## Crime Prevention Week Contest Prizes Awarded

Presentation of prizes for a poster and essay contest in connection with Crime Prevention Week, sponsored by the Holland Exchange Club, marked the club's regular meeting Monday noon in Holiday Inn with President John Muller presiding.

Prizes were presented by Police Chief Charles Lindstrom, an Exchangeite, with winners as guests of the club for lunch. The poster contest was for elementary students and the essay

contest for junior high students. A \$50 savings bond went to Mark Swets of South Side Christian School for the winning poster and another \$50 savings bond to Debra De Meester of E. E. Fell Junior High School for the winning essay. Gift certificates went to second and third place winners and those receiving honorable mention.

The winning essay was read by Officer John Dillbeck of the police department who with

Keith Houting organized the contest.

Program for the week was on "Why Re-evaluation?" with City Manager William L. Bopf and City Assessor Robert Nienhuis presenting facts on the recent reappraisals in the city. Bopf explained that the reappraisal was necessary to correct inequities in assessments which he documented. He emphasized that reappraisals were not done to gain more revenue for the city since the city could levy another three mills within the limitation of the city charter.

The program was arranged by Exchangeite John Fonger who is Holland's city auditor.

## Trophies Awarded At Annual Meeting

A total of eight trophies were awarded at the Ottawa Dairy Herd Improvement Association (DHIA) annual meeting recently in the Sveden House, Grand Rapids.

Some 150 dairymen and their wives attended the meeting. Bill De Kleine, DHIA supervisor from Jamestown, announced trophy winners and awards were made by the businessmen who donated them.

The high herd trophy for large herds over 40 cows was presented by Van Strein Sales and Services of Hudsonville to John Fraaza and Sons of Zeeland. The 99-cow herd of registered Holsteins had a production of 19,319 pounds of milk and 743 pounds of butterfat per cow.

The high herd trophy for small herds under 40 cows went to Robert Vande Bunte, Hudsonville, whose 25-cow herd of Holsteins produced an average of 15,863 pounds of milk and 637 pounds of butterfat per cow. The trophy was presented by the First Michigan Bank and Trust Co. of Zeeland.

The grandma cow award was presented by the State Bank of Michigan in Coopersville to Gerrit Buth and Son of Coopersville. The cow has a record of 216,580 pounds of milk and 7,586 pounds of butterfat during her lifetime of 16 years.

High mature cow trophy was presented to Henry Baker by the Byron Center State Bank. The cow produced 26,050 pounds of milk and 1,152 pounds of butterfat during the 1971 testing year and Baker also rated third in the county for herd production. His 40-cow registered herd is located in Jamestown township.

The high four-year-old trophy went to John Fraaza and Sons from Mead Johnson Co. of Zeeland. The four-year-old cow produced 25,098 pounds of milk and 1,006 pounds of butterfat during the 1971 testing year.

The high three-year-old trophy was presented to Gerrit Buth and Son by Old Kent Bank and Trust Co. of Grand Rapids and Hudsonville. The three-year-old produced 21,577 pounds of milk and 847 pounds of butterfat during the 1971 testing year.

The high two-year-old trophy was presented to John Fraaza and Sons by Cliff Allen, Ottawa county MABC inseminator. The two-year-old produced 20,387

pounds of milk and 851 pounds of butterfat during the 1971 testing year.

High increase in butterfat trophy was presented to Bob Don and Ed Hassevoort of Hudsonville by General Genetics of Jenison. This herd of 85 Holsteins had an average increase of 1,601 pounds of milk and 57 pounds of butterfat in 1971 over the 1970 testing year.

Plaques were presented to nine dairymen with herds averaging over 600 pounds of butterfat per cow for the 1971 testing year by Clifford Allen. The presentations were made on behalf of the Michigan Animal Breeders Association.

Certificates were also presented by Larry Stebbins, Ottawa County Extension Director, to 19 dairymen as members of the 600 and 500 pound clubs. These dairymen have maintained a herd average of either 600-pound level or 500-pound level of butterfat for five consecutive years.

An association report was given by DHIA supervisors Harvey Brouwer, Ron Carlson, De Kleine and Stebbins. The report showed that Ottawa county ranks second in Michigan in milk production with 48 herds producing an average of 14,499 pounds of milk for the 1971 testing year with 3,705 cows involved in the test. Martin Wilson, state DHIA administrator, gave a brief report and reviewed changes in the DHIA herd report.

Directors elected for a two-year term to the board were Wayne Hecksel of Coopersville, Nelson Aukerman of Jamestown and George Raterink of Zeeland. The board reorganized with Aukerman as president, John Mast of Hudsonville as vice president and Hecksel as secretary-treasurer.

The program concluded with a slide presentation by the tester supervisors, focusing on the dairy operations that received trophies.

## Kris Goes Home On Sad Mission

SAUGATUCK—Kirsti (Kris) Viitanemi, 17-year-old Finnish exchange student is back home in Finland for about 10 days through the generosity of kind-hearted friends, but she will return here at the end of next week.

Her mission is a sad one... the death of a 19-year-old brother whose illness was not known to her.

The chain of events started last Sunday when her American parents, Mr. and Mrs. Dan Wisely who live at 4129 66th St. (in Saugatuck school district), received a call from Finland. Kris was spending the

school and church friends in Holland, Saugatuck and Hamilton soon rallied, and by Tuesday night sufficient funds (about \$350) had been raised. Most of these people did not know Kris, Mrs. Wisely said.

"The expression on Kris' face when she learned she was going home was worth so much," Mrs. Wisely said. Kris left the Grand Rapids airport Wednesday afternoon and arrived in Helsinki at 4 a.m. Thursday (Holland time), home town of Rauma, well in advance of the funeral scheduled next Tuesday.

"Kris has many friends," Mrs. Wisely said. "She has a warm personality and loves people, animals and everything else. At first she is a bit reserved, but she is an excellent ambassador for her country."

Kris is a senior at Saugatuck High School under the Youth for Understanding program. The Wiselys' daughter Sandy also is a senior at Saugatuck High. The local family has a son Timm who is a sophomore and Scott, a seventh grader.

The call to Finland last Sunday revealed that Kris' brother Juha, 19, had been in a hospital a week with a heart ailment. He had been ill a short time. Besides the parents and Kris, a 12-year-old sister survives.

Kris' love for her American family is shown in a message written on the back of her senior picture shown here. It reads: "To Mom: Thank you for everything. I really enjoy being here and I think this family is the best I ever could live with. I know already that the day I leave is going to be terrible. I am going to miss everybody."

## Guard Holds Training For Recruiters

A recruiter training school was being conducted in Holland Saturday by the Michigan National Guard for recruiters in guard units in Western Michigan. About 23 officers and members of nine units were attending the one-day school.

Capt. Howard Goodyke of Holland's Co. B, and Sgt. Marine S. Damvelt of the Kalamazoo unit, were conducting the school assisted by Maj. George A. Hansen of the state guard headquarters in Lansing.

Similar training sessions are planned at key locations about the state. Such areas as motivation, salesmanship, interview methods, followup and public relations are being covered in the sessions.

Representatives from National Guard units in Muskegon, Grand Haven, Grand Rapids, South Haven, Kalamazoo, Lansing, Pontiac, Detroit and Holland were attending.

Maj. Hansen said recruiting is necessary to fill vacancies in guard units in the state brought on in part by the draft lottery system. He added that generally waiting lists no longer exist in guard units.

## Three Youths Held In Bravo Robbery

ALLEGAN — Three youths faced arraignment Tuesday in Allegan District Court in connection with a \$700 armed robbery Monday evening of a grocery store at Bravo.

The trio was apprehended after State Police from South Haven and Allegan County deputies searched a wooded area about 1/2 mile north of robbery location.

Facing court appearances were Charles William Gregory, 17, formerly of Fennville; Michael T. Thronburg, 17, of Lansing, and Tracy Dexter Gunneman, 19, of Lansing.

State Police said two shotguns were recovered with the arrest of the three as was some of the missing money.

Troopers said two of the youths were arrested about two hours after the trio abandoned their car in a snowbank not far from the grocery store at Bravo, a small community south of Fennville in Allegan county.

The two were flushed from their hiding place by a State Police tracking dog. A third youth surrendered as he returned to the car where police were waiting. The car had been rented at Ann Arbor.

Troopers said a gunman wearing a white shirt with slits cut into the side over his head and carrying a sawed off shot gun entered the store of Gerald Garbow shortly before 6:30 p.m. Monday and demanded money. Garbow, 27, his wife, Judith, 26, and some customers were in the store when the intruder ripped a telephone from the wall.

Moments later a second masked man entered the store. After obtaining the money from a cash register, the two robbers fled to a waiting car where a third subject inside drove off.

Garbow and customers pursued in a car of a customer. Garbow was armed with a pistol. During the chase, the car being pursued opened fire with a blast from a shotgun, hitting the other car. No injuries were reported.

Garbow fired back but missed. The pursued car spun sideways in the road and became stuck in a snowbank. Three occupants fled on foot.

Back at the store, Mrs. Garbow called police from another telephone in the building. Officers arrived with a tracking dog and began a search of the area. Two hours later the trio was in custody.

## Olive Landfill Site Opens on Schedule

The controversial Olive township landfill opened as scheduled at 8 a.m. Tuesday despite court attempts by residents of the township to block the landfill at Pigeon Creek park.

The Northwest Ottawa County Refuse Disposal Center adjacent to the park off Stanton St. is to operate 2 1/2 days a week and the opening today culminated months of legal activities. The courts previously ruled in favor of the Ottawa County Road Commission.

Monday, Allegan attorney Leo W. Hoffman sought a restraining order in Ottawa County Circuit Court to forswear the opening of the landfill. The action was taken on behalf of Olive township and 22 other plaintiffs.

Judge Raymond L. Smith took the matter under advisement and did not rule on the request immediately.

A citizens group, known as Preserve All Resources Committee (PARC), has opposed development of the landfill, claiming the county obtained the land for park purposes.

Ronald Bakker, engineer-manager of the county road commission, said the landfill will be operated Tuesdays and Thursdays from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Saturday mornings until noon. The operation and hours will be reviewed to determine whether volume and revenues are sufficient to maintain the facility on a self-supporting basis.

The site was picked after the dump at Grand Haven on Harbor Island was closed Aug. 1, 1970.

## New Mail System Effective March 6

When the Holland post office becomes part of Area Mail Processing early in March, six local postal employees will be transferred to the Sectional Center Facility in Grand Rapids, Postmaster Louis A. Haight said Saturday.

Those being transferred are Supervisor Vincent J. Duffy and Clerks James Weber, James Wolman, Gerald McFall, Gerald Hof and John Seidelman. These men will continue to live in Holland, at least for the present, and there is a possibility in the future they may request transfer here as vacancies appear.

The new program is designed to speed the ultimate delivery of the mail and to gain maximum efficiency through full utilization of the modern and mechanized post office at Grand Rapids.

Area Mail Processing is a plan whereby eventually all mail originating at these offices will be consolidated in Grand Rapids for complete preparation and processing for

outgoing dispatch. The Grand Rapids center will serve 94 associate post offices in Michigan.

Postmaster Haight cautioned local residents to write "Holland, Mich." on all local mail, not "City" which under the new system could lead to unbelievable complications. The old habit of "city" on local mail has been discouraged in recent years but some people still persist.

All mail deposited in street letter boxes will be sent to Grand Rapids for processing and will bear the Grand Rapids postmark. Only local mail deposited in boxes designated "local delivery" or in the "local delivery" slot inside the post office will bear the Holland postmark.

The Sectional Center Facility area postmark will read "U.S. Postal Service, Mi. 493" along with the date and a.m. or p.m. designation. The city postmark of Holland, Grand Rapids, and each individual associate office will not be changed.

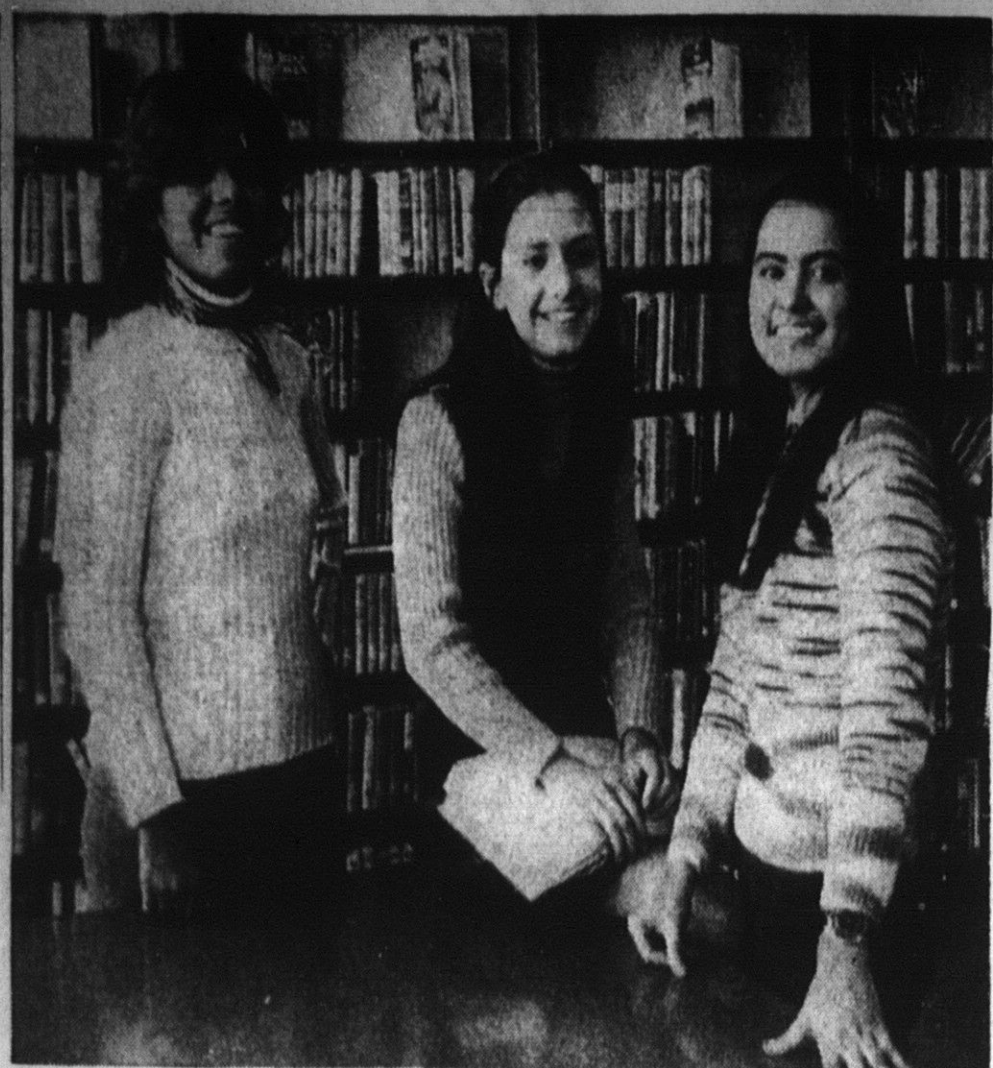

## Holland High Welcomes South American Students

With the world population reaching enormous proportions and the earth's size becoming proportionately inadequate, the need for effective communication and increased understanding of foreign cultures has become a vital issue.

In an effort to meet this challenge, international youth exchange programs have arranged for American and foreign students to gain insight into other countries' languages, lifestyles, people and national issues. Youth for Understanding and the Rotary Exchange Program are two such programs which have provided this opportunity for local youth to travel abroad or to have a foreign student in their homes.

Since the first of the year, Holland has welcomed three South American students to experience life in a small town, live with an American family and study in the unique atmosphere of Holland High School.

Maria De Nazareth Esmeraldo, sponsored by the Rotary Club, is making her home with the Gilbert Moellers, 661 Harrington Ave. Maria's native city is Belo Horizonte, Brazil, a city comparable to Detroit in size.

It's probably for this reason that she finds life calmer here and remarked that Holland is a friendly town.

Maria's goal during her stay in Holland is to gain a better working knowledge of the English language. She hopes to achieve this partly through her courses in American literature, U.S. history, algebra, office practice and typing.

Maria's favorite pastimes are volleyball, music, reading and a newly discovered sport, snowmobiling.

Susana Espinoza, a YFU student, arrived Jan. 23 to live with the Fred Winter family, 1089 Legion Park Dr. She is from Quilque, Chile, a city the size of Holland, and finds a friendly atmosphere here.

Susana, a 17-year-old senior at Holland High, remarked that the high school looked more like a university and that the system is also quite different. In Chile, students are required to take 11 subjects and attend school from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m., Monday through Saturday. Susana takes the required YFU subjects, English, U.S. history and government, plus physical education, biology and chemistry.

She enjoys sports, especially

volleyball, which is a popular Chilean sport, and guitar. Vera Sylvia Falsetti, another Brazilian student, is living with the Dr. Sheldon Wettack family, 147 West 12th St. This 17-year-old student is originally from Sao Paulo, Brazil, a city of about 10 million.

As a senior at Holland High, Vera has had the most extensive English background. She takes the required YFU subjects, in addition to algebra, senior math and art. She hopes these studies will equip her with the knowledge to become an architect.

Vera's hobbies are piano, guitar, reading, theater, swimming and meeting people. She has already become involved in the youth activities in the First United Methodist Church.

Although the Rotary Exchange program and Youth for Understanding are alike in purpose, there are differences in their requirements. Students enrolled in the YFU program must be in the age range of 15-17, must have a working knowledge of English, may stay in the host country for six to 11 months and are sponsored through local organizations.

Students in the Rotary Club program must be from 16 to 18 years of age, need not have studied the language of the country they are visiting, may stay in the country for as long as one year, must be in the upper third of their class and need not be Rotary members.

## Dutch Dominate Maroon Tankers

Holland High's swimming team chalked up its 11th victory of the season, dunking Holland Christian, 76-29 Tuesday evening in the Holland Community Pool.

The Dutch opened the meet in first place and continued to move out ahead of the Maroons, as they recorded all of the first places in the competition.

Stroking in first on the medley relay team, Mike Albers, Greg De Vries, Bruce Keen, and Jim Beedon clocked a 2:04.0, while S. Fonger, J. Dieleman, D. Homkes, and E. Cammenga posted second for Christian.

In the distance competition, John Vande Bunte and Kurt Vander Sluis pulled the one-two punch for Holland in the 200-yard freestyle, while Dave Ter Haar and Greg De Vries gave the Dutch a clean sweep in the 400 yard freestyle.

The individual medley was a crowd-pleaser as Holland's Ter Haar and Christian's Rick Endean finished first and second respectively with times of 2:29.9 and 2:30.0.

Sprinters John Lamb and Jim Paul netted first and second places for Holland in the 50-yard freestyle, while Paul returned in the 100 yard freestyle to churn for first place points.

Ace diver Dave Sundin set pool and team records in his specialty as he manipulated off the boards with 230.05 points for first place.

In the backstroke Bruce Wyckoff captured first place honors for Holland. While churning for first place in the freestyle relay, Holland's Dick Beedon, Tim Houting, Kurt Vander Sluis, and John Vande Bunte registered a 5:50.4.

The Dutch ended the dual meet season with a 11-7 record. They will host the Southwest Michigan Swim Conference meet Saturday, March 4 with the finals beginning at 7 p.m.

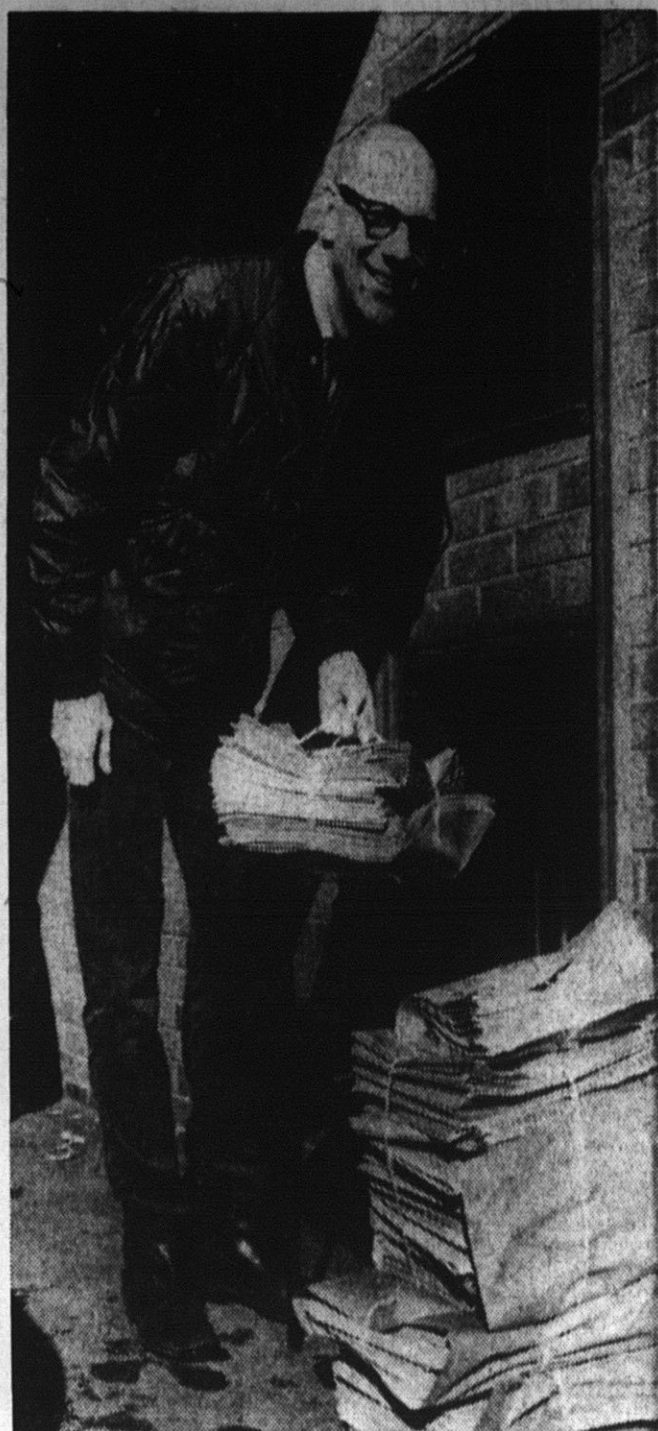

## Carrier Boy Still Delivering Papers

Thirty years ago, Kent Hopkins was one of the youths delivering The Sentinel to homes as a carrier boy.

Today Hopkins continues to deliver the papers but now takes bundles to the carrier boys for them to deliver to the homes.

Hopkins spent 2½ years as a carrier boy taking papers to homes along east Ninth, Tenth and Eleventh Streets. He left to become a messenger boy with the post office. Today he is a postal clerk.

Married and the father of twin boys and a girl, Hopkins and his wife, Kathleen live at 188 East 27th St. with sons Steve and Mike, 14, and daughter

Kimberly Ann, 9. Hopkins recalls that delivering the papers in bundles to the Montello Park, Virginia Park and Central Park areas was difficult some winters when he became stuck three times in the snow but managed to get free and deliver the papers. He does not recall ever missing a delivery to the carriers.

Hopkins volunteered for the Navy during World War II but contracted malaria and was discharged about a year later. When the Korean War broke out, Hopkins was drafted into the Army and served two years in the service.

In 1964 he began the bundle drop route for The Sentinel.

## Gem, Mineral Club Members Learn About Keokuk Geodes

The Tulip City Gem and Mineral Club had as its guest speaker for the February meeting Wednesday, Stephen H. Sinotte, of Kalamazoo and Keokuk, Iowa. Mr. Sinotte is a longtime collector of the special geodes from that area, and has authored two volumes, "The Fabulous Keokuk Geodes."

Mr. Sinotte used slides and specimens of Keokuk geodes to illustrate his talk. A geode is a piece of rock, rounded in shape, generally with a hollowed interior, and having a harder exterior than the material in which it is found.

These special Keokuk geodes started to form 250 million years ago when Iowa was under a sea. Carbon dioxide dissolving in the water caused chemical reactions with marine life dying and decaying at the ocean bottom. During the coming centuries, the lumps of material formed by this began to solidify, becoming very hard on the outside crust. Further chemical re-

actions caused crystals of many shapes and colors to form or grow inside the geodes.

The largest percentage of the many different minerals found inside these geodes are of quartz and calcite, in colors of white, pink, clear and brown. Some contain special pyrite crystals which are hairlike, and bend at angles.

Microscopic slides of pyrite crystals shown were of those only about 1/8 of an inch long. Keokuk geodes are found in sizes from about 2 inches to 27 inches in diameter, although another enlarged slide of one with a dazzling crystalline interior turned out to be one only 1/2 inch in size.

Mr. Sinotte's talk about the Keokuk geodes was a preview of what to look for when the club members take a field trip to the St. Francisville mine in Keokuk, on April 22 and 23.

The club president, Chet Smith, announced that Mrs. June Wendt was the winner of the 1971 contest for articles published in the club newsletter, "The Conglomerate." Her subject was "Texas Vacation Hunting for Petrified Wood."

Jim Franz won honorable mention for his technical article on garnets, and Al Nuttle was noted for articles on tumbling to polish rocks.

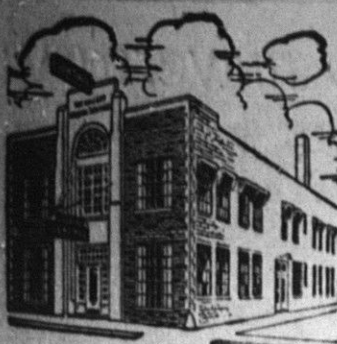

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, March 5  
The Foundation of the Church  
Ephesians 2:19-22;  
Matthew 16:13-20  
By C. P. Dame

On the first Sunday of March we begin a series of lessons on the timely topic: "The Church: Its Nature and Mission." Since much discussion is going on about the church this series should be beneficial.

The church is a divine institution composed of God's redeemed people and this truth deserves our best thought.

I. The church is composed of believers and the first part of the text is from Paul's Epistle to the Ephesians which deals with the church. The Ephesian church members were for the most part people who once were pagans and hence strangers and foreigners to the family of God. This family was composed of the Old Testament believers. Through faith in Christ these believers had become "fellow citizens with the saints and of the household of God."

In other words, these changed people now belonged to the same fellowship to which Abraham, David and Isaiah belonged.

It cost these members something to break loose from the old pagan fellowships and contacts and to become members of God's family. God had honored them and was responsible for their new situation. God was their heavenly Father and membership in God's church implies membership in a state, in a community, and family.

Here in the text Paul likens the church to a temple. Elsewhere Paul refers to the church as the Bride of Christ and as "the body of Christ."

In this temple every stone represents a member and Jesus Christ is the cornerstone. Both Jews and Gentiles are united in the formation of the church. It is a glorious privilege to belong to an organization which neither hell nor the devil can destroy.

II. The Lord Jesus is the foundation of the church. Towards the close of the Lord's ministry Peter, at a small conference Jesus had with his apostles, made a great confession. First Jesus asked what people said about Him and the apostles reported. He then put a personal question to them, "But whom say ye that I am?"

Peter answered, "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God" — thus separating himself from the crowd, the religious leaders and asserting that Jesus is the fulfillment of the Messianic prophecies.

Protestants believe that the words, "thou art Peter and upon this rock I will build my church" refer to Peter's confession, implying that the Lord will build his church with people having Peter's faith.

The Lord promised the keys of the kingdom to Peter. Keys symbolize authority and in this instance, to bind and loose, to permit or forbid. In Matthew 18:18 Jesus gave this authority also to all the apostles and today anyone who preaches the gospel may exercise the same authority. ## NOSE Tips

Hope College basketball fans will have the opportunity to see one of the state's all-time greats, Dan Shinabarger close his brilliant career tonight in the Civic Center in Hope's MIAA clash against Kalamazoo College.

The 6' Shinabarger is called "the finest" outside shooter ever at Hope by Coach Russ DeVette and ranks as the second greatest scorer in Hope's long history on the basketball floor.

"It's hard to believe that Dan has played four years for us," continued DeVette. "The time sure flew by fast."

We only saw Dan in action three of his four years at Hope but also rank him as the greatest outside court shooter that we have ever seen.

Only the equally great Jerry Pettaway of Northwood Institute, who was the state's all-time leading scorer until this winter, compares to "Shinny" in shooting.

Shinabarger has totaled 1,802 points to date in his four years which ranks second to only Floyd Brady's 2,004 points.

In talking to various coaches that saw Brady in action, they indicated that you can't compare Shinabarger and Brady because they were different types of ball players.

Said DeVette, "As everyone knows, Floyd got most of his points from close in while "Shinny" gets most of his from outside, so you really can't realistically compare them."

Shinabarger, who holds the MIAA scoring record for one game — 51 points against Albion College on Feb. 21, 1970, "makes no bones about basketball being his first love. "Yes, I must admit that playing basketball was the main reason that I went to college. If I couldn't play round ball, I don't know what I would do."

Dan almost didn't get to do his thing because in the 10th grade at Holland he was told by a doctor that he would never again play basketball because of a spine separation.

He showed his desire for the game by wearing a back brace all the time in his final high school days just to be able to continue doing the thing he loved the most.

He still uses the brace now but only when playing.

His high school mentor Don Piersma replied, "Dan was the best guard that I ever coached. He was a self made shooter and he had certain moves that you just don't teach."

Dan has an uncanny perception when he's on the floor and it doesn't matter if he's 30 or five feet away, when he makes up his mind to shoot, it usually means two points for his team.

Shinabarger is not only a great one-on-one player but is as dedicated as they come. As a youngster, he used to wear basket after basket out on his garage at home and still continues to do his thing with his younger brother Steve.

Even though Dan has many personal high points in his career at Hope, he's been frustrated by not playing on a championship team.

"It really bothers me not to have been on a title winner because that's what we were all working for."

Dan turned down several Ivy and Big Ten schools, along with Central, Western Michigan and DePauw to go to Hope.

What was his big reason for attending Hope? "I would probably have to say my parents were my biggest influence, and watching Floyd Brady play was another. He was my idol."

"Hope really laid it on thick," added Dan. "They said they couldn't win without me and being a naive high school kid, I believed them."

Dan's philosophy differed with that of the college. Where basketball was No. 1 to him, it was secondary at Hope. He cracked, "A lot of people may not like that but it's true."

Hope missed out on several fine high school basketball players that would have attended the college because of their recruiting policy.

I know of a lot of guys that would have come to Hope, if they would just have showed some real interest in them," sighed Shinabarger.

"This has been one of my biggest pet peeves at Hope and everytime I think of losing Dana Snoop to another school, it really burns me, because he could have really been a star for us too."

Dana is the younger brother of Marty and transferred to Grand Rapids JC after one year at Hope. He led the Raiders in scoring and is now the leading scorer at Central of Iowa.

"We had great personnel that year but our record wasn't that good. I still can't understand it."

Dan admits that Calvin is the big game for the Dutchmen and it really hurt to lose to them six times in a row. "I don't know what happens to us against those guys because for some strange reason, we always seem to lose."

"This year's championship Olivet team is the best team that we ever played. They have so many standout players that you just can't key on anyone in particular."

He doesn't think that Grand Valley which bombed Hope,

106-84, was really that good. "We were psyched out before we ever got on the court," he echoed.

Dan thinks that he was more consistent in high school but his average has gone steadily up over the past four seasons at Hope. He averaged 15.1 his freshman year, 19.7 his sophomore season and 22.9 last year. His better than 26.0 clip this season will wrap up the MIAA scoring championship for him.

Hope's 1970-71 team was the best, according to Dan. "We were 13-7 that year and I got more satisfaction out of that season than any."

Shinabarger thought about leaving Hope a few times in his career. "Dave Gosselar and myself almost transferred to Central Michigan after my sophomore year."

Like any basketball player, Dan would rather play in the friendly confines of the Civic Center than on the road.

"Playing at home really does make a difference," added Shinabarger, who after the completion of tonight's game will rank as his team's leading scorer for three straight years.

Who does Dan credit his basketball ability to? "Zeke" Piersma has done more for me than anyone else. He's just the greatest guy in the world."

Dan's biggest team win at Hope came during his sophomore year when the Dutchmen trailed Olivet by 17 points with 13 minutes to go and pulled out the verdict. "I don't think I ever felt so good than after that game."

Shinabarger is a pre-med major and expects to get his degree in June. I would like to attend Michigan State or Bowling Green to do my graduate work," insisted Danny.

He says that his football injury did make him a better basketball player. "It really killed me when they told me I couldn't play football again though."

Shinabarger was the starting quarterback his sophomore year and has the second fastest time reaching the fieldhouse roof on a rope, according to Piersma.

"Dan's got real strong shoulders and arms and he's real durable too. He and Jim Helmk are two of the most dedicated players that we ever had," stated Piersma.

"Shinny" would have liked to have had Helmk on his side this year but did comment, "Jim is really too dedicated to go to Hope. Basketball is No. 1 at Central and if that's what his main interest is, that's where he ought to be."

Even though the Dutchmen haven't won any championship with Shinabarger in the lineup, DeVette says that Hope wouldn't have won as many games as they did without Dan.

"There's no doubt but we wouldn't have been as strong without Dan on our side," DeVette sighed.

Dan probably had more pressure on him than most athletes that played at Hope because of his background. After averaging 28 points at Holland in his senior year, people just figured that he would get that or more points per outing at Hope. And even though he did more than his share of the time, it put extra pressure on him.

"It may sound strange but I lack self confidence," sounded Dan. "This is what Piersma really gave me. He would tell me little things and I would go out and really do the job that I was supposed to after his talk."

Shinabarger would like to get a crack at the big time in basketball, if not on the NBA or ABA level, maybe for some semi-pro team.

"Basketball has been my life and I don't know what I would do without it," he continued.

There's one award that Dan wants to win more than all

## Local Professionals Hear Talk on Gestalt Therapy

Dr. Neil Lamper, a practicing gestalt therapist, outlined his work as a therapist and educator in Kalamazoo before a group of community professionals in the Heritage room of Holland Hospital Friday morning.

He explained the gestalt method which encourages the client to "uncover himself, then come to terms with this realization" and then used an actual demonstration with audience participation. Dr. Lamper who worked with Dr. Fritz Perlis in the Gestalt Institute of Canada in establishing this therapy process ended with showing two films prepared by Dr. Perlis, in which the latter interviews a client in the gestalt manner.

Dr. Lamper teaches counseling at Western Michigan University in Kalamazoo and has been actively engaged in gestalt therapy for eight years. He was introduced by Dr. Kenneth Vander Woude of Community Mental Health Services.

The Lamper presentation is one of several of a community education series sponsored by Community Mental Health Services organized by Fred Groen, Lewis Weeber and Donna Hartman of the Mental Health Services education committee.

## Shinabarger Ends Career As MIAA's 2nd Top Scorer

Dan Shinabarger, Hope College's senior guard completed his outstanding collegiate career Tuesday night in the Civic Center as the second highest scorer in MIAA history, as the Dutchmen crushed Kalamazoo College, 107-86.

Shinabarger tossed in 16 field goals and seven free throws for 39 markers to finish his league career with 1,117 points compared to Henry Hughes of Adrian's 1,116 total. Hope's standout registered 1,841 all-time points compared to Floyd Brady's school record 2,004 points. Brady still retains the MIAA record of 1,170 counters.

While Shinabarger was making all kinds of news with his startling performance, his teammate Marty Snoop, senior forward from Wyoming threw in 17 markers to push his career total to 1,004 points. Snoop becomes only the 10th player in Hope history to score 1,000 or more points.

Senior Jack Hankamp and junior Lee Brandsma helped out with 14 points apiece for the Dutchmen while Bob Dentzman paced "K" with 23 counters,

1. Party of the first part, do hereby license to the party of the second part, certain lands owned by party of the first part to party of the second part, for restricted uses hereinafter specified, for a period not to exceed 120 days from the date hereof.

2. The lands herein licensed shall be those lands designated by a Committee representing the party of the first part, and shall be used only in accordance with and under the guidance and permission of the Committee.

3. Said lands shall not be used in a manner or area inconsistent with the permission given by the Committee.

4. The party of the second part shall develop, at its own expense, and without cost or reimbursement from the party of the first part, that land designated by the aforementioned Committee and under the guidance of said Committee.

5. The land so designated shall be used for snowmobiling by the general public.

6. The party of the second part shall not be used for profit nor shall a fee for use thereof be made.

7. The party of the second part shall, in a clear and uniform manner, mark all areas to be designated for snowmobile use. Part of second part shall police and supervise the use of said land to include, but not limit to the protection of trespass and damage done to adjacent land to that designated.

8. At the termination of this license agreement and permit, the party of the second part shall clean up all litter and debris from the land designated herein.

9. The party of the second part shall provide public liability and property damage insurance on behalf of the party of the first part and does hereby agree to indemnify and hold harmless the party of the first part from and against all damages which may result to the party of the first part, including but not limited to a court action, attorney fees, or judgment which may result from a lawsuit filed by a third person while using said lands.

10. A violation of any of these covenants may result in termination of this License Agreement, provided violation shall continue five (5) days after receipt of written notice of such violation to one of the members of the second party Board of Commissioners.

Foundations are penalized if they fail to distribute income to charitable purposes, own too much of a business, engage in lobbying, or engage in activities that might jeopardize their exempt purpose. The law requires private foundations to file an annual report with the Internal Revenue Service and also to publish their annual report, he said.

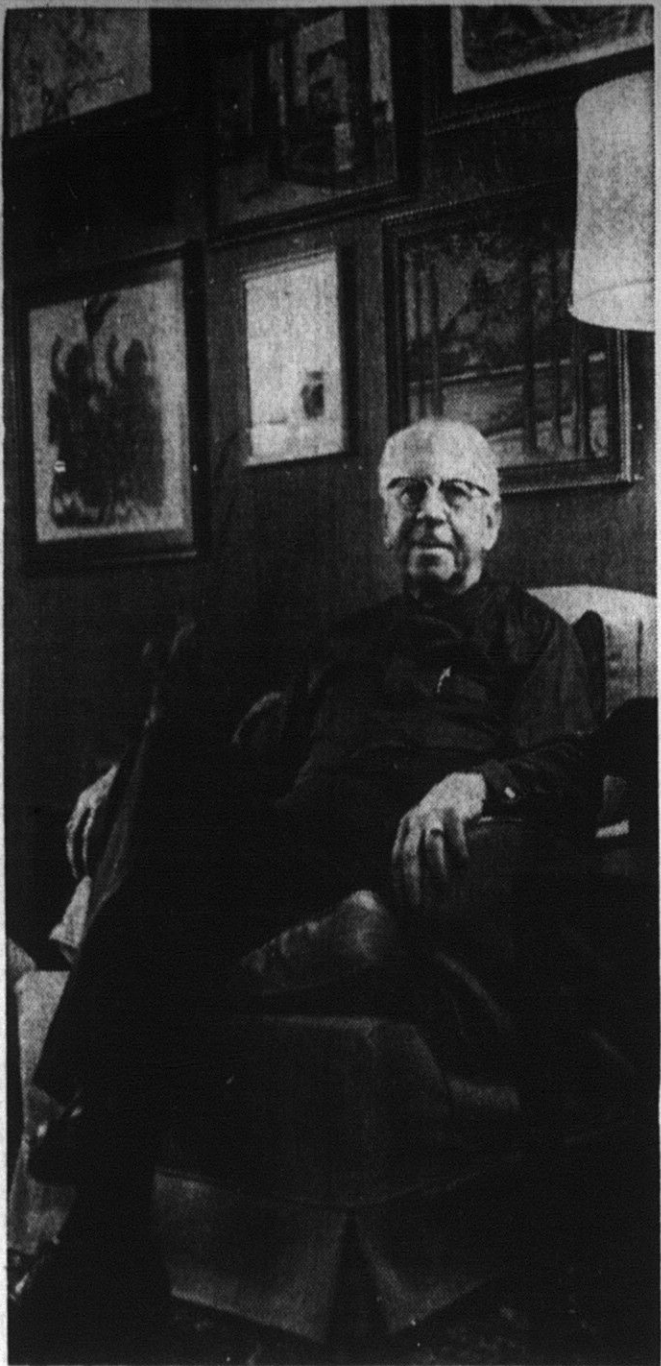

## Dr. J.D. Van Putten Remembers China

Dr. James Dyke Van Putten, 1075 Post Ave., was pleased to hear of President Richard Nixon's proposed trip to mainland China, remarking that Americans generally have a wrong impression of the Chinese people.

Dr. Van Putten, who retired from the faculty of Hope College where he taught Chinese history, international relations of the Far East and political science, in 1969, has spent much of his adult life in the east and characterizes the Chinese as among the most courteous people he has ever met.

Dr. Van Putten went to China in 1925 to teach at the University of Nanking but, instead, he and Mrs. Van Putten spent two years there learning the Chinese language. The couple studied eight hours a day in order to become fluent and spent the second year in Hangchow.

In 1927, the Van Puttens were forced to leave China in the face of Chiang Kai-shek's anti-foreign attitude and nationalist movement which led to an exodus of foreign peoples from China.

The Van Puttens returned to China briefly in 1928, on their way to India, to try to reclaim items which had been left behind in their hurried flight.

Dr. Van Putten was director of the United States Information Service in Peking beginning in 1947 and was there until the new Communist regime allowed the couple's departure in March, 1950. The first official act of the

Dr. Van Putten received his Ph.D. on the Far East from the University of Chicago in 1934 and began teaching at Hope in 1952 after declining an invitation from the U.S. government to work in Vietnam where American involvement was just beginning.

Dr. Van Putten characterizes Red Chinese Premier Chou En-lai as a sophisticated, well-educated, well-traveled man from a good family who has been on the path of the beginning. Chou was one of the first Chinese organizers in the early 1920s, he said.

Taiwan is probably the biggest problem involved in relations with Red China, Dr. Van Putten said, because Taiwan is part of China. However, he added, the Taiwanese majority doesn't particularly want to return to the mainland.

Dr. Van Putten hopes the President's trip to China is successful for various reasons but he would particularly like to return to Peking, a city he describes as the most interesting in the world. The Van Puttens spent about 20 years living in the Far East and both agree to a preference for China and its people.

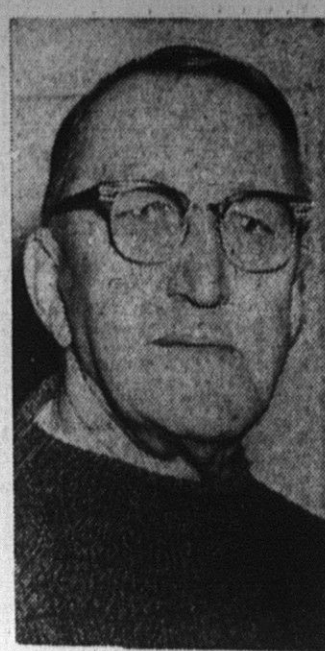

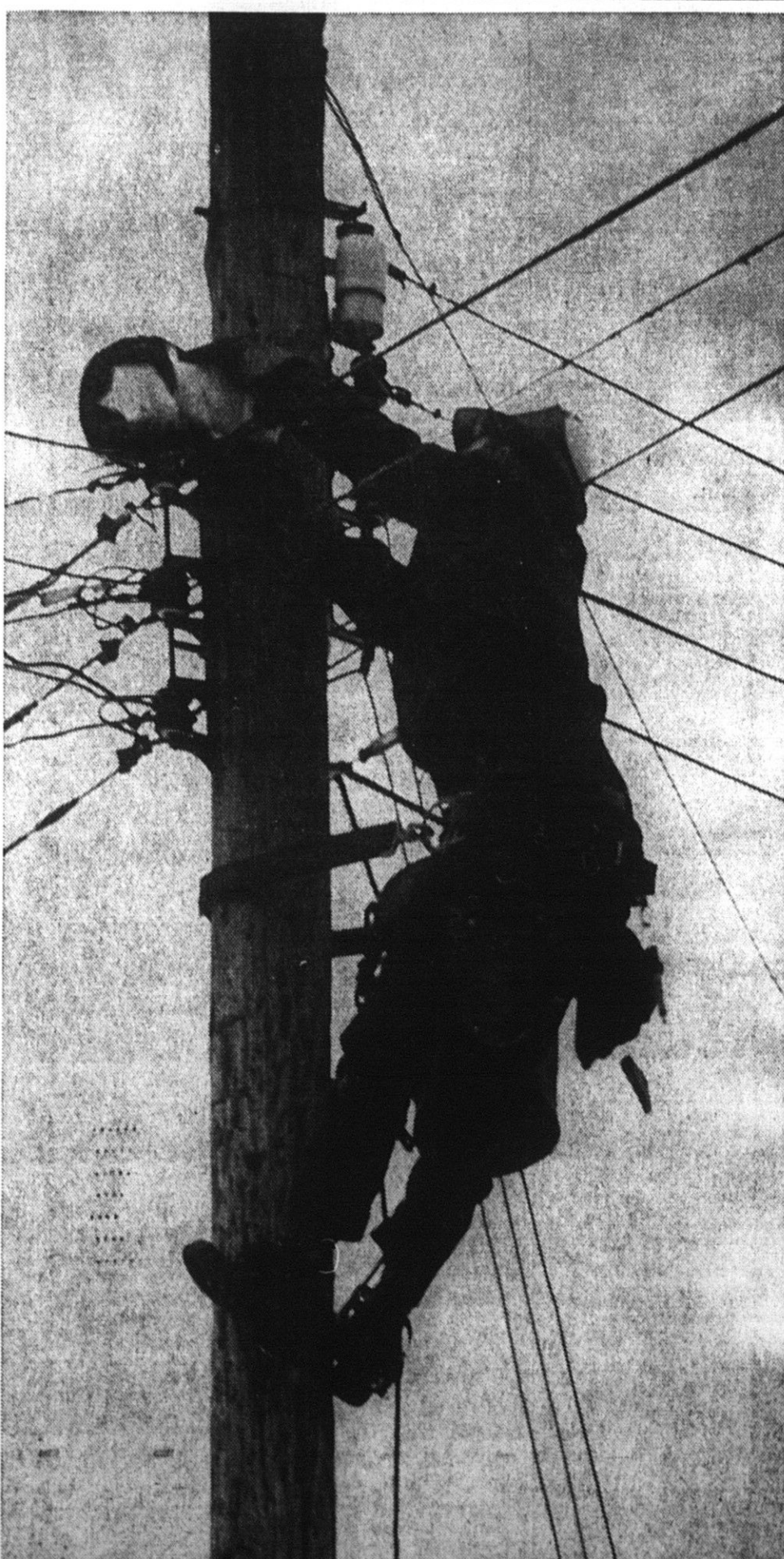

MUSKEGON — Holland's basketball team was colder than yesterday's left over potatoes, as they went down to its third straight defeat, 53-48 at the hands of Mona Shores here Friday evening in the season finale.

The Dutch could only find the handle for 17 field goals out of 65 attempts for a frigid 26 per cent clip. Mona Shores wasn't that much better off, as they netted 22 of 54 shots for 40 per cent.

Holland ended the regular season with a disappointing 5-11 record. It was the first regular season losing year for a Coach Don Piersma squad. Mona Shores will take its 9-7 mark into Class A District play next week.

It was also the first time that a Coach Piersma unit hasn't tallied at least 50 or more

points in a game. "We just couldn't hit to save our lives," said Piersma. "If you can't make the baskets, you're not going to win."

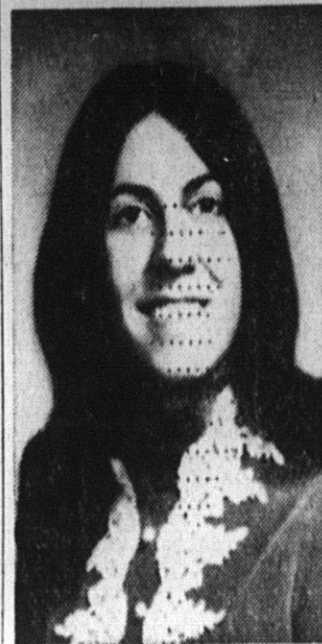

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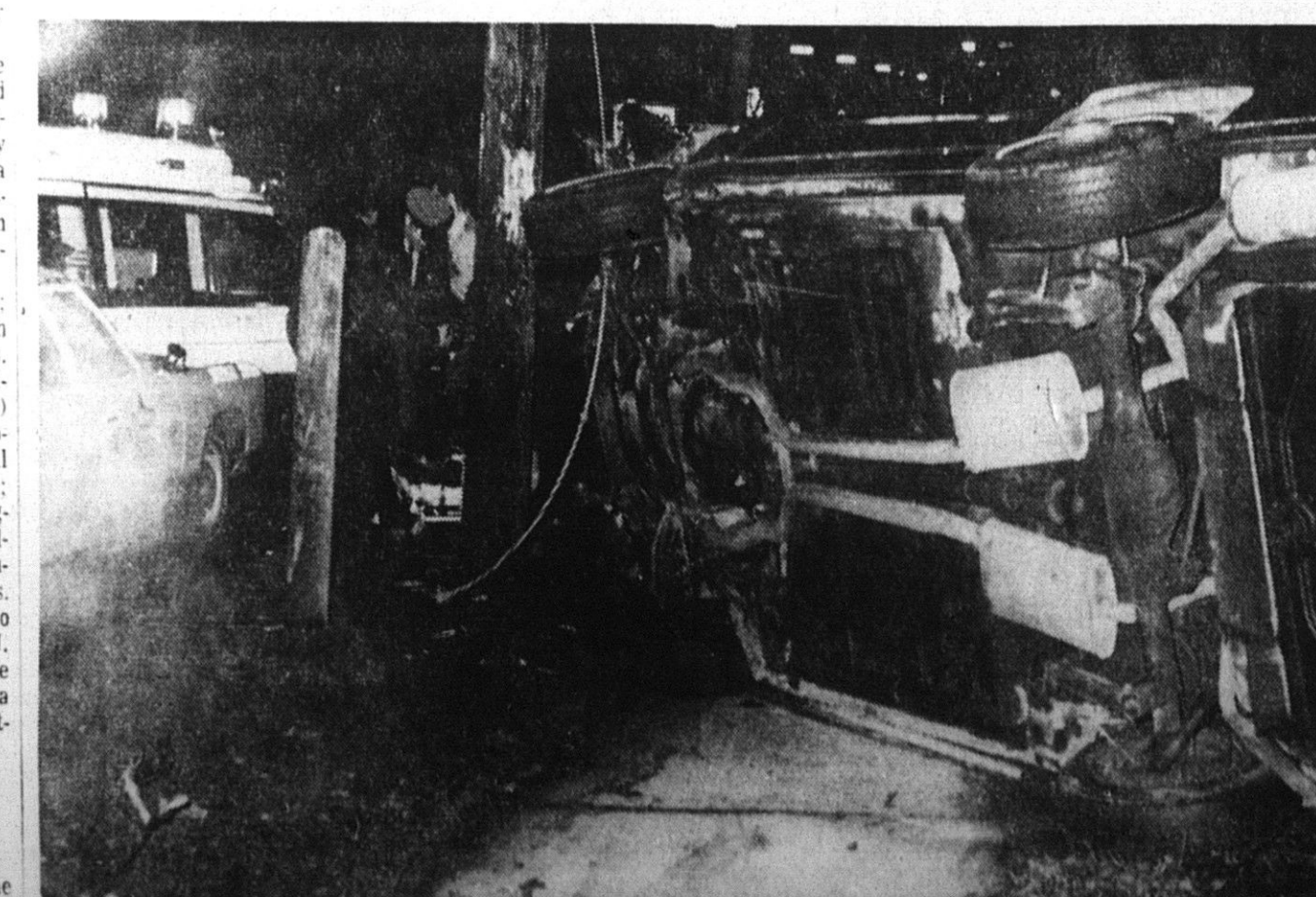
