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Committee Maps Sales Campaign

Drive Slated to Open
In Holland April 19;
Plans Announced Today

A three-member steering committee of William Venhuizen, Jack Plewes and Ken Zuverink were appointed at a meeting Monday to map plans for a sales campaign slated to start April 19 in Holland.

The trio will start work at a breakfast meeting at 7:30 a.m. Tuesday in the Warm Friend Tavern.

Plans announced at the meeting at Cumerford's Restaurant called for a mass evening kickoff meeting to be held Wednesday, April 16 in the Civic Center and the drive will start April 19.

Pennants and banners will be placed throughout Holland to announce the drive.

The New Car Dealers, of which Venhuizen is president, will have as its slogan — "You Auto Buy Now" while the merchants, headed by Plewes, Chamber of Commerce president, and Zuverink, Retail Merchants president, will have "Buy Days Bring Pay Days." These slogans will be used by the two groups interchangeably.

Committee chairmen were selected at the meeting attended by more than 35 persons.

R. E. Barber will head the publicity committee while Clayton Ter Haar is finance chairman. Fred Dirkse and Al Dyk are heading the used car division and Henry Ter Haar the new car division.

Henry Maentz and Clarence J. J. van der Grinten are in charge of the April 16 mass meeting and C. P. McCormick, the manufacturers. R. S. Bove is in charge of signs and service stations and Lew Hartzell, retail merchants.

Cornel Brewer is chairman of the builders and Harry Wieskamp heads the wholesalers. Harv Buter is in charge of transportation and Robert Wolbrink, insurance and realtors.

Zuverink presented the program to the retail merchants at a meeting of the group Monday in the Warm Friend Tavern.

Two Plead Guilty In Municipal Court

Jerald L. Myard, 18, of route 3, Zeeland, this morning pleaded guilty in Municipal Court to charges of leaving the scene of an accident and having beer in his possession.

His companion, Roger Bruursema, 20, of route 2, Zeeland, also pleaded guilty to a charge of having beer in his possession. The youths will return on April 26 for sentencing.

Police said Myard left the roadway on North River Ave. just north of Pine Ave. today at 1:27 a.m. and collided with a cement light pole. Officers estimated the damage at \$350 to the 1955 model car and said the cement pole was also slightly damaged.

The youths were apprehended a short time later when officers noticed the damaged car and water leaking from the radiator. Beer was found in the car, officers said, and the youths were held at the city jail.

Both Drivers Hurt In Two-Car Crash

Two persons were injured in a two-car collision Wednesday at 12:55 p.m. at the intersection of US-31 and Crosswell Rd.

Glendon C. Larsen, 48, of 581 State St., driver of one of the cars, was treated at Holland Hospital for an injury to his left knee and possible rib injuries and released. The driver of the other car, Mrs. Gladys G. West, 50, route 2, West Olive, was treated by a local doctor for knee and head cuts and released.

Ottawa County deputies said Larsen was headed south on US-31 as Mrs. West, going west on Crosswell Rd., stopped for the stop sign and then pulled out in front of Larsen. Mrs. West was ticketed by deputies for interfering with through traffic.

Deputies estimated the damage to Larsen's 1957 station wagon at \$900, and the damage to Mrs. West's 1955 pickup truck at \$600.

Collide at Intersection

Cars driven by Peter G. Damstra, 77, of 23 West 18th St., and Edwin Pelon, 33, of 1859 Lakewood Blvd., collided Tuesday at 2:55 p.m. at the corner of North River and Douglas Aves. Ottawa County deputies, investigating the accident, estimated the damage at \$200 to Pelon's 1955 model car and \$150 to Damstra's 1949 model car.

Office Entered

GRAND HAVEN (Special) — City police are investigating a break-in at Neitring's City Coal Dock early today. Office Clerk Charles Hamm found the front door had been forced open but nothing appeared to be missing. There was no indication of ransacking and 44 cents on the counter had not been touched.

School Bus and Cab Collide on Highway

GRAND HAVEN (Special) — A Rosy Mound school bus driven by Mrs. Helen E. Rhoades, 27, route 2, Grand Haven, collided with a Checker cab of Kalamazoo at 8 a.m. Wednesday on US-31 at Hayes in Grand Haven township. The Kalamazoo cab was a testing car driven by William James Stout, 18, Kalamazoo. His father, James M. Stout, 56, an experimental engineer for the cab company, received a slight concussion and minor head injuries and was to be treated by his physician.

The collision occurred when Mrs. Rhoades stopped in the middle of an island at the intersection and failed to see the approaching cab. She was charged with making an unsafe start in front of traffic. The cab driver was charged with having no chauffeur's license.

There was only one passenger in the bus at the time and neither the passenger nor the driver was hurt. The cab continued on its own power but the school bus was towed away.

Beechwood Votes 20 to 1 On 9th Grade

Residents of Beechwood school district voted 20 to 1 in a special election Tuesday to operate a ninth grade next year for Beechwood students and for those of several other school districts in the area.

The vote was 415 to 21. It was the largest vote ever attracted in a school election in Beechwood district.

Plans call for taking over the complete west wing of the Howard Ave. school for the ninth grade while some lower classes will be housed in the Beechwood church addition nearby.

The program calls for five teachers in the five class rooms. Some teachers will be transferred from the present staff and some new teachers will be hired. The new ninth graders will share the library with elementary and junior high students. The music program, both instrumental and vocal, will be extended into the ninth grade.

In addition to academic subjects, ninth graders will be offered shop and home economics courses. Equipment for the latter is being arranged through community effort of people in Beechwood and in the sending districts.

Beechwood Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte emphasized that the program of the ninth grade is for one year only and during that time the school districts cooperating in the program are expected to launch procedures for a reorganization program. Beechwood expects to have 130 students from 13 districts.

Boards of Education in sending districts will be notified shortly of plans for the high school curriculum.

It was announced that there will be a nursery school float in the children's parade during Tulip Time. A committee was chosen to build and decorate the float.

The annual family picnic will be held on Tuesday, June 3 at Kiwanis Camp at 5 p.m.

The spring project was discussed and adopted and the group approved the revised constitution. Within the week, a newsletter will be sent to all members listing the organization's activities during the year.

Equipment chairman Robert Abbe announced a work meeting for Saturday from 1 to 4 p.m. Refreshments were served by Mrs. Jack La Barge and Mrs. Frank Gaiowski.

The skating party was formerly an annual affair, but because of its popularity, it is now held twice a year.

Grand Haven Board Okays Lakeview Students

The Grand Haven Board of Education has accepted 28 Junior High students from Holland's Lakeview School for a one-year period.

Grand Haven has room for them for the 1958-59 school year, according to Supt. R. M. Van Volkinburg. The Lakeview ninth graders will be transported 30 miles by bus.

De Mots New Assistant Postmaster

Acting Postmaster Kenneth E. Scripsma today announced the appointment of William De Mots as assistant postmaster for the Holland post office. De Mots, who has been with the post office for 19 years, will start his new duties Monday.

De Mots succeeds Sipp H. Houtman who retired March 31. Houtman, who served as assistant postmaster for about three years, had been with the Holland post office 42 years. He is now Tulip Time director.

During his 19 years with the local post office, De Mots has always worked in a clerical capacity and has had considerable experience in dispatching mail and at the stamp window.

The new assistant postmaster lives at 230 West 22nd St. with his wife and three children. He was born in Edgerton, Minn., and came to Holland in 1929 with his parents. In 1935 he married the former Gertrude Deur of Holland. He is a member of Sixteenth Street Christian Reformed Church, a Sunday School teacher, has served on the consistory and currently is a member of the board of trustees of Holland Christian Schools.

Federal Not Included in Northside Plan

Plans Set For Sales Drive Here

Auto Official Speaks
At April 16 Meeting;
'Wheel' Parade April 19

Otto Kendshoven, of Detroit, a Chrysler Corp. official, will be the main speaker at a mass meeting Wednesday, April 16 at 7:30 p.m. in the Civic Center to kickoff a sales campaign in the Holland area.

Kendshoven, a Detroit native, has been with Chrysler for many years, including several on the West Coast, and is regarded as a topnotch speaker.

George Van Peursem of Zeeland, speaker of the Michigan House of Representatives, will deliver the keynote at the pep-rally meeting. Promotional material for the campaign which starts April 19 will be distributed including window banners, balloons, salesman's lapel buttons and bumper stickers.

"Holland on Wheels" will be staged when the drive opens Saturday, April 19 and will include an open-air showroom called "sidewalk showcase."

Plans call for the parade participants to convene at 9 a.m. between 29th and 32nd Sts., on Maple Ave., just off Michigan Ave. and will leave here at 9:40 a.m.

The parade route starts at Michigan Ave., and 32nd St., and will move north on River Ave., to Ninth St., east on Ninth to Columbia Ave., and Columbia north to Eighth St.

The parade will move west on Eighth at 10 a.m. to River and south on River to 12th St., and then east on 12th to College Ave. where the parade will disband. Any merchant, wishing to exhibit products in the parade may do so if they have wheels on which to transport it.

Those parade participants who are interested will then set up a "sidewalk showcase" in the middle of Eighth St., between College and River Aves., and on River from Eighth to Ninth St.

The display will be set up until 1 p.m. and will include "anything on wheels," such as antique cars, boats on trailers, house trailers, scooters, new and used cars, trucks and carrying vans.

Henry Ter Haar (phone EX-6-2688) is chairman of the parade and "sidewalk showcase" and Andy Vander Vliet (EX-2-2873 or EX-2-9394) is parade marshal. Serving on the committee are Al Dyk (EX-2-2873 or EX-4-4344) and Clayton Ter Haar (EX-6-5241) or EX-4-4523). Anyone interested in participating in the parade should contact one of these people.

The mass meeting, parade and campaign are the result of two meetings held here in the last week designed to get a sales campaign into gear.

The slogans will be "Buy Days Means Pay Days" for the merchants and "You Auto Buy Now" for those involved with automobile sales and service.

Included in the initial meeting last Friday were more than 50 persons made up of merchants, automobile dealers, used-automobile dealers, gasoline station owners, industrial leaders, builders, truckers, wholesalers, insurance men, realtors and representatives from banks, newspapers and radio stations. Holland, Zeeland, Fennville, Saugatuck and Hamilton were represented.

Dogwood Planted on Bypass And Lilac Trees on M-21

The Holland Garden Club, after years of planning, has launched its program of beautification on the US-31 bypass around Holland. This highway has been designated the Blue Star Memorial Highway extending for 379 miles on US-31 from the Indiana state line to Mackinaw City and on US-2 to Sault Ste. Marie.

On Tuesday, a group of garden club members aided by representatives of the State Highway Department planted close to 100 dogwood trees along the sides of the highway in two separate plantings in the vicinity of 32nd St. and the C and O overpass south of the city.

Today, club members again are working with highway personnel planting several hybrid French lilac trees in the M-21 boulevard near the Black River bridge a mile east of the city. This planting also includes several flowering crab shrubs which are expected to bloom this spring.

The lilac program is separate from the Blue Star Memorial Highway program. The lilac program was inaugurated only a few years ago with the aim to plant lilac trees in the boulevards from Holland to Grand Rapids, adding further attractions for tourists in quest of color for Tulip Time.

Netherlands Trade Expert Coming Here

Dr. J. H. Dirk van der Kwast, Director General for Trade and Industry, the Netherlands Ministry of Economic Affairs, will visit Holland Friday and Saturday. It was announced today by Willard C. Wichers, director of the Netherlands Information Service.

Dr. van der Kwast is a participant in the Foreign Leader Exchange Program of the International Educational Exchange Service of the U.S. Department of State and his present tour of the United States is arranged by the Government Affairs Institute. While in Holland he will be a guest of the Netherlands Information Service and will lecture before students of Business and Economics at Hope College. Friday evening, he will address the members of the Holland Professional Club at their monthly dinner meeting. The Holland Chamber of Commerce is arranging conferences for Dr. van der Kwast with merchants and industrialists.

Dr. van der Kwast was born in Indonesia and educated in the Netherlands, receiving his Ph. D. in Economics from the Economic University in Rotterdam. Following his graduation he entered government service in the field of Trade. He has traveled throughout Europe in connection with his official duties and this is his second visit to the United States.

Youth Changes Plea And Pays \$10 Fine

GRAND HAVEN (Special) — Wayne D. Clark, 17, Grand Haven, whose trial before a jury in Municipal Judge Jacob Ponstein's court was scheduled Thursday afternoon, appeared in court Thursday morning and pleaded guilty to a charge of being disorderly and paid \$10 fine and \$5.10 costs.

Clark was arrested by city police the morning of March 21 following a scuffle with a 16-year-old at Washington and Seventh St. During the fight, which started over the calling of names, the glass in a peanut vending machine was broken.

The 16-year-old was referred to the Ottawa Probate Court.

A Holland woman was admitted to Holland Hospital today with possible fractures of the left hip, left leg and right wrist after being run down by a runaway, driverless car.

Mrs. Jennie Tanis, 66, of 242 West 10th St., was struck at 12:13 p.m. as she stood on the sidewalk on Eighth St. just west of the Old News Printery, on the south side of the street.

Holland police said the car, which had been parked facing west on the north side of Eighth St., was owned by Seth Vander Ploeg, 40, of 1719 West 32nd St.

Vander Ploeg was in the police station at the time of the accident, checking on a warning ticket issued by Holland police.

Police said the car was not in gear, and left the parking space, rolled across the street and knocked down a parking meter before striking Mrs. Tanis.

Several other pedestrians managed to jump out of the way as the car bounced over the curb. One witness, a woman, raced into the police station as soon as it happened, and an ambulance was at the scene almost immediately. Officers estimated damage to the 1950 model car at \$80 and are continuing their investigation.

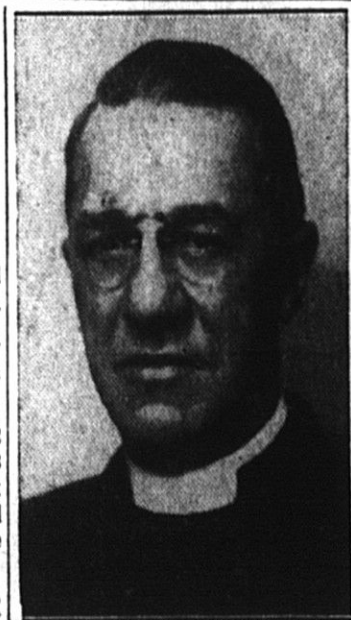

Dr. J.R. Sizoo To Receive High Honor

Dr. Joseph R. Sizoo, Milbank professor of religion at The George Washington University in Washington, D. C., and outstanding preacher, was named Wednesday Clergy Churchman of the Year.

He will be honored along with Cecil B. DeMille, motion picture executive who was named Lay Churchman of the Year and the Rev. Georgia Harkness, leader in the movement which admitted women to the Methodist ministry, who was named Churchwoman of the Year as part of the Washington Pilgrimage of 1958.

The announcement was made today by Dr. and Mrs. Harold M. Dudley, directors and co-founders of the Washington Pilgrimage, established in 1951. The awards will be presented at the Pilgrimage's annual dinner, Saturday, May 3 in Washington.

Winners were chosen in terms of their service to their local church, their denominations, and in terms of their ecumenical leadership.

Dr. Sizoo has appeared in Holland frequently. He is an ordained minister of the Reformed Church in America, but preaches in all denominations in the United States, as well as Europe, Asia and Africa. He directs the University Chapel at George Washington.

He began his ministry in the missions of South India. Later he was minister in New York State and New Jersey and at the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church, Washington, D. C., and for 12 years at the Collegiate Church of St. Nicholas in New York City.

Dr. Sizoo became president of the New Brunswick Theological seminary in 1947 and came to George Washington in 1952. He holds honorary degrees from eight institutions, including Hope in 1925. He was a graduate of Hope in 1907 and was graduated from New Brunswick Theological Seminary in 1910.

"This is a complicated legal mess that goes back many years," Asst. Atty. Gen. Nick Olds said.

Christian Names Three Principals

School Board Announces
11 Teaching Positions
Still to Be Filled

Appointment of new teachers and offering information on vacancies still to be filled highlighted the monthly report of Supt. Bert P. Bos to the Holland Christian School Board of Trustees, Tuesday night.

In his report to the board, Bos told the board that nine new teachers had already returned signed contracts for the new school year. He said, however, that 11 positions must still be filled.

Headlining the appointment information was the naming of three new principals for next year, including those for the new schools which are expected to be ready by next September. One principalship is still open, the superintendent said.

Appointed to the South Side School, which will include kindergarten through grade eight, is Robert Strabbing who succeeds the present principal, Garrett Keuning. Strabbing has been on the Christian High School staff for the last six years, but has had administrative work previously. Named as principal of the new Rose Park School, kindergarten through the sixth grade, is John G. Bekker, who had served as principal of the Fremont Christian School from 1952-1956. The third principal named is Leon Witteveen, former principal of the Dutton Christian School. He will either serve as principal of the new Maplewood School or of the West Side School. Both the Maplewood and West Side Schools will house pupils in grades kindergarten through the sixth.

Other grade school appointments include Miss Dorothy Hoffman of Zeeland who expects to receive her bachelor's degree from Calvin College in June; Miss Anne Holsteege, also of Zeeland, who has taught five years in the Hudsonville Christian School; Miss Marilyn Johnson of Holland, who expects to receive her A.B. from Calvin this June and Miss Joanne Van Kley of Chicago who will also receive her A.B. from Calvin this June.

Three new teachers have also been named to teach in the high school. Two are additional teachers caused by increasing enrollment and the third is a replacement. Named to succeed Miss Jeanette Veltman, who is retiring, in the commercial department, is Miss Shirley Kuiper of Byron Center. She attended Calvin College and will complete requirements for her B.B.A. degree from the U of M in June.

Public School Teachers Ask Pay Boosts

Starting Pay Would Remain at \$4,000, But Other Boosts Sought

Holland MEA district, composed of public school teachers in Holland, voted 100 to 10 at a regular meeting Monday in Van Raalte school to submit a report of the Welfare and Salary committee to the Board of Education asking for a boost in salaries next term which may run \$400 plus the usual increments for those teachers not already at the top of the schedule.

In general, the eight-page report drafted by the committee, asks that the salary schedule which currently covers a span of 14 years be shortened to 13 years and eventually be shortened to 10. The report also asks that the maximum salary be twice the minimum salary and that the schedule should offer an increment of at least \$200 over the previous year and that the fifth and ninth steps offer \$300.

The present schedule starts at \$4,000 with top salary of \$6,200 after 14 years. An automatic \$300 is added per year for master's degrees. The new schedule sought by the teachers starts at \$4,000 to top salary of \$6,600 after 13 years. The \$300 differential for master's degrees would remain the same.

Cost of annual increments on the present schedule is \$16,150, and cost of raises and increments under the new schedule will be \$67,575, according to the report. This study covers only teachers, not principals, consultants, superintendents, administrative assistant, director of vocational education or director of adult education. At present, the teaching staff lists 94 B.A. teachers, 57 M.A. teachers and 4 non-degree teachers.

The Teachers club recommendation is expected to be discussed at the next meeting of the Board of Education Monday night in E. E. Fell Junior High School.

Serving on the Welfare and Salary committee are Myron Van Ark, chairman, Garrell Adler, Margaret De Pree, Vida Harper, William Noyd, Winona Penna, David Scobie, Harold Streeter and Deane Van Lare.

General information compiled by the committee indicated that the teaching situation in Holland is good, due in large degree to the salary schedule which a working committee attempts to keep flexible. Next year 75 teachers will be at the top of the salary schedule which explains why Holland is seventh in the state with a median salary of \$5,913.

The report points out that the Michigan educational finance study commission has recommended a minimum salary of \$4,500 be extended to \$9,000 over a 10-year period of successful teaching experience. It also pointed to the fact that many workers in industry are guaranteed raises during the next year, and teachers feel justified in requesting a salary that is above the cost of living increases.

Hulst played in the state tournament last season before dropping to Hamtramck's Francisco Castillo, the A winner. Damson played doubles in the state meet.

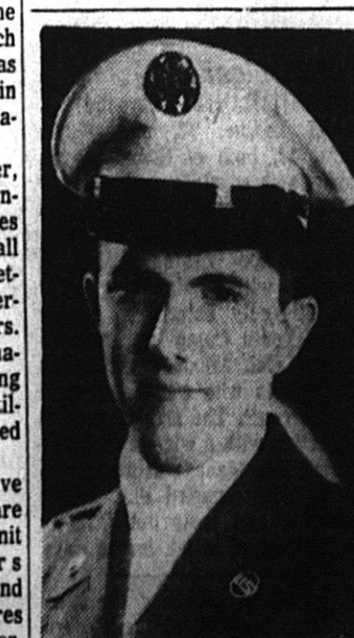

Water Plant In Full Service For One Year

Monday marked one year of continuous service from Holland's new water filtration plant near Tunnel Park, Water Supt. James Hornung said today.

Although Holland had had water service through its seven-mile pipeline to Lake Michigan before that time, the service was intermittent due to construction interferences.

The Board of Public Works said the plant has met its rated design characteristics to the board's complete satisfaction and with a minimum of maintenance.

BPW leaders also pointed out that the bacteriological and physical qualities of the treated water have at all times been better than the minimum limits set by the U. S. Public Health Service.

The new filtration plant which held open house last summer is open to visitors from 1 to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday, and at other times upon request, according to Hornung.

During the period from April 7, 1957, to April 7, 1958, treated water pumped amounted to 1,070,000,000 gallons. Water used in the plant totaled 58,000,000 gallons.

A total of 35 tons of alum was used for coagulation and nine tons of chlorine for disinfection. Chemical and physical tests recorded totaled 56,000. Electricity used amounted to 1,161,000 kilowatt hours.

High pumpage duty registered 6,122,000 gallons. The plant pumping capacity per day is 15,000,000 gallons and plant filtering capacity per day is 14,000,000 gallons. Average hardness is 8.5 grains per gallon.

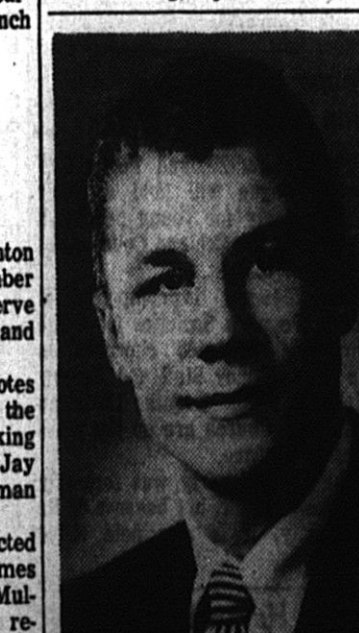

Holland Furnace Notes Sales Up

Holland Furnace Co. experienced a "somewhat lesser loss" in the first quarter this year than the \$415,994 deficit of 1957's first three months, a company spokesman said today.

He said the company's financial position improved in the first two months of the year because some unprofitable branch offices were closed and new ones opened in other areas.

Sales, all made on a door-to-door basis by the company's own staff, were up to 10 per cent in January over the 1957 months, officials said. The March quarter sales were about five to eight per cent greater than in the year-ago period when they amounted to \$5,472,646.

Officials said management has "cause for reasonable optimism," that net income for 1958 will be better than the 71 cents a share, of \$507,744 of 1957. Sales last year totaled \$30,327,587.

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THAT MONROE POSTAGE STAMP

James Monroe, fifth President of the United States, has once more been honored by the U. S. Postal Service. His face appears on a new issue of three-cent stamps released in April.

Such an honor is nothing new for Monroe. Five times before, he was featured on a stamp. In each case there seemed a pretty good reason for the honor: in the present instance the reason was particularly good—the stamp was issued on the 200th anniversary of Monroe's birth.

But people who are endowed with a dash of political skepticism in their natures may ask, in spite of this very good post office excuse, whether the recipient of the honor was really worthy of six such citations.

Ask any average citizen who has enjoyed an average American education what James Monroe's contribution was to American history, and he is sure to answer, "He proclaimed the Monroe Doctrine." Today's citizen may not be too clear as to just what the Monroe Doctrine was, but he is certain that it was a very wonderful proclamation.

And it was, without question. It was considerably short of the importance of such a document as Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation, which came a generation later, but it was very important to America. It told Europe curtly to keep hands off this hemisphere.

That declaration was urgently needed at the time; it helped to lay the foundations for America's later greatness.

The only trouble, so far as the Monroe stamp is concerned, is that James Monroe was hardly more than the mere voice of that doctrine. His name became associated with it because he was president at the time; all the others who played just as great a part in it, some of them a greater part, have long since been forgotten.

But that's the way of the world. Fame is a capricious lady, and many of the celebrated names in human history are celebrated merely because the persons answering to them happened to be on the right spot when important events took place.

Because of the Monroe Doctrine many Americans are far more aware of Monroe than they are of James Madison, Monroe's predecessor in the presidency. Yet Madison was very largely the author of the Constitution of the United States, certainly a far more important document than the Monroe Doctrine. His name did not have the luck to get connected with that work. Real accomplishment and fame do not by any means always go together.

Mission Groups See Easter Play

Sunday School Lesson

Exodus 1:7-23
God's People in Bondage
(Based on copyrighted outlines produced by the Division of Christian Education, National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A. and used by permission.)

We can easily link this story of a people in bondage to contemporary life. The names Israel and Egypt are prominent in these days. We read much about how people exploit each other. This lesson offers many opportunities for discussion about modern problems.

I. Anti-Semitism is very old. It appeared in Egypt centuries ago. Jacob and his eleven sons with their families, numbering seventy souls came into Egypt and settled in Goshen, at the invitation of Joseph who had been sold there as a slave and had become next to the king in authority. In the course of time Joseph and his generation died. After the Hebrews had been in Egypt about one hundred years a new king came to the throne. The Hebrews had been growing in prosperity and power and in numbers "and the land was filled with them." The new king did not know Joseph and showed no interest in his people—in fact he began to be afraid of them. It is very likely that the natives resented the growing prosperity of these foreigners and disliked their increase in numbers. Perhaps there was much talk about Egyptian supremacy in those times.

II. Oppressing minorities is an ancient practice. The king proposed that active measures should be taken to stop the growth of the Hebrews. They were made to labor on public works without pay and by forced Hebrew labor store cities were built. The purpose of this slavery was to break their spirit and reduce their numbers. More babies are born in times of prosperity than in a time of depression. The king's measure failed. "But the more they afflicted them, the more they multiplied and the more they spread abroad"—so the Bible states. The Egyptians stepped up their oppressive measure and "made their lives bitter with hard service, in mortar and in brick, and in all manner of service in the field, all their service, wherein they made them serve with rigor."

When these hard measures failed the king called the two midwives who were at the head of their profession and ordered them to kill all boy babies. People who are brutal often assume that others are like they are. The midwives refused to obey the king's order. They offered a flimsy excuse to the king, in fact they lied to him, and so the boy babies were spared. When this measure failed the king commanded that all Hebrew baby boys be thrown into the river. This measure also failed—the people kept on growing in numbers.

Today there are slave labor camps in Russia. Nations, under the oppressive rule of the communists want freedom. There is still slavery in some parts of Arabia. We know that in our own land there are minorities whose problems are many. It is sadly true that pressure groups constantly seek advantages at the cost of others. The man who is on top always wants to stay there and he cannot understand why the man under him is displeased. He believes in leaving things as they are. Some years ago industry did much exploiting and today some labor union bosses show that power has corrupted them.

We remember how Germany, a most enlightened nation allowed Hitler to kill the Jews in ruthless ways. How many Stalin liquidated only God knows. It is reported that one million people have been killed by the communists in China. History shows clearly that the hearts of tyrants are always the same—the tyrants of today are just like the tyrants of Egypt.

III. God is opposed to exploitation and tyranny. History teaches that in time tyrants are overthrown and freedom comes. It was in the dark days of slavery that Moses the deliverer was born. We can be sure of this—God is against anything and everything that robs people of freedom, liberty and justice.

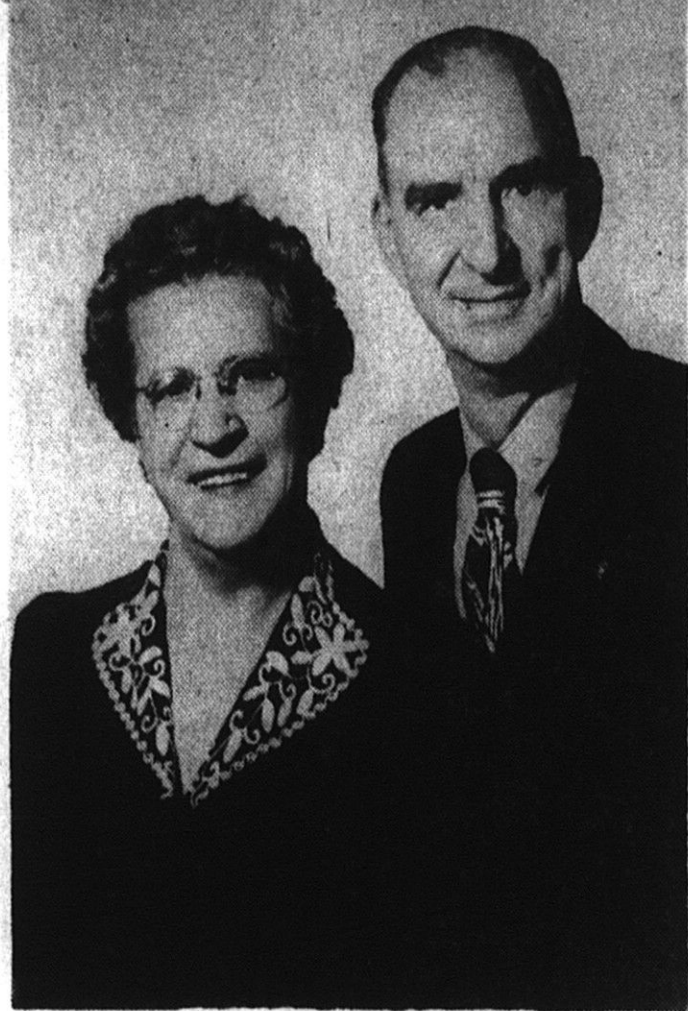

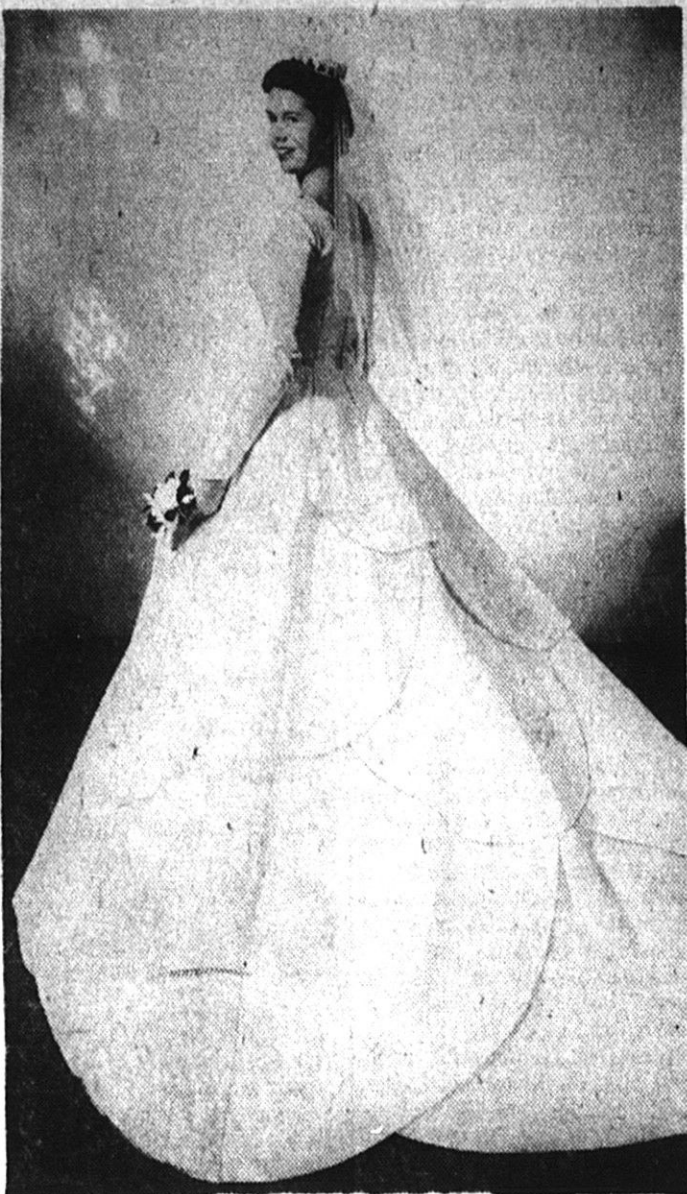

Dr. Tirrell Addresses Local ASWA Banquet

"Educating the Publics" was the fascinating subject Dr. John E. Tirrell, Dean of the Grand Rapids Junior College, used Tuesday evening for his talk to members of the Holland Chapter, American Society of Women Accountants.

The occasion was the ninth annual public relations dinner of the group attended by employers and guests of the Accountants in the Tulip Room, Warm Friend Tavern.

The hometown boy, educated in Holland at Holland High School and Hope College and then continuing on to University of Michigan and Harvard University, seemed more like a college student than the dean of a college as he pointed to the progress report on a research project.

There was no mistake in the title of his address "Educating the Publics" because there are actually three types of public—the active public, the concerned public and the unconcerned public—each is a separate group and in public relations must be treated as such, he said.

The active public reads and has definite opinions to offer much as the concerned public. The unconcerned public is usually less educated with fewer opinions and less interest in community projects, politics or cultural events.

"When you get to know people and have direct contact, you think better of them. When you are connected with a group and have direct participation in an organization there will be less danger of falling into one of the three groups that public relations has to deal with, he said.

"People in the first group are those who lack personal efficacy or feel personally ineffectual. The second group feels cut off from long range goals and the third group is intolerant, believing something must be either black or white and cannot be shaded into grays."

Dr. Tirrell urged the audience to be part of the active or concerned public by devoting time and talent to belonging to an organization. Being an educator, he naturally stressed the fact that the better educated person was the one with the best public relations.

Julius F. Schipper, superintendent of the Zeeland Public Schools, gave the invocation.

Parents Hear Revised Form Of 'Youth Code'

Members and advisors of the Holland Youth Code committee presented their latest revision of the Code to parents of both Holland High and Holland Christian High School students at a meeting Wednesday evening in room 8 of E. E. Fell Junior High School.

The meeting was presided over by committee chairman Bruce Van Leuwen. Larry Van Til gave the invocation. Karen Eckstrand read the minutes of the committee's last meeting.

Dave Bonnette, Joan Ten Cate and Paul Weener presented the first article of the Code, dealing with family relationships. Discussion on the first article centered around the definition of the term "going steady," and the reasonableness of the hours suggested in the Code for school and non-school nights. "Going steady" was found to mean many things to many people, but was generally discouraged in the Code unless the individual feels mature enough to "take on the responsibilities involved."

The suggested deadlines for students under 16 were 10 p.m. on school nights and 11 p.m. on non-school nights. Students over 16, it was felt, should observe 10:30 p.m. 12 p.m. deadlines. Many parents expressed pleasant surprise at these hours and commended the committee for its judgment.

A motion to add something to the Code to the effect that students have a right to know where their parents are at all times was referred back to the committee for more study.

Nancy Cooper and Barbara Duffy presented Article II of the Code pertaining to individual rights of students as young citizens. The sentiments expressed in this section of the Code prompted more remarks by several parents on the attitude of the committee, and a discussion on the function of the Code, one completed, followed.

Karen Eckstrand presented Article III of the Code on Respect for law. In the revision, mention of smoking had been unintentionally omitted, and will be included in later revisions.

After the presentation of the Code itself, ways and means of propagating and publicizing the Code were discussed. It was generally agreed that the Code should have a beneficial effect on both the younger students and the students soon to leave high school, as well as the parents. It was felt that all possible means should be employed for the spreading of the Code and its ideas.

Eugene Scholten, one of the advisors for the committee, reviewed for the parents the publicity measures which have been planned so far.

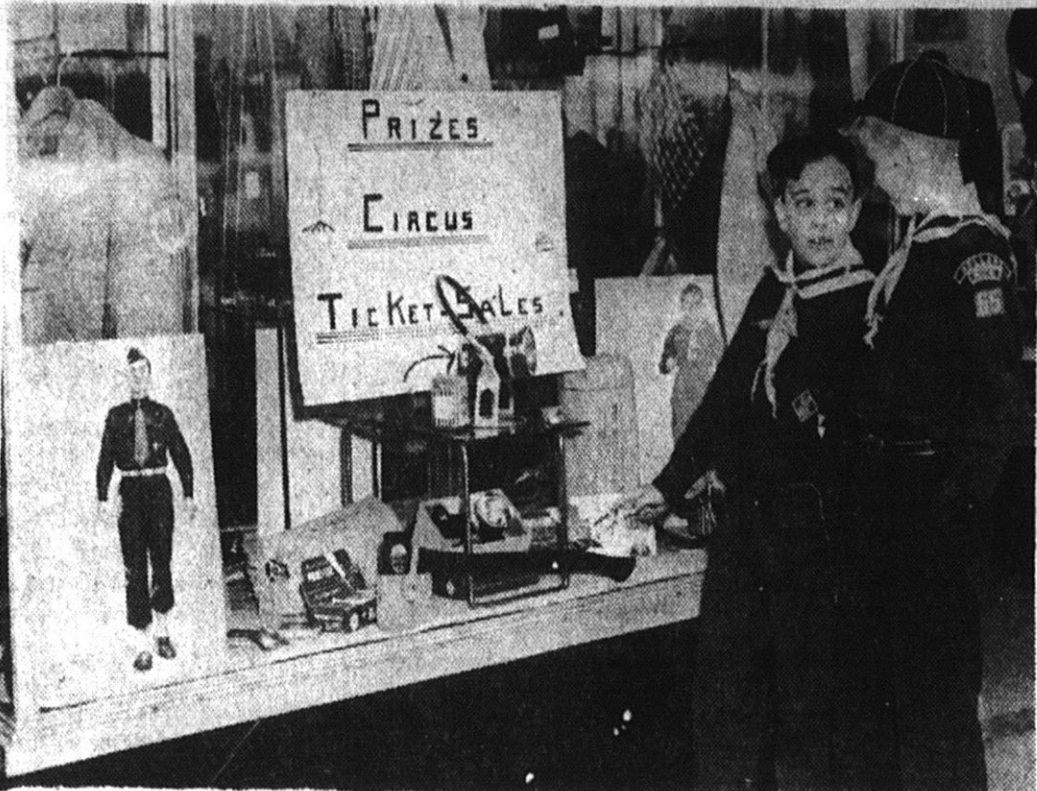

The Ellie Mae number by Geri Bagladi was one of the show's soppers. This mountaineer ballad "Hamburger Heart" featured a rhythm number with bells on her knees. And her kinfolk behind the curtain—the Robert school kitchen band—was just the right final touch.

We're told that Geri's husband, Frank, didn't know what she was going to do. The conversation must have gone something like this:

Frank: What are you going to do in the Follies show?

Geri: I'm going to sing.

Frank: Why, you can't sing!

And that was all Frank knew until Geri pranced down the aisle shouting at the announcer that she had got out of jail in time to appear on the program. Then came the wild ballad and bell dance, plus the act by her kinfolk.

The first thing Geri asked after her act was over, "Did Frank leave the auditorium?"

The "Hamburger Heart" number was one Director Jim Dyas dug up in New York. It was written by a friend of his, and proved to be just the number for Geri's talents . . . and the kitchen band.

Incidentally, dancing with bells hitched to the knees isn't very comfortable. Geri's knees were black and blue.

One of the most finished performances in the Follies was the slave girl dance by Mireille Knudsen in the sultan scene. Mireille (pronounced Mir-ay) came to Holland as a French war bride. She had been with the French ballet before coming to America.

The figures of the girls in the chorus line were pretty good . . . showing plenty of reason why the new ugly sack dresses will not be 100 per cent popular. All song and dance numbers were well done, but the one that impressed the large audience the most was the precision dance number at the close of the program. It was an

excellent takeoff of the New York Music Hall Rockettes.

A Follies production requires a whole lot of behind-the-scenes work. Committees working on props found themselves designing things like the Eiffel tower, a bathhouse for the beach scene, and lining up ice cream parlor chairs and goodness knows what.

The costume committee had a terrific assignment. When the costumes came in that last week from the Cargill Productions in New York, all members of the cast had to be outfitted, alterations made, and then labeled. In the case of the men, each man was assigned a locker in the dressing rooms and inside his locker were all his changes, together with instructions on what to do with them after he completed the act. The women fared not quite so well. There were no locker rooms for them, and they did the best they could with limited dressing rooms.

The makeup committee had its work well organized too. It was virtually an assembly line . . . first of all came gobs of cold cream, then grease paint, rouge, lipstick, powder and maybe some glitter stuff. And with dozens and dozens to be made up, it needed real organization.

Amateurs not too well acquainted with grease paint soon learned the value of cold cream after one venture. Those who had skimped on cold cream base learned to their sorrow that cold cream is the only stuff that will take grease paint off.

Larrie Clark, the sheik in the sultan scene, had perhaps the most complicated make up. He had grease paint all over the upper part of his body, and a fine black beard for that act. He virtually had to take a shower before he could appear as soloist in the precision dance act.

On page 29 of the Follies program was a little poem which was a tribute to the husbands . . . the ones who carried on at home, taking care of children, eating out of tin cans and getting along as best he can . . . while mama is rehearsing for the chorus line. That poem received more attention than any other thing in the program.

The show must go on . . . even in Holland. Sid Woudstra who was handling stage lighting had to rush to Holland Hospital at 4:30 p.m. the day of final rehearsal, because his son was undergoing an emergency appendectomy. Everything went well, and Sid managed to be present for the evening rehearsal.

During Friday's rehearsal Director Jim Dyas was snapping things up behind scenes and the rock and roll bunch in rushing to the stage was momentarily confused and instead of rushing through the opening of the front curtain, took the back curtain and ran right into the brick wall. Fortunately, nobody was hurt.

Getting that Oldsmobile on the stage for the slap hands number was quite tricky. It involved backing up that convertible from a steep ramp outside onto the stage. With everything on a split second schedule, the slowly moving car clipped one of the rock and roll drummers Friday night and sent him sprawling. Nope, he wasn't hurt either.

Throughout the three weeks of rehearsals the big cast developed a terrific respect for the talents of Jim Dyas, the director. Jim has a faculty for making things pleasant and the rigorous rehearsals turned out to be more fun than work. Jim said himself that he can't remember laughing as much as he did during his three weeks in Holland.

New Radar System Tested at Grand Haven
