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Many Cases Processed In Court

Several cases were processed in Holland Municipal Court the last few days.

Jerry Calvin Creekmore, 21, of 20 North State St., Zeeland, was put on probation for two years on two disorderly counts which occurred March 4. One charge was tampering with property not his own and the other was disorderly-intoxicated. The latter carried with it a 15-day jail term. He must pay \$5 a month oversight fees.

WASHINGTON — U.S. Sen. Philip A. Hart (D-Mich.) announced at noon Tuesday that the Office of Education has authorized a \$1 million grant to Hope College at Holland, Mich., for the construction of a new science building.

The total project cost is \$4,111,532.

The grant is authorized under Title I of the Higher Education Facilities Act.

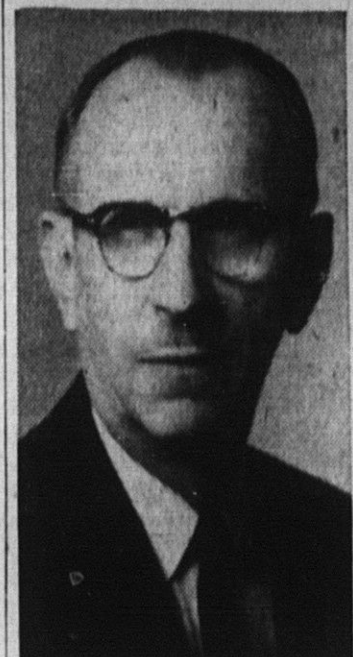

The blaze burned through the wall and ceiling of the rear portion of the house and also caused extensive smoke damage in the home.

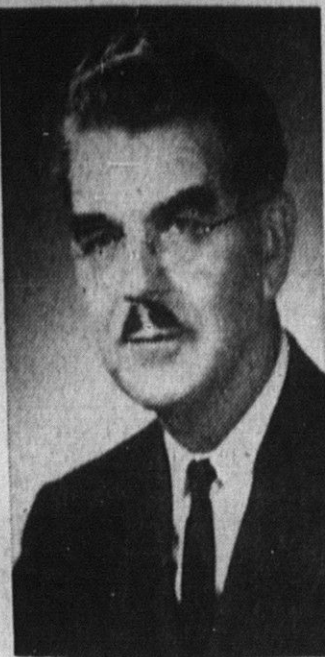
Drenthe firemen were called about 9:45 a.m., and had the flames extinguished in about an hour. Holland township firemen assisted in fighting the fire.

Intangibles Tax Assistance Offered Here

W. Clare Walker, representing the Michigan Department of Revenue, will be in the council room, second floor of City Hall, on two days for the purpose of assisting taxpayers in the preparation of their intangibles tax returns.

He will be available Friday, March 31, and Friday, April 21, from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Intangible personal property subject to the tax includes all mortgages, land contracts, bank accounts, cash, postal savings accounts, accounts and notes receivable, corporate stocks, corporate bonds and other similar types of property.

However, all U.S. bonds are exempt from the tax, and the tax on deposits in Michigan banks and building and loan associations, as well as stocks in Michigan banks, will be paid to the Department of Revenue directly by the banks or building and loan associations.

Under present law as amended, all corporate stocks are 100 per cent taxable including Michigan corporations.

The department has issued a warning to all owners of property such as outlined here to file the necessary return forms prior to March 31. The department constantly is engaged in checking stockholders' lists, mortgage records, income tax returns and other data for the purpose of discovering evasions of the Intangibles Tax Act. Failure to file a return when a tax is due subjects the taxpayer to severe penalties.

Besides assisting taxpayers in preparing returns, Walker also will advise any person concerning his liability, if any, under the act.

Those seeking assistance are requested to bring with them full information on their holdings including the face or par value, and income received therefrom during the year, and copy of the previous year's return filed with the department.

Those who wish to make a voluntary disclosure will be given special consideration as to penalties and interest, Walker said.

Weather Slows Organ's Trip To Holland

NEW YORK — A huge Amsterdam street organ, bound for the Dutch Village in Holland, Mich., was expected today to arrive at its new home sometime late Friday or early Saturday.

Purchased by Fred and Harry Nelis of the Dutch Village last February, the large organ arrived in New York Tuesday aboard the S. S. Maasdam of the Holland-America Lines. It had been scheduled to arrive in New York Monday.

Recent heavy snows on the East Coast have also resulted in delays in getting the big 12-foot high, 18-foot long organ on its way to Holland.

Harry Nelis, who is in New York to bring the organ to Holland, called the Dutch Village Wednesday and said he had hoped to leave New York early today. He said he was hoping to arrive in Holland Friday night.

Too big to be hauled by conventional truck or rail car, the organ is being towed on its own specially-built trailer. It will be placed in the Dutch Village, a miniature city located north of Holland on US-31.

File Custody Petition

GRAND HAVEN — A petition was filed today in Ottawa County Probate Court seeking the removal of two Holland youngsters from custody of their mother who is serving a 90-day jail sentence for child neglect.

Holland police juvenile officer Dennis Catlin signed the petition asking that the 10-year-old girl and 13-year-old boy, found by police Monday living alone in filth and squalor, be removed from custody of their mother.

The mother, Mrs. Dorothy Dyer of 461 West 22nd St., had not been at home with the children for a week prior to her arrest police said. She pleaded guilty to contributing to the neglect of her children Tuesday in Holland Municipal Court and received the maximum 90-day jail sentence.

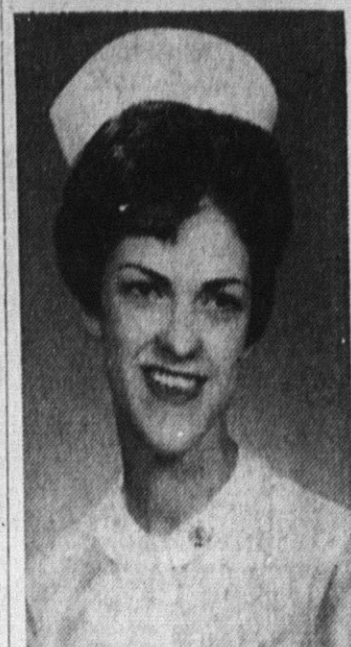
The children have been placed in a foster home.

5 Sentenced To Prison

ALLEGAN — Five men were sentenced to terms at Southern Michigan Prison at Jackson when they appeared before Judge Chester Ray in Allegan Circuit Court Monday.

David C. Kendall, 21, Allegan, was handed a 2-10 year sentence for breaking into the Tange Gun Shop, Allegan, with intent to commit larceny. Kendall was credited with 15 days spent in the Allegan county jail.

Edward Haist, 21, Hamilton, received a 4-10 year sentence without recommendation and credit for 42 days time in the Allegan jail. Haist was apprehended Nov. 13 after he broke into the Johnson store in Hamilton.

Two 21-year-old men of rural Allegan, Stanley Rakowski and Robert Reid, charged with breaking into Gray's Electric Co., Plainwell, were also sentenced to 2-10 years and credited with 36 days' jail time.

Jack Knoll, 23, Holland, arrested in connection with an Oct. 4 break-in of the Harry Van Pelt residence, Laketown township, was given 18 months to 10 years in prison with the minimum sentence recommended and credit for 18 days already spent in jail.

Warning had pleaded guilty to stealing eight tires and wheels valued at \$300 from Farnsworth Chevrolet, Plainwell, in December. Forney had purchased the articles with the admitted knowledge they were stolen.

Mrs. Dorothy Dyer, 43, of 461 West 22nd St., pleaded guilty in Holland Municipal Court Tuesday afternoon to the neglect charge. She was given the maximum jail sentence of 90 days.

Juvenile officer Dennis Catlin said the children, a boy, 13, and a girl, 10, had been left alone for a week at the home which was described as "unfit for habitation."

Mrs. Dyer was arrested Monday after what had started out as a routine truancy investigation. Cpl. Ron Myrick of the Holland police department had gone to the home Monday to determine why the children had not been in school for the last week.

Myrick knocked on the door of the home and received no response. As he was leaving he saw the girl lying on a bed near a window and knocked on the window. Failing to get a response, Myrick said he thought something might be wrong with the child and called another officer to enter the house with him to investigate.

Officers described the house as "filthy." They said there were four dogs living in the house with the children. Police said the children had had only dry cereal to eat the day they were removed from the home.

The children were placed in a foster home, police said, and a warrant was obtained for Mrs. Dyer's arrest. She was picked up in Douglas, where she was working in a factory by Allegan County deputies.

The children told officers their mother had not been home since March 13. Mrs. Dyer, police said, had been staying at a rooming house with a boy friend.

The two children had spent the last two weekends at a relative's home in Allegan and had spent weekdays at their own home.

Catlin said he was going to file a petition today in Ottawa County Probate Court to have the children removed from custody of their mother.

Tech School Okay Sought For County

GRAND HAVEN — School superintendents of the local area Thursday asked representatives of the Michigan Department of Education to speed up approval of this county's application for an area vocational-technical education program for high school students.

Local educators said two years had been spent in assembling a survey, and application for such services had presented last fall.

Present from the state office were Leon Alger of the Division of Vocational Education, Kenneth Morse of the program section of the Bureau of High Education and Michael Sugarman, consultant from the program section.

Sugarman said the next move is to return to the Community College board at Lansing and seek approval of a vocational-technical program through the community college regulations. He also suggested that local leaders explore the possibility of extending the district further to the south as Van Buren County also is exploring such a training center.

The Ottawa County area also includes Hamilton and Saugatuck districts of Allegan County in the study.

It was pointed out that this section of Michigan is blessed with liberal arts facilities, listing community colleges at Muskegon and Grand Rapids, Grand Valley at Allendale, Hope College at Holland, Calvin at Grand Rapids and Western Michigan University at Kalamazoo. What the area needs is one or more vocational training centers for high school students and graduates, superintendents say.

Representatives of the state office explained that costs of setting up a vocational program are increasing all the time and that such facilities are more costly than liberal arts schools.

Large Crowd Cheers Play In Zeeland

About 425 persons crowded into the Zeeland High School auditorium Friday night for the comedy, "The Stuck Pot," presented by the junior class. The play will be presented again tonight at 8 p.m.

This three-act situation comedy by Kate McNair was a fine vehicle for teenagers in their dramatic debut, built about two prep schools, the Worthington Women's Academy and Jason School, the latter for boys.

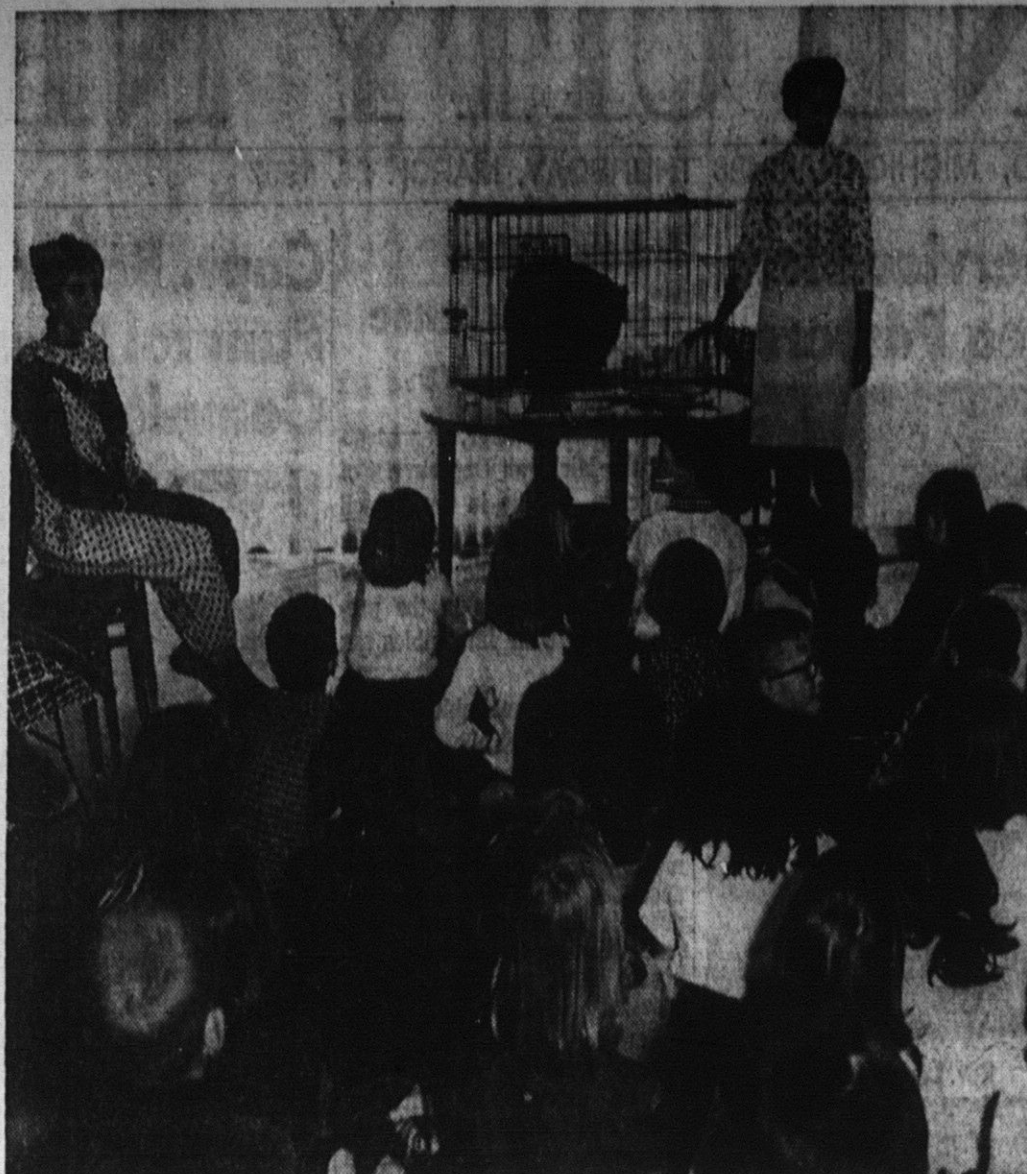

Public Hears Specialist On Water Pollution Facts

Since 1938 — long before water pollution became a matter of serious concern — the steel industry has worked continuously and at great expense to solve its water-quality problems, a spokesman for Bethlehem Steel Corporation said here Thursday night.

Speaking on the subject, "Water Quality — A Must for Tulips or Technology," E. Brent Snodgrass, Bethlehem's Manager of Community Relations for the Chicago District, told a meeting of the Holland Branch of the American Association of University Women, in Graves Hall, that while water quality is a problem of long-standing, it has a short history of concern and remedial measures.

"In fact," Mr. Snodgrass said, "it was only 19 years ago — in 1948 — that the first Federal Water Pollution Control Act was passed by Congress."

But it was ten years before the passage of that act, pointed out, that the steel industry launched an ambitious research program in water-quality control.

"Industry for many years has shown its desire to cooperate in setting water-quality standards. The American steel industry, for instance, gave every assistance to the Federal government in

its development of the Water Quality Act of 1965, which gave the states the responsibility to establish quality standards for waters within their boundaries," the steel company representative said.

"The industry feels that the states are the proper agencies for setting water-quality standards," he continued, "for they are closer to the water supply and its uses and have a better understanding of the problems involved in achieving clean water in their areas than does the Federal government."

Mr. Snodgrass said that the problem of water quality is a problem for all, and that all must share in the cost of clean water. "It cannot be the concern of industry alone — and the finger shouldn't be pointed only in that direction," the speaker said.

He proposed three basic principles in evaluating any pollution abatement program:

1. Standards should be set that are both fair and attainable. Unnecessarily high goals would overly restrict business, harm the economy and result in unwarranted tax burdens.
2. The responsibility to set water-quality standards should be vested at the lowest level of government capable of doing the entire job adequately.
3. Compliance with water-quality regulations can best be achieved through an approach based on incentives rather than penalties. Tax relief should be granted to firms which construct water-quality control facilities, particularly since they are non-revenue producing investments.

Donnelly Is Honored At Aquinas

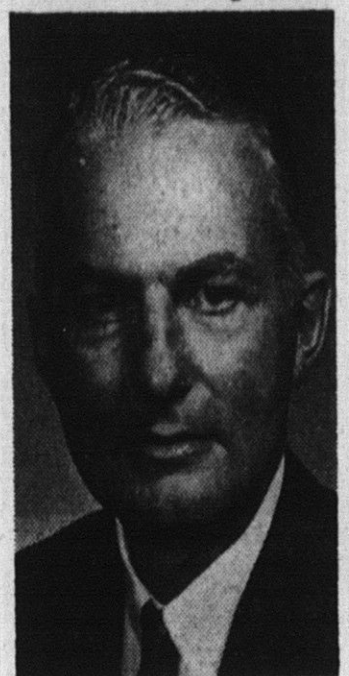

of Catholic laymen affiliated with diocesan councils of Catholic men. It claims as high as seven million members.

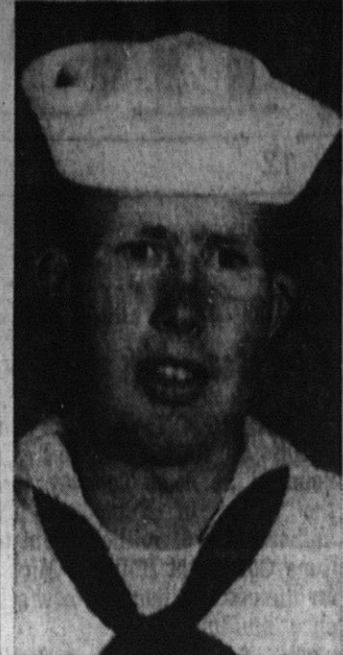

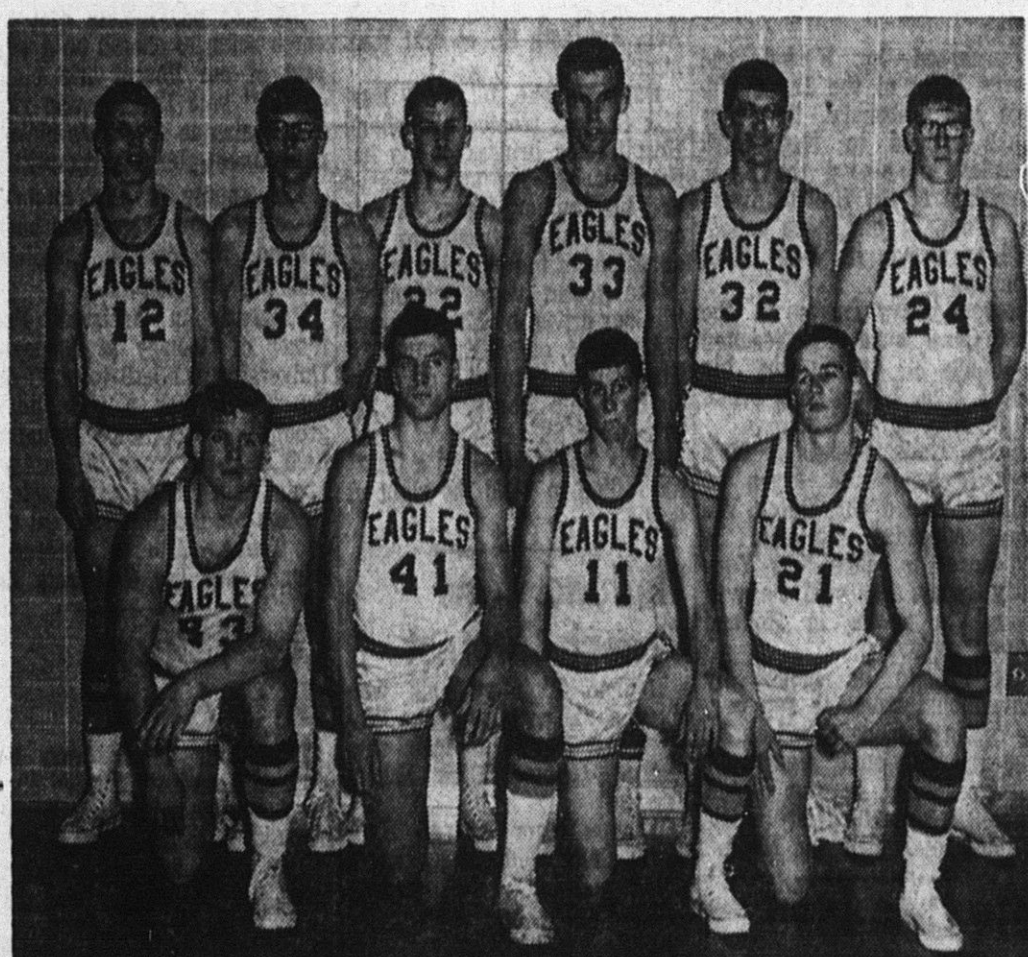

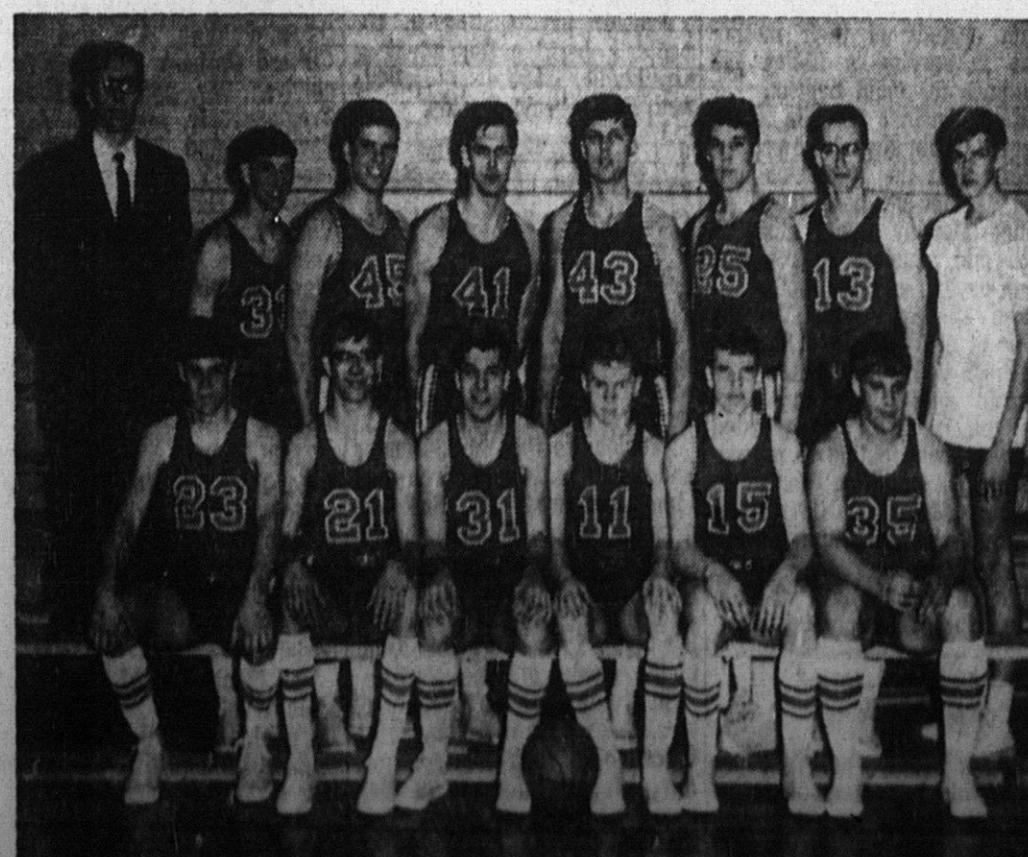

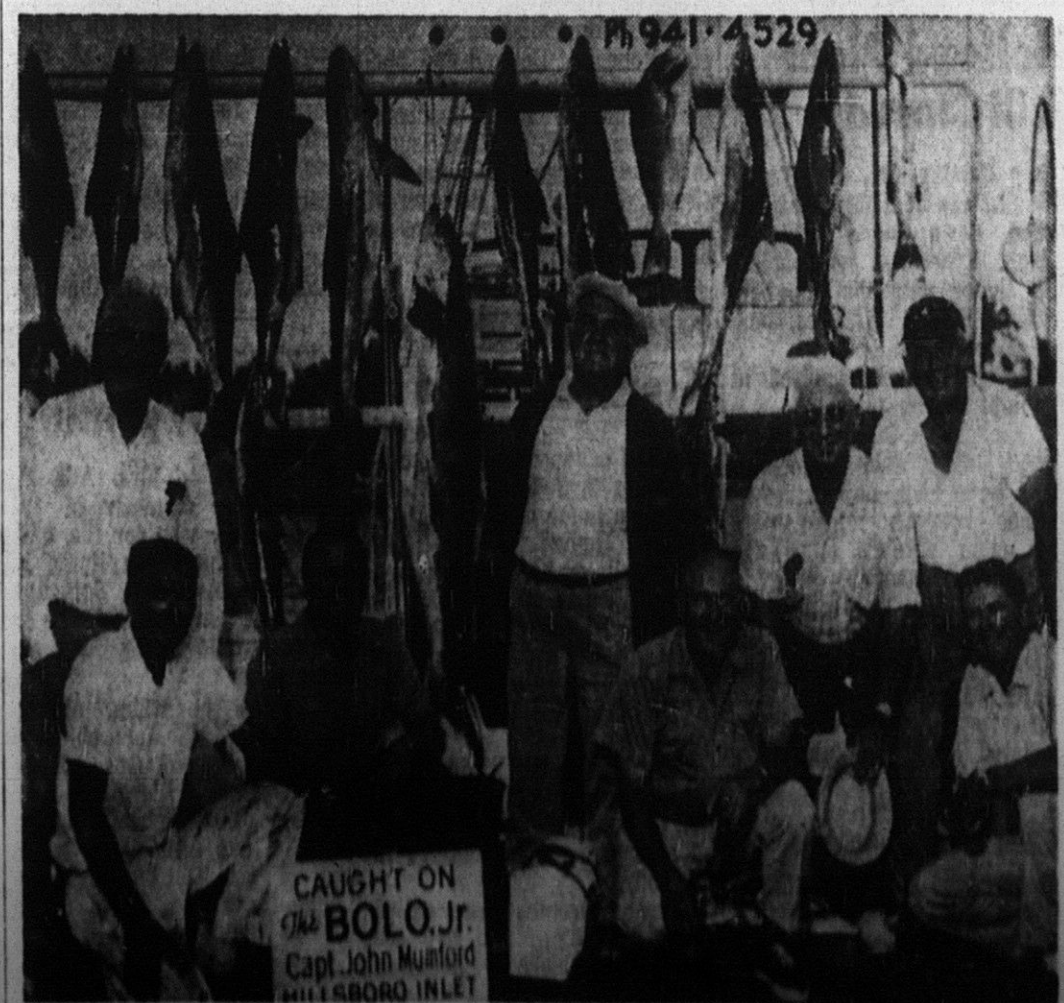

Allegan County Residents Vote on Bridge Replacement

ALLEGAN — Laced with rivers, lakes and trout streams, Allegan County has often been called "the gateway to Michigan's Water Wonderland," attracting thousands of tourists each year.

Crossing those streams, scores of picturesque bridges dot the rural Allegan landscape, many being the identical spans our grandfathers and great-grandfathers rumbled across by horse and buggy.

With some dating back to 1880 and the "new" ones built no later than 1915, these bridges were never meant to carry the heavy loads required of them today.

Of the 1966 rural bridges under jurisdiction of the Allegan County Road Commission, 127 have been classified by engineers as "inadequate."

A 1 mill five-year levy to be placed on the April 3 county ballot will, if approved, provide funds to start repairing or replacing these structures according to a "priority plan."

A similar measure was defeated in last August's primary by only nine votes out of a total 7,222 cast.

The 127 bridges have been inadequate for one or more of the following: they are limited as to load capacity; they are so narrow traffic is restricted to one lane; they are dangerously located at a curve or steep approach grade.

Most of the old bridges are steel truss type with wood or concrete decks, varying in width from 12-16 feet.

Road Commission engineer-manager Fred Niels explains that a bridge today should be at least 24 feet wide and "to try to build them as wide as a road or 34 feet across, so you won't even know a bridge is there."

In a recent survey, Niels noted that 24 of the more or less decrepit bridges are located on "primary" roads or one of the main arteries in the county connecting cities, population centers or state trunklines. There are 103 inadequate bridges on "local" roads. All have a span greater than 20 feet. Anything less, said Niels, is a culvert, of which there are hundreds in the county.

Explaining that "every situation is different, and any number of ways may be possible to provide a stream crossing," Niels said road crews always attempt to build the "most economical structure while, at the same time, keeping future maintenance costs in mind."

It has been the intention of the county engineer, during the course of road construction, to replace as many bridges as possible with corrugated metal pipe culverts or laminated wood culverts. Twenty-five to 30 feet is about the practical limit for installing multiple metal or wood culverts, he explains. If a span greater than this is to be crossed, a timber or concrete bridge might prove more economical.

For bridges with 30-foot spans or more, a reinforced concrete substructure with a steel beam and concrete deck would be ideal, according to Niels, but, in most cases, this would prove costly (\$30-\$35 per square foot of deck area) especially in view of the number of bridges to be replaced.

Road crews have installed prefabricated, pressure-treated timber bridges at two county locations and believe that this type of crossing could be used in a great many of the long-span county bridges providing a low cost installation needing only a minimum of maintenance in the future.

Noting that "the problem will not solve itself," Niels said "Every year we will be forced to close more bridges that have failed or are about to fail and, under present conditions, we must use gas and weight tax

money to replace them; money which is badly needed for road improvements."

A certain percentage of the funds raised annually by the 5-year levy could be allocated to the primary bridges, with the balance set aside for local spans. Construction of primary bridges could be programmed over a period of years until all were replaced.

Distributing money for local bridges could be complicated, according to the county engineer, since some of the townships have so few to be replaced. He believes, however, that some type of matching fund program could be set up for local bridges, where the township would provide a portion of general fund money as a percentage of bridge replacement costs.

Most county residents believe that money received from the annual return of gasoline taxes and license plate fees should be sufficient to run the county road system.

Disproving this theory, Niels pointed out that Allegan County has 1,840 miles of roads — excluding state trunklines and city streets — and is second only to Oakland County in number of miles under county jurisdiction. It is, however, 20th from the top of Michigan counties in the amount of tax and fees returned.

The formula for the return of these funds is based primarily on population and secondly on mileage. A rural county, Allegan simply does not have a population large enough to support its extensive road system. Stretched out, its roads would reach from here to Florida and half-way back.

From available funds, provision must be made for all road commission operations including plowing, scraping, building new roads, buying equipment and rights-of-way — in short, every expense of running the road commission and paying its 85 hourly-paid employees.

Property taxes paid by individuals and corporations don't go far in maintaining or con-

structing county roads and bridges, Niels revealed.

In Allegan County, only about one-half mill or half of one-tenth of one per cent of the property tax is designated as a road tax. Some of the townships levy an additional property tax for road upkeep. Approximately six townships now have this additional tax.

At the present rate funds are being made available, Niels estimated it would take more than 50 years to replace the 127 inadequate bridges without curtailing road maintenance and construction.

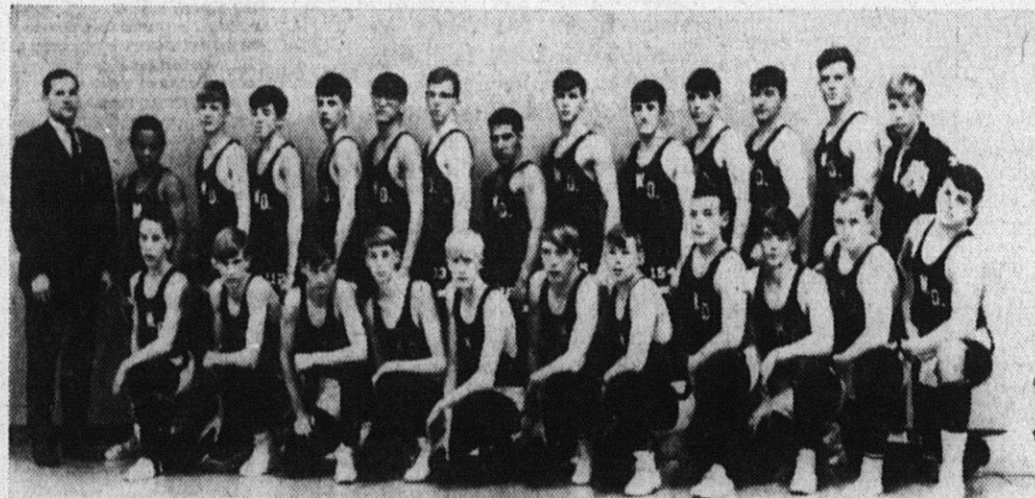
Some Allegan county cities are opposing the millage proposal, saying they won't benefit from the extra-voted funds.

The road commission, reasoning that "no man is an island," reminds county residents that they also use county roads and bridges. As more of the smaller rural school districts are brought into the large city systems, benefitting the cities with additional school tax money, the number of bus crossings on county bridges will increase — a matter of great concern to the Road Commission. The commission concludes that since the state has not provided sufficient funds to solve the bridge problem, the county must act on its own to correct the situation.

The commission feels that, since there are 127 inadequate bridges on the county road system and only 3 at most, within cities, it is not unreasonable to ask for city support of the issue, even though benefits to cities may be only "indirect."

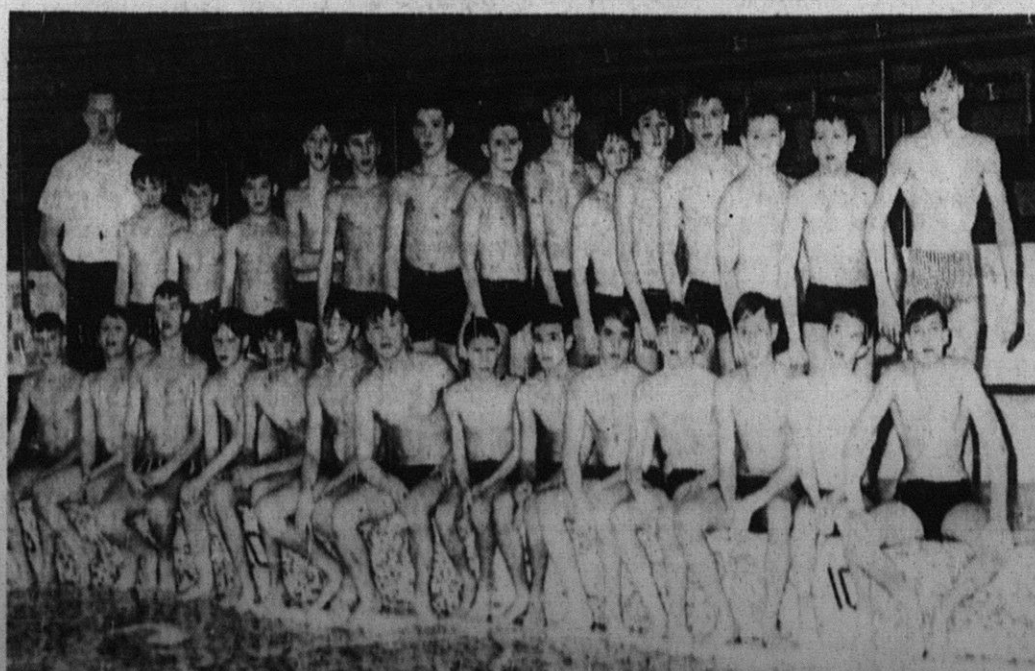
"When the average man will pay \$1,000 a year for a car, including depreciation, shouldn't he be willing to come up with less than the price of a carton of cigarettes per year to help rebuild our county bridges?" Niels asked.

One mill will bring the county \$190,000 annually — or less than a million dollars in five years. "This is less than half of what we need to replace all our old bridges," said Niels. "But we are just being practical — we know we can't ask for more, and this much will give us a boost in the right direction."

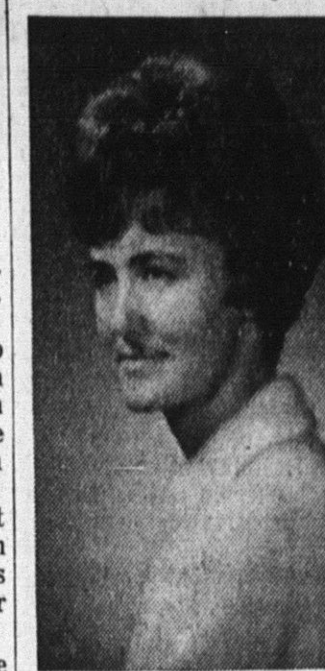

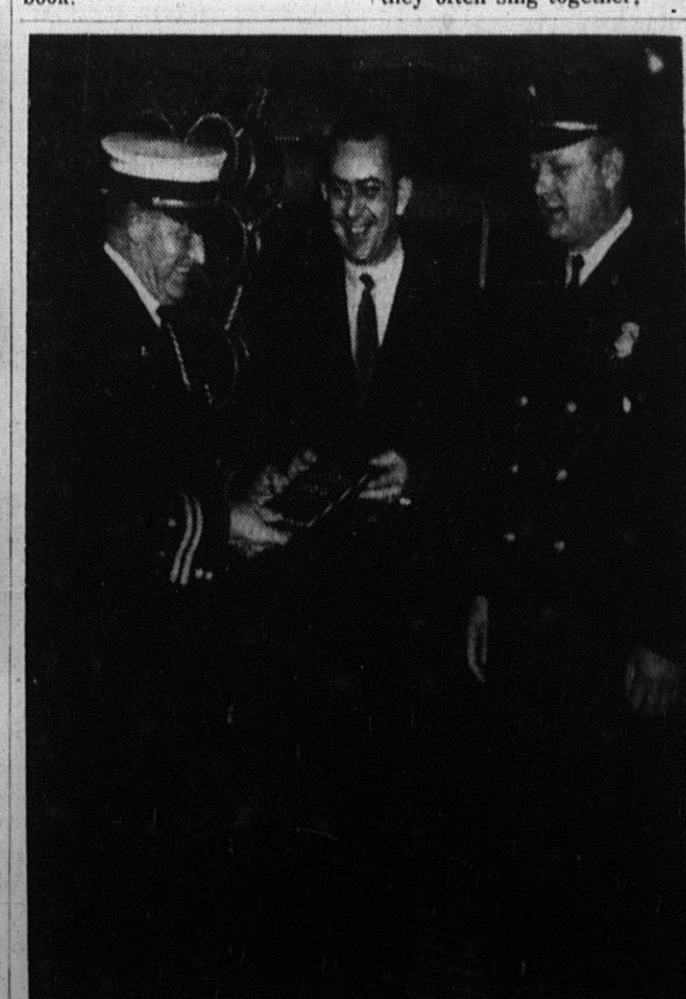

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, March 26
Proclaiming the Resurrection
Luke 24:1-9, 44-49
By C. P. Dame

This lesson tells about the greatest miracle recorded in the Bible. If you do not believe this miracle Easter will mean but very little to you, if you do, then it will mean much, very much to you. The gospel can be told in two sentences: "Christ died for our sins" (1 Cor. 15:3) and, "Now He is risen from the dead" (1 Cor. 15:20).

I. The resurrection of Jesus was unexpected. The death of Jesus stunned the disciples. On the first day of the week, on Sunday, several sad women walked to the Lord's tomb in order to anoint His body.

Women stood by the cross and saw Jesus die and noted that His body was properly laid away. Since they could not anoint His body Friday evening because the sabbath had begun they went real early Sunday morning. While walking to the tomb they asked, "Who shall roll us away the stone from the door of the tomb?" No man was in the party. Much to their surprise the stone had been rolled away. Another surprise followed — the tomb was empty! Still another surprise puzzled them, two men, clothed in dazzling apparel, angels, told the women that He was risen from the dead.

"Why seek ye the living among the dead?" The angels reminded the women how He had told them of His resurrection. And then they remembered. The women reported the astounding news to the eleven.

II. The resurrection of Jesus is foretold in the Old Testament. On the day of the resurrection two gloomy disciples learned from Jesus a great deal about the prophecies recorded in the Old Testament. These men while on the way to Emmaus were overtaken by a stranger who "expounded unto them in all the scriptures the things concerning Himself" — the Messiah, for the stranger was Jesus. No human ears had ever heard such a wonderful exposition of the Old Testament. The gloom gave way to gladness.

The second reference to the Old Testament was made by Jesus to the disciples who had been told many times about His death and resurrection but who had not grasped the truth. Jesus reminded them of this in His words, "which I spoke unto you, while I was yet with you."

All that had happened to Jesus was foretold in "the law of Moses, and in the prophets, and in the psalms." The Jews divided the Old Testament in three parts: "The Pentateuch, called the five books of Moses; the prophets including what we apply call the historical books, as well as the prophetic books and the writings of which the Psalms form the most prominent part."

One scholar found more than one hundred messianic prophecies in twenty Old Testament books and stated that he had listed only the most important of them.

Jesus gave His disciples a new understanding of the Old Testament and of His mission and gave them the responsibility of being His witnesses and give the good news to a wicked world. Remember our world differs not much from the world in which Jesus lived and worked—it is still a needy, lost, broken world and it desperately needs the gospel.

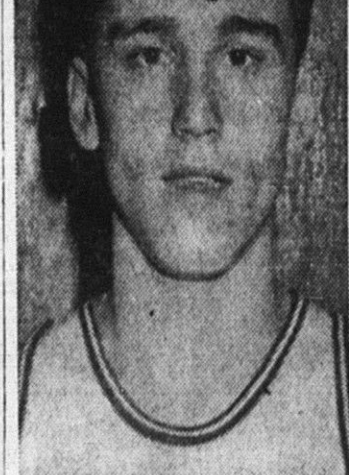

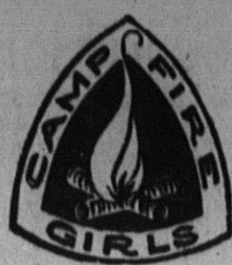

A Midwest farm magazine recently reported "This is the time of year to give thought to getting the most of your fertilizer dollar. There are always a few promoters working around the fringes of the industry who find ways of selling plant food for twice what it is worth on the market."

While we do not deny the possibility of foliar feeding, importance of placement, etc., we do not recommend expensive materials that require special equipment which have high labor cost per unit of plant food, and the yield increases reported are particularly disturbing.

Some of the gimmicks used to push these expensive materials are: a little fertilizer goes a long way, it is completely water soluble, it is an organic form of plant food, it is a natural product — not a poison, it contains essential micronutrients (even though the material may contain .05 per cent or less for each micronutrient), it is a natural soil conditioner, their soil tests prove a need.

Others are University workers will not give the product a fair trial; the product is too new for Experiment Station evaluation; higher food value; increased disease and pest resistance; firmer and will hold up better in storage; Joe Doe, largest seed producer in Michigan uses it (most likely it was given to him for trial).

If you are a victim of pre-spring gardening fever and have a sweet tooth for home-grown blueberries, see us for planting information, and find a neighbor with a blueberry patch.

It takes six to eight years after planting for blueberries to reach full production. Bushes will produce no crop at all the first two years. In the third year, each bush will produce about ½ pint of berries. The next year one or two pints per bush can be expected. The full crop of four to six pints of berries per bush can occur in the sixth season. Some bushes will yield much larger crops. Newly cleared land is best for blueberries, since it contains more organic matter than land that has been cultivated for several years.

Home gardeners must protect berries with netting, or birds will eat the fruit before it is fully ripe.

It is important to choose the right variety of berries, and to buy state-inspected planting stock, the initial cost of establishing a commercial planting is high. Good blueberry land will cost about \$500 an acre to buy, clear and prepare for planting. The plants cost between \$225 and \$350 an acre.

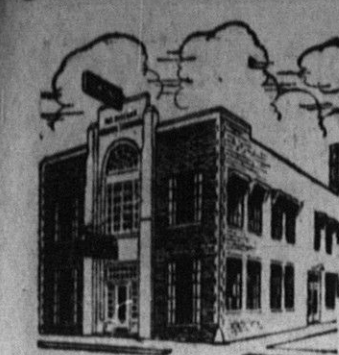

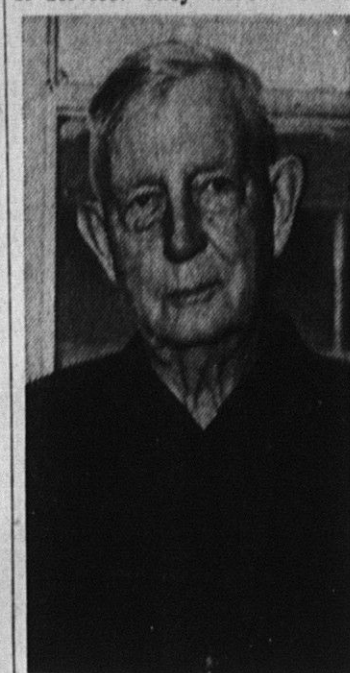

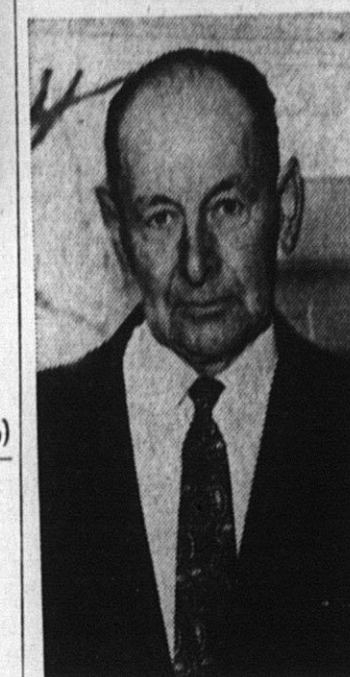

Rule Ends Confusion On Easter

A note to any Holland women who may be worried that snow during this year's early Easter Sunday might ruin their new Easter bonnets.

Take heart. Easter Sunday could — and has — come earlier than this year's March 28 date. In fact, it could fall as early as March 22.

All confusion on the date Easter is celebrated was cleared up more than 1,600 years ago when the first Council of the Christian Churches was held at Nicaea, in Asia Minor in 325 A.D., to settle a long-standing dispute on the date for the celebration of Easter.

The council's ruling — which still stands — was that Easter would be observed on the first Sunday following the 14th day of the Paschal Moon.

The Paschal Moon is the first moon whose 14th day falls on or after March 21. If the Paschal Moon falls on a Sunday, then Easter is the following Sunday.

The earliest date on which Easter can fall is March 22. It fell on that date in 1761 and 1818, but won't do so again during the 20th century.

The latest possible date for Easter is April 25. It fell on that date in 1943 and will do so next in 2038.

The ruling by that early council of Christian Churches helped to resolve a conflict among early Christians. Those in Asia Minor celebrated Easter on the 14th day of Nisan, the seventh month of the Jewish calendar, while those in Europe observed the nearest Sunday to the 14th of Nisan.

The earliest observance of Easter during the present century was March 23 in 1913. In recent years, Easter was observed on March 24 in 1940 and on March 25 in 1951.

Easter will not be celebrated as early as this year again until 1978.

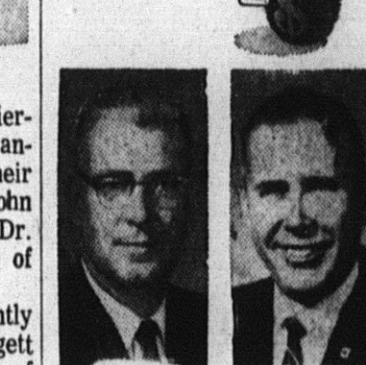

Den Uyl was charged with driving under the influence of intoxicants and crossing the center line, police said.

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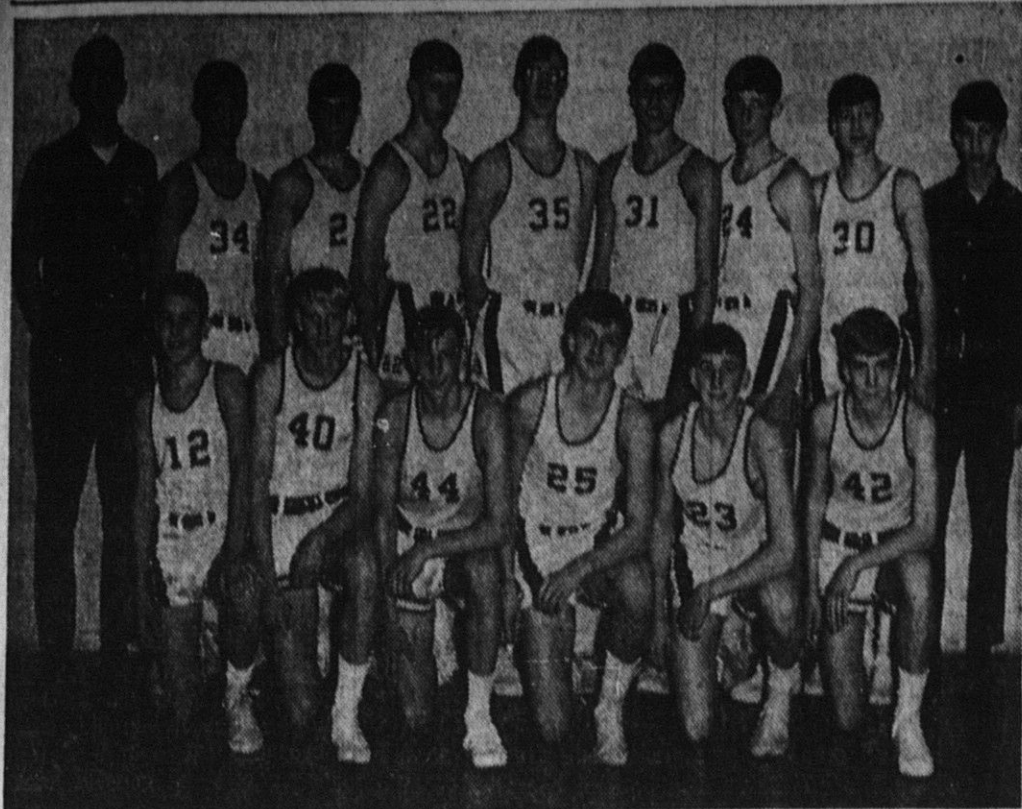

Snow Removal Is Expensive

Snow removal in Holland costs about \$1,000 an inch for the season.

With more than 113 inches falling so far in the 1966-67 season, the street department has spent \$111,852.53, according to City Engineer Harold Derks.

This lists \$40,787.10 for payroll, \$26,940.79 for sand and salt, \$4,124.64 for gasoline and \$40,000 for machine rental.

The department's cost accounting procedures are based on equipment rental rates established by the State Highway Department which take depreciation into consideration.

"When everything is said and done, there seems to be a mysterious correlation of \$1,000 per inch of snow per season," City Manager Herb Holt commented. He said a check through the years indicates the figure runs between \$925 and \$1,050.

In the engineering setup, all labor and materials are charged to various accounts. This includes street plowing, sidewalk plowing, street sweeping, street maintenance, construction, and laying storm and sanitary sewer lines.

During heavy snowfalls, employees of the Park and Cemetery department and that department's equipment are pressed into service, with labor and supplies chargeable to the snow removal accounts.

Following the heavy Jan. 26 snowstorm which paralyzed several places elsewhere, the additional cost that pay period for snow removal was \$15,832.68 Derks said.

Snow removal is considered street maintenance and is partly payable from the Motor Vehicle Fund. The more a town spends on snow removal the less it has for repairs, construction and the like.

The \$1,000 per inch of snow is correct only for the overall season. For instance, a sleet storm which has no measurable snow can result in an expensive service requiring trucks, salt, sand and perhaps more. A four-inch snowfall is generally ideal, calling for no great demands on equipment. A heavy snowfall requiring V-plows, graders, etc. can be the worst headache.

Henry Terpstra, long time street department employee, heads the street crews.

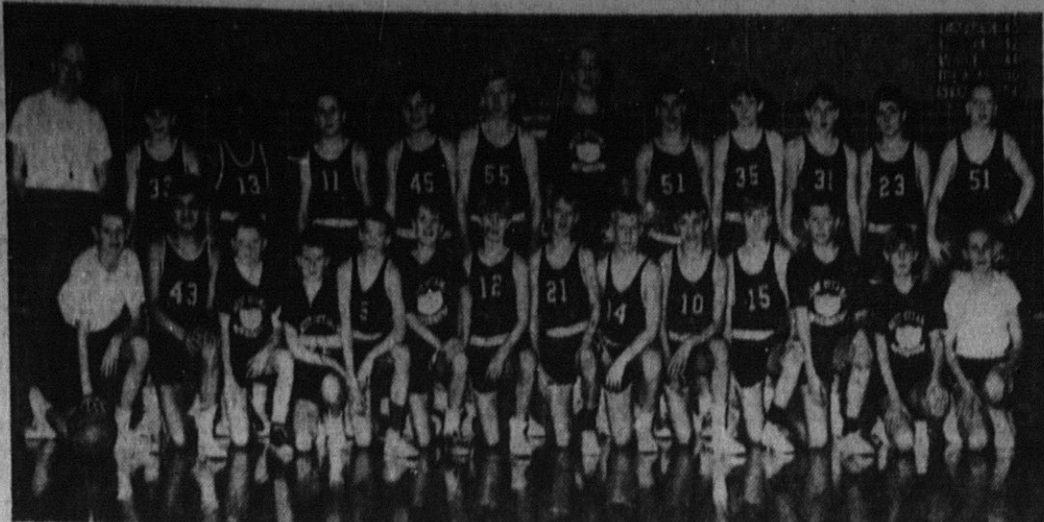

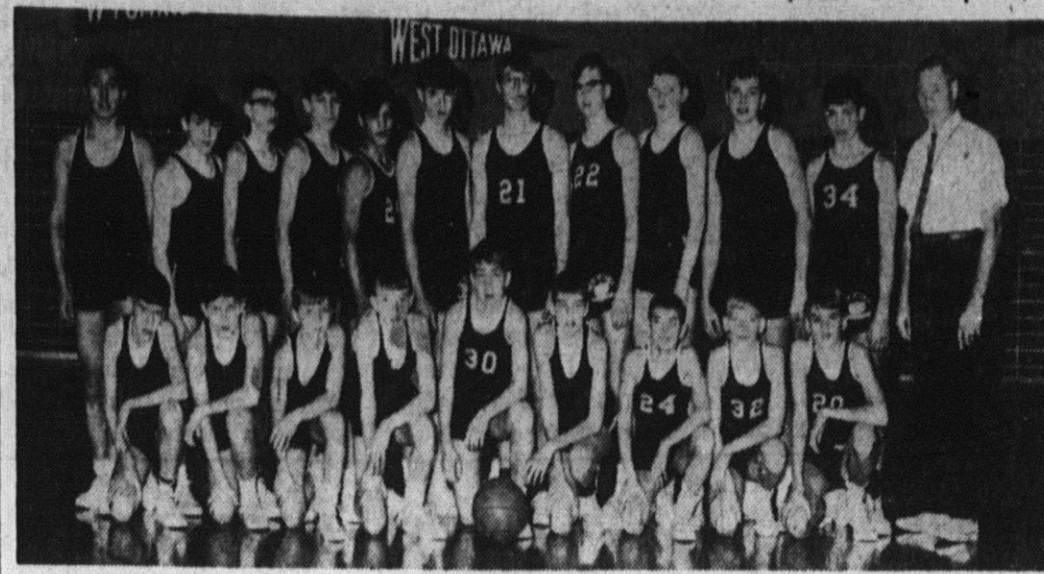

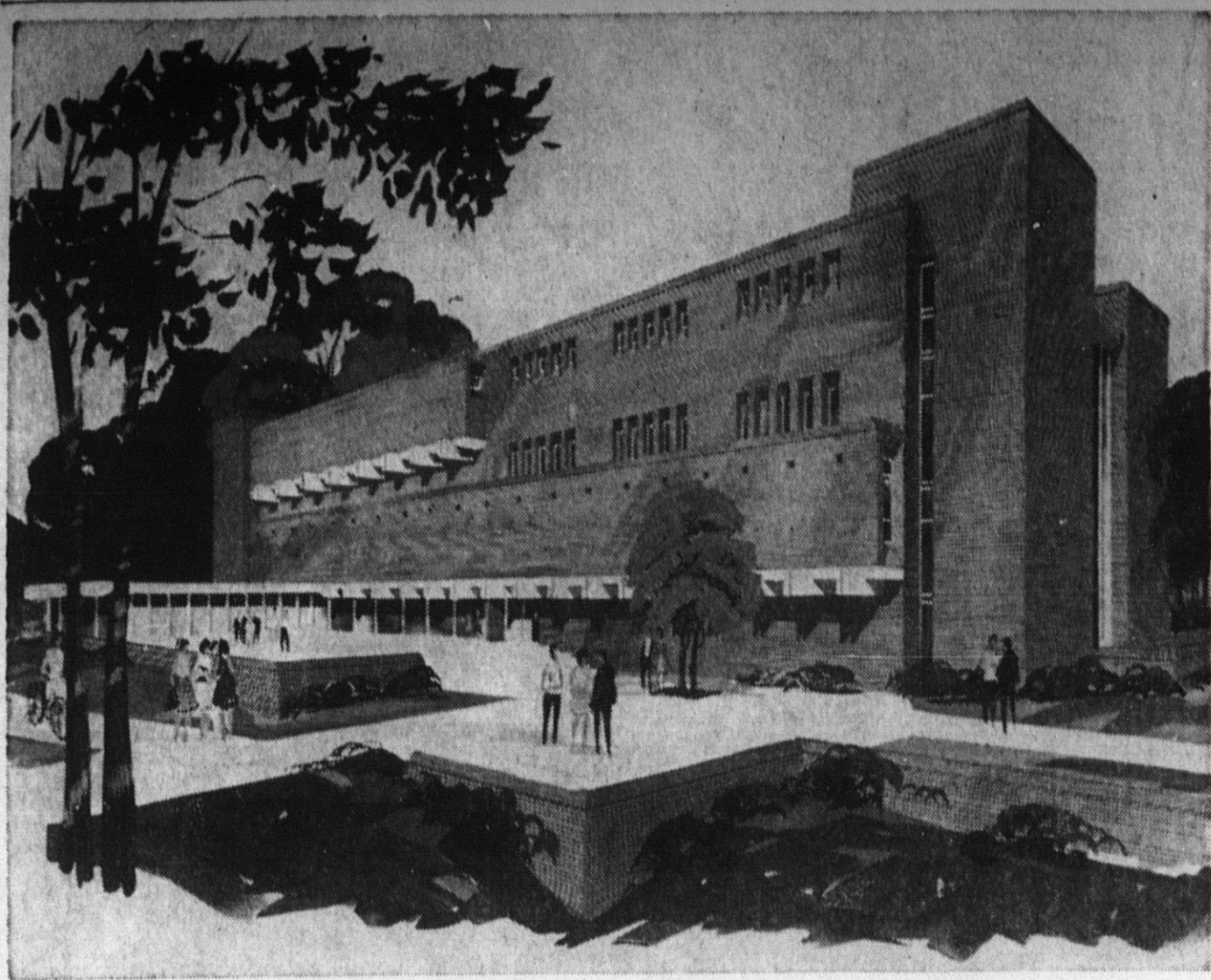

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Hope College's Proposed Science Building to Be Erected at 12th St. and College Ave.

Federal Grant Spurs Plans For New Science Building

Another step by trustees and administration of Hope College brought second century plans closer to reality Tuesday with the announcement of approval of a \$1 million grant from the U.S. Department of Education towards the construction of a new science hall.

Approval of the grant Title I of the Higher Education Facilities Act, was revealed by U.S. Senator Philip A. Hart in a telegram to Hope College President C. A. Vander Werf.

The new science hall, estimated to cost approximately \$4 million, is part of Hope's Centennial Decade Master Plan.

Ground was broken earlier this month for a new \$1 million 284 student residence hall. The start of construction on the science hall is contingent upon completion of financial arrangements.

The science building will house the departments of chemistry, biology and the new geology

Department. It will replace the present science building which was constructed in 1941. The existing building will serve as a classroom facility for which it is imminently suited.

"The new building will be an expression of the crucial role that science education must play in the liberal arts colleges towards the realization of our national goals and of our aspirations as human beings," said Dr. Vander Werf.

Persons who played key roles in Hope's presentation of the grant application included President Vander Werf, Dr. Norman J. Norton, chairman of the biology department; Dr. Irwin J. Brink, chairman of the chemistry department; Dr. David Klein, associate professor of chemistry; Henry J. Steffens, treasurer and vice president for finance; Clarence Handlogten, director of business affairs, and Larry Ter Molen, acting direc-

tor of development.

The Master Plan was designed by architect Charles Edward Stadel of the firm of Stadel, Dolan & Emerick of Park Ridge, Ill.

The Master Plan also includes construction of a Men's Physical Education Hall, International Education Center, Cultural Social Center a mens' residence hall and additions to the Nykerk Hall of Music and Van Zoeren Library.

The new science hall is slated to be located at 12th St. and College Ave. The building will permit a logical extension of the campus into the sector now occupied by the physics-mathematics building and Van Zoeren Library, bringing all of the sciences and the library into close proximity. A landscaped plaza will front the building along Graves Pl., tying in with the fourth floor which contains the physics-mathematics building and Van Zoeren Library.

The ground floor will contain mechanical and storage rooms, three geology laboratories and a woodshop. On the main level will be two more geology labs, two classrooms, science library with study carrels, large lecture hall, seminar rooms and exhibition space.

The second floor will house biology in six laboratories, a museum, two special project laboratories and a herbarium. Chemistry and biology will share the third floor which will contain four biology laboratories, four chemistry labs, two classrooms and a seminar room. Eight chemistry laboratories and a classroom with a greenhouse located on the roof.

All floors will be served by an elevator. Throughout the building will be department and faculty offices which will have private research laboratories for each.

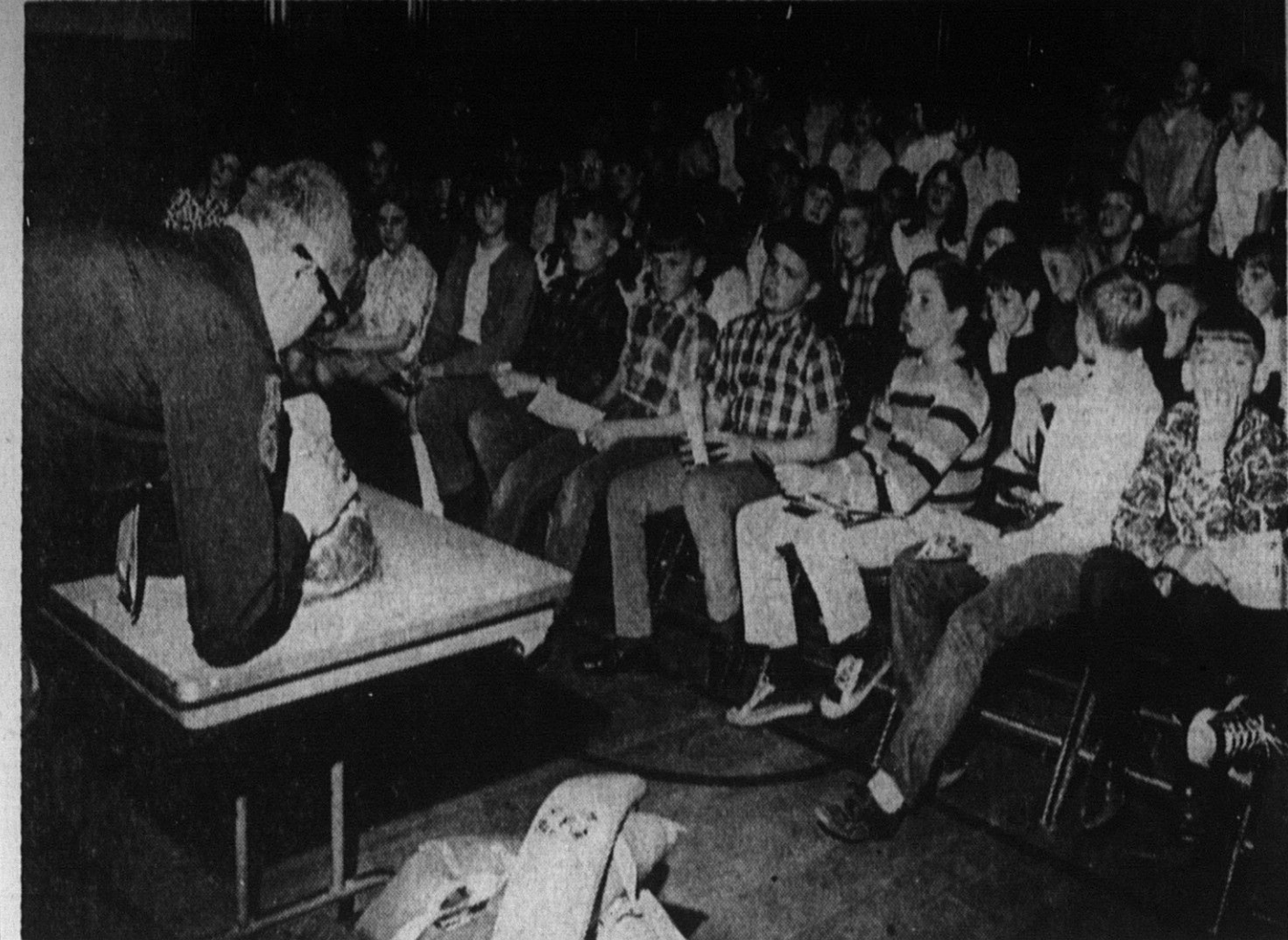

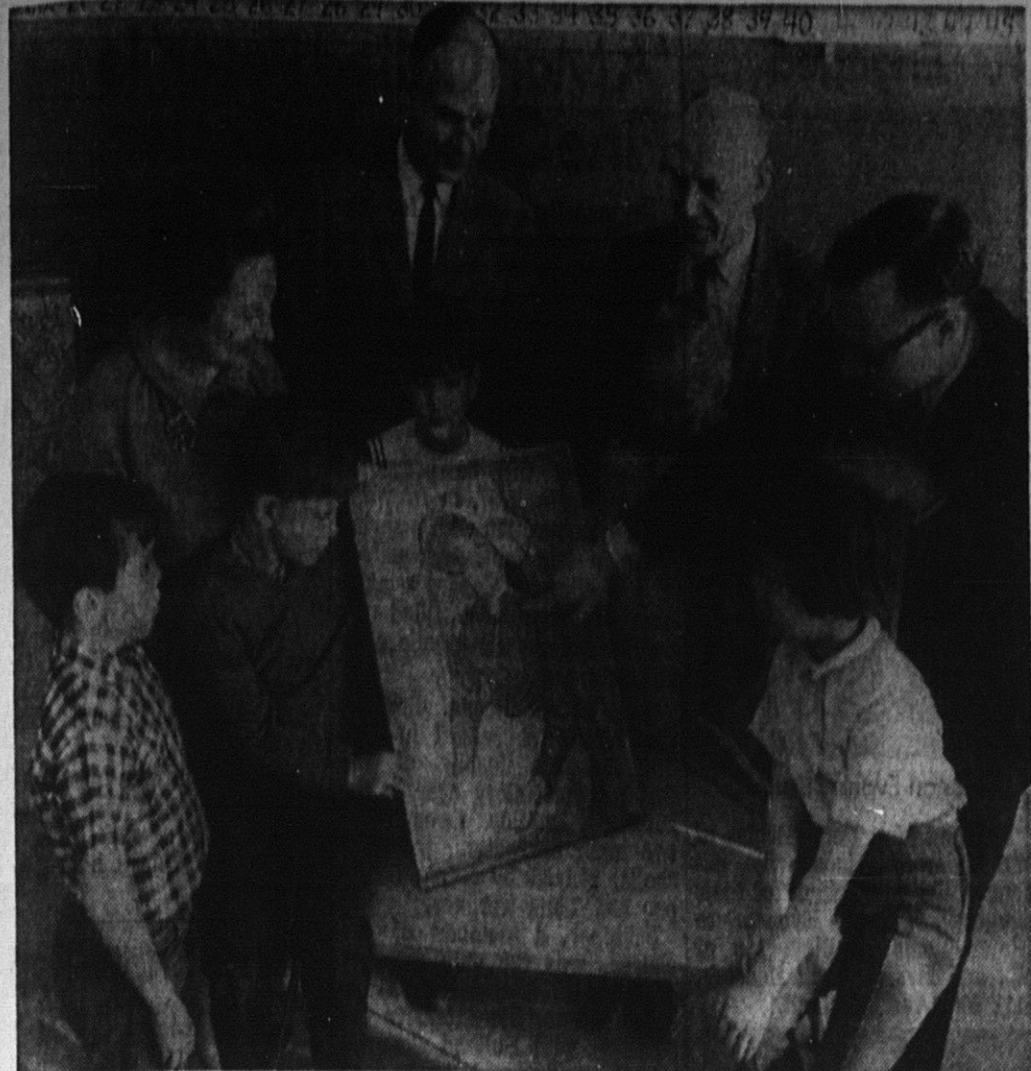

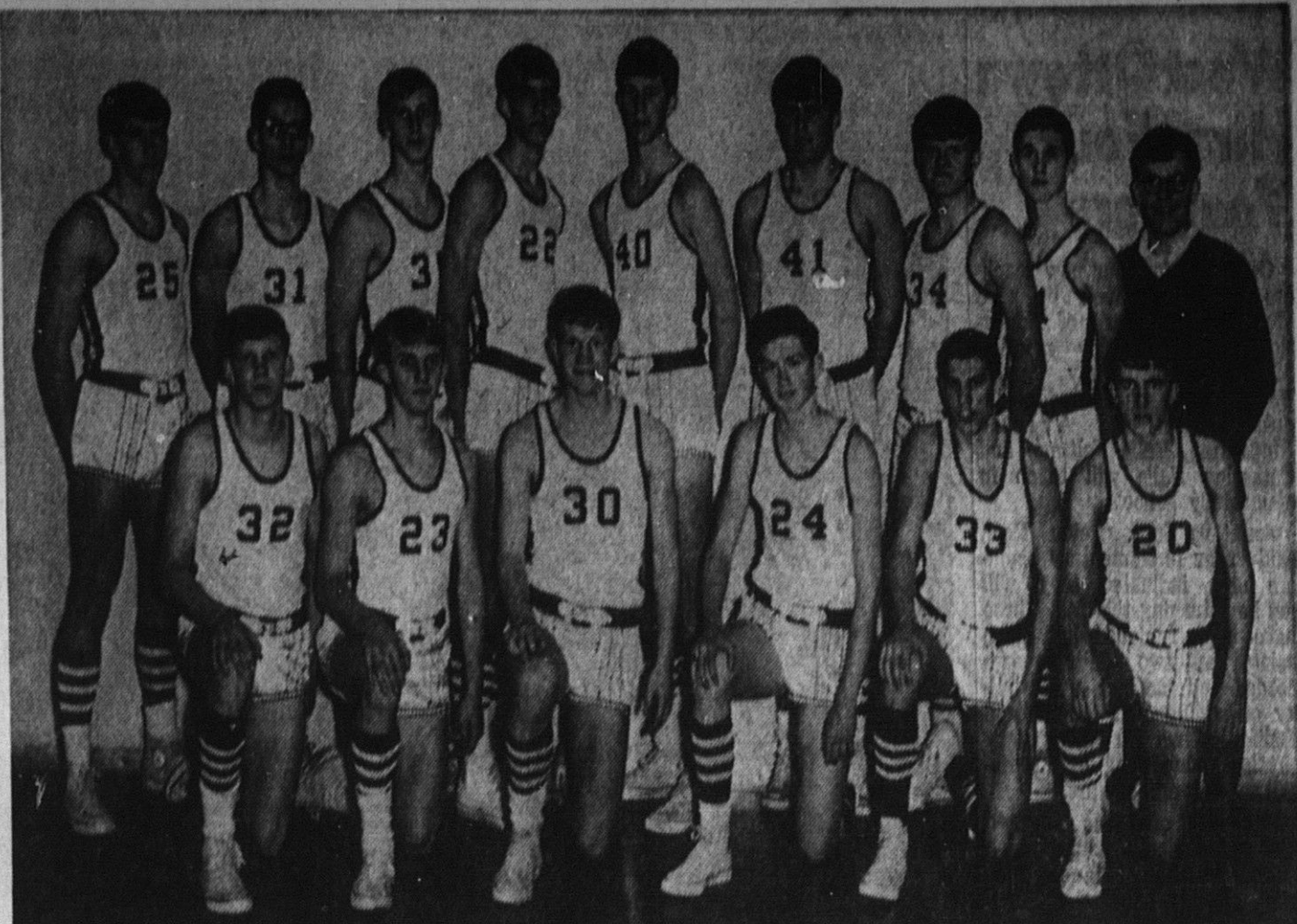

The 1,500 capacity was surpassed in the 1965-66 school year with 1,561 officially enrolled. Last fall the total was 1,672 and next fall the projected enrollment is 1,729. It was pointed out that the building is used almost 100 per cent of the time, whereas 80 per cent use is considered high for a junior-senior high building.

Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte reviewed elementary enrollment projections with emphasis on tremendous growth in the district.

Van Raalte said playground equipment will be installed by the custodial staff of the district during the spring vacation period. He said playground equipment from some two-room schools which have been closed was delivered to the Sheldon Woods school last fall but frost set in and installation was halted.

The superintendent also reported on completed construction at Pine Creek school and reviewed the fire marshal's report.

The board approved a blanket increase of 10 cents an hour for secretarial help. Van Raalte told the board that Harold Thompson, general maintenance man for the district, has resigned and is moving from the state.

The board approved a second reading of personal leave policies setting guide lines for emergency and sick leave for school district employees.
