Civic Groups Study Future School Needs

Enrollment Projections, Population Trends Charted in Local Area

Enrollment projections and population trends with a view to developing schools in the proper places were discussed at a two-hour meeting of several civic groups Monday night in the Warm Friend Tavern.

Attending were members of City Council, Holland Planning Commission and Board of Education, plus representatives of the Board of Public Works, Chamber of Commerce and neighboring school districts.

Reports were presented by Arthur Read, school building consultant, and Scott Bagby, planning consultant. Although Read's report based on projected enrollments and Bagby's on population trends, there was a great deal of similarity in pointing out school needs of the future.

Read submitted a 60-page report with detailed information on enrollment figures and an inventory of present facilities in the greater Holland area which includes not only the present Holland school district, but Van Raalte, Federal, Lakeview, Harrington, Maplewood, Apple Avenue and Montello Park districts.

Read's report revealed that the five elementary schools inside the original city have 71 classrooms, 55 of which are satisfactory and 16 that need replacement. Elementary schools in the Apple Avenue, Maplewood and Montello Park districts have 24 classrooms, 18 termed satisfactory and six that require replacement. Lakeview, Van Raalte, Federal and Harrington districts have 36 classrooms, 27 termed satisfactory and nine that require replacement.

Holland High School plus the "farm house" has 22 classrooms, and it is recognized that nearly all these rooms require some renovations before any of them can be called satisfactory. Junior High including the annex has 30 classrooms. Some renovations are required but they are far less in scope and cost than in the older high school building.

For the present year, schools in the entire area included in the survey have 5,247 students, listing 3,020 in elementary schools, 940 in junior high and 1,287 in high school. Facilities could comfortably care for 3,800 students, thus the area has 1,447 students in excess of reasonably satisfactory housing.

This overflow is accommodated by use of sub-standard classrooms (basements) rented areas in churches, use of a store building, curtailments of program and a general juggling of teachers, classes and space.

Consultant Bagby displayed charts of land uses in the recently annexed areas, and charted general trends in population trends, mentioning that 1958 was the first year that the birth rate ran behind the previous year since the postwar period. There was considerable discussion of having buildings fit the educational philosophies, and he showed color slides on school park developments in Grand Rapids, making the schools community centers and keeping them in use all day every day instead of just during school hours.

Supt. Walter W. Scott commented on the Conant report compiled after exhaustive study, with emphasis on proper counseling and facilities and providing a well rounded program for all the children to be served. The report said a high school should have not less than 100 students in a grade and not be so large that the identity of the student is lost in the total program. He pointed to Evanston, Ill., high school which has a national reputation for an excellent school program. This school has an enrollment of 4,000 students and will become larger.

Conclusion of the meeting was to place schools in the right location and utilizing funds to the best advantage, bearing in mind that schools should serve neighborhoods as well as providing education for children.

Clare Broad Transferred From Holland

Park Manager Will Go To Grand Haven April 1 After 12 Years Here

Holland State Park Manager Clare Broad said Wednesday he has been notified by the State Parks and Recreation Department that he will be transferred as manager to the Grand Haven State Park, effective March 29.

In return, the park manager at Grand Haven, Louis Haney, will be transferred to Holland.

Broad, 60 years old, has served as manager at Holland State Park for the last 12 years. Prior to that he was manager of the Magnus State Park at Petoskey for four years. He has worked for the Parks and Recreation Department since 1940.

Under Broad's direction, Holland State Park has become known as one of the finest parks in the state. Holland led all state parks in the number of camping permits issued in 1958, and was second in total revenue.

In the past 12 years, an additional road has been built at the park, trailer and tenting facilities have been enlarged and improved and a laundry building has been added for the convenience of campers.

Broad said he has greatly enjoyed working at Holland, and expressed appreciation for all the cooperation he has received from local individuals, county deputies, city police and local civic groups, particularly the Tulip City Rod and Gun Club and Holland Boy Scouts.

Parks Department officials said the change was being made for administrative reasons. Haney has served as park manager at Grand Haven since 1947, after serving as a ranger at Muskegon State Park.

Receive Word of Death Of Randolph Roshirt

Word has been received here of the death of Randolph Joseph Roshirt, 65, of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., who died Friday at his home. He was well known in Holland by members of the Macatawa Bay Yacht Club.

Mr. Roshirt was vice president of Aluminum Industries, Inc., at Cincinnati, and during World War II he served on an advisory committee to the War Production Board, the Office of Price Stabilization and the National Production Association. He formerly was executive vice president and a director of Bohn Aluminum and Brass Corp.

Funeral services were held Monday in Fort Lauderdale.

Destruction Fairly Light In Holland

Several Businesses Lose Front Windows; Some Phone, Power Lines Down

Holland was unusually fortunate Sunday, escaping with relatively minor damage as a bitter, late-winter storm spread destruction across the state with high winds, rain and snow.

Even so, reports of damage were numerous as the winds, estimated by Coast Guardsmen up to 60 miles per hour, smashed large windows in business establishments, tore the roofs off buildings, and blew down trees, television antennas and telephone wires, disrupting some telephone service in the area.

Officials at the Vandenberg Buick Co., on US-31 Monday estimated damage to the building at around \$1,000, caused when the wind Sunday afternoon blew in three large show windows and ripped loose ceiling tiles.

A \$5,000 new automobile parked in the showroom near the windows received an estimated \$300 damage to the body, finish and windshield as the glass crashed down upon it.

A large show window was also blown in at the DeNooyer Chevrolet Showroom at 221 River Ave., causing some damage to a new car.

Early in the afternoon, a 10-by-12-foot show window was smashed by the wind at the Homer Hayden store at 46 East Eighth St., with some merchandise in the window damages by flying glass.

The screaming winds tore roofs off the barns at the Oliver Schrotenboer farm at 48th St. and Central Ave. and at the John Wolters farm on 56th St., south of the city. A silo roof was blown off at the Peter Mulder farm on M-40 south of Holland.

A large branch of a tree crashed down on the sidewalk on Eighth St. at Washington Ave. at 1:30 p.m., but no pedestrians were injured and the falling branches missed telephone wires.

Windows were also reported blown out at Lincoln School and at the Boeve Oil Co. on Lincoln Ave.

Exchange Repair Foreman Harold VanderVeer of the local Michigan Bell Telephone Co. office said the Holland area was quite fortunate during the storm, with only 50 to 75 scattered phones knocked out by the winds. Crewmen were called out immediately, and today are busy repairing the damage.

On South State St., in Zeeland, a tree was blown down, carrying with it the telephone cable and disrupting service to about 50 homes. Winds at Zeeland also blew out a large window in the Hubbell File Chest display and tore awnings off the city hall and a barbershop.

About 35 telephone poles in a row were blown down by the wind on M-21 just west of Jensen, blocking the west-bound lane of traffic for a time. But telephone company officials said the cable was not broken and service was not disrupted.

However, several hundred families east of Allendale were without electric power from 5 p.m. until about midnight when the winds smashed down a power pole, causing a short circuit and burning out the main cable, according to Consumers Power Co. officials.

At Saugatuck, the fishing tug Thomas C. Mullen, commanded by Robert Peel, struggled against the howling winds, tide and swift-moving ice pack for nearly five hours before making it safely into the harbor about 6 p.m.

Peel was in contact with the Holland Coast Guard by radio throughout the ordeal, and at times did not think he would make it.

Coast Guardsmen said gale warnings were out, signifying winds from 39 to 54 miles per hour, but Bosum's Mate Chief John C. Leepa, officer in charge at the Holland Station and a 24-year veteran, said he believes the winds at times reached 60 miles per hour.

Although law agencies were overwhelmed by accidents in other parts of the state, Holland police reported no accidents during the storm and Ottawa County deputies reported only a few minor accidents.

Cornelius J. Traas Dies in Grand Haven

GRAND HAVEN (Special) — Cornelius J. Traas, 81, of Spring Lake, died Monday at Municipal Hospital following a three-week illness.

He was born in Holland and for the past three years had made his home with Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Vander Molen in Spring Lake. He formerly lived in Coopersville for 20 years, where he was employed at the Swanlund Furniture Store. He has no known survivors.

Holland High Bomb Scare Is Revealed

Police, Firemen Called Tuesday After Hoaxer Told of Bomb in School

Holland High School officials and Holland police today revealed that Holland High was the victim of a bomb scare hoax on Tuesday afternoon.

Although The Sentinel cooperated in holding the story while police pushed their investigation, Holland High School Principal Jay W. Formsa said today that, rather than allow the rumors concerning the locker inspection Tuesday to become any wilder, it was felt best to inform the student body and local residents of the facts.

Officials said that at 1:20 p.m. Tuesday, "an adult, male voice" called stating that a bomb had been planted in the high school.

Under a prearranged plan, the police and fire departments were immediately notified, as were the administration officials and school custodians.

Three firemen and two policemen rushed to the school, and two five-man teams inspected the building.

The students were not immediately informed of the bomb threat, but were asked to leave their lockers open. A thorough investigation turned up nothing.

Formsa today thanked students for their cooperation during the search. He emphasized that this is a serious matter and should not be treated as a joke.

He added that if school was dismissed because of a bomb scare, the time would have to be made up at a future date. School was not dismissed on Tuesday.

Police Chief Jacob Van Hoff said that, last fall, following a rash of bomb scares at other schools, a plan was drawn up by police, fire and school officials to deal with bomb threats.

The plan outlines specific procedure to be followed, emphasizing that the situation be met with speed and all possible secrecy, in order to facilitate investigation.

City Attorney James E. Townsend said that anyone caught phoning a bomb threat would be prosecuted to the full extent of the law. Reporting a fictitious crime, he said, is an offense carrying a possible penalty of 90 days in jail or a \$100 fine.

Holland Balloon Found in Canada

Mike Koop, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Dell Koop of 121 East 32nd St., today is in possession of a letter received from a farmer in Wainstead, Ontario, Canada, 235 miles from here, in answer to his note sent by balloon.

At the General Electric Christmas party held last Dec. 13 Mike received a helium-filled balloon and in the evening, "just for fun," he attached a note giving his name and address and offering a "reward" to the person who found the balloon and returned it to him.

It was found by Lewis Falconer, 23-year-old farmer of route 1, Wainstead, who wrote that he had found the balloon a couple of days after it had been released but had neglected to return it until now.

Delynn Van Tongeren at the Holland Wooden Shoe factory today said he would help Mike out with the reward involved by donating a pair of wooden shoes for Falconer, suitably inscribed with Falconer's name and the date the balloon was released.

The Grand Rapids Shriners band and drill team will provide pre-parade entertainment along the parade route for Saturday's big parade of bands. There also will be other pre-parade entertainment including the traditional klompen dancing to provide activity on the parade route from 2 to 6 p.m. The Shriners band also will march in the parade.

Announcement was made that the number of exhibits in Little Netherlands will be doubled this year. Sipp Houtman is in charge.

Russell Welch again will serve as marshal of the children's parade on Friday afternoon. Public schools will be dismissed Thursday and Friday afternoons during Tulip Time. There will be no children's festival at Kollen Park this year. There was some discussion on possibilities of a Sunday hymn sing.

The Red Cross will expand its services at Kollen park at the conclusion of Saturday's big parade of bands. All marching units break up at the park.

Local Share -- \$8.5 Million

Holland's share in achieving a balanced federal budget for 1960 will be close to \$8.5 million. Representative Gerald R. Ford said today.

With the President's recommendation at \$77.1 billion, the per capita cost to American people for a balanced budget is approximately \$442. Based on an estimated population for Holland of 19,500, the local share is \$8,619,000.

Ford pointed out that any action by the Congress to expand federal spending by as much as a billion dollars would increase Holland's share by \$110,760. If \$5 billion is added to the budget, the average obligation of Holland's taxpayers would be increased by \$553,800 — over half a million dollars.

Rep. Ford said, "I realize that we are dealing with averages here, but I believe that these figures illustrate dramatically the enormity of our federal spending and what it will mean to add further to the taxpayers' burden."

Ottawa and Kent counties' share in a balanced budget will be \$194,922,000, according to Ford. To spend an additional \$1 billion will increase this amount by \$25 million dollars.

Holland Man Treated For Bruises in Crash

County Man Is Killed In Smashup

Five Others Injured In 3-Car Accident West of Standale

STANDALE (Special)—An Ottawa County man was killed outright and five other persons were injured in a three-car smashup Thursday at 6:30 p.m. on M-30 at 14th Ave., two miles west of Standale.

Killed was Ronald F. Bruen, 20, of route 5, Grand Rapids (20th Ave.). Ottawa County Sheriff Bernard Grysen said Bruen was thrown from his car when it was struck broadside by another, and then he was run over by a third car as he lay in the road.

Miss Janice Zysk, 22, of 16494 Ranch Lane, Spring Lake, driver of the car which rammed Bruen, today is listed in satisfactory condition at Butterworth Hospital in Grand Rapids with a possible skull fracture and ractures of the right leg and right ankle.

The other injured, all passengers in Miss Zysk's car, were taken to St. Mary's Hospital in Grand Rapids for treatment.

Her brother, George Zysk, 16, was treated for head lacerations. Thomas Regelin, 18, of route 2, Grand Haven, received head lacerations and an injury to his right ankle.

Sharon Johnson, 19, of route 2, Grand Haven, was treated for lacerations of the head. Mary Alice Pelton, 19, of 318 Beacon Blvd., Grand Haven, received severe lacerations and head injuries.

Sheriff Grysen said Bruen was headed west on M-30 when he attempted to make a left turn in front of Miss Zysk, headed east. Miss Zysk crashed broadside into the Bruen car. Grysen said, throwing Bruen out of the car and into the road.

Then, Grysen said, a third car, driven by William J. Klemple, 16, of 1225 Robbins Rd., Grand Haven, headed east behind Miss Zysk, tried to avoid the accident, but sideswiped the Zysk car and veered off to run over Bruen.

Bruen was pronounced dead at the scene of multiple fractures by Medical Examiner Dr. Jay J. Post of Allendale. The body has been taken to the Langeland Funeral Home at Allendale where funeral arrangements are pending.

Grysen said both Bruen's 1950 model car and Miss Zysk's 1957 model car were damaged in excess of their value, and he estimated the damage to Klemple's 1955 model car at \$300.

Public Library Display Made by Mrs. Champion

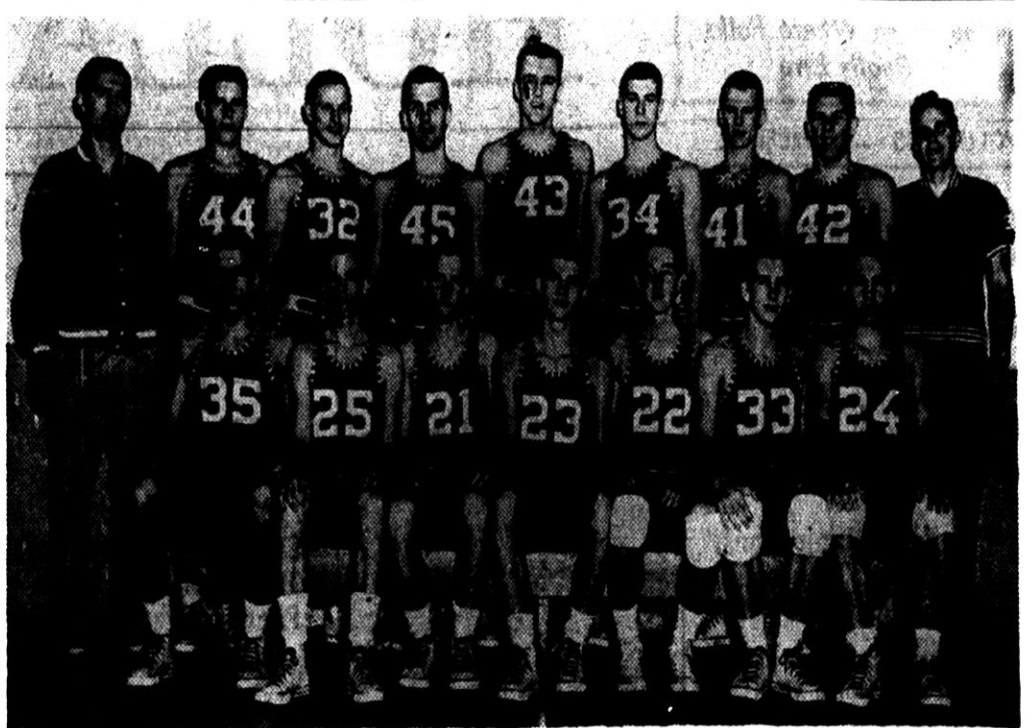
The Holland Garden Club display in the Holland Library by Mrs. R. B. Champion is an artistic arrangement of dried materials.

Holland Cagers Optimistic for Future

Holland High varsity basketball Coach Bob Cornell was smiling as he totalled up figures and averages on his 1958-59 squad.

Not since the 1953 team coached by Cornell's predecessor, Fred Weiss, has a Holland cage coach found his team in the black side of the won-lost column at season's end. That was the year the Dutch were bumped from the Class A State tourney in the quarter-finals.

This year, Holland was eliminated in the first tournament game, 68-65, by Muskegon Heights. But Cornell still found a lot to like in the individual and team statistics.

In winning nine games and losing seven, this year's rejuvenated Dutchmen outscored their opponents, 977-900. The squad averaged 61 points per game to 56.2 for their foes.

To accomplish this they hit on 39.5 per cent of all their shots from the floor, and recorded a 57.4 per cent average at the foul line. At the same time, they committed

304 personal fouls, 89 rule infractions, and fumbled the ball 70 times.

The regular season saw Holland record double wins over Grand Rapids Ottawa Hills and Grand Haven, split with Benton Harbor, Muskegon and the vaunted Muskegon Heights, and drop two to St. Joseph, still going strong in the Class B tourney. Solo wins were recorded over Grand Rapids Godwin Heights and Kalamazoo Central and a two-point loss to East Grand Rapids.

The Dutch lost two season games by only two points, and two more by four points. A nine-point loss and a six-pointer both by St. Joe were the worst beatings absorbed by the Dutch.

Cornell's smile broadened when he moved to the individual figures. Five men scored upwards of 100 points each, with little Ron Maat, a junior guard this year, amassing 182. Forward Glenn Van Wieren, also a junior, was next high man

with 166, followed by senior forward Ted Walters with 154. Junior center Ed Loncki with 121 and senior guard Jack Hulst with 116 round out the top marksmen.

Senior forward Jim Overbeek with 82 and senior Ron Dorgelo, a sub forward and center, with 67, also figured importantly in the scoring. Others were seniors Dave Wehrmeyer, 26, Hub Harrington, 11; Jim Van Putten, 7 and Bob Chambers 6. Juniors Burton Wiersma with 15 and Jack Naber with 6, plus sophomore Jim De Vries who tallied 18 complete the season totals.

Van Wieren led in rebounds with 123 offensively and 125 on defense. Loncki snared 98-126 and Walters 63-91 for the other top spots.

It's a long time until next season, but Van Wieren, Loncki and Maat are proved material for the 1960 squad. Wiersma, De Vries and Naber may be vying with members from this year's successful reserve team for starting varsity berths next year.

The mortar platoon, the machine gun platoon and the anti-tank (106 mm. recoilless rifle) platoon will be no more, as such. They will become the first and second rifle platoons and the weapons platoon.

Company Commander Capt. Clarence W. Boeve said the first rifle platoon will be led by First Lt. Roger Scheerhoorn. Platoon leader of the second rifle platoon will be Second Lt. Clare Zwiap.

First Lt. John Schutten is being transferred from his present battalion staff post as assistant S-3 (plans and training) to take command of the weapons platoon. First Lt. George Smeenge will command the headquarters platoon and serve as company executive officer.

Capt. Boeve said two of the company's 81 mm. mortars have already been reassigned, one going to Grand Haven and one to Grand Rapids.

In return, the Grand Haven unit, presently Co. F and Sunday being changed to Co. A of the Second Battle Group, has sent two Browning automatic rifles (BARs) to Co. D.

The local unit will keep its 106 mm. jeep-mounted recoilless rifle, and is slated to get another. They will keep their 50 caliber and light 30 caliber machine guns, but will lose the four heavy, water-cooled .30s. They are keeping two 81 mm. mortars.

Regimental officers said the men will be armed as soon as possible with the new NATO-style M-14 and M-15 rifles, now in production and capable of both semi-automatic and fully automatic fire. Until then, Co. D will augment its firepower with additional BARs.

In peace and in war, the men of Holland have made Co. D a heavy weapons company famed throughout the state and the world. The men have resolved to carry on the tradition as a rifle company in the new pentomic era.

Garden Clinic Plans Made

Growing interest in Russia—intensified by the recent visit of Soviet Deputy Premier Anastas Mikoyan and the publication of Boris Pasternak's controversial current best-seller about a Russian doctor-poet, "Dr. Zhivago"—has brought a rush of requests to the Holland Public Library for information on all aspects of Soviet life, according to Librarian Hazel Hayes.

"People are beginning to realize that they know very little about life in Russia, and this fact has stepped up requests for reliable information," she said.

To enlighten local residents, the librarian explained, the library has numerous books and current magazine articles covering every aspect of this vast and varied land.

One of the most informative recent books is John Gunther's 1958 best-seller "Inside Russia Today," the latest in the author's first-hand reports on the modern world. The book compares the present-day situation to the older Russia Gunther knew. He discussed the new scientific boom, the attitude of the Russian people toward America, the youth situation, and the outlook for the future.

Among other recently-published books are "The Russian Revolution" by Alan Moorhead, "The Changing World of Soviet Russia" by D. J. Dalin, "Russia and the Soviet Union" by W. B. Walsh.

Many Americans have little or no understanding of communism and its effect on the people of the world. For the interested reader, there are such excellent books as Harry and Bonaro Overstreet's recently-published "What We Must Know About Communism," Richard Ketchum's "What is Communism?" and M. Djalil's "The New Class."

A number of books deal with U. S.-Soviet relations. Newest of these are C. M. Roberts' "Can We Meet the Russians Halfway?" and Louis Fischers' "Russia Revisited."

In addition, the library has many other older volumes dealing with all aspects of Russia.

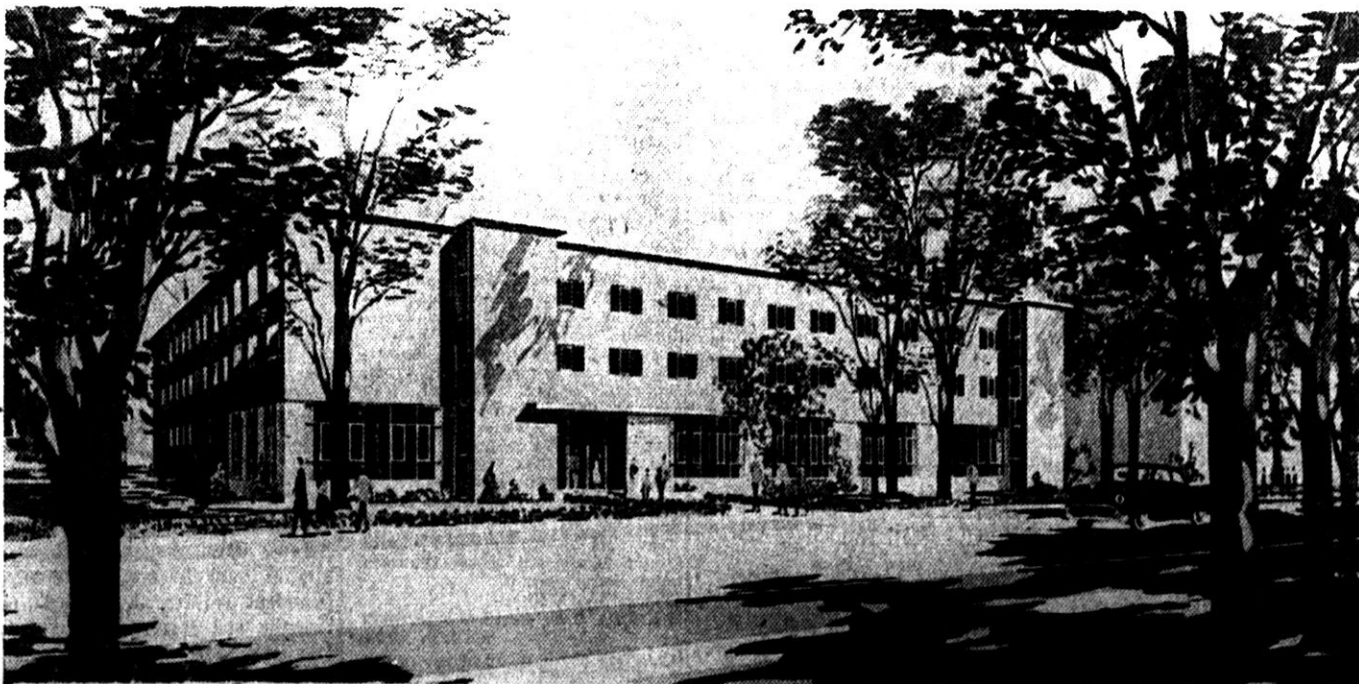
Village President Clare Broman said the council set up an operating budget of \$91,700, but spent only \$83,023.58 for operations. Village receipts totalled \$99,248.78.

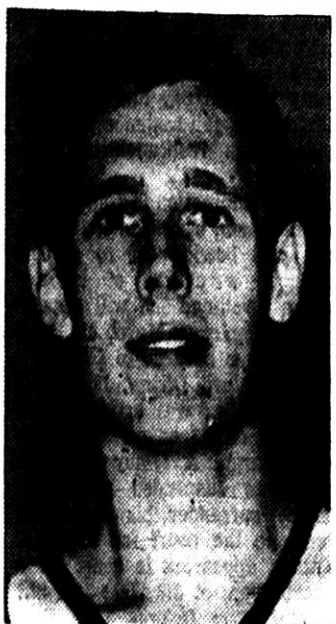
