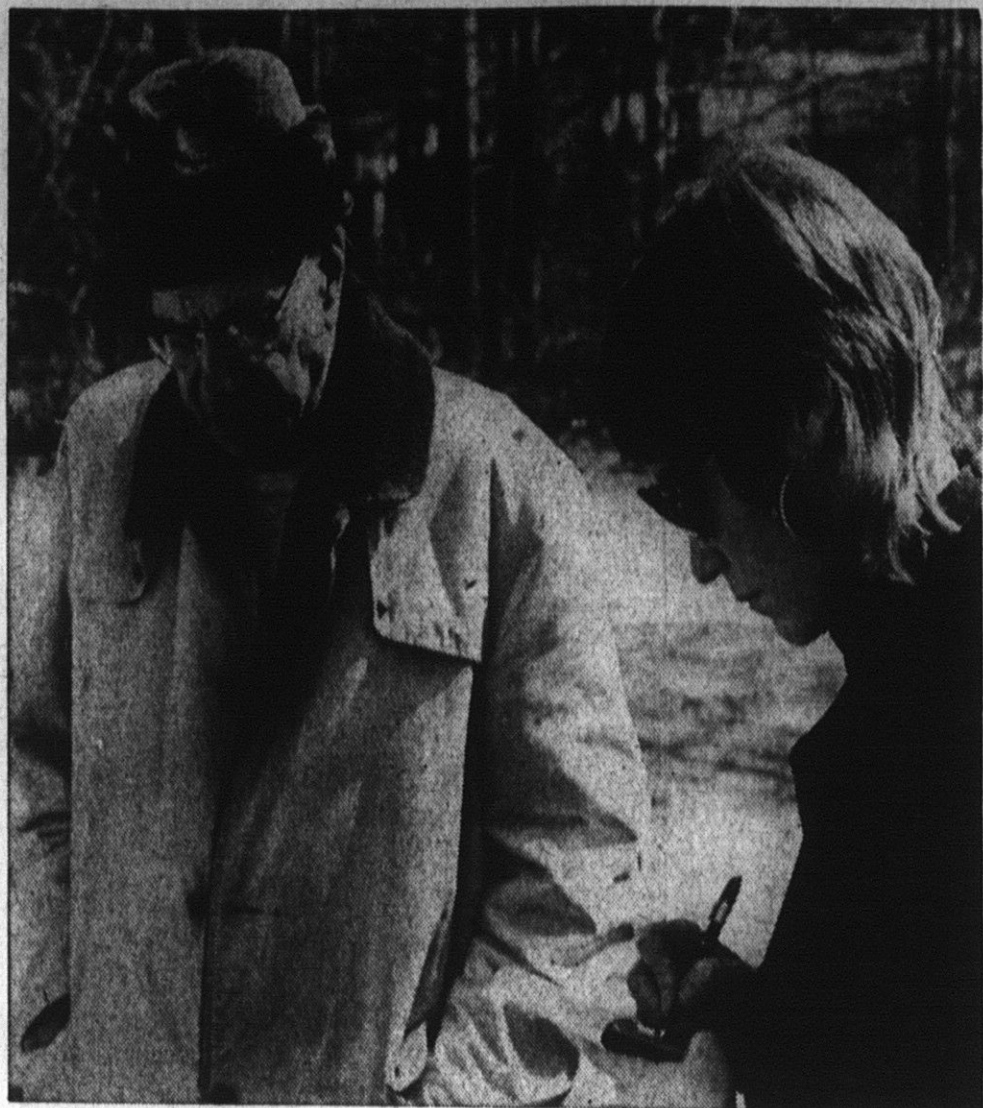

Holland Has Link With Panda Gifts

It's a small world indeed when Holland can claim a link to the presentation of the pandas to the National Zoo in Washington, D.C., from the Peoples Republic of China.

It is possible though, and Leroy Woodruff Sr., 1242 South Shore Dr., left today for Washington to serve as a consultant to Dr. Reed, director of the National Zoo.

The Woodruffs moved back to Holland Saturday from Chicago where he worked as a general zookeeper for the Brookfield Zoo from 1933 to 1967 and then spent two years working there part-time after his retirement.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Woodruff are Holland natives and Woodruff worked eight years for Chicago oil and coal magnate, George Getz, who owned an extensive private zoo on his estate at 264 Lakeshore Dr. He was a trainee at the Getz zoo and advanced to general keeper and assistant to the general superintendent before leaving.

At Brookfield, Woodruff was field head from 1933 to 1949 and served as superintendent of the hoof stock at the zoo's west end from 1952 to 1967.

It was at Brookfield that Woodruff gained the working knowledge of pandas that will be put to use in his consultant capacity in Washington.

Brookfield had three pandas, the last of which died in 1933, and was the first and last zoo in the United States to have the animals. When the announcement of the panda gift was made during the presidential trip to Red China, there were many at the Brookfield musing, "What if . . .?" and hoping that Chicago would get the bears.

All of the proper facilities, personnel, etc., are present at Brookfield, Woodruff said, but Mrs. Nixon decided the pandas should be in the nation's capital. However, Woodruff feels more of the pandas, because they are a high altitude animal, will be obtained by the U.S. and he is sure that Brookfield should get the next shipment.

When it was decided that the National Zoo would get the bears, Dr. Reed contacted Dr. Weaver Williamson, veterinarian at Brookfield, and asked for Woodruff's services as consultant. Neither Reed nor any of his zoo personnel has had experience with pandas and Woodruff will check such things as the bear grottoes, sleeping dens, shift doors, bedding, general housing and general care and feeding.

Woodruff will be in Washington these days but have no idea when the pandas will arrive because the entire venture is being kept highly secret. Although the animals are to arrive sometime around April 1, no definite date has been set and no one is even sure how many or what sex the pandas will be.

Woodruff has spent most of his adult life in zoo work and, although he began as a trainee with Getz, zoos today are beginning to require two years of college zoology for employment. This leaves the individual with the opportunity of becoming a curator, Woodruff said, adding that Brookfield is deeply involved with training programs and is a training center for keepers.

Interesting things seem to come into Woodruff's life in groups. He and his wife were in the middle of moving to Hol-

land from Chicago when he received the request to serve as consultant for the National Zoo, and he has also been awarded life membership in the American Association of Zookeepers and has received the AAZK's R. Marlin Perkins Certificate of Excellence for 1972. A friend from the Brookfield staff will accept the award in Honolulu for Woodruff while he is in Washington.

Now that the Woodruffs are fully retired and moved to Holland, they're planning on relaxing and enjoying their family. It seems highly unlikely, however, that a man who has led such a life will settle down to much inactivity in retirement.

Ottawa Jailer Burmeister Dies at 60

GRAND HAVEN — Ottawa county deputy Clifford R. Burmeister, 60, of Marne, died Tuesday in Borgess Hospital. Kalamazoo of injuries suffered in a car-truck collision near Spring Lake last Thursday.

Burmeister, a member of the sheriff's department 11 years and Wright Township clerk, was critically injured when the pickup truck he was driving and a car collided head-on along M-104 at 144th Ave. in Spring Lake township.

'Contract Curriculum' Set at Hope

Hope College will introduce a new curricular pattern beginning with the 1972-73 academic year which will allow a student to keep with his unique abilities and goals while achieving the overall educational objectives of the College.

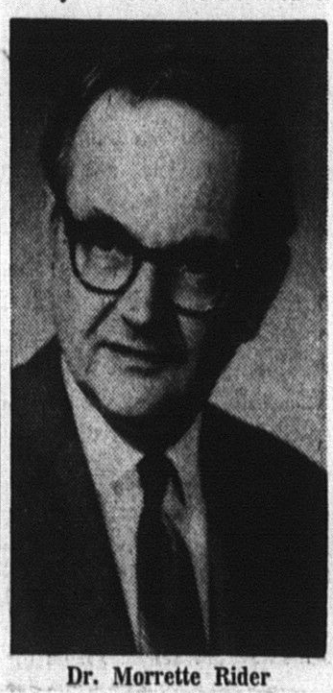
"After a long and intensive study, our faculty and students have agreed that the long-established formal program of core and departmental major requirements that have formed the general course pattern for a Hope College degree may not be the best for all students," said academic dean Morrette Rider.

The new pattern, known as Contract Curriculum, rests on the assumption that there are some students who are not only capable of, but also eager for self-determination in their education.

"The current presupposition that students ought to learn broadly at first and then proceed to greater and greater specialization is not necessarily valid for all students," said Dean Rider.

"In fact," continues the Dean, "The inverse of that academic pyramid might be more productive with some students."

The new curriculum will allow a student after his freshman year to select an area of

concentrated study which might be a better approach to the ultimate achievement of his personal educational objectives.

The student will enter into a "contract" with the college defining his educational goals. Contract curriculum is not considered an honors program according to Dean Rider. He said that no minimum grade point average will be established as a pre-requisite for acceptance into the program.

"Present techniques for identifying honor students are not necessarily reliable indicators of success in such a program as we conceive it," he added.

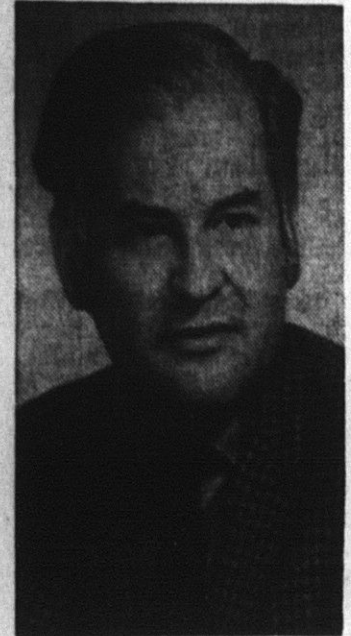

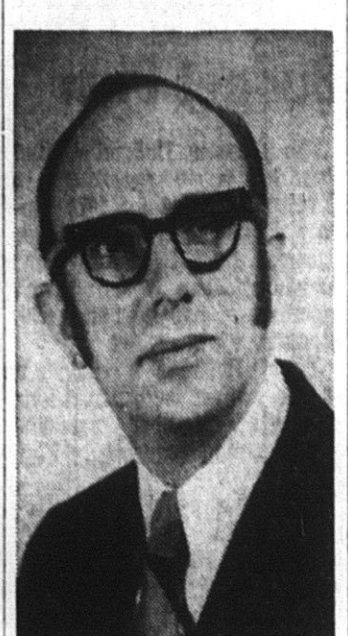

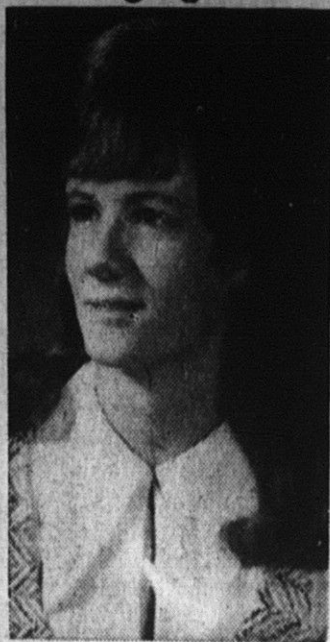

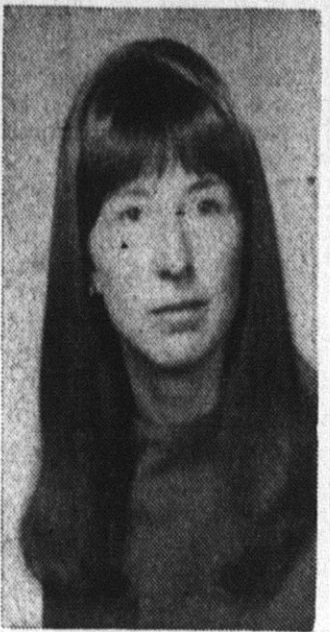

Women's Lib Basically Good, Accountants Told

A strong advocate of women's lib, Dr. Dolores B. Storey, a consulting psychologist in Muskegon, told guests attending the 23rd annual public relations dinner of the Holland chapter of Women's Accountants Tuesday Night in Holiday Inn, that fighting for women's liberation the right way not only benefits the women, but also the men.

"Of course, a few fanatics go around breaking into men's bars, and we can't blame the newspapers for playing this up, but fundamentally, the women's liberation movement is basically good. Women are different and we will preserve this difference forever, amen. But preserving this difference and seeking equality is not the same. Courtesy and manners are still important, and women should not fight so hard that they lose more than they have gained."

Married to the same man for 27 years, a veterinarian, and having five children in 4 1/2 years, produces plenty of tensions and anxiety, Dr. Storey admitted but life cannot be free of tension, or there would be no motivation to do anything. "When you reach a tension-free Nivana, you are dead," she said.

Adhering to her subject of "Your Tensions Are Showing," Dr. Storey said women get migraine headaches with too much tension and men get ulcers. Change is the No. 1 cause of tensions, even though most persons like to think of themselves as being flexible, and "not getting our own way" is the second reason, even though people are loath to admit it, the speaker said.

Surprisingly, she listed the fear of death as a third reason, something most everybody avoids talking about, yet something she described as a great

shining hope instead of a morbid subject. She questioned a so-called Christian nation in the throes of the Easter season not really thinking of resurrection and hope.

She urged everybody to try for one week to do exactly what they want to do, and predicted that the wild things one often dreams about will not come to pass because at heart few people are evil. Asking people to love thy neighbor as thyself, she said people cannot give to others unless they respect themselves. "Nobody owes you anything. Christian charity begins and ends with your giving," she said.

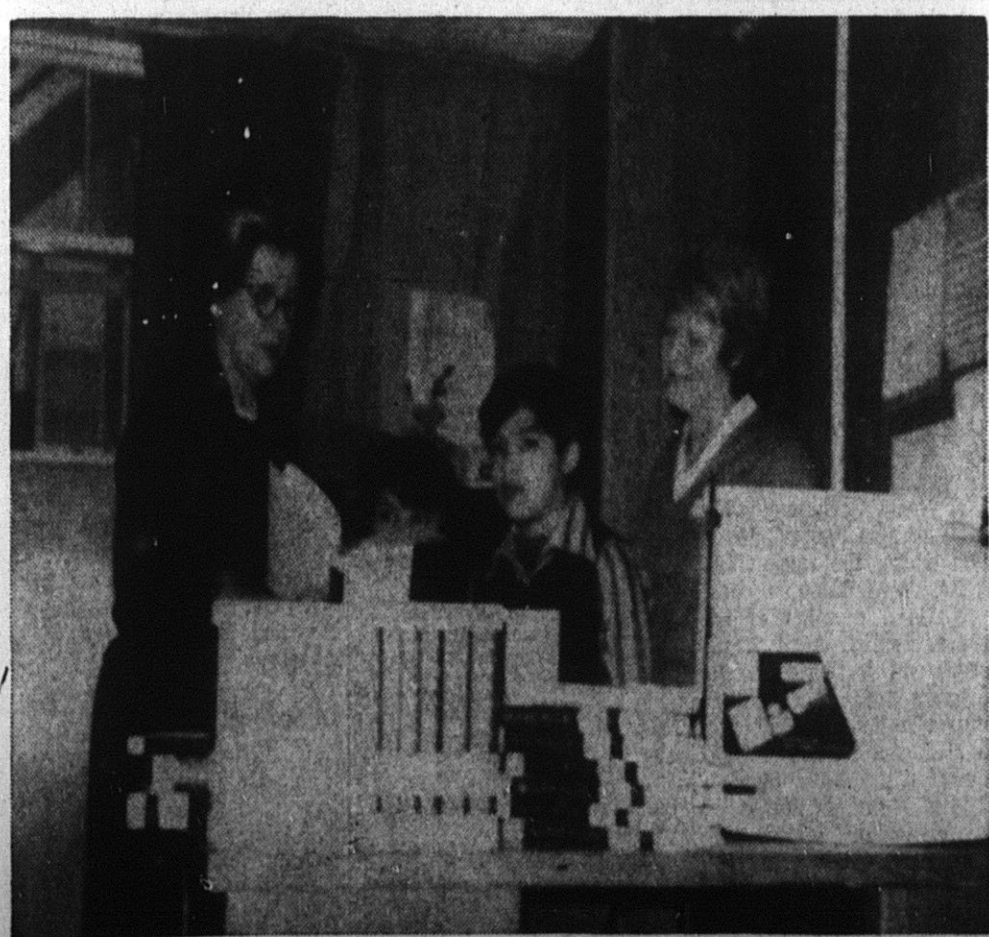

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, April 2, 1972
The Church of the Risen Lord
I Corinthians 15:3-19
By C. P. Dame

Some chapters of the Bible are more important than others. I Corinthians 15 is one of the great chapters, for it deals with the resurrection of Jesus and with ours. On Easter Sunday it is fitting to think about the hereafter.

I, Jesus died and rose again from the dead. This was the content of the gospel Paul preached to the Corinthian church. The Old Testament foretold the death and resurrection of Jesus and the New Testament preachers made this fact the content of their preaching. The death of Christ was purposeful. It was not the death of a martyr but the death of the Redeemer who made possible the forgiveness of man's sins.

In Paul's day questions about Christ were asked. Note that Paul affirms the death of Jesus and that He was buried and "that He rose again the third day according to the Scriptures." Peter saw the resurrected Jesus, and the 12, and at one time "above five hundred brethren at once of whom the greater part remain until this day"—about 30 years after the Lord's resurrection. This indicated that those disciples were young when they met Jesus in Galilee.

James, the brother of Jesus, also saw Jesus and Paul the persecutor also saw Him on the road to Damascus. Paul did not mention every appearance of Jesus but enough to prove that He had risen from the dead and was alive. The Corinthians had listened to the preaching of the risen Christ and had been converted by it. In spite of this fact some Corinthians doubted the resurrection.

II. Preaching the resurrection of Jesus is important. Because some denied the fact the resurrection Paul said that if there is no resurrection, then Jesus did not rise from the dead and we have no gospel to preach. Useless is the preaching of the gospel, faith is meaningless and there is no hope for sinners and no future for Christians. One denial leads to another.

Today some teach it is not necessary to believe in the resurrection of Jesus. They say that we know the character of Jesus and His teaching and His crucifixion and that is enough. Historic Christianity has always taught that Jesus died, rose from the dead according to the Old Testament and lives today. People who are committed to Jesus reveal it by their Christ-like living.

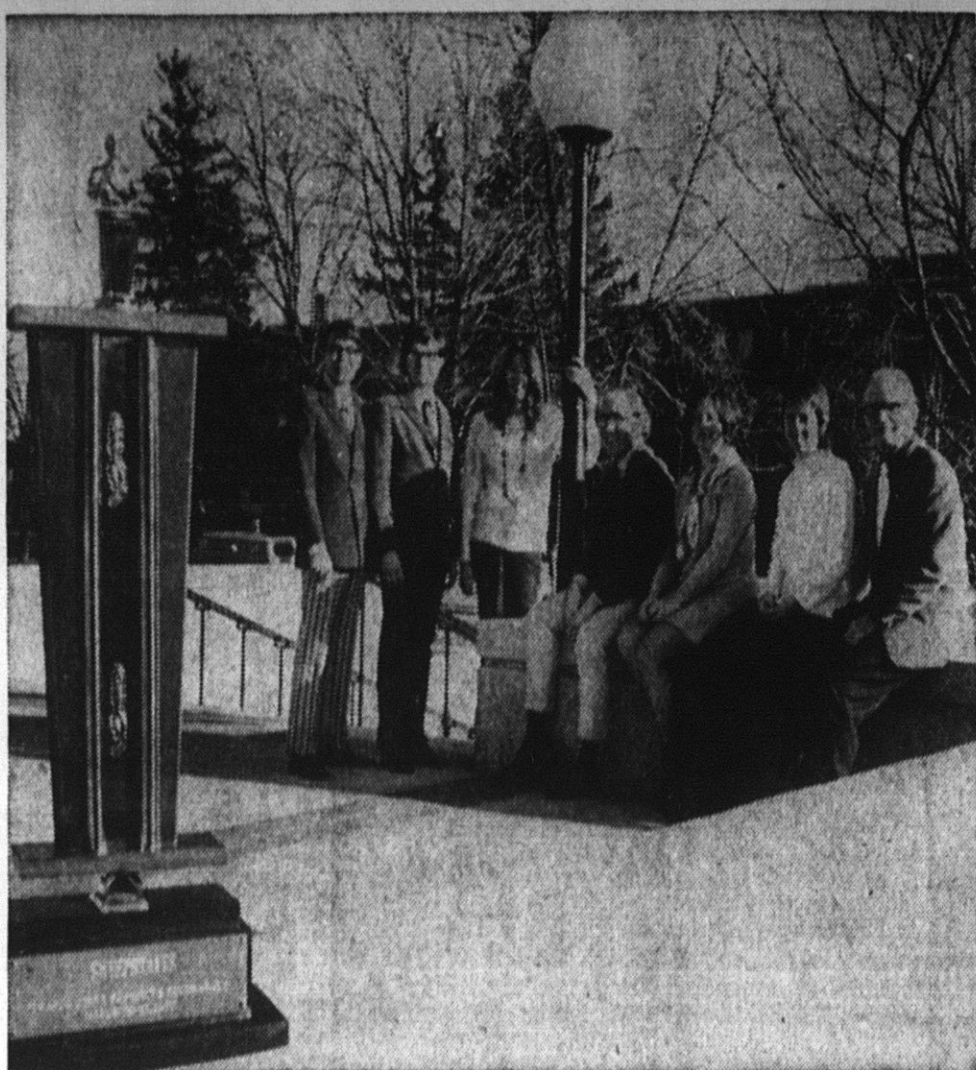

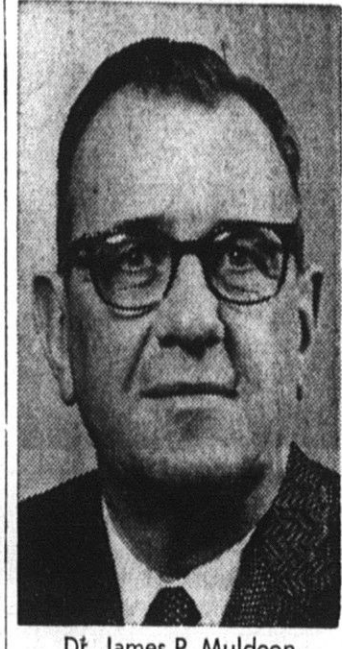

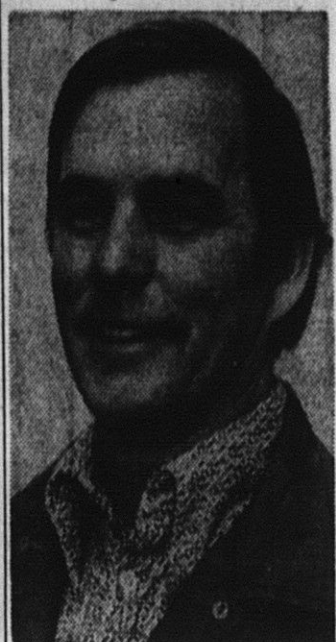

Dyer Sentenced To Prison For Check Writing

GRAND HAVEN — Harry J. Dyer, 44, of 255 West 12th St., Holland, was sentenced to nine months in jail on a felony charge of writing a check without funds. He was sentenced Monday by Ottawa Circuit Court Judge Raymond L. Smith.

Dyer was charged in connection with a \$135.20 check written Oct. 16, 1971 and passed at a Holland clothing store. Dyer was apprehended recently in Phoenix, Arizona, and returned to Holland to face charges. Police said Dyer had an account in a Holland bank but that the funds did not cover the check in question. Officers said others checks were written against the account since October, 1971, totaled more than \$7,000. The checks were passed at a variety of locations across the country, officers said.

Red Poll Visitors May Stay Awhile

Holland area residents' bird feeders have had some new customers this winter, red polls, those little sparrow-like birds with the red-topped heads.

Some of them have red feathers on their breasts and are known as rufous red polls. Their presence in such numbers this far down in the state is irregular, but not unusual, according to Dr. Eldon Greij of the Hope College biology department. They are regular winter visitors to the Upper Peninsula and the northern part of the lower peninsula, however.

According to Dr. Greij, the birds breed and nest up near the Arctic tundra and usually return to their breeding grounds late in March. However, they sometimes stay in Michigan as long as the middle of April.

Dr. Greij also added that snowy owls and snow buntings have been seen in the southern lower peninsula this winter, too, although they do not congregate at feeders as do the entertaining little red-headed birds.

Two Chamber Breakfasts Are Planned

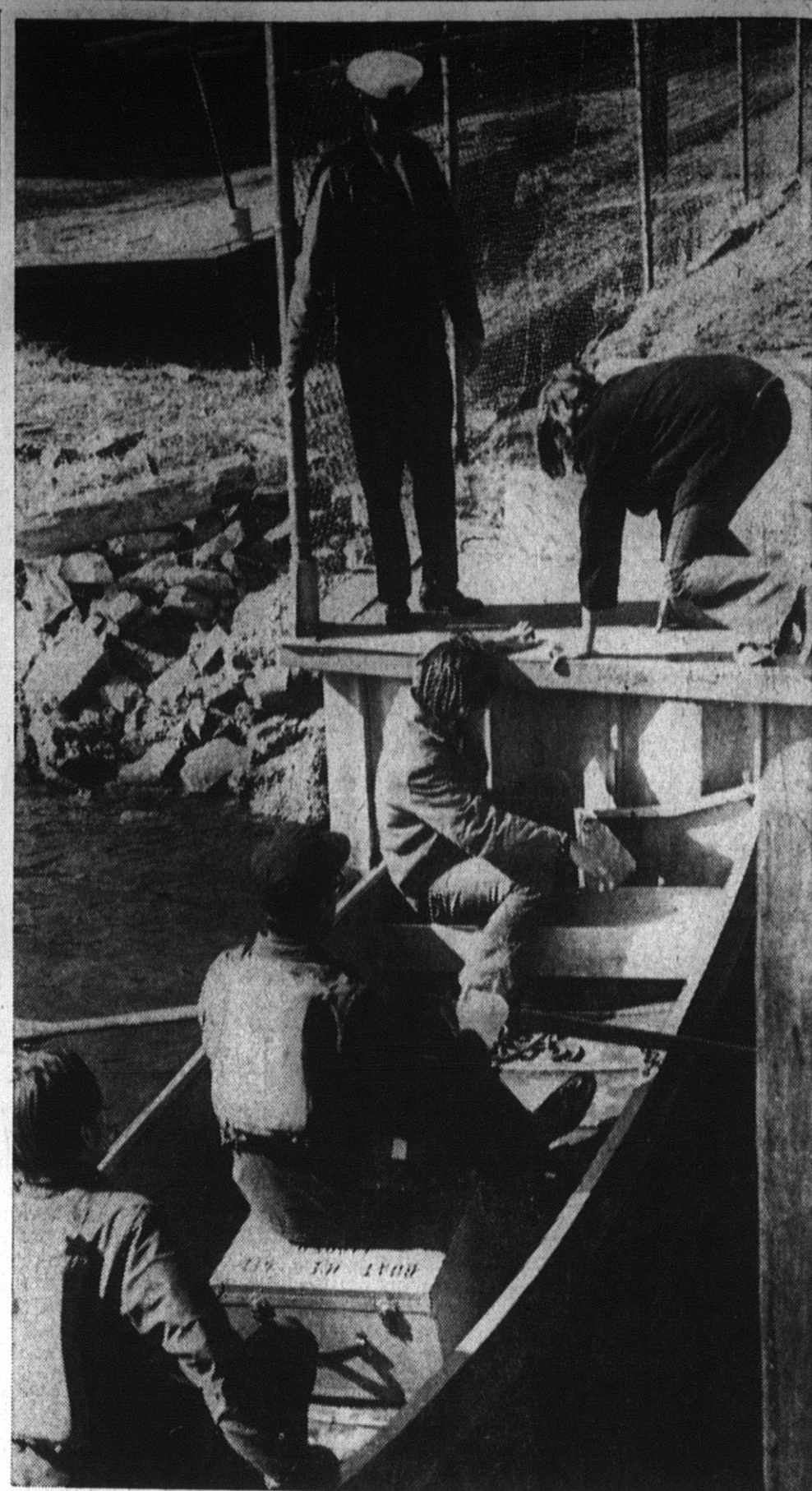

No Injuries Reported In Three-Car Collision

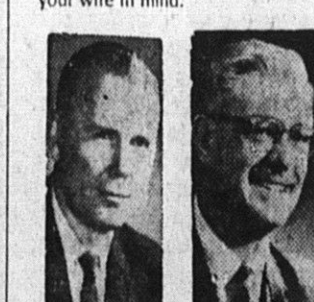
No injuries were reported in a three car chain-reaction collision Saturday at 9:35 p.m. along Eighth St., 158 feet east of College Ave.

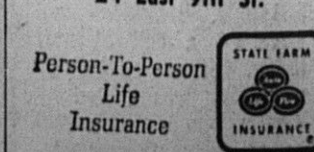
