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New Sewage Concept Is Explained

The "living filler" concept of sewage disposal using large lagoons and spray irrigation was explained at a public meeting Monday afternoon in Herrick Public Library, called by Tom De Pree of Holland, chairman of the planning committee of the Ottawa County Board of Commissioners. More than 100 attended.

Dr. John Sheaffer of the Center for Urban Studies at Chicago University explained what could be done on this concept for the Holland — Zeeland area plus the entire Black River basin as well as Lake Macatawa.

Vision is needed, he said, in approaching the pollution problem: (1) environment must be regarded as a single unit on water, land and air, (2) earth-bound people should have closed systems with no direct discharges, (3) pollutants should be regarded as potential resources out of place. He discounted the "myth" of secondary treatment as the answer since Chicago has been using secondary treatment 40 years and has not solved its problems.

Dr. William Ballard defined conventional sewage treatment "as a river rolled up in a ball" concentrating all wastes at one point in a bacteriological action that separates effluent and solids. As an alternative, he proposed spreading the waste water over a large area, aerating the lagoon from a few weeks to a few months, chlorinating the effluent, decolorizing it, and returning it to the land. He said drainage could be accelerated by wells, and the end product would be clean water. The cost might be expensive, but the overall cost would be less, he said.

Fred Roland, another consultant conducting a preliminary study for Ottawa county, pointed to two components of the study, one an engineering feasibility study, and the other a water quality management plan for Lake Macatawa. He spoke of the need for acquisition of land, areas amenable to such treatment, proximity of wastes and discharges.

Dr. Sheaffer pointed to the cycle such a system would involve—treated wastes would be used in spray irrigation on corn, the corn would be fed to cattle, cattle would provide meat for the table, and domestic wastes would return to the treatment lagoons.

William L. Kennedy of Allendale, chairman of the County Board of Commissioners, said a feasibility study would cost about \$40,000 and that the county would advance this sum which would be paid for later out of the project.

A question by Mayor Nelson Bosman on use of the city's disposal treatment plant brought an answer that the new system would replace the treatment, but the system would make use of the entire collection system.

BPW Supt. Guy E. Bell said the city was committed to remove 80 per cent of the phosphates by Dec. 1, 1972, and asked if there were any basis that could provide for the delay. No estimate was given on the time element.

Representatives were present from county, township and city governments, garden and game clubs, state government, water resources commission, and a number of persons interested in solving pollution problems.

Brandt said Hait told firemen he was awakened by what sounded like an explosion and found the rear of his apartment in flames. Hait, his wife and two small children escaped without injuries.

Heat from the fire caused paint in other rooms of the Hait apartment to peel, Brandt said.

City Buys New Snow Loader

City Council Wednesday night approved the purchase of a new conveyor type elevating loader for the street department by accepting low bid of the Don F. Nickel Equipment Co. of \$27,190 for the diesel engine loader. The old snow loader well over 25 years old will be traded in.

Councilman Morris Peerbolt asked about a snow blower purchased some years ago, but was informed that the conveyor type is much more efficient since blowers have difficulty loading the snow onto the trucks. Blowers are used to some degree.

Mayor Nelson Bosman appointed Gary Bartlett and Willard C. Wichers to the Planning Commission.

A letter from Robert J. Arendshorst requested Council to reconsider action on his request for new SDD and SDM licenses at 46 East Eighth St., which Council denied two weeks ago. Both Arendshorst and his attorney, Peter S. Boter, spoke of Arendshorst's plans for a high class party store putting emphasis on gourmet foods with liquor as an incidental item.

Stan Stekette, also seeking a license for a mini-store, pointed to Council's policy listing drug stores, supermarkets, grocery stores, delicatessens and new table top licenses as criteria for new licenses, and said the downtown area already had two takeout outlets. Council tabled the request for further study. Later in the meeting, Councilman Lou Hallacy said the study is mainly for reviewing license guidelines and does not necessarily mean approval of the Arendshorst request.

Two public hearings were held, one by Marathon Oil Co. for a restaurant at 651 East 16th St., and the other by the Board of Public Works for an addition to the old Fifth St. power plant consisting of a garage and storage building. Both involved fire district variances and both were approved.

Paul Danielson, who lives on Waverly Rd. near the proposed Marathon restaurant, asked whether a fence would block headlights shining in his rear yard and whether the lighted high sign would be a nuisance. Marathon representatives said plans call for a hedge to block light but they would consider a fence if that were desirable. The high light will be in operation during working hours, not yet determined.

Danielson later talked about traffic safety, particularly on the bypass at 16th and Eighth Sts., and the 25-mile limit at the school on 16th St. and 112th Ave. which he said is seldom heeded. He indicated nobody seemed concerned over traffic safety but City Manager William L. Bopf and several Councilmen assured him Council is very much concerned with traffic safety and refers many, many requests and suggestions to its traffic consultant.

It was pointed out that on state highways, other agencies are involved and it often takes long periods of time before studies and decisions are made and implemented. Bopf said the police department is close to all traffic problems, and the chief has a problem of selective enforcement in critical areas.

A letter from Charles Cooper, president of Holland Motor Express, Inc., asking Council to continue subsidizing the operation of Park Township, was accepted for study. The letter applauded Council's efforts to reduce expenditures but felt airport support was necessary.

Council acknowledged gifts to Holland Hospital of a vending machine valued at \$367.80 from Lindsay Distributing Co., and a Bilirubin light valued at \$385 from St. Francis Hospital Guild, also gifts of \$5 each from Grace Reformed RCFV and Niekerk Young Peoples Society to the police department for speakers' programs on narcotics.

A claim against the city from Margarita Gomez, 68 West Seventh St., was referred to the insurance carrier.

A communication from the Lake Macatawa Intermunicipality Committee informed Council it does not recommend installation of a bubble curtain this year since from all indications alewives are not expected to be a great problem.

Council approved a city manager's recommendation to grant a license to Holland Cooperative to install two gasoline storage tanks and a pump island at 88 East Seventh St. Detailed site plans showing curbs, pump locations, paving and drainage were found to be consistent with the necessary requirements, the report said.

Also approved was a contract agreement for a Phase I computer program involving \$80,000 to be shared by various departments, 30 per cent for city, 10

Junk Car Processing Gets Okay

After a two-hour hearing and another hour's deliberation, the Board of Appeals Thursday night approved "in principle" the petition of the Louis Padnos Iron and Metal Co. for an installation on property west of Pine Ave. and north of Fifth St., if extended, to process junk cars and other items such as old stoves, refrigerators and water heaters.

From 40 to 50 persons were present at the hearing described by city leaders as the most detailed "in depth" hearing ever conducted by a local appeal board. Representatives from firms manufacturing the machinery in St. Louis, Mo., and Milwaukee, Wis., were present to describe all steps of processing. Attorneys also were present for both the city and the Padnos Co., and a court reporter took down all testimony.

The Board of Appeals will adopt the final resolution at its meeting April 6. Conditions of operations will be reviewed by the Department of Environmental Health and the deputy city attorney in the meantime.

The operations call for disposing of junk automobiles and other appliances in a three-step process which would reduce the materials into fist-size metallic pieces ready for reuse by the steel industry.

Seymour Padnos, president of the local company, was in Washington last week testifying before an emergency hearing of the Department of Commerce on disposing of the growing mountains of junk cars. The subject had been prominently mentioned in President Nixon's State of the Union address.

Thursday's hearing, which had been adjourned from one Feb. 26, gave thorough consideration to noise factors, pollution, smoke, vibration, transportation and other aspects of environmental health.

Manager's Budget Is Presented

City Council will spend most of the evenings next week in budget study for the 1970-71 city budget.

According to city charter, City Manager William L. Bopf submitted his preliminary budget to Council at regular meeting Wednesday night. Within two weeks Council will set a public hearing. Final passage is expected the first meeting in May.

The budget Bopf has drawn up calls for a total tax levy of \$1,626,246, up some \$200,000 from the 1969 actual levy of \$1,413,740. It lists a tax rate of 16.552 mills, slightly under 2 mill of last year's rate, provided a \$91,000 bond retirement obligation be assumed by the Board of Public Works and a \$34,000 general obligation bond issue be assumed by the Hospital Board.

Both these proposals will be carefully studied by Council which a month or so ago adopted a resolution calling for each department to be as self-sustaining as possible.

The report pointed out that the Board of Public Works has recognized that an increase in sewer charges will be necessary, particularly in order to finance increased operating costs which will result from new facilities for sewage treatment, a "must" recognized by the community in the current pollution abatement fight.

The proposed budget also lists:

1. Sufficient funds for implementing a computer program involving major functions of the city.

2. An increased appropriation for continuing the work of the Higher Horizons organization, listing \$12,000 from the present \$9,000. The police department budget also calls for a graduate sociologist in an assistance program which may carry a 75 per cent federal grant.

3. Approximately \$100,000 for needed storm sewers, regarded as a necessary prerequisite to extensive paving projects in annexed areas.

4. Funds for completing and operating the new suburban fire station which hopefully will be completed by next fall.

5. \$50,000 to finance one-half cost of a total reassessment program for all property within the city. Commercial and industrial properties in the Allegan county portion were made this year, and it is now incumbent to complete the reassessment of the entire city.

6. A 6 per cent general increase for all municipal employees, plus cost for hospital insurance for fulltime employees dependents.

Bopf's report was accompanied by a six page report by Jack Leenhouts, personnel officer, containing detailed information on trends in salaries, the need to remain competitive and other pertinent information.

The new budget will be spread on an equalized valuation for the city of some \$104,000,000, up \$7,000,000 from last year through growth and reassessment.

Water, Alarm Set Off When Sprinkler Hit

Adult Education Sets 3 Courses

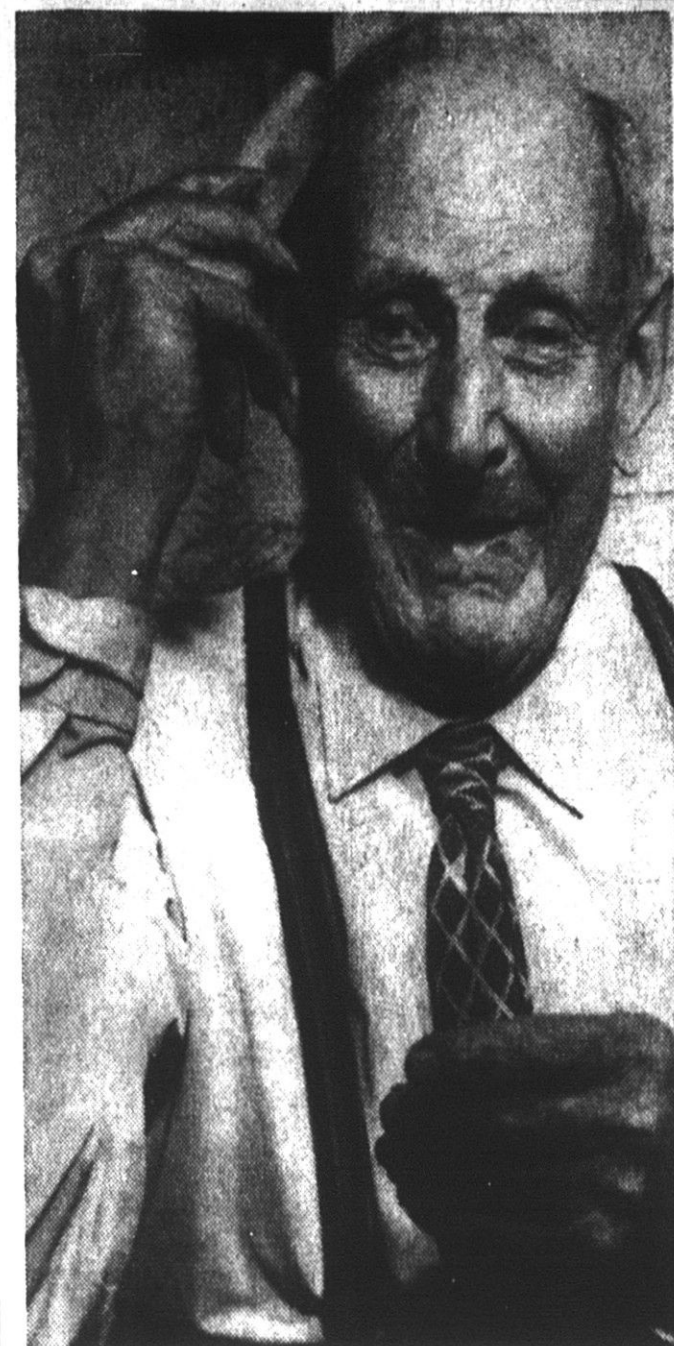
The Adult Education program of the Holland schools is offering three additional courses beginning April 7. These are shop geometry, shop algebra and problem solving.

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City Starts Bus Plan for 4 Weeks

Starting Monday, the city of Holland began operation of city bus service on an experimental four-week program in which two buses will be leased from the City Bus Co. which announced a month ago it will terminate its public transportation service here March 28.

City Manager William L. Bopi, who arranged the lease, said the schedule currently in effect will be followed the first week, with two minor adjustments to be made the second week. Notice of the changes will be posted on the bus. The present driver, Julius Brown, will continue the runs during the four-week period.

City Council March 18 approved a boost in rates of 50 cents for adults, up from 25 cents, and 40 cents for children, up from 20 cents. The new rates were put into effect Monday. Bus owner Al Vander Kolk and driver Brown said the change produced an appreciable increase in revenue and no substantial loss in business. Complaints came only from children, they said.

The four-week experimental program will determine how many people use bus service and at what times. It also will provide basic information on costs of operation, should the city go into the transportation business.

A survey this week revealed an average load of 2 to 3 persons at a time, and on one occasion a peak load of 14 persons.

The program called for leasing two buses, one in a standby function.

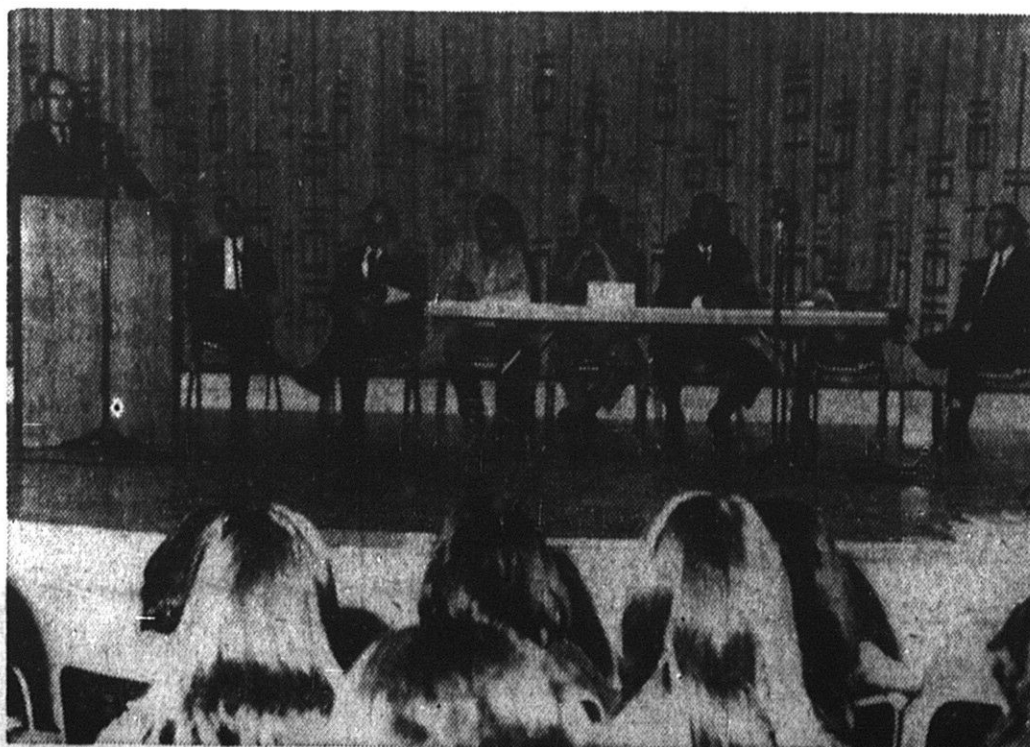

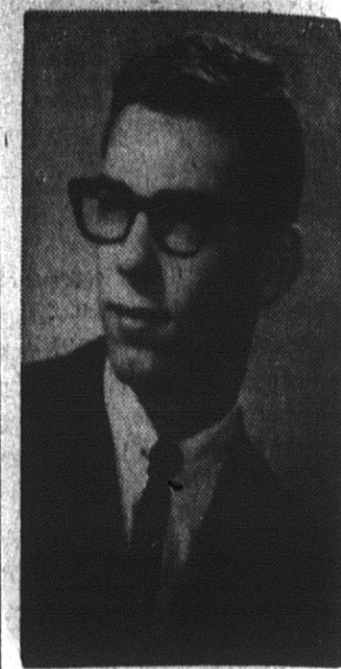

Deputies Cite Driver After Two-Car Mishap

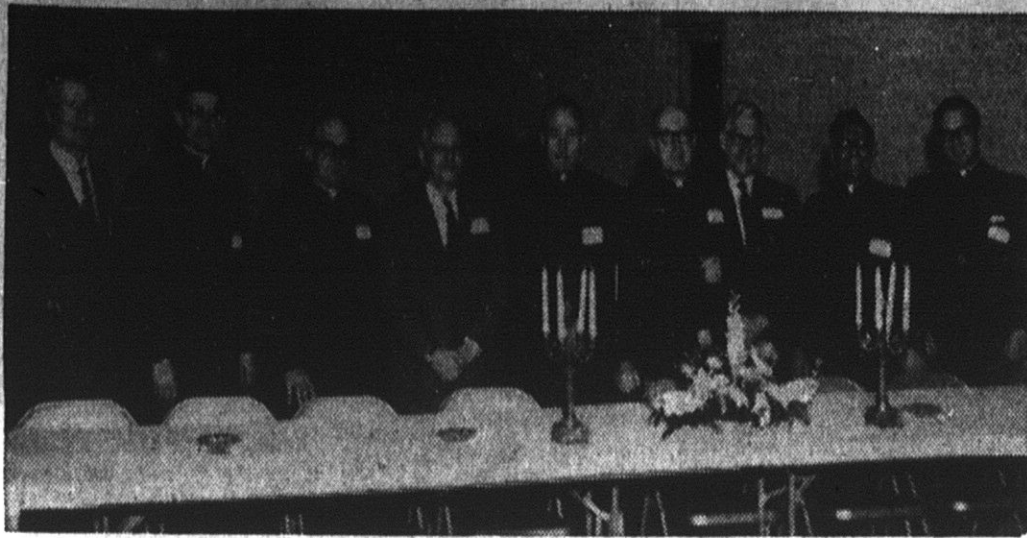

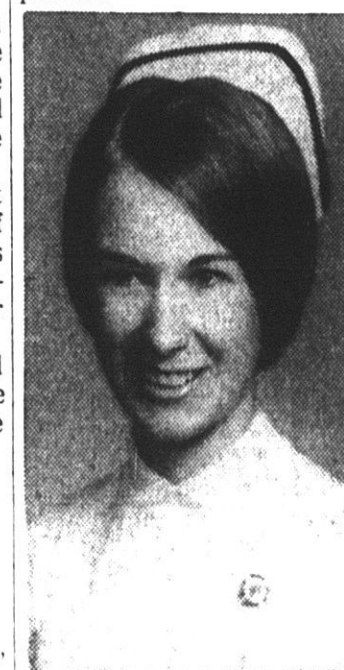

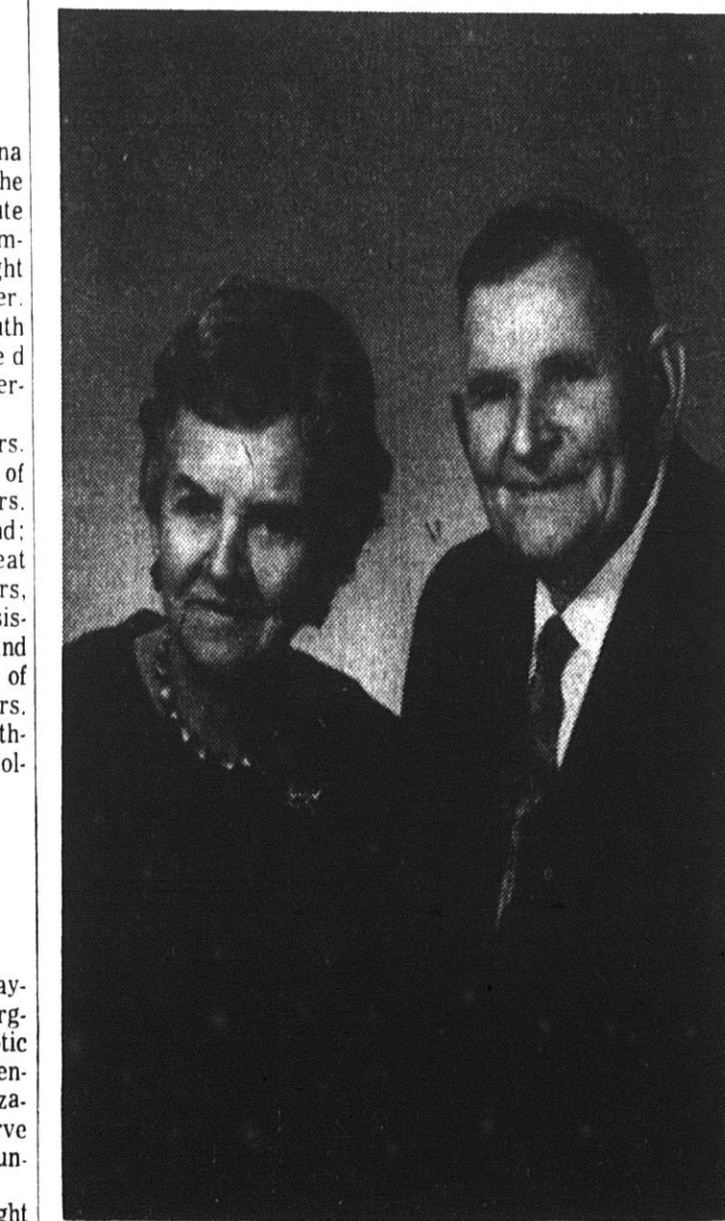

Happiness Is A Unique Hobby

Mrs. Minnie Van Pernis, 78, of Holland, who is confined to her home, has found a hobby that brings activity to days that were once too long and brings beauty to her own life and to the lives of others — she decorates eggs.

Mrs. Van Pernis and her late husband, the Rev. Gerard M. Van Pernis, decided to take up hobbies upon retirement. He took up sketching and she decided to try her hand at egg decorations.

Friends supply Mrs. Van Pernis with beads, earrings, sequins, decorative materials and, sometimes, with eggs. The hobby is an inexpensive one because the yoke and white are blown out and can be used while the shell can be decorated. Mrs. Van Pernis has given many of the decorated eggs as gifts, including two egg trees, and recently completed a fourth tree.

Mrs. Van Pernis discovered at first that it was quite a trick to blow out the contents of the eggs, something necessary before the shells could be used. Even hardboiled eggs will not serve the purpose. After puncturing the shells and removing the contents, Mrs. Van Pernis cleans the shell carefully so that paint, glue and other materials will adhere and loose dirt will not spoil the art.

The egg tree in Mrs. Van Pernis' living room was made from a shrub branch, grown in California and received from a niece there, and 25 duck eggs given to her by a friend. Duck eggs are slightly larger than chicken eggs and are a bit easier to work with.

Among the eggs is one depicting the birth of Christ and the Easteride. A window shape was cut into the side of the egg and inside Mrs. Van Pernis made silhouettes of the Holy Family against a background of the city of Bethlehem with a purple velvet cross in the back. Thus, the life of Christ is depicted from birth to the cross.

Mrs. Van Pernis also has an egg decorated with a woman's face and is wearing a bonnet with "blue ribbons on it" to depict the lighter side of the holiday and one egg is decorated with Easter seals.

Other eggs are decorated with scenes of miniature birds nesting, winter and outdoors. Some are completely covered with beads, sequins, bright cloth, gold and silver braid or pictures from calendars and greeting cards.

At the base of the tree are several China eggs which came from Mrs. Van Pernis' father's henhouse and are nearly 100 years old. The "eggs" were placed in the nests to induce laying and are now collector's items.

These "eggs" with their polished surfaces are a little more difficult to decorate than chicken or duck eggs, but Mrs. Van Pernis has decorated them and they are displayed in old fashioned egg cups.

Mrs. Van Pernis feels that "everyone who is retired should have a project of some kind" and is happy with hers.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, April 5
God's Gift of the Holy Spirit
Acts 2:1-4, 14, 36-42
By C. P. Dame

Some church members and leaders are confused about the mission of the church. A study of the Book of Acts would help. If the message and the methods of the early church were accepted confusion would end.

I. The Holy Spirit came upon the church at the right time. After staying upon the earth forty days, during which time Jesus taught His disciples, He left. Before leaving Jesus told the disciples to remain in Jerusalem which they did, and witness there and from there go to the ends of the world.

On the day of Pentecost the disciples were meeting together. There were three great Jewish feasts, the Passover, Pentecost and the feast of Tabernacles. A miracle took place. There was the sound of the wind and the appearance of the flame-like tongues which came upon the one hundred and twenty disciples and the speaking with other tongues which made it possible for the people from fourteen countries and provinces who were present to hear the gospel message. Those who accepted the message went home and told it there.

II. Preaching is still important. The disciples were charged with drunkenness. Peter spoke up and preached. What a contrast between the Peter who denied Jesus and the Peter who spoke at Pentecost. Take note of the fact that the Holy Spirit had given Peter a message and the ability to deliver it.

Today preaching is discounted. The church is the loser. In his sermon, Peter said that God approved the ministry of Jesus, that God raised up Jesus from the dead which He had foretold and which was taught in the Bible, and lastly, that the Spirit, who filled the disciples, was sent by Jesus. Peter called upon his hearers to repent. And three thousand did! Peter had stirred the conscience of his hearers. Do modern sermons stir people's consciences?

III. Conversions followed Peter's preaching. Today there are few conversions. Why? The new converts showed their sincerity by following the teaching of the apostles. The preaching was followed by teaching. Billy Graham puts more and more emphasis upon teaching those who made decisions. This is biblical.

The new converts were accepted by the church — the word "fellowship" teaches that. And the converts partook of the Lord's Supper. The word "prayers" refers to the worship services. In a few words the Bible portrays the religious life of the early church. We do well to follow the example this church set.

Seminar for Theologians Slated Here April 6 to 8

The first Peter C. Cook Management Seminar for seminary seniors is scheduled for the campus of Western Seminary April 6 to 8. Senior students from New Brunswick Seminary in New Jersey and Western Seminary in Holland, together with a group of Western Michigan pastors in Reformed Churches, will meet for the management seminar.

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Birchwood Patients Give Of Themselves in Project

At Birchwood Manor, local nursing home for the aged and ill, a group of elderly patients is putting into practice the theory that to "help others is to help yourself."

More than a year and a half ago, when a diversional therapy program was initiated at the home, several elderly women began volunteer work for the American Cancer Society. Almost every day small groups of women gather in the bright, cheerful therapy room to fold cancer dressings for use by area cancer patients. Arthritic fingers, failing vision and unsteady hands are forgotten in the determination to accomplish something meaningful in the long, lonely hours which often plague the old.

Mrs. Judy Kragt, Birchwood's director of diversional therapy, is especially pleased with the cancer dressing phase of the home's therapy program. Although many projects are available, the folding of dressings is especially valuable in that it offers the patients the opportunity for community service. Most of them have been active in community and church work all their lives and find this similar to projects they've accomplished in the past, she said.

Mrs. Kragt said the therapy room is always open to any patient and a variety of materials is available. Some patients are especially creative and have produced lovely craft items, from sparkling Christmas wreaths to rag dolls and stuffed animals. Many of the materials, including the 4 by 4 cancer dressings, are pre-cut by Mrs. Kragt and Birchwood aids, so that little or no sewing is required.

The cancer project is a favorite of about 20 women, whose average age is 82. One is a former nurse, who enjoys contributing even in this small way to her profession. Another is an amputee with no legs, some are stroke or severe arthritis patients, but all find a new will to live and a new outlook through active productivity. None of the therapy is compulsory, of course, but the patients sometimes goad one another to it and it becomes a matter of pride to "accomplish something."

In all ways, the work is especially rehabilitative, Mrs. Kragt says. Physically, of course, it stresses use of the hands, but even more important, it brings the patients together for conversation and companionship, it allows them to feel useful and it affords them their own way to serve the community which does much for them.

Newsmen Catch Glimpse Of Modern Day Holland

Group Tours Amsterdam, Tiny Villages

From dinner atop the 392-foot Rotterdam Euromast to a tiny village wedding on the Isle of Marken, Sentinel City Editor Randall P. Vande Water caught a glimpse of modern day Holland.

The stops were part of a seven-day tour of The Netherlands and Belgium conducted for nine Michigan newsmen and 19 travel agents and hosted by Pan American World Airways and its personable midwest public relations director Robert Wigginton of Chicago.

Vande Water and others left Detroit March 14 on Pan American's Inaugural tour of new flights to Brussels and Amsterdam. Included on the trip were newsmen from Detroit, Grand Rapids, Flint, Pontiac and Windsor, Ont., and agents from throughout Michigan.

At the Euromast, the group met A. van Raalte, genial manager, who told of plans for a 213-foot addition and will send the tower 605 feet skyward. Dedication is planned on May 5, to coincide with the VE-Day observance May 7. General Motors will have its sign at the top and visitors to the lofty heights will have a 45-mile view.

Erected a decade ago, thousands of persons have visited the Rotterdam landmark. Workmen reached the top of the addition Wednesday. The restaurant will remain at the 392-foot level. Van Raalte noted he was the great-great grandson of the brother of Dr. Albertus C. Van Raalte, founder of Holland, Mich.

While walking along the quiet Isle of Marken, Vande Water witnessed the marriage of a young Marken couple. After vows were spoken in the town hall, the bride, dressed in the traditional white gown and on the arm of her formally-dressed groom, walked through the narrow streets, over a drawbridge and to a reception in one of the village's two churches.

Interspersed between these two scenes were views of Amsterdam and its canals and its thousands of bicycles ridden by elderly merchants and mini-skirted girls, the modern Rotterdam superstructures and the village of Spakenburg's reserved fishermen.

In Amsterdam, the group saw the city from the canals, stayed in the famed Hotel Krasnapolsky, witnessed election night anxiety in Dam Square and visited atmospheric cabarets and dining rooms.

A harbor cruise with a "kof-fietafel" hosted by Gerard Lamers of the Rotterdam Tourist Office (VVV) highlighted Rotterdam plus a visit to the old port of Delfshaven and its memories of the Pilgrim fathers. The pilgrims left Delfshaven on their historic voyage.

Next it was off to the Gooi-area, hosted by John Verdonk of Amersfoort, senior sales representative of Pan American in The Netherlands and a frequent visitor to Western Michigan and Tulip Time.

Starting with the historic past, the tour stopped at Jamed Muiderslot castle and then rode by bus on four-lane dikes through the new polder of "South Flevoland" and on to most-surrounded Naarden, the best preserved fortress town in the country.

Following luncheon in the Grand Hotel Gooiland in Hilversum, site of all of the radio and television in The Netherlands, the group trekked to Spakenburg to see the Dutch in their native costumes. Dinner was held in the Amersfoort Berg-hotel with newspaper editor John Coburn as guest and host J. R. Laming, VVV Amersfoort manager.

Besides the wedding, the quiet life of the villages was observed, all anticipating another booming tourist season which starts in a few weeks. One Volendam merchant remarked that wooden shoes would be made in the village for the first time this spring.

But from the quiet fishing villages with the grazing sheep and horse-drawn carts, Vande Water returned to Amsterdam and its world-famous Schiphol Airport from where thousands of planes take off each year. The group returned March 21.

The Michigan contingent had landed in Brussels and spent three days at the Hotel Metropole touring the capital city, its landmarks and nightlife plus side trips to Ghent and Brugge, famed for their cathedrals and lace.

Mrs. Kiekintveld stated that the use of salt was one of the earliest refinements of civilization, with vessels for salt among the earliest dishes known.

Salt had religious connotations in most early civilizations; newborn babies were rubbed with salt and failure to use enough salt in cooking was reason for divorce amount early Hebrews. Orientals have long considered salt as a sign of friendship and hospitality.

According to Mrs. Kiekintveld, salt also was a chief economic product and Syria, India, Persia and Rome built roads and highways for the Great Salt Route. Salt was also used for money.

Caesar's soldiers were paid in salt, the payment called the "salarium" from which our word "salary" is taken.

Ancient tombs contained salt dishes of gold, silver and pottery. Pewter, wood and later, glass were also used to make these necessary articles.

After the Civil War in the United States, salt shakers replaced dishes on American tables.

He also can save precious moments in disaster situations where emergency oxygen or a resuscitator is needed." Citizens radio has many other community uses as well as possibilities in the event of national disaster, he added, and "through organized effort, we expect to utilize its potential more fully."
