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2 Millage Proposals On Ballot

ALLEGAN — County Commissioners voted Tuesday to place two extra millage proposals on the ballot in Allegan county's May 16 preferential primary election.

Voters will be asked to approve two mills for two years to finance construction of a 60-bed addition to the Allegan County Medical Care Facility.

They will also be asked to decide on renewing the county's special one-mill bridge replacement tax for five more years.

The one mill levy for the hospital addition would raise between \$600,000 and \$620,000, Commissioner Francis Cronen, of Otsego, said the current cost estimates indicate the sum would be adequate to construct a 60-bed wing. He said if the levy is approved, construction probably would be underway in 1973.

The present medical care facility, with 60 beds, was built with a service center adequate to take care of a second 60-bed wing.

Cronen said "the need is pressing . . . and the land is available, so I feel we should proceed."

The resolution placing the hospital expansion plan on the ballot was approved with only two dissenting votes.

In January of 1965, county voters approved a one mill levy for five years to establish a sinking fund for construction of the present facility. Even at that time, surveys indicated a need for 120 beds, but funds available proved insufficient and the plans were scaled down to a basic service center plus a 60-bed wing. The facility was built in 1970.

In other action, the board voted to retain the law firm of Huston and Jacobs, of Kalamazoo, to represent the county in any possible negotiations with unions. Sheriff's department employees have voted to be represented by the Fraternal Order of Police, but there have been reports that the "Teamsters" union also is attempting to organize the department.

The board approved a resolution under which the county would associate itself with Kent, Ottawa and Muskegon counties in Region 8 for planning purposes. The resolution was submitted by the county planning commission.

On the recommendation of the county operations committee, a claim for two weeks fees to compensate Allegan attorney Lester Tooman for two weeks work in February, 1970, was denied. Tooman served as special assistant prosecutor during the absence of Prosecutor George Greig. The claim was denied on the basis of the fact that the board had not authorized Tooman's special assignment.

Involvement By Citizens Credited With Saving Life

ZEELAND — Police credited two persons who got "involved" early today with helping save the life of an elderly woman who wandered about the area of her home on the northwest side of the city and suffered exposure.

Police chief Lawrence Veldheer said the woman, 82, apparently set dogs barking at the home of Harvey Wierda, 338 West Washington, who was awakened and noticed a woman walking through his yard. He called police at 3 a.m.

Officers, with the assistance of Ottawa County deputies, followed tracks about the neighborhood until another resident, Mrs. Arnold Styf of 438 West Main, called police at 3:45 a.m. saying she was awakened by a woman who knocked on her door and then went into a garage.

Police said the elderly woman was found in the garage suffering from exposure and a gash on the head apparently sustained during the wanderings. She was taken to Zeeland Community hospital where she was held overnight for observation. Veldheer said the woman was found about 2 1/2 blocks from her home.

3 Apprehended In Car Vandalism

Three youths, including two juveniles, were taken into custody Saturday in connection with a report of vandalism to an auto parked in the Macatawa Park area.

Held at the Ottawa County jail for arraignment was Dean Brandt, 17, of 1579 Harding St., Holland. The juveniles, aged 15 and 16, were released to their parents and referred to probate court.

Deputies said they received the vandalism complaint at 2:22 a.m. Saturday.

SAUGATUCK — Voters in Saugatuck Monday approved a referendum on participating with Douglas and Saugatuck township in the development of an area sewage treatment program. The straw vote was 60 in favor and 38 against.

Voters in Douglas went the opposite way, turning down the proposal, 96 against and 71 in favor.

Vote Slated For Allegan Bridge Levy

ALLEGAN — Allegan county's Road Commission will ask voters to renew a special one-mill bridge replacement tax for another five years.

Engineer-Manager Fred Neils announced today that permission had been granted to place the millage issue on the ballot at the May 16 preferential primary election.

The original levy, approved by county voters in 1967, will expire this year. Since 1968, first year the tax was collected, the county has replaced and opened to traffic 32 bridges. Two more are currently under contract with work scheduled to start this spring. Another will be bid March 22 and several more are in various stages of planning and design, according to Neils.

He said Allegan county's special tax has "put us well ahead of the rest of the state in bridge replacement."

"Allegan is one of the few counties in Michigan which met the problem head-on," Neils said, "most of them are just now coming to grips with it."

Under new federal aid regulations, most counties are being forced to face up to bridge replacement problems. Under the new rules, all bridges must be checked and posted as to weight limits by July 1, 1973.

There will be one major difference between the bridge levy which will be on the ballot May 16 and the form in which it was approved five years ago.

Under a state law passed in 1968, the road commission will be required to share the special levy with the county's incorporated cities and villages. Thus the money will be divided — on the basis of state equalized valuation — between rural roads and the cities and villages of Holland, Fennville, Saugatuck, Douglas, Martin, Hopkins, Wayland, Otsego, Plainwell and Allegan.

Neils said the division would be "about 60-40" with the county getting 60 per cent and the cities and villages 40 per cent. The incorporated areas will not be limited to spending the money on bridges alone, but may also use it for street repairs.

Eight primary road bridges and 87 local spans remain on the county's list of "things to do," he said. All have been rated inadequate, even though Neils said they have a "fairly high capacity." Their low rating is largely due to the fact that most can handle only one lane of traffic.

The largest single problem bridge on the county's list is the 100-year-old span across the Kalamazoo river at New Richmond. It is ranked as the "5th worst" in Michigan. According to Neils, "it probably would be No. 1 if it carried more traffic."

Present plans call for replacing the New Richmond bridge with a 5-span, 320-foot structure which would be relocated approximately a half-mile downstream. Neils indicated the existing bridge — one of the oldest still in use in Michigan — would be kept open to automobile traffic as long as it is practical. The span has been closed to trucks for many years.

"Barring unforeseen changes in federal and state restrictions and funding," Neils said work would be started on the New Richmond replacement bridge this year.

Holland Starts Court Suit

GRAND HAVEN — The city of Holland started a suit in Ottawa Circuit Court Friday against the Holland Hitch Co. of 430 West 18th St., Holland, the result of an explosion at the plant July 30, 1971.

The plaintiff (city) claims that the company had under its care and control on that date a tank of propane gas, which allegedly exploded and caused damage to the Wildwood drain, owned by the city.

It is claimed that the explosion damaged the drain and other property and a judgment of \$25,000 is sought by the city.

Rites in Kalamazoo For J.C. Singleton

KALAMAZOO — Funeral services were held at St. Luke's Episcopal Church here at 3 p.m. today for Jack C. Singleton, 61, of Kalamazoo who died Tuesday. Burial was in Mount Everest cemetery, Kalamazoo.

A stepson, Raymond Sartini of Holland is among his survivors who also include his wife; three sons and five daughters, all of Kalamazoo; a son in Texas; two stepdaughters in Hopkins and Allegan; 39 grandchildren; three great-grandchildren; a brother in Massachusetts and two sisters in New Hampshire.

Allegan Woman Faces Murder Charge in Court

ALLEGAN — Carolyn Jean Lacy, 21, of Allegan, was held without bond Tuesday in the Allegan County jail for a March 20 appearance in Allegan Circuit Court on a charge of first degree murder.

Miss Lacy was bound over to circuit court at her preliminary examination Monday in district court in connection with the March 4 shotgun slaying of Mark Lee Johnson, 21, of Allegan.

Johnson was struck in the stomach and right side by a blast from a shotgun discharged in the Lacy home.

Allegan police said Johnson, a Vietnam war veteran, was among several persons in the Lacy home. The shooting followed an alleged request that the visitors leave the house. Johnson died less than an hour later in the Allegan General Hospital.

Rotterdam Visitor Kept Busy on Visit

"You are treating me royally," said Albert van Raalte of Rotterdam, director of the observation tower Euromast, as he toured places of interest in Holland, Mich.

As a guest of the 125th anniversary committee, van Raalte who is a direct descendant of the brother of Holland's founder, was meeting his American cousins and others interested in the early history of Holland at a coffee kletz this afternoon from 3 to 5 p.m. in the Dutch Grill of Hotel Warm Friend.

He was a guest of Willard C. Wichers of the Netherlands Information Service at a weekly meeting of the Rotary Club this noon.

On Wednesday, he visited the Van Raalte gravesite in Pilgrim Home cemetery and the Reimold estate on the hill on East 16th St. near 112th Ave. Chamber of Commerce personnel showed him local industries including a visit to Lake Michigan and Taylor Produce and its food storage operation which was of particular interest since van Raalte operates two restaurants in the Euromast and also manages the Kurhaus, an exclusive resort hotel in Scheveningen on the North Sea.

He had an opportunity to see American democracy in action by attending a regular meeting of City Council Wednesday night, preceded by an informal supper session. On arrival Tuesday night, he was greeted by a group in the Wichers home.

The Rotterdam man is the only male Van Raalte descendant of the Van Raalte family in the Netherlands today. He has an 84-year-old aunt, Petronella Cornelia van Raalte.

Dr. A. C. Van Raalte, Holland's founder, was one of 17 children of whom eight became adults. There were three men, A. C., Petrus and Arend Johannes Christiaan. The latter is the great grandfather of the Rotterdam man. Arend Johannes died in 1848, a year after his brother founded the Holland colony.

Mrs. J.W. Ederle Succumbs at 86

Mrs. John W. (Mae T.) Ederle, 86, who had lived in the Warm Friend Apartments since last September, died early Sunday in Holland Hospital where she had been a patient for two weeks.

Born in Grand Rapids, she had lived most of her life in the Jenison Park area of Holland. She was a member of Third Reformed Church. Her husband died in April, 1961.

Surviving are a sister-in-law, Mrs. Ruby Toren, and a niece, Mrs. Fred Thomas; both of Muskegon.

Plasman, Riksen On First Team

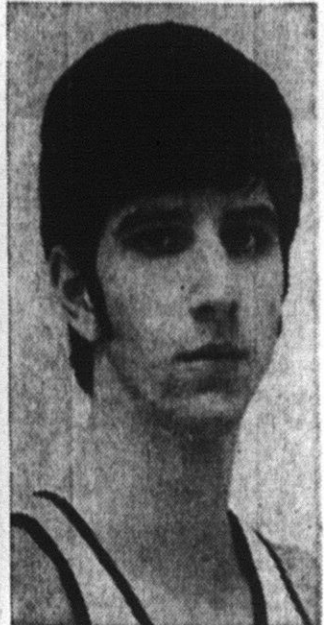
Mark Veenstra, Hudsonville Unity's giant junior center, heads the 1971-72 All-Area basketball team released today by The Sentinel's sports staff.

Holland's 6'2" senior is one of the finest jumpers in the state and is called by Roger Kole of Holland, "the second highest jumper" he ever saw.

Kole is a devoted Holland Christian fan that also attends many Holland, West Ottawa, Hope College and Calvin College games.

"Only Doug Oostendorp of Hudsonville Unity can jump like Riksen," Kole stated. "You don't see many white kids leap like he does."

Oostendorp led the Crusaders into the state Class B finals against River Rouge in 1963.

His coach Andy Ten Harnsnel added, "When you compare Oostendorp, you're comparing someone to 'jumping' Johnny Green of Michigan State. Oostendorp has jumped as high as 11'6".

Christian's Plasman was the big reason for his team's success this past winter. The 6'2" sharp-shooter can hit from any part of the court. He led the Maroons in scoring by a wide margin and is a gifted ball handler.

"Dan enjoyed a great season for us," Coach Elmer Ribbens related. "He did everything that we asked and even more."

The second tallest cager on the All-Area squad is Hamilton's Roelofs, who averaged 13 points and 13 rebounds an outing for the high flying Hawkeyes, who won 14 games in a row before losing to Fennville in the district.

"Kerwin did a fine job for us this season and was one of the big reasons we did so well," Coach Tom Bos said.

Nyenhuis is the only repeat from last year's honor team. The 6'2" Hudsonville star almost led the inspired Eagles to a stunning upset over Hudsonville Unity in the District, as he threw in 39 counters in an 85-82 overtime loss.

"Tom is as good a shooter as I have seen all season," said his Coach Jim Hulst. "He had a great year and we're going to really miss him."

Named to the second team were Holland's Steve Shinabarger, West Ottawa's Mike Gorman, Saugatuck's Dave Mocini, Fennville's John Van Voorhees and Zeeland's Steve Bassett.

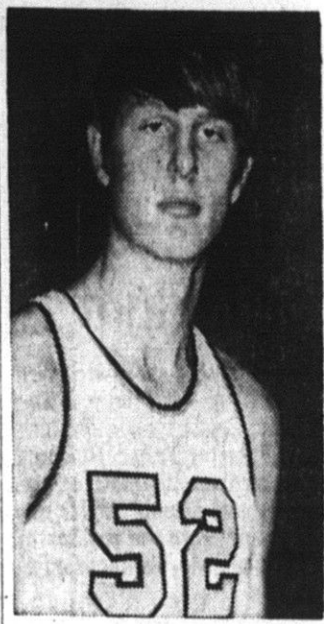

Mocini was the Indians high scorer while Bassett was the Chix' most consistent cager.

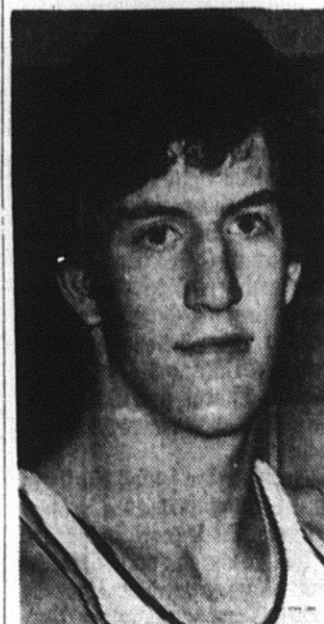
Van Voorhees was the big reason that Fennville won a Class C District crown and its first Regional game ever.

Named today as top area mentor was Hamilton's Tom Bos, who made his last season one of his most successful, guiding the Hawkeyes to a fine 15-5 overall record and a second place finish in the O-K Blue Division behind Wyoming Lee.

Bos, 33, has been head basketball coach at Hamilton since the doors opened 12 years ago. His overall coaching record is 120-100.

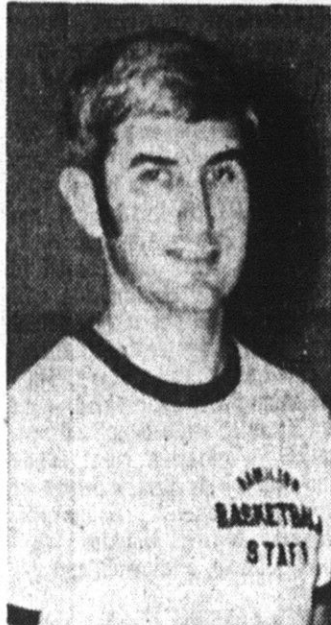
His clubs won district titles and league championships in 1967 and 1969.

Moliere Classic Done In Well-Paced Style

An audience in a relaxed and receptive mood thoroughly enjoyed the handsomely staged and well-costumed National Players production of Moliere's "The Miser" at the Civic Center Wednesday night.

The stylized comedy of a miser, his son and daughter and their intrigues to defeat his greedy plans move at a fast pace as done by the capable and attractive cast. The performance of Alan Share as Harpagon, the old miser, was a gem of timing and nuance, as he utilized every trick in the actor's bag to extract more laughs from the audience.

The story is ridiculous by modern standards, but Moliere's sly digs at fashion, human nature and the generation gap are what makes the comedy a classic in any language.

As is the case in Shakespeare, Moliere lavishes the same care and as many clever lines on minor characters as major, and those portraying La Fleche, the valet, Master Jacques, the cook and coachman and the three household servants take advantage of every chance to upstage the major protagonists of the silly plot.

By the time the play was winding up in a flurry of coincidence, with all the lovers reunited and Harpagon restored to his casket of money, the laughs were almost drowning the lines.

While the Civic Center is less than ideal for theatrical productions, the National Players group used excellent voice production and clear diction to make everything perfectly clear for those unable to get a clear view of the stage.

Many Items Processed By Council

City Council Wednesday night accepted legal documents in which Meijer's Inc. is deeding 17 feet of right of way along the south side of 16th St. east of Waverly Rd. to the city for highway purposes. Together with a 17-foot right of way granted on the north side, the total width in this section will be 100 feet, sufficient for the five-lane highway under consideration.

Council also approved standard contracts for the visit of Artrain, a five-car train of art work of the Michigan Council for the Arts, which will visit Holland May 31-June 6. Council also transferred \$1,500 to cover expenses incurred including shrubbery, insurance, security and the like. Former Mayor Nelson Bosman is serving as Artrain chairman. The visit here is part of the city's 125th anniversary celebration.

Tabled for further study was an application of James T. Crace for a beer-wine license for a proposed restaurant on South Washington Ave. near the I-196 interchange. The city manager's report stated the proposed facility was approximately 800 square feet short of required area for kitchen and food storage. The report also stated that the police department would strongly object to a curb cut off an exit ramp.

Claims against the city from Cal Prince, 45 Bellwood Dr., and Randall J. Veenhoven, 940 East 10th St., were referred to the city's insurance carrier.

Council tabled an offer of Hope College of a greenhouse presently located at Marigold Lodge to the city for erection and use at Windmill Island.

Since the college had requested that biology students be granted access to study at the greenhouse, Council felt it should clear with attorneys since revenue bonds required strict adherence on admission fees.

City Manager William L. Bopf reported that the Department of Natural Resources has rejected a plan to enlarge Washington School playground into a park project and Council approved his recommendation to terminate the plan and return earmarked funds back into the capital improvement fund.

The city manager and police chief were authorized to sign federal grant applications to continue the Traffic Safety Unit for the coming year. It was noted that the local share in the form of actual cash outlay represents an increase of \$1,685 out of the projected amount of \$8,900.

Council tabled a proposed plan to extend 24th St. west of Ottawa Ave. on the basis of cost of \$13,141 to construct two C and O grade crossings. Property owners interested in the proposal have until April 5 to reevaluate the plan.

After a two-week tabling process, Council decided to eliminate parking during certain hours on the east side of Lugers Rd. at Lakeview School. This runs north from 32nd St. for 416 feet.

Announcement was made that a region 5 meeting of the Michigan Municipal League will be held in Grandville April 20.

The Board of Public Works advised that improvements at the waste treatment plant will be completed several months ahead of schedule, and that training of personnel and staffing of plant for the new operation will be needed sooner than had been anticipated. New positions and changes in existing positions were authorized.

Council acknowledged several cash gifts for the police department to be used for sending disadvantaged children to camp this summer. Gifts listed \$5 from Young Adults of Montello Park Christian Reformed Church, \$10 from the Mothers of Twins Club, \$10 from Graafschap Men's Society, \$10 from Overisel Reformed Church Intermediate C.E. and \$284.28 representing proceeds from the police-Hope College benefit basketball game.

April 5 was set as date for public hearing on a sanitary sewer project in Bay Ave.

Mayor Lamb appointed Ken Elhart to the Board of Public Works to fill the unexpired term of Robert Wolbrink who is moving from the city.

Among the visitors was Albert van Raalte of Rotterdam, a direct descendant of the brother of Dr. A.C. Van Raalte, Holland's founder, who is spending a few days in Holland as the guest of the 125th Anniversary committee.

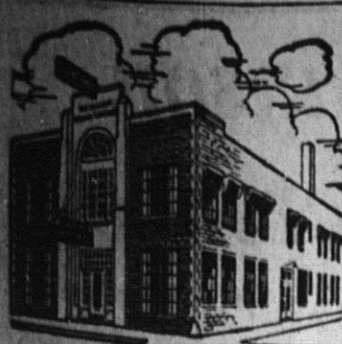

One doesn't have to get too far from home to see some expensive urban renewal with the only result, the blight moving farther down the street.

We keep trying all these panaceas only to find that we haven't solved the problems, we have only increased them.

We keep spending billions on education with grants for every conceivable notion that comes to the mind of man, and the state tests simply tell us that Beaver Island, with no great school system, is way out front, and some small town in the Upper Peninsula with no pipeline to the newest fads, does very well.

Columist Saul Friedman tells us that senators like Fred Harris and our own Philip Hart are becoming disillusioned. They are beginning to realize that they haven't come up with utopia. The most recent stories on the government's excursion into housing ought to add to the disillusion.

Acts 4: 32-37; Romans 15:1-7

The young church was growing and it had problems. The Holy Spirit had empowered the membership. Unity and love prevailed among the members and they sought each other's material and spiritual welfare. I. Sharing is Christian. The early Christians were conscious of being members of a great spiritual family. All belonged to God and everyone was a steward. All were conscious of their relationship to God, their Father, and to the members, for all belonged to God's family.

Some had more wealth than others. Evidently some were in needy circumstances. Those who had wealth sold some of their property and brought the money to the apostles who made distribution according to the need. Later the apostles transferred this work to the deacons. (Acts 6:1-6)

"And with great power gave the apostles witness to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus"—the apostles preached and did social work in the congregation. Both kinds of service are still needed, and the servant church must minister to the need.

II. A good example helps. "Jesus, who by the apostles was surnamed Barnabas, (which is being interpreted, The son of consolation)" had some land, sold it and brought the money to the apostles who distributed it. Not all members were like Barnabas.

The early church was imperfect. The story of Ananias and his wife Sapphira proves this. Selfishness, pride, hypocrisy and the lust for honor, these sins and others were also present in the early church. Although the apostles preached with great power, not everyone heeded.

III. Christ is still our example. Romans 14 discusses the problem of food and the observance of special days. Paul said that the strong in faith should bear the infirmities of the weak. Those who have are under obligations to those who have not. Paul quotes Psalms 69 which foretold about Jesus Christ, who suffered for God's glory. The disgrace which was cast of God brought grief to Christ. It cost Christ much to please the Father and to redeem mankind but He did it. He set us a fine example.

Everything that is written in the Old Testament is for our benefit that we might have hope together and with one mind and mouth glorify God, the Father of the Lord Jesus Christ. All Christians were received, that is welcomed by Jesus Christ, all, regardless of whether they were weak or strong, and therefore we should welcome each other.

Old Dutch Service Will Be New Tulip Time Feature

Holland Tulip Time festival May 17-20 will have a new touch this year — geared to the 125th anniversary of the founding of Holland.

The festival will open with its usual street scrubbing ceremony, folk parade and klompen dancing, but at 4 p.m. that day, visitors and townsfolk will wend their way to Holland's oldest church, the historic Pillar Church, for a Dutch service.

There, the Rev. Fred W. Van Houten in the role of a Dutch dominie will do the traditional long tail and will deliver a sermon in the Dutch language. A voorzinger (song leader) will lead the singing of Dutch psalms, the fine old chorales in measured rhythm. The collection will be taken up in bags on long poles which church deacons move in front of each person in the pews.

But for convenience, the bulletin will be in both Dutch and English.

Holland's 125th anniversary started off Feb. 6 with a religious service in Dimment Memorial Chapel on Hope College campus. It was the Sunday

closest to the historic date Feb. 9, 1847, when Holland's founder, Dr. A. C. Van Raalte, arrived with his scouting party to found a city in the wilderness.

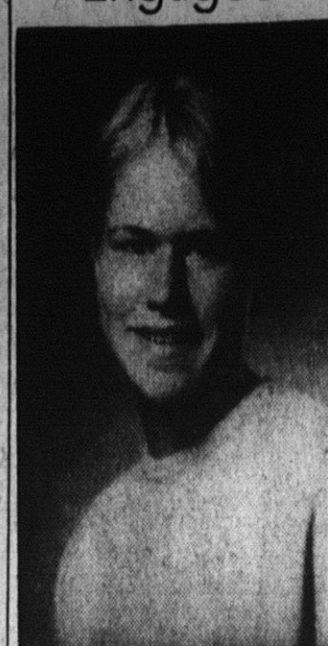

New Parking Plan Near Completion

City Council Wednesday night took steps leading to an expanded parking program in the Central business district, following a year of study and deliberation.

In general, the plan calls for validated parking, attended lots, and parking tokens provided by cooperating merchants. Thus, a shopper buying merchandise will be reimbursed in part or total for parking time used. Tokens also can be used in parking meters.

Specifically, Council by resolution requested the Building Authority to enter into a parking program in the amount of \$518,920. Council also revised certain ordinances extending parking meters in areas south of the downtown district.

No longer will parking be free on Wednesday afternoon or Monday night. Plans call for three validated parking lots and one lot farther out for day-long parking at about 50 cents a day.

City Manager William L. Bopf said parking tokens, bearing the imprint of the city's 125th anniversary are expected April 10, and he was hopeful that one or two validated lots would be ready by that time. Most meters by that time will be reset to 10 cents an hour or the equivalent. These increases were authorized months ago.

Mayor L. W. Lamb Jr. said most Holland residents do not understand the new parking program, that in effect it will be a great aid to shoppers, not a hindrance.

Council approved low bid of R. E. Reed Inc. for parking control equipment totaling \$18,370.28 to be used in attended lots. Most of these lots will be manned by city employees under EEA.

Bopf also announced a meeting March 22 of some 300 downtown merchants and store owners to review the entire revised parking program.

Third Rate Postage Increases in Effect

Third-class postage rate increases are now in effect at Holland post office, Postmaster Louis A. Haight said today. Third class covers circulars and advertisements.

Single piece rate for two ounces remains at 8 cents and 10 cents for three. Four ounces cost 15 cents, up one cent. Seven ounces cost 21 cents, up from 18.

Regular bulk rate for circulars, etc., is 28 cents per pound, up from 23. Books and catalogs under bulk rate will be 21 cents a pound, up from 17, and the minimum per piece is five cents up one cent.

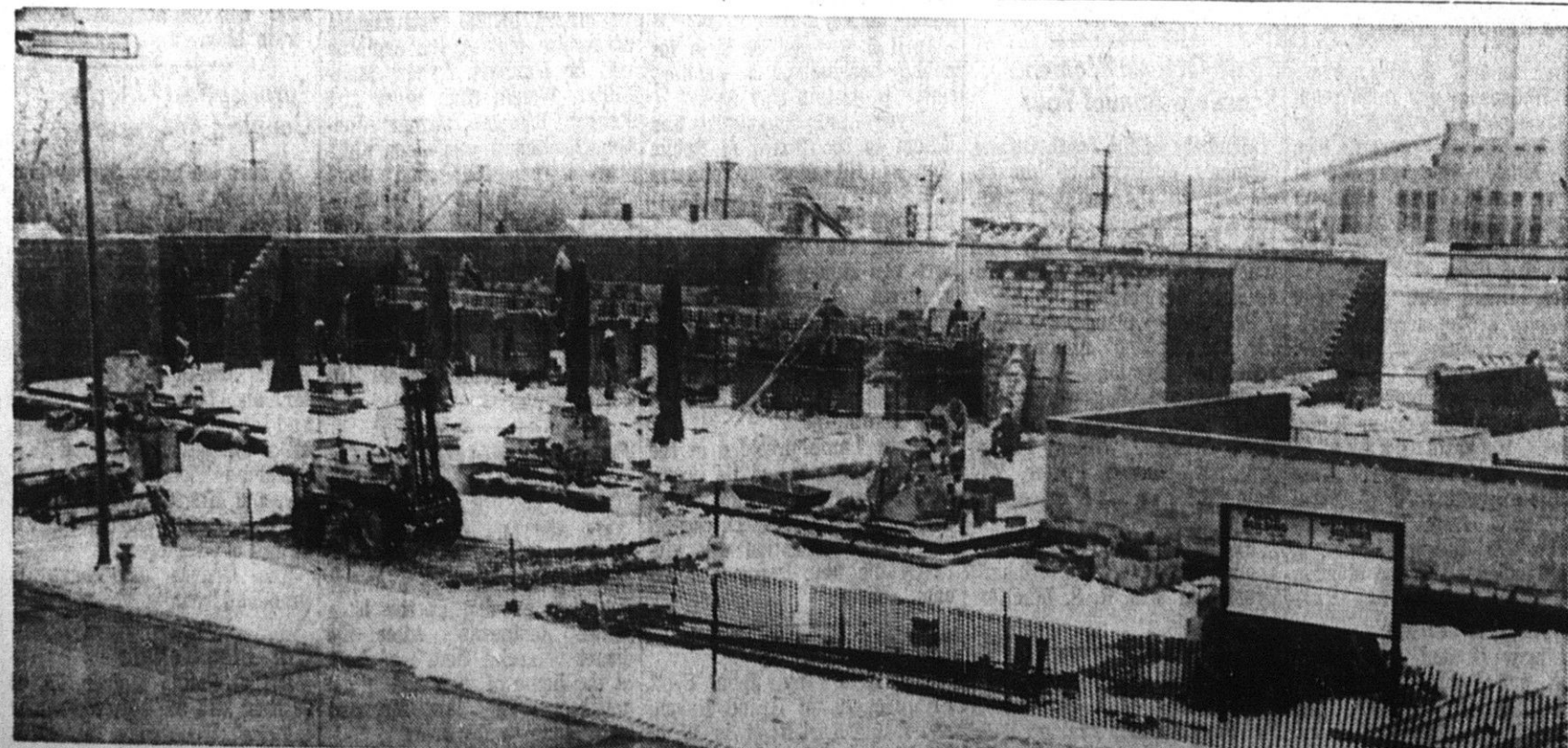

It was predicted that in 1972, 12,000 women will die of cancer of the uterus, yet this kind of cancer is almost 100 per cent curable.

Both the National Cancer Institute and the American Cancer Society report that the death count in 1972 will rise to 345,000. "For women the overall incidence is decreasing. For men, the peril is rising. The lung-cancer death rate among American men is three times greater than it was in 1947. Women are suffering from lung cancer in growing numbers."

In closing the meeting, Mrs. Dalman requested the captains to complete their lieutenants' list.

Captains and lieutenants were there representing the city of Holland and townships of Holland, North and South Zeeland, Park, Olive, Port Sheldon, Jamestown and Blendon.

Zeeland Firm Named In Damage Suit

GRAND RAPIDS — Big Dutchman of Zeeland, a division of U.S. Industries, was named in an \$816,500 damage suit filed in federal district court here Feb. 14 in connection with the destruction of nine poultry houses and 97,000 chickens during a snow and sleet storm in Montgomery County, N.C.

The plaintiffs are A11 Star Mills, Inc., and AGL Star Hatcheries, Inc., who had common stockholders at the time they operated the Fairview Farms, a poultry and egg producing business in Montgomery County when the storm struck Feb. 17, 1969.

The plaintiffs say they purchased 387 steel trusses for the construction of the poultry houses through Big Dutchman in 1963 for \$47,500 but did not live up to express and implied warranties assuring they would withstand severe adverse weather conditions.

Big Dutchman designs and manufactures materials and equipment supplies for farming operations, particularly for poultry products production.

In addition to Big Dutchman, other defendants listed in the court action were Dick-Jack Co., also known as Big Dutchman Inc., and Automatic Poultry Feeder Co. Central Pipe and Steel Supply Co., Inc., and Central Fabricators Inc. of Benton Harbor where Big Dutchman obtained the trusses.

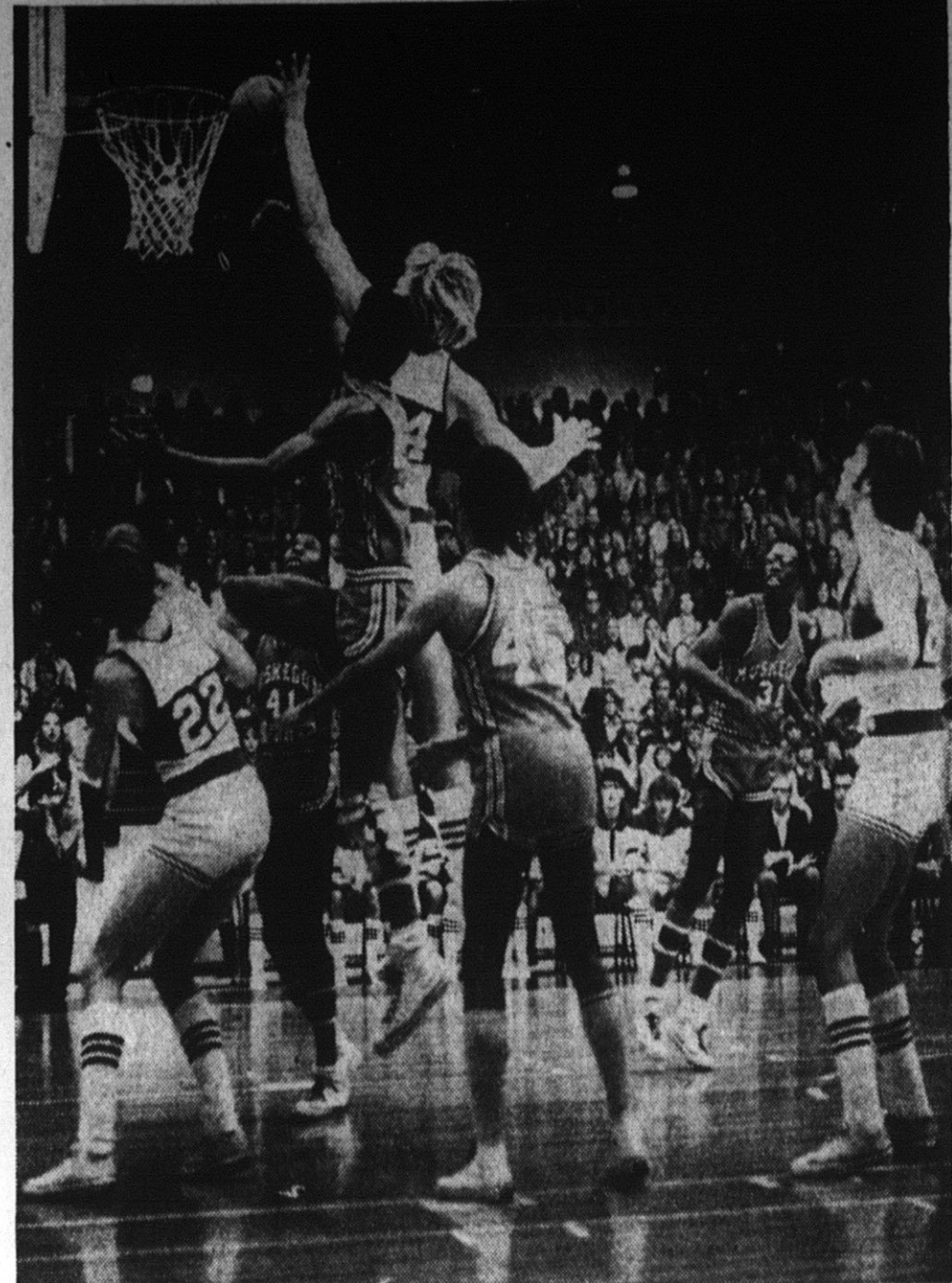

Defense Tough On Big Veenstra

MUSKEGON — Muskegon Heights, the top rated Class B team in the state sent Hudsonville Unity into spring sports by taking a heart-pounding 80-74 decision Friday night in L.C. Walker Arena.

The victory gave the favored Tigers the Regional basketball championship and sends them into quarterfinal action.

The key to the game was the Tigers' boxing defense on big Mark Veenstra. The 6'8" Unity star pumped in 46 markers in the Crusaders' 94-81 win over Spring Lake Thursday but was held to 26 counters by Heights, with only two of them coming in the crucial fourth period.

"Their tough defense on Mark was the difference of the game," said a disappointed Coach Andy Ten Harsel in the quiet Crusaders dressing room. "We just couldn't get the ball into him like we normally do."

One of the big reasons that Unity couldn't get the ball in to their huge pivot man was because of the presence of 6'5" center Al McGlothlin of the Tigers, who actually ate Veenstra up on the offensive boards and only scored one less point, 26-25.

"McGlothlin played a beautiful game," stated first year Coach Ossie McCarty of the Tigers.

Unity finished the game by hitting on 31 of 76 shots from the field for a 40 per cent mark while the Tigers canned 34 of 74 for 47 per cent.

The Tigers did have 22 turnovers while the Crusaders only committed 13 mistakes.

Guard Gregg Aten, who kept Unity in the game most of the evening with his outside shooting followed Veenstra in scoring with 20 counters. Forward Dean Van Vugt added 18.

Heights' two forwards Tony Smith and Ed Merriweather backed up McGlothlin with 19 points apiece for the winners.

Veenstra, who led Unity to a great 18-5 season swished a charity toss to give the Crusaders a 1-0 opening tip advantage. Neither team held more than a two point margin through the entire first quarter which ended in an 18-18 standstill.

Four straight free throws by reserve Chuck Aldrink gave Unity the night's biggest lead, 24-18 at that time early in the second session.

Aten's fielder gave Unity its last lead of the evening, 65-64 early in the final stanza. Junior forward Mike Kamps fouled out with 5:53 left and Unity down by one point, 66-65. From then on, it was all the Tigers, as they cashed in at the charity line to wrap up the thrilling contest.

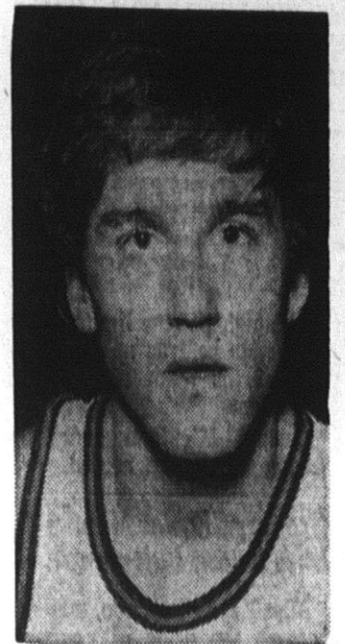

Maciasz was selected from nominees submitted by each MIAA member. Each coach did not vote for his own nominee.

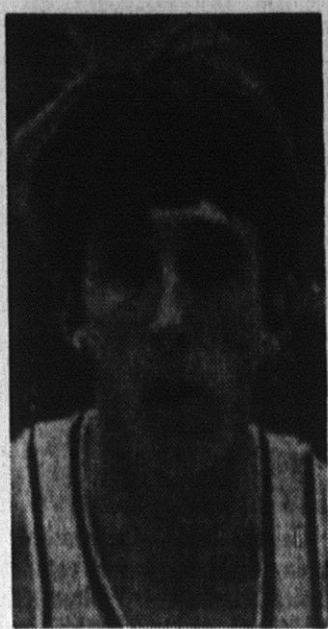

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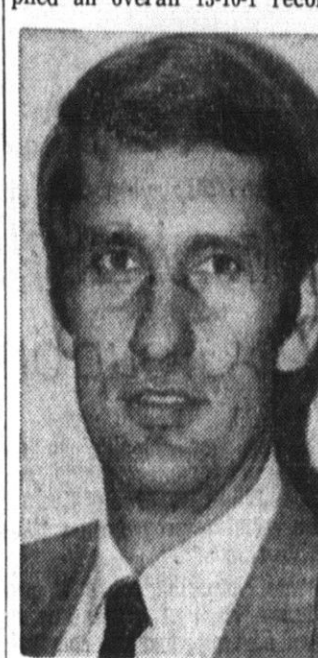

She said the committee had visited the Mona Shores district which had built two junior high schools at the same time, and found this arrangement was more economical than building separately, also that with one building progressing slightly ahead of the other, problems on the second building were worked out well in advance. The study also covered cafeteriums, pools and recreational facilities.

John Weeber, chairman of the buildings and grounds committee, said the state police had inspected all school buses and had approved them for safety.

Don Piersma, Dirk Bloemendaal and Ken Bauman of the high school faculty outlined plans for an outdoor education program, listing camping trips, instruction in fishing and shooting, a study of natural resources and the environment, field trips and preparation for the outdoor excursion of camping.

Bloemendaal showed a film he had taken called Paddle Packers in which the three men visited the Sylvania wilderness area in the upper peninsula, a vast area containing 36 lakes which the state had purchased for \$5.7 million, an unspoiled area where President Eisenhower had often gone fishing. The film was incomplete and a Bloemendaal hinted broadly that a zoom lens would provide the desired closeup pictures, besides being a great aid to Piersma in filming basketball plays.

Judy Mastenbrook presented a book selection policy for public school librarians, listing the philosophy of book selection, specific criteria for selection and criticism of materials. For the latter, a blank was designed for request for reconsideration of a book. It was made clear that there had been no crises or objections, but certain members of the board felt the time to consider procedures was at a time when there were no pressures. It was pointed out that a few school districts had been experiencing trouble over stocking some books. In general, problems will be resolved in their own buildings with the aid of principal and teachers, with the superintendent notified of the course of action.

Board action was taken for the special school election April 10 to levy 4.65 mills for school operations. An absent voter counting board was authorized, and some 50 election workers were approved for the regular precincts. Saturday, April 8, at 2 p.m. will be the deadline for applying for absentee ballots in the city clerk's office.

It was also pointed out that 18-year-olds not only may vote in the April 10 election, but also are eligible to run for the school board at the June election. It was stated that the law has been revised so that a candidate no longer need be a property owner in the district.

For the annual election in June, there is one vacancy this year and Charles Bradford, whose term expires, said he expects to be a candidate again.

President Lamb presided at the meeting which lasted two hours. Robert Gosselaar gave the invocation. John Amaya was absent.

Besides its coastline of 200 miles, the country has 4,003 miles of canals which serve as water roads. The Netherlands is 120 miles at its widest point and is 190 miles long.

The capital of the small nation is Amsterdam and the seat of government is The Hague. Rotterdam has the largest port in the world and also has one of the largest air plane companies.

The religion of the royal family of The Netherlands is Dutch Reformed but 40 per cent of the population is Roman Catholic and 38 per cent is Protestant, Mrs. De Pree said.

Between the ages of six and 15 years, attendance in public schools is mandatory and the teachers are paid by the government. Sixty per cent of the children go on to secondary schools and those who prefer to go into trades must attend the trade schools where they are taught four languages.

There are flower markets all over the country and each housewife puts plants in her windows. The people like privacy, have a strong family life and are tolerant.

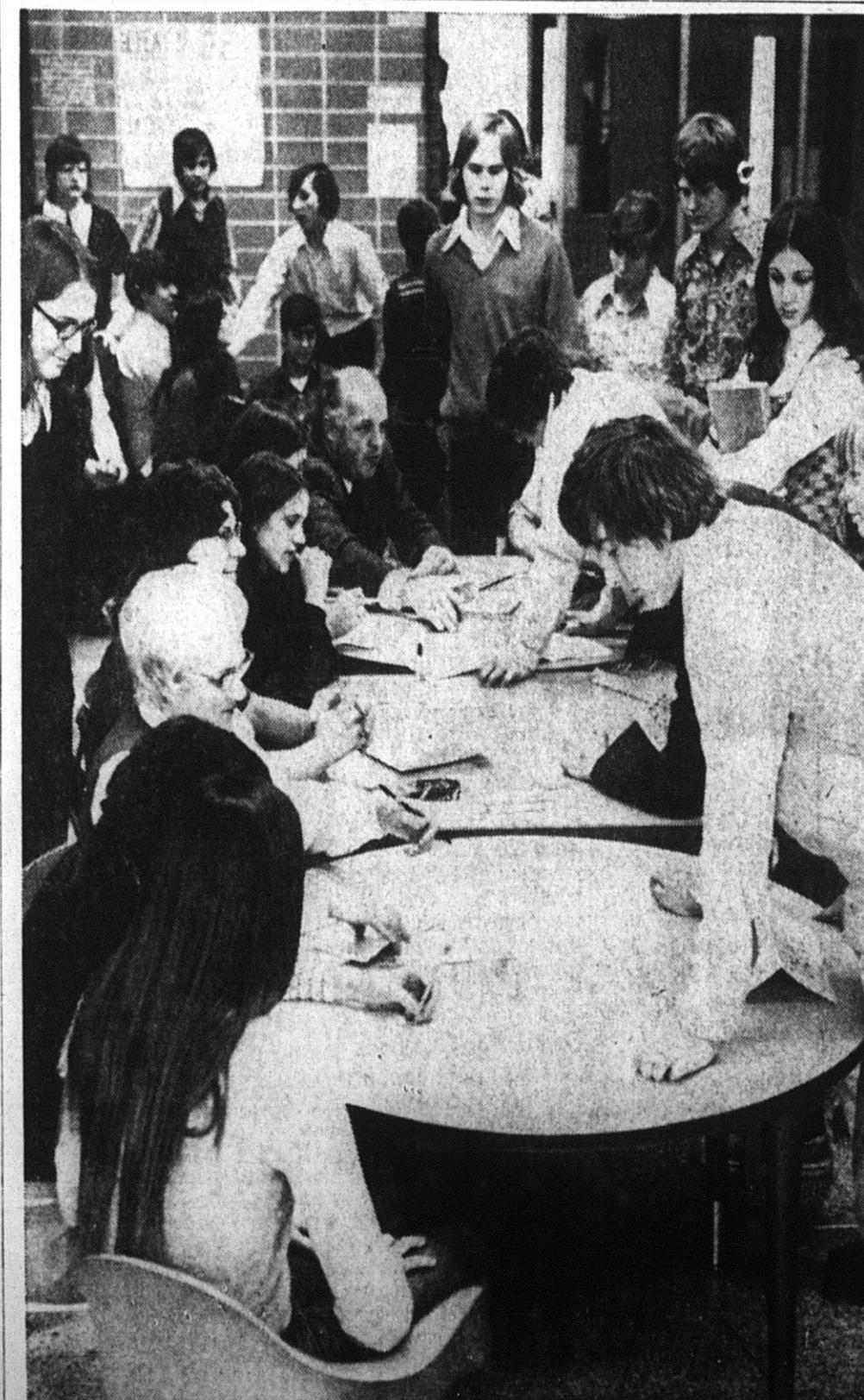

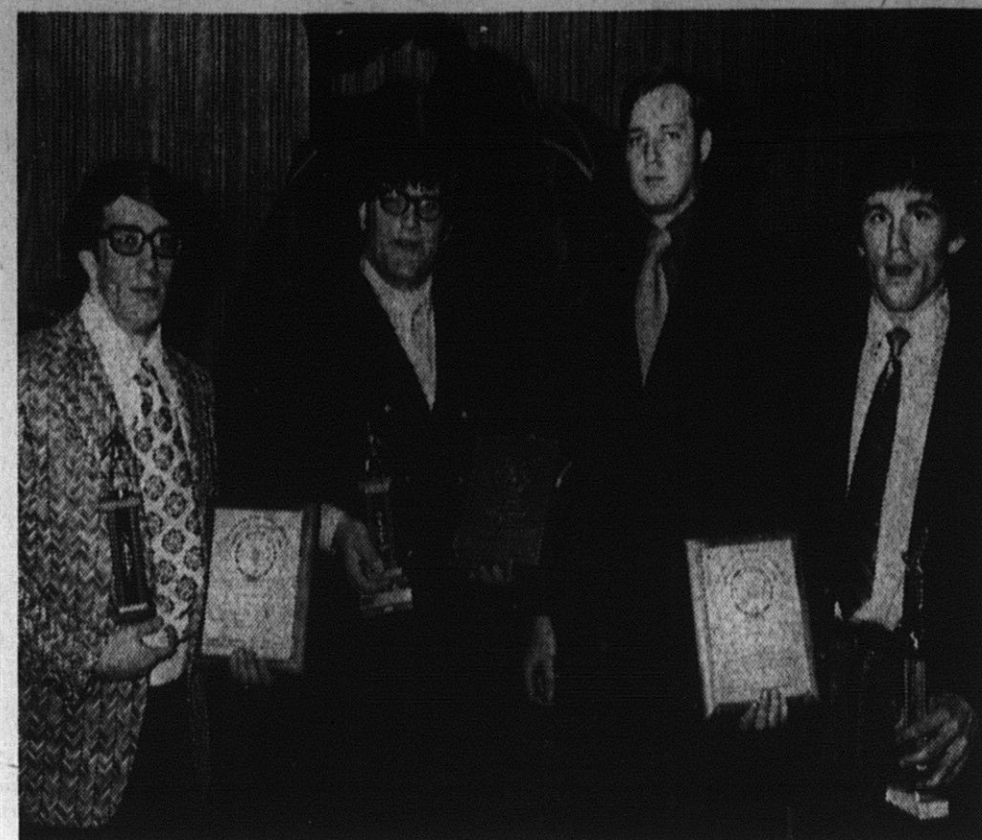

To Expand Services In County

GRAND HAVEN — Following a heated debate, the Ottawa County Board of Commissioners Monday approved extending welfare services by renting space in a building in Allendale, but later agreed unanimously to survey vacant space available for county services, especially the health department, in the Georgetown-Jamestown area.

The discussion followed a report on social services by Larry Hilldore, director of the county department. Commissioner William Winstrom, chairman of the buildings and grounds committee, said more space is needed for Hilldore's department and said a firm in Allendale is willing to erect an addition at a rental of \$6,072 a year for 2,000 feet.

Commissioner Ray Vander Laan of Hudsonville opposed the Allendale proposition, stating the board should consider more county services in the populous Hudsonville-Jenison area. Plans call for drafting a lease for the Allendale property, with final action in April. Part of the rental will be paid by the state.

Hilldore said 188 positions have been filled in the county under the federal Emergency Employment Act, listing expenditures since Jan. 1 of \$116,359.50 with \$24,479 as the local share. He was authorized to fill three vacancies, a legal aide and secretary for his office and a coordinator in the migrant labor program which operates from March to December in Ottawa.

Two changes were authorized in office accommodations in the county building. The environmental section of the health department will move to a vacant room on the second floor and the Social Services department will have an office in room 103.

The board approved application for federal funds to be used in an area wide study requested by the Grand Haven - Spring Lake sewer authority. D. D. Tammen of Grand Haven said such a study is required before the authority can apply for federal funds under HUD for the \$6 million sewage plant.

Resolutions of Grand Haven, Spring Lake and surrounding townships requested a program of comprehensive planning in the county or on a regional basis. The Grand Haven plant has scheduled ground breaking May 31 and the authority must be involved in a planning program within 60 days, Tammen said.

The planning study will be made in cooperation with the West Michigan Shore Line Planning Commission.

Director Glenn Timmer of the county Civil Defense department was awarded a citation from the State Department of Health for outstanding efforts in disaster planning, medical stockpiling and medical self-help projects in the county. The CD office also received a service award from the U.S. Department of Commerce National Weather Service for cooperation offered by the county CD
