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Broad Aims Set For Goals Group

Broad aims were discussed at the first meeting of an area goals committee Tuesday night in Herrick Public Library, attended by the 30-member committee appointed recently by Mayor L. W. Lamb Jr. in an effort to set goals and guidelines for the community extending 20 to 30 years hence.

Ab Martin, general chairman, outlined possible areas of study for the five subcommittees, assigning himself and four members of his coordinating committee as contact persons, (father confessor, he called it) for each subcommittee. He referred to the year 2000 as a goal for thinking in projecting the path of progress in the coming years.

"2000 is a nice round number," he said, "and we must think in terms of possibly doubling our population by then, and also be aware that as the population grows, our problems, challenges and opportunities will grow at an even faster rate."

Mayor Lamb said committee appointments include no former mayors or city councilmen because he did not want the goals committee to be "contaminated" by an experienced group well aware of certain limitations.

Lamb spoke of the growing need for cooperations among governmental entities, and said the committee reflects a well distributed organization involving Ottawa and Allegan counties, the four townships of Park, Holland, Laketown and Fillmore, and the cities of Holland and Zeeland. He spoke of the need of cooperation in furthering the "quality of life" in the years to come.

City Councilmen and representatives of the Ottawa and Allegan Boards of Commissioners were invited to the first meeting. Afterwards the five subcommittees met and made plans for further meetings and study. Services of the City Hall staff will be available.

Martin will serve as resource person for the subcommittee on the Role of Political Entity, headed by Harvey Butler. Mrs. Eleanor De Kruijff will be resource person for the subcommittee on Culture, Recreation, Entertainment and Sports, headed by Mrs. William G. Winter. John Donnelly will be the representative on the Quality of Life or environment group, headed by Henry Weyenberg.

Marvin C. Lindeman was assigned to the committee on Area Plans for Land Use headed by Donald Hann. Russell Fredricks will serve with the committee on Health, Education and Welfare headed by John H. Van Dyke.

Extend Deadline In Poster Contest

Zeeland To Double Its Sewer Rates

ZEELAND — Sanitary sewer charges in Zeeland will be doubled effective July 1 following action by City Council Monday night.

Council acted on recommendations of the sewer committee and the city's consulting engineers, Moore & Bruggink of Grand Rapids.

The higher sewer rates were needed to meet increased costs of operating the system and to pay for improvements, it was pointed out.

The city currently is undergoing a \$500,000 expansion of the treatment plant.

Council authorized the doubling of the sewage rates with the minimum rate being boosted from the current \$4 a quarter to \$8 a quarter.

Council tabled action for two weeks on a proposal to extend sanitary sewer services into areas not now serviced.

Three separate projects were proposed by consulting engineers including the northwest, southeast and southwest areas.

Estimated cost would be \$16.50 per front foot for the northwest area; \$16 per foot for the southeast area and \$20 a foot for the southwest area.

In addition each property owner would be assessed \$325 for a sewer lateral from the main to the property line. Total estimated cost for the improvement was \$1,012,700.

Hope Administers Spanish Exam

The National Spanish examination of the American Association of Teachers of Spanish and Portuguese (AATSP) was administered at Hope College last Saturday.

Competing were students from area high schools, including Holland, Hamilton and Allegan. The AATSP national Spanish examination is a state-wide contest in which students currently enrolled in Spanish classes are eligible to compete for prizes on both the state and national level.

Between 80 and 90 students took the exam this year according to Orestes G. Pino, assistant professor of Spanish and coordinator of the Hope testing center.

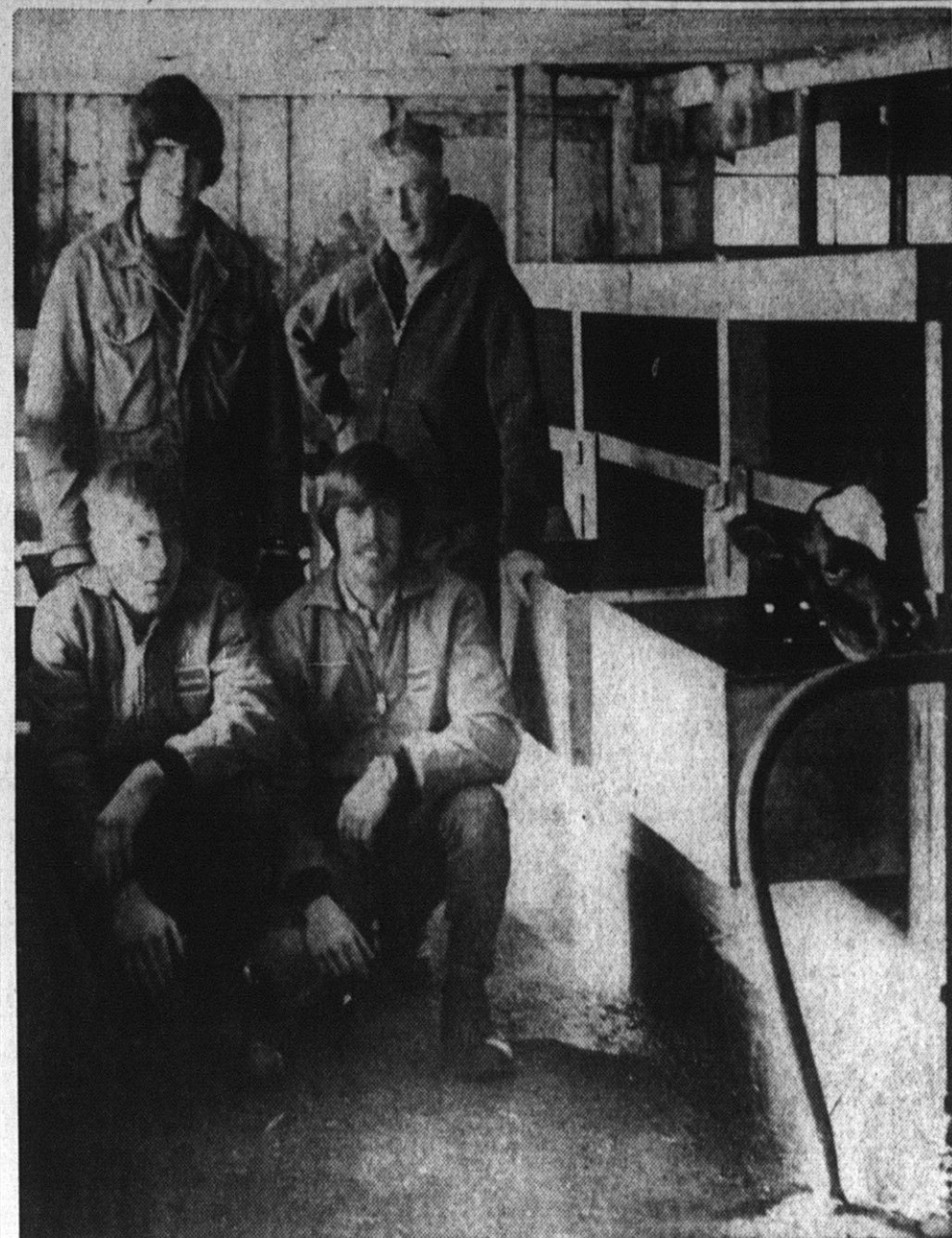
Further plans for the celebration were made at a meeting of the committee Thursday night in City Hall with Don Vos presiding.

Two Area Farmers To Get MSU Awards

Two area farmers are among the 20 Michigan men who will be honored this year with "Farm Manager of the Year" awards from Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service. Jarvis Zoet, route 5, Holland, and John Fraaza, route 2, Zeeland, will attend the award presentation in East Lansing with their wives Thursday.

The winning farmers were selected on the basis of efficient organization and operation of their farms over the past three years, during which time they were rated in the top three per cent of MSU's Telfarm Program, a plan of electronic farm record keeping. In addition to being successful farmers, most of the men are involved in community, farm, church, school and political affairs.

Zoet has been farming about 20 years and his poultry farm is located on M-40 six miles south of Holland. The organization includes two fully mechanized modern cage laying houses with 28,000 square feet of space with a capacity for carrying 36,000 laying hens and facilities for producing 14,000 pullets in a batch.

The 300 acres of tillable land on the Zoet farm are largely in corn and some hired help is necessary during the year. A son, John, is enrolled at MSU as an agricultural technology student, and the farm operation is a good example of a family working together, keeping and using good records and practicing good management principles, according to Homer Paterson, Allegan county extension director.

Fraaza was a farmer for 22 years in Wisconsin prior to coming to Michigan where he has been farming five years. He and his sons, Jerrold and Lyle, have been in partnership a little over a year on their dairy farm located on 72nd Ave., route 2, Zeeland.

The operation now carries about 100 cows, double the herd size of four years ago, and is one of the highest producing registered Holstein herds in the state, averaging 19,319 pounds of milk and 743 pounds of butterfat per cow in 1971. Only 165 tillable acres are farmed, according to Lawrence W. Stebbins, Ottawa county extension director, and these produce primarily corn and quality forage.

The Fraazas buy considerable feed in the belief that they can make more money producing milk than raising feed and they emphasize good breeding, feeding and dairy management based on accurate records kept.

Drinking Law For Drivers Now Stiffer

Law enforcement agencies today alerted citizens to a tougher drunk driver law that goes into effect in Michigan March 30.

Called the "point test" law, the presumptive blood alcohol level for driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor will be reduced from 0.15 per cent to 0.10 per cent.

Under the Michigan Implied Consent Law, drivers using Michigan highways are presumed to have given their consent to a chemical test if arrested for driving under the influence.

Amendments to the law have lowered the "under the influence" level to the 0.10 per cent level. Also lowered is the level for "impaired driving." That drops from 0.10 per cent to levels in excess of 0.07 per cent but less than 0.10 per cent.

For the average driver weighing 150 pounds it means that five highballs or five glasses of beer taken within one hour could bring the level to 0.10 per cent. Previously it would have taken eight highballs or eight glasses of beer in one hour to reach the "drunk driver" level of 0.15 per cent.

Tapes, Recorders Taken in Breakin

Holland police were investigating a breakin reported at Electronic Sound Inc., 738 Michigan Ave. where tapes, recorders and speakers valued at \$1,228 were missing.

Police said they received the complaint at 10:38 a.m. Tuesday from William Kuykendall, an employee of the firm. Officers said entry to the building was gained through a rear door. The breakin was believed to have occurred Monday night or early Tuesday.

Missing were 40 tape cartridges, three recorders, two speakers, two head sets, an auto player and three tape cases.

Teachers Salaries Up 5 Per Cent

Contract Ratified By School Board and HEA Membership

A salary schedule for Holland public school teachers for 1972-73 calling for a five per cent increase has been ratified by the Board of Education and the Holland Education Association.

The board unanimously approved the new schedule which will become a part of the three-year master contract at a special meeting Tuesday afternoon, and the HEA membership ratified the contract in a ballot vote in various school Wednesdays, 195 to 47.

The new salary schedule calls for teachers with a B.A. degree to start at \$8,264 and in 12 steps go to \$12,159. The M.A. degree schedule starts at \$8,726 and in 13 steps goes to \$13,797. The current salary schedule for B.A. degrees opens at \$7,870 and goes to \$11,580 and for M.A. degrees \$8,310 to \$13,140. Since the 1971-72 schedule was implemented after the price freeze, not all of the scheduled increases have been paid.

Robert Gosselar presided at the 10-minute board meeting Tuesday afternoon in administration headquarters. Five members present cast a unanimous vote. Absent were Board President James O. Lamb and John Amaya.

HEA President Donald Rohlich conducted the HEA membership vote this morning.

The salary schedule agreement, negotiated within the federal laws and regulations in connection with the wage-price control, also set rates for extra pay - extra duty items. This supplement lists 6 per cent for two senior high school plays, 2 per cent for high school musical production, 5 per cent for senior high girls basketball and 3 per cent for junior high girls basketball.

Supt. Donald L. Ihrman said the current settlement has been the earliest in many years.

Grand Haven Cited for Use Of Landfill

Grand Haven city manager Daryl Tammen and three municipal truck drivers from Grand Haven were cited by Port Sheldon township Tuesday in connection with alleged use of an unlicensed landfill in the township.

Township attorney James Bussard of Grand Haven said the citations were handed out as the trucks left the landfill site along the south side of Crosswell St. at US-31. The drivers were cited for dumping without a permit while the city manager was cited for aiding and abetting.

Bussard said the landfill was owned by Paul Machiele of Spring Lake who had an agreement with the city to pick up refuse. Bussard said the landfill was not licensed under terms of a township ordinance adopted within the past year.

Township constable Vern Bowen said the Grand Haven trucks carried debris picked up in Grand Haven during a spring clean up campaign by the city.

Tammen said four municipal trucks had attempted to empty their loads at the landfill but the fourth truck went to the Olive township landfill site at Pigeon Creek park to empty its load.

The Pigeon creek landfill site is under opposition by Olive township residents.

Tammen said more municipal trucks picking up debris today would head for the Olive landfill site.

Bowen said the township was considering closing the Machiele landfill.

30 Teen-Agers Sign Up for Jobs

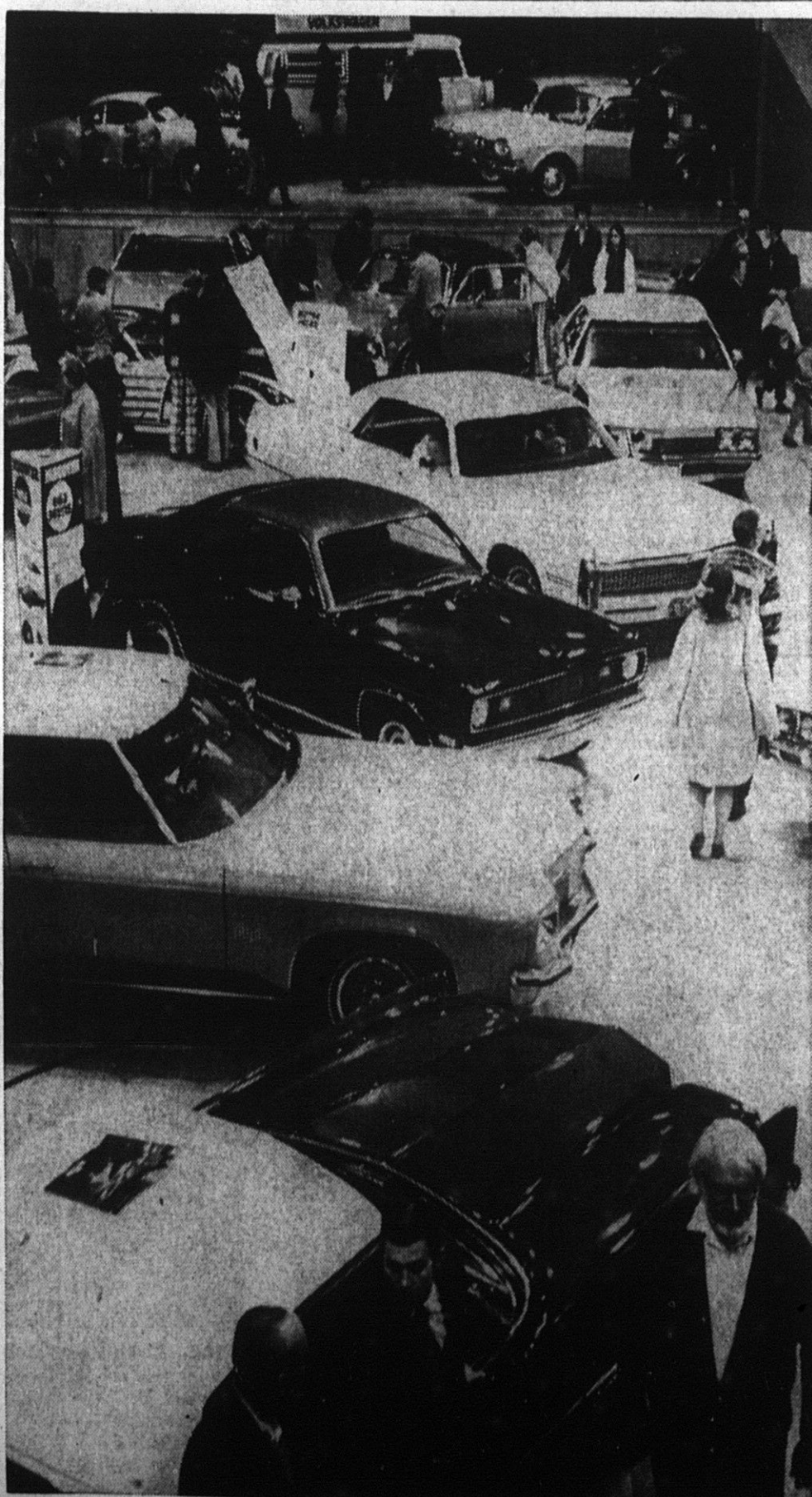

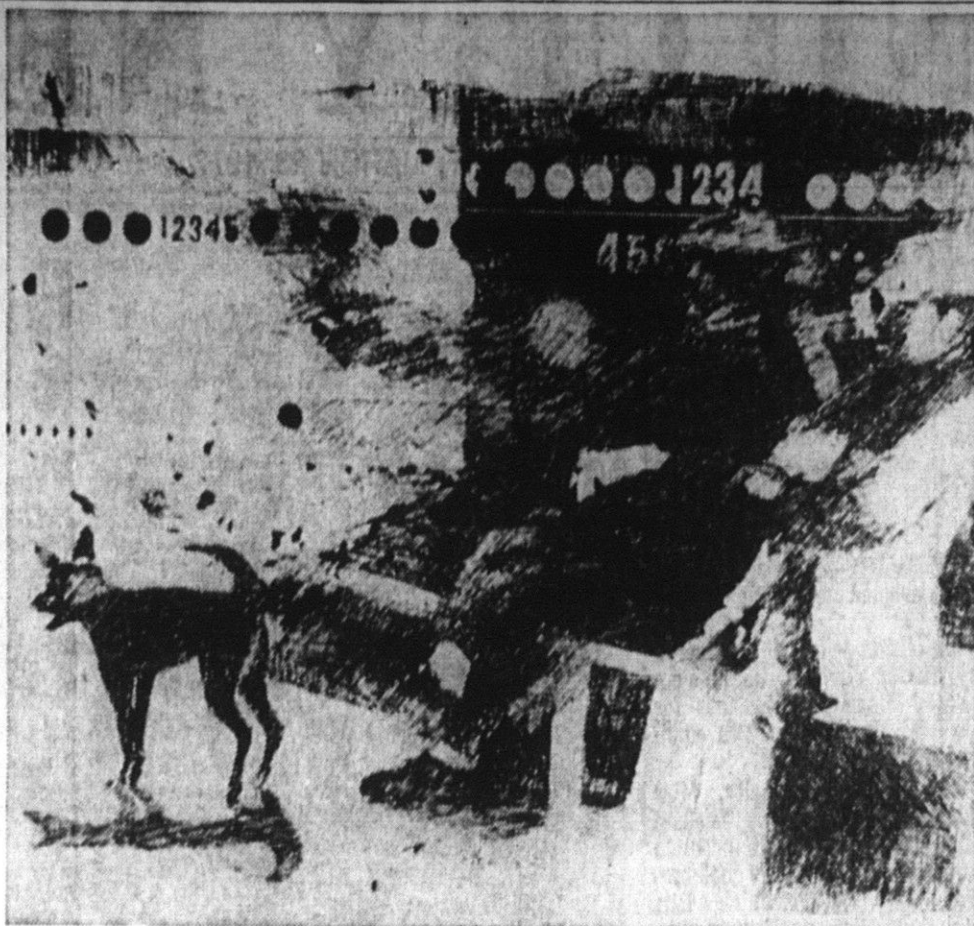

Millage Election Slated June 12 in Grand Haven

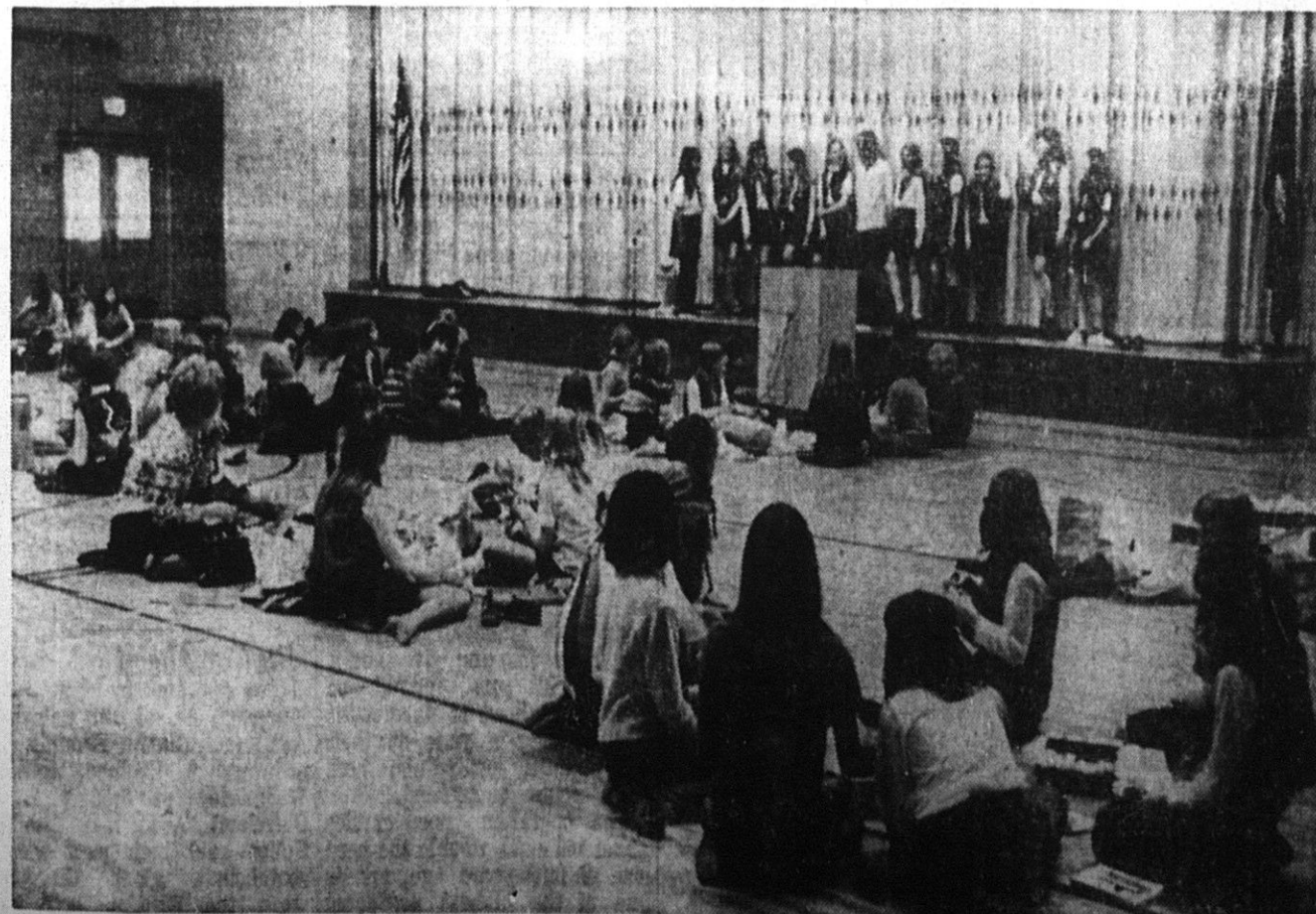

Holland police are investigating a breaking and entering at Jim's Launderama, 188 West 29th St., sometime Monday afternoon. The incident was reported at 5:51 p.m. by the owner, Jerry Genzink.

Police said coin changers in the facility were tampered with and broken into and an undetermined amount of money was taken.

Jim Knoll Says God's Miracle,

"Yes, I suppose I'm a walking miracle, but it was God's miracle!"

Those are the words of Jim Knoll, 41-year-old Baptist missionary in Tokyo who survived a 65-foot fall from a freeway overpass last Aug. 8, and is now home in Holland convalescing from multiple fractures in both legs.

"Even more important to us was that God's miracle in healing was recognized by unbelievers in Japan. Only the sustaining grace of God could pull one through."

Jim's close brush with death last August occurred when he attempted to return to his stalled car on a freeway north of Japan to retrieve his reading glasses. The car had stalled about 8:30 a.m. that Sunday when he was en route to conduct a service in a church attended by U.S. soldiers. The Japanese have road service for such events, but the car was still there at 9 p.m. when a friend was driving Jim home.

Although the car was not on the bridge, Jim rounded some bushes and plunged down "a hole" curving out about 15 feet and landing in a four-foot muddy drainage ditch, missing a hard surface directly below. Fortunately, a blacktop road led to the lower level and the Japanese ambulance answering the call got Jim to the Zama Army Hospital in record time.

At the hospital, attendants found multiple and compound fractures of both legs, a broken back, one broken rib and a few other injuries, although no "internal injuries" in medical terms. He was put on a Stryker frame in intensive care. Within 12 hours, his temperature rose to 105+ and a tracheotomy was performed to keep breathing. A special pacer kept his heart beating while machines took over other functions.

Zama Army Hospital a 700-bed facility for U.S. servicemen wounded in Vietnam does not serve civilians, but does handle emergencies. It has all the latest equipment for complicated war wounds, and Jim received the best of care. Most other patients are sent to the west coast in a matter of days, and Jim's case, considered hopeless at first, became a challenge to the top men. Out of the hospital experience developed a close friendship with Lt. Col. Donald Seymour who heads the orthopedic section.

Jim today walks on crutches, his right foot encased in a stout boot with a three-inch base, and the left foot in a walking cast. It is the left foot that will continue to give him trouble since the fragmented bones could not be set and drainage is still a problem. Besides countless trips to surgery, he for a time was encased in a body cast.

"We were never bitter, although I'm sure my wife would have even greater cause for bitterness than I had," Jim said. "She was saddled with all the work of the mission, looked after the children, and made daily visits to the hospital... and that involved about four hours on the road."

Jim added: "We could feel the prayers of all God's people. God constantly upheld us, and it is this that the unbelievers found hard to understand. We were aware of all the prayers of our friends in Holland, and I have received letters from people on every continent on the globe saying people were praying for me. We are most grateful."

Jim's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ted Knoll of Holland, and about 25 other relatives greeted the family at Kent County Airport Friday night... a grand celebration indeed.

Sunday morning Jim attended Immanuel Baptist Church and sang a tenor solo. That night he attended his old church at Central Park where he grew up. Both local churches share in his support.

The family, now living in the Immanuel missionary home at 96 West 21st St., expects to remain here through the school year in 1973. After that, hopefully they will return to Japan which has been their home for over four years.

Jim attended Hope College two years, and served in the U.S. Army 1951-55 before going to Moody Bible Institute in Chicago. He taught school two years in Washington State and then went to Tokyo. There he married a mission worker of San Gabriel, Calif. They have three children, Christine, 7, Jeff, 5, and Debbie, 3.

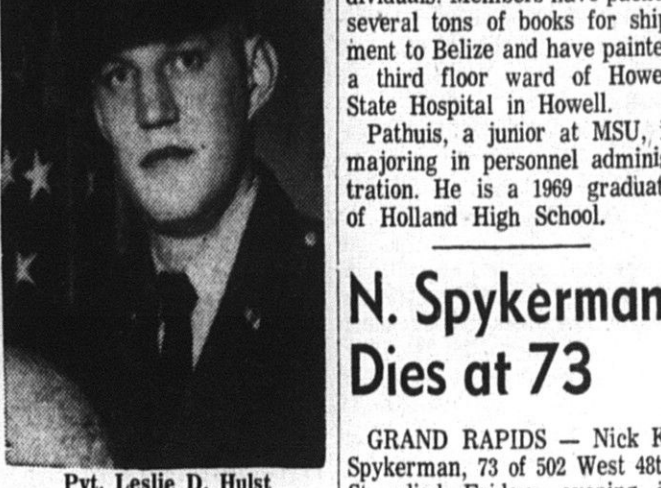

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SAFETY GADGETS ON CARS

The National Geographic has just furnished another press release concerning a little history on the invention of motor vehicles and safety features.

"Early safety refinement replaced the driver's tiller with a steering wheel. This is reported to have simplified controls including a hand throttle on the wheel. Then decades later the throttle was removed, ending a dangerous tendency for unoccupied motor vehicles to move on their own.

"Then came the self starter, no longer necessary to crank by hand. Bumpers, criticized today as being too fragile, were said to be an afterthought. The first 'horseless carriages' had none.

"Pierce-Arrows offered shock-absorbing pneumatic bumpers as optional extras in the 1920's. But most cars relied upon protruding solid steel bumpers to keep crashes from denting the bodywork. The jolt, however, often proved highly damaging to the people inside.

"Some experimental cars now being tested use hydraulic bumpers to absorb some of the energy in a collision. One inventor — not Chinese — stuffed bumpers with ping-pong balls for the same purpose.

"Water-filled bumpers have plugs that pop out on collision, releasing several gallons of water. The water cushions much of the impact, but the filled bumpers weigh about 250 pounds each.

"Seat belts, first offered on American cars in 1955, predate automobiles. A United States patent was granted in 1886 for lap belts to prevent people from bouncing out of fast bugies.

"The idea found few takers. Even World War I pilots did not use belts until some aviators fell from their machines. Following the war, Barney Oldfield installed a seat belt in his racer — possibly the first car so equipped.

"Cars in Germany included seat belts as early as 1941. But today experts believe less than 40 per cent of motorists use the lap and shoulder harness that comes with their cars.

"To remedy this, some 1972 cars feature a seat-sensor system that sounds a buzzer and flashes a light if the motor is turned on before occupants have buckled up.

"One 'passive restraint' system under consideration uses belts permanently fixed to car doors. Motorists enter the car by sliding under the belts. When the doors are closed, the belts wrap around the driver and passengers.

"In addition to proposed air bags, which would expand on impact to hold people in their seats, automakers are testing web nets or blankets that served from the roof to protect motorists in crashes.

"To halt drunk drivers, a digital device has been developed that would make the driver punch buttons to match numbers flashed briefly on the dashboard. If the motorist failed in three tries, the car's engine wouldn't start.

"And a Japanese manufacturer has patented a sensor in the steering wheel that reacts to alcohol on the driver's breath and turns off the motor."

Sunday School Lesson

One Body in Christ
1 Corinthians 12: 12-27

The church is criticized and defended but it is not ignored. This lesson teaches that the church is one body and that every member has a function in this body and to make every member aware of his obligation is a task.

I. The church is like a human body. Paul extolled the church. He said it was the household of faith, a temple, the very shrine of the eternal, the pillar and ground of truth, the bride of Christ and the body of Christ, a blood-bought initiation (Acts 20:28), of which Jesus Christ is the Head.

The text is from the letter sent to the Corinthians. It was troubled about leadership loyalties, and speaking in tongues — made them quarrel. Paul said they belonged to one body, all baptized by one Spirit, all fellowshipped together at the Lord's table. The church is one body.

II. In the church every member has a function. Like the human body which is composed of many members, each having its special function, so the church has many members and each one has a function. In the church some may think their function unimportant, others may consider their function important. Every member contributes his part when he does it well.

In the human body some members may get more attention than others but every member is important and has a responsibility — the same is true in the church. Every member contributes something so that the whole body may perform efficiently. This is true of the church and the human body.

III. The whole is more important than a part. The building of the church ought to be the concern of every member. Unity and diversity can go together. Every member is under obligation to build the local congregation, the denomination, and the universal church of Christ. Important it is for every member to realize that he belongs to Jesus Christ.

Love is important. Where there is love there is concern for each other, not only those of the same group or congregation or color or culture but to Christians all over the world. We are always in danger of being parochial in our concern, forgetting that we are members of one great body, the body of Christ. We can begin by learning to know each other better in the local congregation and community.

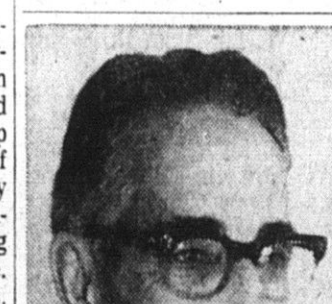

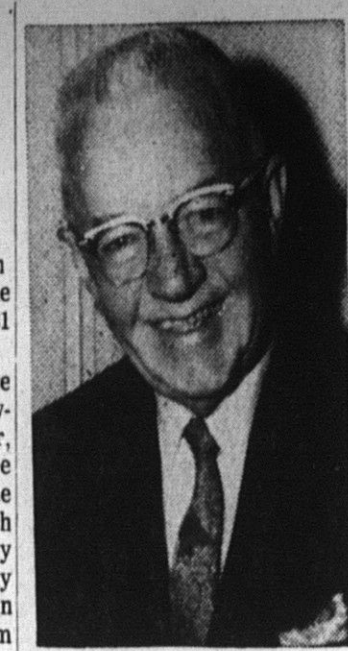

Yet from that decade of longer sideburns, shorter miniskirts and higher taxes, America has moved to the 1970's, the decade of environment; from a decade of criticism and tearing down to a decade where people have begun to try to solve the problems, not quite so wrapped up with what's wrong with America but what's right with America.

Vander Jagt said America has more abundance more evenly distributed than any other country in the world and that people on the poverty level in the United States are on standards which would be regarded as luxurious in two-thirds of the world. "And we have greater freedom to do the things we want to do than any other country in the world," he added. "We should swell with pride because of the things that are right with America," he said, "and America needs builders like Janet Cuperus and the VFW to make this a better world."

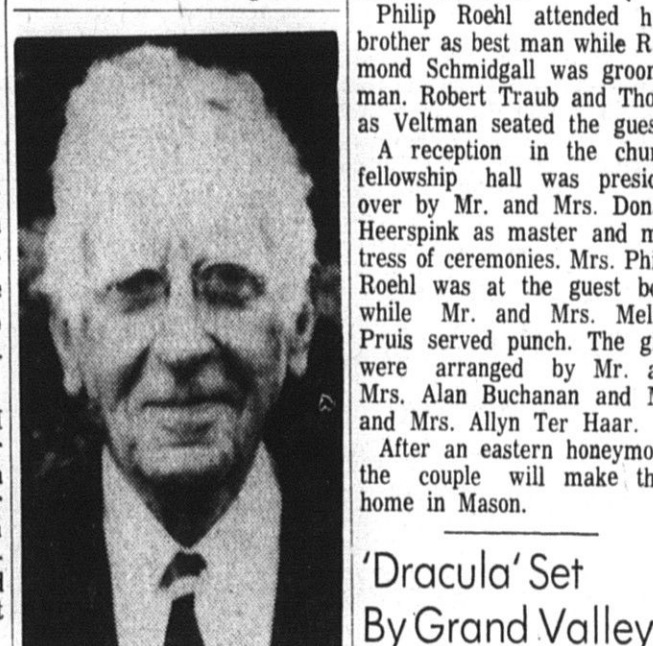

Joe Iauch, basketball coach at West Ottawa for the past two years, announced Tuesday that he had resigned from that position but will remain on as head of the social studies department.

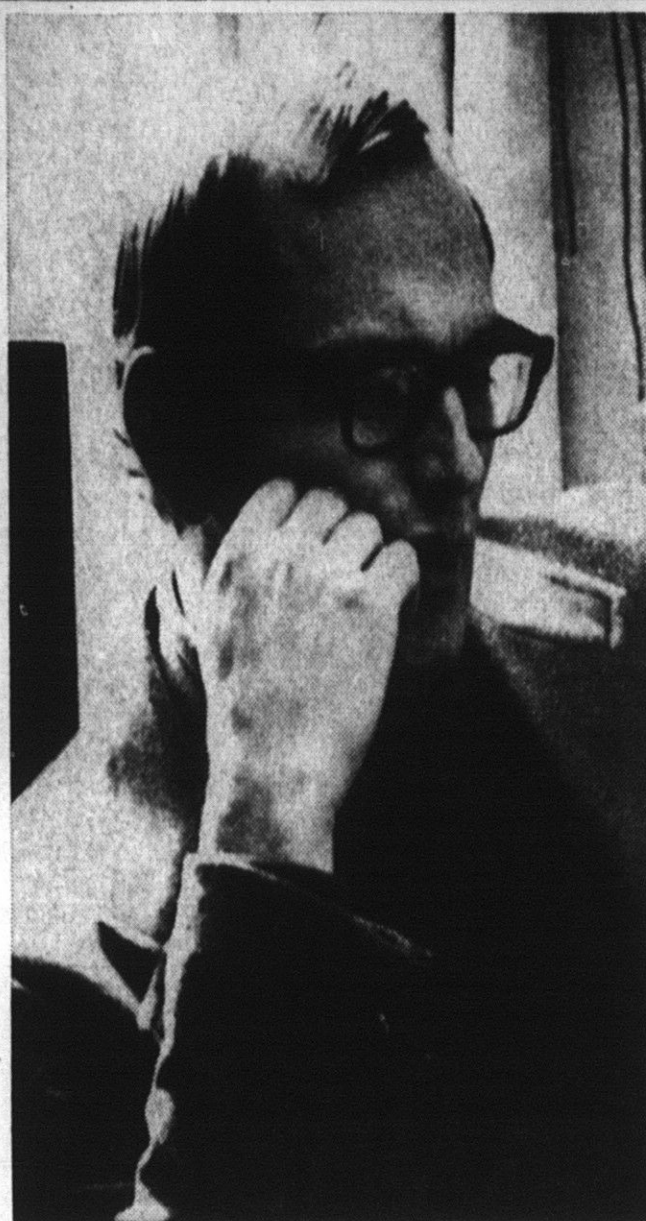
Iauch said, "I'm also quitting as trainer of the football team and as assistant track mentor."

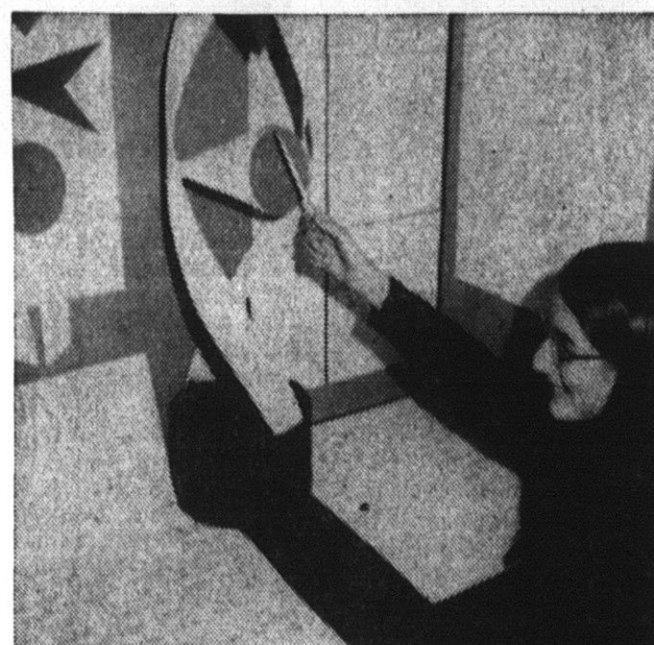

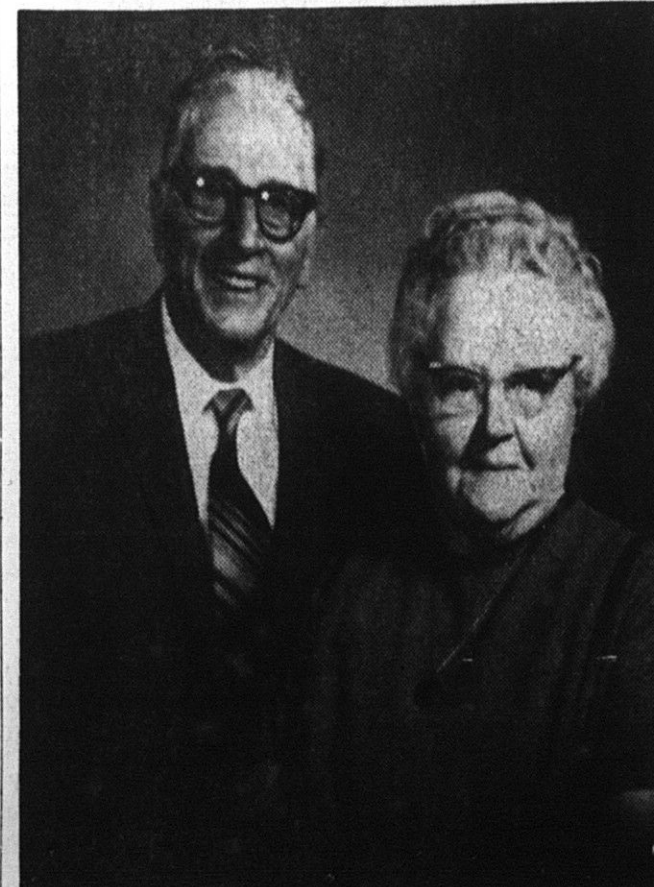

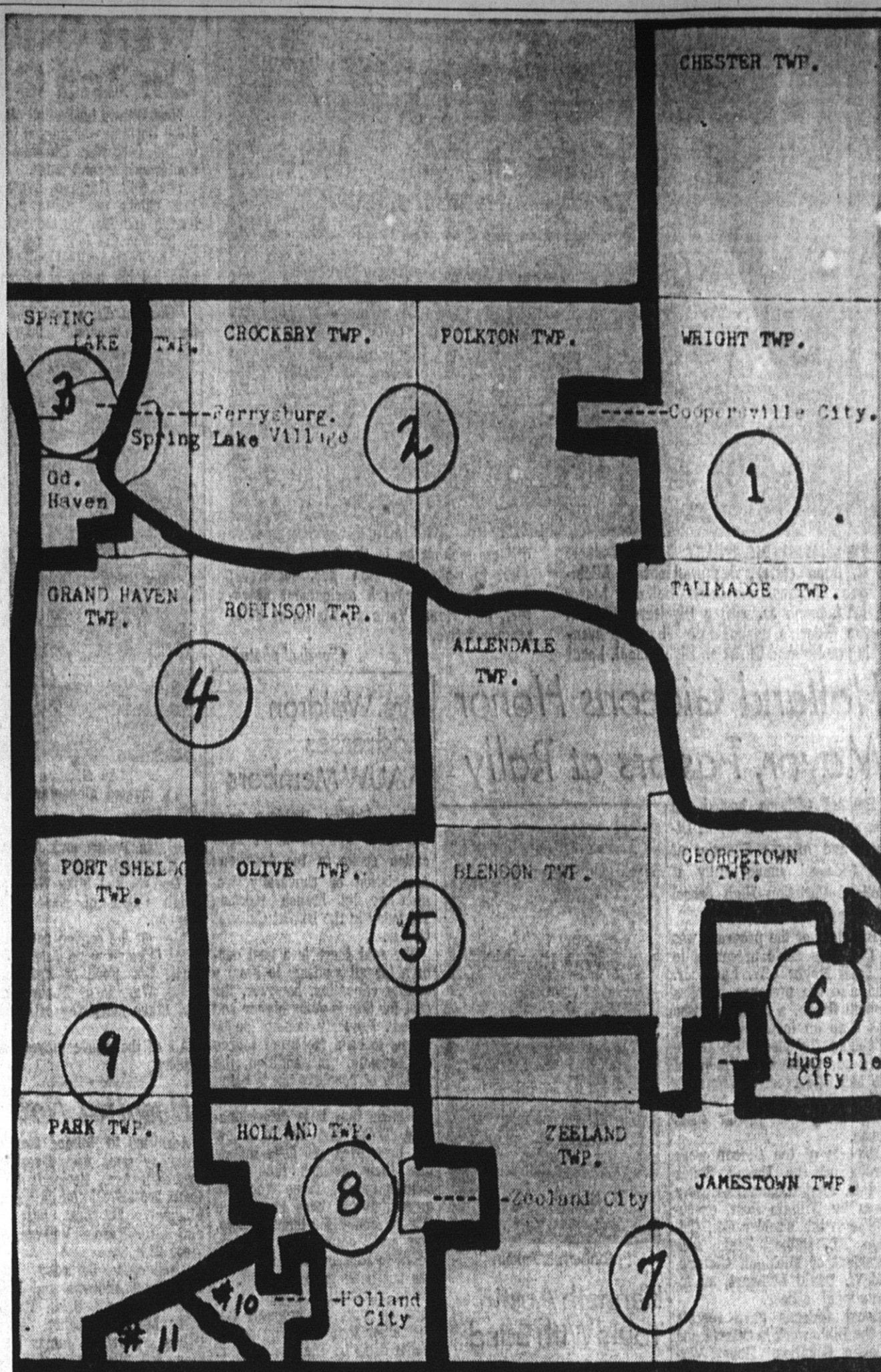

The office force will operate four nine-hour days Monday through Thursday and from 8 a.m. to noon on Friday.

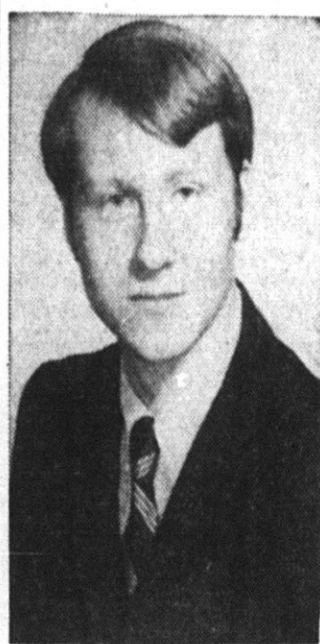
Four or five other plants in Holland have initiated or are considering the four-day 40-hour work week, Arendshorst said.

At the business meeting concluding the conference, the Classics Department of Hope was nominated to administer the national translation contests in Greek and Latin for 1972-73.

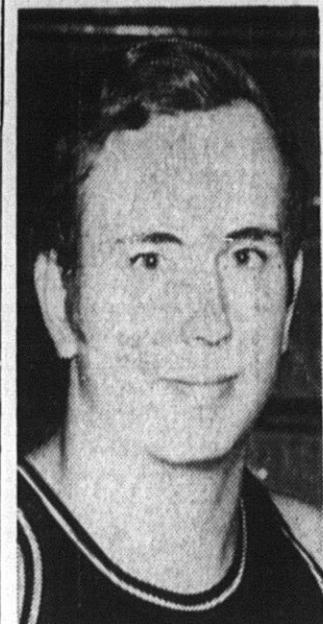

2 Schools at West Ottawa Overcrowded

For the first time, West Ottawa Board of Education Monday night adopted a policy for the remainder of the school year limiting enrollment at Lakewood and Waukazoo schools because of overcrowding. For the remainder of the season, newcomers to the Lakewood-Waukazoo service area will be assigned to Beechwood Glurum and transportation will be provided.

Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte said since boundaries for elementary school areas were set up five years ago, Lakewood-Waukazoo has had an increase of 164 students while other service areas have had only minor increases. Lakewood serves the lower grades and Waukazoo the upper grades.

Enrollment projections were discussed and the greatest growth appears on the senior high level, although the board is concerned over potential growth because of 492 new subdivision lots approved the past year, 411 of them in Park township served by the Lakewood-Waukazoo area.

Supt. Van Raalte reported meeting with Sen. Gary Byker, Rep. James Farnsworth and Rep. Melvin De Stigter and in their opinion it is inevitable that state aid to West Ottawa district this year will be reduced \$51,593.

Van Raalte said this cut will curtail some school functions. He said the district was not informed until after school started last September of the 1971-72 school aid formula, and must now adjust to offset this reduction which Van Raalte said is being withheld to help balance the state budget.

The board approved an interim policy on graduation requirement revision currently requiring 16 units and eight semesters of attendance. This is being studied by a committee of teachers, citizens, students and administrators, but meanwhile, students who have a valid reason for separation may file applications with the principal. This is mainly for students who have met all requirements outside of the eight-semester attendance and may be accepted by college or technical school.

The board approved modification of the Ottawa-Kent League Constitution, calling for a strong administrative council to prevent possible coalition of relatively few schools controlling important decisions.

A progress report on Middle school put construction on schedule for opening Sept. 1, 1972, in the opinion of the architect. The board approved some contracts for stage draperies, home economics electrical equipment, shop equipment, musical instruments and shelving. Van Raalte said equipment purchases were falling within or below original estimates, and overall construction to date also has resulted in credits on estimated construction costs.

Joe Jauch submitted his resignation as high school basketball coach and it was accepted.

A progress report by the transportation committee referred to studies involving children riding on buses to which they were not assigned to attend such meetings as Scouts and Bluebirds, resulting in overloading. Also under study is transporting children to school-sponsored activities in another building for such functions as band and orchestra. Scheduling procedures also are being studied in the major review of the transportation policy adopted in 1959.
