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Mrs. Michigan Talented Mother Of 10 Children

Bubbling with excitement and radiating personality plus, Mrs. Gary W. Vreeman of 1422 South Shore Dr. graciously answered telephone call after telephone call and modestly accepted best wishes on being named Mrs. Michigan of 1966.

The 38-year-old mother of 10 who resembles a college coed was selected by judges in the Mrs. America headquarters in Chicago from a strong field of candidates including Mrs. Randall E. Phillips of Flint who was named first runner-up and Mrs. Frank Wassenaar of Alma who was named second runner-up.

As Mrs. Michigan, Wilhelmina or Nickie as she is better known, and her husband who is principal of Rose Park Christian School, will be guests at the pageant finals in San Diego, Calif., April 29 through May 8 where Mrs. America will be selected.

Competing for the Mrs. America diadem will be the champion homemakers of each of the other 49 states and the District of Columbia.

The vivacious Mrs. Vreeman not only runs her household in an orderly fashion and expertly handles a daily radio program but also finds time for heavy participation in civic and cultural activities not to exclude her many hobbies of sewing, knitting, handicraft of all sorts, color photography, writing, painting and playing the organ and piano.

She lightly commented she does eight loads of washing every day and that ironing is her favorite occupation. She said her day often begins between 4 and 5 a.m. and she's really going at 9:40 a.m. when she does her broadcast "Who's New in the Nursery."

At 10:05 a.m. daily she does "her own" radio program, "Your Neighbors Kitchen," direct from her home whereby she visits with the listeners over coffee, reading poetry, news, commenting on fashions, conducting interviews or "whatever I feel like doing."

And whatever she does, she does well with apparent ease. During the summer when the entire Vreeman family operates the Christian Reformed Conference Grounds near Grand Haven, it's Mrs. Vreeman who makes barbecue, potato salad and baked beans using her own recipe that yields 200 pounds of barbecue and an equal quantity of potato salad and baked beans.

Her children's food tastes are numerous and diversified, but her favorite recipe, as revealed by Mrs. America headquarters, is Oriental beef patties, which she includes in an ideal dinner menu complete with tossed salad with croutons and Roquefort dressing, scalloped cheese potatoes or rice, green beans with mushrooms and bacon, biscuits, beverage and fruit compote.

When asked of her educational background, Mrs. Vreeman, a native of Zeeland, replied, "I have the type of liberal education that comes with coaxing and quizzing a husband through 10 years of summer school. When Gary was going to summer school I would read everything he had to and more." A compulsive reader, Mrs. Vreeman said she reads everything she gets her hands on including labels on bottles and cans.

The pert and chic Mrs. Michigan also finds time to be an active member of the Holland Hospital Auxiliary, serves on the Citizens Committee for the Promotion of Decent Literature and makes several speaking appearances for church and civic groups in addition to giving book reviews.

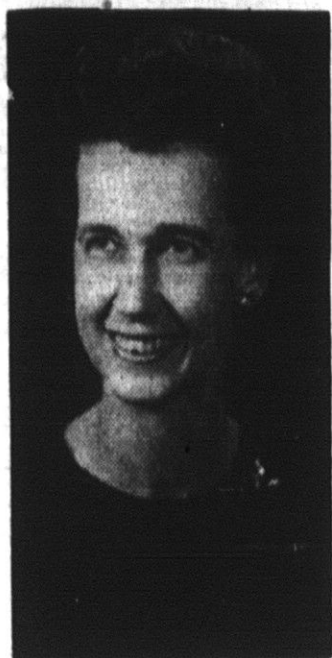
The sparkle in her eyes takes on an added glow when it comes to her family of five boys and five girls — Willie, 18; Betty, 16; Jerry, 15; Jane, 14; Thomas, 12; Mary, 11; Steven, 9; Frederick, 7; Joel, 5, and Joan, 4.

All of the children have assigned duties as marked on the duty roster which is changed every month. Assignments include the host or hostess who must set the table and serve the food and the dish doers. Mrs. Vreeman makes the chart and always includes a saying or quotation on it.

Somewhere on each chart is the word "smile" because, as Mrs. Vreeman pointed out, "duties always go better with a smile." The children each take care of their own rooms in addition to making beds, sweeping and other little cleaning duties.

When Mrs. Vreeman and her husband arrive in Los Angeles at the end of the month, Mrs. Vreeman will receive her crown and sash for the Mrs. America competition as well as the key to the city from the mayor.

In addition to the interviews of husbands and wives by the full panel of judges, Mrs. Vreeman will compete in a safe-driving event, luggage-packing, flower-arranging, interior design, baked dessert events and a homemakers forum.

But it doesn't end there! Also on schedule is the child communication event in which contestants must communicate with a 5-year-old stranger for five minutes, the grocery shopping event in which each contestant is given \$10 to purchase food for dinner for six as well as preparing and serving it.

There is also the laundry event which involves ironing a white shirt, the hostess-at-home event, the creative-expression event and the money-management quiz.

That's what the competition involves for the nation's outstanding homemaker but regardless of the outcome, Mrs. Vreeman provides a yardstick of excellence in her duties as wife, mother and community leader.

Saugatuck, Douglas Set Alert Friday

SAUGATUCK — A practice tornado alert will be held in the Saugatuck-Douglas area on Friday sometime between 5 and 8 p.m., Fred Koning, area Civil Defense Director, announced today.

Koning said the practice alert will start with the sirens sounding in both villages and they will run in a series of cycles. At the end of each cycle, the sirens will stop for approximately one minute and then start again. This will continue for a period of not less than five minutes.

In addition to the sirens, police cars from both villages and Civil Defense cars will assist by driving up and down the streets and sounding their sirens.

Families in homes are asked to participate when the sirens are sounded by going to the southwest corner of their basements.

The practice alert on Friday will last between 20 and 30 minutes.

Byron Anteliff, superintendent of schools, said that a letter was sent to parents this week explaining the procedure in case a tornado "watch" is announced while school is in session. Children will be sent home immediately if a "watch" is announced by the weather bureau.

Sheriff's Work Week Is Reduced

GRAND HAVEN — Additional funds and three additional officers for the sheriff's department were approved Wednesday by the Ottawa County Board of Supervisors.

A 44-hour week instead of a 48-hour week was authorized requiring three more men. There currently are two vacancies on the staff and the board voted to transfer \$11,856 from the contingency fund to pay the added help.

The board also approved payment of \$994 in expenses to former Deputies Roy Shields and Ron Van Haver who recently were defendants in a Circuit Court suit brought by a Kent county man who charged illegal arrest and imprisonment. A verdict of "no cause" was rendered. The expenses involved travel fare for Shields, now an officer in California, and lawyers' fees.

Glenn Timmer of Holland, acting director of Civil Defense, was named director for two years.

Supervisor Henry Slaughter of Lamont was given a standing ovation by the board after Chairman Herman Windemuller announced Slaughter was awarded a plaque by the Michigan Association of Supervisors for his 38 years of service on the Ottawa board.

William Koop of Holland, chairman of the equalization committee, said committee meetings are scheduled today, Friday and Monday, and the report will be presented to the board April 19.

The building and grounds committee submitted plans for revamping the county building square and landscaping to be completed after the old court house and jail are removed. The plans were referred to the improvement committee for further study and additional parking space.

The board adopted a resolution by the contractors steering committee seeking alteration or repeal of act 383 which requires licensing and bonding of residential builders.

Windemuller appointed Drain Commissioner Roscoe De Vries, Robert Murray of Coopersville and former Supervisor William Kennedy of Allendale to the Grand River watershed council and to attend an organization meeting April 20 in Lansing Civic Center.

School Vote Set June 13

Two school board members whose terms expire this year announced Monday night that they will not be seeking reelection in the annual school election June 13. The retiring members, William Gargano and Albert Schaafsma, are completing four-year terms.

To qualify as candidate, the person must live in the school district, must be a taxpayer (or husband or wife of such a taxpayer) and must have not less than 50 signatures of qualified electors on petitions.

Deadline for filing petitions with the secretary of the board is 4 p.m. Saturday, May 14.

Those eligible to sign petitions are legal residents of the district, 21 years of age, resident of the state six months and resident of the district 30 days. No elector should sign petitions for more candidates than are to be elected.

Petitions are available from the school superintendent's office at 61 West 16th St.

The Board of Education at its monthly meeting Monday night voted to ask the city clerk to conduct the election.

Holland township firemen put out a grass fire that burned about one-half acre at 2361 136th Ave. Monday.

The fire, which started from some trash burning in a barrel was reported about 10:15 a.m. The blaze was extinguished in about 20 minutes.

Police Arrest Teen After Wild Chase

Mary Ann Froncek, 19, of 29 East 16th St. pleaded not guilty at her arraignment Tuesday in Municipal Court on a charge of illegal transportation of alcoholic beverages.

Her trial was set for April 19. She was released on \$100 bond. Miss Froncek may also be charged with other offenses later, according to Holland police.

She was apprehended by Holland police early this morning after a high-speed chase and a scuffle with several officers.

The chase started when a patrolman noticed the pickup truck she was driving did not have red tail light covers. He stopped the truck at 16th and Central Ave.

The officer noticed a sack of beer cans in the car, and attempted to arrest the girl. She then drove away at a high rate of speed.

Miss Froncek's truck was finally stopped after a chase of several miles over city streets by several police cruisers.

During the chase at speeds in excess of 80 miles per hour she allegedly ran six stop signs and a red flasher. She allegedly drove over a curb and across a portion of lawn to avoid a police roadblock set up on 24th St. near Columbia Ave.

Police finally stopped the car behind 283 West Ninth St.

She reportedly struggled with several officers, and was handcuffed and placed in a police cruiser.

When they arrived at the police headquarters she attempted to escape by running away. She was apprehended again near Seventh St. and River Ave.

She was then placed in a cell after struggling with police officers.

Kramer is charged for an incident involving a 15-year-old youth which occurred April 9.

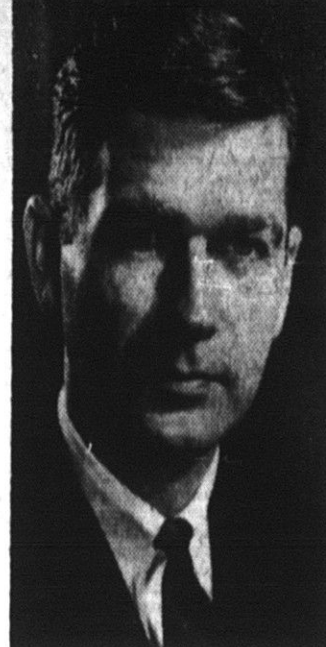

GRAND HAVEN — Gov. Mark O. Hatfield of Oregon will come to Ottawa county June 6 to address a \$50-a-plate Republican fund raising dinner at the Spring Lake Country Club.

The goal is 300 reservations, according to Marion A. Sherwood, chairman of the Republican finance committee. George Heeringa of Holland is finance chairman for the southern half.

Gov. Hatfield, who took office as governor of Oregon in 1959 at the age of 35, currently is a candidate for the U.S. Senate in Oregon.

A World War II veteran, Hatfield served with the U.S. Navy in amphibious attack craft in the south Pacific at Iwo Jima and Okinawa.

In 1960 he nominated Richard Nixon for president at the national convention. He served as convention keynote in 1964. He is married and has four children.

Hamilton Men In Service

HAMILTON — Two rural Hamilton men, Marine Pvt. David L. Ende and Fireman Apprentice Roger Lee Gates, are serving in the armed forces.

Ende, son of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Ende of route 1, Hamilton, was graduated from Marine recruit training at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot at San Diego, Calif.

During his eight weeks of intensified recruit training under veteran non-commissioned officer drill instructors, he learned small arms marksmanship, bayonet fighting and methods of self protection.

He also received instructions in military drill, history and traditions of the Marine Corps and other academic subjects. He underwent four weeks of individual combat training and four weeks of basic specialist training in his military occupational field before being assigned to a permanent unit. Ende was a 1965 graduate of Hamilton High School.

Gates, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Gates, Sr., of route 1, Hamilton, departed from Norfolk, Va., while serving aboard the amphibious force flagship USS Pocono. The ship will participate in an amphibious operation off Onslow Bay, N.C., and then to Miami, Fla., for a few days of relaxation. Gates is a 1965 Martin High School graduate.

Cliff Brough and Miss Mary Pearson of Yorkshire, England, are spending a few days at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Teusink, 1181 West 32nd St. During their stay they plan to make a trip to the Straits. Mr. Brough is a cousin of Mrs. Teusink, who is a former native of England.

Christian Okays New High School

The Holland Christian School Board of Trustees authorized construction to begin immediately of the new Christian High School at a total cost of \$1,219,015 at a special meeting held Wednesday night.

In its final action the board awarded the general construction contract to the Lamar Construction Co. of Holland. The Reimink Plumbing and Heating Co. was given the contract for the mechanical installation, and Parkway Electric, the electric work.

The breakdown of the figures showed \$796,922 for general construction, \$299,473 for plumbing and heating, and \$122,620 for electrical.

"The \$1,219,015 figure is a guaranteed maximum for the basic construction. Savings to be effected by possible modifications will go entirely to the school," Superintendent Mark Vander Ark reported.

Alternate plans for increasing pipe size to allow for later air conditioning, and for use of more terrazzo floor finish are now under study and would of course add to the final contract figure, Vander Ark said.

Hil Buurma, chairman of the planning committee, reported that the contract figure was less than the estimate of \$1,250,000. The figure breaks down to \$11.60 per square foot, Buurma said. Site development, equipment and fees are figured at \$200,000, it was reported.

Buurma reported that the board had previously selected three contractors to negotiate building agreements on a cost of materials and time basis. These contractors had been instructed to submit guaranteed maximum costs to fulfill architectural specification with the understanding that modifications

in construction could be negotiated without penalty to the builder, if necessary.

Site improvement and construction is to begin immediately, with July 1, 1967, the due date on completion, Vander Ark said. Classes will be held in the building beginning September 1967, it was reported.

The new structure will be built on 40th St. and Ottawa Ave. It is being built to house 1,000 students and will include 32 classrooms, a library, an auditorium to seat 800, a gymnasium to seat 3,000 and a cafeteria. The plan allows for a simple addition of extra classrooms.

Present at the contract signing, besides the board, were Ben Altena, William Vogelzang, principal Raymond Holwerda, all members of the planning committee. Others at the meeting were architect James K. Haveman, engineer Joe Appell, Russ Lamar, Jerry Petroelje of the Reimink Co., and Elton Achterhof of Parkway Electric.

Mother and 5 Children Escape Fire

ALLENDALE — A mother and her five children escaped without injury from their blazing home at 11281 40th Ave., Allendale township, at 11 p.m. Wednesday.

Mrs. Eva Holmes was awakened by Mr. and Mrs. John Hemphill of Grand Valley State College who were driving by the home, and she woke her five children, three boys, 15, 14 and 12, and two daughters, 10 and 9. They escaped in their night clothes. All other clothing and contents of the home were destroyed in the blaze. No estimate was given.

Fire departments of Allendale, Wright, Tallmadge and Georgetown townships responded. No estimate was given of the loss which is not covered by insurance. The blaze was believed caused by an overheated furnace.

Neighbors have started a drive for clothing and household furnishings which may be brought to Ensing Standard station, corner M-45 and 68th Ave., in Allendale.

World Group May Visit Tulip Time

A group of International visitors who will be in Michigan the week before Michigan Week May 15-21 may pay a visit to Holland during Tulip Time, the visit coinciding with Gov. Romney's appearance here on the first day of the festival May 11.

Richard H. McManus of Southfield, Mich., one of three co-chairmen under Romney for Michigan Week, was in Holland Wednesday discussing the possibilities of including Holland in the itinerary of 20 to 30 persons from countries all over the world who will be touring the state as a World Preview of Michigan Week, a special event of the Greater Michigan Foundation.

If plans can be worked out, the visitors would be guests at the luncheon honoring Gov. Romney in Civic Center and would witness first-day festival events which include the age-old rite of street scrubbing.

The international party will be spending the week touring Michigan, much of the time in the Detroit area, but also touring the Upper Peninsula and other cities. They will be guests at an International Dinner in Detroit May 16.

Judy Six Will Attend Horizon Conference

Miss Judy Six, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Russel Six of Holland, will join some 1,000 students from 35 states in the Camp Fire Girls Horizon Club Conference Aloft July 8-28.

The conference will be held aboard the chartered M-S Aurelia and is sponsored by Camp Fire Girls, Inc., in cooperation with the Council on Student Travel.

The girls will spend three days and two nights each in San Juan, Puerto Rico; Kingston, Jamaica, and Cartagena, Columbia.

On shipboard, a full program of workshops and seminars will reinforce previous study in Latin-American geography, history, economics, current events, arts and crafts, music and the dance and conversational Spanish. The girls will hold discussions on Horizon Club special interest, publish a daily newspaper and make a photographic record of the conference.

Cook Quits As Board Chairman

Herman Windemuller Of Park Township Is Elected Chairman

GRAND HAVEN — In a surprise move before the Ottawa county Board of Supervisors Tuesday, the resignation of Richard L. Cook of Grand Haven as board chairman was announced. Cook is recuperating from a serious illness in Grand Rapids.

Herman Windemuller of Park township, vice chairman for the past year, was elected chairman and City Assessor George Wessel of Grand Haven was elected vice chairman.

Following announcement of an offer of Titus W. Hager of Grand Rapids of 25 acres of land adjacent to the present Hager Hardwood Park on Bauer Rd. in Georgetown township, the board authorized the Road Commission to continue its study and to seek funds to finance the expansion from federal sources, foundations, cities nearby, Ottawa county, adjacent counties and private gifts.

The gift is contingent on naming the development Hager Hardwood Arboretum. Architects already have designed plans for the development of the area and slides of the proposed park, buildings and plantings were shown to the board. Neal Van Leeuwen of Spring Lake, a member of the commission, presented the report, mentioning that Hager already had given the county a large tract of forest land near Hudsonville for park purposes.

Estimated cost of construction would be \$724,700, according to architects. The development would include parking lots, paths, walls of fieldstone, amphitheatre, astronomy center, garden areas, greenhouses, ornamental horticulture and floriculture areas, a map of the United States with perimeter fencing, and about 1,000 trees.

Grand Haven City Clerk J. Nyhof Poel was given permission to use the basement of the county building as a polling place for the No. 1 precinct which formerly used the city library. This precinct will use the new community center on Columbus St. after it is completed in 1967.

The board passed a resolution urging Council to retain its present traffic pattern on Franklin St., a one-way street.

A resolution calling for a regional sanitation planning group was adopted by the board following a presentation by the road commission and the water and sanitation committee. Sanitation Engineer Walter Russell explained the need for the new group which will include representatives of the road and sanitation committee and the chairman of the Board of Supervisors. The road commission recently made a study of a sewer plan for Marne in Wright township and said a central organization was needed to obtain federal grants.

An offer of Spring Lake village to lease seven acres of village property near the new M-104 bridge, provided the area is used for a park, was referred to the committee on roads.

The Road Commission presented its program for 1967 which lists a budget of \$80,000 for improvements and maintenance of five county parks. Engineer-Manager William Osner reviewed the 1967 construction program and said a new \$25,000 bridge over Gidley bayou in Grand Haven will be built this year. A total of \$620,000 is budgeted for highway improvements in 1967.

South Ottawa projects include Port Sheldon St. from 72nd Ave. west 2.5 miles paving, \$40,000; 136th Ave. from Butternut to Quincy St., widening and resurfacing, \$115,000; Crosswell St. from US-31 to Lake Shore Dr., resurfacing, \$50,000.

Firemen Put Out Three Grass Fires

Firemen in the Holland area extinguished three grass fires today and Wednesday.

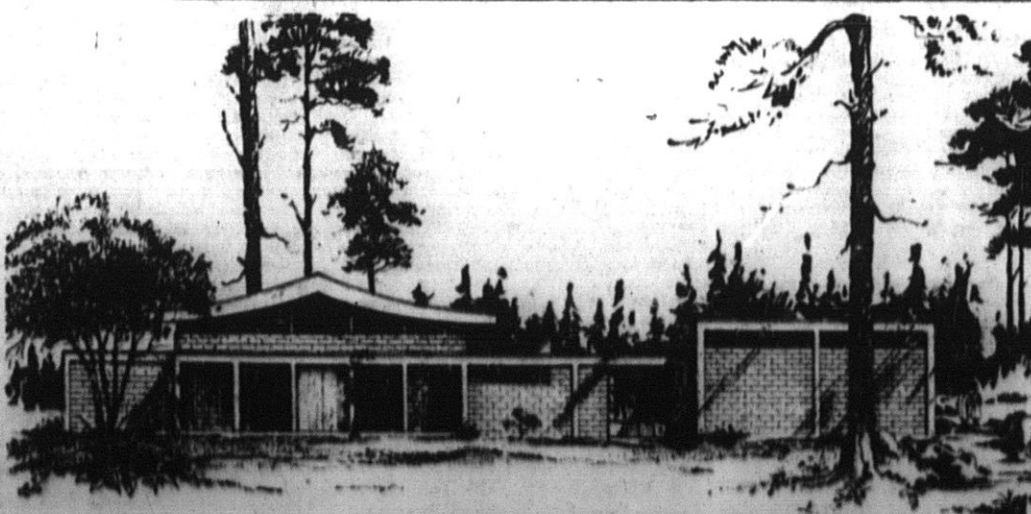
Port Sheldon township and Holland township firemen put out a blaze which burned about eight acres on Van Buren St. east of Butternut Dr. Wednesday afternoon.

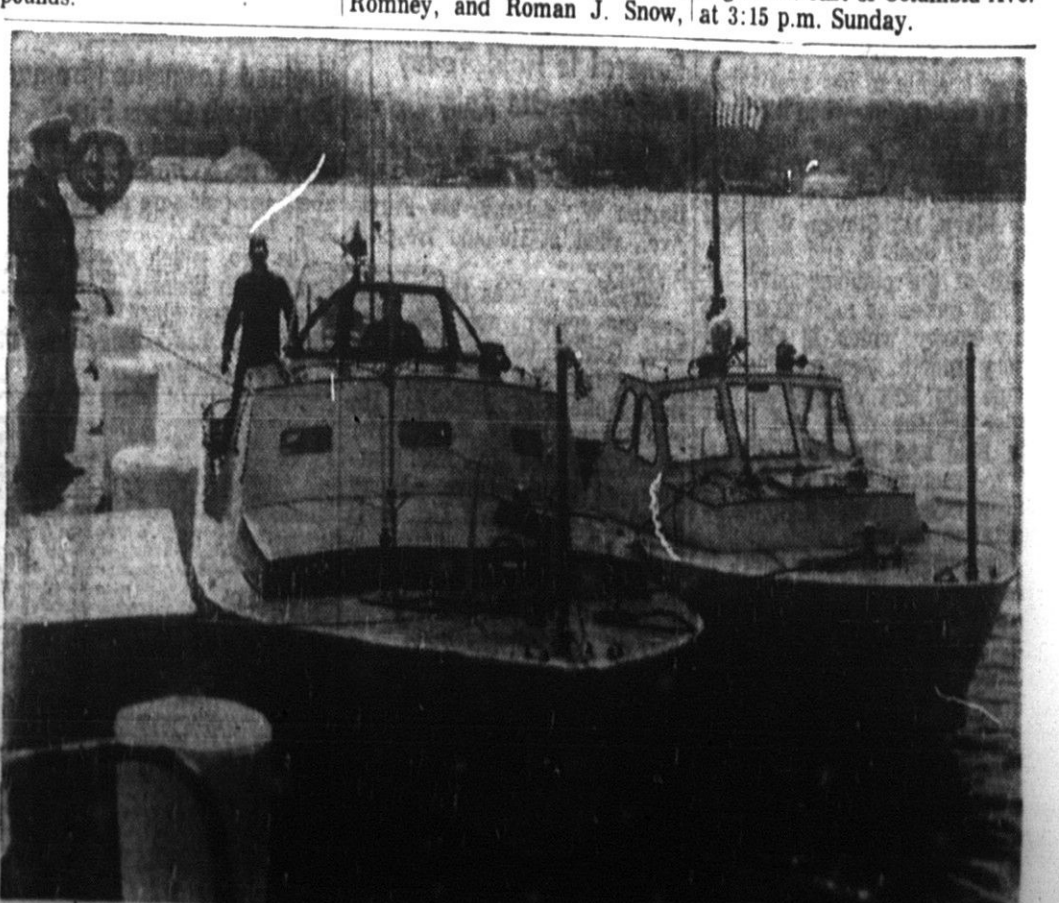

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, April 17
The Kingdom is Divided
1 Kings 12:1-5, 16-20
By C. P. Dame

This lesson is the first of 11 that deal with the history of Israel from the division of the kingdom to the fall of Jerusalem. This series of lessons should give much opportunity for discussion since we are living in a time when nations face many problems which godlessness creates.

I. Some fathers are foolish. A father, named Solomon, in his writings warned many times against playing the fool or dealing with one. Solomon is known for his wisdom. Some one rightly called him a wise fool. After the death of Solomon, his son Rehoboam "went to Shechem: for all Israel were come to Shechem to make him king." The son faced a difficult situation. People were tired of paying heavy taxes. The people's money had been spent in the erection of luxurious buildings, in pomp and splendor, and in extravagant court living.

Solomon was a busy father. The affairs of state demanded much attention. Now a person usually has time for anything he really wants to do. Solomon had time for his horses, merchants, fleet, builders, and the women of his harem but he took no time to prepare and train his son for the kingship. He was like far too many fathers who are successful in business but are failures as parents. That is the reason why the sons and daughters become delinquent.

II. Some sons are foolish. The nation was restless and divided. The north and the south never got along real well. Rehoboam realized this and that is why he went to Shechem to meet the people who were there ready to make their complaints and demand. Jeroboam who had once been a foreman of labor gangs in the days of Solomon, but who objected to Solomon's policies and fled to Egypt, was on hand.

Rehoboam heard the demand of the people for lighter taxes. The young man told the people to come back in three days. This was a blunder. He should have granted them their demand and thus he would have won them over. During the three days the young man sought counsel from the older men and they told him to grant the people's request and be a servant to the people.

Then the king asked the young men with whom he had grown up, the smart alecks, and they told him to tell the people that he would make their taxes heavier. The king did not ask God. Foolishly he heeded the counsel of the young men and lost the allegiance of ten tribes. A few words can be costly.

A fool usually makes more than one unwise step. When Rehoboam saw the people going away from him he sent "Adoram, who was taskmaster over the forced labor" workers, most likely the most hated man in the nation, after the people. When the people saw him they stoned him to death. When the young king saw this, he had sense enough to flee to Jerusalem in his chariot as fast as possible. Jeroboam, the son of a widow, an able and energetic man was chosen king by the ten tribes. Only Judah and Benjamin remained loyal to Rehoboam. One foolish, unprepared, untrained leader divided a nation by his folly. The father had prepared the nation for a rebellion but he had not trained his son for the position that awaited him. The foolish father and the foolish son were to blame. The deep reason for the division of the nation was godlessness.

J. Trim Named Dairy Inspector

GRAND HAVEN — A former sanitarian for three northern counties, James A. Trim of 317 South Third St. Grand Haven, has been assigned to dairy inspection work in Ottawa County by the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

He was assigned by the department's Dairy Division. He previously served as county sanitarian in Chippewa, Luce and Mackinac counties.

The Michigan Department of Agriculture's Dairy Division is responsible for enforcement of all the state's dairy statutes plus department regulations. These cover all phases of the dairy industry from the production of milk on the farm through all channels of trade to the retail level.

Michigan was the first state to have compulsory milk pasteurization, and other laws over the years have kept Michigan among the leaders in progressive dairy legislation.

Next July 1 the state's uniform dairy inspection law will become effective. This will place all dairy inspection in the state under the Michigan Department of Agriculture thus avoiding costly duplications in inspection that have existed in the past. Dairy products that have been approved may move anywhere in the state without further inspection.



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EMPHASIZING CAUTION

Every driver who has tried to beat the yellow caution light of a traffic signal will appreciate the efforts of James Hines. He is producing, and now has ready for sale, a traffic signal which allows a driver to know how long the caution light is going to stay on. No more guessing, no more getting caught in the intersection just as the red signal turns against you.

Mr. Hines' light works like this. A few seconds before the green signal is about to go off a bright 9 (for 9 seconds) appears on the caution light. Then it ticks down to one at one second intervals — 8, 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2, 1. Then the entire caution light lights up for three seconds. Then the red light comes on. This gives the motorist a good chance to judge whether he can make it through the intersection safely or not.

Abilene, Texas, has tried the signal on one of its worst intersections for nine months and was so well satisfied with the results that it is buying another \$6,000 worth to try on other bad corners. If it works for Abilene it's likely to work anywhere. And if a new light can save lives, then we should investigate the Abilene, Texas program, then give the light a trial run.

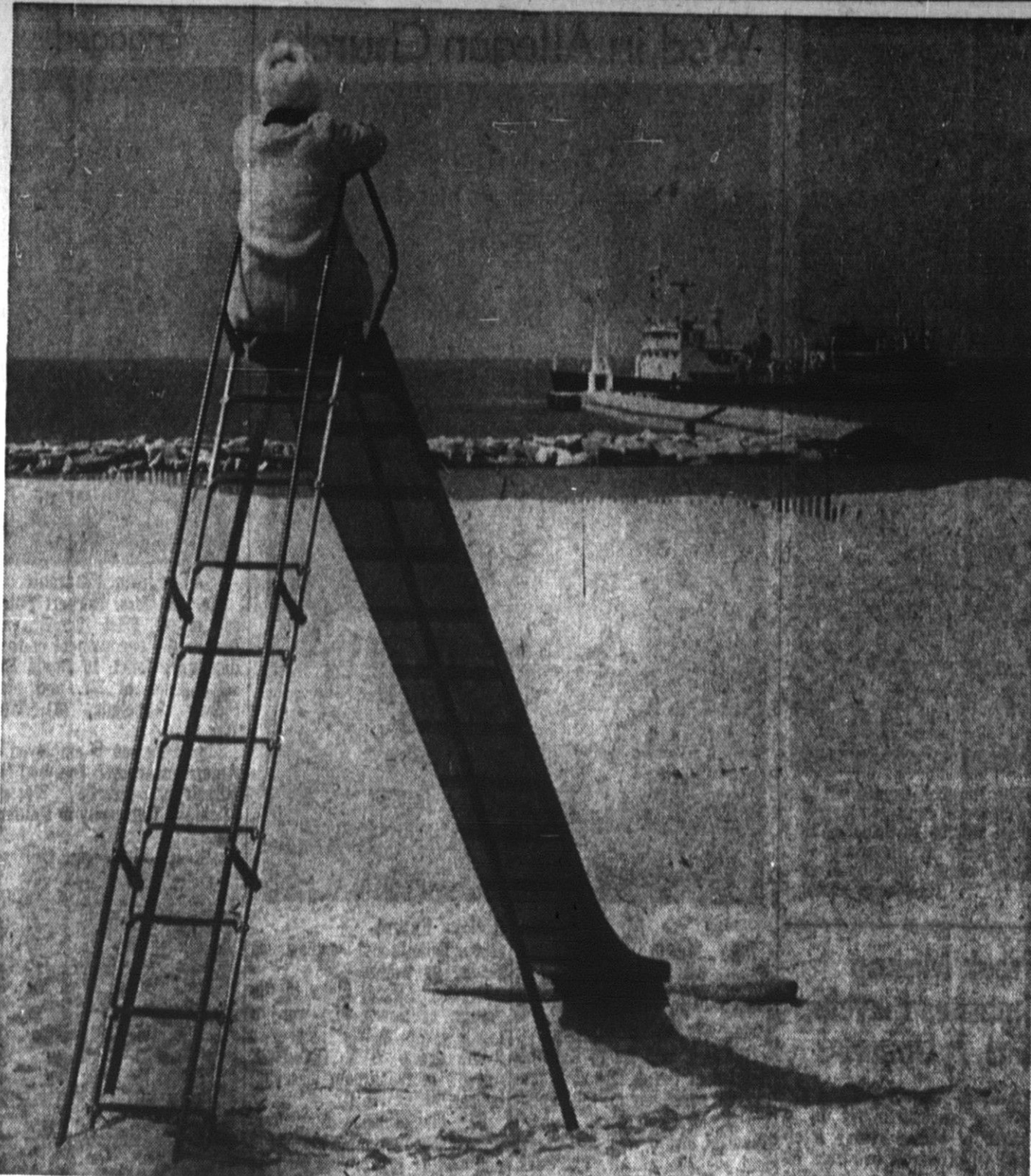

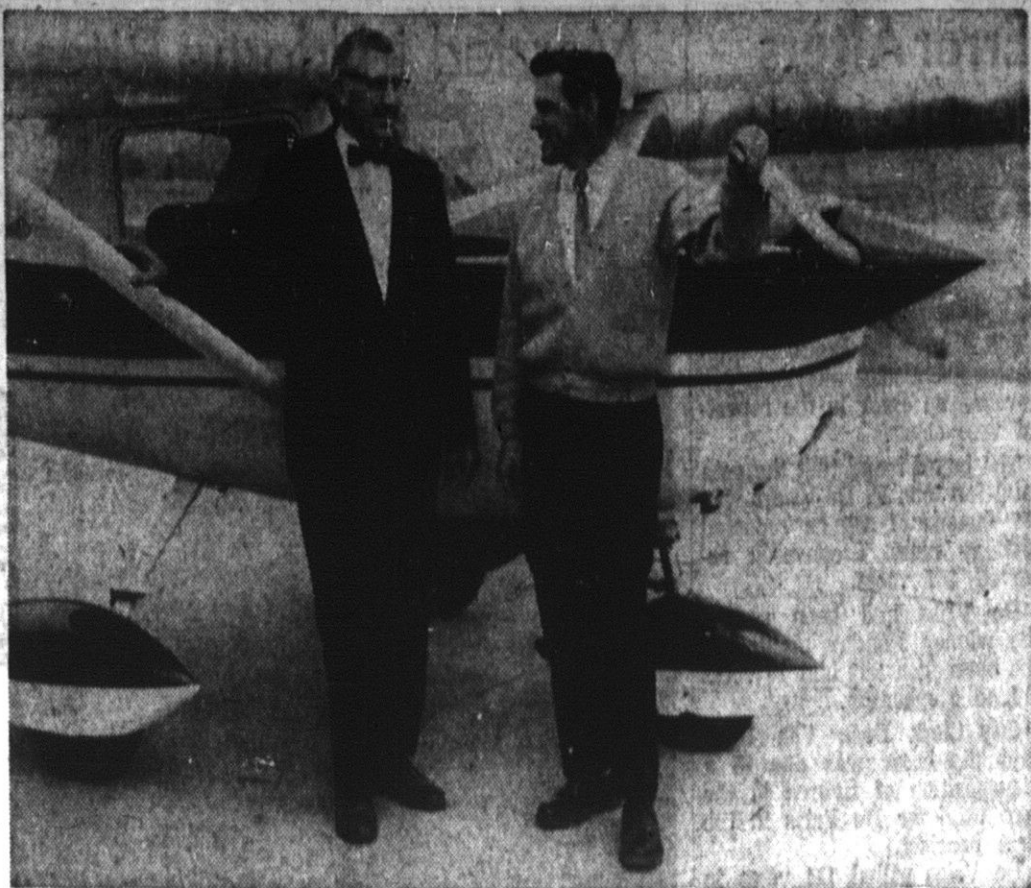

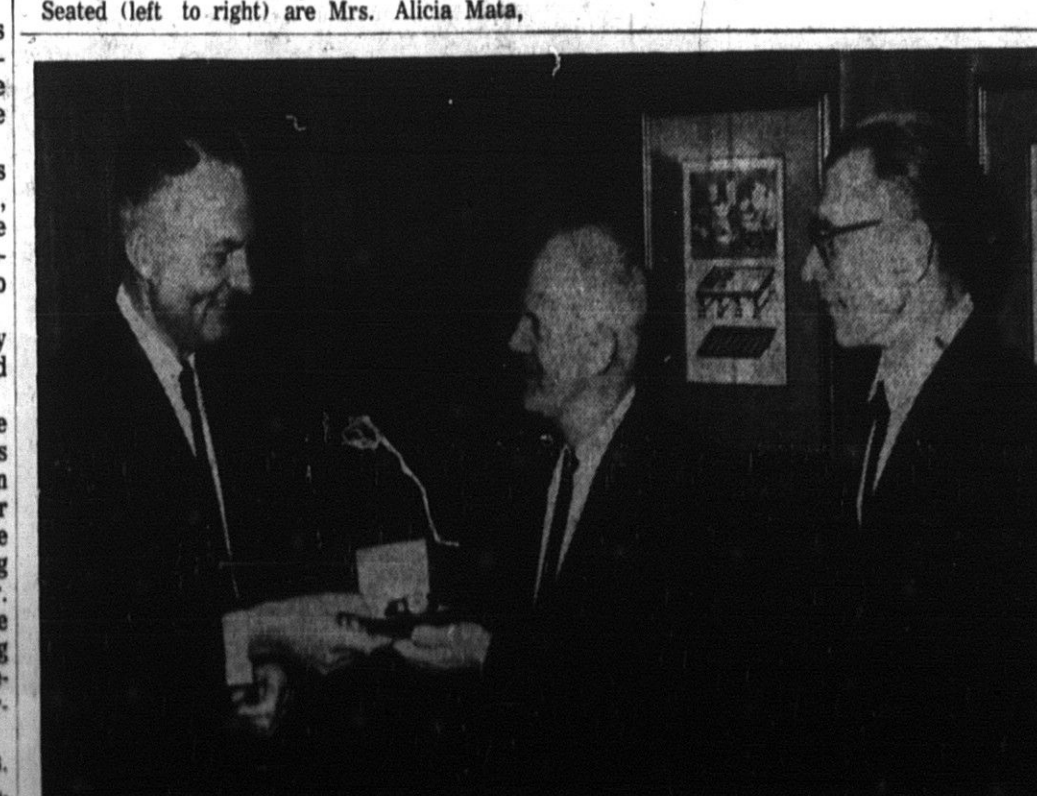

Israeli Couple Visiting Holland

The spaciousness of America in general and Holland, Mich., in particular is the greatest single impression of two Israeli relatives of the Padnos families who are spending a week in Holland on their first trip to America.

Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Katz of Haifa, a large port city on the Mediterranean in Israel, are house guests of Mr. and Mrs. Stuart Padnos, who with their three sons visited the Katzes in Israel two years ago. Haifa is about 100 miles from Jerusalem.

Katz, who speaks excellent English, explained that there are 2½ million people from 70 different lands living in the tiny country of Israel of 8,000 square miles, or about one-seventh the size of Michigan. A city of 30,000 inhabitants in Israel would cover considerably less than one-quarter the size of Holland, he said.

Yet, despite the limitations of space, the fledgling nation is prosperous and progressive, and its accomplishments can well be envied by nations older and larger.

Mrs. Katz is a Sabra, a native of Israel. Her husband was four when his family went to Israel from Poland. Mrs. Katz' father is a first cousin of Stuart and Seymour Padnos of Holland. Her brother, Yecheskal Padnos, is arriving in Holland Saturday to spend the weekend here.

The Katzes speak English, German, Hebrew and Arabic, but Hebrew is their native tongue. Mrs. Katz was hesitant in speaking English when the Padnoses visited Israel two years ago, but since then has learned considerably more.

At home, Katz works in plastics, both in design and production, and has been involved in about 150 items, many of them home articles. He was particularly interested in the Sentinel's Fairchild engraving machine in which photographs are etched in plastic in a matter of minutes.

Yes, there remains a good deal of unrest in Israel, the Katzes admitted. A good share of it is traditional springing from age-old differences with the Arabs. Resentment over the history. And the tv docu-carving the tiny state back in 1948 is far from forgotten, and certain envy over achievements is ever present.

Yet with all these complications, Katz said he has many friends among the Arabs, stemming back from the days long before the emergence of Israel as a state. Of the 2½ million persons in Israel, 350,000 are non-Jews, mostly Arabs. He estimated this number includes some 70,000 Protestants.

Katz said the Leon Uris book of Exodus on the plight of the Jews and the birth of the new nation was a fairly accurate picture of the story of the Jews, but glossed over much of the unpleasantness that went with the story.

Mr. and Mrs. Katz are planning to spend the rest of their visit in Holland, and will be in the country for about a week.

The Hamilton band program is under the direction of George Smart.

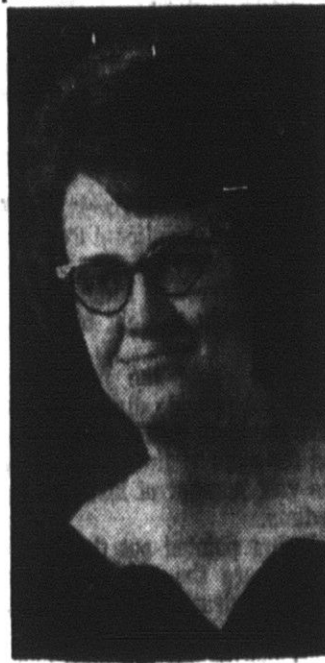

Give Report At March of Dimes Meet

ALLENDALE — Hanne Meyers Jr., campaign chairman for the 1966 March of Dimes campaign in Ottawa County, announced Monday night that a total of \$34,653.19 has been collected for the campaign.

Meyers made the announcement at the annual dinner meeting of the Ottawa County chapter of the March of Dimes at the Allendale Town Hall.

Aud Petroelje, campaign chairman for the south half of the county, reported that \$19,591.35 was collected in the southern part of the county. Mrs. William Sheraton, campaign chairman for the north half, reported that \$15,061.84 was collected in the northern part.

The goal for the campaign was \$35,000, but more money is expected to be collected to bring the total nearer the goal.

The total collected in Holland and Park Township area was \$11,260.

The chapter elected six new members of the board of directors. Named to three-year terms on the board were Mrs. Willis Wolters, Verne Kupelian, Roger Stroh, Earl Rhodes, Mrs. Hazel Ver Hoven and Mrs. Henry Mast.

Dale Boehm, midwest area director of the National Foundation of the March of Dimes, outlined the March of Dimes three-part program to fight birth defects.

Boehm said the foundation could not provide direct patient care for birth defect cases as it did for polio victims because of the vast number of birth defect victims.

Boehm pointed out that birth defects are the second largest cause of deaths in the United States. More than 250,000 American babies are born each year with serious physical or mental birth defects. Nearly one in 10 families has a birth defect child, Boehm said.

Because of the scope of the problem the foundation is seeking to help the greatest number through research into the causes and cures, Boehm said.

Currently, the foundation is seeking to help develop a vaccine for German measles. By immunizing expectant mothers against German measles many birth defects could be prevented, Boehm said. The foundation is supporting four research projects on measles vaccine.

The second way in which the foundation is fighting birth defects is with comprehensive care for severe cases, Boehm said. The foundation has 69 centers throughout the country for care of birth defect patients. There is a center in Ann Arbor and an evaluation center in Grand Rapids.

The third program in the fight against birth defects is education, Boehm said. The foundation is trying to inform school children, business leaders, labor leaders, government officials and the general public on the problem.

A major goal of the education is to inform expectant mothers of the importance of medical care before the birth of the child. This is one way in which the number of birth defects can be reduced, he said.
