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## Health Unit Seeks Funds In Allegan

ALLEGAN — Members of the Allegan county board of supervisors Wednesday heard spokesmen for a large delegation of Fennville area parents call for a county-wide tuberculosis testing program.

Their request was prompted by the reporting of one diagnosed case of tuberculosis in the Fennville schools and one suspected case in Pullman.

Health department officials who submitted a request for a supplemental appropriation of \$33,597, mostly to provide for an increase in personnel—indicated the department intended to proceed with its plan to start next Monday on a testing program for all county students in the first, fifth and ninth grades.

Director Girard Veenschoten, M.D., indicated the department's ability to carry out this program — and maintain other health department services at the same time — would be dependent upon the board's approval of the request for additional funds.

Supervisors will be returning for an extra session on Friday when they expect to have a recommendation on the request from health, salaries and finance members.

The board did solve one ticklish problem on Wednesday, the matter of the chairmanship for the fiscal year which starts in April. In past years the chairmanship was awarded on the basis of seniority. This year, however, six members with equal seniority were in line for the post, Harvey Immink, of Heath; Philip Quade, of Saugatuck; Grover Grigsby of Trowbridge; Howard Busfield, of Cheshire; Bernard Miller, of Monterey, and M. C. Klintworth, of Otsego.

Immink withdrew his name from consideration, indicating he had already submitted his resignation to his township board and was only waiting for a successor to be appointed. Klintworth also indicated he did not wish to be considered.

In the past, when two persons of equal seniority were up for the chairmanship, the decision usually was made by a flip of a coin. This time, however, members decided to ballot rather than choose a chairman by lot. Philip Quade, veteran township supervisor was chosen in this way and his election as chairman will become official at the April session.

Board members unanimously approved a resolution urging the legislature to postpone for one year the effective date of Michigan's new workmen's compensation law which would extend its coverage to all farmers. Paul Bayless, Fennville supervisor, offered the resolution, pointing out that the added expense would put Michigan farmers and fruit growers at a competitive disadvantage in the national market. At present the law would take effect this May. Bayless' resolution called for postponement until May, 1967.

After voting to approve a request from Sheriff Robert Whitcomb for automatic transmissions for new police cars, the board accepted the low bid of Joslin Ford, of Otsego, for three new sedans, specially equipped for police work, at a net cost to the county of \$3,820.92, including trade-ins.

The local winners will advance to the district contest to be held March 26 at Muskegon High School. They will face students from Muskegon, Muskegon Catholic Central and Holland Christian High School.

## Registrations For Boats Are Available Here

Boat owners may now obtain registrations at the Holland license bureau at 87 West Eighth St., bureau manager Frances Johnson said Wednesday.

Starting this year persons no longer need to write to the Secretary of State's office in Lansing to obtain the boat registrations. The registration fee is \$3.

Persons receiving registrations will get a yellow sticker, good for three years. The previous three-year sticker was white.

Mrs. Johnson said the large MC number on the boat remains the same. Persons applying for registration must bring along the MC number.

Persons who don't have an MC number, the number on the side of Holland area boats, will be issued a number at the license bureau when they obtain their registration, Mrs. Johnson said.

All boats with motors, regardless of size, must be registered, Mrs. Johnson said. All boats, motor or sail, 16 feet and longer must also have a license plate. These plates can be obtained at the Holland office.

Hours at the Holland office are 9 a.m. to 12 noon and 1:30 to 5 p.m., daily. The office is closed Wednesday and Saturday afternoon.


## Christian Service Guild Meets at Rose Park

## Mike Lawson Wins LMAC Scoring Title

Mike Lawson, Holland High's 6'10" senior center, won the LMAC scoring championship with 208 points, official LMAC statistics compiled by Don Badcon of Grand Haven showed today.

Lawson scored 79 baskets and 50 free throws in 10 games for a 20.8 average. He edged out David Day of Muskegon Heights by two points. Day was second with 206 points and a 20.6 average on 82 baskets and 42 free throws.

Larry Pete, Holland senior, was fourth with an 18-point average on 67 baskets and 46 free throws for 180 points. Ellis Hull of Benton Harbor was third with 191 points and a 19.1 average.

Steve Millard of Holland took eighth place with a 16.3 average. He scored 61 baskets, 41 free throws for 163 points. Charles Beck of Benton Harbor was fifth with 174 points followed by Ralph Houston of Muskegon Heights with 167 and Dave Boykin of Grand Haven with 166.

Rounding out the top ten were Pat McManus of Traverse City and Willie Harris of Muskegon. Both had 162 points.

Lawson's average was the lowest for a scoring champion since Sam Moore won it in 1960-61 with 20.4 in five games. The record is 312 points and a 31.2 average for L. C. Bowen of Benton Harbor in 1965-66 when he was a junior.

Pete's 39 points against Muskegon Heights was the individual high in LMAC games. Pete also had a 35-point effort against Traverse City while Lawson scored 37 against Grand Haven and Day 34 against the Bucs.

Lawson was eighth in league scoring last year with a 12.9 average and Day was seventh last year with a 13-point average.

Muskegon Heights had the top offense in the league with an 88.6 average but considerably off the pace of Benton Harbor last season of 98.8.

Muskegon Heights was also best on defense with a 66.1 average while Benton Harbor was 61.1 last year. Holland, second place finishers to the Heights, was second on offense and defense. The Dutch had an 84.5 offensive mark and a 67.1 defensive average.

GRAND HAVEN — Petitions bearing more than 300 names of electors in the Coopersville area and in Polkton township seeking incorporation of the area as a home-rule city were filed today with Ottawa county clerk Harris Nieuwma.

One petition requests the Secretary of State's office conduct a census in the area involved to ascertain whether there are 2,000 or more residents in the area.

If the census proves there is sufficient population, the other petition submitted will be referred to the Ottawa County Board of Supervisors on April 12 requesting an election in the area the last week in May.

The area described in the petition includes the present incorporated village of Coopersville and an area surrounding the village including parts of sections 13 through 15 and 22 through 27 in the eastern part of Polkton township.

The proposed area is bounded on the north by a line one-half mile north of Cleveland Ave., on the south by I-96, on the west by 68th Ave., and on the east by the township line along 48th Ave.

## Pushaw Seeks Nomination For Senate

GRAND HAVEN — David Pushaw, 39, Grand Haven, Wednesday announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination as state senator for the 23rd district which covers Ottawa, Allegan and Van Buren counties and one township in Barry.

The 23rd district seat currently is held by Sen. Harold R. Volkema of Holland who was elected when the state was reapportioned two years ago. Volkema has not announced whether he will seek reelection.

Pushaw, married and father of six children, is chief speech therapist for the Ottawa Area Intermediate School District and administers the speech therapy program in schools all over the county. He currently is a member of Grand Haven City Council, serving three years.

He holds an A.B. degree in education from Michigan State University and a masters degree in administration from the University of Michigan. He is a member of the Methodist Church in Grand Haven and currently is county chairman for Michigan Week.

Pushaw announced his candidacy "after careful consideration coupled with a great deal of urging by many, many people," he said, "I feel the challenge of representative government is vital and wish to offer the citizens of the 23rd district a clear choice of candidates."

"Having served the Republican party for many years, I intend to work as hard as I can in a grassroots campaign in order to meet and know the people in the 23rd district. It will be an uphill fight but I am in to stay."


**James Malcolm Plans Summer Drama Program**

## Sculptor Finds New Future Here

Arvid Knoppel, a well-known Swedish sculptor, has found a new lease on life during a social visit in Holland with his son, Curt, of 126 East 35th St.

The elder Knoppel, who is 74, had been suffering for several years from a shoulder ailment, complicated by an auto accident in Sweden last November, and had begun to fear for his continued career in art.

The ailment had made it impossible for Knoppel to work, and this winter he decided to leave his studio and travel to Holland, Mich., to visit his son.

During his stay in Holland, Knoppel was treated by a Fruitport osteopath and his shoulder responded to the treatment. Since that he has begun working on his art again with renewed and youthful vigor.

Inspired by the gratitude he felt for the cure of his shoulder ailment, Knoppel, who has made a special practice of sculpting animals, got to work and made a clay model of a pair of fighting wolverines, in honor of the state in which he found added years of art.

Since the wolverine has become an extinct animal in Michigan, Knoppel said he would like to give back to the people of Michigan their state animal.

The statue which Knoppel envisions would be cast in bronze and be slightly larger than life size. On a six-foot long, four-foot high base, it would stand in the center of an 18-foot water-filled basin.

Knoppel owns a 200-acre wildlife preserve about 10 miles outside of Arvika, Sweden, near the border with Norway, and has two wolverines among many other animals. He has been able to observe their habits and has made numerous drawings and sketches of the wolverines.

Knoppel will, after additional study of the wolverines, make a full-size model in clay of the statue, followed by plaster casts which would be shipped to the United States where the actual bronze statue would be cast, possibly in Detroit.

The completed statue will weigh several tons. Cost of such a project is estimated at \$50,000 to \$75,000.

Knoppel believes his statue, born of gratitude, would make a fitting monument for the state of Michigan.

Knoppel's career in art spans the years from World War I to the present time. Monuments by him stand in most major cities in Sweden and his work is exhib-

## Grand Haven Lets Bids on New Library

GRAND HAVEN—City Council has awarded a \$1,173,000 contract to Erhardt Construction Co. of Grand Rapids to construct the new cultural complex across from Central Park.

The bid price is about 15 percent higher than the estimated cost which could amount to \$1,000,000, but Paul A. Johnson, president of the Loutit Foundation, has assured Council that the foundation would take care of added costs in addition to its original donation.

Broken down, the bid, lowest of three, lists construction of the Community Building at \$510,000 and Loutit Library at \$663,000.

The property across from Central Park will be conveyed this week from the Loutit Foundation to the city of Grand Haven.

The city's share is \$400,000, of which \$200,000 was received in gifts and pledges and another \$200,000 financed by a bond issue approved by voters last November.

ZEELAND — City Council Monday unanimously approved the bid of Bouwens and Sons Construction Co. of \$33,600 for renovation of City Hall.

The bids were opened at the Feb. 21 council meeting, and action on them was tabled until Monday's meeting.

The renovation include expanding the police department into the area of the City Hall garage, expanding the large office on the north side of the building and addition of several things to improve the fire safety of the building.

A drivers' licensing bureau and office space for police and Civil Defense will be built in the area of the garage. The work includes knocking out the wall separating the garage from the present police quarters, raising the floor of the garage and replacing the garage door with a pedestrian entrance.

Work on the renovations will begin in 10 days and is scheduled for completion in 180 days.

The council also appointed City Clerk Leon Van Harn to work on a census of the population in the newly annexed areas of the city.

It was announced that Zeeland will exchange mayors with Allegan for the statewide mayor exchange day in May.

He said complaints on cars partially dismantled or inoperable should be directed to his office in City Hall.



## Van Wieren Named Hope's Most Valuable

Clare Van Wieren, Hope College senior from Holland, has been named Hope's most valuable basketball player, Coach Russ De Vette announced today.

This is the second straight season the 6'3" ex - Holland Christian player has been named MVP. De Vette said Van Wieren's selection was unanimous by his teammates.

Van Wieren now enters competition for the Randall C. Bosch of Holland MIAA MVP award. Bosch, president of the Western Machine Tool Works, has been presenting the gold, diamond - studded basketball award since 1947. He has presented a similar football award since 1938.

Serving as Hope's captain for two seasons, Van Wieren led the Flying Dutchmen to the MIAA crown last season and to a second place finish this year. Van Wieren was an all-MIAA selection last season.

He was Hope's leading scorer for the past two seasons, scoring 491 points this season in Hope's 13-9 season and 453 last year. Van Wieren scored a total of 1,524 points in four seasons to be fifth in Hope's all-time scorers.

Van Wieren also has the unique distinction of starting every game he played in college. This totaled 88 straight, starting with Carroll College game Dec. 1, 1962 through the

Calvin game last Saturday.

His highest single game output this season was 35 against Wheaton while his MIAA high was 31 against Alma. He finished second in MIAA scoring this season with 251 points behind Calvin's Bill De Horn, who meshed 254. Van Wieren won the league scoring title last year with 255 points.

Van Wieren's overall scoring average was 22.7 and his MIAA mark was 20.1. He also averaged nine rebounds a game.

De Vette praised Van Wieren's all-around ability, his shooting and scoring and hustle on defense. He noted his good adjustment in shooting and being able to adjust while in the act of shooting.

Most of Van Wieren's baskets have been on turnabout jumpers or driving layups. Because of his ability to adjust while shooting, he has come with some uncanny baskets and is hard to defense.

"He has the ability to score from any position and it's hard to block his shots without fouling him," De Vette said. Commenting on his rebounding, De Vette noted, "Clare isn't a leaper but gets his rebounds because of position and desire."

De Vette hung the tag of "Mr. Consistency" on Van Wieren and this title fit as Van Wieren consistently hit his average.

Married to the former Joan Ter Haar, the Van Wierens have a son, Christopher, who was 17 months old on Feb. 19 when Clare made his final Hope home basketball appearance. The youngster attended the game.

Van Wieren's brother, Glenn, was an all-MIAA player and Hope's most valuable player in 1964. Glenn is now teaching and coaching in Grand Haven.



## Hope Orchestra Features Piano By Dr. Kooiker

Dr. Anthony Kooiker, professor of piano at Hope College will be featured soloist with the Hope College Orchestra on Thursday evening at 8:15 p.m. in Dimmet Memorial Chapel.

An appealing display of unique tone colors, brought out by the use of celeste, harp, and various percussion instruments, brings the program to a close in Rossini's "Soiree Musicale" arranged by Benjamin Britten.

Dr. Rider says the orchestra will present a pair of children's concerts for the Holland area children on Friday afternoon, March 25, in Holland High School Auditorium.

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## THE JAPANESE PEACE CORPS

Here are some excerpts from a Japanese report on the beginning of its peace corps activities in a number of countries. The stress it places on the need for peaceful cooperation and assistance is enheartening in a world of so much competition and war:

"Five members of the Japanese Overseas Cooperation Volunteers left Japan for Laos on December 24 as a first team under a new program of economic cooperation. In the near future, 26 additional volunteers will leave for assignments in various Asian countries. The purpose of the Japanese Overseas Cooperation Volunteers program is to cooperate in the social and economic development of the countries concerned by sending young Japanese men and women equipped with the required technical knowledge or skills to live and work with the local inhabitants.

"The first group of 31 volunteers, averaging 25 years of age and including five women, have all received pre-assignment training in English and other languages, training in physical conditioning and the necessary technical skills. They all are eager to begin their tasks and to contribute their services to the people of their assigned countries. The ultimate goal is the promotion of friendship and mutual understanding between Japan and these countries.

"It is now agreed that it is imperative for the advanced nations of the world to provide assistance and cooperation to developing countries in agriculture, social welfare, hygiene and education in order to bring about a better life for all people of the world.

"The idea of dispatching Japanese young men and women overseas to cooperate in the growth of developing nations has been advocated by youth organizations in Japan for quite some time. The Japanese Government approved the dispatch of volunteers last spring after carefully considering the various conditions in the countries where the volunteers would be assigned.

"The Japanese Overseas Cooperation Volunteers program is a government project agreed on between the Japanese Government and the governments of the countries concerned. The principal countries to which the volunteers will be dispatched are those of Asia and Africa.

"The major characteristic of the program is that it is not merely giving aid or assistance but rather is rendering service through which cooperation is provided to the countries where the volunteers are assigned. In addition, the volunteers are not acting as leaders or supervisors nor are they conducting any research or investigations. Rather, they will eat and live in the homes of the local inhabitants, speak the local language and contribute in service to the development of the region to which they are assigned."

The word seems to be getting around that cooperation is at least as important as competition, that assistance is as noble as conquest. It's a small but we hope a real step toward a peaceful world.

## Sunday School Lesson

Man's Relationship with Others  
Ephesians 4:25-32;  
James 2:8-10, 14-17  
By C. P. Dame

The person who becomes conscious of his obligation to God also becomes conscious of his relationship and obligations to his fellow men. To live with others beneficially is the Christian's duty.

I. Christianity has high standards. Many first century Christians came from paganism. The Christian faith called for a new kind of life. It still does. And that is why it is necessary to call attention to the Christian virtues.

Lying is wrong, truth is commanded. We can lie with our lips, with our silence too and with our facial expressions and conduct. Truth is becoming Christians for they are all members of one another — members of one body. Truthfulness is necessary in the church and in society. "Be ye angry and sin not."

We need angry Christians — people who are angry with the liquor trade, with foul literature, with crookedness in politics and with all manner of evils. Jesus got angry, but He sinned not. When a man stays angry he gives place to the devil and that is why quarrels should be settled before sunset.

"Let him that stole steal no more" — these words reveal that there were former thieves in the Ephesian Church. Thievery was common in the Orient, it still is we are told, and getting to be more common in America. Employees steal millions of dollars from employers. Some people steal from God. Instead of stealing work, "let him labor working with his own hands the thing which is good."

Some kinds of work are unbecoming a Christian. Any kind of honorable work is praiseworthy. Why work? In order to get more luxuries and creature comforts? No, work in order to give.

"Let no corrupt communication proceed out of your mouth" so wrote Paul. Foul language is common. We are told that modern novels, for the most part, are filthy. How much better it is to use words to encourage and build. Life is short. Why give place to bitterness, wrath, anger, clamor, evil speaking and malice — these things must be put away. And it is Christ-like to be forgiving if we have been forgiven.

II. Faith must express itself in good works. James reminds us of the royal law — the law that comes from God — which commands us to love our neighbor as ourselves. James teaches that to break any part of God's law makes one a lawbreaker. The whole law sets forth the will of God.

To break any law means to disregard God who is the author of it. The person who shows disrespect of persons violates God's law of love. We all need to guard against making more fuss about a rule of the church or about some petty habit than about keeping love supreme in heart and life.

Faith is important but good works are also important. We are saved by faith through grace but this faith must express itself in good works. Faith is like the roots of the plant, good works like the flower that blooms and blesses. We are living in a time when much emphasis is placed upon action.

## Red Cross Plans Area Fund Drive

With the month of March proclaimed as Red Cross month throughout the nation, the Ottawa county Red Cross chapter has organized its annual Red Cross fund drive with Dale Van Lente of Holland as county chairman.

Since the majority of Ottawa county residents have contributed to Red Cross last fall through the various United Fund campaigns, the drive is organized for those areas not covered by United Fund campaigns.

A total of \$52,200 has been contributed through the fall campaigns and the remainder of the Red Cross budget of \$9,761 is to be raised through March to round out the total county budget.

That area of Holland city lying within Allegan county is included in the Ottawa Red Cross services.

Appointment of Van Lente as county fund drive chairman was announced by Harold Langejans, of Holland, county Red Cross chairman.

County Chairman Langejans said heavy expenditures for victims of Hurricane Betsy, the greatly increased services to the military in Viet Nam and the normal expansion of activities make it essential that the Ottawa chapter and every chapter go over the top in fund campaigns.

In Ottawa, funds will be used to defray costs of chapter services and to support nationwide and worldwide programs such as service to the armed forces, disaster service and the blood program.

Last year, Ottawa county served 10,841 families in direct services. These involved 401 active servicemen in such services as emergency leaves, birth and death notices, etc.; 837 veterans in government claims work, benefits, etc.; 207 civilians in various items of emergency nature; 43 families in disasters such as burnouts; 658 families in the blood program using 2,842 units of blood (ranging from 1 to 45 pints) which at the cost of \$25 a unit would equal \$71,060 or more than the entire county Red Cross budget.

In the blood program, 84 registered nurses gave free service countywide in blood clinics, and 2,942 persons provided voluntary service in staffing clinics.

In the swimming program, 3,564 children learned swim skills. More than 800 persons were given other types of safety service instruction.


## Mrs. Peter Roossien Succumbs in Muskegon

She was a former school teacher from Kansas City, Mo. where she had taught for 35 years.


She attended the Second Reformed Church in Grand Haven. The former Mrs. Olive Cunningham was married in 1954 to Roossien.

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

"Since the home is the most important element," he told his audience, "the design in public area should direct the eye to the front door. Broad expanses of lawn should be used wherever possible as the unifying element."

His sketches of how trees could be used for shading, framing, screening disturbing angles and for balancing were most informative. He suggested that trees, shrubs and plants be selected in a backward process, the requirements of basic design principles to be considered first and then the type be chosen to fit those requirements.

In developing the outdoor living area which should be a continuation of the home he felt the most important factor to consider was that this was an area where people should be comfortable. There should be proper division of space and privacy.

## Court Mulls Cheff Appeal

WASHINGTON — The appeal of Paul T. Cheff, former president of the Holland (Mich.) Furnace Co., was taken under advisement Thursday by the U.S. Supreme Court.

Cheff drew six months in jail after the 7th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Chicago found he had willfully violated its 1959 order forbidding certain sales practices defined as fraudulent by the Federal Trade Commission.

Cheff's attorney, Joseph E. Casey of Washington, argued that in cases arising in administrative agencies, contempt, if any, is civil rather than criminal.

Congress in legislating for these agencies knew it was dealing "with the business life of America" and not setting up a "gestapo," Casey said.

He argued further that imposition of a six months sentence after denial of a jury trial violated the constitution's guarantee of the right to trial by jury.

Nathan Lewin, assistant to the solicitor general, argued that contempt historically has not been considered a crime in these constitutional terms.

## Hope Receives DeWitt Grant for Harpsichord


Hope College has received a gift of \$2,700 from the De Witt Foundation of Zeeland for the purchase of a harpsichord.





## District May Have Extra Judge Soon

GRAND HAVEN — The 20th judicial circuit of Michigan covering Allegan and Ottawa counties may soon have two judges instead of one.

Judge Raymond L. Smith of Holland who is completing his third six-year term this year will be a candidate for reelection in the November election, but it has not been determined how the district will be affected by proposed changes.

In this case, Judge Smith has filed an "affidavit of candidacy" with the Secretary of State's office in Lansing, seeking a fourth term. No other judge has served more than three terms in the Ottawa-Allegan circuit.


Legislators from the two counties recently submitted a bill that would divide the circuit, with Ottawa county becoming the 20th circuit and Allegan the 43rd.

More recently, a Senate bill called for the two-county circuit remaining as it is but to add another judge.

The State Supreme Court has recommended the latter course, and the bill which also includes additional judges for five other circuits has been advanced to final debate. The bill would provide one new circuit judge in Oakland, Genesee, Kent, Washtenaw, Monroe, and Allegan-Ottawa circuits.

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
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
