. He used to play basketball but indicated that he was too small for football.

We asked Johnson, how much it cost to play pool back in the so-called good days and he snapped, "I think it was around 30 cents an hour." A far cry from today's price!

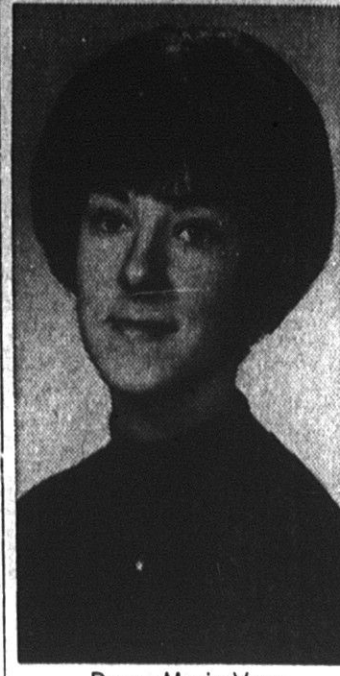

Jim Helmink, who is one of the most feared juniors in the area, notched 16 points while Ken De Boer and spark-plug center Tom De Vries netted points each. Ray Munson rounded out the balance scoring for Holland with 10 points. Four of them came in the extra session.

Don Strobridge paced the Wolverines in scoring with 26 points while Mark Gorsky and Dave Dame pumped in 18 and 16 respectively for Godwin.

The victory lifts the Dutch to a 6-4 overall record compared to a 3-7 mark for the Wolverines.

"It was a team victory all the way and I'm just glad to get the win," Coach Don Pierasma of Holland said. "That Glupker did another standout job while De Vries came off the bench to give us the necessary lift."

The Wolves battled back on a free throw by Strobridge and a basket by Gorsky to cut Holland's lead to 79-77, then Munson hit two clutch free throws, one as he jumped straight up in the air with joy, to increase Holland's margin to 81-77.

Hustling guard De Boer put icing on the cake, by swishing two free throws with only seven seconds left, to kill off any chances the determined Wolverines had of winning.

Holland outscored the losers 11-5 in the decisive overtime session. Munson and Glupker both added four points during this span to lead the Dutch.

In a low scoring third quarter, Holland edged the Wolverines, 14-13 but still trailed 58-57 going into the final stanza. The Dutch hit on 30 of 61 attempts for a fine percentage of 45. Godwin also made 30 baskets but was able to connect for 17 free throws compared to 23 for Holland.

Coach Ken Bauman's reserves raced past Godwin, 67-56 as once again Bauman's squad received balanced scoring to pick up their fifth victory in their last five games.

Steve Shinabarger, Jim Lawrence and Dave Brownson each scored 13 points for Holland while Hue Simpson and center Mike Riksen added 11 apiece.

The little Dutch are now 5-5 for the year.

Educational Tax Reform Explained

A clearer insight into the educational portion of Gov. Milliken's tax reform proposal was given to Chamber of Commerce members at a legislative breakfast Monday in Hotel Warm Friend with State Sen. Gary Byker and Reps. James Farnsworth and Melvin De Strigter.

Rep. Farnsworth said the educational reform bill proposes a statewide school tax of 16 mills (Holland school district currently levying 20.44 mills). He said each local district would have an option of levying additional taxes and the state operational fund would be distributed on a classroom unit basis instead of a student basis. The 16-mill tax would not build buildings or pay bonded indebtedness. Some state aid might go to nonpublic schools (Parochial).

Farnsworth said the bill would reorganize the present 60 intermediate districts into 10 or 15 districts, would give such districts the responsibility of providing vocational and technical training and would complete the K-12 consolidation. It also calls for eventual abolishment of the State Board of Education and the governor would appoint a director of education. The 16-mill proposition and replacing the state board would require changes in the state constitution.

Rep. De Strigter listed several reasons why educational reform is needed, the greatest one to

pinpoint responsibility in a complex program in which responsibility is vague. The governor is not totally responsible for the program, nor is the legislature, and not the State Board of Education which is elected on a partisan basis, nor the Superintendent of Public Instruction who is appointed by the board.

He added that the intermediate concept does not fit well into the total program and some districts do not even operate a school. He also pointed to the need in reform in collection and distribution of revenue.

Sen. Byker, speaking on how to finance the proposed program, defined taxes as "the portion you give to enjoy a remainder" and said the legislator is always under pressure from four groups — senior citizens, agriculturalists, businessmen and educators.

He outlines several possibilities of raising the money but concluded income tax loomed as the one possibility which would get the most consideration.

Answering questions from the audience, Byker said sales tax returns to cities and schools would not be changed since this is a constitutional amendment. De Strigter said uniformity in tax assessments still hits a snag in the township level where the local supervisor is an influence.

Donald Stoltz, chairman of the Chamber's legislative committee, presided.

Please Don't Dig In Snowbanks

ALLEGAN — Allegan County Road Commission Engineer Manager Fred Neils is asking parents to warn their children of dangers in digging tunnels in high snowbanks along county roads.

Neils pointed out that youngsters could be seriously injured when snow plows cut the banks or move them back. He said "we've been lucky so far this year, but there have been injuries in the past so it's a good idea to remind children of the dangers each year."

Neils also appealed to operators of small plows not to plow snow from private property across public roads or pile it in the roads. Personnel can be injured and equipment damaged when plows hit frozen snow, he said. There is also the possibility that persons working within the right of way without permission might expose themselves to liability problems in case of a mishap.

He said the practice of moving snow from private property to the right of way also uses up snow storage space badly needed for keeping the public roads open.
