Council To Study Offer Of 'Playboy'

Council reacted, and so did the audience, Wednesday when City Clerk Donald Schipper read the latest gifts to Herrick Public Library.

Council tabled one gift as the audience snickered and laughed. Schipper calmly read the first gift, a book, "Birds of North America," by Porter in memory of Mrs. Harold Taylor. It was accepted with thanks.

Then came the other gift that would have created, perhaps, some raised eyebrows.

Schipper announced a magazine subscription to "Playboy" from an anonymous donor.

Councilman Robert Dykstra moved it be tabled.

Councilman Elmer Wissink wasn't so sure.

"I hoped it would have increased traffic in the library."

In more routine action the clerk presented for approval and thanks a list of gifts presented to Windmill Island. Included were two Martin houses from Mr. and Mrs. Dale Van Kampen; a plow from Mr. and Mrs. C. Herist; two woodcut prints (originals) from Mr. and Mrs. Seymour Padnos; and a windmill fan from Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Vanden Berge.

Claims against the city were received and referred to the city's insurance carrier and the city attorney. They were from H. Van Kampen, 133 East 22nd St.; Willodean Saucedo, 395 West 22nd St.; Mrs. Albert Serne, 361 West 18th St.; Walter Pelon, 105 East 37th St.; and Linda Gingras of Fennville.

A request for rezoning approximately 41 acres of land at the northwest corner of 32nd St. and the US-31 bypass from A-1 residential to C-4 commercial and A-3 residential was referred to the planning commission for study and recommendation to council.

On a six - to - two vote, council approved the removal of two parking meters along the north side of Eighth St. west of Columbia Ave. Council confirmed certificates of purchase from Lamb, Inc., to the police department for \$64.44 and from Peerbolt's, Inc., for a \$2.68 purchase by the street department.

A request for water service in the Maple Heights area was received and requests for water service from Ben Van Dis in the area of 25th St. and Lugers Rd. and from the Muskegon Cooperative Federal Credit Union along the US-31 service drive near 14th St. were approved.

A request from Donnelly Mirrors to construct an addition to its existing manufacturing plant at 49 West Third St. over an eight inch sanitary sewer was approved with certain conditions.

Final payment on the 1972 sewer projects amounting to \$24,999.84 was approved on a seven - to - one vote.

Opening prayer was by Robert Dietz, youth director of Calvary Reformed Church. All councilmen except Al Kleis Jr. were present for the meeting which was adjourned at 10:10 p.m.

Dryer Fire Reported

Holland firemen were summoned to the Marvin Nienhuis residence, 238 West 33rd St. Wednesday at 4:45 p.m. where a fire was reported in a dryer. There was no estimate of damage.

Hundreds Attend Public Meeting

Carousel Plan Hearing Adjourned to March 29

A hearing Thursday into a mammoth development proposal for 300 acres of rolling dunes at Carousel Ski Area was adjourned until March 29 after opposition attorneys claimed not enough information was made available by the developers for zoning changes.

An estimated 300 to 400 persons jammed the Carousel Ski Area lodge for the joint hearing by the Laketown Township Zoning Board and Board of Appeals. The three-hour hearing was delayed a half hour beyond its scheduled 7:30 p.m. start.

Petitions opposing the development and bearing about 400 signatures were presented to Howard Siebelink, chairman of zoning board, by township resident Dr. Edward Helbing.

The 300 acres in question runs generally north from Castle Park to Macatawa and west from 66th St. to Lake Michigan. Only 66 acres of the land is owned by Carousel Recreational Equities, Inc., the developers. The remaining land is under option to the developers.

Carousel put a \$53 million valuation tag on the completed development which would include 1,881 dwelling units and a commercial area.

Township supervisor Gerald Rutgers said after the meeting that the entire assessed valuation of the township now is \$10 million while the population is about 2,200. The assessed valuation of the completed development would be about \$26 million.

Developers were seeking exceptions to present zoning codes to allow construction of multi-family dwelling units and zoning changes for commercial purposes.

Louis Moncrief, a researcher at Michigan State University retained by the developers for a marketing study, suggested the 1,881 dwelling units would be constructed during a period of five to eight years.

He said about ten to 30 per cent of the total units would be occupied permanently and that persons buying the single family houses or condominiums would come from the Grand Rapids area and Indiana, Ohio and southeastern Michigan.

Zane Miller of the Grand Rapids engineering firm of Williams & Works, said he studied water, sewage and transportation needs for the developers and indicated the City of Holland, through expansion of its water supply system, could provide water service to the Carousel area. Municipal sewer services could be extended from the city along 32nd St.

On roads, Miller said surveys indicate the present system, with modifications, could handle the projected increase in traffic.

Speaking to the impact on local schools, Dave Froberg, president of COMCO, the parent concern of Carousel Recreational Equities, Inc., said an additional 324 students could be expected if no more than one-third of the dwelling units were occupied permanently.

During the public response, Dick Den Uyl, manager of the Point West facilities, said he was "100 per cent" behind the proposed development. He said he represented a corporation that owned 100 acres of land under option to COMCO and that in past years several developers had approached them for use of the land. But until now he said all had been rejected.

Dick Ratcliff, a resident of the so-called Chicago Addition which is not included in the proposed development, said he feared interference of his rights if the development would take eight years to complete.

Sam Greydanus feared an end to wildlife in the area should the development be approved and urged the township to join other municipal bodies in forming a regional planning group to

control what he called 'hodge podge' development in the area.

"Residents from Indiana apartments up here to enjoy the dunes and shoreline and not to see other apartments," Greydanus remarked.

When asked what would happen if the zoning changes were turned down, Froberg said the developers have invested large sums of money and that the developers would "go ahead and develop the property one way or another."

Grand Rapids attorney Len Hoffius, representing the developers, said about the only way to prevent development of the area was to make the land public lands.

And he said the township board, by past actions, apparently did not see the necessity of prohibiting development because they zoned the area residential for home site uses.

February Snow Only 10 Inches

With March coming in like a lamb, one would think that the 41 degrees recorded Feb. 28 would be the highest of the month.

Not so, according to Weather Observer Glen Timmer.

Highest temperature for the month was 52 degrees on Feb. 3. On four other days early in the month, the maximums ranged from 42 to 45.

Cold spells struck at mid-month with -8 and Feb. 17 and days. There were nine sunny days.

Snowfall for the month totaled 10 inches and precipitation 1.06 inches. Precipitation fell on 15 - 5 the day before.

Greatest snowfall in a 24-hour period was 3 1/2 inches Feb. 15 and greatest depth on the ground was 4.5 inches Feb. 26.

Feb. 2, Groundhog Day, was marked by rain, hail and thunder.

Boy, 6, Injured When Hit by Car

JENISON — Robert Van Sulichem, 6, son of Mr. and Mrs. Chester L. Van Sulichem of Kentwood, suffered a broken left leg and bumps and bruises Sunday at 6:43 p.m. when he darted into the path of a car.

Ottawa County deputies said the youngster had been playing in a drainage ditch along the road and dashed west across the road when he was struck by a car traveling along 12th Ave., one-half mile south of M-21 in Georgetown Township and driven by Roger Meekhof, 28, of 6696 Dale St., Hudsonville.

Neither Meekhof nor his wife and three children were reported injured. Robert was taken to Blodgett Hospital in Grand Rapids for treatment.

Car Hits Hole in Road Runs Out of Control

Gary G. Vander Wal, 26, of 10090 Otogon St., suffered minor injuries at 12:40 a.m. today when his car went out of control after hitting a hole in the road along eastbound Otogon 600 feet east of Waverly Rd.

Police said the car ran off the road and struck a fence of the Dale Schaap residence, 11880 Otogon St. Vander Wal was to seek his own treatment.

Vogelzang Zoning Try Is Rejected

Holland council Wednesday rejected, with some reluctance, a rezoning request from Vogelzang Enterprises and rejected a proposed building board of appeals ordinance which had been tabled from the previous meeting.

Council acted on a recommendation of the Planning Commission in denying the Vogelzang request to rezone 22.6 acres of land along the north side of East 16th St. between Waverly and Hope Aves., although two members expressed some doubts.

Councilman Morris Peerbolt said he favored denial but added he felt council could have provided an area for such commercial developments patterned after the HEDCOR concept of purchasing land for resale.

Councilman Elmer Wissink felt the Vogelzangs had received "shoddy" treatment from council and cited the firm's 30 years of doing business in Holland and its need for expansion.

"I feel badly that we cannot accommodate these people," said Wissink.

Councilman Lou Hallacy, a member of the Planning Commission, countered by saying the rezoning request had been under study since 1971 and the commission recommended its denial then. Council agreed. Then followed more meetings and study on the matter by the Planning Commission and Council. Hallacy said, before the denial recommendations were again made.

Hallacy said the entire area in the eastern end of the city is up for rezoning this month.

On the proposed building board of appeals ordinance, councilman Peerbolt said adoption of the ordinance would tend to delay revisions in the building code and could give an advantage to the larger construction firms who could pay the required hearing fees to win a variance. He suggested builders bring their ideas for revising the building codes to the council.

Council did approve ordinances requiring use of copper pipe in water services from the main to the building, amending a code relative to use of water meters on private water supplies and setting fees for winter street cuts effective March 31.

In a four - to - four tie vote, council rejected a motion to prohibit parking on the east side of Cleveland Ave. between 16th and 17th Sts. The matter had been tabled from the previous meeting.

An application from the Easter Seal Society for a license to solicit funds in the city April 9 to 13 was approved.

The Liquor Control Commission advised council it had denied an application of Skiles Tavern Inc. for a reclassification to Class C license.

Notices of hearings were received from the Michigan Public Service Commission regarding Michigan Bell Telephone Co.'s application for a revision of rates and charges and from Michigan Power Co. for authority to offer an authorized emergency use of gas in connection with an interruptible gas rate, southern division, and to establish a rate and minimum charge therefor.

An addendum agreement to television rentals as recommended by the Hospital Board were approved by council. The revisions call for inclusion of channels 41 and 35 on the rental television sets with no increase in patient rental fees.

A request from the hospital board to transfer \$45,000 from the contingency fund to the long range planning committee account to cover the cost of the TriBrook Group, Inc., agreement on a long range plan for the hospital was approved.

Several gifts to the hospital were accepted with thanks. They were a CPAP system from Margaret Hummer guild valued at \$800; sand blasting furniture from the Rena Boven guild valued at \$576; an electrocardiograph machine from Martha Kollen guild valued at \$1,250; a wheelchair from the Abraham Leenhouts guild valued at \$212.80, and a grant in the amount of \$2,220 from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare for the hospital library.

Two Cars Collide

Cars driven by Georgia Essenburg, 26, of 2529 Thomas Ave., and Mildred Cramer, 50, of 754 136th Ave., collided Wednesday at 4:30 p.m. at James St. and 136th Ave. Neither driver was reported injured. State police at Grand Haven said the Essenburg car was eastbound on James while the Cramer car was north bound on 136th Ave.

South Shore Paving Plan Wins Council Approval

The controversial South Shore Dr. paving project with which two mayors and two city managers have wrestled the past four years was adopted by City Council Wednesday following a public hearing that lacked public fireworks.

Council chambers and an adjoining room formerly used by District Court were filled with an estimated 100 persons, mostly residents of the South Shore Dr. assessment area.

The paving plan calls primarily for a two-lane road from Plasman Ave. west to Old Orchard Rd. A bicycle path was listed as an alternate. Total cost was estimated at \$741,000 or about \$70 to \$75 per running foot of which the assessed property owners will pay a total of \$20 per foot, \$10 for each side of the road.

In anticipation of an overflow crowd, 40 additional seats were set up in the old District Court office where a television monitor and speakers were installed.

Council held to fire codes which allowed only 75 persons in the council chambers.

The police department's closed circuit television sys-

tem was used to televise the council proceedings to the overflow in the District Court room. It was the first time such arrangements had been made for a council meeting.

Grand Haven attorney James Bussard, representing dissident property owners along South Shore Dr., claimed the paving proposal would not give additional benefit to the residents and objected to storm sewer runoff into Lake Macatawa from an ecology standpoint.

Bussard asked that the pavement be returned to the condition that existed before a sanitary sewer line was installed. He claimed that creating a major arterial route along South Shore Dr. could have a detrimental affect for the residents.

He said the residents he was representing in the assessment district "vehemently objected" to the special assessments and improvement to the road.

Jacob Bierema of 617 South Shore Dr., asked that the road be improved as council proposed, including the bicycle paths.

Attorney James A. Bidol of Holland who said he was representing some clients along South Shore Dr., asked council to "reconsider and rethink" the proposal in light of what attorney Peter S. Boter had said years ago.

Bidol said Boter indicated the project and assessments were "unwarranted, probably unconstitutional and a mistake."

That was all there was to the eight minute public response. South Shore Dr. residents who attended the meeting then left.

Before the public response, the city clerk read letters from Mrs. Margaret Ewing, who owned property at 1206-1214 South Shore Dr., and Marvin Hoffmeyer, with a business establishment at 1157 South Shore Dr., objecting to curbing which would limit parking.

A letter was presented from Donald Bruggink, 880 South Shore Dr., who agreed with council proposals to widen the road and construct bicycle paths.

Councilman Donald Oosterbaan asked whether the bicycle path proposal could be deleted from the project. City Manager Bopf said it was an alternate and could be deleted at any time.

Councilman Robert Dykstra questioned curbing at business establishments and asked whether changes could be made in the curbing design to allow parking. Bopf said a safety factor was involved and he urged the curbing not be modified to allow parking.

Councilman Elmer Wissink said he objected to the paving proposal because the road should be wider than as proposed. He felt South Shore Dr. should be considered a major artery and preferred a 36-foot

wide road which he said would require the removal of nine trees in two miles and "does not denude the entire area."

Council's plan calls for a 28-foot roadway from Plasman to Myrtle and a 36-foot roadway from Myrtle west to Old Orchard Rd. Major intersections would be flared to allow for a left turn lane. The proposal calls for removal of three trees along the two - mile stretch.

Mayor L. W. Lamb, Jr. ended discussions when he said he thought the proposal by council for paving and assessments was a good one and that by waiting for the approval of all concerned there would be no reason for such a body as the council. He called for a vote and with Wissink dissenting, the proposal was adopted seven to one. Councilman Al Kleis Jr. was absent.

The paving project was proposed first when Nelson Bosman was mayor and Herb Holt was City Manager. Bosman did not seek re-election when his term expired in 1971 and Holt resigned in 1969.

Earlier a paving project for Prospect Ave. between 22nd and 24th Sts. was approved following a public hearing at which two objections were heard. Jerry Weener of 118 East 22nd St., and John Weerstra, of 117 East 23rd St., asked whether the road could be topped with asphalt and not fully curbed.

Three Injured In 2-Car Crash

Three persons suffered minor injuries in a two-car collision Tuesday at 4:33 p.m. at Pine Ave. and Eighth St.

Reported injured were Marguerite Jacobs, 76, of route 2, Hamilton, a passenger in a car driven by her husband, Raymond, 76, and Hilda Westing, 52, of 409 West Lakewood Blvd., driver of the second car and her passenger, Patty Westing, 8.

Police said the Jacobs car was westbound on Eighth St. while the Westing auto was heading south along Pine when the collision occurred.

Galien Realty Attending National Sales Meeting

Immunization Of Children Is Studied

Results of an Ottawa County Health Department survey to determine the immunization status of the county's children for measles, rubella and polio show that in the first two diseases the level is 88 and 82 per cent and for polio, 62 per cent. According to information from the department, checks were made in 10 to 15 per cent of the county's schools using kindergarten, third and sixth grade in each school checked. A check of preschoolers was also made from birth certificates.

Since a 65 per cent immunization level is considered acceptable, the survey shows the county above average in measles and rubella immunization, but a little below in polio. County health officials regard the low polio immunization rate shown to be the result of confusion following the change in recent years to oral vaccine rather than injections, and suggest a higher rate is probable.

However, the department is concerned that apathy regarding polio immunization should lead parents to neglect this necessary protection for their children.

They urge parents to check with the family physician to update their children's immunization. The department also conducts regularly scheduled immunization clinics, also.

Dutch End Regular Season With Dismal 3-17 Record

MUSKEGON — Holland High ended its regular basketball season here Friday night the same way they started the 1972-73 season by losing to Mona Shores, 64-53.

The Dutch ended the regular season with a dismal 3-17 record which is the worst at Holland in 13 years. The win evened out the Sailors overall mark at 10-10. The score might have indicated a stalling offense for the Dutch in the first period but that was hardly the case as Holland couldn't find the basket while the Sailors weren't doing much better, as they only held a 10-6 first period margin.

Holland doubled its score in the second half but still trailed at the intermission, 24-18.

The tempo picked up in the second half, as Holland tallied 14 and 21 points in the third and fourth stanza's while Mona Shores was recording 24 and 16 periods.

Jed De Boer threw in eight of his team high 17 markers

in the final quarter and was backed by guard Dick Wood, who had six in the last eight minutes.

The improving Tim Boeve added 10 counters for the Dutch while hustling Paul Van Oostenburg chipped in with nine.

Six-foot-six center Mark Reyer of the Sailors pumped in 10 buckets from inside for his game high 20 point total. Scott Volkman helped out with 16.

Mona finished the evening with a 53 per cent mark from the field on (29 of 54) attempts while the Dutch were much colder than the weather with a 32 per cent clip on (22 of 68) tries.

Both teams traded the ball back and forth on turnovers. The Sailors had 24 while Holland had 20.

Holland's jayvees also concluded its season with a 3-17 slate by losing to Mona Shores, 69-39.

Doug Bazon and Joe Serrano managed eight and seven points

respectively for Holland.

It's off to the Class A District tournament for both teams. Holland will play Niles Wednesday at Benton Harbor while the Sailors take on Muskegon Monday at L. C. Walker arena.

Cornie's Corner

A note from former Sen. Clyde H. Geerlings in Tucson, Ariz., enclosed two Don Schellie columns from the Tucson Daily Citizen about weather, with Holland, Mich., weather in particular.

It seems he read something in Grit about last year's experimental program in which the U.S. Army chose Holland to test its helicopters in heavy wet snow.

Mr. Schellie, who has never been in Holland, Mich., was nice enough about it, but he made the most of Holland's weather being worse than Sault Ste. Marie "where the weather wasn't nearly rotten enough."

He had used the item just to make the Tucson people happier with their own lot and concluded: "And, to be sure, if any of you Hollanders would like to drop us a note in defense of your fair city we'd be happy to offer equal time."

Well, his next column a week later (Feb. 16 to be exact) was about 50 per cent longer than the first column... and it was from those people who call 494-23 their very own zip code. That's Holland's zip.

These newfound pen pals assured Schellie in no uncertain terms that there's more to Holland than the winter weather.

Defense even came from John W. Van Schelven of Grand Haven who was staying in Tucson. "True, we don't have Tucson weather in the winter," he said, "but we have beautiful summers, cooled by Lake Michigan breezes. And if you want to see something beautiful, just show up in Holland in May for Tulip Time."

Fay E. Ewers, Nellie Ewers and Pearl Picering, Hollanders all, mentioned the same thing. And as for the nasty weather, Fay said, "Once you have lived there for 20 to 30 years, you take it in stride and feel full of pep. We came to Tucson to get away from shoveling so much snow, but we sure miss the lovely summers when all the trees are leafed out."

An anonymous snowbird from Michigan sent a clipping from the Holland City News showing four cents on the third green of Crestview Golf Course in Borculo in January. Schellie called Borculo a suburb of Holland. The picture appeared in The Sentinel too.

Another soul familiar with Holland couldn't understand why the Army should think Holland weather was so bad.

As for Clyde Geerlings, he put the matter in perspective for all of Tucson. "Holland, Mich., is a wonderful city, weatherwise," wrote the retired senator, "from May 1 to Nov. 1. During those months skies and general weather conditions cannot be beat, but come the first of November and skies become gray, hinting at the coming of winter with its cold rains, its wet snows, its soft and heavy snows and its cold and stormy snows."

Sen. Geerlings would have Tucson know that he remembers Holland winters with snow piled so deep by the plows that "all the cars had flags on their radio antennae so that you could see the cars passing as you tried to enter from a non - through street."

However, Geerlings also remembers winters in which nary a flake of snow fell upon fair Holland.

But again, the tulips. "With the first thaw the tulips are an inch high, and when May rolls around and the sun is warm and the sky is blue, they grow almost four to six inches a day. By mid - May - Tulip Time - the flowers are as much as 30 inches high."

How about visiting us, Mr. Schellie?

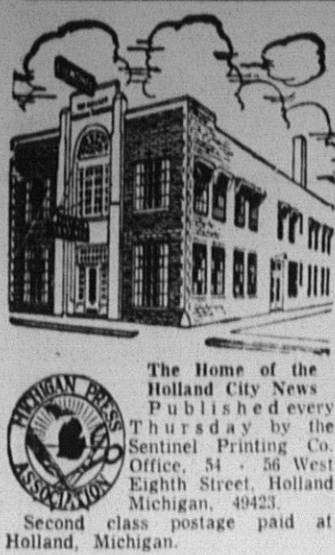

THE BIKE COMES OF AGE

The people who were singing the praises of adult bicycling back when bikes were widely regarded as a kid's toy are tasting vindication these days. It has become not only respectable but in some circles downright fashionable to ride a bike to work or for exercise or just for fun.

This new status of the pedal-powered two-wheeler is being attested by government plans for nothing less than a national conference on the bicycle. It will be held at the systems center of the Department of Transportation in Cambridge, Mass., early in May. The Department of the Interior is joining with DOT in sponsoring this event.

The idea is to examine all sorts of problems related to the bicycle. Safety will be a prime consideration. There will be discussion of the need for more bikeways. One can hope the conferees will get into the subject of making city bike routes available to encourage bicycling both for health and as a means of easing traffic congestion and air pollution. The government has thus begun to give bicycling some constructive attention. It is high time for that.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, March 11
Man Is a Responsible Being
Genesis 1:27-30; Acts 17:30-31;
Romans 14:10-12
By C. P. Dame

Some people do not know themselves. If they would read the Bible they would learn and get a better view of life and its possibilities and responsibilities. This lesson teaches us that God created man and that man is responsible to Him — a truth many forget.

I. God the Creator holds man, whom He has created, responsible to Him. "So God created man in His own image, in the image of God created He him, male and female created He them." Man is not an animal, nor a machine, but a person, God's image - bearer. Genesis 2:20-25 tells how God created woman from man to supplement him. To this couple God gave the power to procreate and told them to use it within the context of marriage, not outside of it.

God also commanded this couple to have dominion over nature, which involves the duty to study it and manage it — not to exploit it or to be domineering. God made provision for man's physical welfare. "I have given you every herb bearing seed." The use of meat for food was given to man after the flood (Genesis 9:3). God gave man ability, a responsibility and a work to do. He was to study what God had created, to use it and glorify Him with it. Man is a dependent creature.

II. To repent is always in order. The second portion of the text tells how Paul was in Athens and noted it was full of idols. Paul spoke first in the synagogue, then in the market place and then before the Court of Areopagus where he told them he was speaking for the true God who made the world (verse 24), whose offspring they were (verse 29), to whom they were related, to whom they were responsible, and who commanded "all men everywhere to repent." This is one of God's standing orders. This God has set a day in which He will judge the world in righteousness through Jesus Christ whom He has raised from the dead.

Varied reaction followed. Some mocked at the resurrection from the dead, others said, "We will hear thee again of this matter" — they postponed and a few believed including a man named Dionysius and a woman named Damaris "and others with them."

III. Man is not the judge but God is. The third portion of the lesson text, Romans 14:10-12, reveals that Christians criticized each other then as some do today. Paul objected. It is not man's business to judge; this is God's affair. We are not able to give a fair judgement because we are not qualified; we don't know enough about people's attitudes and motives and those who judge others will be judged, before the judgement seat of Those who judge reveal their own weaknesses and sins. Besides, we all must stand before the judgment seat of Christ and give an account of our deeds, words and thoughts. Are we ready?

'Cyrano' Big Hit Here

Holland had no Great White Way for the world premiere of the musical "Cyrano" at Hope College Thursday night but it had all the color and excitement of a Broadway opening.

Although he made only brief introductory statements before each act, Director Jose Ferrer, who won the Academy award for the title role in the film "Cyrano de Bergerac" in 1952, was very much the star of the evening. It was his production, his showcase and he had every right to be proud. It was a smash hit in Holland.

The musical itself, with music by Robert Wright and George Forrest and book by J. Vincent Smith, was a faithful reproduction of the century-old Edmond Rostand classic, retaining the beautiful poetry which was enhanced by the music which

served to extend the story line. Simplicity marked the production — a deceptive simplicity which pointed to long, hard hours of work and constant change, all designed to keep the story line and music uncluttered. There were no big production numbers but plenty of action. Oh, plenty of action.

There was all the sword play of the original story, the battle scenes, and the swashbuckling action of the day. With professionals playing the three leads, and others enamored with doing their best, the production had the high gloss of professionalism, guided by a director who is a top authority on the Rostand hero.

Young James Anthony, a native New Yorker who has just completed a tour of "Fiddler on the Roof," made a most en-

gaging Cyrano, his long nose firmly in place and his white plume and flared cloak almost always in swirling action. Pam McHardy, another New Yorker with a long list of credits, played Roxane with a depth of feeling while displaying a fine soprano.

And Bill Beidler of the Grand Valley State College music department won the audience in both song and acting the inept lover come to life only through Cyrano's poetry. His death on the battlefield and Roxane's 14 years in a convent visited weekly by Cyrano and the latter's death brings the musical to a bittersweet ending, entirely consistent with the Rostand original.

With 42 persons playing 76 roles, one cannot recognize all. Among memorable performances were Don Finn as de

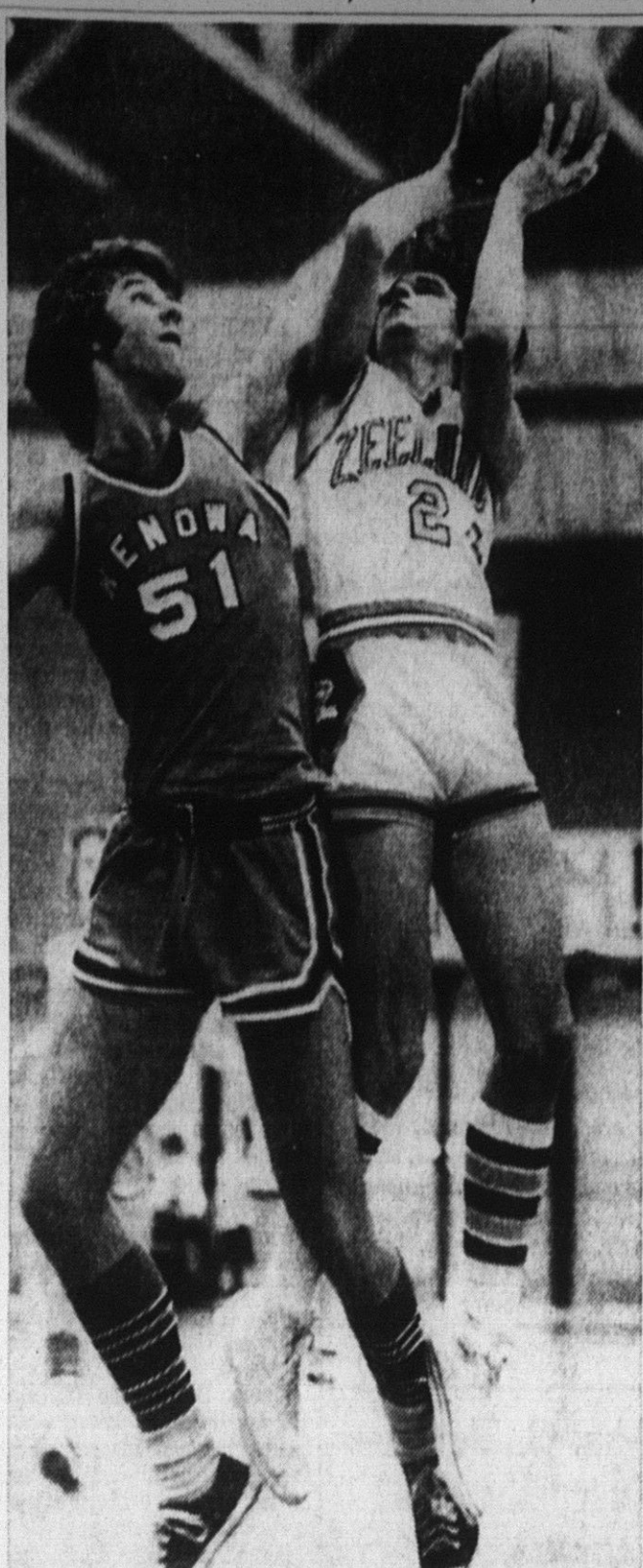

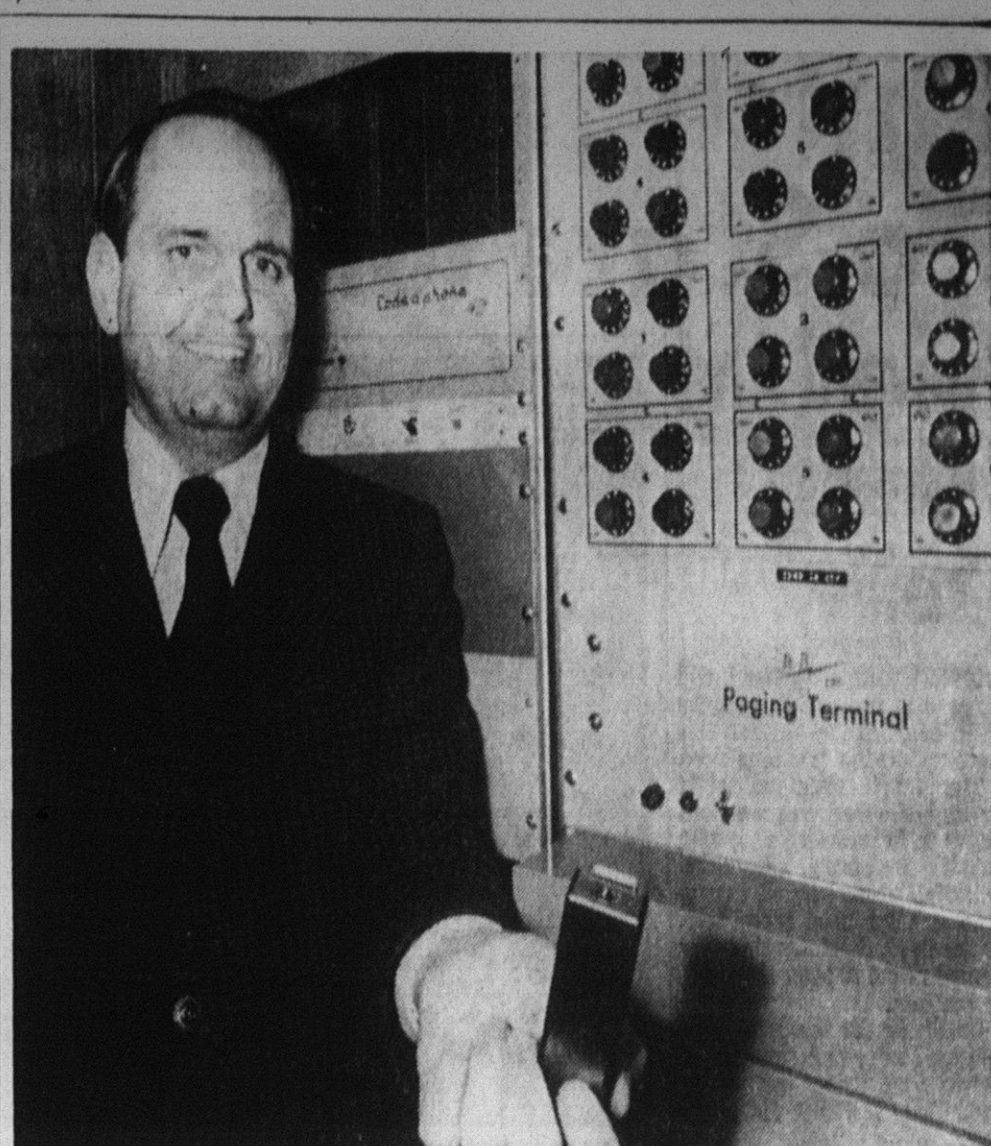
Theatre Group Alters Election Procedures

Direct Paging By Telephone Added Locally

Holland's Mayor L. W. Lamb, Jr., dialed a telephone number Tuesday morning at the Chamber of Commerce breakfast and seconds later spoke to Chamber Executive Vice President Roscoe Giles, not by telephone but through a paging device carried by Giles.

That telephone call launched the new direct dial paging service called "Dial-A-Page" introduced into the Holland-Zeeland area by Horne's Office Service.

Jerry Horne said Holland is the first city of its size in Michigan to have such a direct telephone page service.

For the past ten years, Horne has provided a paging service whereby an operator at Horne's office received incoming telephone calls and relayed the message to the proper pager.

The new system allows the caller to be routed directly to the pager carried by the subscriber and the caller is given a specific number of seconds in which to give his message. The small pager fits inside the subscriber's pocket or clips to a belt. The pager is battery operated and effective within an 18 to 20 mile radius of Holland.

Horne said the pager allows subscribers to keep in touch with the office or secretary while away from the office or work site.

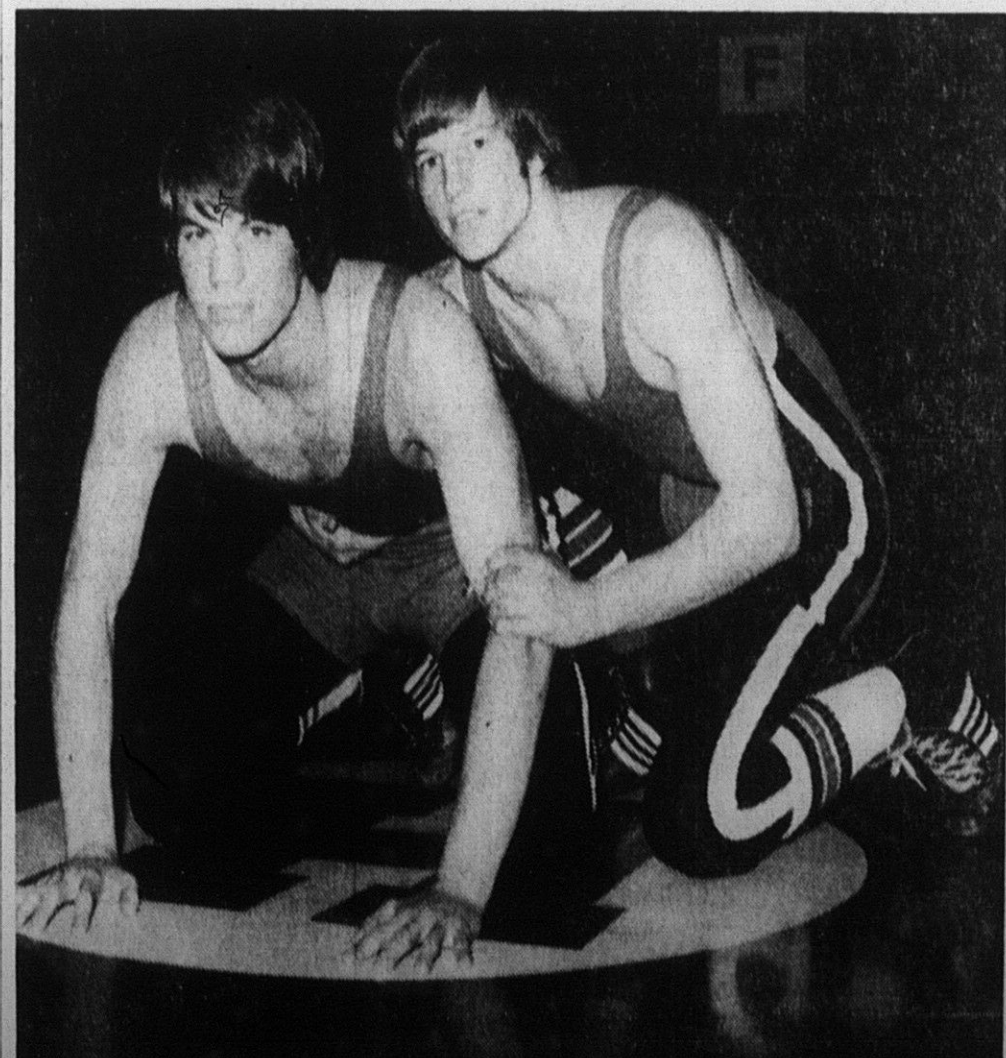

Horn was defeated by Kim Zavitz of Mona Shores, 8-3. Harrington fell to Keith Morgan of Lansing Eastern, 6-2 while Arizmendez was pinned by Jim Jackson of Grand Rapids Otawara Hills and nipped by Vince Carnes of Mona Shores in overtime on a referee's decision.

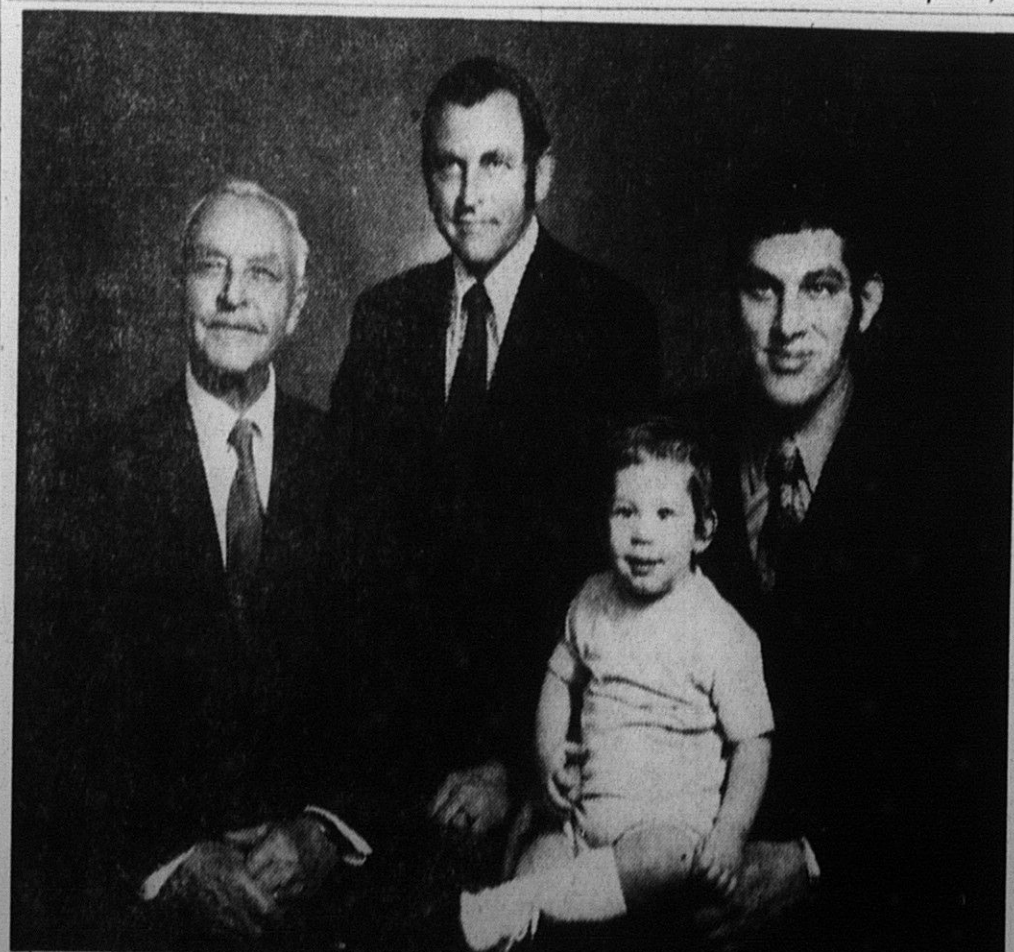
