## Unity Dumps Christian From Tourney

HUDSONVILLE — Hudsonville Unity Christian used a strong first quarter Friday night to knock Holland Christian out of the state Class B basketball tournament, as the Crusaders chalked up an 83-74 triumph. By virtue of their win, Unity took the rubber game between the teams, and went home with the District No. 85 championship.

The Crusaders' road to the crown was a tough one, as they first had to go overtime to defeat Hudsonville, then had to down defending champion Jenison, before meeting the Maroons, who had won 10 of their last 11 games.

After Ray Schrottenboer's basket tied the game at 3-3, Unity racked up 12 straight points and 19 to four for the Maroons to take a 22-7 lead, which they maintained at the end of the quarter 26-11. Big Mark Veenstra, Unity's junior All-State candidate, scored 12 points in the first period, including 10 of his team's first 15.

The Maroons, meanwhile were ice cold from the floor, hitting on only three of 19 shots for 16 per cent. Dave Mulder carded two buckets and six of Christian's 11 points.

Unity was never seriously threatened in the game, and six times in the second period held 18-point bulges, as seven players scored in the quarter, paced by Dean Van Vugt's six counters. The Maroons continued to have trouble hitting, with the exception of Tom Klaasen, who canned four long bombs, trying to spark his team in a comeback effort. Unity still led by a 45-28 score at the half.

Christian shot 24 per cent in the half compared to 43 per cent for the Crusaders. Unity held a 22-21 edge in rebounds and had six turnovers compared to 10 for Holland.

The Maroons came out in the second half a fired-up and determined club, and for a while it looked as though they might pull the game out.

Chuck Visser hit a bucket, Schrottenboer a free throw followed by buckets by Visser, Steve Vogelzang, Klaasen, Vogelzang and Dan Plasman, which were sandwiched between three Unity baskets, to narrow the margin to 51-41 with 4:49 left in the third quarter. The period ended with the score 62-49.

Van Vugt's six points early in the final quarter pulled the Crusaders out of danger and they continued to their biggest lead of the game, 79-59, with 4:24 left. Then with Plasman starting to connect, Christian outscored Unity 15-4 for the final nine - point difference. Plasman scored 12 of his 21 points in the last period, while Veenstra added eight to his game-high total of 29.

Klaasen hit for 20 points for his season high, while Vogelzang and Visser each contributed 10. Mulder and Schrottenboer turned in good floor games with their hustle and aggressive play as did Rick Smith, who has been called upon game after game to spell his teammates, both at forward and guard, and has consistently turned in fine performances.

Van Vugt aided Unity's cause with 17 points, Mike Kamps garnered 14 and Greg Aten 12. For the game Unity made 30 baskets on 77 shots for 39 per cent. This was hurt by 23 per cent in the fourth quarter. Christian was 27 of 86 for 31 per cent, which was aided by 53 per cent in the third quarter.

The Maroons were guilty of only one turnover in the second half and 11 for the game, while the Crusaders ended with 16. Unity edged the Maroons on the boards, 45-39, as Veenstra led with 20. Visser with 10 and Vogelzang with nine were the top rebounders for Christian.

The Maroons end the season with a 12-8 record, and a three-year mark under Coach Elmer Ribbens of 43 wins and 19 losses for a 69 winning percentage.

Unity, with a 17-4 record, will play Thursday in the Regionals held in the L.C. Walker Arena in Muskegon.

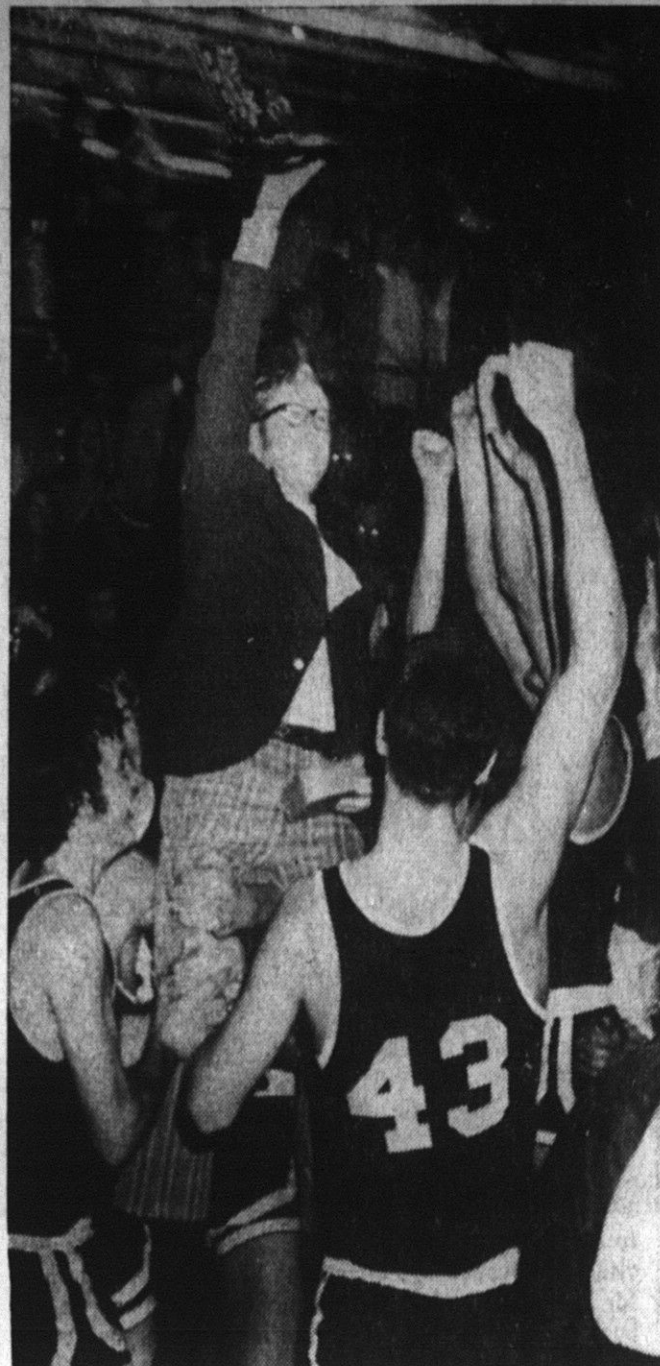

## Saugatuck Beats Hustling Vikings For Class D Title

KENOWA HILLS — Saugatuck put an end to St. Augustine's misery here Friday night. The Indians closed out one of those seasons for the Vikings by taking a 72-51 victory to wrap up the Class D District basketball championship.

St. Augustine ended the season at 0-19 but did turn in an outstanding game in losing to the Indians, who have only lost six times in 20 outings.

It wasn't an extra-sharp performance by the Indians but it was good enough to send them to the Regionals next Friday at Big Rapids against Lake City. The hustling Vikings of first year mentor Sam Morehead surprised the Indians by holding a 15-14 first period lead and were only down by two points, 51-49 with 5:48 remaining in the game and had possession of the ball. A Vikings turnover gave Saugatuck the momentum they needed, as they started to run away from St. Augustine from that point on.

"We gave them a scare and I can't say enough about the way the fellows played tonight," said Morehead after the contest. "The kids ran our game plan to perfection and have nothing to be ashamed of in losing to those guys."

Guards Tom Kaput and Dan King of St. Augustine were as deadly shooters throughout the first three periods, as they canned basket after basket from long range out to the delight of its huge following.

It was hard to believe that the Vikings haven't won any games after the way they performed against the Indians.

"Let's give St. A credit because they did a great job against us and I'm glad to get the victory," stated Coach Wayne Fries of the Indians.

Saugatuck led at the intermission, 33-30 and at the end of three periods, 51-45.

The No. 15 was the magic figure for the Vikings, as they netted that total throughout the first three quarters. However,

they only scored six markers in the final period while Saugatuck was running in full stride with 21 counters.

Junior guard Dave Mocini led the Indians scoring parade with 19 points while senior guard Dave Demerest added 17 and Rick Switzer 15. Kaput and King registered 17 and 14 markers in that order for the Vikings while Pat Sexton added nine.

Saugatuck was charged with 21 miscues while St. Augustine had 15.

## Civil Defense Teaches First Aid Classes

ZEELAND — In accordance with the Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970, the Zeeland and Holland Civil Defense departments and Holland Red Cross are sponsoring first aid courses for key men in industries in the Zeeland area.

Persons involved with the program are Glen Timmer, Ottawa County Civil Defense Director; Don R. Vos, Zeeland Civil Defense Director; Howard Johnson, personnel director of Herman Miller Inc., representing the company which started the program. Instructors are Mrs. Claribel Dorgelo and John Klingenberg.

The act passed by Congress is to assure safe and healthful working conditions for working men and women, and the law stipulates that first aid trained personnel must be on the work site if no infirmary, clinic or hospital is in near proximity. It is the employer's responsibility to see that workers are trained in first aid.

When the act was passed, Herman Miller Inc. of Zeeland started the initial program. Supervisors, foremen and other key men in the industries including women, and employees of the city are now taking the courses.

The courses cover 27 hours in Civil Defense Medical Self Help and Red Cross Advanced First Aid. When the course is completed, students take a written test and are given the Medical Self Help card and certificate and the Red Cross First Aid Card.

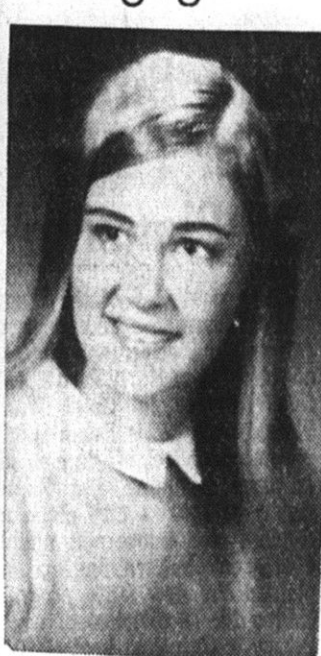
## Miss Walters, 63, Dies in Hospital

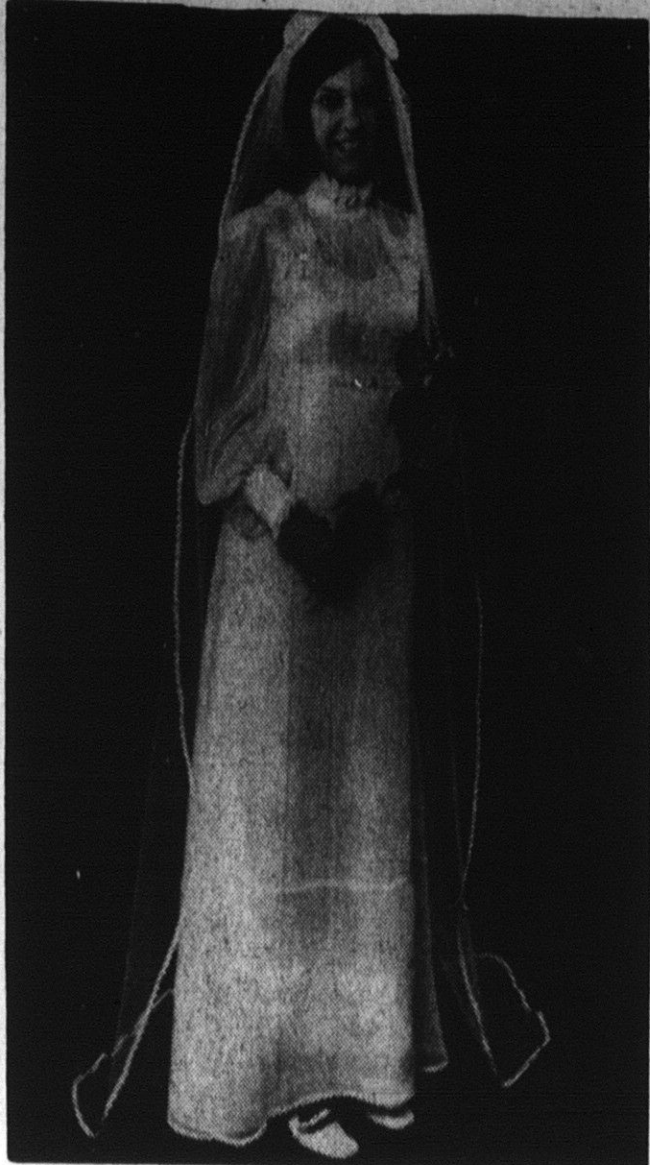

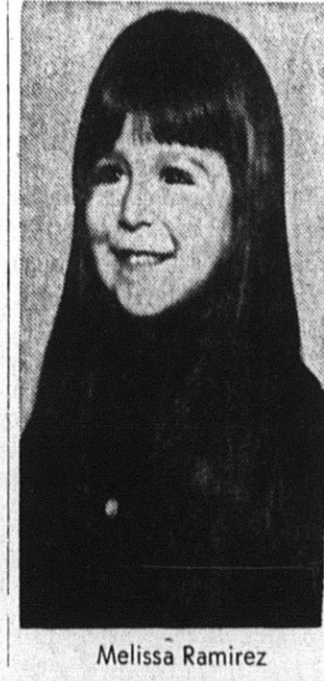

All pictures entered in the contest are being held at Celia's Beauty Shop, 333 College Ave., where parents of the contestants may claim them.

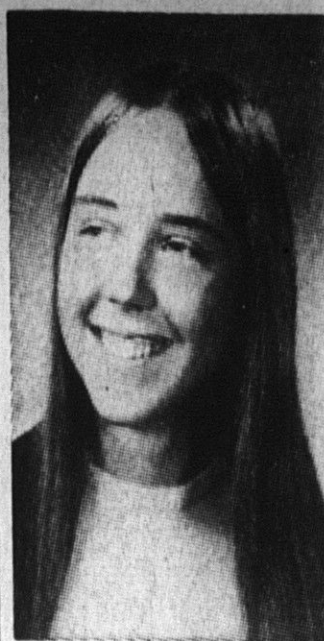

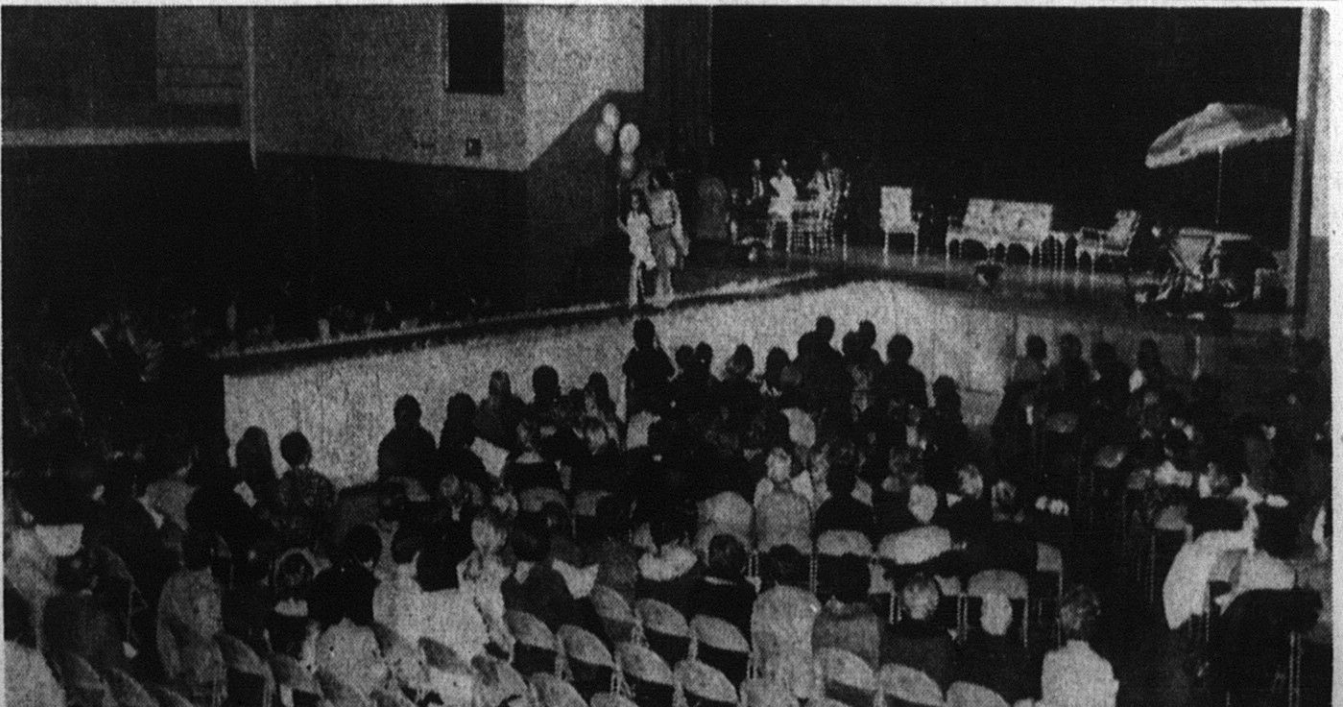

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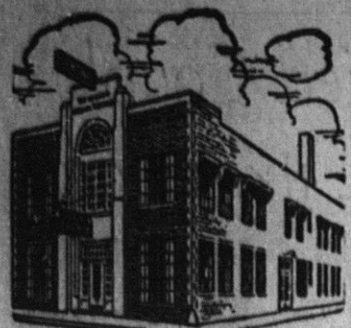
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## IMPROVING OUR DOWNTOWN

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, March 12  
The Spirit Empowers The Church  
Acts 2:1-4, 14-21  
By C. P. Dame

The topic, "The Spirit Empowers the Church," speaks to us of the Person of the Holy Spirit and of an institution, the church. Today we hear much about the Person and the institution. This lesson teaches how the Holy Spirit empowered the members of the early church for their work.

I. According to the Lord's promise the Holy Spirit came upon the early church. Luke wrote two books, his gospel, which tells about the life, death and resurrection of Jesus and the book called Acts which records the growth of the New Testament church. After His resurrection, Jesus spent 40 days teaching the disciples to be His witnesses in all parts of the world. They were to begin at Jerusalem and to wait there until the promised Holy Spirit would come. During this period of waiting they prayed.

"When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place." The Passover, Pentecost, and the Feast of Tabernacles were three great Jewish religious festivals much observed. The word Pentecost means "the fiftieth," the feast fell "50 days from the first Sunday following the Passover" (Lev. 23:15-22)—it was a harvest celebration but later also became associated with the giving of the law at Mt. Sinai.

While the disciples were meeting, "A sound came from heaven like the rush of a mighty wind, and it filled the house," and "there appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire and it sat upon each of them." All were filled with the Holy Spirit and spoke with other tongues, in languages before foreign to them, to the international crowd of people present at the feast. They spoke about the wonderful works of God, namely about the death and the resurrection of Jesus from the dead. The Holy Spirit prepared the disciples to preach the gospel in the languages of the people present.

II. The coming of the Holy Spirit fulfilled an Old Testament prophecy. The miracle attracted a crowd which gave Peter an opportunity to preach and explain. First of all, Peter refuted the charge that the disciples were drunk and then said that the event was in fulfillment of the prophecy of Joel, which foretold a new activity on the part of the Holy Spirit. In the Old Testament time the Holy Spirit prepared certain individuals for special tasks, such as Bezaleel, Ex. 31:3; Othniel, Judges 3:10; Gideon, Judges 6:34, but in the time to come the Spirit would be given to "all flesh," to all believers.

Peter preached about the ministry of Jesus (v. 22), his death, (v. 23), his resurrection, (v. 32) and his lordship. His sermon was scriptural, doctrinal and evangelical and it got results, for people asked, "Brethren, what shall we do?" How often is this question asked in our churches today? Peter had the answer. Does every church give Peter's answer?

## \$125,000 Sought In Damage Suit

GRAND HAVEN — A damage suit for \$125,000 was filed in Circuit Court Thursday in which William Homoly of Muskegon, administrator of the estate of Thomas Homoly, seeks judgments from Imig and Redeker Inc. of Grand Haven, Burton Imig of Grand Haven and Gerald N. Lewis and Gerald E. Lewis of Ottawa county.

Plaintiff claims Thomas Homoly died of injuries received in a traffic accident March 16, 1969 involving cars driven by Burton Imig and Gerald E. Lewis.

Imig was the driver of a car owned by Imig and Redeker Inc. and Homoly was a passenger in a car driven by Gerald E. Lewis and owned by Gerald N. Lewis, according to the complaint.

## Juveniles Selling Items Arrested

Holland police said a series of larcenies and shopliftings, some unreported by merchants, has been cleared with the apprehension of two juvenile boys from the Holland area.

The two boys, aged 14 and 15, were taken into custody Monday after a controlled buy of allegedly stolen items was conducted for investigators.

Police said about \$350 worth of items ranging from clothing to watches, tape players, lighters and radios were recovered.

Police said their investigations continued and said they expected to recover more items. The "buy" was conducted in downtown Holland Monday night and the two were taken into custody a short time later.

## Copies of 'Holland Herald' Now Available in Holland

Copies of the Holland Herald, an Amsterdam magazine printed in English, featuring Holland, Mich., are now available in Holland at the city treasurer's office in City Hall, at Reader's World and at the Netherlands Museum.

A thousand copies have been made available here retailing at 60 cents. A good share of the edition has been turned over to Holland, Mich., on the occasion of its 125th anniversary.

Starting on page 15, the Holland (Michigan) Herald starts out with a general store titled "More Dutch Than the Dutch" highlighting the annual Tulip Time festival with pictures of klompen dancing, town crier Hans Suzenaar and a small picture of the late Lida Rogers who started it all in 1927.

Copy on Holland with some stores on Zealand continue for over 30 pages including four pages of color picture on Tulip Time. There are features on the Miss Holland of 1897, 1947 and of today (a young Lisa Holland of the only family of that name in Holland, Mich.)

There are stories on Windmill Island titled "How the Swan Flew West," a feature on Bill Diekema and his vitamin pills, a laugh story on an old hoax in another newspaper which had not been given local publicity, an abridgement of Marvin C. Lindeman's historical paper in 1947 originally titled "An Outsider Looks at Holland," still regarded as the best of its kind.

There is an insert of a page of the Holland telephone book with a lot of Vans, articles on Hope College, Harry and Chita van Pelt, an article on Bruce van Voorst currently Newsweek bureau chief in Bonn-Berlin, a story on Sue Donnelly, the Dutch Immigrant Society city churches, art stories on Eleanor Van Haisma, John Vander Burgh, Leo Jungblut and Joy Walsb.

Then there are industrial stories on Heinz pickles, Bob De Bruyn's onions, Donnelly Mirrors, Beech-Nut, De Witt's Big Dutchmen, Herman Miller, Lear - Siegler's Home division and many local ads including one of the city of Holland showing Windmill De Zwaan, the drawbridge and the title "The Bridge That's 4,000 Miles Long."

The cover shows a color picture of street scrubbing on Eighth St. with the caption, "So This is America?"

In his editor's letter, Vernon Leonard who visited Holland in 1969 mentions the help of Wilard C. Wichers of the Netherlands Information Service and his wife Nell.

Leonard also cabled congratulations to Holland Feb. 7 on the occasion of the city's 125th anniversary.

The shipment to Holland was delayed at some point but a cablegram from Wichers Monday traced the waylaid magazines. For two weeks the Holland issues have been aboard KLM planes and available in many different part of the world. Wichers has been receiving letters from widely separated points commenting on the issue.

## Century Club Hears Talk On Continental Drift

The geological sciences are having a renaissance. Dr. James Cotter Tharin of Hope College told Century Club members and guests at their monthly meeting Monday night in the De Witt Cultural Center on Hope campus.

All data concerning the origins of the earth and related subjects must be reevaluated in the light of present studies, he said.

As early as 1620 Sir Francis Bacon noted that the continents of South America and Africa could fit together, and in 1912 this thought was considered by a German geographer, but Dr. Tharin said it was not until after World War II that serious study began on this idea.

He followed this theme of continental drift with a series of slides showing the presence of rocks, common flora and certain similar vetebrates on the east coast of South America and the west coast of Africa.

Diagrams of the mid-Atlantic Ridge which must have been caused by a great outpouring of basaltic lava were significant as were others showing earthquake areas that follow a pattern in the Pacific Ocean. The view of the Gulf of Aden from the air further supports probability of land surfaces drifting apart.

Technology resulting from methods of detecting submarines has been responsible for renewed interest in the subject, the speaker said.

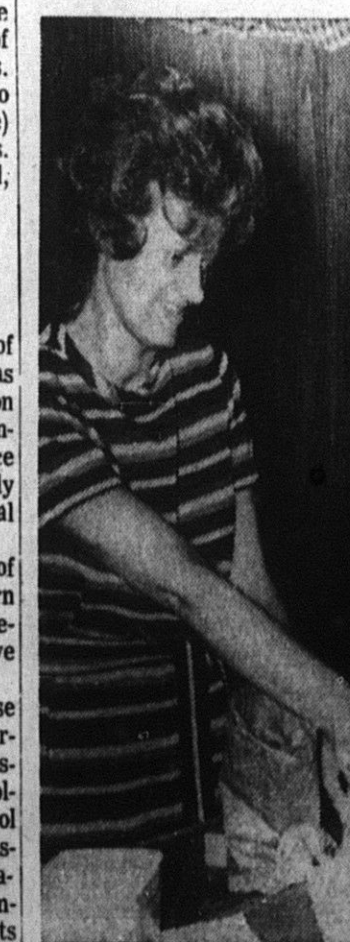
### Small Utility Boiler Explodes at Plant

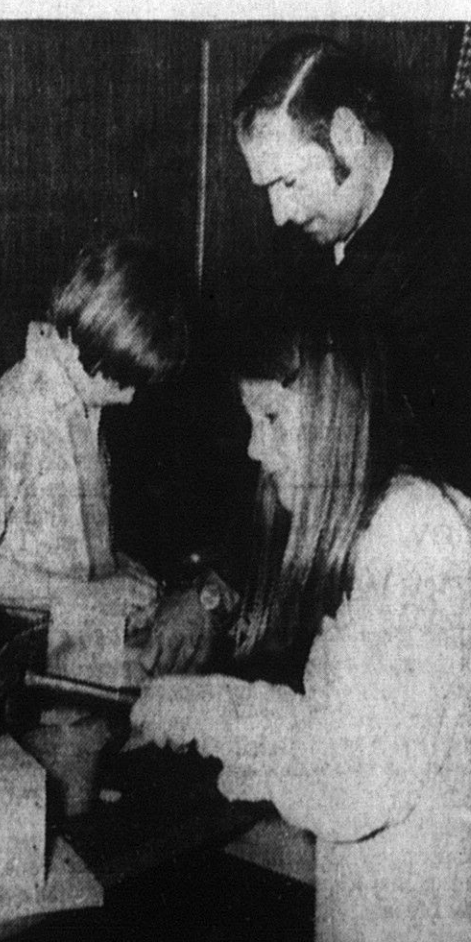

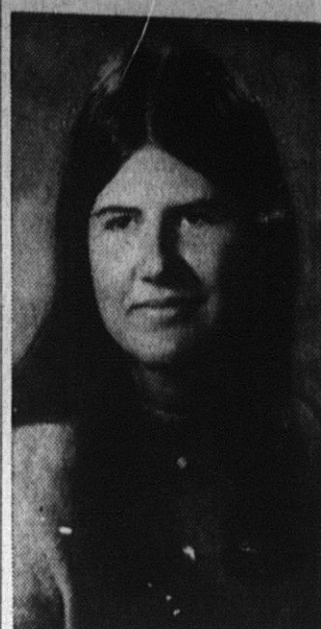

In the junior division, Miller was 11th in the 200-yard individual while Den Herder was ninth in the 200-yard freestyle and 13th in the 100-yard freestyle.

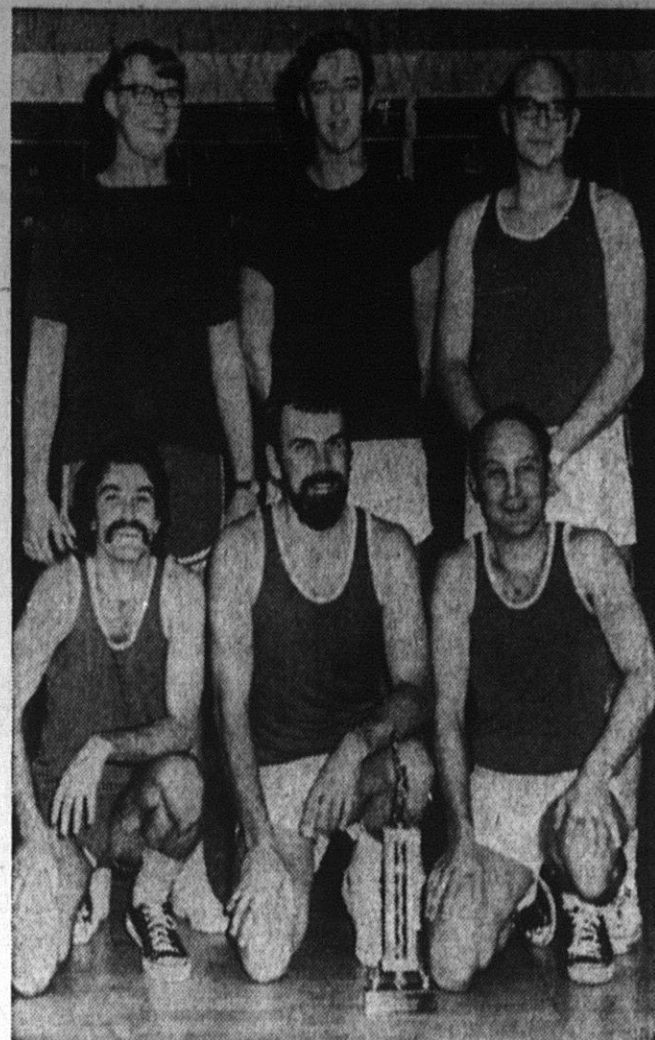

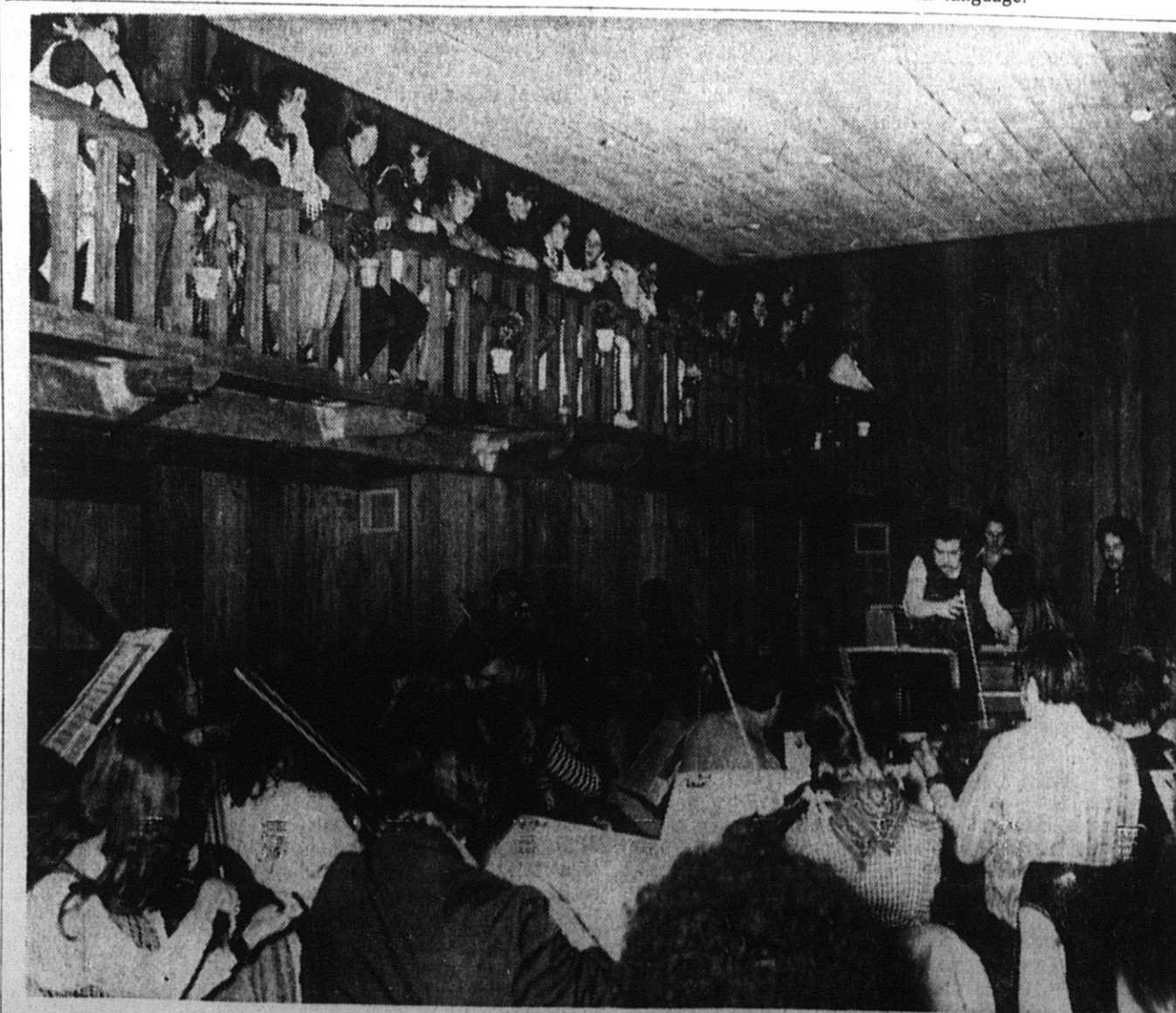

HAMILTON — March madness ended for Hamilton's basketball team here Saturday evening before a packed house, as they were ousted in the State Class C District finals by Fennville 81-64.

The loss was the first of the new year for Coach Tom Bos' Hawkeyes, who until Saturday had won 14 in a row. Hamilton ended the season with a fine 15-5 overall mark while Fennville takes its 11-9 record into Regional action Friday at Calvin College against Grant.

Six-foot-two forward John Van Voorhees put on quite a show for the Blackhawks, as he not only led both teams in scoring with 38 points, but dominated the backboards as well against the taller Hawkeyes.

"Van Voorhees was the difference," said a rejected Bos after the game. "He was the reason that Fennville beat us at our own game."

Hamilton usually dominates the backboards but with Van Voorhees and 6'3" center Gordy Alderink leading the way, the Blackhawks took down 39 rebounds to only 31 for the losers. Six-foot-five center Kerwin Roelofs had 12 for the Hawkeyes.

"Van Voorhees was just super and I thought that all the guys did a great job," stated a soaked Coach Larry Morse, after being thrown into the shower.

"Hamilton defeated us twice this season and the guys wanted to prove that we were just as good of a team and tonight we were better," Morse commented.

Assistant Fennville Coach Tom Pelon, a former standout at Holland and Hope College pointed out after Hamilton's rough win over Bloomingdale Thursday would take something out of them Saturday and it seemed to, as the Hawkeyes looked like a tired club while Fennville looked like a fresh bunch of shiny red apples.

The first half went down to the wire, as both squads were dropping in long shots without too much trouble. The lead was tied six times and changed hands seven during this span.

After leading by four points, 28-24 with 1:41 left in the half, the Blackhawks broke open the game on a basket and two free throws by the clever moving Van Voorhees to lead at the intermission, 32-24.

For a while it looked like the Hawkeyes might overtake the high flying Blackhawks advantage, as they cut the deficit to 37-34 with 3:56 to play in the third stanza.

With Van Voorhees scoring five of Fennville's six baskets and hitting on three out of three free throws, Fennville put in two more points, 18-16 to lead at the close of the period, 50-40.

Fennville added insult to the injury, as they hit on its first three shots and were on top by 20 markers, 64-44 before Hamilton with 5:11 left in the contest.

Hamilton did manage to tally 24 counters in the final eight minutes but the fast striding Blackhawks put in 31 points to put an end to the Hawkeyes dream of winning the District title.

Besides Van Voorhees 38 points, Alderink followed with 19 markers with 10 of them coming in the fourth quarter. Jack Schrotenboer paced Hamilton with 14 points while Roelofs and Jerry Kreuze had 13 apiece. Dave Jurries chipped in with 11.

Bos, who was coaching his final game concluded, "even though we lost to Fennville, we had a great season and I'm proud of all our kids." We were 1-4 and could have quit but the guys turned it all around as we finished with a fine 15-5 overall record.

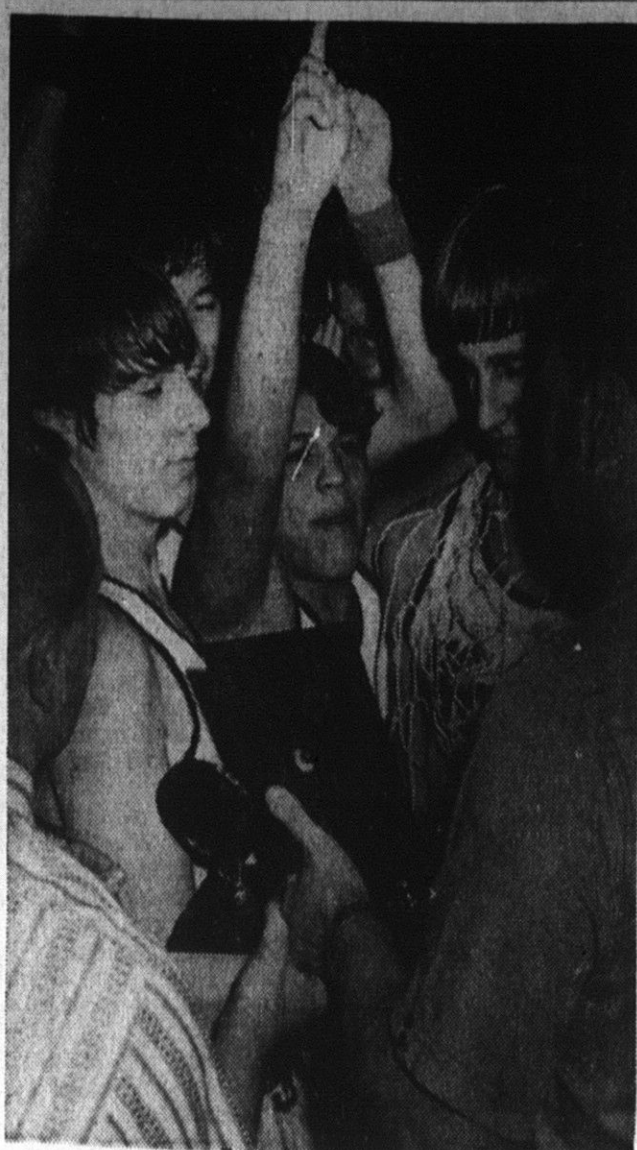

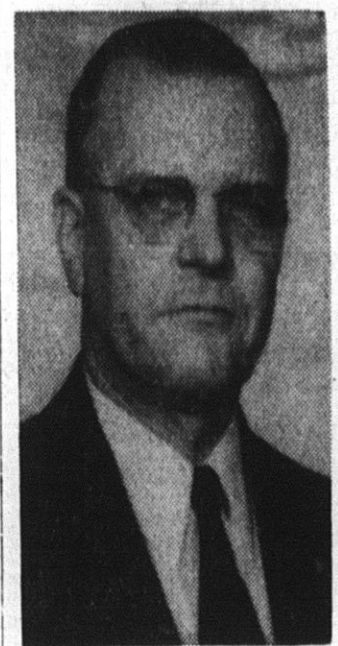

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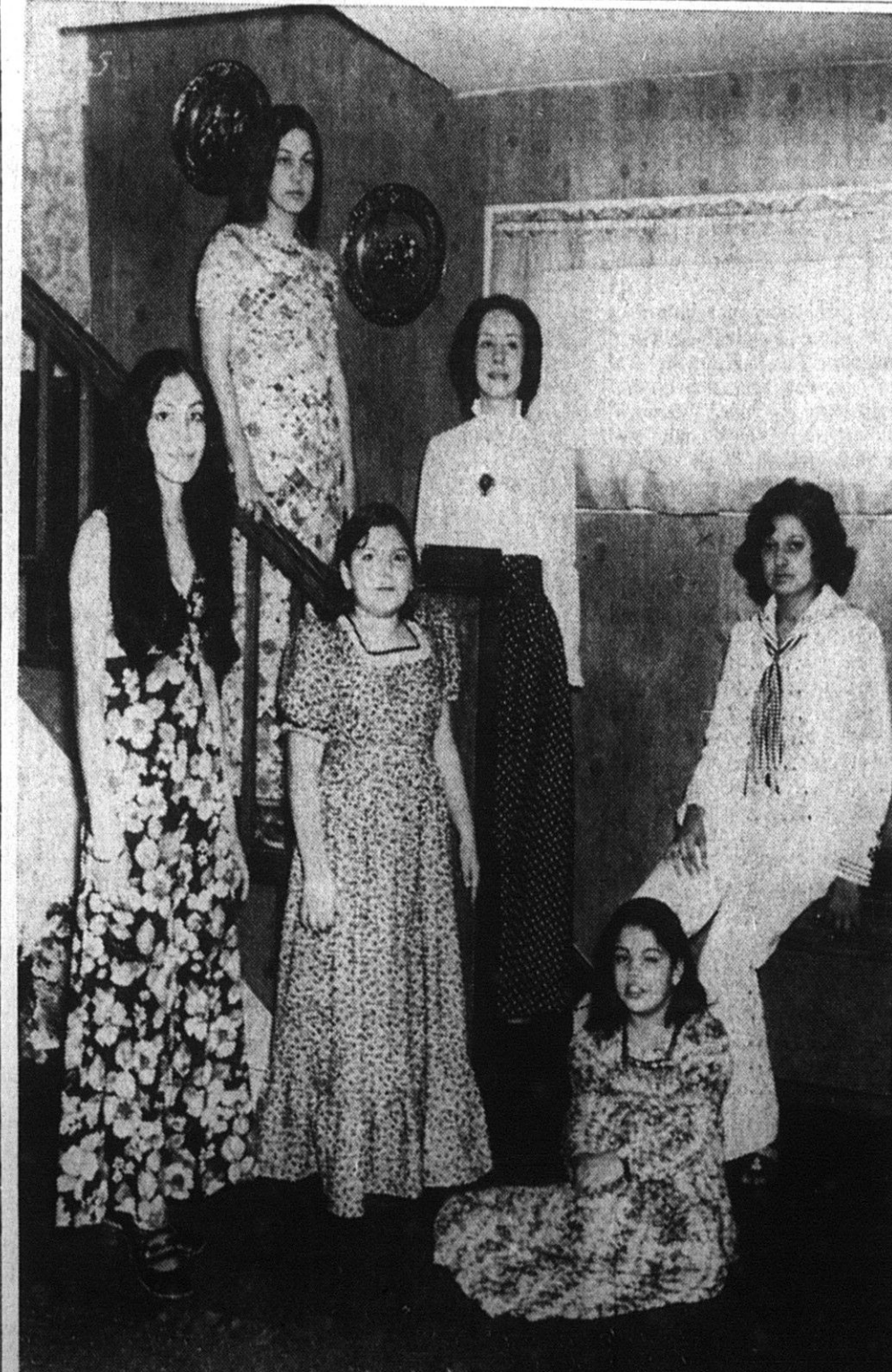
