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## School Finances Reviewed

A review of school district finances by Harvey J. Buter of the Board of Education at the monthly board meeting Monday night revealed the importance of the 5.5 mills approved by district voters last month in the total school budget for 1967-68.

Buter explained that the current school year opened with a balance of \$117,000 which had been built up earlier on a balanced three-year budget geared to the three-mill levy voted in 1964. The first year the board maintained a surplus, the second year it broke about even, and the third year it spent more than \$100,000 than it collected, Buter explained. He said the year would end June 30 with a balance of about \$15,000.

"The school system actually is spending over 4 mills this year instead of the 3 mills voted," he said, "and instead of having 2.5 extra mills for the coming year, we only have about a mill and a quarter above minimum needs."

He said the board would be studying very carefully all expenditures in the coming budget. Besides salaries for teachers, administrators, custodial help and secretaries, decisions must be made on curriculum, school libraries, physical education programs, keeping buildings in good repair, meeting tightening demands of the fire marshal, solving parking problems, and many more.

He said the city assessor and city treasurer have been most cooperative in their associations with the Board of Education. Summer tax collections in the city are over 96 per cent, and it is expected there will be some increase in total assessments through new homes, apartments and increasing industrial activity in the city.

Buter said he hopes allocations for schools will remain at 10.87 mills this year, pointing to constant demands from other governmental units for support. In view of the fact that all school districts in the county have voted extra operating millage, Buter as a member of the allocations commission has constantly maintained that other units should seek other modes of support and not cut into basic school taxes.

The 5.5 mills voted in January is for one year only.

## Primary Set for All Precincts

About 15 absentee ballots have been issued for next Monday's city primary to nominate candidates for the April 3 spring election.

Deadline for obtaining absentee voter ballots is 2 p.m. Saturday. Polls will be open in all 14 precincts in the city Monday from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

All voters will have an opportunity to vote councilman-at-large and voters in the fourth and sixth wards will vote on ward selections. In any case, the voter votes for only one in each office. The two receiving the highest number of votes will be carried over to the spring ballot.

## Kalamazoo Jolts Hope From First

KALAMAZOO — Kalamazoo College took over sole possession of first place in the MIAA with a convincing 75-63 win over Hope's basketball team Wednesday night in Tredway gymnasium.

Kalamazoo, shooting mostly from the outside in the first half, sank 44 per cent of its shots to take a 16-point lead, 39-23, at the intermission. Hope never recovered, and could get no closer than eight points in the second half.

The Hornets used a shifting zone defense which stymied Hope's attack. The zone, installed for the Hope game by Kalamazoo Coach Ray Steffens, combined with Hope's frigid out-court shooting left the Flying Dutchmen with only 23 points in the first half.

The zone which shifted from a 1-2-2 to a 2-3 collapsed on Hope's ace, forward Floyd Brady. It was so effective that Brady, the leading scorer in the MIAA, got off only three shots in the first half and didn't score a field goal until 15:49 of the second half.

The harassing Hornets helped force Hope into 14 ball control errors in the first half. The Hornets repeatedly took over the ball when the Flying Dutchmen tried to work it in against the zone. They got the ball four straight times between 8:44 and 6:40 of the first half and scored four straight baskets to open up their biggest lead, 29-11.

At the same time the Flying Dutchmen couldn't find the range from the outside. They made only seven of 29 field goal attempts in the first half for a 24 per cent average.

Another key to Kalamazoo's success in the opening 20 minutes of play was their rebounding on the defensive backboards. They pulled down 21 rebounds in the half mostly on the defensive boards to keep Hope from getting second shots. Hornet Center Craig Vossekuil had seven rebounds in the first half and 10 in the game to lead his team in that department.

Hope was hurt in the rebounding department by the absence of Center Bruce Van Huis. Van Huis, who sprained an ankle in the Alma game last Saturday, did not dress for the game.

Hope led by Brady also dominated its defensive backboards, but the Hornets with their 44 per cent accuracy in the first half didn't need too much offensive rebounding. The Kalamazoo scoring in the first half was led by Gene Nusbäum with 14 points and guards Bob Trenary with 12 and Tom Crawford with eight.

The Flying Dutchmen played their best basketball in the opening minutes of the second half. They got six straight points in the first 1½ and then narrowed the margin to 44-36 at 15:26 of the period.

The Hornets countered with six straight points in the next three minutes. A layup by Trenary following a steal was the third basket of the series, and it seemingly ended the Hope threat. The two-pointers put the winners ahead 50-36, and Hope

couldn't get any closer than 11 points the rest of the game.

Trenary and Crawford, turned in outstanding performances throughout the game. Their ball handling and speed allowed the Hornets to get many layups either on turnovers by Hope or by breaking Hope's full-court press in the second half. Hope gave up the ball 11 more times in the second half.

Trenary ended with 31 points. He hit a spectacular 11 of 15 shots from the floor for 73 per cent and nine of 10 free throws for 90 per cent. Crawford totaled 15 points as did Nusbäum.

Brady finally got some shots off at close-range in the closing minutes. He made five baskets in the last five minutes, but the spurt came too late to make any difference in the outcome.

The 6'3" forward was tough on the backboards hauling down 20, but otherwise had a frustrating night. He went to the foul line 11 times, but came through on only five of the free throws. He ended with 17 points — for the night, Brady's average going into the game was 23.4. Brady even had a basket cancelled when he was called for offensive goal tending.

Carl Walters got hot from the outside in the second half and hit for five baskets. He finished with 12 points. Gary Rypma chipped in 10 points for Hope.

Kalamazoo tallied on 28 of 60 shots from the floor for 47 per cent and 19 of 24 from the free throw line for 79 per cent. Hope ended with 26 of 69 field goal attempts for 38 per cent and 11 of 21 foul shots for 52 per cent. Hope outrebounded Kalamazoo 49-33.

Kalamazoo's MIAA record is now 8-1. The Hornets play Calvin in the Knights fieldhouse Saturday. Hope's league mark is 8-2. They meet Wheaton in a non-league game Saturday in the Civic Center. Kalamazoo's overall record is 14-3 while Hope's is 11-7.

## Grand Valley Gets 'A' Rating

ALLEDALE — Grand Valley State College President James H. Zumberge today announced the college has qualified for an "A" rating in the 1967 edition of "Report of Credit Given by Educational Institutions."

The "A" rating entitles Grand Valley students to have transcripts of record given full value by institutions throughout the nation reporting to American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers, publishers of the book.

The college was granted accreditation by the Michigan Commission on College Accreditation last June, after evaluation by a team of educators from other colleges in the state.

It is also a candidate for accreditation by the North Central Association. Full accreditation from NCA is expected during the next academic year.

## Council Accepts Bond Ordinance At First Reading

City Council Wednesday night took another step in industrial financing through revenue bonds by accepting for first reading the bond ordinance to provide \$12,500,000 for building and equipping a confections plant in Holland for Beech-Nut Life Savers, Inc.

Second reading and final action is slated later. The detailed bonding ordinance covering many printed pages was drawn up by a New York law firm headed by Thomas E. Dewey, Charles Moon of the Detroit law firm of Dickinson, Wright, McKean and Cudlip has been representing the city's interests and bond buyers' interests in the transactions.

Moon said the Beech-Nut firm originally had considered a \$13 million bond issue, then cut it down to \$12 million and current-

ly has set it for \$12½ million. Action was taken after Moon answered several searching questions, most of them posed by Councilman Richard W. Smith.

In general, Moon said, industrial revenue bond financing provides long-term financing in which the city floats the bonds and leases the property to the industry at fees sufficient to pay all bonding obligations. In this case, the bonds run 25 years, whereas private financing generally runs 10 to 15 years.

Moon said revenue bonds do not obligate the city, and the city's credit is not directly involved. But he added that no city cares to be associated with bond defaults and it follows that issuance of such bonds for developing industry is done only after the most thorough study of all aspects involved, particularly the assets and credit of the company seeking the bonds.

Answering a question on why cities should welcome and finance new industry which would compete with existing industry, Moon pointed to state policy in 1963 which encourages location of industry within the state and to provide aid therefor, in an attempt to strengthen and revitalize the economy in general, improve tax bases for communities, provide employment for residents, and generally expand and diversify business.

Moon also said similar financing is available to most any type of industry, provided credit is well established and attractive enough so that the banking market would be interested in purchasing the bonds. To safeguard such transactions, both the city and the Michigan Municipal Finance Commission must be convinced the program is of such character that there is no question of bankable credit.

Answering questions by Councilman Bertal Slagh, Moon said the advantages of municipal financing is three-fold, that long-term financing is available, that the application can cover 100 per cent of costs, and the interest rate generally is lower. He said sale of the bonds is not generally open to individuals, but secondary sales by large bonding and banking houses are common.

Councilman Morris Peerbolt deliberately posed the "blackest" question possible, asking what the city's obligation would be in the case of abandonment or bankruptcy. Moon said the bond ordinance covers every conceivable obligation to pay, but in case Beech-Nut went out of business, the city would own the land, plant and equipment. Should such development occur in, say 18 years, the city then would likely liquidate the property, refund the bonds, and perhaps arrange to finance a new tenant for another period, possibly 25 years. Moon added that if the entire economy went sour, all municipal bonds would probably be in the same boat.

But he pointed to the good name and assets of Beech-Nut and said the company's assets all over the country is behind the Holland venture.

City Manager Herb Holt was asked how much taxes might be paid by such a company, and on the basis of one-third assessment and \$60 per \$1,000, total taxes might approach \$240,000, covering city, school and county taxes.

Council approved retention of the firm of Dickinson, Wright, McKean and Cudlip of Detroit as bond attorneys on the revenue bonds, and granted a request of Beech-Nut that the company's tax attorney in Washington be given limited power of attorney by the city to obtain a ruling from the Internal Revenue Service in connection with the proposed revenue bond issue.

Council received and placed on file a stipulation from George and Loretta Green pertaining to the extension of Ottawa Ave. south of 32nd St., in connection with pending condemnation proceedings in Allegan Circuit Court. The stipulation was submitted along with a communication from the city attorney.

Also approved was a proposed agreement with J. Paul Jones Associates as planning consultants.

The annual budget for Herick Public Library was referred to the city manager for later consideration by Council.

Council approved recommendations of the Insurance Audit and Inspection Co. on awarding fire and extended coverage insurance on city buildings and contents. This lists low bid of the Holland Association of Home Insurance Agents in the Home Insurance Co. at an annual premium of \$13,146.

All Councilmen were present at the meeting which lasted 1½ hours. Mayor Nelson Bosman presided and the Rev. John Pelan of the Christian Counseling Service gave the invocation.

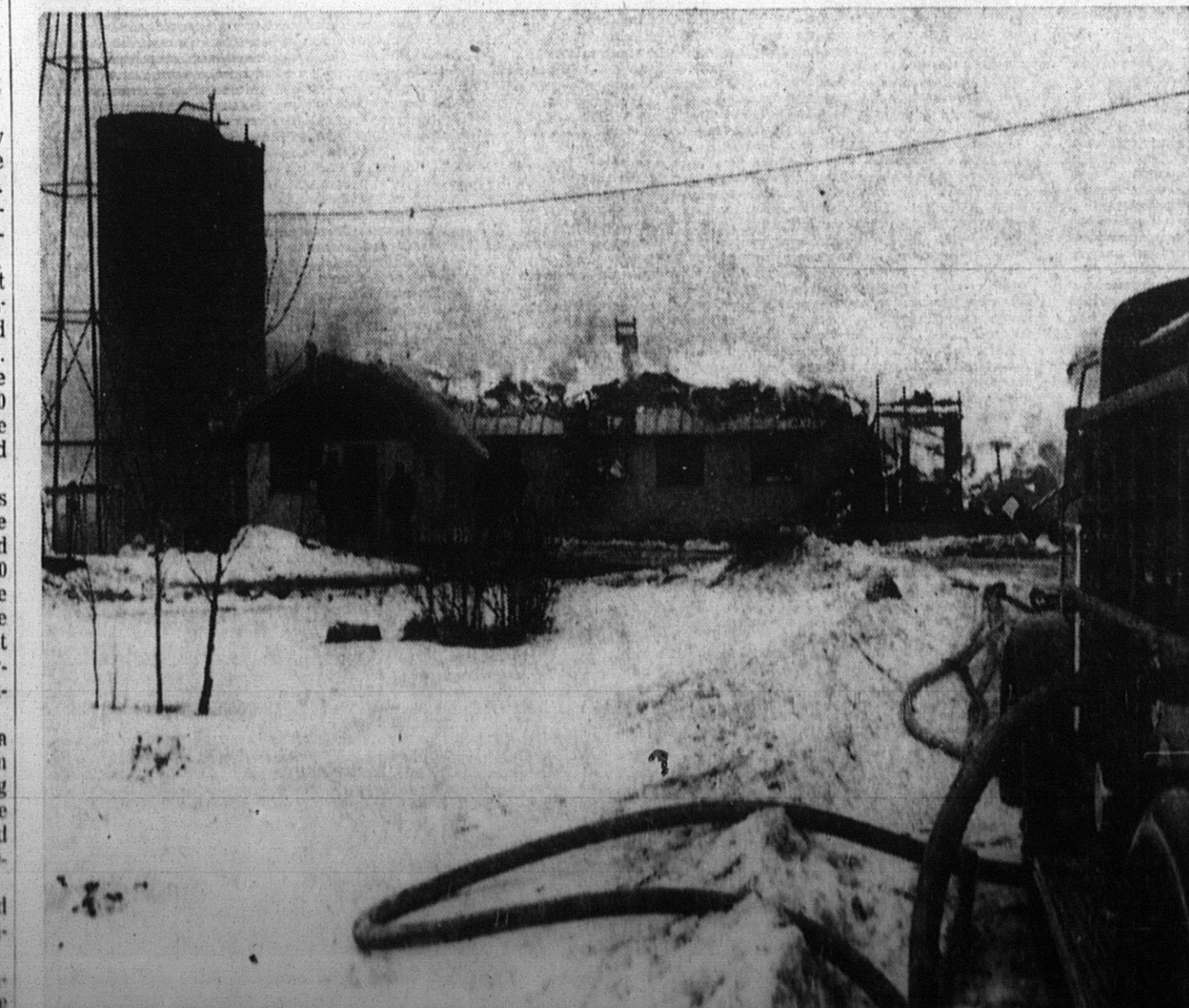
Firemen said work was being done on a gasoline engine in the garage, and some gasoline exploded when it came too near an electric heater.

## Maroons Win 12th Game This Season

Holland Christian's basketball team had its best scoring balance of the season, all five starters in double figures, as it ran over West Ottawa 76-45 before 2,300 persons at the Civic Center Tuesday night.

John Lappinga and Steve Bushouse each had 14 points for the Maroons while Don Hulst and Bob De Nooyer put in 12 each and Bob Van Langevelde had 10. The team enjoyed a 48 per cent average from the floor (30 of 63) and hit on two-thirds of their free throws (16 of 24).

Christian had an easy time winning its twelfth game in 15 outings. West Ottawa managed to tie the score at 2-2, but spent the rest of the night trailing the Maroons. It was the Panthers' twelfth defeat in 13 games.

Christian took a 7-2 lead near the middle of the first quarter and ran the margin to 16-8 at the end of the frame. Bushouse had four field goals to pace the winners in the quarter.

The two teams traded baskets for much of the second period, but the Maroons managed to pick up five points to lead 34-21 at halftime.

The Panthers shot a fine 47 per cent of their shots in the first half, but managed to get off only 19 attempts during the first two periods. The Maroons outrebounded them 19-7 in the half.

Both teams had their best scoring efforts in the third period. Christian made nine of 15 from the floor for 60 per cent while West Ottawa pumped in five of eight for 62 per cent. The Maroons outscored the Panthers 25-16 in the stanza to up their margin to 59-37 at the three-quarter mark.

The last period saw Christian open up their biggest bulge, 36 points, as the Panthers were able to mesh only two of 17 field goal attempts. The Panthers didn't score in the period until Doug Vande Wege hit a free throw at 4:38. Substitute Lloyd Doezeman sank a pair of free throws to put Christian ahead 74-38 near the middle of the period. West Ottawa got seven straight points in the closing minutes as Maroon Coach Art Tuls brought in many of his reserves.

Christian pulled off 32 rebounds to 18 for West Ottawa during the game. Don Hulst had eight rebounds and John Lappinga seven for the Maroons.

West Ottawa's scoring leader was freshman center Lynn Loncki who had 13 points. Guards Bill Henson and Jim Visser gunned in 10 points each for the Panther cause. The losers hit 16 of 40 floor shots for 40 per cent and 13 of 19 free throws for 68 per cent.

Holland Christian travels to Muskegon Christian for a rematch with the Warriors Friday night. They whipped them 80-49 at the Civic Center Jan. 20.

West Ottawa hosts Wyoming Park Friday night in an Ottawa-Kent Red Division game.

## Scouters Hold Roundtable

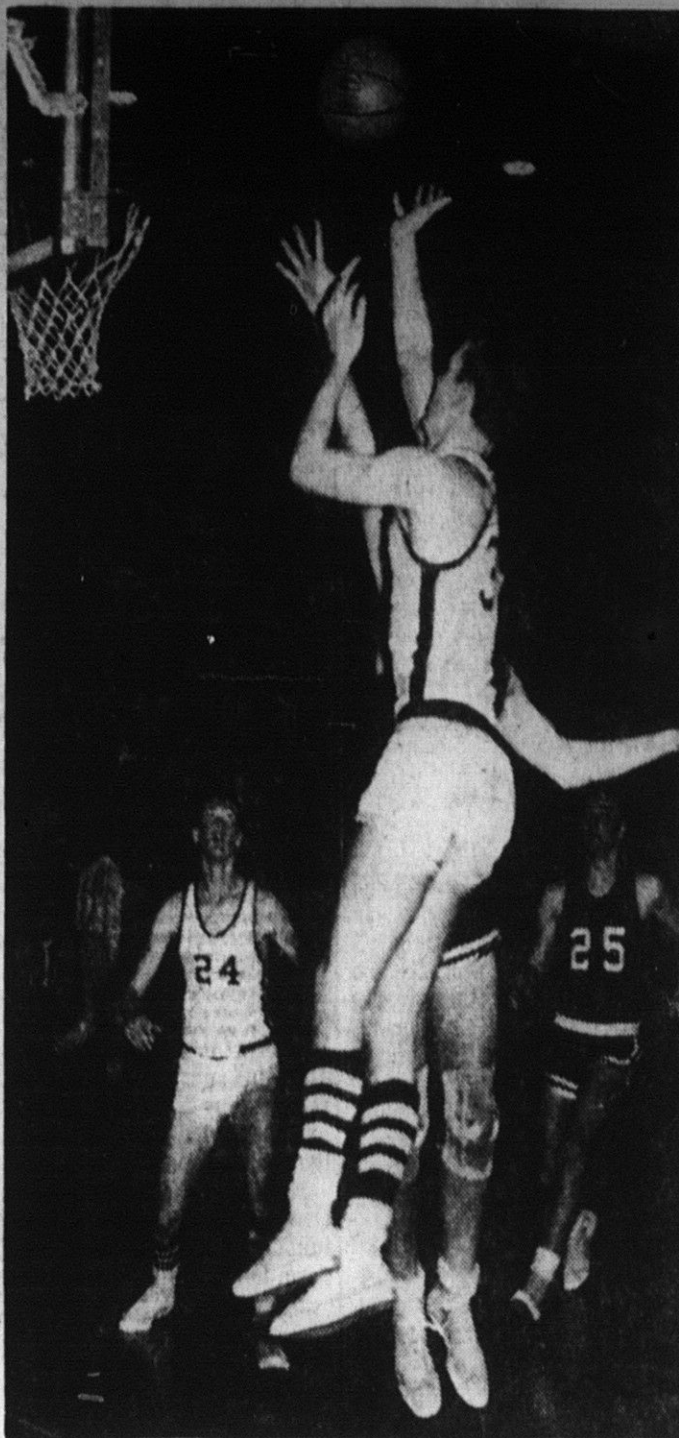

## Dr. Ridder Challenges Women at Prayer Service

Holland women of various denominations gathered for a World Day of Prayer service Friday afternoon in First Reformed Church. Among the 375 attending were those from Reformed, Methodist, Lutheran, and Roman Catholic churches, and from the Salvation Army.

Dr. Herman J. Ridder, president of Western Theological

Seminary, spoke on the topic "The Overwhelming Minority." He said that although Christianity is doomed to the role of a decreasing minority as the world's population soars, it can be a powerful minority if its members will shake off the spirit of lethargy.

Dr. Ridder based his discussion on the command of Christ to go into the nations and to make disciples of all men. This command, he said, gives Christians all the authority they need to take the world by storm. He pointed out that Christ's command was followed by the assurance that "Lo, I am with you always." The speaker questioned, however, whether this promise would apply to a church which is indifferent to the needs of the world.

## Volleys

Judge Cornelius vander Meulen was surprised to receive a greeting from a person in the Netherlands last month referring to a story about him in a Dutch newspaper.

It took some time to ferret out, but the judge finally received a copy of De Tijd of Rotterdam dated Dec. 24 which included an article by Hans Hermans, well known Dutch writer, who has visited Holland, Mich., on several occasions. He has been a guest of Judge vander Meulen and the judge visited the Hermans home on Curaçao some years ago while on a cruise of the Caribbean.

The subject of Dr. Hermans' article in the Rotterdam paper was the judge's distinctive Christmas greeting, original in content and form. It was in verse, which Hermans faithfully translated into Dutch.

In writing about the judge, Hermans pointed out that vander Meulen's grandfather was one of the founders of Zeeland, Mich., and his father was a minister. One of the judge's fondest memories in growing up with the Dutch Bible was the pleasing prospect of a dollar for every letter written in correct Dutch to his grandmother in Zeeland. At 86, the judge still speaks Dutch with surprising fluency.

Hermans who once attended an evening session of traffic court in Holland writes: "One should have seen Judge vander Meulen at a session of his court when he handled traffic violators with a courtesy and wisdom and frequently with such a sound sense of humor, that one pricked up his ears so as not to miss a single word he spoke. Had he not himself made the decision to retire, the citizens of Holland would undoubtedly have reelected him to office."

"Every one knows him as 'the judge.' No one calls him anything else. When, one time, an anonymous person, undoubtedly vexed by his decision, called him 'An Old Crow,' he found this appellation so pleasing that the same year he wrote, in verse, the Christmas greeting of 'The Old Crow' and sent it to all his friends to their amusement and, no less, to his own."

"Now once a year, Cornelius vander Meulen writes a verse and sends it to his many friends. It is a highly personalized Christmas greeting from a noble person who remains proud of his Netherlands ancestry and who in Holland, Mich., holds high the good name of the Netherlands."

The March exhibition will feature the works of James Mc Garrel, noted contemporary artist presently teaching in the school of art at Indiana University.

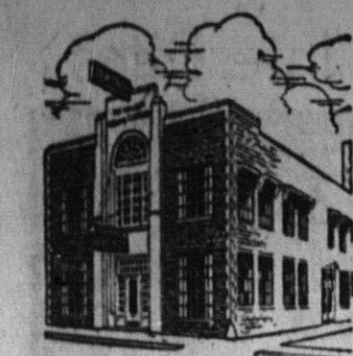
## Heart Attack Fatal For Fruitport Man

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#### HOW ABOUT THIS APPROACH?

Governor Romney has presented his budget to the legislature. It calls for new highs in spending, and in order to pay the bill, it asks for new taxes. There will be new taxes on private income, corporate income and an assortment of minor taxes. We are told that the state is growing and the needs must be met. We are quite sure that this is the case. What does concern us is the insistence that any kind of retrenchment is monstrous. This possibility has become almost extinct.

In California, a state which has grown more rapidly than any other state in the Union, Governor Reagan has called for a cut in spending as well as new taxes to make up the deficit. The howl that has gone up because of his request for a cut in spending has been heard from coast to coast. We are told that it isn't good business, it blocks progress and slows the governor to be out of step with the times. But we aren't sure.

There is something to be said for a Governor who insists on putting into action a campaign promise, even if that promise was to cut expenses. And we aren't quite sure whether all the criticism of the Governor is the voice of the people of California, or for that matter, the thinking of the general public. We are generally bombarded by the writing of men who constitute a small "in" group and who mirror the thinking of that group. It is difficult to get into print the thought of the people at large.

We think there is something courageous about a man who bucks the trend by insisting that along with higher taxes, there is another way to balance a budget and that by less spending. It might just be that that kind of approach will catch the fancy of millions of Americans who are forced to do that with their own budgets. There is a precedent in American life for such a realistic approach. And maybe it isn't really out of date.

#### Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Feb. 19  
God Years for the Lost  
Luke 15:11-24  
By C. P. Dame

This lesson is from one of the best known chapters of the Bible — Luke 15. It contains three parables of the lost — some say four. One truth stands out in the chapter — God is deeply concerned about lost people.

I. The lost call for searching. Jesus had a purpose in telling about the lost coin, sheep and boy. The Lord was criticized for associating with publicans and sinners. The Pharisees said, "This man receiveth sinners and eateth with them." They thought that was wrong. In defense Jesus told the parables.

When is a thing lost? When its owner can't USE IT AND enjoy it because it is in the wrong place. The coin, the sheep and the boy were not in their proper places and were not fulfilling their mission, and hence lost. The sheep wandered away thoughtlessly, well some people are like that. The coin was lost through someone's carelessness and got out of circulation. The boy wanted freedom and left home.

The religious leaders paid no attention to the lost people of their times. Jesus did — and His attitude reflected God's attitude. The lost are worth seeking and when found there is joy. The joy of the shepherd, of the woman, and of the father suggest the joy there is in heaven when one sinner repents.

II. The lost can be restored again. "And He said, A certain man had two sons." The younger son was restless, discontented, and wanted to leave home and get out into the world. He demanded his share of his father's possessions which he would one day inherit — see Deuteronomy 21:16, 17. The father yielded, the son left, found the far country and lived it up for a time. He had money, was ready to spend it, won friends, who left him when his money was gone.

The unexpected happened — a famine hit the country. The young man who always had the best looked for a job and got one — feeding swine, a most degrading job for a Jew. His employer sent him and he went obediently — what about freedom? His desperate situation made him think about his former blessings and the folly of his course and made him resolve to go home and ask to become a hired servant — he acknowledged his sin, and started for home.

III. God warmly welcomes the lost. The father is the real hero in this story. When he saw his son a great way off he had compassion on him and ran to meet him and fell on his neck and kissed him. God is like the father in this parable. The father said to his servants, "Bring forth the best robe," the marks of the far country must be removed; "and put a ring on his hand," a sign of authority; "and shoes on his feet," slaves go barefoot, but sons wear shoes; "and bring hither the fatted calf and kill it; and let us eat, and be merry." Did the son deserve this? No. This parable teaches the fact of God's grace. Sinners need grace.

Consider what the prodigal got. He was given pardon for his wrongdoing, restoration to the family, dignity, recognition, luxuries and love, position and prestige. Everything the far country promises God gives in Jesus Christ. God in season and out of season welcomes wandering wayward sinners and fills their lives with that which empty hearts and lives need.

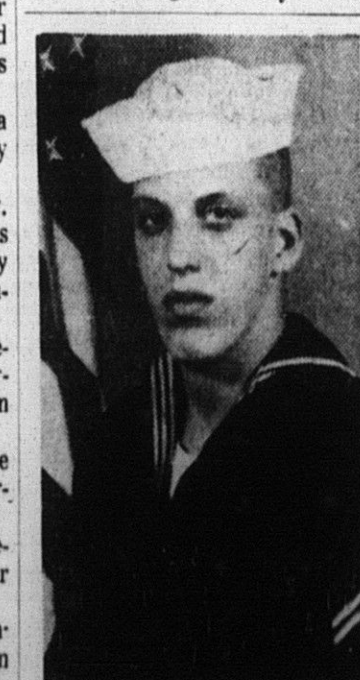

## Six Youngsters Perish In Tenant Shack Blaze

SOUTH HAVEN — Six children died early Monday when a flash fire, believed to have started from an oil heater, swept through a tenant shack on a farm in Lee Township, Allegan County. The parents, Mr. and Mrs. Alzie Bice and another child escaped death.

The victims were identified as Brenda Stringer, 15, daughter of Mrs. Bice by a previous marriage and five of the Bice children, Randy, 10, Debra, 9, Connie, 8, Marsha, 7, and Steve, 3.

Sharon Stringer, 14, also a child by Mrs. Bice's previous marriage was the only one to escape the flames which roared through a small shack in which the children were sleeping. She alerted the mother and father who were sleeping in another shack about 27 feet away.

Bice, 36, and his wife, Lucille,

34, and Sharon were taken to South Haven Hospital and treated for shock.

The victims were burned beyond recognition, Dr. J. D. Hayes, of Douglas, medical examiner, reported.

The scene of the multiple tragedy was on the Adkin brothers farm, about 7 miles east of South Haven. Bice was employed on the farm. By the time firemen from Lee Township, Pullman and other units had arrived after the alarm was sounded about 6 a.m. the wooden shack in which the children had been sleeping had been destroyed.

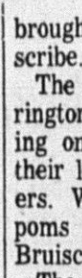
It was several hours later when crews from the Calvin Funeral Home and the Ebersson Funeral Home of South Haven were able to extricate the charred bodies from the smoldering ruins.

The bodies were in three beds whose posts were twisted metal and the mattresses were reduced virtually to ashes.

Tom Renner, South Haven Tribune managing editor who was at the scene, said, "They never knew what hit them."

A fireman said, "It was so far gone, we weren't going to put water on it until someone yelled there were children inside. Then it was too late," he added.

The Bice family moved to the area from Arkansas last October and Bice picked apples on the farm and orchard. Alvie Maynard, supervisor of fields for the Adkin brothers, said when the picking season was over Bice and the family were permitted to remain at the tenant shacks without rental charges.

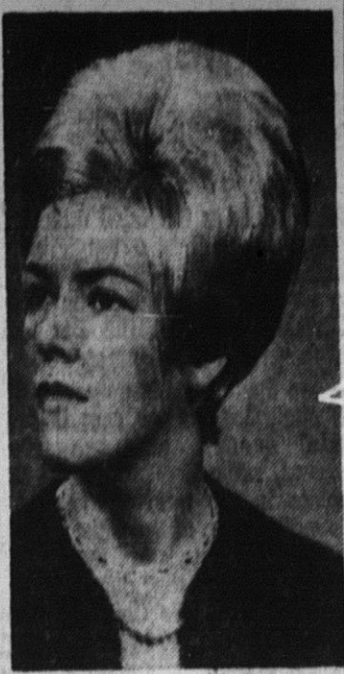

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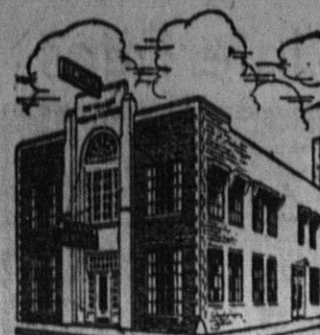
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#### HOW ABOUT THIS APPROACH?

Governor Romney has presented his budget to the legislature. It calls for new highs in spending, and in order to pay the bill, it asks for new taxes. There will be new taxes on private income, corporate income and an assortment of minor taxes. We are told that the state is growing and the needs must be met. We are quite sure that this is the case. What does concern us is the insistence that any kind of retrenchment is monstrous. This possibility has become almost extinct.

In California, a state which has grown more rapidly than any other state in the Union, Governor Reagan has called for a cut in spending as well as new taxes to make up the deficit. The howl that has gone up because of his request for a cut in spending has been heard from coast to coast. We are told that it isn't good business, it blocks progress and shows the governor to be out of step with the times. But we aren't sure.

There is something to be said for a Governor who insists on putting into action a campaign promise, even if that promise was to cut expenses. And we aren't quite sure whether all the criticism of the Governor is the voice of the people of California, or for that matter, the thinking of the general public. We are generally bombarded by the writing of men who constitute a small "in" group and who mirror the thinking of that group. It is difficult to get into the thought of the people at large.

We think there is something courageous about a man who bucks the trend by insisting that along with higher taxes, there is another way to balance a budget and that by less spending. It might just be that that kind of approach will catch the fancy of millions of Americans who are forced to do that with their own budgets. There is a precedent in American life for such a realistic approach. And maybe it isn't really out of date.

#### Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Feb. 19  
God Years for the Lost  
Luke 15:11-24

By C. P. Dame

This lesson is from one of the best known chapters of the Bible — Luke 15. It contains three parables of the lost — some say four. One truth stands out in the chapter — God is deeply concerned about lost people.

I. The lost call for searching. Jesus had a purpose in telling about the lost coin, sheep and boy. The Lord was criticized for associating with publicans and sinners. The Pharisees said, "This man receiveth sinners and eateth with them." They thought that was wrong. In defense Jesus told the parables.

When is a thing lost? When its owner can't USE IT AND enjoy it because it is in the wrong place. The coin, the sheep and the boy were not in their proper places and were not fulfilling their mission, and hence lost. The sheep wandered away thoughtlessly, well some people are like that. The coin was lost through someone's carelessness and got out of circulation. The boy wanted freedom and left home.

The religious leaders paid no attention to the lost people of their times. Jesus did — and His attitude reflected God's attitude. The lost are worth seeking and when found there is joy. The joy of the shepherd, of the woman, and of the father suggest the joy there is in heaven when one sinner repents.

II. The lost can be restored again. "And He said, A certain man had two sons." The younger son was restless, discontented, and wanted to leave home and get out into the world. He demanded his share of his father's possessions which he would one day inherit — see Deuteronomy 21:16, 17. The father yielded, the son left, found the far country and lived it up for a time. He had money, was ready to spend it, won friends, who left him when his money was gone.

The unexpected happened — a famine hit the country. The young man who always had the best looked for a job and got one — feeding swine, a most degrading job for a Jew. His employer sent him and he went obediently — what about freedom? His desperate situation made him think about his former blessings and the folly of his course and made him resolve to go home and ask to become a hired servant — he acknowledged his sin, and started for home.

III. God warmly welcomes the lost. The father is the real hero in this story. When he saw his son a great way off he had compassion on him and ran to meet him and fell on his neck and kissed him. God is like the father in this parable. The father said to his servants, "Bring forth the best robe," the marks of the far country must be removed; "and put a ring on his hand," a sign of authority; "and shoes on his feet," slaves go barefoot, but sons wear shoes; "and bring hither the fatted calf and kill it; and let us eat, and be merry." Did the son deserve this? No. This parable teaches the fact of God's grace. Sinners need grace.

Consider what the prodigal got. He was given pardon for his wrongdoing, restoration to the family, dignity, recognition, luxuries and love, position and prestige. Everything the far country promises God gives in Jesus Christ. God in season and out of season welcomes wandering wayward sinners and fills their lives with that which empty hearts and lives need.

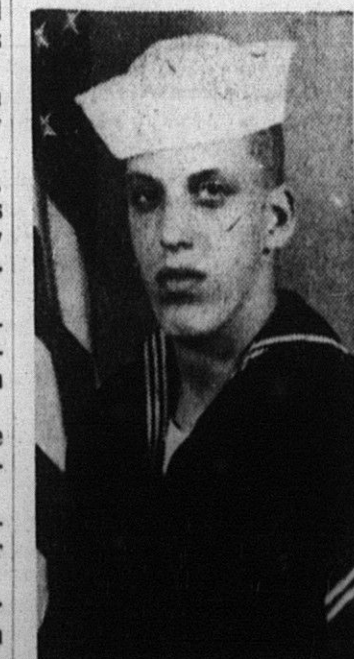

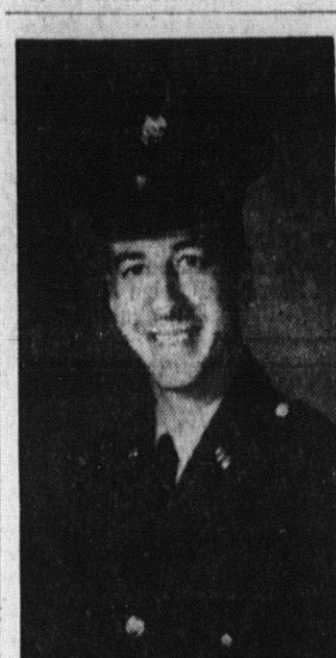

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## Six Youngsters Perish In Tenant Shack Blaze

SOUTH HAVEN — Six children died early Monday when a flash fire, believed to have started from an oil heater, swept through a tenant shack on a farm in Lee Township, Allegan County. The parents, Mr. and Mrs. Alzie Bice and another child escaped death.

The victims were identified as Brenda Stringer, 15, daughter of Mrs. Bice by a previous marriage and five of the Bice children, Randy, 10, Debra, 9, Connie, 8, Marsha, 7, and Steve, 3. Sharon Stringer, 14, also a child by Mrs. Bice's previous marriage was the only one to escape the flames which roared through a small shack in which the children were sleeping. She alerted the mother and father who were sleeping in another shack about 27 feet away.

Bice, 36, and his wife, Lucille,

34, and Sharon were taken to South Haven Hospital and treated for shock.

The victims were burned beyond recognition, Dr. J. D. Hayes, of Douglas, medical examiner, reported.

The scene of the multiple tragedy was on the Adkin brothers farm, about 7 miles east of South Haven. Bice was employed on the farm. By the time firemen from Lee Township, Pullman and other units had arrived after the alarm was sounded about 6 a.m. the wooden shack in which the children had been sleeping had been destroyed.

It was several hours later when crews from the Calvin Funeral Home and the Ebersson Funeral Home of South Haven were able to extricate the charred bodies from the smoldering ruins.

The bodies were in three beds whose posts were twisted metal and the mattresses were reduced virtually to ashes.

Tom Renner, South Haven Tribune managing editor who was at the scene, said, "They never knew what hit them."

A fireman said, "It was so far gone, we weren't going to put water on it until someone yelled there were children inside. Then it was too late," he added.

The Bice family moved to the area from Arkansas last October and Bice picked apples on the farm and orchard. Alvie Maynard, supervisor of fields for the Adkin brothers, said when the picking season was over Bice and the family were permitted to remain at the tenant shacks without rental charges.

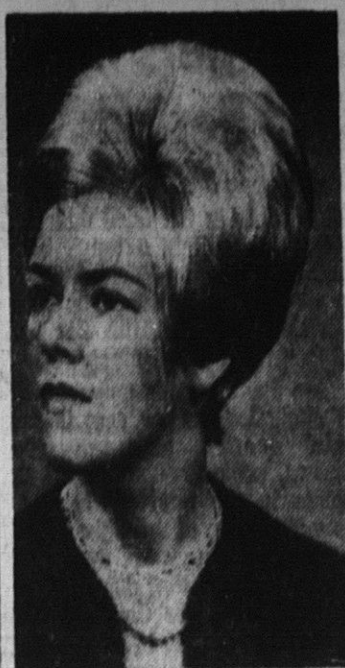

The fourth quarter saw foul difficulties for both teams. Holland center Bob Venhuizen left the game with 6:09 and East guard Chuck Butch committed his fifth foul with 4:30 left.

In the second half the Dutch hit for a blistering 73 per cent while the Pioneers had a poor 29 per cent. East had four of 16 for 25 per cent in the third period and 6 of 18 for 33 per cent in the fourth.

The teams were nearly matched from the free throw line with Holland tossing in 12 of 20 and East 15 of 20.

With scrappy playing and a slight height advantage, Holland controlled the boards throughout, grabbing 16 offensive rebounds to East's 14 and 33 defensive to East's 13.

East Grand Rapids forward, Sam Korrick, turned in his finest game of the season, pumping in 26 points to keep his team in contention for part of the game. Korrick scored 12 of his points in the first quarter.

Coach Don Piersma complimented the work of his top scorers, Shinabarger and forward Steve Jacobusse who contributed 18 points. "Substitute Bob Pete played a fine game," Piersma said.

He added, "It was a good win, but it was probably our poorest defensive effort of the year."

The win gives Holland a 9-3 record in Valley Coast Conference play and pushed the hapless Pioneers down to a 2-10 league record.

Holland will travel to Wyoming Friday to meet Godwin in another conference game.

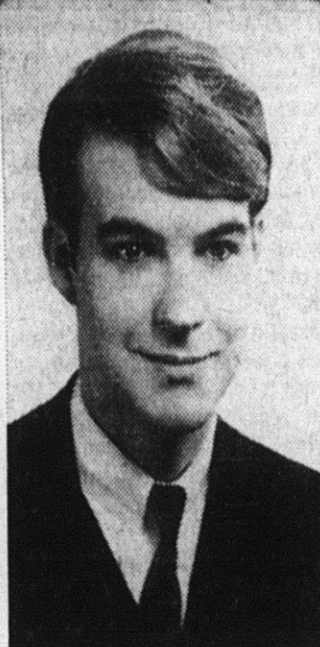

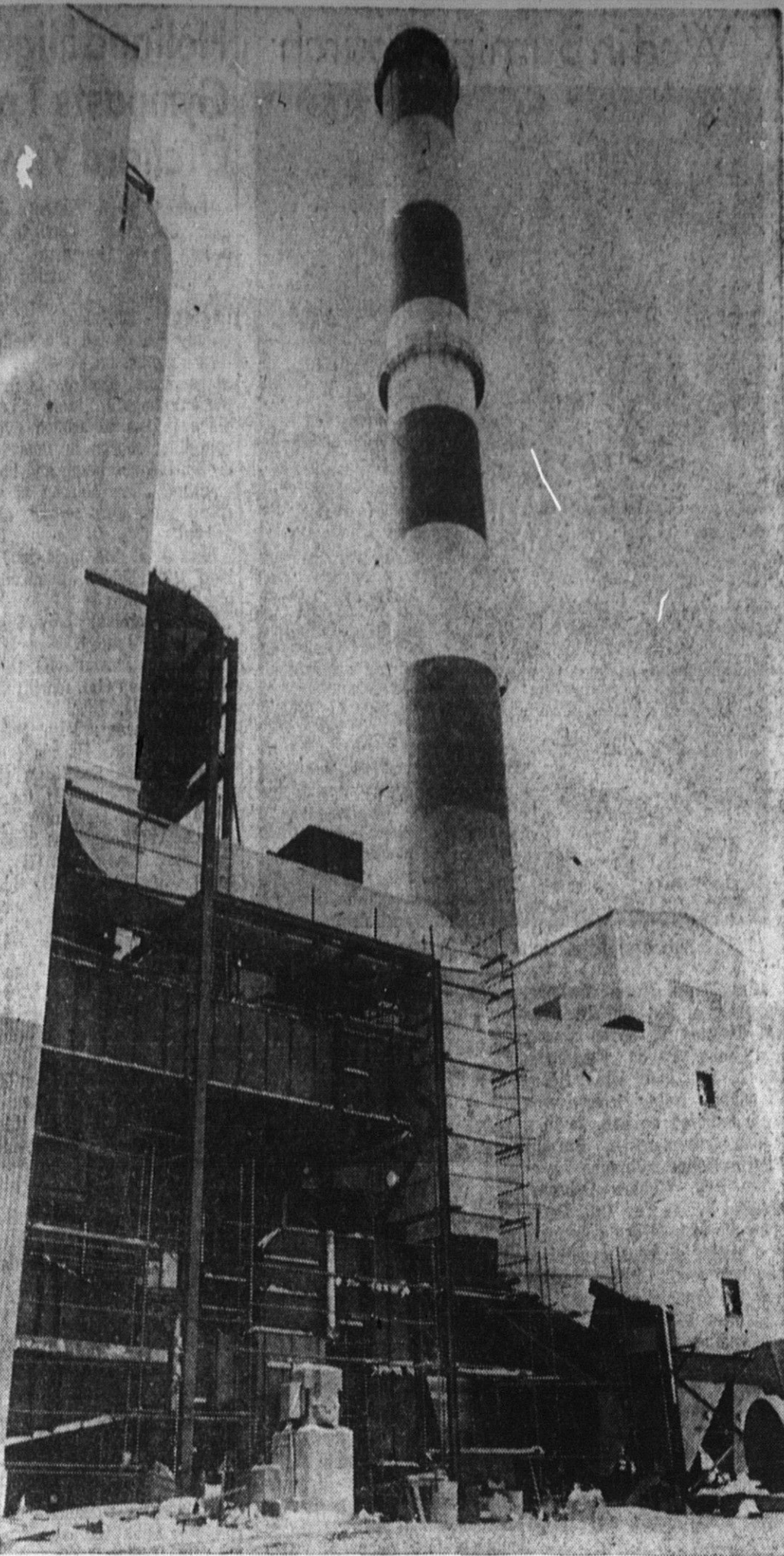

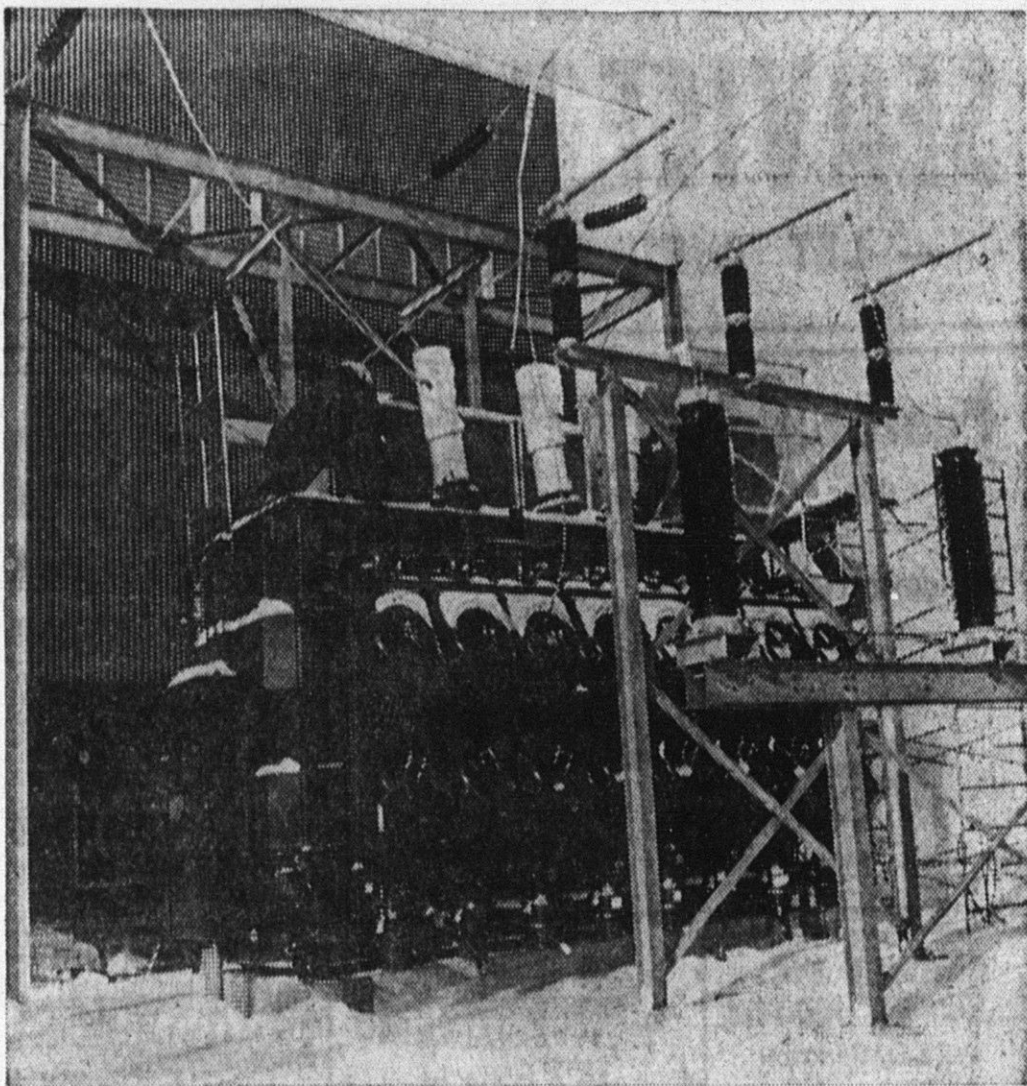

struction supervisor Tom Cook said that mostly vapors come from the stack, preventing air pollution.

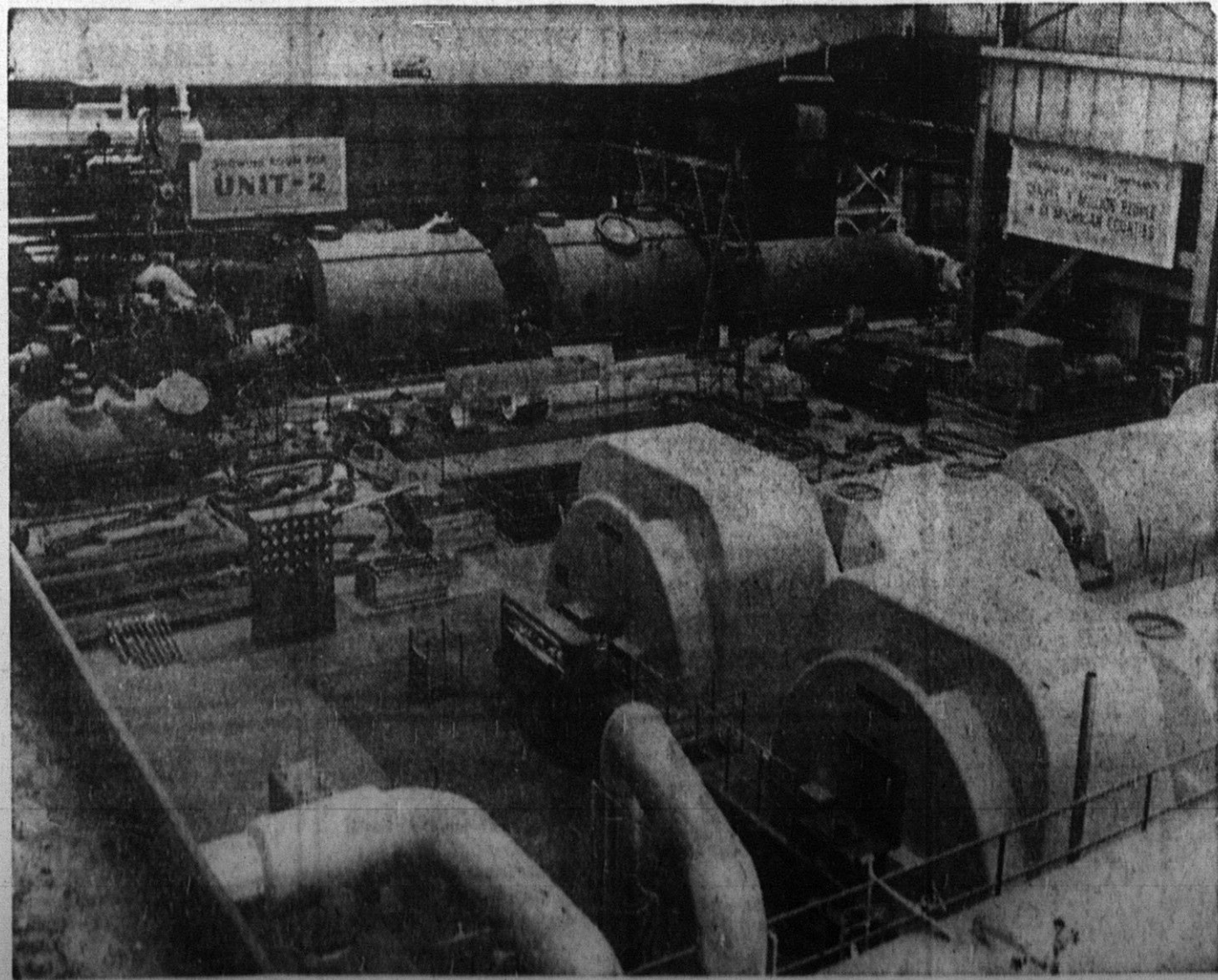

common system. The transformer boosts voltage to 138 kilovolts. The common system allows the electricity to be used anywhere in the state.

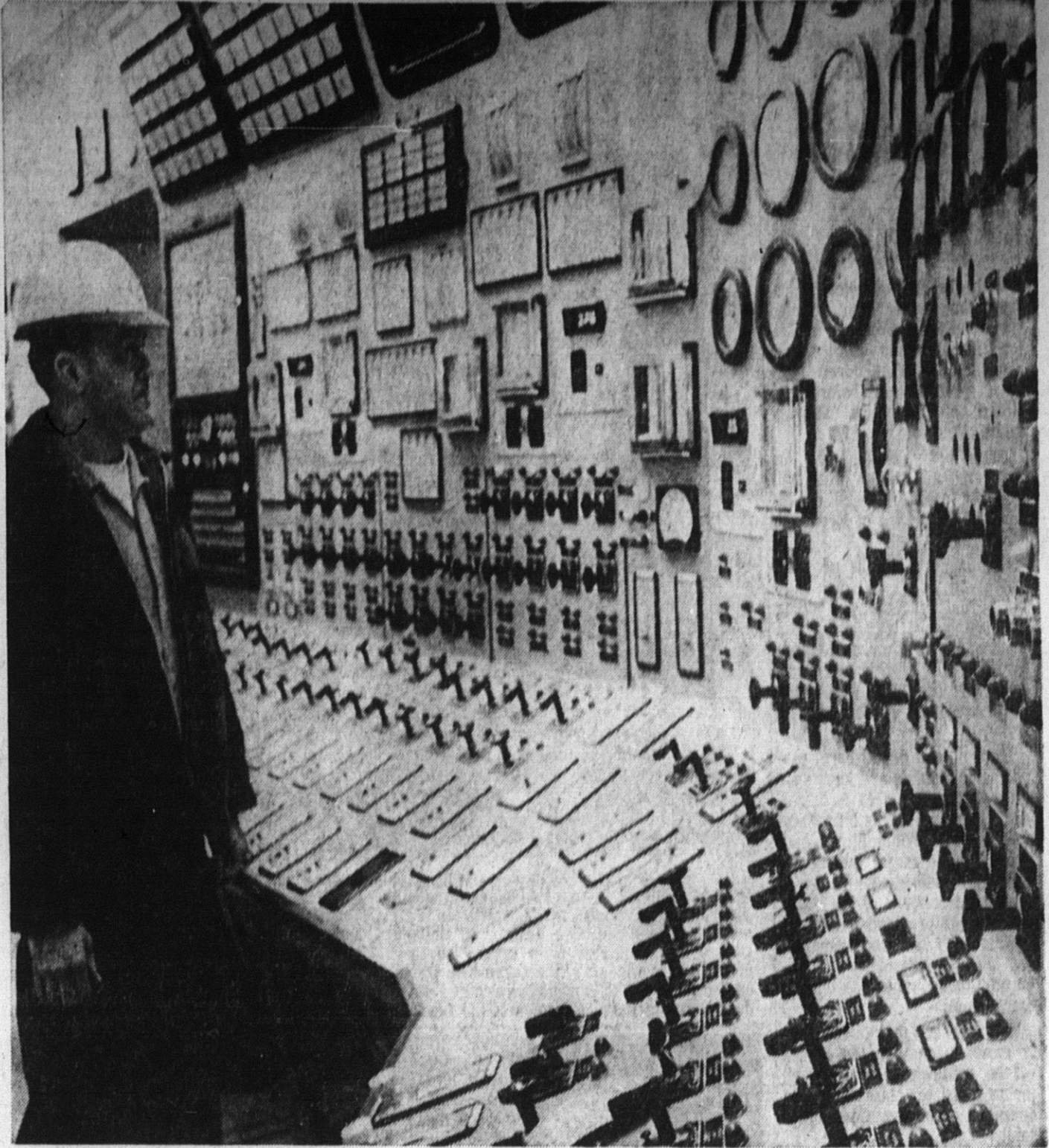

## Head Start Program Is Explained

With the aid of color slides, Ivan Compagner who directed the Head Start program in Holland last summer described the program for 30 children in a brief presentation before the Board of Education Monday night.

Plans next summer call for four sections of 15 pre-school children each, financed as before by the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Compagner said the program ran seven weeks and proved to be a real revelation in aiding children preparing for school. Most of the children came from the Lincoln - Washington areas and 28 of the 30 completed the full course, two of them moving away.

Medical and dental care, psychological testing and trips once a week to such places as farms, parks, the police and fire station, and Windmill Island, proved to be major adventures for the youngsters. Visits of Marty Hardenberg of the police department provided a friendly approach to law enforcement—not always previously experienced in the homes the children came from.

The teachers maintained fairly close liaison with the homes of the children and nearly all parents visited classes on one or more occasions, Compagner said.

In other business, the board approved a recommendation to hire two teachers. Bruce A. Zylstra who received an A.B. degree from Western Michigan University in 1966, will teach junior high citizenship and John V. Pastoor, a 1967 graduate of Calvin College, will teach high school English.

Howard Kammeraad of Architects Kammeraad and Stroop gave a progress report on new construction at the three elementary schools and community swimming pool.

At Van Raalte school, acoustical tile ceilings are complete and light fixtures have been installed. Cabinets are in place including coat racks in hall. Mirrors are installed in toilet rooms and chalk boards are being installed in classrooms. Ceramic tile walls in corridors are about 90 per cent complete and vinyl asbestos tile flooring in classrooms is just beginning. Partitions are completed in toilet rooms and wall hung water closets are being installed.

At Longfellow school, acoustical tile ceiling gridwork is in place and ceilings are partially installed. Light fixtures are being installed. Ceramic tile work in corridor is delayed pending delivery of tile. Terrazzo floors require final grinding and cleaning. Cabinets have been installed in classrooms, ceramic tile walls in toilet rooms and ceilings have been plastered.

At Maplewood school, boilers are being tested after which the building will be heated. Terrazzo floor work will begin this week and slate asbestos shingles are two-thirds complete on mansard around gym. Exterior glazing is substantially complete and pre-cast concrete facing around the building is about 60 per cent complete.

At the swimming pool, underground mechanical and electrical work is progressing in the lobby and dressing room area. Plumbing fittings for diving hopper walls proved defective and were returned to the manufacturer. Workmen have been hampered by severe weather, and materials are being collected at the job.

Supt. Donald L. Ihrman announced an offer of the Holland Garden Club to provide tuition for sending Buildings and Grounds Supt. Ed Prins to a landscaping design and study course March 28-30. He also announced a gift of \$635 from the Junior Welfare League for a safety project at the swimming pool.

Ihrman also announced a library grant amounting to \$7,837.12, and a school board and administration one-day meeting Feb. 27 at Kellogg Center in East Lansing to discuss federal aid, vocational training, negotiations, fiscal reform and large city problems.

The board acknowledged efforts of Junior high students through the school senate in raising \$500 through sock dances, bake sales and other projects for Assistant Principal William Noyd who underwent open heart surgery some weeks ago.

Board President James O. Lamb presided and gave the invocation. All members were present except John Keuning.

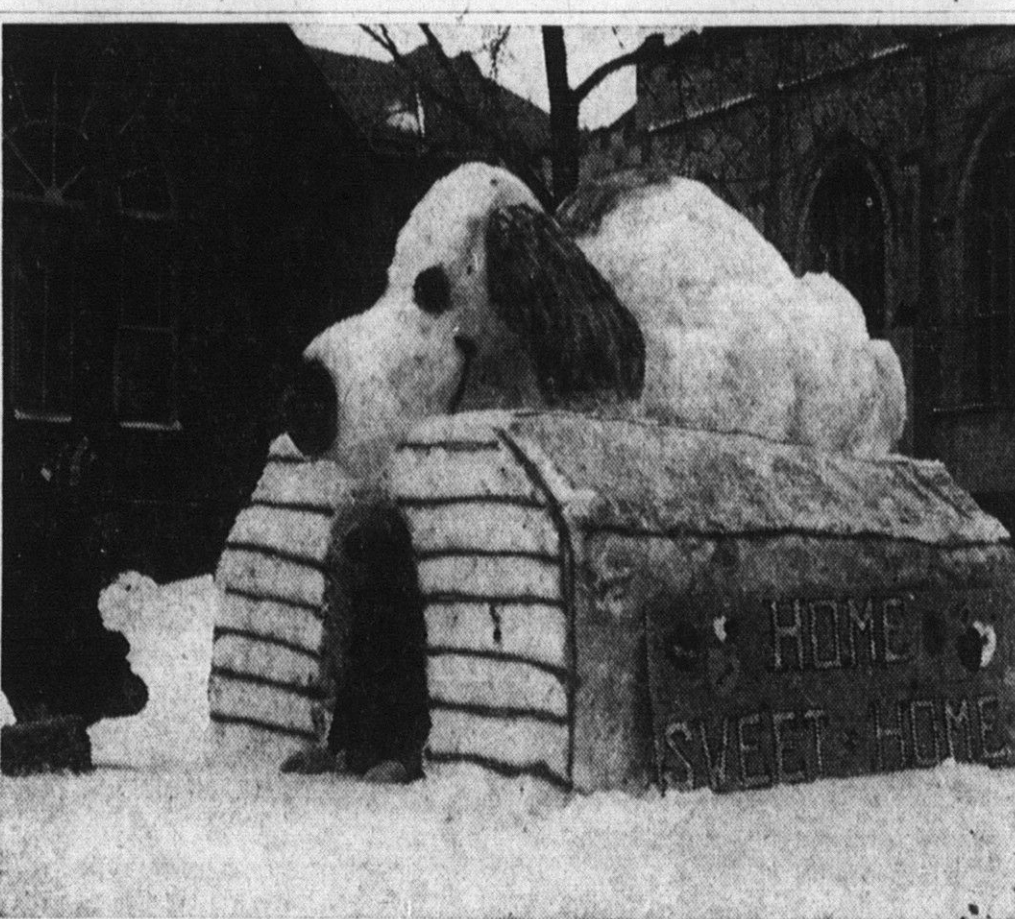

## Hope to Play Kalamazoo For 1st Spot

ALMA — Hope College's basketball team escaped from an ambush here Saturday night, to defeat Alma, 79-78.

Hope led the entire game in defeating Alma, but had to stall the final four minutes to survive an upset attempt by the red-hot shooting of the Scots' Gordon Hetrick and his teammates.

Hetrick, a 6' junior, was amazing in the second half as he zeroed in on jump shots from all over the court, some as far out as 30 feet. He finished with 32 points—20 of them in the second half.

Hope's Floyd Brady, Jim Klein and Carl Walters were all hot in the first half as they paced the Flying Dutchmen to a 51-40 margin at the intermission. Brady had 19 points, Klein 12 and Walters 10 in the first half.

Hope's shooting cooled off against Alma's zone defense in the second half, but the Flying Dutchmen were able to maintain the 11-point lead at 14:28 of the second half. The score was then 59-48. The two teams traded baskets for about four minutes, and Hope led 67-57 at 10:31 of the half.

The Scots began to eat away at the lead. Gary Rypma sank a field goal at 5:17 of the period to put Hope ahead 76-71. But Hetrick came back with a three point play at the five-minute mark and notched a free throw at 4:05 to make the score 76-75 in Hope's favor.

The visitors then went into a stall hoping to draw Alma out of its zone defense. The Scots stayed with their zone.

Carl Walters was fouled at 3:05 of the period, and he notched a free throw to give Hope a two-point edge.

Alma's John Fuzak was fouled while shooting at the 2:46 mark, but the freshman guard was only able to hit one of two free throws, and Hope still had a one-point edge.

The Scots blew another chance to tie the score or go ahead when Rick Lorenz, another freshman, missed the first shot of a one-and-one situation at 1:20.

Hope continued to stall, and Brady was fouled at 1:19. He converted. Carl Walters came back with another free throw at :15 to put Hope ahead by three points.

Hetrick gunned in a long jump shot seconds before the buzzer to bring the Scots within one point.

Hope, which used a man-to-man defense most of the second half, went into a zone at 2:46 of the half. De Vette said the zone kept Hetrick from getting the shots, and the rest of the Scots couldn't hit in the closing minutes. De Vette said he had hoped to go into the zone with a bigger lead, but finally decided to use it to stop Hetrick from getting good shots.

The Scots had three more baskets than their visitors, but Hope outscored Alma 21-14 from the free throw line to win the game.

The Flying Dutchmen made 18 of 36 attempts from the floor for 50 per cent in the first half, but came through with only 11 of 33 in the second half for 33 per cent. Brady led Hope's scoring with 26. Walters had 18 and Klein 14.

Alma meshed 32 of 62 shots from the floor for 52 per cent. They hit an identical 16 of 31 in each half. Besides Hetrick's 32 points, Fuzak had 15 and Bill Simmons 10 for the Scots.
