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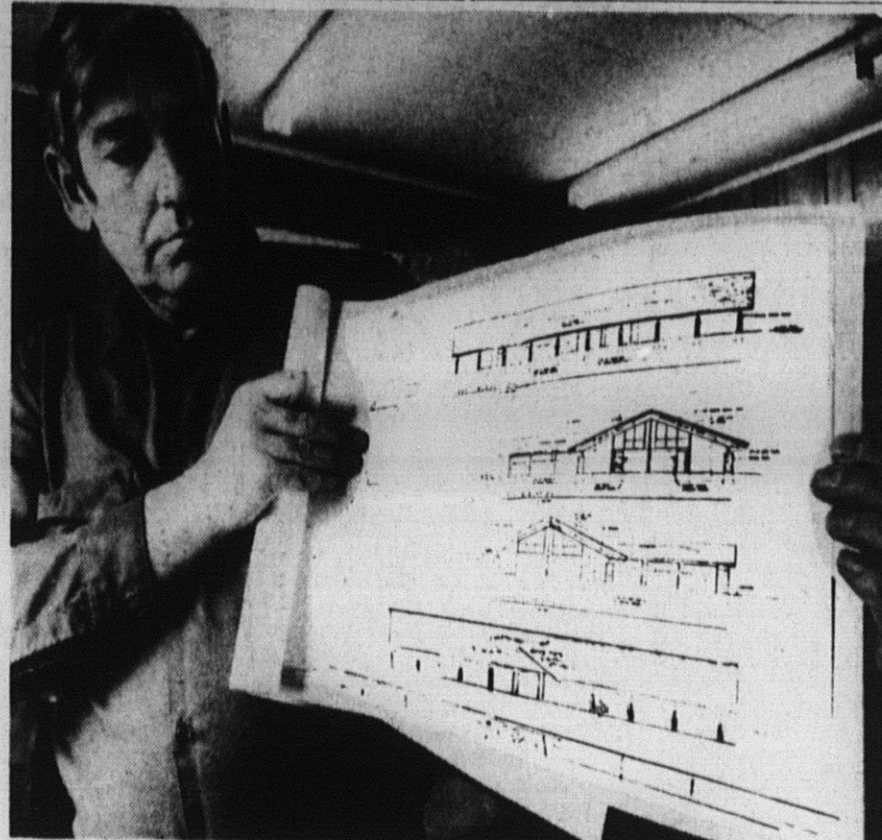

Bathhouse, Concession Building

New Facilities For State Park

Construction of a modern bathhouse and concession stand with a covered picnic area is scheduled to begin this spring at Holland State Park.

Bids for the project, funded by Federal and State governments, were opened Thursday afternoon in Lansing and the apparent low bidder was Sweetman Construction of Holland at \$318,650.

Department of Natural Resources officials said nine bids were received with the highest at \$379,115. Contracts are expected to be awarded within 30 days.

Plans call for the new structure to be built on the site of the present bathhouse and concession building constructed in 1939.

State Park manager Dana Houseworth said the existing building will be razed and temporary concession facilities will be erected in the beach area.

Bathhouse facilities and restrooms will be limited and confined to the existing facilities in the northern regions of the beach park.

The new building will stretch 144 feet north and south with a wing from the eastern side 100 feet long, forming a "T" shaped structure. The existing building was about 144 feet long north and south and only 40 feet wide.

Plans call for the east - west section of the building to be open for picnic uses. The area is 100 feet by 30 feet and metal roll - down doors for wind and rain protection.

Change courts will be located at the north and south ends of the structure and a concession area will be included in the north section off the covered picnic area.

Work is expected to be completed by May 25, 1978, Houseworth said.

Junior High Contracts Net \$1.7 Million

Contracts totaling \$1,789,535 were awarded for Holland's new junior high school at a special meeting of the Holland Board of Education Monday night. With these contracts, 80 per cent of all building contracts have been let, according to representatives of Elzinga and Volkens Construction Management who said bids were well within budget estimates.

Previous awards listed \$204,072 for foundations, etc., and \$158,928 for site development costs. Items yet to be bid are some athletic fields, landscaping, street improvements and equipment.

Board President Charles Bradford presided at the meeting which lasted about 1½ hours.

Pleds Guilty To Benefit Charge

A Grand Haven man pleaded guilty to concealing evidence from the Social Security Administration to gain improper Supplemental Security Income benefits, the social security office announced.

The arrest was part of an ongoing effort by social security to assure proper eligibility for payments.

Lawrence J. Schaidt, Jr., pleaded guilty March 17 before U. S. Magistrate Stephen W. Karr in Grand Rapids. He was charged with failure to report income received from the Veterans Administration and as a result received improper SSI benefits.

The SSI program provides monthly payments to aged, blind or disabled persons with limited income and assets. While SSI beneficiaries are allowed to have limited amounts of income their benefits are reduced proportionately.

Board Approves Seminary Library

Western Theological Seminary was granted permission by the Zoning Board of Appeals Thursday night to construct an eight - story library addition just east of the present library on East 12th St.

A public hearing on height was held last month and the board tabled the application for a month to seek input from the Planning Commission. The new addition will be 80 feet high.

In the only other business Thursday night, the board approved a petition of the Holland Community Hospital Authority to use a building at 604 Maple Ave. for a construction field office, subject to a number of conditions.

Mayor Asks New Talks At Life Savers

Mayor Louis Hallacy has attempted to bring union and management together in the 11-day strike at Life Savers, Inc., and said he and other city personnel have met with local union and management representatives.

Hallacy said both sides were urged to resume contract negotiations at the Holland plant.

Telegrams were sent by Hallacy to Life Savers management in New York and the local union president, encouraging the re-opening of talks.

Hallacy said there appeared to be interest on both sides in resuming active negotiations and offered the use of city facilities as a neutral meeting place.

The mayor said a telegram from Life Savers president William Mack Morris in New York indicated the Holland office has been instructed to resume good faith negotiations at the Union's request and to resume plant operations during the period of contract negotiations, if it is acceptable to the union.

Hallacy urged a joint request for a federal mediator for the resumption of contract talks be issued as soon as practical.

Contract Is Ratified At Heinz

A three - year contract has been ratified by the local H. J. Heinz Co. and local 705, Retail - Wholesale and Department Store Union AFL - CIO. The total package includes wage increases plus semi - annual cost of living increases and additional fringe benefits. James Harper is local union president.

Plant Manager Edward Schierbeek, in restating senior management commitment to the pickle business, said an aggressive marketing plan has been developed to provide Heinz with an even larger share of the total pickle market.

Due to spiraling costs, the Heinz Co. as well as all food industries has had to make some economic adjustments, but Schierbeek said the future looks good.

The local factory is the third largest Heinz USA plant and is the only plant making the complete line of vinegars. It is the largest pickle factory in the world.

Court Sentences Holland Man, 23

GRAND HAVEN — Steven F. Jerome, 23, of 1419 Blue Star Highway, Holland, charged with larceny in connection with a burglary at Mini Store West, 220 West Eighth St., Feb. 14, was sentenced to 18 months to four years in prison Monday by Ottawa Circuit Court Judge Calvin Bosman.

A quantity of beverages and beer was taken and Holland police made the arrest. Jerome was given credit for 41 days served in jail.

John Adams, 23, of 159 Highland, Holland, placed on delayed sentence status Dec. 27, 1976 for breaking and entering, Monday was charged with violation of his status and was placed on two years probation with 26 weeks in jail. He was ordered to pay \$200 in court costs.

Alfred J. Wheat, 23, of 1617 Elmer St., Holland, arrested Nov. 3 and charged with attempting to deliver a controlled substance, was placed on delayed sentence status for one year and ordered to pay \$200 costs.

Kansas Chain Has 17 Other Newspapers

Sentinel Is Sold To Stauffer Inc.

Sale of the Holland Evening Sentinel to Stauffer Publications, Inc., of Topeka, Kan., was announced here today by W. A. Butler, president and publisher of the 17,500 circulation newspaper.

The Sentinel becomes Stauffer Publications' second Michigan daily. The company also has 15 other daily newspapers, five radio stations, a television station and a bi-weekly regional newspaper in seven midwestern states.

The new publisher of the Evening Sentinel will be Donald M. Skoglund, 51. Skoglund is a native of Kewanee, Ill., who was previously with Stauffer Publications as circulation manager and business manager of The Hannibal (Mo.) Courier-Post and for the last five years as general manager of The Arkansas City (Kan.) Daily Traveler.

Stanley H. Stauffer, president of Stauffer Publications, said there would be no other changes in the staff of The Holland Sentinel.

"We are anxious to continue to provide the residents of the Holland area with a well-edited and well-managed daily newspaper," Stauffer said.

"We are gratified that Mr. Butler and his associates have chosen our company to carry on The Sentinel."

Stauffer said he and his associates were extremely impressed with the dynamic growth prospects and the quality of life found in the Holland area. He said the company was very favorably impressed with the combination of industrial development and resort-like living provided by the community.

Butler reported that 100 per cent of the outstanding common stock in the Sentinel Publishing Co. was sold to Stauffer Publications. He declined to report a sales price.

In Michigan, Stauffer Publications owns and operates The Hillsdale Daily News. Largest

of the company's 17 dailies is The Topeka Capital - Journal, published morning, evening and Sunday with a 90,000 daily circulation. Newspapers and broadcasting stations are owned and operated by the company in Missouri, Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa, South Dakota, Oklahoma, Texas and Colorado.

The new Sentinel publisher was country circulation manager of the Kewanee Star-Courier, before moving to Hannibal and Arkansas City.

Skoglund served three years in the South Pacific during World War II. While in Hannibal he was an elder of St. John's Lutheran Church and was president of the church congregation for 12 years.

Skoglund has been president of both the Hannibal and Arkansas City Chambers of Commerce and has been active in activities of the Lions Club, Little League Baseball, American Legion, VFW, Rotary and Salvation Army.

Mr. and Mrs. Skoglund have three children and two grandchildren, all living in Illinois.

Fire Station Bids Opened By City Aides

Bids for Holland's new central fire station at 12th St. and Kollen Park Dr. were opened Thursday in City Hall and the apparent low bidder of seven for general construction was Highland Construction Co. of Holland.

Highland's base bid was \$424,400 and the highest bid was \$469,326, according to city manager Terry L. Hofmeyer.

Apparent low bidder for electrical work was North Shore Electric of Grand Rapids with a base bid of \$42,900 and the apparent low bidder for mechanical work was Warm Friend Contractors of Grand Rapids with a base bid of \$94,055.

Construction was expected to begin within 10 days of contract awards and completed in about six months.

A federal grant of \$577,000 as part of a jobs program is funding the project. Under the grant work is to be started on the project by April 26. The new fire station will replace the aging fire house on Eighth St. in downtown Holland.

Head-On Collision Injures Drivers

ALLENDALE — Two persons were injured in a head-on collision along M-45 east of 42nd Ave., in Allendale township at 12:48 a.m. today.

Ottawa County deputies identified the drivers as James Key, 27, of 15965 88th Ave., Coopersville and Rodger Glass, 22, of 8527 Warner, Allendale. Deputies were not able to say which direction the cars were traveling.

Key suffered possible internal injuries while Glass sustained a hip dislocation and both were taken to St. Mary's hospital in Grand Rapids for treatment.

Deputies said both vehicles were demolished in the collision.

Spends Hour Touring Lake Property

Milliken Visits Seminary Site

SAUGATUCK — Gov. William G. Milliken made a quick, hour-long visit to the St. Augustine Seminary property in Laketon township this morning to study the site proposed for a state prison.

The governor arrived at the Tulip City Airport at 9:15 a.m. and visited the seminary site with aides and personnel from the seminary.

Seminary officials said Milliken and State Rep. Russell Hellman, chairman of the capital outlay committee, and four others toured the site in two cars, visiting the woods and beach area.

Milliken stopped to talk with a resident in the Seminary area, who told the governor she was not happy with the proposed prison site, according to Phil Quade, coordinator of the Prison Action Committee which is opposing the proposal.

Milliken and his party left the airport before noon today. Quade said the governor's office had promised the governor

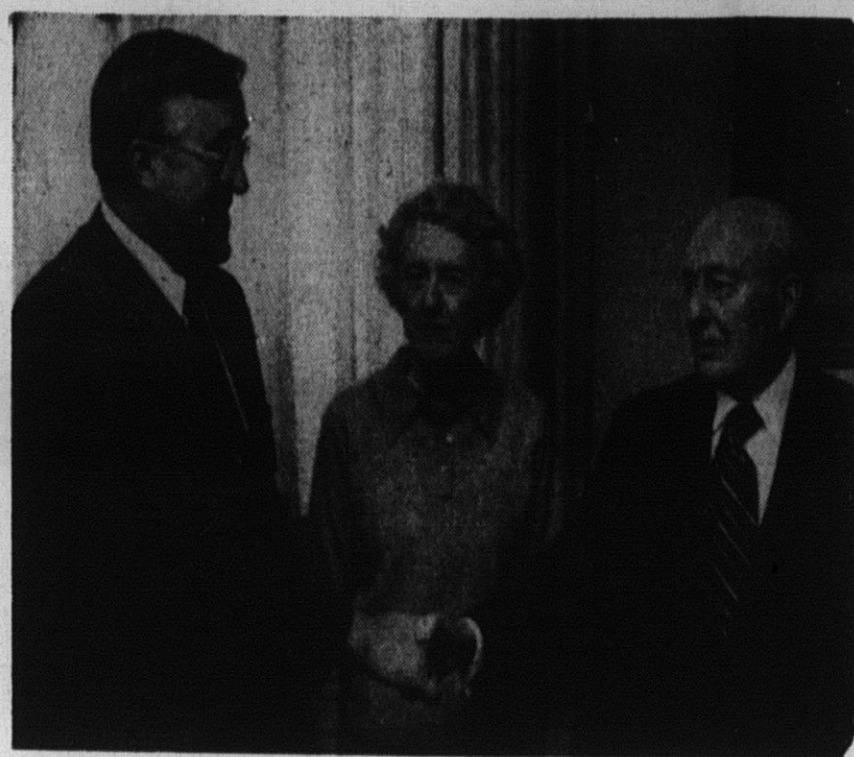
would visit the site before meeting with area governmental officials to discuss the proposed prison.

Dates for the meeting in Lansing were not firm this morning, Quade said.

PAC's lobbyist in Lansing, Don Potter, told Quade that he had been meeting with members of the capital outlay committee and that the committee might have to find more economical ways to cope with the increasing prison population because of demands on the outlay budget.

Quade said PAC was urging the legislature to find temporary or short range solutions like the use of mobile trailers to house prisoners until additional potential prison sites could be located and area hearings conducted.

Quade said PAC was urging use of the Kincheloe Air Force Base in Upper Michigan for both short range and long range uses.

Appreciation Expressed for Years of Cooperation

50-Year Era of Family Newspaper Ends Here

A 50-year chapter in the life of The Holland Evening Sentinel as a family-owned newspaper came to an end today with the sale of the local newspaper to Stauffer Publications Inc. of Topeka, Kan.

But few changes will be evident to Sentinel readers since there will be no changes in staff other than transfer of publisher from W. A. Butler to Donald M. Skoglund who has been general manager of The Arkansas City, Kan., Daily Traveler.

It was Dec. 30, 1927, that The Holland Daily Sentinel was purchased by Charles A. French, Walter Kennedy and Frank Moses. The property at 54-56 West Eighth St. was acquired in April, 1926, for the present building.

In time, the name was changed to The Holland Evening Sentinel produced by the Sentinel Printing Co. which acquired the Holland City News around 1937.

Donald French, son of Editor-Publisher C. A. French, was in the business until his death June 30, 1934. (These were the years when Tulip Time developed into a full-fledged festival.) W. A. Butler came to The Sentinel Aug. 15, 1934.

C. A. French died at 94 Jan. 30, 1948, at which time his heirs became stockholders of the Sentinel Printing Co., namely, Wallace French, Mrs. Marguerite Miller, Randall French, Mrs. J. D. French and Mrs. W. A. Butler. At this time Butler became president of the Sentinel Printing Co.

Company officers today expressed appreciation to the many business and industrial associates for their generous cooperation throughout the years, and to 50 years of loyal subscribers, carriers and many, many dedicated employees who as members of "the family" worked in team production in

turning out a newspaper for family consumption.

"This company has been proud to serve a community where people earn their 'daily bread,' where there are more than 60 churches, a Christian college, a seminary, fine schools of several faiths as well as public schools where heritage is not forgotten."

"We are proud of city government 'of the people, for the people and by the people' which provides parks, schools, electricity, water and protection, a city where citizens are willing to carry responsibility."

"And we are confident the city of Holland will profit and enjoy new excellence with the leadership provided by Stauffer Publications."

Stanley H. Stauffer, president of Stauffer Publications, was here today for the formalizing of the sale, assuring The Sentinel employees of autonomy and continuity of employment.

BPW Plans Studies Of Power Supply

The Holland Board of Public Works Thursday recommended spending up to \$15,000 for two studies involved in participation with others in electrical generation facilities.

One study would look into a joint operation with other municipal power plants in the state as a long range power source while the other study would be with Grand Haven and Zeeland to form a power pool for a short term solution.

In addition to the two possibilities BPW general manager Frank C. Whitney said Holland had a letter of intent with Consumers Power Co. to purchase a portion of their generation facilities.

Whitney said Holland was fortunate in having three possible solutions pointing to such cities as South Haven and Paw Paw who have no local power plant and fact no contracts with other generating firms.

Board member William Vogelzang suggested that the day of Holland going on its own with a power plant was "pretty well ruled out" because of today's economies.

The board also recommended to council \$25,000 for its share of engineering costs involved in the Lake Macatawa water crossing with Park and Laketon townships. The two townships would each pay a similar amount.

The BPW recommended the ordering of an electrical substation for a Holland Community Hospital expansion project on the low bid of \$69,000 but added that should the expansion project not be started the hospital authority would pay any penalty charges for cancelling the order.

Whitney said ten months was necessary for delivery time.

The board recommended a new rate structure for installation of water meters and tap fees which had not been raised in two years. Officials said the cost of materials has gone up.

Graafschap Fire — Graafschap firemen were called to the Graafschap Grocery, 1213 Graafschap Rd., shortly after 7 p.m. Tuesday where a small fire was reported behind the store. Officials said there was no damage to the building and no injuries were reported.

Series of Window Breakings Under Study by Police

A block away, Maurine Mills, 240 West 13th St., said she heard a noise and found four bb holes in a picture window with damage estimated at \$85.

Start Raking Those Yards

Cleanup Week coincides with spring vacation in Holland next week.

Actually, it starts Friday, April 1. That's the signal for raking leaves into the curb in front of your homes.

Cleanup Week (this year April 1-18) is for lawn rakings, shrub trimmings and windblown twigs, according to Acting City Engineer Gordon Hedinga.

Some pickups will be made next week but the main effort will begin Monday, April 11. All debris must be raked to the curb not later than April 18.

Hedinga emphasized Cleanup Week is for clearing yards only. The pickup does not extend to trash, garbage or large tree limbs.

Placing material into the streets may be done only during spring Cleanup Week or the leaf pickup program in the fall. Litter of this type at all other times is a violation of the city ordinance.

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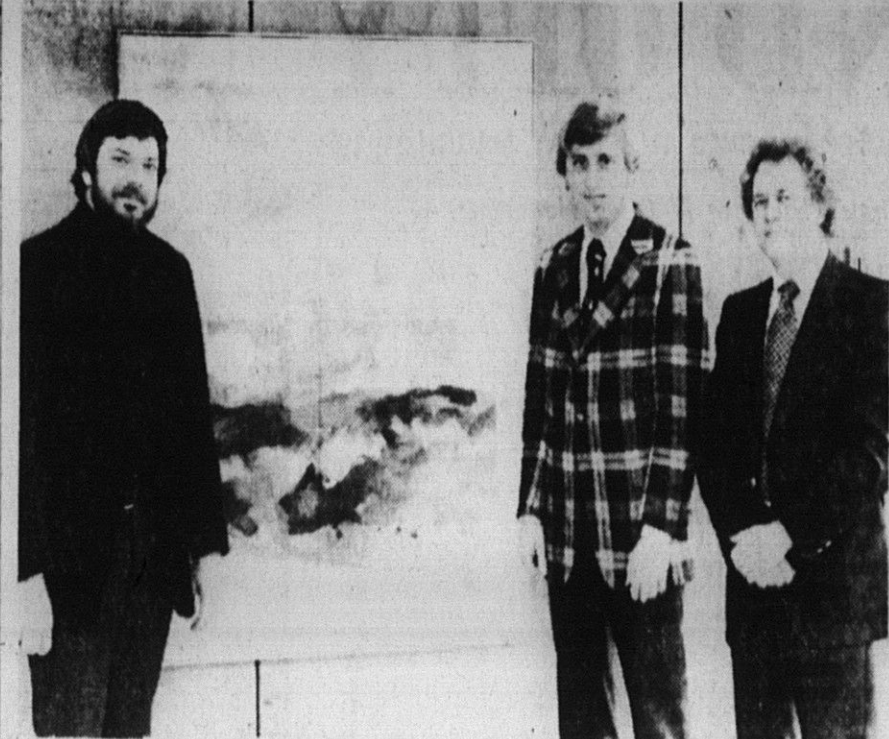

Artist's Works Donated For Art Museum's Event

Two paintings by local artist Delbert Michel will be included in the Grand Rapids Art Museum's annual Springfest Auction on May 20.

Two local firms, Donnelly Mirrors, Inc., and Point West, Inc., have purchased the paintings and are donating them to the Grand Rapids Museum in support of its annual fund drive.

Purpose of the auction is to raise \$25,000 for capital improvements and special projects at the museum and to assist the museum in its growth as an art center for all of Western Michigan.

Arlyn Lanting, president of Donnelly Mirrors, and Richard Den Uyl, president of Point West, are among industry leaders who have joined the effort to involve all of Western Michigan in development and enjoyment of the Grand Rapids Art Museum.

Although the auction is an annual affair, this is the first time business-sponsored acquisitions are included. Western Michigan artists will be featured, and their works will be displayed for prospective buyers beginning April 18 at the museum. Absentee bids will be accepted before auction night, when there will be both silent and live auction procedures.

Artist Michel, whose works have been exhibited in 15 states and abroad, is chairman of the Hope College art department. His works for the auction,

"Cope on the Southdowns" and "Yellow Landscape," may be viewed by local residents in Hope's Van Zoeren Library until April 18, when they will be transferred to the Grand Rapids Art Museum.

Michel's work is well-known here. He is a painter whose artistic concepts involve images, color and atmosphere from his natural environment. He uses primarily acrylic on unprimed canvas, combining spatial illusion and surface richness. "Yellow Landscapes" he describes as an exploration of the abstract qualities he perceives in his environment and an attempt to convey the "complexity of landscape space by contrasting softened atmospheric effects with the precise rectangular shape in the center and vaguely illusionistic qualities."

A "love affair" with the English countryside inspired the pencil drawing, "Cope on the Southdowns." Michel lived in England for a year and a half and this drawing is a small woods on the hillside in Hampshire county in south England. Fragmenting of the landscape in the drawing, he says, is possibly his "unconscious way of taking a chunk of this beautiful landscape with me."

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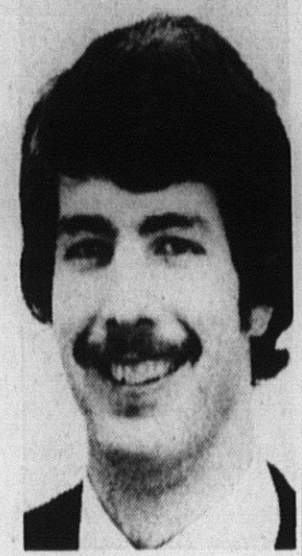
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Name Afman Dutchmen Jayvee Coach

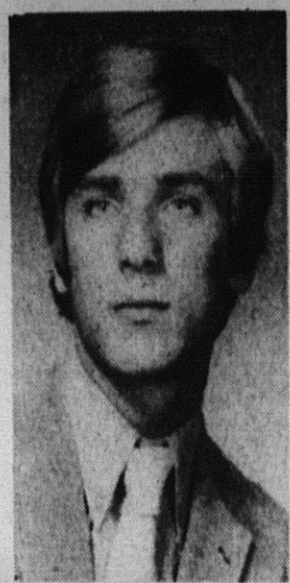
State police identified the victim as Rex Allen McDonald. Troopers said he was wearing dark clothing and was standing in a poorly lighted area when he was hit.

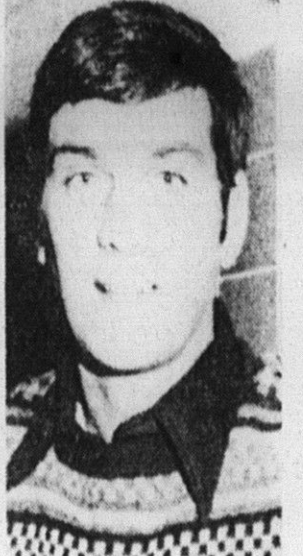

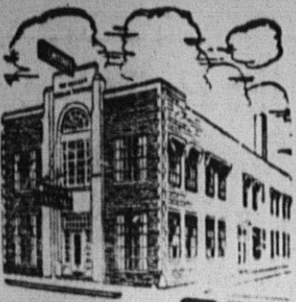

Latino College Night Reflects Pride, Hope

It was a typical high school college night.

Speakers stressed the importance of applying to the college of one's choice early; the importance of meeting deadlines for grant and scholarship applications; the necessity of providing Parents Confidential Statements on finances available to the college-bound student.

But there was a great difference. Two languages, English and Spanish, were used by the speakers and by the audience and many of the speakers were just one generation removed from the migrant stream. Many of the students in the audience were the first in their families to complete high school, let alone aspire to a college degree.

The occasion was the fifth Latino College Night Thursday in Lincoln School, with six graduating high school seniors present, many more juniors and sophomores, some ninth graders and several parents.

The air was festive, full of hope and pride in the achievements of parents and students alike. Dr. Ray Padilla, Latino education coordinator for the Michigan Department of Education, the first speaker, stressed the pride, which has spurred a statewide Latino convocation in Lansing on June 19, to honor graduating seniors and their parents.

Padilla, who recalled picking pickles with his family in Borculo, also stated that Latino college graduates will be invited to the convocation and encouraged parents to bring the younger brothers and sisters of their graduates to the event, so that they may be inspired to consider college, too.

Juanita Sanchez, of Grand Valley State College, encouraged students to apply for admission to college early, which was echoed by Armando Tena of Western Michigan University, who gave advice on financial aid, reiterating the availability of grants and loans and work-study programs, particularly for children of migrant workers.

While proud and hopeful, none of the adult speakers, nor the college students who recounted their experiences, discounted the hard work and dedication necessary for any student to complete college, but especially minority students.

Their reiterated theme was, "It's difficult, but not impossible, and it is worth it, after all."

The speakers were introduced by Dan Uribe, coordinator for Latino College Night and by Augustine Torres, co-chairman of Parents for Bilingual Education, one of the sponsors of the program, along with the Holland High Latino Club, the E. E. Fell Chicano Club, as well as Hope College's Upward Bound program.

Following the talks in Spanish and English and many questions from the floor, the par-

ents and students attending were able to speak with representatives of the state's universities and colleges, present to answer specific questions about their schools.

In conversation before the program began, Tom Carey Holland High counselor, stated that when the Latino College Nights were instituted, only a very few Latino high school graduates were considering college, but each year has brought out more interested students and parents, and a corresponding increase in the number of Latinos who enter college.

He also observed that the year that the program was coordinated with the regular Holland High College Night, not many parents attended, probably because of language difficulties, so the separate Latino program was restored.

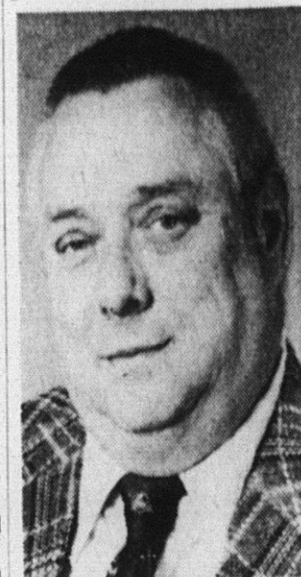

Wayne Tanis, the excellent Hamilton mentor, was the runaway winner in this year's selection.

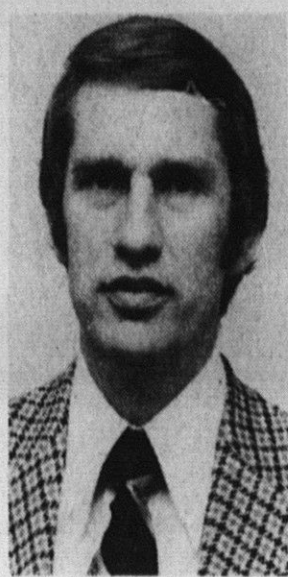
Tanis directed the Hawkeyes to a final season 15-3 record. Hamilton was the lone high school team to cap the regular season over .500.

The Dutchmen, who routed

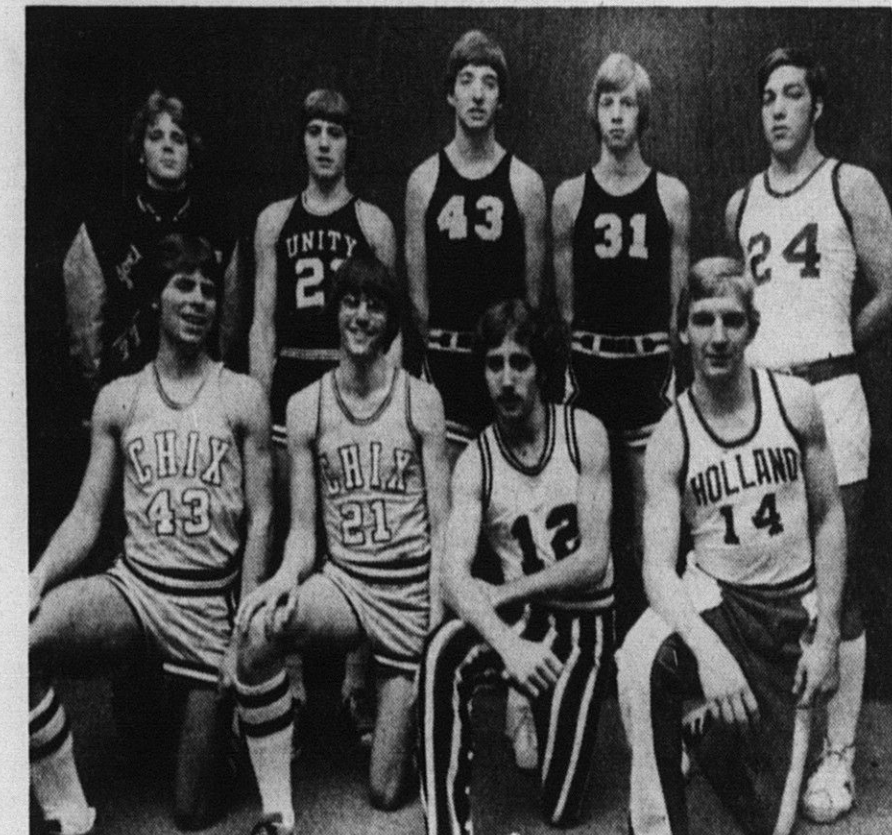
