## Local Man Is Wounded In Vietnam

Spec. 4 Roger L. Wolters, 22, was wounded in action in Vietnam Monday, Feb. 22, according to word received late Wednesday by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Steven H. Wolters, of 483 Graatschap Rd.

According to the telegram, Specialist Wolters was slightly wounded by small arms fire while on a military mission when a hostile force was encountered. He was wounded while attempting to aid another wounded individual, and received a fractured right leg, both the tibia and fibula. He was treated and is hospitalized in Vietnam.

Wolters attended public schools and is a graduate of Holland High School. He entered the army Feb. 18, 1970, and left for Vietnam last July. His mailing address is Hospital Mail Section, APO San Francisco 96347.

## Holland Cotton Products Sales And Profits Up

An increase in sales and profits for combined operations of the Louisville Bedding Co. and Holland Cotton Products for the first quarter of the company's year (fiscal year starts in October) was reported today by Bernard Arenshorst, president of Holland Cotton Products. The local company is a wholly owned subsidiary of Louisville Bedding.

Net sales for the quarter totaled \$4,554,000 and the net operating profit \$173,000. This is a 10 per cent increase in net sales and a 13.1 per cent increase in net earnings over the same quarter last year.

With one month gone in the second fiscal quarter, incoming orders are running 13.8 per cent ahead of the same period last year, and it appears economic conditions in the home furnishings industry should improve this year. This coupled with the fact that the company is paying lower interest rates on short term borrowings, should be a contributing factor to increased profits, according to J.R. Hartsock, chairman of the board, and H.C. Forrester, president.

## Dr. Boelens Uninjured In Mississippi Tornado

Dr. Peter Boelens, founder of the Christian Reformed Church medical evangelism program in Mississippi, escaped injuries while in the path of a tornado that swept the state.

The medical missionary told friends in Holland this morning that a trailer he was preparing to move to a site near Vicksburg, Miss., provided by a plantation owner was completely destroyed in the twister. The plantation also was leveled and a grandson and daughter-in-law of the plantation owner are missing.

Dr. Boelens was in Holland in January addressing a group of local physicians and dentists.

## Sentence Student In Dormitory Fire

Daniel C. Jacquish, 18, a Hope College freshman from Iliou, N.Y., Tuesday pleaded guilty in Holland district court to a reduced charge of willful and malicious setting of a fire and was sentenced to 30 days in jail.

Jaquish was given credit for 12 days spent in jail. It was agreed he would leave the city and the state.

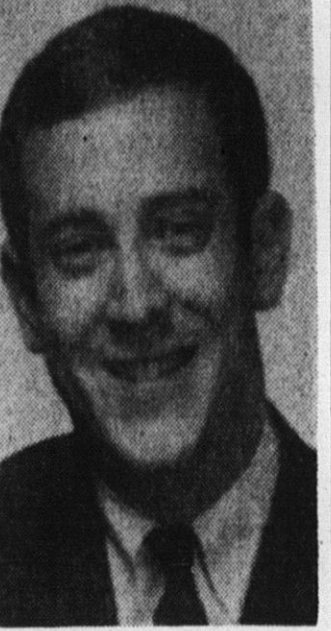
## Computers Subject For Early Birds

## Site Cost Authorized By Board

GRAND HAVEN — The Ottawa Area Intermediate Board of Education has authorized the payment of \$27,400 for 50 acres of land to be used as the site for the trainable center for intermediate district students. The school attorney has indicated a clear title on the land which is centrally located in the county.

The board expressed grave concern over financial cuts in school support from the state and the possible effects on special education.

The State Health department is indicated definite optimism over a possible \$75,000 federal grant for the trainable center. Hopefully, bids will be taken in late May or early June with construction to start shortly thereafter.

The board has scheduled a meeting Monday, April 26, with representatives of all local boards to discuss the question of a vocational-technical center.

The intermediate area budget of \$168,731 was approved at a hearing attended by representatives of local district some weeks ago.

## \$15,000 Judgment Granted in Suit

GRAND HAVEN — The estate of Leonard Mastenbrook of Kalamazoo, who died of injuries resulting from a traffic accident on US-31 near Holland April 11, 1970, was awarded judgement of \$15,000 in Ottawa Circuit Court Monday.

Grace Mastenbrook, executrix for the estate, had filed a damage suit July 16, 1970, seeking \$100,000. Mastenbrook died April 13 from injuries received in the accident, on US-31 at Beeline rd. in Holland Township.

Defendants in the case were Marvin and Dorothy Nienhuis of Holland. Mrs. Nienhuis was the driver of a 1969 car which collided with a truck in which Mastenbrook was a passenger.

KALAMAZOO — The Hornets of Kalamazoo College popped the Hope College junior varsity basketball teams four - game winning streak here Wednesday night by taking a slim 67-65 victory in overtime.

The Hornets, who got the tip in the overtime held onto the ball until 30 seconds were left and after finally taking a shot and missing, the Hornets grabbed the rebound and called time out.

Guard Pat Cunningham was the hero for the Hornets as he let loose with a 25-footer with one second to play and when the ball actually went through the hoop, time had already expired.

Jack Klunder of Hope, who tallied 16 markers sent the game into overtime by dropping in a fielder with six seconds to play. However, it all turned out for naught, as the Dutchmen never got possession of the ball in the overtime session.

Mike Zylstra led the Dutchmen with 17 counters while Tim Graham chipped in with 16 points. Creighton Baldwin had 19 points for the winners.

Hope ended the season with a 8-7 mark and Coach Van Wieren stated, "I'm sure proud of the way these boys have improved this season and I'm looking forward to next year."

## Hornets Tie Dutchmen For Third Place

KALAMAZOO — Kalamazoo College jumped out to a commanding 31-15 bulge in the first half here Wednesday evening and held off a furious Hope College rally in the final 20 minutes to take a 62-59 MIAA basketball decision in Tredway gym.

The 59 points scored by the Dutchmen is their lowest tally of the season and comes after upsetting tough Olivet College, 104-92 last Saturday.

Both teams were cold from the field, as the Dutchmen were able to only sink 26 of 62 shots for 41 per cent, while the Hornets made three less field goals, 23 of 61 for a 37 per cent average.

The big difference came from the free throw lane, as Hope only had 10 chances and made good on seven of them for 70 per cent while the Hornets took 20 shots and netted 16 for 80 per cent.

"We knew if they made their free throws that we would be in trouble and we also felt that if they would miss them, that we would eventually pull out the decision," said Coach Russ DeVette.

Hope's surge was led by the playmaking and scoring of guard Doug Smith and the rebounding and clutch scoring of sub Dave Harmelink.

"Smith played his best game of the season while Harmelink did a job for us coming off the bench," DeVette continued. "But you got to give Kalamazoo credit, they hung in there and did a good job."

It took Hope three minutes and one second to score its first tally and before they knew it, they were down by 14 points, 18-4.

While the Dutchmen couldn't find the lid to the basket, forwards Dick Winkley and Dave Lee were pumping them in left and right for "K".

Dan Shinabarger kept Hope in the game in the first half by

collecting 11 of his 18 markers. Lee and Winkley both had 12 points for Kalamazoo.

Down by 10 points, 45-35, the Dutchmen came to life on consecutive left - handed baskets by Tom Wolters and Harmelink and on two fine moves for buckets by Smith to cut the gap to four points, 47-43 with 9:10 left to play.

Shinabarger's bucket and Wolters basket cut the deficit to two points on two occasions, 55-53 and 57-55 but that was the closest the Dutchmen could get against the Hornets, who seem to hold a spell over them in Tredway as they got revenge from an earlier 84-77 loss to Hope in the Civic Center.

Besides Shinabarger's 18 counters, Harmelink tossed in 13 points and Smith came within one point of his career high with 10.

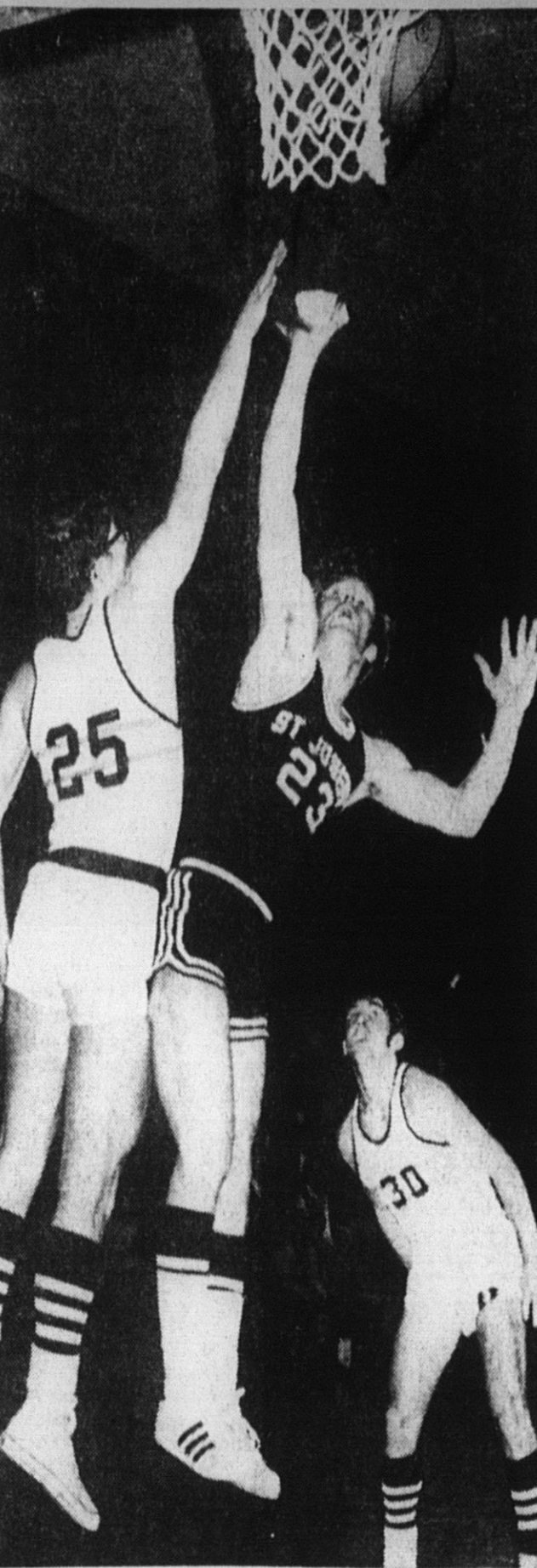
Lee led the Hornets with 18 points while both Winkley and center Jim Van Sweden followed with 14 apiece.

Hope out-rebounded Kalamazoo, 43-40 as Harmelink paced the Dutchmen with nine while Van Sweden had 11 for the Hornets.

Kalamazoo's victory ties them for third place in the MIAA with Hope with 7-4 records. For the season, the Dutchmen are now 13-8 while the Hornets are 12-9. The Dutchmen will close out their season Saturday at Adrian while Kalamazoo will visit co-leading Olivet.

## Winds, Ice Cut Power In Counties

A build-up of ice on electrical wires and winds Monday knocked out electrical service to about 1,500 Consumers Power Co. customers in Ottawa and Allegan counties.

Consumers said the outages lasted from about one-half hour to six hours.

Hardest hit were areas north and south of Borculo and south of Holland where power was lost for six hours. Also affected were areas south of Coopersville and north of Holland.

The Bil-Mar turkey farm at Borculo was powerless for six hours and radio stations WJBL AM and FM were knocked off the air for the afternoon.

Some residents north of Holland reported basements were flooding after electrically operated sump pumps did not function.

Consumers said about 200 customers south of Holland lost their power and that efforts to restore electrical lines were hampered by the ice and wind conditions.

A spokesman said wires had to be strung with a new method to prevent winds from damaging the ice-laden wires.

Consumers said a quarter-inch of ice had coated the lines and wind gusts up to 35 miles per hour were reported.

## Christian Loses In 2 Overtimes

If a pressure packed game is what is needed to get ready for tournament time, the St. Joseph and Holland Christian basketball teams should be set. The two teams battled to a tremendous double overtime game in the Civic Center, which was filled with thrills and excitement, before the Bears came off with a 78-76 triumph.

St. Joseph also won the first meeting from the Maroons, 58-54.

The overtime came about when St. Joseph canned 10 baskets in 18 tries in the final quarter to overcome a 55-48 lead the Maroons held going into the final period.

The teams put on an excellent display of basketball, and until the overtimes shot well from the floor. The Maroons hit 31 per cent in the first quarter, then averaged 53 per cent for the next three periods. The Bears hit 22 per cent in the second quarter, and also averaged 53 per cent for the other three periods.

Christian started slowly and trailed 8-3 before Ron Scholten connected for the Maroons' first bucket of the game with more than four minutes gone. The pace then picked up with the Bears holding a 19-13 lead at the quarter.

The Maroons took the lead on a Phil Tuls basket at 2:36 of the second period and held a 33-29 margin at halftime. Scholten, playing one of his best games of the season, had 15 points in the first half, and continued on for a game-high 32 counters.

With the Maroons hitting 65 per cent and the Bears 50 per cent in the third quarter, Christian twice held 12-point leads, and were up 55-48 at the period's close. Scholten hit five baskets in the period, while Mike Knuth, held to two points in the first half, tallied nine for the Bears in the third stanza.

St. Joseph went ahead, 61-59 before the Maroons tallied seven straight and led 66-61 with 2:08 to play. Jeff Mort and Scott Marutz tallied for St. Joe, and Scholten made two from the charity stripe, and it was 68-65 with 55 seconds left. Marutz made it 68-67 with 40 seconds to go. Phil De Jong hit a charity toss for the Maroons with 31 seconds on the clock, and Mort sent the game into overtime with a bucket at the 15 second mark, tying the score at 69-all.

Both teams had their chances in the first overtime, but could not find the hoop, as St. Joseph hit only one of nine shots, and one of two from the free throw line, while Christian was one of five from the floor and one of four at the line. Tuls tipped in a shot at the buzzer sending the game into the second overtime with the score at 72-72. In regulation time Christian hit 13 of 16 attempts at the free throw lane.

John Gorton scored the winning basket for the Bears with seven seconds left for a 78-74 lead. Gorton transferred from Benton Harbor to St. Joseph mid-way through the season. Scholten scored on a layup at the buzzer to complete the scoring.

Christian ended the regular season with 12 wins and six losses, and now awaits District tournament action next week.

In the reserve contest, coach Dave Vander Hill's five scored its 13th win in 17 games, defeating the St. Joseph second team, 58-43.

The Maroons led 18-10 at the quarter before trailing 25-24 at halftime. At the end of three periods the score was tied 35-35. Christian broke the game open early in the final period to win going away.

Ed Meiste took scoring honors with 14 points, followed by Rick Klompaker with 11. Mark Schnepse hit 25 for the Bears.

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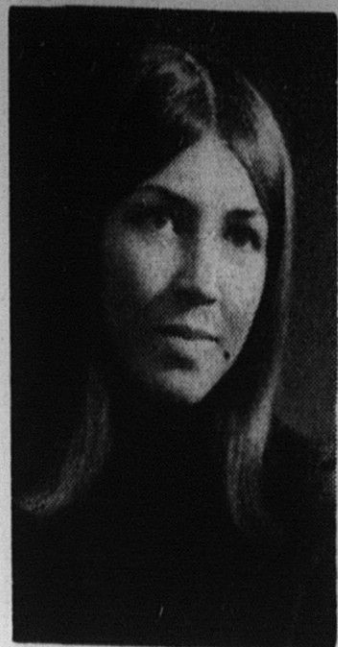

## National Health Care Plan

Last Thursday the President proposed a national health care plan under which employers would provide low cost insurance for workers and their families. The Federal government would foot most of the bill for the poor.

The President in his special message to Congress outlined the program that would: Require private employers to work out arrangements under which workers would ultimately pay only 25 per cent of health insurance premiums, and each worker and member of his family would be protected for costs all the way up to \$50,000 for catastrophic illness.

And provide premium free protection for families of four making less than \$3,000 per year and coverage at a sliding fee for those with incomes up to \$5,000. The President's proposals would go into effect July 1, 1973.

In addition to the two basic features the report indicates that his message called for establishment of private risk sharing in insurance pools for the self-employed and people outside the public work force, such as federal and state government employees, who would compose the bulk of those exempted from the employer-subsidized plan.

Some others not covered under this phase, such as household domestic and part time and seasonal employees, would qualify — because of their low incomes — for the federally subsidized protection.

The private insurance coverage plan would be required of all firms involved in interstate commerce, regardless of the number of employees.

There are many more points which all cost money. Health, Education and Welfare Secretary Elliot Richardson is reported to have said the cost to the federal government during the first year of such a plan's operation would be about \$3 billion.

Our Congress has plenty of problems. The problems all seem to cost more money. We the taxpaying public should ask our appointed, elected and hired government people just where the deficit financing will end.

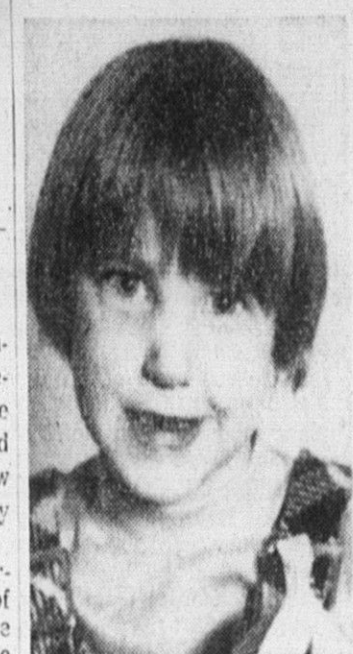

## Gladfelter Heart Fund At \$2,700

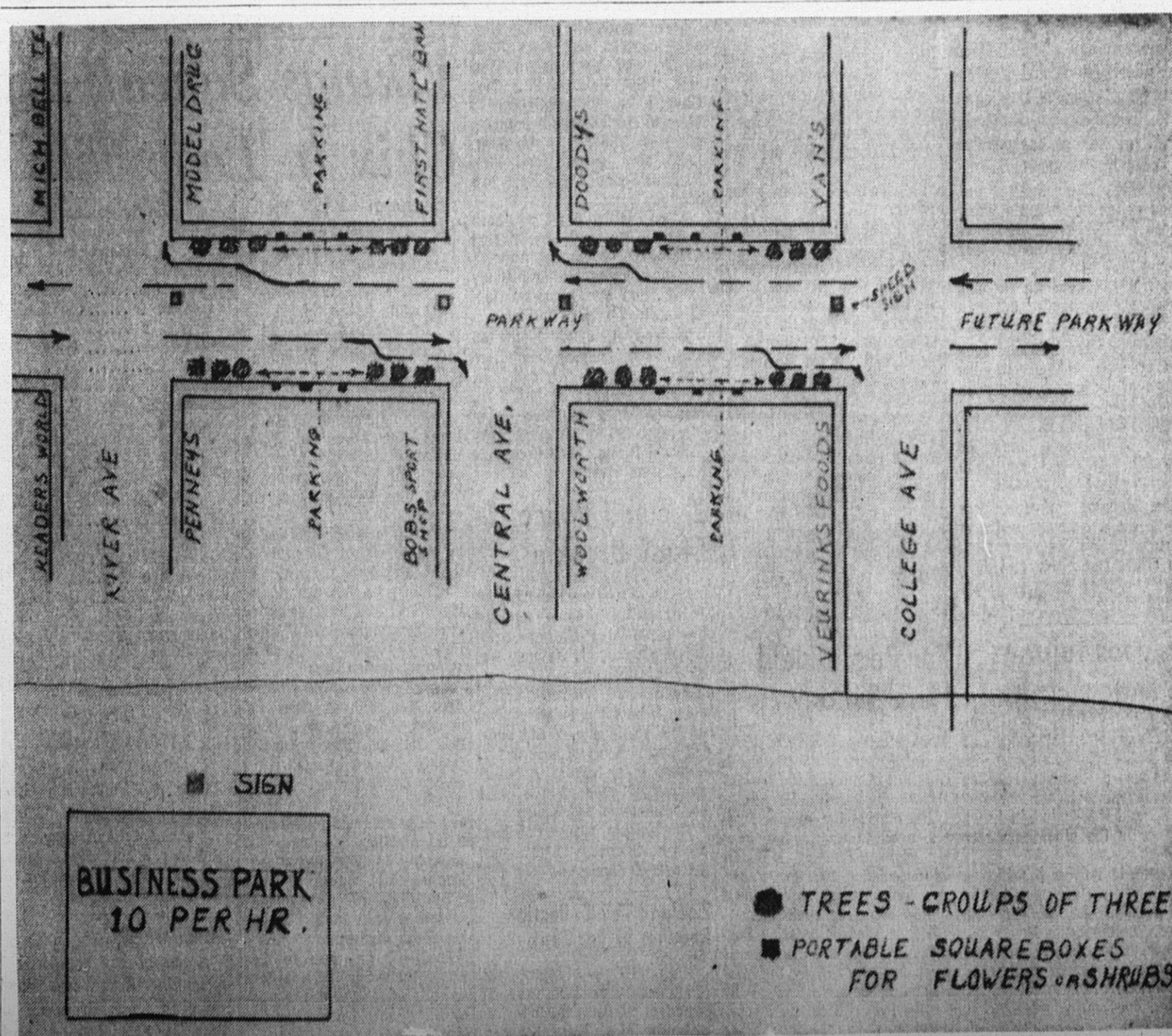

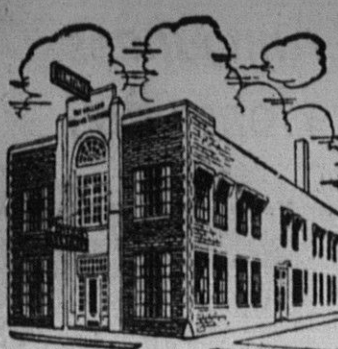

#### NEW POSTAL SERVICE RATE

The Postal Rate Commission is fulfilling the task assigned to it by setting new postal rates that are supposed to be high enough to help place our postal service on a paying basis. We the taxpaying public no doubt will again find that the rates will go up.

The law requires the new government-owned postal corporation to do exactly what it is doing so we do not seem to have any other choice but to pay the cost of operation. We can at least register our opinions however.

The independent Postal Rate Commission is reported to have 90 days to deliberate on the proposals. They are bound to receive some protests as they work on the program. Our hope is that they will find a way to cut out some of the operation that has been running at a loss for a long time.

We hope that if they are able to find a way to make the mail service pay, that they will also work on some ideas that may help to improve all of the services. The first important step is reported to have been taken toward fixing the rates at a level that will place the postal system (in the words of Assistant Postmaster General James W. Hargrove) on "a sound financial basis for the first time in many years." We hope we come up with better service on a paying basis.

#### Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Feb. 28  
Rich Toward God  
Luke 12: 13-21  
By C. P. Dame

A lesson about riches is always timely but it is especially so in these days of much plenty and much poverty. It is fitting that on the first Sunday in Lent we direct our minds to the importance of being rich toward God.

I. Covetousness is still common. One day Jesus was preaching to a large crowd of people when suddenly He was rudely interrupted by a hearer who was not listening to Jesus for he had his mind on something else. Even Jesus could not win the attention of everyone. This man asked Jesus to talk to his brother about dividing the inheritance with him. Which brother cheated we do not know, perhaps both, but Jesus refused to play the role of a judge and stuck to preaching. Today some preachers become politicians.

Jesus guessed that the questioner was covetous and hence He warned, "Take heed and beware of covetousness: for a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth." A person may be wealthy and yet poor because he is covetous — always wanting something which belongs to another and hence has no right to it. The Bible speaks of two kinds of covetousness—the sinful kind against which Jesus warned and the commendable kind of which Paul speaks — "But covet earnestly the best gifts" (1 Cor. 12:31).

II. Prosperity presents problems and opportunities. The man's question led Jesus to tell a parable about the rich fool whose fields yielded a big crop which led to a problem. The farmer worked hard, got results, and planned to build bigger barns and thus make provision for the future. Some people earn much and spend all, which is not wise.

The big crop made the farmer more of an egotist—note his use of the pronouns "I" and "my," he talked as if he had control of nature; God did not count. His prosperity made him think only of a future that promised eating, drinking and being merry. Really he did not look ahead far enough. Today many fail like he did.

This farmer did not realize how poor he was. He was dying intellectually and spiritually he was bankrupt. He had no time for God and his neighbors and the poor, the widows, orphans and handicapped, whom he could have helped.

God stepped into this man's life and took him away from his wealth and then he was poor. God called him a fool even though he was a success according to the world's idea. Are there fools like this man in our churches?

III. Some treasures are real and last. Laying up treasures in heaven is a task Jesus gives us to do. "For where your treasure is there will your heart be also." Where is your heart? We live in a materialistic age. Getting is the passion supreme in many lives and often the getting is due to the passion of wanting more things, comforts, conveniences, luxuries and whatsoever appeals to the physical and passing prizes of life.

#### Day of Prayer For Peace Held Here Sunday

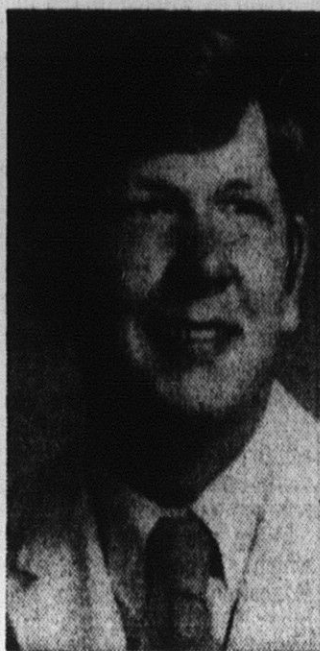
Sunday was a Day of Prayer for Peace in Vietnam in churches in the Holland-Zeeland area.

The Chix will close out the season at home Friday by hosting South Christian.

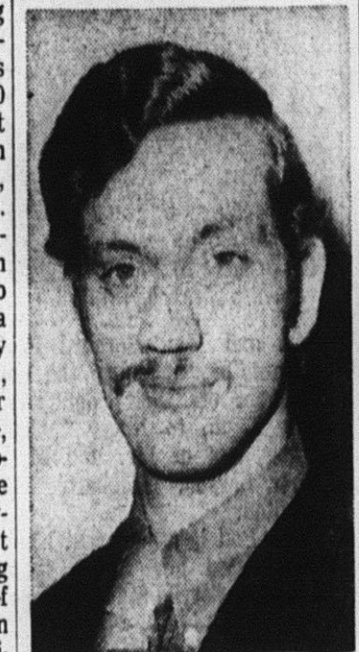
Zeeland's fine reserve team won a thriller in the final three seconds on a 30-foot jump shot by Bill Maat to make the final score, 63-61.

# Nature Fluke Turns Water Animal Into Land Animal

A funny thing happened to Jerry Bosscher's senior biology project at Hope College — one of his water animals (axolotls) turned into a landlubber (tiger salamander).

The metamorphosis from axolotl to tiger salamander can be induced in laboratories and is often done by introducing iodine or thiamine into the animal's environment. But it happens "very infrequently in nature" according to Dr. Norman W. Rieck, associate professor of biology and the Hope faculty member under whom Bosscher was working.

The ex-axolotl was being used as a control animal (one living under normal conditions) as part of a project in which several other axolotls were exposed to small quantities of a methyl-mercury compound. The results of the mercury portion of the project aren't yet complete, but it appears that there is a direct correlation between exposure to poisonous mercury and a shortened life-span. It has not yet been determined whether or not the axolotls are effected in ways (and parts of the body) similar to human beings.

Bosscher, a senior from Grand Rapids, began his project Oct. 9 and recorded the behavioral and physiological changes in the mercury-poisoned axolotls. However, during the recent Christmas vacation, he began to notice changes in his control animal as well.

First, he noticed that the axolotl began surfacing to breathe (axolotls have gills, like fish). More pronounced changes had occurred by the time school reopened in early January, including: loss of the external gills, shedding skin six times, changing tail from broad paddle to slender one, color changed from olive-drab to black with white and yellow spots, and changed head shape including protruding eyeballs.

When school resumed and the changes continued, "We finally began taking photographs and tried to keep up with the anatomical changes," says Dr. Rieck. "We were sure we had something unusual because all conditions remained the same — he was fed and his environment (water) changed three times a week, temperatures remained the same — we hadn't done anything to artificially induce the change."

Once the resident of a dish of water, the tiger salamander now lives on land (in a terrarium) and no longer swims with facility. He has also changed his eating habits. Dr. Rieck and Dr. Timothy Stabler, assistant professor and director of laboratories in Hope's biology department, have been searching for a new diet for the salamander. "He's not eating much liver (which is what he lived on as an axolotl)," says Dr. Stabler, "so we're trying to find a suitable replacement." One of the problems is that flies, which salamanders normally eat, aren't too abundant during Michigan winters, "but that's

what we'll probably feed him when we can find them," says Dr. Rieck. Meanwhile, the Hope biologists are trying to interest the salamander in meal worms.

Dr. Stabler, who raises the axolotls for the department, says they live naturally in lakes and ponds around Mexico City and are used to cold water. Tiger salamanders, on the other hand, are found throughout the northeastern U. S., often under rotting logs in fairly moist places. They are most noticeable in the spring when they are sometimes found on cold, wet lawns enroute to ponds, where they breed.

The Brookstras have been living in Hawaii since last year when Lt. Brookstra was assigned to the Naval base as supply officer.

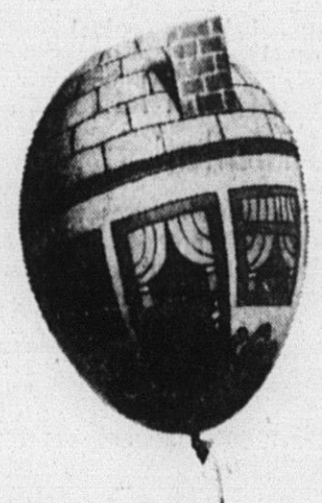

## Blaze Damages Building; One Fireman Overcome

Fire authorities Monday probed the damaged warehouse of Harrington Fuel & Dock Co., for clues to the cause of a fire Sunday morning.

Fire Chief Richard Brandt said the fire was believed to have started in the southwest corner of the corrugated sheet steel and cement block structure west of the Harrington offices along Lake Macatawa at Eighth St. and Washington Blvd.

Brandt said preliminary investigation Monday failed to indicate possible cause of the fire. He said he may call in state fire inspectors to help determine the cause.

One fireman, Jerry Heerspink, of 68 West 17th St., was overcome by smoke and received oxygen at the scene before returning to battle the blaze.

Earlier reports of \$100,000 damage were trimmed Monday by owner Carl Harrington and Brandt. Brandt said he doubted the damage would reach \$75,000.

Harrington and Brandt said six trucks and two front-end loaders housed in the building were removed by firemen and company personnel and the equipment escaped serious damage.

Fire damage inside the 120

by 40-foot structure was confined to the area of the point of origin and insulation in the ceiling of the building.

The fire was discovered at 8:48 a.m. by Holland police Cpl. Robert Ryzanica while on routine patrol.

Firemen responded with three engines and an aerial ladder truck and remained on the scene about 2½ hours.

Flames were prevented from reaching the office building and nearby piles of coal. The damaged structure was used for vehicle storage and maintenance.

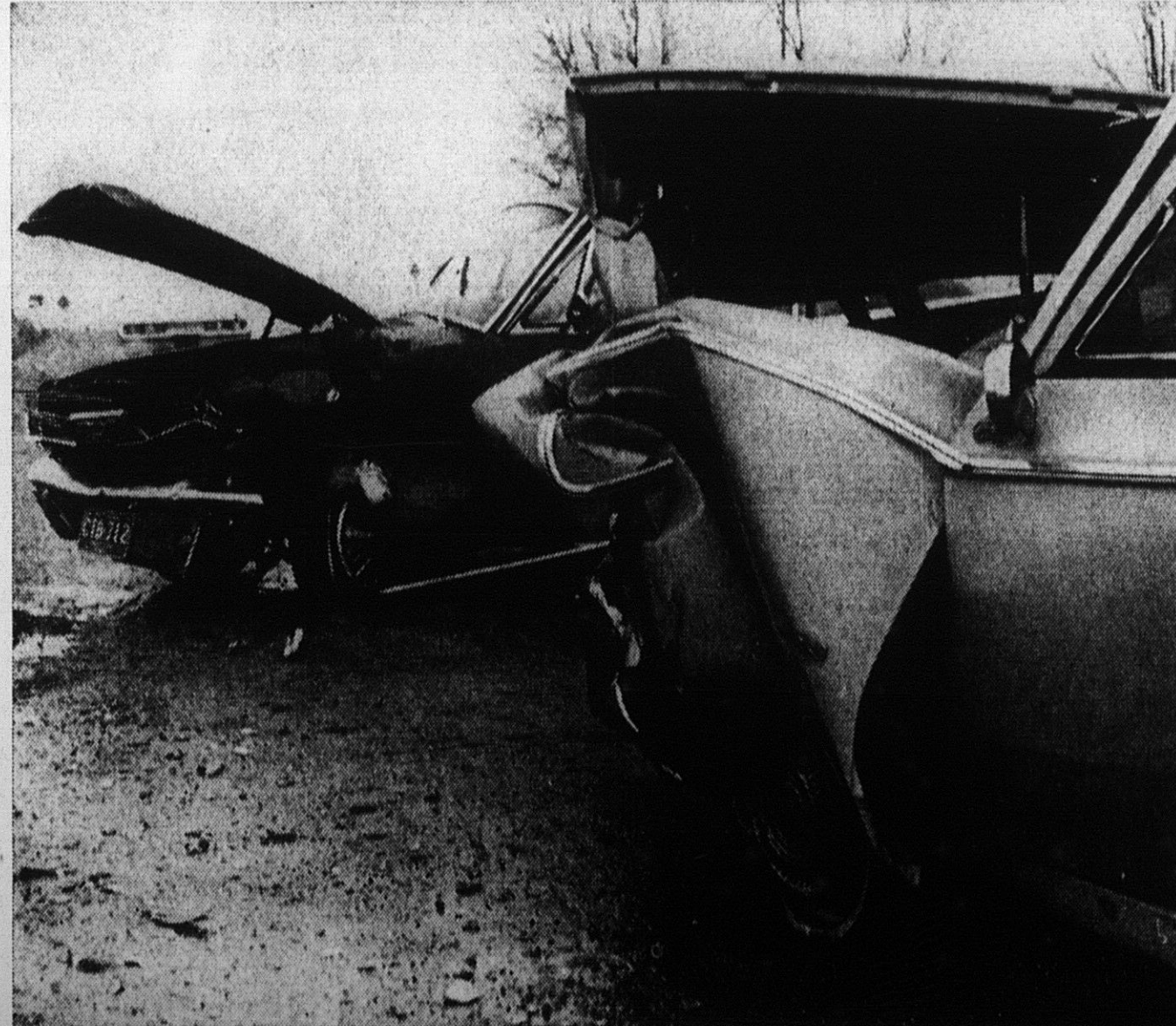

## Wes Tebeau Guest Speaker At Rotary Club

Youth, those between the ages of 18 and 35, comprise the major buying public of leisure-oriented products, according to Wes Tebeau, director of the West Michigan Tourist Association.

Tebeau spoke to Rotary Club members Thursday and explained how the young people of today have become leisure-oriented and spend most of their discretionary earnings, those earnings set aside after all expenses are taken care of, on products for living the full life.

Products such as radios, tv, phonographs, boats, vacations and those consumer goods that will allow for more leisure time, such as automatic dishwashers and convenience appliances, are purchased.

He pointed out that the youth and young people of today are better educated, more aware, have more social conscience, than any of their predecessors in the previous generation and that there are more young people now than in any time during the history of the world.

With such a large youth population, spending billions of dollars annually, the major producers of products for consumer use, whether for leisure or as necessities, have had to change their whole approach to marketing and advertising.

No longer are marketing and advertising claims acceptable unless they are truthful. The young people today will tune out any claims that walk a thin line between truth and fiction.

Tebeau said that any producer of consumer goods who ignores the youth population is ignoring a growing group that will continue to grow and spend money in unprecedented amounts. The under-35 population now stands at 65 million, he said.

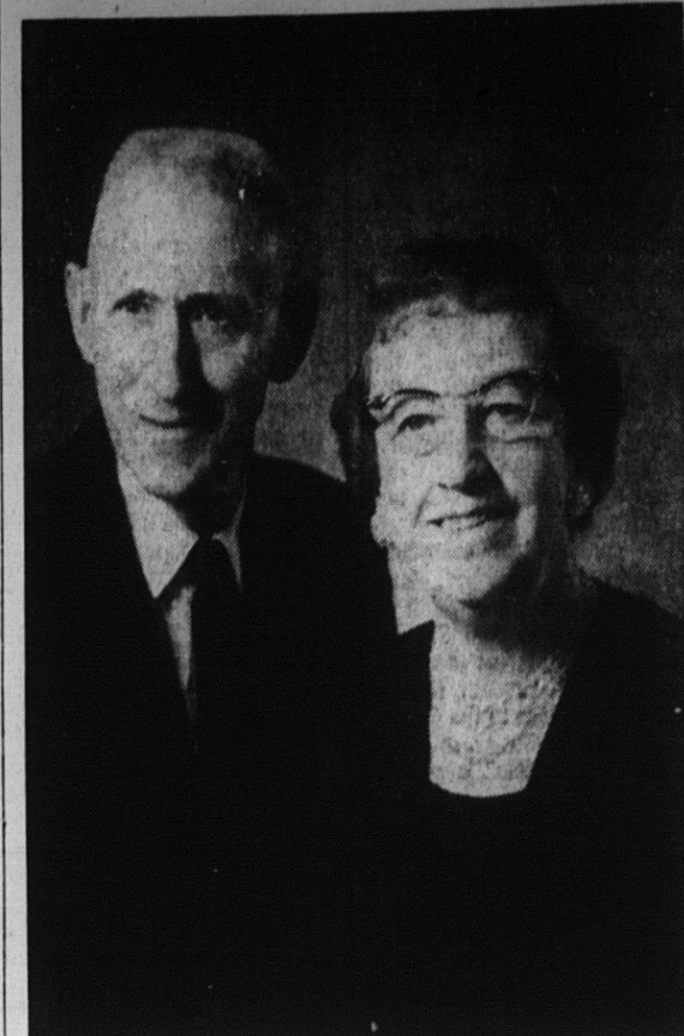

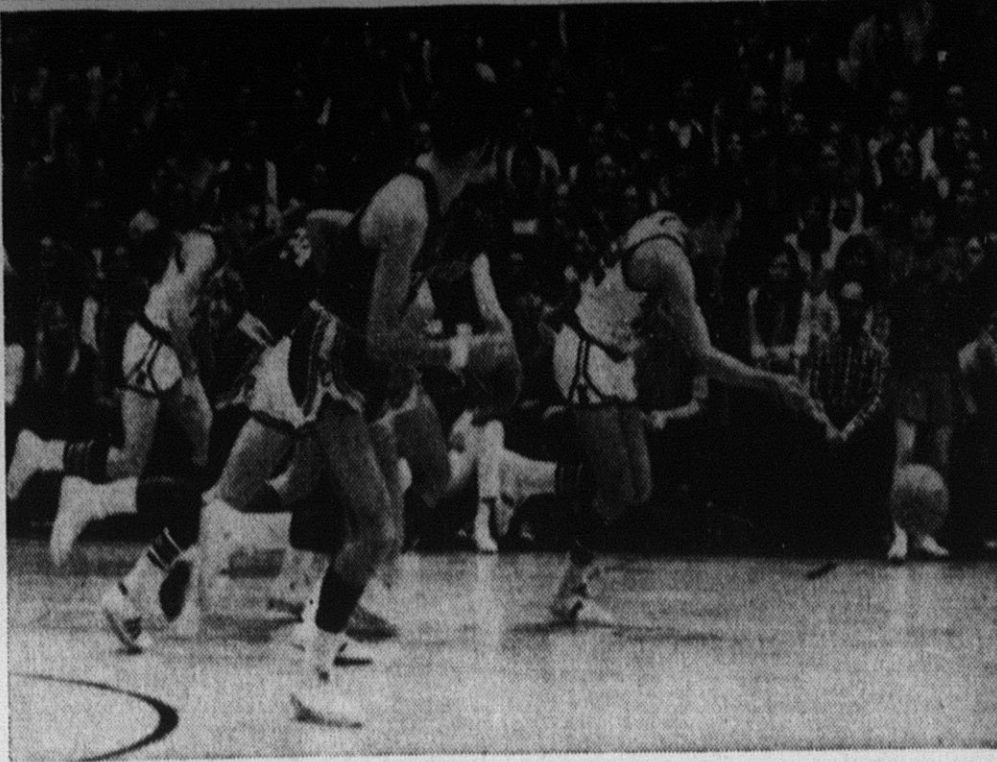
## Hope Hands Olivet Team 104-92 Loss

A current veterans check is not necessary this year, since the Statement from Benefit Payment Records will suffice. But if the veteran does not have such a statement, he should bring a current check. Those veterans applying for the first time must bring proof of home ownership, discharge papers and Statement from Benefit Payment Records, or a current check.

All applications for senior citizens and veterans must be renewed every year. All application forms must be signed.

Senior citizens applying for the first time must bring proof of home ownership, proof of birth and Social Security number.

## Hutchinson Urges Chrome Ban Removal

WASHINGTON — Rep. Edward Hutchinson, R - Mich., said Monday he will support legislation to remove the ban on importing chrome ore from Rhodesia because Russia has jacked up its prices on the ore to an "intolerable" level.

The legislation would rescind an action that started in January, 1967, when President Lyndon Johnson issued an executive order making it a criminal offense for any American to engage in trade with the African nation of Rhodesia. President Johnson's action was the result of a decree by the United Nations Security Council calling for a worldwide embargo against Rhodesian goods. The decree was based on the charge that Rhodesia had illegally declared its independence from Great Britain and that it was guilty of racial discrimination against its predominantly-black population.

A substantial share of metallurgical-grade chromium ore requirements of the United States came from Rhodesia before the decree was issued.

In 1963, Russia entered the high-grade chrome ore exporting business, and gained a substantial share of the U. S. market in following years by underselling competition. When sanctions against Rhodesia took effect the Soviet Union increased its share of our market to nearly 50 per cent, Hutchinson said.

But the Soviets also found it possible, with competition no longer present from Rhodesia, to substantially increase prices. High-grade ore is \$75 a ton today, compared with \$25 per ton before sanctions, he said.

"At the same time, Rhodesia is able to sell some of its ore in Europe and Japan at distress prices. The products produced using that ore compete with our higher-cost products in world markets," the Fennville congressman declared.

"The situation has become intolerable. We are greatly dependent on the Soviet Union for a raw material which is critical in our manufacturing processes," he said.
