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Charter Plan Gains Okay In Zeeland

Annexation Loses; 3 Incumbents Win, One Loses Second Term Bid

ZEELAND — Three incumbents won re-election, and one was defeated in the city elections Monday. The city also approved a charter revision proposal.

The annexation proposal was defeated in the annexation area of Holland Township by 11 votes. To pass, the annexation proposal must be approved by both the city and the annexation area. The city had approved annexation.

Mayor Frank Hoogland who was unopposed was re-elected, as were Councilman Glenn Bouwens and Supervisor Willard Claver. The other council seat went to Kenneth Folkertsma. Howard Stephenson, an incumbent, lost in his bid for a second term on the council.

Theodore Vanden Brink polled the highest write-in vote for the office of treasurer. It was not known whether he would accept the post as he is presently out of town.

The job of revising Zeeland's charter will be done by a nine-member charter revision commission which was also elected Monday.

The nine persons receiving the most votes for the commission were (in order) Randall Dekker, Louis Mannes, Clio Huizenga, William Vanden Bosch, Kenneth Folkertsma, Vernon Lokers, Kenneth De Jonge, George Allen and Alvie Millard.

Folkertsma who was elected to both the council and the charter revision commission will not be allowed to fill both posts. Folkertsma led all candidates for council with 455 votes. Bouwens polled 415 while Stephenson received 385, and a fourth candidate, Frank De Young got 347.

In the supervisor race, Claver received 487 votes to 297 for Bert H. Brouwer.

Theodore Vanden Brink got 192 write-in votes for treasurer. Frances Walters received 131, and Gordon Kornoeje got 26. Several other persons received a scattering of write-in votes.

Mayor Frank Hoogland received 766 votes.

The charter revision proposal passed 437 to 147, and the annexation proposal was approved 395 to 79. The vote on the annexation proposal in the area of Holland Township was 187 against 176 in favor.

Other candidates for the charter revision commission in order of finish were Laura Ver Plank, Corey Van Koeveering, Steven Kroll, Paul Van Koeveering, Frances Walters, Rena De Jonge and Sallie Van Harn.

Master Plan For Airport Authorized

By a vote of 8 to 1, City Council Wednesday night approved a proposal from Black and Veatch, consulting engineers, for a detailed airport master plan, as a cost not to exceed \$7,500, shared equally by the city and the Michigan Department of Aeronautics. Councilman Eugene Vande Vusse dissented.

City Manager Herb Holt said the first study was a feasibility study resulting in information that an airport was feasible for Holland and suggesting five or six sites. Another study by the Michigan Department of Aeronautics centralized on the sites and selected one in the southern section of the city in the vicinity of the existing Tulip City Airport.

The proposed study by Black and Veatch will result in a detailed master plan for the selected site. Holt explained this step is necessary if an airport is to be constructed with 75 per cent provided by federal funds and 25 per cent by local funds.

Retirement Board Will Meet Here

The quarterly meeting of the board of the Michigan Municipal Employees' Retirement System will be held in Holland this weekend, coinciding with the dedication of Windmill De Zwaan.

City Auditor John W. Fonger, who is serving his seventh year on the board and his third term as chairman, has arranged for members to attend the convocation in Dimment Memorial Chapel Saturday morning when Prince Bernhard of the Netherlands will deliver an address on "International Understanding: Individual Responsibility."

Board meetings will start at 10 a.m. Friday in Council Chambers in City Hall, and continue in the afternoon.

The retirement system was established in 1946 with 14 participating municipalities of which Holland was one. Membership now embraces 136 participating municipalities with a membership of approximately 10,500. Besides active members, there are approximately 1,800 retired members presently receiving retirement payments.

The board is charged with the responsibility of administering a system with assets in excess of \$40 million. Besides Fonger, board members are Emil F. City Council Okays Items On Windmill

City Council approved several recommendations in connection with operations of Windmill Island at its regular meeting Wednesday night.

One recommendation involved change orders in contracts with Meyer Construction Co. for an added cost of \$3,860.16. Changes cover draining and pumping, changing crushed stone to bituminous paving on dikes, constructing dike around rim of island, and constructing meter pit for water service.

Several communications also were presented on Sunday operations expressing varying opinions. The communications were all placed on file with no action taken.

Communications came from the Classis of Holland, Reformed Church in America, expressing the hope that the city would not engage in commercial practices on Sunday; from Harderwijk Christian Reformed Church coupled with petitions that Windmill Island be free from business transactions on Sunday; from the consistory of Pine Creek Christian Reformed Church opposing commercial operations on Sunday; from Calvary Christian Reformed Church, indicating no objection to visiting gardens on Sunday if admission were free; and from Charles Lantay, which was a copy of a letter which previously appeared in the Sentinel.

Council approved an agreement between the city and the LaCer Ceramic Products Co. of Grand Rapids whereby the company is given the right to reproduce the official Windmill Island design on four-inch and six-inch ceramic tiles, together with the certification mark, for 6 per cent of net sales. The agreement was prepared by Lloyd Heneveld, Grand Rapids patent attorney, and was reviewed by the city attorney and the Windmill Committee.

Council also approved an agreement with Alvin D. Bos Co. of Holland for automatic vending services of snacks and beverages at Windmill Island. The Bos proposal and proposals from three other companies were analyzed by Windmill Island Manager Jerry Fairbanks, Environmental Health Director Sam Stephenson and the Windmill Committee.

A report by the city manager on selling city-owned property on the northwest corner of Sixth St. and College Ave. was tabled until City Council meets with the Planning Commission.

Following a public hearing, Council granted permission to Overisel Lumber Co. to construct office buildings and lumber storage at 573 East 32nd St., provided the walls between office and mill are constructed with materials that would give a two-hour fire rating.

Council also gave further consideration to a previously tabled application from Scotts Inc. for a variance from requirements of the fire district ordinance, and granted permission on condition that new plans are approved by the building inspector. The report referred to a letter from the fire marshal's division which said policies would prohibit approval of any construction or situation prohibited by a local code or ordinance not in conflict with any state law or regulation.

A letter also was read from the Grand Valley chapter of the American Institute of Architects commending the building inspector and public officials in carrying out their legal responsibilities of enforcement of their building codes.

A petition requesting water service in Heather Dr. from Black Bass Ave. to Old Orchard Rd. was referred to the city manager.

A letter from the State Highway Department called attention to a public hearing today at 8 p.m. in Zeeland High School gymnasium to explain the proposed location for Interstate route 196 in Kent, Ottawa and Allegan counties.

A communication from the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers called attention to a request of Michigan Bell Telephone Co. to lay a proposed submarine cable across Lake Macatawa from West End Dr. to Waukau Park. Objections must be filed by 4:30 p.m. on May 3.

Council granted permission to Hamilton High School Band to solicit funds April 24 in various business districts so that the band may play at the World's Fair.

Petitions bearing 69 signatures requesting that new double-lane bridges be installed to replace those on Country Club Rd. between 16th and 24th Sts., and on 24th St. between Waverly Rd. and Country Club Rd., was referred to the city manager for study and report. The communication said signers considered present bridges inadequate and hazardous.

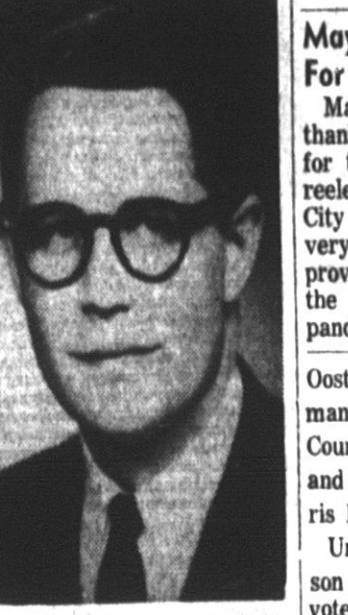

54.3 Per Cent of City Residents Vote; Bosman And Galien Unopposed

All incumbents were returned to office in Monday's city election which attracted a total of 6,535 votes or 54.3 per cent of the total registration of 12,002.

Incumbents re-elected were Councilman-at-large Donald D.

Mayor Thanks Residents For Confidence Vote

Mayor Nelson Bosman today thanked the voters of Holland for their vote of confidence in reelecting present members of City Council and said he was very pleased that voters had approved the sewer bonds, giving the city an opportunity to expand and grow.

Oosterbaan, 1st Ward Councilman Bertal H. Slagh, 3rd Ward Councilman Hollis H. Clark Jr. and 5th Ward Councilman Morris Peerbolt.

Unopposed were Mayor Nelson Bosman who received 5,788 votes and Municipal Judge John Galien Jr. who received 5,865 votes.

Passing by a fairly comfortable margin was the \$1.9 million bond issue to extend and improve Holland's sanitary sewer system by installing interceptor sewers to the Holland Heights area, the southeast section and the Lakeview - South Shore Dr. area.

This vote was 3,493 to 1,809, or 65.88 per cent of the vote cast. According to state law, a 60 per cent plurality was necessary for passage.

In the race for associate municipal judge, which listed no candidates, Gerald J. Van Wyke, present associate municipal judge, received 43 write-in votes and Walter Roper received 22 votes.

Vote in the four councilman races follows:

Councilman-at-large — Donald Oosterbaan, 3,664; Donald E. Stoltz, 2,725.

Councilman, 1st ward — Bertal H. Slagh, 3,221; Norman J. Artz, 3,070.

Councilman, 3rd ward — Hollis H. Clark Jr., 3,364; William De Mols, 2,919.

Councilman, 5th ward — Morris Peerbolt, 3,253; Harold L. Michelson, 2,938.

Two precincts in the 5th ward (that part of the city that lies in Allegan county) voted down the two Allegan county propositions for a new medical facility. On the question of increasing the millage, the two precincts voted 239 yes and 421 no, and on the question of establishing a sinking fund, the vote was 242 yes and 418 no. County-wide, both propositions passed by a 2 to 1 majority.

City Clerk D. W. Schipper's office was a busy place Monday night as precinct election board chairmen called in the results. First precinct to report was ward 4-2 at 8:10 p.m. The last of the city's 14 precincts reported at 8:50 p.m.

At the spring election in 1963, total vote cast in Holland city was 6,945 or 57.2 per cent of the registered vote of 12,129. At that time, Henry Steffens and Richard W. Smith were reelected councilmen and John Van Eerden and Eugene Vande Vusse were elected. The latter two replaced William De Haan and John Beltman who did not seek reelection. Mayor Nelson Bosman was reelected without opposition. The 1963 ballot also had a state election including a vote on the new constitution.

All councilman terms are four years. The mayor's term is two years and the municipal judge's six years.

The mayor and four councilmen reelected Monday will take their oath at a special organizational meeting Monday, April 12. Shortly thereafter, Council will begin study at a series of informal meetings on the 1965-66 budget. Terms of the municipal judge and associate municipal judge start Jan. 1, 1966. See election chart on page 6.

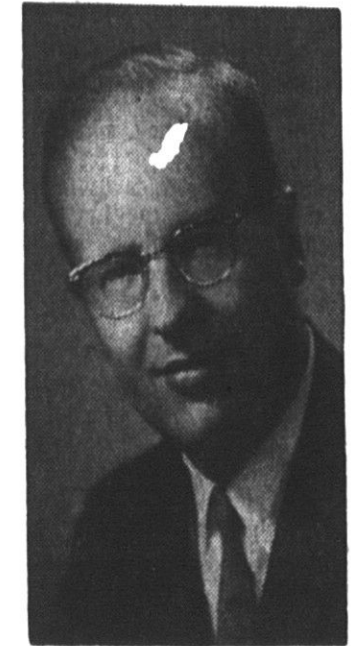
Views From The Campus

An athletic trophy, laurel wreath, and knighting ceremony were among the plaudits awaiting Dr. Arthur H. Jentz of Hope College's Religion and Bible and Philosophy departments as he returned to the college with his newly earned doctoral degree last month.

Dr. Jentz's thesis, "Ethics in the Making: the Genesis and Nature of Ethical theory in the philosophy of Alfred North Whitehead," was presented to a committee at Columbia University, New York, which granted the Doctor of Philosophy degree.

A 1956 Hope College graduate, summa cum laude, Dr. Jentz earned a Bachelor of Divinity degree from New Brunswick Theological Seminary, New York. In 1962 he joined the (An athletic trophy, laurel Hope College faculty. —Editor's note.)

In the broadest sense, education may be regarded as the

whole experience of human life itself.

Perhaps it is refreshing to regard education in that way, for by doing we do not identify education with schools, studies, lessons, the mastery of skills. College students, for example, are quick to point out that college should involve more than "book learning."

They are right in saying this, for we do become educated through the whole variety of experiences and relationships in which we participate. Surely it would be misguided, even tragic, to regard education as merely the accumulation of data and the acquiring of skills. These ideals may be realized in the work of computers and robots; they do not begin to describe the variety of experience and expression possible for human life at its best.

Yet to appeal so broadly to "varied experience," to the ideal of the "well-rounded man," is also likely to deprive human life of its cutting edge. The mere variety of experience may amount to nothing more than an accumulation of trivia.

Education must include variety of experience, and yet point us beyond that accumulation of experience toward precision and depth of understanding. True education is formal and precise as well as varied and practical. The trick of human life is a right combination of the formal with the practical features of our experience.

We are rightly skeptical of the wholly "theoretical" man, divorced, as we say, from the facts of life. On the other hand, what understanding can we have of those brute facts apart from critical analysis of them? We need to "make sense" of our world: that is the task of human life.

These are the relevant considerations, I believe, in assessing the nature and aims of the work involved in achieving the Doctor of Philosophy degree. To be significant, that work must involve a broad acquaintance with the data and the history of thought relevant to the student's field of specialization, and also a move toward precision.

All of this is done not merely with the aim of becoming more fully acquainted with the past, so that one knows "who said what" (which information is appropriately relegated to quiz shows), but with a drive toward creativity, toward insight, toward saying something new.

The way to true education is not easy. Tools are necessary: languages, libraries, techniques. Certifying examinations and examinations in one's particular field must be passed. When course work is completed, language and other examinations are passed, there remains the chief project of producing a doctoral dissertation capable of defense before a committee of scholars.

The procedures of research constitute a solitary endeavor little understood or appreciated by one's friends or family. Why do it, anyway? Prestige? Job promotions? Perhaps. But also there is the aim toward achievement, understanding, vision — and toward a product which will embody something worth commending to others. Ideally, the emergent work will be the expression of education, of exper-

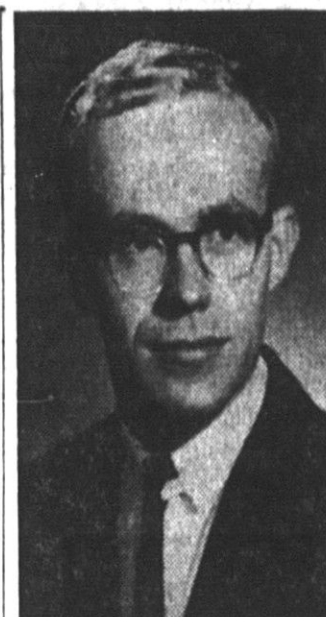

Conservation Practices Being Studied

Cooperators of the West Ottawa Soil Conservation District are planning for another outstanding year in the application of conservation practices. Recently, the Soil Conservation Service technicians of the Grand Haven Work Unit have been attending all of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service sign up meetings in the different townships of the county. This has given them an opportunity to work with part-time farmers and other farmers who work during the day.

It is important to plan and apply the conservation practices that are needed on each individual farm. Proper timing is very important. Tree and wildlife shrub plantings should be done as soon as the frost leaves the ground in the spring. The drainage and field and contour strip-cropping can be installed before the planting of corn if proper arrangements are made.

Hayland and pasture seedlings can be established in the early spring. Irrigation and wildlife ponds can be constructed in July and August when the water table is lower. Grass waterways can be shaped and seeded in early spring or in August and the first part of September. Cover crops should be sown at the time of last cultivation of corn for grain or after corn silage has been harvested. Another period of tiling occurs on cropland in the fall after the crops are harvested.

John Klein, Polkton Township, will finish installing 70 acres of field strip cropping early this spring. Cal Leestma, Zeeland Township, plans to plant 1,100 feet of Norway spruce as a two-row field windbreak and about 500 white pine as an underplanting in an existing woodlot. Jack Oback, Jamestown Township, plans to install a wildlife pond for fish and ducks. Roger Hop, Jamestown Township, plans to install field strip-cropping and an erosion control structure.

Franklin Reister, and Raymond Dietrich, Chester Township, will be seeding a cover crop in their orchards to control soil erosion. Erwin Miller, Wright Township, will shape and seed a grass waterway and install the tile drainage this year.

Murry Clayton, Wright Township, plans to dig an open drainage ditch and install tile. Cornelius Rynsbarger, Blendon Township, will install several hundred feet of shallow field drainage ditches and wildlife pond. Wayne Quigley, Tallmadge Township, will make a wildlife shrub planting on his 13 acres. William Kennedy and Sons, Allendale Township, will make a birdfoot trefoil seeding in the spring to improve their permanent pasture next to the Grand River.

Farmers in the West Ottawa Soil Conservation District are on the move in planning and applying the needed conservation on their farms. Now is the time to get in touch with the Soil Conservation Service personnel at Grand Haven, who will be most happy to work with you in solving your soil and water conservation problems.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, April 11
The Crucifixion
Matthew 27:33-50
By C. P. Dame

"Who Killed Jesus?"—these words appearing on a church bulletin board caught my attention. Every year during Lent that question is asked and no doubt answered variously. Our lesson text gives the answer.

I. The gospels give much space to the death of Jesus. There is a reason for this. The Bible teaches that Jesus came to this earth to solve the sin problem and that is why He died on the cross. The Jewish leaders plotted the death of Jesus. Gentiles, soldiers of Rome, nailed Him to the cross. Before the soldiers crucified Jesus they mocked Him. It was the custom for the criminal who was sentenced to be crucified that he carry his own cross through the streets to the place of crucifixion. This Jesus did. The procession reached "a place called Golgotha that is to say, a place of a skull." Golgotha is the Aramaic word Calvary the Latin. The exact place is today unknown.

Some women of Jerusalem had formed the habit of giving a drug to the criminals to soften their suffering. Jesus refused to drink it for he wanted to suffer for our sins with a clear mind. It was the custom of the soldiers to divide the clothes of the crucified man among themselves. Every Jew wore five articles of clothes.

There were four soldiers—they cast lots for the one seamless robe and thus fulfilled the prophecy found in Psalm 22:18.

Above the head of Jesus was a placard, written in three languages, Hebrew, Greek and Roman, saying, "This is Jesus, the King of the Jews." Today millions acknowledge him as their king. Jesus hung between two thieves. At first both mocked him but one was converted. In life and in death Jesus was with sinners.

II. Churchmen most loudly mocked Jesus. "And they that passed by reviled him, wagging their heads."

They showed scorn. "Likewise also the chief priests, mocking him, with the scribes, and elders said, He saved others, himself he cannot save." These mockers were church leaders. They confessed that Jesus had saved others. They did not realize that it was because Jesus wanted to save others, therefore He did not save Himself. The Lord's accusers attacked His claims. They demanded a sign of His Sonship. "If thou be the Son of God, come down from the cross." They also belittled His relationship with God. "He trusted in God, let Him deliver him now." Today some people still mock and scorn Jesus.

III. Jesus died with and for sinners. From twelve to three, Jesus hung on the cross. During this time darkness covered the earth. The cry, "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" Tells us that Jesus suffered the pangs of hell—namely to be forsaken of God. One unknown soldier took a sponge and filled it with vinegar and put it on a reed and offered it to Jesus. This was not the drugged wine. Jesus took this gift. Jesus died voluntarily as the words, "yielded up the ghost" and the words, "Father, into thy hands I commit my spirit" indicate. By His death He fulfilled His mission.

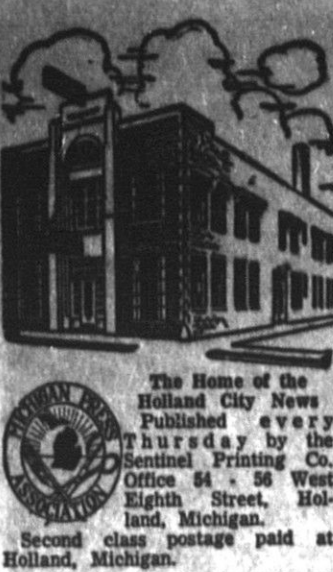

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SAFETY STANDARDS

If ever American automobiles are to be engineered for more safety, governmental pressure may be necessary. Manufacturers understandingly engineer their products for comfort and eye-appeal. The government wants certain safety factors built into its vehicles and is said to include such specifications in its orders for cars. Perhaps the car makers will see their way clear, in the near future, to incorporate these features into all its products.

Another example of governmental pressure became apparent recently when Senator Gaylord Nelson of Wisconsin suggested that the government publish the findings of the Federal Trade Commission which resulted from an investigation of tire manufacturers and marketing.

Senator Nelson believes that there is a tire scandal. As he sees it, there are no fixed standards for tire safety and there is no relation between the price and quality of a tire. This could leave the consumer at the mercy of the manufacturer and retailer. He in most cases has no way of judging.

Furthermore, says the Senator, tires are inadequately tested so that neither the manufacturer nor the buyer can really know the quality of the tires with which a new car is equipped.

Certainly the statistics of automobile fatalities and the amount of money that Americans pour into automotive transportation should cause manufacturers to pay closer attention to the safety factors of their product.

The lives they save may be their own.

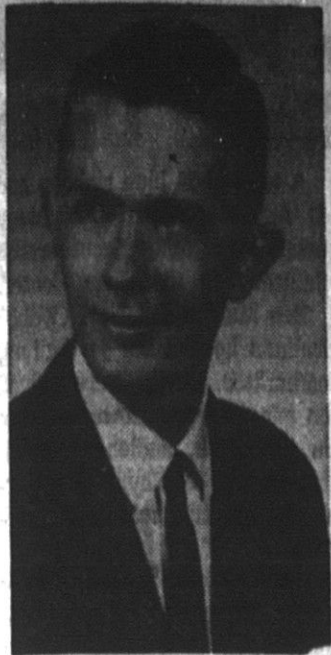

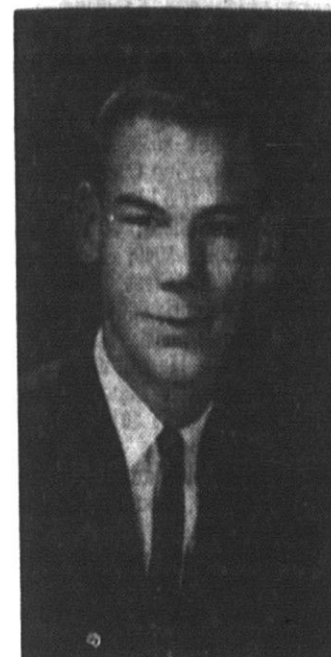

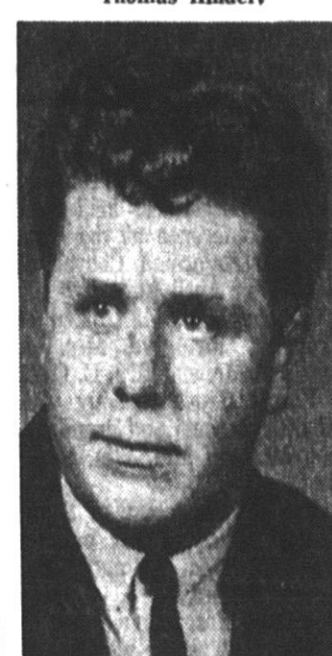

Ottawa County Farm News

We were interested in reviewing the 1964 DHR directory and noticing some of the DHR production records that we can be really proud of. Under the individual cow classes there were some outstanding records made by Ottawa County farmers. In the senior two-year old class, Henry Baker's Star Summit, with a production record of 16,348 pounds milk and 594 pounds fat; this cow was also designated as Michigan Production Leader which lists three all-time high records for senior two-year olds. Two of these records were made in 1964.

In the junior three-year old class, Gordon Schreur had Shadyvale Katydid, production of 18,565 pounds milk and 662 pounds fat. In the senior three-year old class, Roger Holmes' Colorview Madge Bold produced 20,508 pounds milk and 735 pounds fat; four-year old class, Gordon Schreur's Shadyvale Bella Francis had 19,278 pounds milk and 796 pounds fat, and Henry Baker's Bella Vista Roburke Ellen with a production record of 19,639 pounds milk and 765 pounds fat. Congratulations to these people.

In last week's column we mentioned a new course which is being planned by the Michigan State University Short Course Department in Soil Science. We would like to mention now two 2-year Short Courses offered by the Horticulture Department. These are designed for those who are not planning on taking four years of college, but who are interested in being rather proficient in specific fields. The two horticulture courses are Commercial Floriculture and Nursery and Landscape Management. Word from the Horticulture Department is that there are many requests for graduates from these courses and there is no fear of not being able to find a job after completion of the courses. The courses consist of both class room work and on the job training.

A new \$250 scholarship for students transferring from Michigan Community Junior Colleges to the Michigan State University College of Agriculture was announced this week.

Dr. Richard Swenson, director of resident instruction for the Michigan State University College of Agriculture, reported that 44 per cent of the agriculture graduates were transfer students during the 1963-64 school year. The new scholarship is provided by the Michigan Farm Bureau.

Students interested in applying for the scholarship should make out a regular Michigan State University admissions application and letter indicating interest in the scholarship to Dr. Swenson at 121 Agricultural Hall, Michigan State University, East Lansing, Michigan. Dead-

line for applications is April 15.

The feeding value of haylage properly stored in cement silos is approximately equal to that which is stored in air-tight silos.

With the material fed from the cement silo is slightly dried which may indicate a slight nutritive loss.

With the two types of silos producing haylage about equal in feed value, the farmer has to rely on the other factors to decide which structure is best for his particular operation. He has to consider cost, management, use and flexibility of the two silos.

Haylage cannot compete with corn as an energy producer on pound-per-pound basis. Haylage, with its relatively high protein content, might well be worked into a feeding program to complement corn silage, rather than feeding one instead of the other.

Farmers who use haylage alone will have to add supplemental grain to make up for the relatively low energy value of haylage as compared to corn silage. It is difficult to compare haylage with corn on an acre basis. Corn silage is far ahead because its total energy yield is greater.

The new Beef Cattle Research Center, recently constructed on the Michigan State University campus, will help scientists make further studies of the merits of haylage under varying conditions.

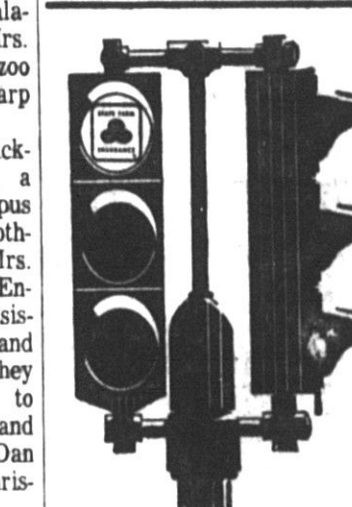

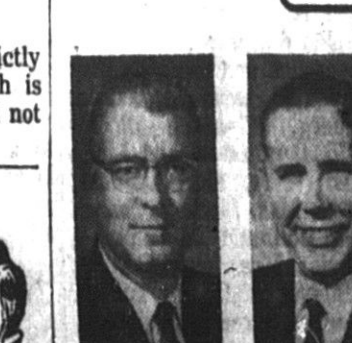


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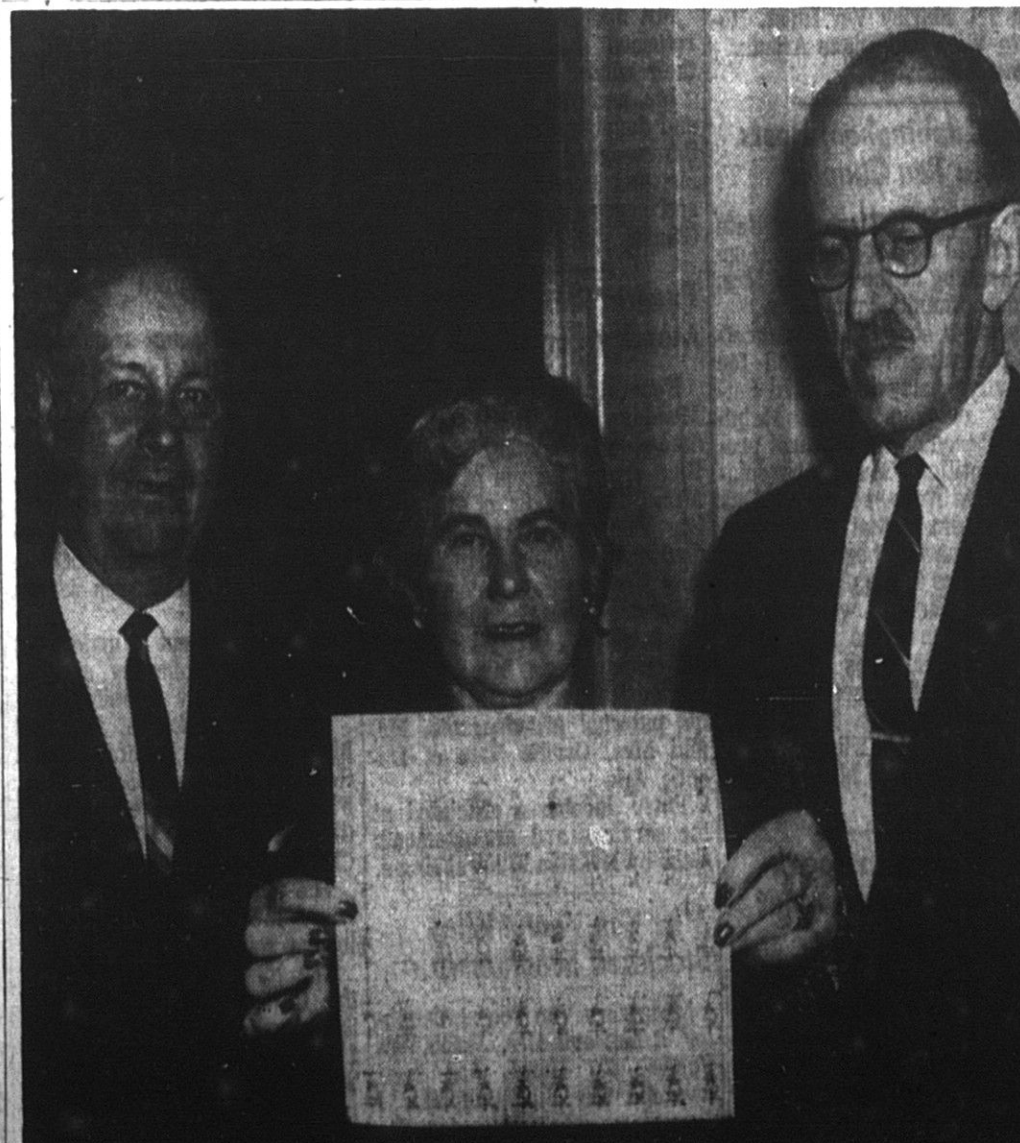

Snowfall Exceeds 100 Inches Here

Snowfall during the month of March in Holland totaled 29.4 inches bringing the season's total so far to 106.8 inches, according to weather statistics compiled by Lynn P. Wheaton.

The 29.4 total was .1 inch less than the 29.5 total of February. Identical totals of 21.2 inches for both January and December and 5.5 inches for November round out the total to 106.8 inches. The season's total will be boosted further by the April 1 snow-storm.

Greatest depth of snow was 11 inches March 23, three days after spring arrived officially. A more vicious storm with less snow lashed the area on St. Patrick's day March 17, resulting in closing many schools and cancelling many meetings. The ground was covered with snow continuously from March 16.

Average temperature for the month was 27 or 8.4 degrees below normal. Precipitation measured 2.67 inches or .38 inch above normal. Precipitation fell on 17 days and the greatest precipitation in a 24-hour period was .78 inch. Greatest snowfall in a 24-hour period was 7 inches.

Maximum temperature was 48 degrees which was registered on March 1. The minimum was -5 registered on March 24. A reading of -2 was recorded March 27.

Maximum of 48 compared with 58 in 1964, 78 in 1963, 70 in 1962 and 70 in 1961. Minimum of -3 compared with 7 in 1964, -3 in 1963, -6 in 1962 and 15 in 1961. Average temperature of 27 compared with 33.4 in 1964, 35.4 in 1963, 32.8 in 1962 and 38 in 1961.

Precipitation of 2.67 inches compared with 4.52 inches in 1964, 4.09 inches in 1963, 1.35 inches in 1962 and 3.21 inches in 1961. Precipitation fell 17 days, compared with 19 days in 1964, 17 days in 1963, 10 days in 1962 and 17 days in 1961.

Greatest precipitation in a 24-hour period was .78 inch, compared with 1 inch in 1964, 1.13 inches in 1963, .40 inch in 1962 and .60 inch in 1961.

Snowfall totaled 29.3 inches, compared with 10.5 inches in 1964, 5 inches in 1963, 9.5 inches in 1962 and 5 inches in 1961. Greatest snowfall in a 24-hour period was 7 inches, compared with 3.5 inches in 1964, 2 inches in 1963, 4 inches in 1962 and 2.5 inches in 1961. Greatest depth of snow was 11 inches, compared with 1 inch in 1964, 24 inches in 1963, 13 inches in 1962 and 3 inches in 1961.

Fog was noted on three occasions early in March. There was sleet on March 16 and 18.

During the year the orchestra presents seven concerts in addition to an annual tour of American cities covering many states each spring. The Tulip Time program, as others, is open to the public without admission charge.

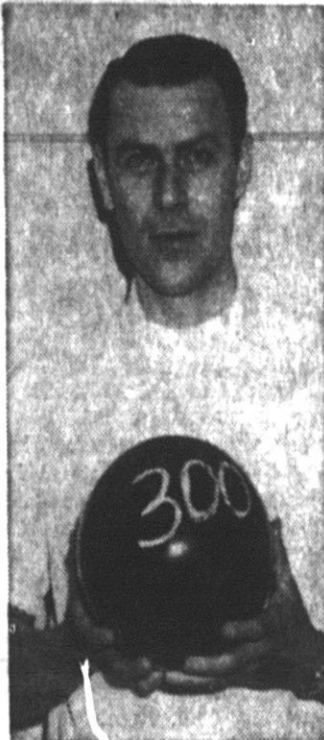

Christian High Fund Reaches \$720,000 Total

A total of \$720,000 has either been received in cash or pledged for the new Holland Christian High School "In Pace With Progress Campaign," John Keuning, drive chairman, reported Saturday.

Included in the new figure is about \$18,000 solicited from business, professional and community solicitation, although many of those involved in this solicitation have not completed their contacts, Keuning reported. "We have really no idea of what to expect from business and professional solicitation, but we have already received many fine verbal commitments. Other contributions are awaiting final verification, pending board of director meetings and the like," he said.

Also listed in the total is over \$20,000 contributed or pledged by the students in the Holland Christian Schools, although this figure is not complete, it was reported.

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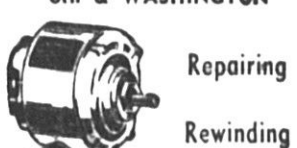
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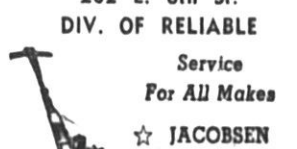


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
