'Hot Dots' to Spot Kids in Darkness

A two-month experimental program to test the effectiveness of reflectORIZED materials on clothing in making children more visible in darkness was begun Tuesday by the Automobile Club of Michigan.

In Holland, students kindergarten through third grade are given six "hot dot" type patches to wear on their outer school clothing to make them easier to see by drivers during the morning darkness hours.

The dime-sized bright orange dots are self adhesive and are designed to be worn on each outer coat sleeve.

William Smolenski, Holland Auto Club manager, said, "We hope that car headlights will pick up the dots at least a block away, warning motorists to use extra caution because of children in the area."

Parents of children receiving the dots also will receive a list of safe walking tips for children, plus an evaluation card to be filled out by parents whose youngsters are participating in the experiment.

Smolenski said the hot dots are just one of a series of products now being marketed to make youngsters more visible in darkness. Cooperating in the experimental program are Holland Public Schools and the Holland police department.

The Auto Club has been outfitting 350 local safety patrol officers with highly visible orange safety patrol belts. There are about 65,000 such belts in the state.

Holland Man Sentenced To Prison

GRAND HAVEN — David W. Finck, 24, of Holland, charged with burglary, was sentenced to two to ten years in prison Monday by Circuit Judge James Townsend. Finck had pleaded guilty to the charge.

In another case, Finck pleaded innocent to a charge of uttering and publishing.

Earl D. Cranmer, 38, of Holland, was sentenced to 90 days in the county jail for carrying a concealed weapon.

Laverne Schaap, of Holland, was placed on probation for one year on his guilty plea to issuing an insufficient fund check.

Sentenced was delayed for Cynthia L. Fowler of Holland who pleaded guilty to a burglary charge. She was placed on voluntary probation for one year.

The scheduled sentencing of James J. Hill of Holland on a gross indecency charge was delayed by the court.

Mark Harthorn, 17, of Holland, pleaded guilty to a grand larceny charge and bond of \$500 was continued. Timothy J. Prescott, 23, of Holland, stood mute to a charge of resisting arrest and was released on \$250 bond.



GRAND HAVEN — The resignation of Det. Sgt. John Hemple, a 16-year veteran of the Ottawa County sheriff's department, was announced today by sheriff Bernard Grysen. Hemple has accepted a position as investigator with the Friend of the Court of Ottawa County in Grand Haven. His resignation from the sheriff's department is effective Feb. 8. Grysen said no successor has been named.

DART Minibuses Arrive in City

Two minibuses in the fleet of five expected are in Holland receiving final preparations for the Dial-A-Ride Transportation Service scheduled to begin operation at 6 a.m. Monday, Feb. 4.

Final touches on the bright red DART buses include the installation of a driver operated door and attaching the Dial-A-Ride insignia and phone number to the sides of the Dodge vans.

Two additional buses will be driven to Holland from Lansing on Friday. The promised fifth bus is still in preparation in Lansing and will arrive at a later date. The system can operate efficiently for the initial weeks with the four buses, according to Jan Meinel, Holland's DART coordinator.

A group which included Mrs. Meinel, Jack Vannette, operator of the Holland DART system, Michael Dewey, transportation consultant from Ford Motor Company who is conducting the driver training, and the recently hired eight drivers and two dispatchers, traveled to Lansing Tuesday to pick up the two buses.

During the return trip the group stopped in Grand Rapids to observe that city's Dial-A-Ride system in operation, particularly the dispatching network.

All of Holland's DART system drivers have had experience driving larger vans but each took turns at driving the vehicles back from Lansing.

Today the drivers and dispatchers are receiving orientation training which will include operation of Holland's particular system. A complete mockup session is planned for later in the training.

Of the three cities picked as pilot projects, Holland Mount Pleasant and Ludington, only the Holland system will begin operation according to the original tentative schedule.

The DART telephone number is 392-1453 with its three lines will be in operation beginning Thursday.

Applications are still being accepted for additional bus drivers which could be as high as a total of 12 depending upon public demand for transporta-

tion. The drivers and dispatchers are being trained to perform their functions interchangeably if necessary.

Drivers hired include one woman and seven men: Mrs. Jan Koster, Fred Overkamp, Marvin Baas, Richard Pender, Keith Koeman, Charles Vanderwell, Ray Gutierrez, and Russell Goeman. Dispatchers will be Bruce Kelly and Charles Vander Broek.

Three Boys Find Body Of Woman

The body of Lola De Waard, 41, of 2489 Thomas St., missing since Tuesday, was found Saturday at 2:29 p.m. in a field in the 600 block area of South Shore Dr. by three boys walking along Lake Macatawa.

The body was found 100 feet from the shore. Police said she died of exposure.

Time of death was placed at about 72 hours before the body was discovered.

Police launched an air and ground search for the missing woman Thursday. She was last seen Tuesday at her mother's house at 301 East 11th St.

Survivors include the husband, Glenn; a son Craig, at home; her mother, Mrs. Ted Vanden Berg Sr.; a brother, Ernest Haight of Orlando, Fla.; a stepister, Mrs. Paul Bakale of Grand Haven; two aunts and an uncle Mrs. Bertha Favel of Grand Rapids and Mr. and Mrs. Russell Haight of Freeport, Ill.

I-196 Link To Open This Year

The state Highway Commission says a 24-mile stretch of I-196 between Holland and Grandville is scheduled to be open later this year. The final segment of I-196 freeway had been expected to be open around Labor Day of 1974.

The anticipated opening is about nine months later than had been planned when the expansion began in 1972. Heavy rains in the late summer of 1972 and spring of 1973 made it impossible to move equipment into mucklands and heavy clay of Ottawa County.

Sections of the freeway near Zeeland have been paved but key overpasses, such as one at Byron Rd. east of Zeeland, have not been completed.

Mercury Soars To 50 Degrees

A high reading of 50 degrees was registered in Holland Wednesday, perhaps the high point of a January thaw that was running into three weeks. Strong winds throughout the day dried a good share of soggy areas exposed by receding snow piles.

Today's temperatures were a different story, falling into the 20s, still accompanied by brisk winds which increased the chill factor. Predictions called for lows around 10.

High winds Wednesday pushed the ice out of Lake Macatawa, the earliest longtimers could remember. West winds will probably return a lot of the ice floes.

Intestinal Disorders In County Up

GRAND HAVEN — Ottawa County experienced an increase in reported intestinal disorders, a decline in reported cases of measles, scarlet fever and mumps and a slight increase in reported cases of gonorrhea.

Dr. Paul Christenson, medical director of the Ottawa County Health Department, said with the exception of reported cases of whooping cough, the county experienced less incidence of communicable disease in 1973 as compared with the state as a whole.

The number of reported cases of whooping cough increased from one in 1972 to four in 1973; shigellosis from four to six; salmonellosis from one to nine; hepatitis from 20 to 36 and gonorrhea from 307 to 330.

The reported cases of syphilis declined from 24 in 1972 to nine in 1973 while red measles dropped from 29 to four; German measles, 20 to 15; mumps, 119 to 15; scarlet fever, 81 to 38 and rheumatic fever, five to zero.

Dr. Christenson said the 1973 increase incidence of salmonella, shigella and hepatitis cases "could conceivably relate to some possible problems with either private waste disposal and/or possibly private water supplies in some sectors of the county."

He added it was "pure conjecture" but said the situation was being assessed and evaluated.

He attributed a reported reduction in the venereal diseases to efforts of many in the health department and the community.

Concerning polio immunizations, Dr. Christenson said the health department provided vaccine to about 70 per cent of the eligible population in grades kindergarten through 12th grade representing 25,705 immunizations.

Donald E. Prins Dies at Age 57

Donald E. Prins, 57, of 440 West Lakewood Blvd., died Tuesday shortly after being admitted to Holland Hospital, following an apparent heart attack.

Born in Holland, he attended local schools and formerly owned and operated the Prins Gun Shop and Service Station. He was employed at Parke-Davis Co., and also taught auto mechanics at West Ottawa High School. He was a member of Beechwood Reformed Church, serving on the consistory as an elder. He was also a former member of the Holland Township Board.

Surviving are his wife, Nina; a daughter, Mrs. Sherwin (Shirley) Weener of Sterling, Ill.; a son, Leon of Zeeland; four granddaughters; a brother, E. L. (Bud) Prins and a sister, Mrs. John Clark, both of Holland, several nieces and nephews.

Drowning Death Ruled Accidental

Ottawa County's sheriff's deputies have ruled the death Wednesday of Richard Van Eenenaam, 68, of 500 Washington Ave., as accidental drowning following an autopsy report Thursday.

Deputies said it appeared Van Eenenaam fell into the waters of Lake Macatawa west of Scott's Marina, 1826 Ottawa Beach Rd., after becoming ill. Deputies said he had been watching fishermen.

The body was found Wednesday afternoon by two passersby in about three feet of water near the edge of Ottawa Beach Rd. where a small creek enters the lake.







HUDSONVILLE — Hudsonville Unity Christian recorded its second basketball win of the season over Holland Christian Friday night, as they rolled to a 74-49 decision.

The Maroons, suffering their worst season in memory, held the lead four times in the early going, the last being 7-6 on a Keith Frens basket with three minutes left in the quarter, and appeared to be headed for one of their better performances. However, shortly thereafter Frens was charged with his third personal foul and had to sit out the rest of the first half. The quarter score was Unity 11, Holland Christian 10.

Already playing without 6'3" forward Jon Houseward, who has missed the last two games with a back injury, and with Frens on the bench, the Crusaders took control of the backboards and also the tempo of the game in the second period to steadily pull ahead to a half-time score of 35-21.

Sharpshooting Bill Van Vugt popped in 12 points for Unity, one more than Christian's entire team could muster. Del Petreloje notched six for the Maroons in the period.

The first half shooting percentages had a great deal to do with the score, as Christian, taking 39 shots connected only nine times for 23 per cent, while the Crusaders shot at a 41 per cent clip on 15 of 35. Incidentally Unity duplicated that in the second half to end with 30 baskets in 72 tries.

Dave Tuls put the Maroons within 12 at 39-27, but that was as close as they were to get for the remainder of the game, as Unity advanced to a 20-point margin going into the final quarter, 53-33.

Midway in the fourth quarter Unity was leading 63-44, then proceeded to register 10 straight points for their biggest spread of the game, 73-44. Christian scored the last five points of the game all at the free throw lane.

The final period was the only one which found the Maroons hitting over 33 per cent, and then they got off just five shots, making three for 60 per cent. Christian ended up with 18 baskets on 63 shots for a very cold 28 per cent. The Crusaders also had the upper hand in rebounds, 42-36.

Three of the Maroons fouled out in the fourth quarter, Dave Van Langevelde at 3:17, Tuls at 2:39 and Frens with 2:15 to play.

Van Vugt led both teams in scoring with 24 points. Also in double figures for Unity were Mary Zwart with 13 and Tom Vander Lugt with 10. Frens topped Christian's point-maker with 11.

Christian's reserve team chalked up a 57-48 win over the Crusaders as Joel Vogelzang and Tom Zoerhof provided a potent one-two punch, recording 23 and 21 points respectively. Doug Venema had 15 for Unity.



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SPEED AND HIGHWAY SAFETY

For years this country has been concerned about the great numbers of people slaughtered every day on its highways. We built safer roads, safer cars and passed various laws to cut down on the mortality. All the while, the experts were saying that it was speed that was killing us.

Now comes the energy crunch, lower speed laws, and all of a sudden fewer highway deaths. Apparently the experts were right about it. It is still too early to give precise figures on how lowered speed saves lives, but it is very evident from the weekly reports of traffic fatalities in Michigan that lowered speed is saving lives on Michigan highways.

The whole solution is so simple that we now marvel at ourselves that we wouldn't be convinced before. What it may all result in is a different notion of what kind of cars and what kind of roads we should have. But perhaps these conditions are not as important as learning a new kind of behavior. It is obvious that if we go more slowly fewer of us get killed. That ought to be incentive enough to use a lighter foot on the accelerator.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Feb. 3
Promise of the Counselor
John 16: 4b-15
By C. P. Dame

For some time the person and work of the Holy Spirit has been neglected but lately He has become more prominent due to the charismatic movement. This lesson tells about the work of the Holy Spirit in the world and in the church.

I. Before leaving His disciples Jesus promised the coming of the Holy Spirit. During the last months of the ministry of Jesus He gave much attention to the training of the apostles. The lesson text is a part of the discourse Jesus gave His apostles on Thursday, the night before His crucifixion. The time had come for Him to teach them things which He had not yet taught them. He was about to leave. He had trained them for service. Hardships were sure to come and Jesus wanted them to be prepared for the future work of building the church.

Jesus told His disciples that His departure to the Father would be to their advantage for it meant the coming of the Holy Spirit, called Counselor, Advocate, Helper. As long as Jesus was with the disciples the Spirit was not needed, but His departure necessitated His coming. Jesus prepared them for the opposition of the world and the work of building the church.

II. Jesus tells about the ministry of the Holy Spirit. He mentions first the task of convicting the world—the world which is in opposition to God, of sin, and of righteousness and of judgment. The world's ideas concerning these three subjects are wrong. The great sin is unbelief in Jesus. The Holy Spirit points to the cross and says that this is what sin does. The world's ideas of righteousness are wrong because its idea of sin is wrong. The only righteousness God accepts is that which He provides in Christ. The Holy Spirit will also convict the world of judgment. Satanic ideas, schemes, motives, goals were judged on the cross of Christ and received God's condemnation. Why the live for anything that is satanic?

III. Jesus said that the Holy Spirit will guide the disciples in the truth. At the time Jesus spoke to them they were not yet qualified to understand truths which in the future the Holy Spirit would make plain. The Spirit guided the apostles in the writing of the New Testament and in their missionary work. The Holy Spirit would make clear the meaning of Christ's death and resurrection and glorify Jesus, pointing out that He is the only Saviour and Lord. Today people, guided by the Holy Spirit, aim to glorify the risen, exalted Christ.

Maroons End 10-Game Losing Skid

Holland Christian's basketball team trailed West Ottawa by 11 points with less than a minute to play in the third quarter, then blitzed the Panthers 21-4 in the final period, to hand West Ottawa a 61-53 defeat. The win for the Maroons snapped a 10-game losing skid and gave Christian its second win in 15 games, while the Panthers dropped to 3-9.

The game took the effect of a three-part play. The first being the first half, the second the third quarter and act III the fourth period.


Visser had 14 points at the half while Frens had nine to lead their teams.

Del Petroelje and Frens hit field goals for Christian at the outset of the deciding quarter, which was followed by one from Visser, for a 51-44 margin for the Panthers with 6:25 left. However, that proved to be the last core for the Panthers until one minute to go, when Visser once again connected.

In the meantime the Maroons ran up 16 consecutive points, including eight by Frens, six by Dave Tuls and two by Jack Scholten, for a 60-51 lead for Christian, their largest of the game.

With the Maroons' turning in what was possibly their best play of the season in the period, the Panthers were stopped cold, and also committed 11 of their 25 turnovers in the period, as the Maroons were all



Dutchmen Turn Back Olivet, 72-67

The MIAA's second leading scorer forward Brian Vriesman of Hope College and his teammate sub center Willie Cunningham paced the Flying Dutchmen to their second league win in five outings, 72-67 Wednesday evening in the Civic Center.

Hope's sixth straight win at home without a loss wasn't easy, as the young Comets of Coach Gary Morrison battled the Dutchmen right down to the very end.

Olivet had hope of stunning the Dutchmen on their own court but when Vriesman netted three consecutive buckets, two of them left-handed, Hope shot out to a 35-29 lead after only being ahead by two points, 29-27 at the half.

The Dutchmen moved out to a nine point advantage minutes later but the aggressive Comets soared back to cut the gap to two points, 49-47, 51-49, 55-53 and 57-55.

Cunningham was in the Hope lineup in place of Dwayne Boyce, who had four fouls and the 6'5" Washington, D.C. junior made the most of his opportunity by canning five buckets and one free throw to cement the Hope triumph in the second half.

Two free throws by Jack Klunder and Mike Riksen closed out the Hope scoring in the dying seconds. Mike Russell swished two charity throws with five seconds left, as the scoreboard read Hope 72 Olivet 67.

The first half resembled a battle of turnovers, as Olivet had 14 and Hope 10. The Dutchmen finished the evening with 20 miscues while the Comets had 25 mistakes.

With neither team taking advantage of each others' turnovers, the tilt was tied seven times in the first half and changed hands eight times.

Both starting centers Boyce and John Nanetz of Olivet had three fouls before the intermission. Namez was the only senior in the Comets starting lineup. Three of the regulars are freshmen and one sophomore.

Vriesman and Cunningham paced Hope's scoring attack with

18 and 15 markers in that order. No one else reached double figures for the Dutchmen, although Riksen and Boyce had nine apiece. John Sibley had 15 for the Comets while scoring 12 was Namez. Randy Sharp and Rob Johnson added 10.

Olivet hit 28 field goals to 27 for the Dutchmen but Hope held a wide edge in free throws 18-11 to wrap up their eight overall win of the season. Last year's MIAA co-champion Comets are now 2-13 for the season.

Veteran Hope Coach Russ DeVette went to his bench early in the first half to try and change the complexion of the game. He said, "We weren't hustling like I wanted and I thought the other guys might get something going. Willie Cunningham did a fine job in a reserve role."

Hope will host Abion Saturday while the Comets won't see action until next Wednesday when they entertain the same Britons.

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secured by the City, and secondarily secured by the full faith and credit of the County, for the purpose of expanding and improving the City's Water Supply System.

2. The County will be entitled to purchase water from the City at the maximum withdrawal rate of 152 GPM (2.25MGD) for distribution to customers in Park, Holland and Zeeland Townships.

3. The price for water purchased shall be determined by dividing the total revenue from metered water sales in the City by the number of metered water delivered in the City. City water retail rates shall be established from time to time at a level which does not exceed that level which is necessary to provide for production and distribution, operation and maintenance, debt amortization and reasonable depreciation of the City system.

4. The County will provide, install and maintain remote meters and tele-metering equipment to allow the City's water use to be monitored at the City Water Treatment Plant.

5. The County will share, on the basis of proportionate benefit, in the cost of an elevated storage tank in or near the City Water Treatment Plant and in any required expanded distribution lines. The City shall build the expanded distribution lines to the City limits on the City Water Treatment Plant. The County shall build the storage tank. No water shall be drawn by the County from the City lines near the south side of Park Township until the storage tank and distribution lines are completed.

6. The County will provide all piping, metering and related equipment necessary to isolate the County Water System.

7. Subject to paragraph 5, the City will permit immediate connection of the Holland Township Federal District, Park Township Wakarusa Area, and any other area that does not create an unusual demand or significant industrial use. Upon completion of the proposed water plant expansion the City will permit immediate connections subject to the usage limitation in provision 2.

8. In the event the County exceeds the maximum withdrawal rate of 152 GPM (2.25MGD) a premium shall be imposed on the County for the amount of such excess. This premium rate shall be three times the rate specified in provision 3.

9. Upon completion of the proposed plant expansion the County shall have the option of purchasing up to 2.25 MGD capacity interest in the Holland Water Supply System. The purchase price, paid in cash, shall be the fair market value of the portion of the Holland Water System purchased as of the date of purchase. The Hollister shall be the sole owner of the capacity interest in the water intake, the treatment plant and ancillary facilities, as well as the water mains used to transmit water to the delivery points. After purchase of capacity interest the rate for water purchased by the County shall include only the costs directly attributable to the production of water, no depreciation of capital return considered.

10. The City of Holland will agree, if agreeable with the City of Zeeland, that water may be delivered to the County for Zeeland Township through the Zeeland Water System.

11. All previous water contracts with the County and/or its Townships will be nullified and replaced by this proposed contract and be included in the 2.25 MGD limitation.

12. Park and Holland Township and Ottawa County will consent to use of their streets and roads for the extension of the City of Holland water system with the exception of any cross-street connection and subject to usual resolution requirements.

13. If agreement cannot be reached as to a division between the City and County of the proportionate benefit of the tank and distribution lines referred to in paragraph 5, then the matter shall be submitted to arbitration through the American Arbitration Association or similar organization.

14. If agreement cannot be reached as to the fair market value pursuant to paragraph 9, then the matter shall be submitted to arbitration through the American Arbitration Association or similar organization.

Mr. Dressel moved the Board reject the two (2) former proposals of the Board of Public Works of Holland City, and moved the adoption of the corrected proposal. Hope College Boosts Tuition 6.8 Per Cent

Tuition, room, board and fees at Hope College for the 1974-75 academic year will be increased \$210 to \$3,310, President Gordon J. Van Wylen has announced.

The increase was approved by the college's Board of Trustees during their winter meeting earlier this month.

"Tuition will be increased \$145 to \$2,135, room fees by \$20 to \$470 and board (meals) by \$45 to \$630. An activity fee will remain at \$75.

"The general inflationary trend in the country also affects Hope College," noted President Van Wylen. "We have tried to keep the increase as low as possible yet still maintain a balanced budget."

"As a private college, we are heavily dependent upon tuition for our academic budget. We are committed to academic excellence, and our first concern is to have the necessary resources to achieve this aim. Yet we are also deeply concerned for our students and their families, and our goal will be to insure that every student who so desires has the opportunity to study at Hope College."

The \$3,310 figure represents a 6.8 per cent increase over present expenses of fulltime, on-campus students.

Hope College had a full enrollment of 2,105 men and women. The college's 1973-74 operational budget is \$7,075,000.
