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Vande Vusse Is Defeated In Primary

6th Ward Nominates Two Smiths; At-Large Race Led by Dyk

One councilman was defeated and another nominated in the city primary Monday which attracted 2,500 votes, 123 votes more than the 2,377 cast in the 1964 primary. The vote cast Monday was 22 per cent of the total registered vote of 11,267. Councilman Eugene Vande Vusse was defeated in the fourth ward, running third in the race among four candidates. Nominates to be carried over to the April 3 ballot are Gerrit Vanden Bos who polled 267 votes and Robert J. Dykstra who received 192 votes. Vande Vusse received 147 votes and Gordon Streur 117 votes.

In the sixth ward, two Smiths emerged as forerunners. Jacob W. (Jack) Smith received 191 votes, and Richard W. Smith, incumbent, polled 172 votes. Edward J. Ribbens polled 129 votes.

For councilman-at-large, Alvin H. Dyk led with 1,135 votes and Herbert L. Vander Ploeg second with 703 votes. Louis Hallacy received 636 votes. Dyk and Vander Ploeg will be carried over to the April 3 ballot. The winner will succeed John Van Eerden who did not seek reelection.

It was a long day for election boards at the city's 14 precincts where voting was slow. All returns were phoned to the city clerk's office within 15 minutes after the polls closed. The first precinct returning election records and supplies was the Christian High group, reporting at 8:10 p.m.

With the primary out of the way, the April 13 ballot now shapes up as follows:

Mayor—Nelson Bosman and Alden J. Stoner.

Councilman-at-large — Alvin H. Dyk and Herbert Vander Ploeg.

Councilman, 2nd ward — L. W. (Bill) Lamb Jr., and Gerald Mannes.

Councilman, 4th ward — Robert J. Dykstra and Gerrit Vanden Bos.

Councilman, 6th ward—Jacob W. (Jack) Smith and Richard W. Smith.

Voters also will face three proposals for charter revision at the April 3 election. One would boost salaries of council and mayor, another would change the deadline for filing petitions for city officers, and the third would boost membership of the hospital board from five to seven.

The mayor's term runs two years. All councilmen terms are four years.

See if you don't get the urge to laugh or end up biting your tongue to hold your composure because of the crazy hairstyles, uncanny clothing combinations and heels too high on the would-be sweet, youthful teenager.

And it doesn't stop there. How about the incorrect posture accompanied by the tons of make-up that appear to be slapped on? Make a count of the really "cool" young teens who speak with a conversational ease and have a natural poise and manners.

I realize we can't all appear as graceful as Princess Grace or Mrs. Kennedy, and heaven knows I can't stand a person who is gushingly, irritatingly sweet. But the opposite shouldn't be a loudmouth. After all, one can learn how to tone it down (if one wants to).

I realize, too, we can't all wear the same A-line style dress, but I see no reason for sloppy clothes or wierd combinations because it takes too much time to care for them properly or it's the latest fad. All one has to do is find what suits and stick to it.

course, I wish they would offer one for "older" people. It includes not only beauty and fashion but also social graces, conversational ease, poise, culture and etiquette, even how to set the table properly and what to do on a date.

Patricia Hender of Holland, who has taught the course in Ohio and Illinois explains the program consists of 10 classes designed to build upon each other with advancing subject knowledge and experience. She said small groups ensure personal attention and such aspects of charm as voice culture and conversational ease, balanced diet and a good program of exercise and rest and careful and discriminating use of make-up are included in the curriculum.

A regional study by Dr. William C. Byham, associate research director for the National Society for the Prevention of Juvenile Delinquency, indicated that students in the 13-17 age groups, following the completion of a similar course, evidenced the following:

"The girls felt they were more popular with their teachers, possibly because of more active participation in class discussion. "When they compared themselves with other girls, they see themselves as prettier than they were at the beginning of the course, while, at the same time, the value they place on the importance of prettiness-to-success went down. Significantly, the importance to success of personality, respect for family and good school work showed an increase at the conclusion of the course."

Well, you can take it from me, the course begins Monday, March 6 in Stoketee's of Holland with classes for girls ages 10 to 13 from 3:45 to 5:15 p.m. and the classes for girls age 14 to 17 from 5:30 to 7 and from 7:15 to 8:45 p.m.

Fruitport Marine Killed In Vietnam

FRUITPORT—Hospital Corpsman Bruce S. LaPorte, 19-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Steve LaPorte, 3661 Pontaluna Rd., Fruitport, was fatally wounded by enemy rifle fire Monday afternoon while acting as medic on a Marine Patrol in South Vietnam, his parents were informed today.

Surviving are the parents; a sister, Ann; a brother, Dennis; a grandmother, Mrs. Dorla Phillips of Flint, and the grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Cyril LaPorte of Wisconsin.

The body is expected to arrive in Grand Haven accompanied by an honor guard in about 10 days and will be taken to Kammeraad funeral home in Spring Lake.

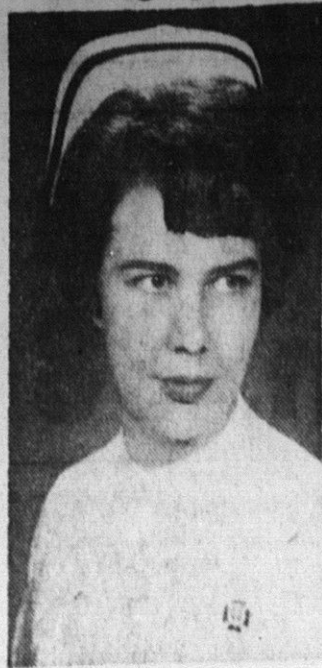

Old License Plates Okay On City Cars

Licenses on tax exempt vehicles operated by city or schools are permanent plates and will continue the 1966 colors of blue on buff, the city clerk's office pointed out. This program was adopted permanently in 1966.

Consequently, if a police car next month halts a car bearing 1966 license cannot assume police are in error. All such licenses carry the prefix "X". There are no dates on the plates.

Eligible for exemption are city, county and state governmental agencies and schools. This includes equipment for the street department but excludes fire trucks, which need no licenses.

Such licensing costs the city 50 cents per vehicle plus \$1 for the uninsured driver's fund.

Netherlands Choir Shows Sterling Musicianship

Fine choral singing, an integral part of Dutch national art, was demonstrated in Civic Center Thursday night by The Netherlands Chamber Choir of Amsterdam, as part of the Holland Community Concert series.

Conducted by Felix de Nobel, the 18-member choir resembled a chamber orchestra in its precision of choral movement, expressing strong yet disciplined feeling in a program geared mainly to selections of the 16th and 17th centuries.

The program opened with the Dutch national anthem Wilhelmus with many of the audience enthusiastically joining in.

The first grouping included religious works based on masses and Gregorian chants, demonstrating beauty of tone and fine choral intonation. Next came a group of Dutch polyphonic songs of the mid-16th century originally designed to be sung in the family circle ranging from love songs to drinking songs that could be rather ribald and outspoken, reflections of life as lived by cultured people of the time.

Substituting freely, the choir sang four Dutch songs including the familiar Hymn of Thanksgiving, and moved into two Bruckner selections, one sung in four parts and the other in seven parts, both beautiful

examples of Bruckner's Wagnerian style.

A contemporary grouping was Benjamin Britten's five flower songs, sung in English with striking rhythms and harmonies.

The choir was most generous in encores of five folk songs from various places in The Netherlands, ending with a Frisian dancing tune which is in Holland's own klompen dancing music.

The program was presented with full house lights on throughout the evening. This is desirable for performers, who like to see their audience but a trifle distracting to the audience accustomed to dim lights.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Feb. 26
Faithful in Little and in Much
Luke 16:10-15; Luke 17:5-10
By C. P. Dame

A pastor made the observation that "the rarest virtue is faithfulness, whereas it should be the most usual because everybody can be faithful." But unfortunately not every one is. Jesus asks for faithful service. I. Some people are faithful to their own interests. The unjust steward about whom Jesus told a parable looked out for number one. He was the steward of a rich man. He was accused of wasting his goods. He faced a crisis and he schemed out of it. He called his master's debtors and lowered their debts with the aim of getting favors from them. The master who heard of the scheme praised him for his foresight. Jesus did not tell this parable to commend wrongdoing. All who took part in this scheme were rascals.

Jesus drew a lesson from this shrewd operator, which he gives in the words, "for the sons of this age are for their own generation wiser than the sons of light." If Christians were as eager about spiritual matters as the worldly are about their aims and ambitions they would be better Christians. Often sinners are more zealous than saints. The have more foresight.

II. Jesus praises faithfulness. "He that is faithful in that which is least is faithful also in much." The person who shows care for the small things of life will be fit to manage the bigger things. The world calls money all-important - Jesus calls it "the unrighteous mammon."

The word "mammon" was an Aramaic word for property. Jesus calls it unrighteous because it is often used unrighteously and gotten unrighteously. It can also be used to promote the eternal world. The things of eternity are far superior to the things of time, therefore they deserve our best. It is also true that if we are not faithful to the earthly things we can't expect to share the heavenly.

"No servant can serve two masters . . . Ye cannot serve God and mammon" said Jesus. We cannot divide loyalty. We must show our loyalty to God in money matters. We can fix our minds and hearts upon money, we can also focus our minds and hearts upon God. It is however either the one or the other. The Pharisees who were lovers of money scoffed at Jesus, literally turned up their noses at him when he spoke of money. In those days many people thought that wealth was a sign of God's approval.

III. Faith is much needed. One day when Jesus talked about the cost of discipleship the apostles asked Jesus, "Increase our faith." The request came from a sense of need. We do all well to ask the Lord to increase our faith so that we may do more for missions, evangelism and education. Little giving shows little faith. The last four verses of the lesson text tell about a slave who works all day in the field and upon coming home waits on his master and serves him before waiting on himself. Because he is a slave he gets no praise. Jesus did not justify this but drew a lesson from it. No matter how much we do we are still unprofitable servants. We remain in debt to God. No one ever has done his duty to God. Love constrains us to do our duty, plus. Let's daily be faithful in small and large things.

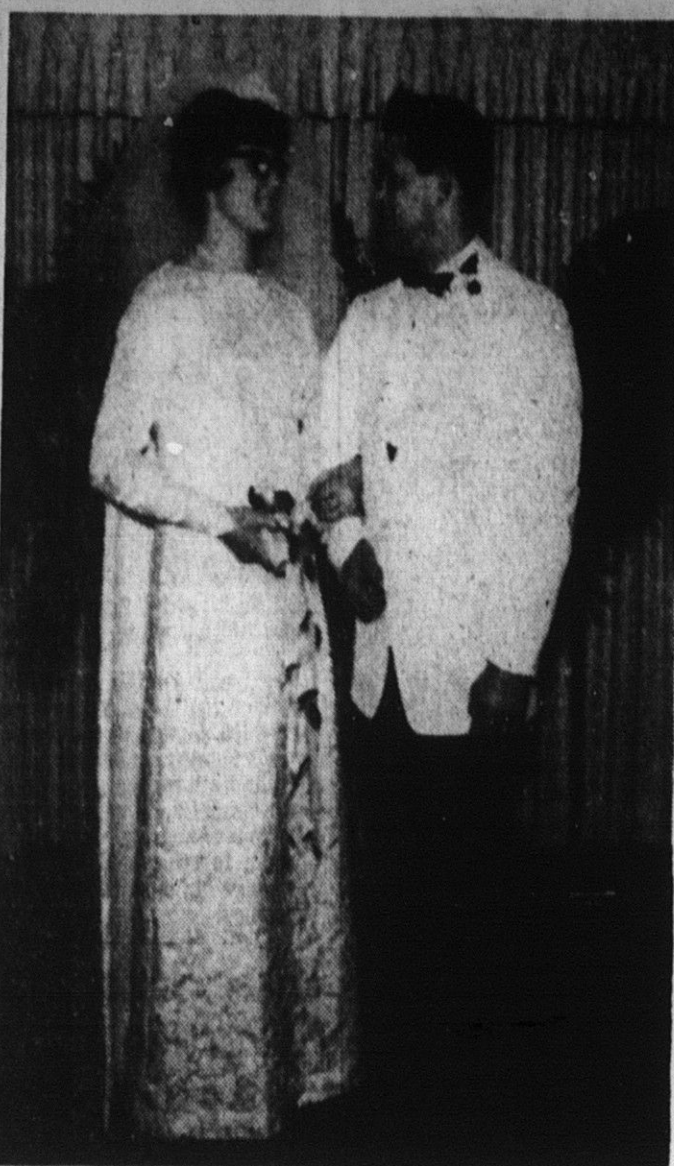

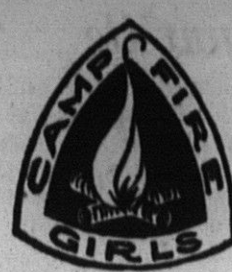

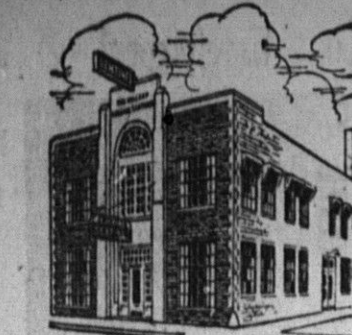

Windmill To Have New Food Service

By a vote of 6 to 3, City Council Wednesday night approved a five-year contract with Alvin D. Bos Co. for food service at Windmill Island.

The contract provides that Bos will erect a building of Dutch design 24 by 50 feet to be used for selling refreshments, film, post cards and other items presently sold in the posthouse. The building would be given to the city with the stipulation that the cost of the building is to be reimbursed to the company at the rate of 75 per cent of the commissions at the beginning of the 1967 season.

The company will pay a commission of 15 per cent less the 4 per cent sales tax on the first \$5,000 of each season, and 20 per cent less 4 per cent for amounts over \$5,000.

In presenting the proposal, City Manager Herb Holt said it had been studied and approved by the Windmill committee.

Opposing the program were Councilmen Bertal Slagh, Donald D. Oosterbaan and Richard W. Smith. Oosterbaan reiterated a former objection that he was opposed to the proposal because of the private enterprise factor and he preferred that the city erect such a building and lease it.

Plans call for converting the posthouse stable area, presently used as a food concession, into a small theatre for the showing of the Windmill Island documentary film. This film also is available from Herrick Public Library.

Communications from the post office department and from Cong. Edward Hutchinson regarding the discontinuance of railway post office service on trains between Grand Rapids and Chicago were filed.

A letter from William H. Bos, 770 Southgate, thanking street maintenance personnel for prompt and efficient service in snow removal and maintenance of streets was filed with a copy to be sent to the street department.

Rural Mail Carrier Works To Bring Bluebirds Back

Happiness is seeing a bluebird.

There are going to be a lot more happy people in the Holland area this year, largely through the efforts of Bernard Smolen, 324 Marquette Ave., a rural mail carrier who for the past year has been waging a one-man fight to bring bluebirds back to Western Michigan and particularly the Holland area.

Smolen became concerned a little more than a year ago over the disappearance of the Eastern Bluebird from this area since 1945. Since lack of nesting places is blamed for virtual extinction of the gaily colored songbird since the World War II years, Smolen has been building and erecting suitable houses to attract the birds back to the area.

Last winter Smolen built 32 bluebird houses and placed them at different points along his rural mail route. He said approximately 50 per cent of the houses were occupied by bluebirds, and many people, like Smolen's wife who had never seen a bluebird, were seeing them for the first time.

This year Smolen is building an additional 30 houses which he plans to place at suitable points along his mail route.

Smolen, who has always been interested in wildlife and who enjoys reading and studying about animal habits, became interested in the plight of the Eastern Bluebird through his reading.

The birds have reached a point of about 85 per cent extinction since 1945, he said. He blamed the use of steel fence posts since World War II as being largely responsible for depriving the birds of nesting places. Hollow wooden fence posts provided the birds with ideal nesting places, Smolen said, and replacing them with steel posts has contributed to the decline of the bluebird population by depriving the birds of nesting places.

Smolen places his bird houses on fence posts or other similar devices about four to five feet above the ground, and preferably in quite open country.

Bluebirds aren't particularly fond of trees, Smolen said, so he avoids putting the houses on tree trunks. The birdhouses are placed about a half-mile apart to allow each bird ample feeding range.

The houses should be erected by early March, Smolen said, because bluebirds generally return to this area by the middle of March.

The birds will always return

to their former nesting sites unless they are driven away by molesters, so Smolen is assured that he will have at least as many bluebirds on his mail route as he had last year. And the 30 new houses he is putting up should attract even more.

Smolen's bluebird houses are relatively simple box-like structures about 4 inches square and 11 inches deep. A hole 1 1/2 inches in diameter is bored about 1 1/2 inches from the top of the front of the house.

The bluebird house does not have a roost and is built so it can be opened easily either from the top or bottom. This permits easy seasonal cleaning.

The houses are cleaned each year, usually in October, to rid them of old nests and remove the likelihood of attracting parasites.

Bluebirds, besides being colorful additions to anyone's back yard, are of great value to farmers, Smolen said. They are great bug catchers and live strictly on insects.

Smolen has appealed to postal patrons on his route to help bring bluebirds back to the area. He has left notes asking them if they would allow him to erect birdhouses on their property.

Patrons are usually more than willing to help him and in many cases want to know how to build the birdhouses and the correct way to place them so they can join Smolen in attracting the birds.

Smolen agrees that his battle to get bluebirds back to this area has been a lot of work. But his work has been rewarding.

An average of one young bluebird per birdhouse occupied lives to maturity, and Smolen is doing his best to increase those odds.

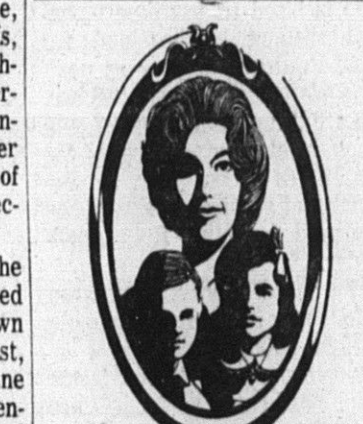

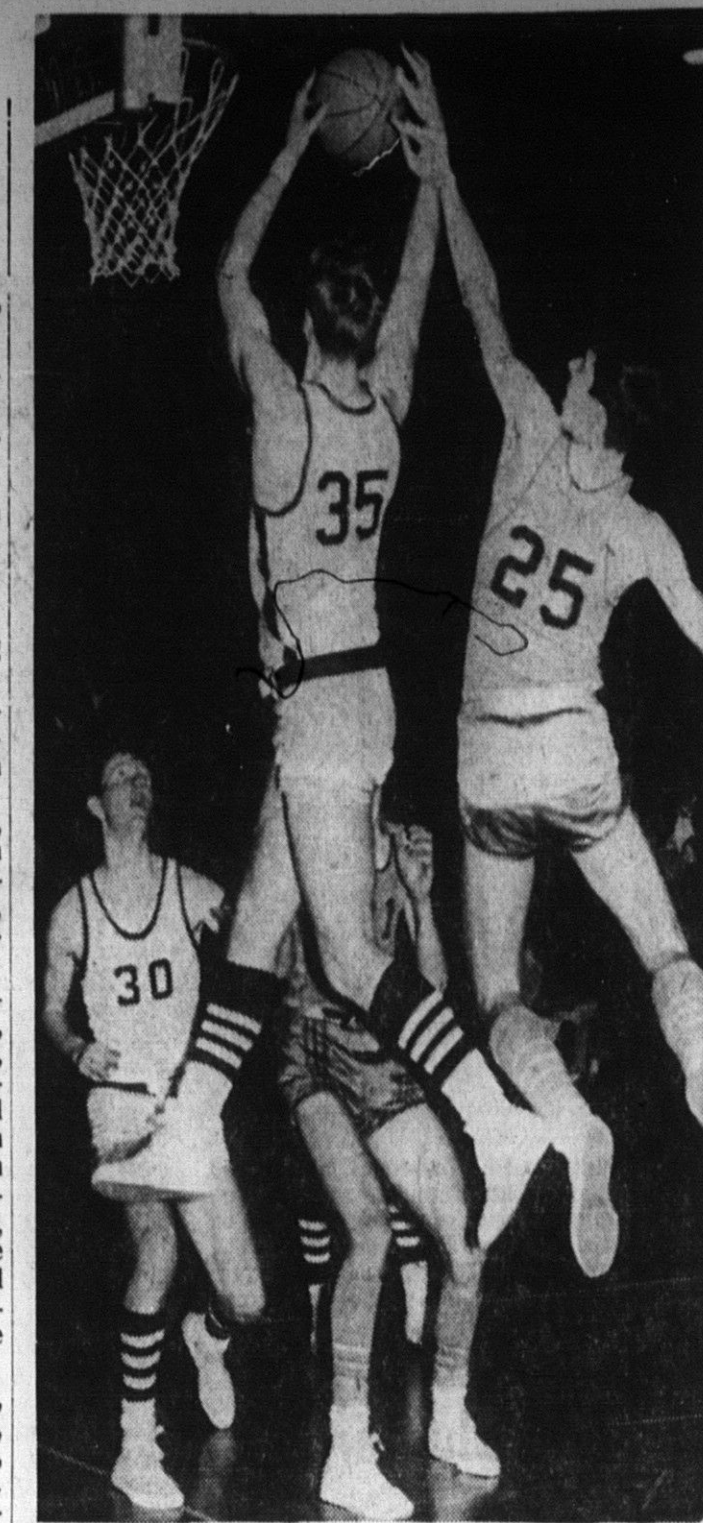

New Radio System Set For Allegan

ALLEGAN — Allegan County Sheriff Robert Whitcomb this week announced the planned installation of a new mobile 2-way radio system to provide improved police communication between all city and county mobile units and base stations.

Currently, dispatching for several Allegan County communities is handled by the sheriff's radio dispatcher, a policy that will not be affected under the planned change except to improve communication between all units.

It is planned to install a more powerful repeater system enabling mobile units to dispatch from any location in the county. A new frequency tower and transmitting equipment will be included in the changeover, Whitcomb said. Under the present system a signal cannot effectively reach patrols in outlying areas where the frequency is often crowded by many out-of-state police broadcasts.

Whitcomb said the new ambulance service, recently established in the county but not a part of the sheriff's department, will also be dispatched from the sheriff's office on a 2-way system entirely separate from the county and city police, assigned by the Federal Communications Commission.

Trials in 11 different locations in the state by Michigan State University have pinpointed the top producing varieties for each area.

Information was released this week on the 252 different hybrids tested by the Department of Crop Science of MSU. The publication, "Corn Hybrids Compared for 1967" (Extension Bulletin 431), is now available at our office on the corner of US-31 and James St. in Holland. High performance ratings for the past three years are given. The highest yielding corn hybrids in the 1966 Michigan Corn Performance Trials produced 26 bushels more per acre than the average and 52 bushels more than the lowest yielding varieties.

The driest hybrids at harvest contained 7 per cent less moisture than the average and 13 per cent less moisture than the wettest hybrids tested. It showed that it was not necessary to grow a late-maturing hybrid to obtain high yields. The best early-maturing hybrids will yield as much or more corn than late-maturing hybrids. Planting early-maturing hybrids is one form of frost protection. Earlier harvest of corn, when weather is more favorable and harvest losses are lower, is another advantage in favor of early hybrids.

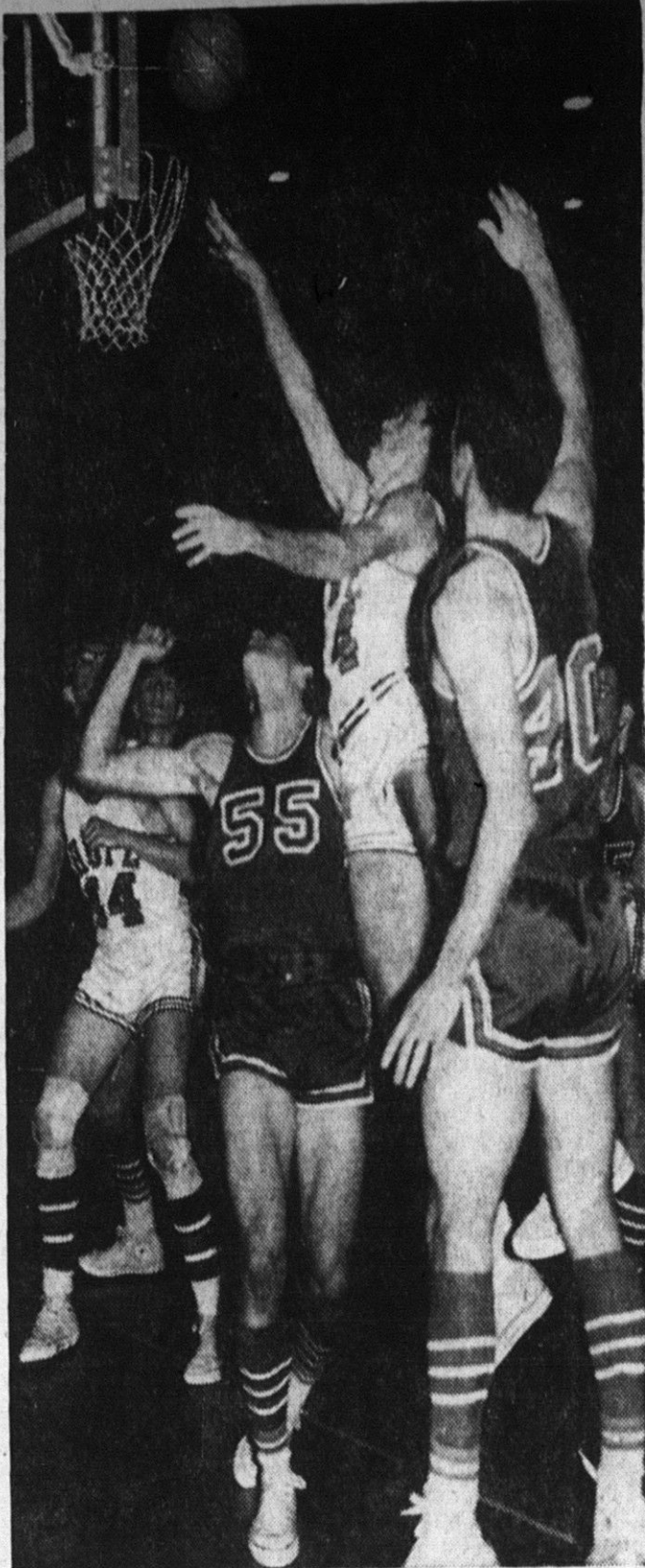
