A cellar had been dug and this hole will be filled. No plans were announced for use of the area.

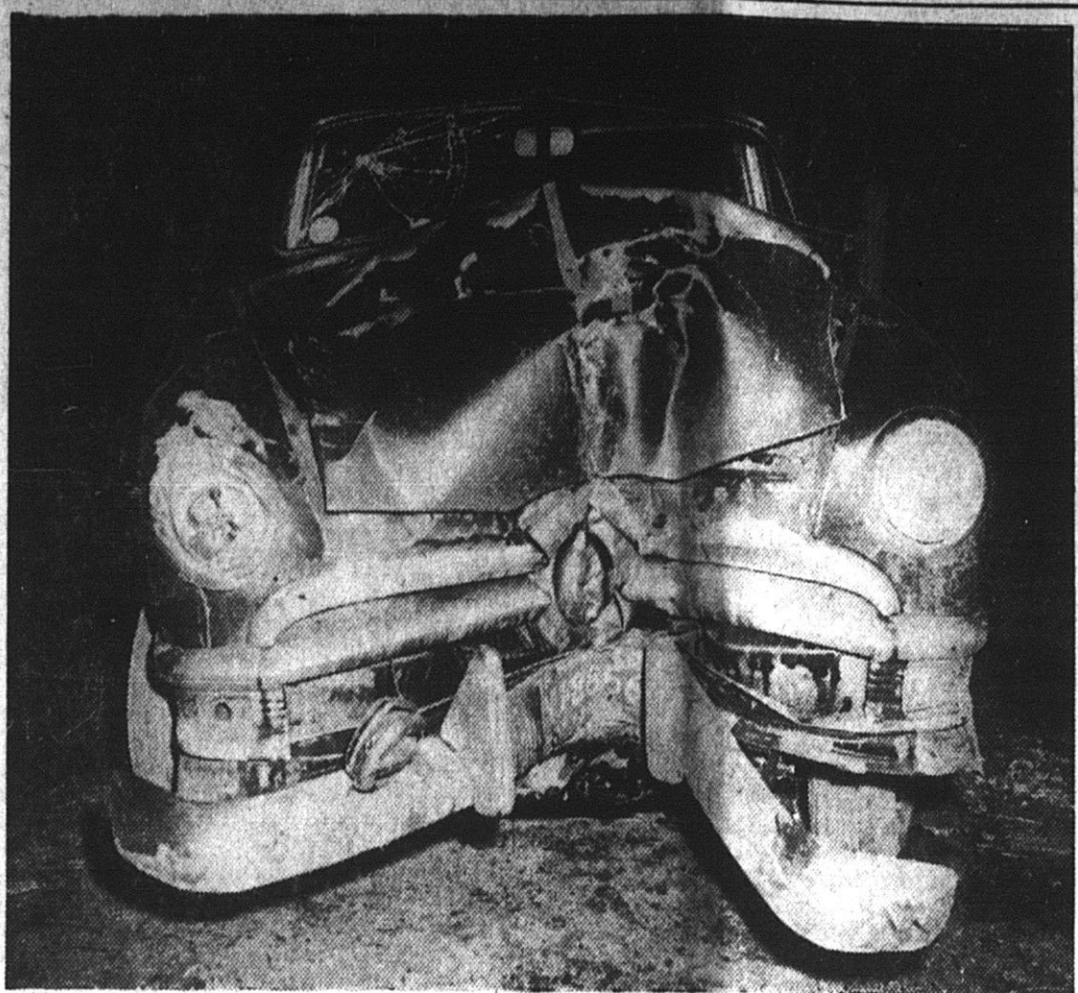
Occupancy of the Maentz home by the Rev. Russell W. Vande Bunte family is hoped for by Oct. 1 following the necessary renovations.

More Plans Set for New High School

Further plans for Holland's new high school building and other school improvements as well as progress in applications for the sale of school bonds were outlined at a regular meeting of the Board of Education Monday night in E.E. Fell Junior High School.

School Supt. Walter W. Scott reported that work is progressing as rapidly as possible in preparing the qualifying application for the sale of school bonds. With the selection of Architects Kammeraad and Strop for the Lincoln school gymnasium and necessary building alterations elsewhere, preliminary sketches will soon be made for these projects. After the qualifying application is submitted, a period of four to six weeks is required for approval.

Meanwhile, Architect Suren Piliarian is working on schematic drawings for the high school. After that will come elevations, eighth scale plans, final working drawings and careful checking of specifications, leaving three weeks for bidding.

The board approved several recommendations from the Buildings and Grounds committee which held a series of seven meetings the past month. Plans for a field house-gymnasium were approved as the most practical physical education and athletic building.

Schematic plans have been completed for the library building which also will house an audio visual room, language laboratory, home economics facilities and general offices of the high school. Two consultants from Wayne State and Northwestern Universities are advising on the auditorium which tentatively will seat about 680 persons with 50 seats available on the fore-stage when it is at floor level. A complete stage is designed with the auditorium. Instrumental and choral music rooms are included.

Most important are the twin academic buildings which have had some revisions because of fire marshal requirements.

The board approved a recommendation authorizing the necessary test borings on subsoil on the site of the new school. Notwithstanding the fact that the swimming pool issue lost in the Feb. 23 bond issue, the committee also recommends that the necessary space for the pool on the site be reserved and that the heating plant and other mechanical features be planned as if the pool were to be constructed as planned.

A petition signed by 21 persons asking that the pool issue be voted on again was placed on file and Secretary James Hallan said he understood several other petitions were being circulated on the same subject. It appeared, however, that such an election would not be held immediately.

Maplewood Appeal Aired in Lansing

LANSING — The State Board of Education Wednesday heard arguments on an appeal by Maplewood school district to have three small parcels of property transferred to the Hamilton district, Allegan County.

Last year, a bid to have a much larger section of the district transferred was turned down by the board.

Gordon Cunningham, attorney for Maplewood, said the three parcels have an equalized valuation of \$36,000 and transfer would "square off" the district and eliminate administrative problems.

The Allegan County Board of Education, the Hamilton district and residents in the area appeared to oppose the transfer.

The board will consider the appeal and announce its decision at a later date.

In another move on the Maplewood dispute, Allegan attorney Leo W. Hoffman filed a petition with the secretary of state asking that the district be ordered detached from the city of Holland.

Hoffman said he represented a group of "farmers who want to get out of the city."

Summer School Plan Presented

Program Enlarged To Include Courses On Many Subjects

A proposed summer school program for students on elementary and secondary levels was submitted to the Board of Education at its monthly meeting Monday.

There will be classes on developmental reading for grades one through six at Van Raalte school, meeting one hour per day for five days per week for four weeks, with all classes in the morning. Teachers will be Mrs. Cene Roe, Miss Elizabeth Schouten and Miss Crystal Van Anrooy. These classes start June 20.

Speech improvement classes for grades 1 through 12 are scheduled with Speech Therapist Charles Doornbos as instructor. This will be a clinic dealing with the problems of speech production, articulation, stuttering and phonation. Dates will be July 5 through Aug. 12.

Summer school for junior and senior high classes will start June 13. There will be developmental reading classes for seventh, eighth and ninth graders designed to expand reading skills and improve work comprehension. Emphasis will be placed on vocabulary, comprehension and speed of reading. Students who feel that they could improve reading skills to spend less time on assignments in the remaining high school years as well as in college would find this course profitable. Similar developmental reading classes are planned for 10th, 11th and 12th graders.

There will be a class in fundamental arithmetic for seventh graders for the four fundamental processes of arithmetic as applied to whole numbers, decimals and fractions. A comprehensive presentation of per cent is a major feature of this course. Problem solving is part and parcel of the entire course, not a separate part of the program. Eugene Prins will teach classes for both seventh and eighth graders.

Driver education will be an extensive program available only to residents of the school district. Enrollment may be made at both principal's offices of the high school and Christian High School. The first session will be from June 13 to July 8; second from July 11 to Aug. 5, and third session from Aug. 8 to Sept. 2. Mrs. Carol Van Lente will teach development of skill in typing for personal and business use for high school students. A special junior high typing program to teach fundamentals will be taught by Donald Gebraad.

Other courses offered are social problems, general machine shop, summer music (offered 11 years) and field biology (an outside course regardless of weather scheduled 4 to 7 in the morning). Fees for all these courses (except driver training) range from \$1 a lesson to \$20 a semester.

A new course this year will be an economics course for high school juniors which includes a month's intensive study on economics in Holland, climaxed by a two-week tour with stays in Washington, New York and Montreal. Tuition for this course will range from \$250 to \$300.

Supt. Walter Scott said summer courses are becoming more and more vital for students, particularly those whose academic achievements are such that their admission to college might be questioned. He said more and more incidents are coming to light emphasizing the need for remedial reading on all levels, and this year's summer courses have been enlarged to meet a growing need. Vern Schipper is summer school director.

Invoking 5th Amendment No Good Here

Invoking the fifth amendment in Holland Municipal Court isn't so simple as it appears on TV or the movies, one traffic offender learned during the weekend.

John Achterhof, Jr., 21, Graafschap, had been arrested on an imprudent speed charge by city police following an incident March 23 involving a cruiser chase at speeds up to 90 miles an hour. The driver was not apprehended at the time but a warrant was issued, and Achterhof pleaded not guilty at arraignment March 31.

At trial Friday afternoon, April 8, the prosecution had concluded its testimony and Municipal Judge Cornelius van der Meulen asked the defendant if he wanted to take the stand, making it clear that he did not have to do so but that if he did he would be subject to questions. Achterhof elected to testify and implied he had lent his car to somebody else and then refused to identify said person, pleading the fifth amendment.

Judge van der Meulen explained that the fifth amendment was not applicable in this case and ordered Achterhof to answer Assistant City Attorney Gordon Cunningham's questions, stating that a contempt of court citation would be an alternative. Achterhof still refused to answer and was cited for contempt to serve 10 days or until such time "as he purged himself of the contempt charge."

After a weekend in jail, Achterhof voluntarily appeared before Judge van der Meulen Monday, pleaded guilty to the original charge and paid \$30 fine, \$9.90 costs and was put on probation for six months.

The 5th amendment was invoked by many witnesses at recent Senate investigation hearings where the men charged their answers would incriminate themselves.

Jackson Inmate Admits Macatawa Breakin

A May 30, 1959, breakin at the home of Dr. W. G. Henderson at Macatawa Park, was cleared up Monday after 29-year-old Gottfried Von Kronenberger of Grand Rapids, admitted the burglary in which over \$3,000 in goods was taken.

Von Kronenberger was implicated in the breakin after it was learned he was using a credit card taken from the Henderson home for identification, according to Ottawa County detective John Hemple.

The Ottawa County Sheriff's Department was notified by FBI agents about three weeks ago that the FBI was seeking a man, using the name W. G. Henderson, for passing bad checks throughout the country. Hemple said.

Pictures of the wanted man were positively identified by persons in the Macatawa Park area as being those of Von Kronenberger. A check with Von Kronenberger's

family in Grand Rapids revealed that he was in the area at the time of the breakin.

Von Kronenberger, described by Hemple as a "real pro" among burglars, was apprehended in Miami, Fla., in February. He was returned to Muskegon County in connection with a safe-cracking at Northway Bowling Lanes, and is presently at Southern Michigan Prison in Jackson, where he readily admitted the Henderson theft, Hemple said, after he and State Trooper Charles Bush of the Grand Haven State Police Post questioned him.

After the breakin at the Henderson home, Von Kronenberger went to Chicago, where he got rid of clothing and a camera taken from the Henderson home. Later he went to San Diego and pawned a typewriter taken in the breakin.

Von Kronenberger was apprehended in San Diego for attempted burglary and jumped \$1,500 bond. Later he turned up in Minneapolis and New Orleans where most of his bogus checks using Henderson's name were passed, Hemple said.

In July 1959, Von Kronenberger went to Florida where an accomplice, Paul Kieth Rollins, was killed trying to run a police roadblock.

Board Approves Circular Gym

A circular combination field-house-gymnasium for the new Holland High School was approved by the Holland Board of Education at its regular monthly meeting Monday night.

The circular building had been under study since January and was recommended by the building and grounds committee of the Board. The gym will be constructed for an estimated \$450,000, the same cost as the rectangular gym which was first proposed.

A revision was made in the seating capacity for the building and it was reported at the meeting that the gym will seat 2,552 persons for pep assemblies and other student activities, Joe Moran, athletic director, said.

The 16-inch bleachers on the east and west balconies will seat 1,814. Those balconies are the folding-type which will "nest" when not used and will form the sides for the two smaller gyms in the building.

The removable bleachers on the north and south end of the building will seat 738, to give the total of 2,552.

It will also be possible to put seats on the gym floor and this will give a total seating capacity for the building of 3,200, Moran said. Hardwood floor is planned for the gym area.

The building will be 180 feet in diameter and 47 feet to the peak of the dome. "The gym has been adapted for the purpose of taking care of all of the physical education needs and also will put a great deal of influence on inter-scholastic sports because of the space available," Moran said. "It will allow the Holland athletic teams to practice out of season sports the year around," Moran said.

The space gained in a circular gym over the rectangular gym will be 4,140 square feet and this is the equivalent of 4½ classrooms. Supt. Walter W. Scott reported.

The circular building will be able to give the community a more adequate structure of larger size, greater flexibility and usefulness to the physical education program of the school, Moran said.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, April 17
Children of the Resurrection
Colossians 3:1-15
By C. P. Dame

On Easter Sunday we will not study a lesson on the Sermon on the Mount but we will consider a passage of Scripture from the Epistle to the Colossians which tells about the resurrected life of a Christian. A person shows by his life whether he is a Christian or not. The Christian lives a different life. It is a new life.

I. A Christian has been risen with Christ. The New Testament tells us about the resurrection of Jesus. It describes this as a fact. Christianity is an historical religion based upon events. If Jesus had not been risen from the dead there would not be a Christian Church anywhere in the world today. Jesus died, was buried, guards were placed about his tomb and his tomb was found empty for Jesus had risen and left it and He was seen, talked to and gave orders to His disciples. These facts are recorded in the New Testament.

During Paul's ministry in Ephesus the gospel was brought by some converts to Colossae and a church was founded there. When Paul was a prisoner in Rome he heard about the sad fact that a dangerous heresy had broken out in this church and therefore he wrote a letter to it. This letter was addressed to Christians in Colossae—people who had come out of paganism and had adopted the Christian faith.

Paul reminded them of their conversion—they had died with and risen with Christ and now were united by faith to Him. Since they were converted they should do two things — "seek those things which are above" and set their minds on things above. Someone may say that we are here upon this earth and therefore we should be occupied by our daily duties. Indeed we have our obligations to this earth but the point Paul makes is that the heavenly should have priority. Christians are linked to the risen Christ and they should reveal this relationship by putting Him first in life.

II. Living the Christian life involves renouncing vices and manifesting the virtues which are Christian. These converted Christians in Colossae knew all about the common pagan vices of their day. Paul told them to be done with them. The apostle mentions two kinds of sin—those of the flesh, such as fornication, and those of the spirit, such as covetousness and anger. He also mentions sins of the speech—note the words "filthy communication out of your mouth" and "lie not one to another." It is evident that people still committed those sins, otherwise Paul would not have said anything about them. Christians were told to "put off" these sins.

Paul was not a negative individual. He not only told these Christians what sins not to practice but he also pointed out to them the virtues which they should reveal in their lives. Christians must continually "put off" and "put on," the one deed must be followed by the other. We are told to put on "compassion, kindness, lowliness, meekness, and patience" and always be forbearing and forgiving since the Lord has forgiven us.

We certainly need these virtues in our home life, in the world of business and in the church today. The supreme virtue is love and therefore Paul says that "above all these things, put on love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony." If the peace of Christ dwells in the hearts of believers and in the church, then all differences will be readily settled. The last words of the lesson text, "and be ye thankful" are important for thankful people are always not hard to get along with.

CENSUS
We are moving along with the Census as 55,000,000 households are being asked 14 basic questions for the 1960 census. Every fourth family will be sampled with an additional 40 questions. You try your arithmetic and see what number you come up with. We get a total of questions amounting to 1,320,000. This is a lot of questions.

Now let's take a look at the setup in Washington. We have FOSDIC, short for Film Optical Sensing Device, for input to computers. Then we jump to Jeffersonville, Indiana where we find Decennial Census Operations Office known as DCOO where 16mm microfilm rolls of information have been processed.

Now we move back to Washington with the answers and FOSDIC goes to work. This process has eliminated 2,000 workers in the card punching department. FOSDIC can read the microfilm and it transfers the information to magnetic tape in the form of dots. Well then we come to UNIVAC so to speak, and out comes a table that tells the story such as where the people live, income, education number of washing machines, urban or rural residence along with many other answers.

This amounts to a lot of people. Reports state that 10 years ago the 1950 census cost \$90,618,000. The cost for 1960 is supposed to amount to about \$118,000,000. This is supposed to be less than it would have cost for the same operation of census taking for 1950. The reason is that there are more noses to be counted this time. We are told that the completed job will be received much sooner. This will be good news to many people who use the census figures for all kinds of programs. So have the information ready when the enumerator calls.

Allegan Cites Tax Increase

ALLEGAN (Special) — Tired of taking the blame for increased taxes which it merely collects for schools and the county, the city of Allegan released a ten year comparison of tax rates and assessments at their Monday night meeting.

The report, compiled by Deputy City Assessor Clarence Wise, showed that the city tax rate had risen only 32 per cent while the total of school, county and special levies, increased 81 per cent.

In the period from 1951 to 1960, the city's total assessed valuation went from \$6,380,450 to \$8,672,850, an increase of 36 per cent. The report pointed out however, that the city's state equalized valuation, upon which most county and school tax levies are based, increased 55 per cent.

Although the city tax rate has been held at 14 mills for the last four years, it is virtually certain the council will have to approve a raise to the 15 mill ceiling this year. This increase will be made necessary by the Cook St. drain project, and not by any hike in city spending, however. Recent revisions of state drain laws require that the cost of drains within a city be paid from the general funds of the city, not from special assessments, either by benefit or the city at large.

Receipt of the tax study was a highlight of an otherwise routine city council meeting. The council disposed of a 28-item agenda in exactly one hour, adjourning at 8 p.m.

The council will hold an informal session at 7 p.m. Thursday night in preparation for its annual re-organizational meeting Monday, April 18. Election of a new mayor and mayor pro-tem and appointment of the new seven-member planning commission will be highlights of that session.

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Safety Official Opposes Use of Go-Carts, Track

A warning to parents and other adults to be cautious in supporting any Go-Cart Club or racetrack was issued today by Avery D. Baker, Ottawa County safety director.

Baker said the Ottawa County citizen's safety council opposes the use of miniature motor vehicles, commonly called "karts" or go-carts, by drivers below the age of drivers who have a legal license and especially when their use in speed or racing is involved.

"While the law of Michigan, and all other states, automatically prohibits these miniature vehicles which have been designed primarily for use by children from the public streets and highways, there is little or no control over their use on private property," Baker said.

"As a result, children have been killed or injured operating these vehicles, and we urge groups to refrain from sponsoring or conducting competitive events using miniature motorized vehicles and to do all possible to see to it that they are at no time operated by persons under legal age," Baker said.

"Since the small cars are a new problem the situation can become more serious as the number of vehicles increases. Three children have already been killed in 'go-cart' accidents in Indiana. Even when driven by licensed drivers they are a hazard because of the low visibility and lack of body framework for protection," Baker said.

The safety director indicated he would ask the county prosecutor for an opinion as to what legal steps might be taken to stop any racing plans.

Baker reported that some eastern states have used public nuisance statutes and New Jersey is passing a law to prevent racing by under-age drivers. Baker said that the County Safety Council endorsed the position of the National Safety Council that speed events of any kind that promoted racing or daring driving was not in the best interest of safety.

Furthermore, the rationalization that early driving experience for youngsters would promote safety could not be justified with an accent on speed and competition, Baker said.

The County safety council is a non-governmental agency that has worked closely with the county traffic safety department. Founded in 1956, the council has its headquarters in Holland at 6½ East Eighth St.

Art, Sas, representing the Ottawa Go-Cart Club, said today that the club is being organized with the primary purpose of obtaining a plot of ground where a road course can be constructed. A road course is an area where the natural terrain is used.

"The club was organized to give adult supervision in the safest and sanest manner possible and road course would permit proper supervision by adults," Sas said.

Another purpose for the course is to get the go-karts off the various parking lots in Holland and get them on the course, where there is no obstruction," Sas said. "We realize the potential danger of go-karts," Sas said, "as well as the danger in any sport, such as football."

The club will have a technical and safety committee and the duties will be to inspect all go-karts for proper construction. The karts must meet the specifications of the National Kart club regarding safety features, brakes, steering and other things.

"At no time will the go-kart be allowed to be operated on the course until it passes the inspection," Sas emphasized. "We realize there are no laws in the country to prohibit the manu-

facture of go-karts and as long as they are made, people are going to buy and use them and the Ottawa Kart Club desires to provide some local control over them," he said.

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Lee York Wins Holland Archery Title

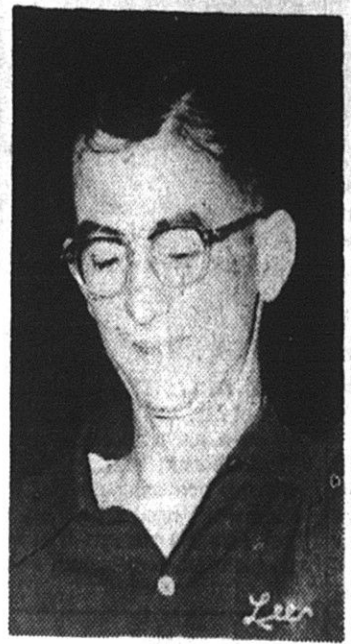
Lee York reigned as the Holland archers indoor champion following his 800 score Wednesday night in the Holland High gym.

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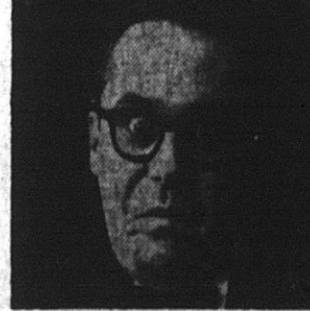

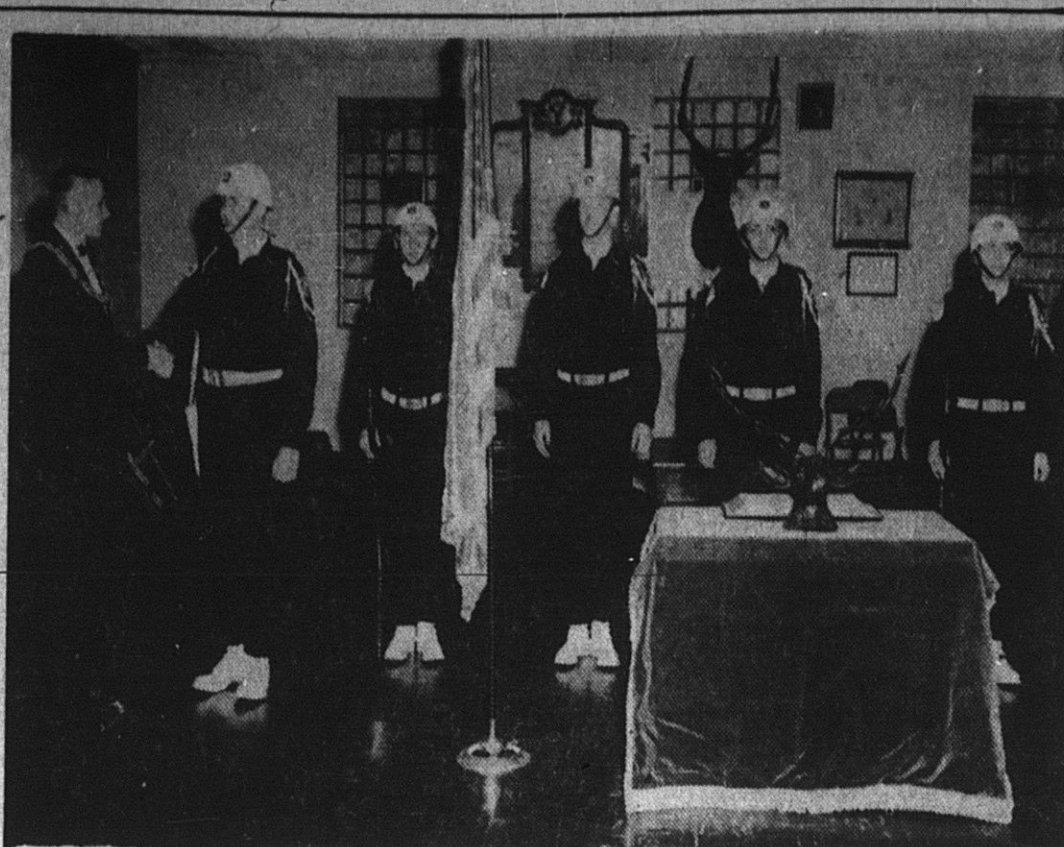

Board Rejects Request for Dog Wardens

GRAND HAVEN (Special)—A request from the sheriff's department for two dog wardens for the county was rejected by the Board of Supervisors at its opening meeting of the April session Tuesday afternoon.

Reason for the denial was that no funds were available in the budget for such an expenditure estimated at \$16,000 to \$18,000, covering two men and two cars.

Richard L. Cook, chairman of the committee, said when the present sheriff took over he inherited a good dog warden in Richard Bell of Holland. A year of having deputies do the work has not proved successful, and the request was made at the January session. Cook said if any change is to be made it should be taken up at the October session.

With four dissenting votes, the board authorized payment of \$8,605 due the Clemmshaw Appraisal Co. for its appraisal work throughout the county. Dissatisfaction was expressed by representatives of three counties including Polkton Township which is represented by Chairman Robert L. Murray.

Murray said he was informed last winter that appraisers would be back but has heard nothing

further from the company. Dissenting votes were cast by Clarence Reenders of Grand Haven Township, Edmond R. Measom of Port Sheldon, Martin Geerlings of Zeeland and Dr. D.C. Bloemendaal of Zeeland city.

A communication from Glenroy M. Walker, chief of the fire marshal's division of the Michigan State Police, stated that the county has complied with all previous orders on the court house except the closing of vertical openings and that steps should be taken to correct this condition. The communication was filed.

Arnold Hertel of Holland informed the board that some changes must be made with the wiring at Ottawa county infirmary at Eastmanville. The matter was referred to the welfare committee. Herman Windemuller of Park Township sought approval for further furnishings and landscaping at the branch building north of Holland. Expenditure was authorized from the \$4,000 left in the budget.

Clarence Reenders of Grand Haven Township informed the board that the West Ottawa Soil Conservation district is willing to

release 26 acres of land in Port Sheldon Township to the county, provided the district may retain 25 per cent of the sale proceeds. Consumers Power Co. wants 20 acres, which Reenders valued at \$300 an acre. The other six acres are valued at possibly \$100 an acre. The matter was referred to the conservation committee and the prosecuting attorney with orders to report back at the current session.

Reenders also suggested trading some county and federal land to allow development of park and recreation areas.

The county board will be host to the fifth district of the Board of Supervisors Association at the American Legion club rooms in Grand Haven April 20. Senator Edward Hutchinson of Fennville will be the speaker and former Mayor Claude Ver Duin will be toastmaster.

The ways and means committee presented a tentative 1961 budget totaling \$1,281,280.40, but the committee recommended that the total budget should not exceed \$1,125,000.

The board adjourned until Monday at 1:30 p.m.

The scenic Portage glacier will be shown along with a view of Mt. McKinley. Shelley also visits Western Alaska to visit the Eskimo village of Bethal along the Bering Sea.

The climax of the film takes the viewer back in the Brooks River Country with its fishing camps. Shelley also has flown into the bear country and has films of the Alaskan Brown Bear, some as close as 40 yards. 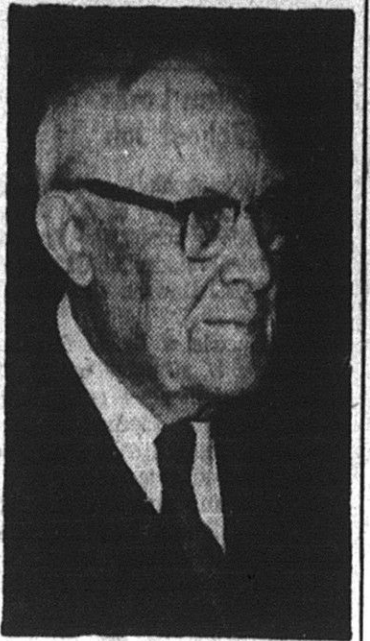

As usual, the calendar provides for 33 weeks of teaching and 180 days of teaching or days which may be counted as taught. This is a State Department of Public Instruction requirement so that schools can qualify for state aid.

Supt. Walter Scott presented a report of the Citizens School committee on expenditures for the Feb. 23 school-bond issue which carried. Total disbursements amounted to \$867.36 for election promotion. The superintendent also read a communication from Bohn Aluminum Co. offering to sell its building and property on the south side of 24th St. to the school at an agreed price of \$34,775.48, provided the company retains possession of the building one year after date of sale. The administration is working on final details.

A communication from Willard C. Wichers, chairman of the Planning Commission, called attention to the revised city plan providing for orderly development of annexed areas. Thirty copies were included.

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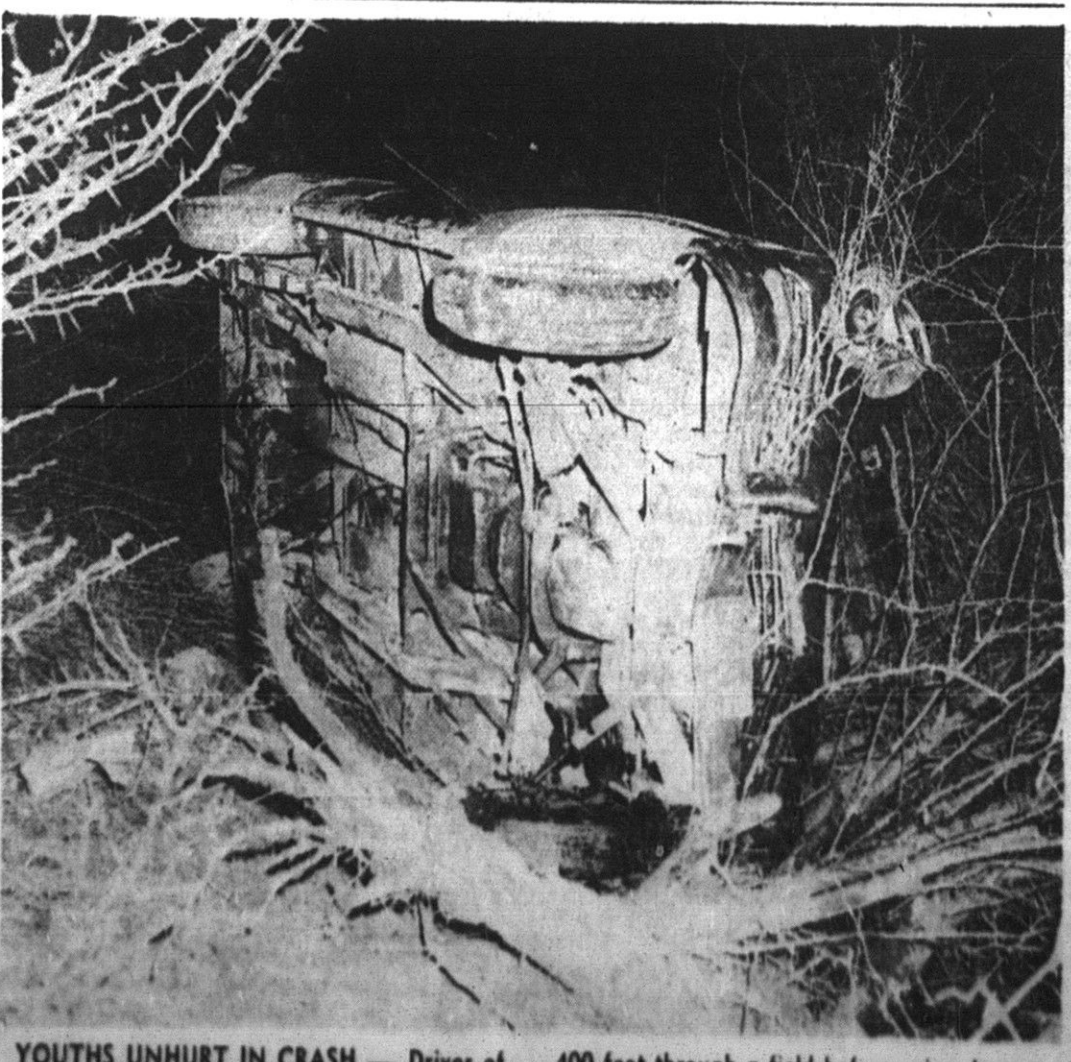
