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## Police Seek Visitors To Apartment

Holland police Tuesday appealed to two friends of David Jansen who went to his apartment Saturday afternoon to check on him to contact detectives investigating Jansen's death.

Jansen's body was found Sunday inside a closed and unused refrigerator in a closet area of the apartment at 337½ Pine Ave. Death was attributed to asphyxiation and police said they believed Jansen had pulled the door shut after he crawled inside the refrigerator.

Police Det. Lt. Marty Hardenberg said Jansen, 29, had been seen in Saugatuck Thursday and had attempted to visit his estranged wife at about 6 p.m. Thursday.

Occupants of the ground floor apartment where Jansen lived reported hearing Jansen's truck arrive late Thursday and someone in Jansen's apartment.

Jansen's body was found Sunday afternoon by other friends who came to check on him. A glass window in a door to the apartment was removed to gain entry.

Police said friends checking on Jansen Saturday removed the same glass window in the door, entered the apartment and apparently finding no trace of Jansen, left the apartment and talked with the downstairs occupants.

Officers would like to make contact with the Saturday visitors.

Police said an autopsy Monday indicated time of death was Thursday night or early Friday but the exact time was undetermined.

## Faces Charge In Assault

ALLEGAN — Clayton Denny, 26, of Fennville, was held in the Allegan County jail under \$5,000 bond today to await a hearing Tuesday on charges of unarmed robbery in connection with an alleged assault last week on a Douglas woman.

Injured was Mrs. Mary Curtis, 58, of 70th St., Pier Cove. She was treated at Douglas Community Hospital for head lacerations, bruises and broken fingers of the left hand.

State Police at South Haven said an intruder entered the Curtis home shortly before midnight April 3 and demanded money. Mrs. Curtis was assaulted in the dining room area of her home and the intruder took an undetermined amount of money before fleeing. Troopers said Mrs. Curtis was struck with a blunt instrument.

Denny was arrested later April 3 at his home. He demanded examination to a charge of breaking and entering and unarmed robbery.

Troopers said Denny was acquainted with Mrs. Curtis and had done some work for her at one time.

Denny is employed in the Fennville area.

## One-Way Street Petitions Have Valid Signatures

A check of signatures on petitions seeking the recall of one-way streets in Holland has revealed a sufficient number of valid signatures, City Clerk Donald W. Schipper said today. The petitions will be presented to City Council at its regular meeting April 19.

Schipper said of the 1,628 signatures, 1,475 were valid. The needed number of valid signatures was 1,455.

The drive to recall one-way streets was spearheaded by Mrs. William Westrate Jr. of Holland.

## Holland Hosts Water Meeting



## School Bus Rolls, Students Injured

COOPERSVILLE — A Coopersville public school bus carrying 37 children ranging in ages from 7 to 14 years rolled over at 69th Ave. south of I-96 in Polkton township Monday at 3:48 p.m., injuring several of the passengers.

Ottawa County deputies said the bus was southbound on 68th when wheels hit slush and pulled the bus onto the shoulder of the road where it went into a ditch and rolled onto its side.

Several of the injured were treated in the Coopersville school by Dr. John Lown for bumps and bruises. Others were to seek their own treatment.

Deputies said the students were placed into waiting cars until another bus could be obtained.

## Bradford Makes Strong Pitch for School Millage

The necessity of passing the special operating millage election for the Holland school district April 16 was outlined by Charles L. Bradford Jr., board treasurer, at a monthly meeting of the Board of Education Monday night in Holland High School library.

Bradford emphasized that the 12.15 mills sought for one year is 2½ mills less than was levied for special operations last year. He said all operating millage levies had expired the past year, and failure to pass the needed millage would be disastrous.

He said the 12.15 mills would amount to \$1,780,000 which hardly compares with the \$190,000 cuts made in 1960 "austerity program" which upset many educators and citizens in the community. "The 1960 cutbacks was only a drop in the bucket, compared with what could happen to the school program next year if special millage is not passed," Bradford said.

He declined to speculate on alternatives other than to say there would naturally be cuts in many areas and the administration would have to hold back all improvements, a costly move in the long run since education is a living process which requires upkeep and improvements in all areas. He said a skinned-down program and lack of improvements cannot but end up in greater millage needs in the future with costly carryovers.

Bradford explained that it is the second year the board has made cuts in special operating millage, representing a 17 per cent reduction. The reduction last year was 1.1 mills, making a total reduction of 3.6 mills in two years. Total increase in available income under this program is less than 1 per cent.

He said Holland district lists one of the lowest millages in western Michigan, made possible, he said, by what the Board of Education considers its mandate of a conservative approach to finances and offering a sound program of good education.

He added that failure to pass millage probably would result in some borrowing, necessitating payment of interest, whereas the local district has always received interest because of the summer tax pro-

## 5½ Inches of Snow Blankets Holland

A 5½-inch blanket of snow covered Holland Tuesday in one of the latest spring storms ever to hit the area.

But intermittent sunshine and a 33-degree temperature at 11 a.m. were making fast inroads into the snow deposits. Monday's howling winds had subsided appreciably and youngsters back in school after a week's spring vacation were making the most of the wet snow that formed marvelous sculptures, if not snowballs.

Weather Observer Glenn Timmer said 4.5 inches fell after 11 a.m. Monday and 1 inch had fallen before that time.

President James O. Lamb pointed out that while the board has reduced millage requests for two years, this does not mean it can continue to reduce total asking. Vice President Robert Gosselaar called attention to relatively low operating millage requests with reductions two years in succession.

It was pointed out that City Council also appears committed to not increasing its tax rate. In other business, the board approved hiring two elementary teachers, Patrick Decker with degrees from Western Michigan University with five years' experience, and Siola McFarland with a degree from Geneva College in Pennsylvania, also with five years' experience.

Supt. Donald L. Ihman reviewed the school district insurance program, effective July 1. He said specifications have been drafted and bids advertised due June 1 at 3 p.m. Bids will be analyzed with recommendations by about mid-June when bids will be awarded. Holland agencies will continue coverage on a 60-day binder to July 1. He said local firms have expressed considerable interest.

Supt. Ihman read a letter from the Ottawa Intermediate Board seeking consensus on another vote for a vocational center following narrow defeat in the March 8 election. Members present were of the general opinion that another vote should be scheduled.

Attention also was called to a meeting May 9 at 6:30 p.m. in Spring Lake Holiday Inn for the Ottawa-North Allegan School Board Association to discuss state and local matters.

Ihman also announced that Holland High School has received accreditation for the year from the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools at a meeting March 28.

Vice President Gosselaar who presided announced that negotiations will be scheduled after a meeting of the communications committee later this week.

Gosselaar presided at the 30-minute meeting. President Lamb who was in Lansing on business for the day arrived late. Mrs. Kay MacKenzie was absent. The invocation was given by Bradford.

## Corps Provides Bags for Sand

Burlap bags for use in shoreline sandbagging were being made available to lake shore residents of Park township and Holland city through a Corps of Engineers flood control program.

Ottawa County Civil Defense director Glenn Timmer said 5,000 of the burlap bags were provided by the Corps for use in the Lake Macatawa area. Residents were to obtain them through township or city officials.

Residents whose property was affected by the high water levels are to provide their own sand, fill the bags and place them where necessary. Some of the bags have been used along lake front property of South Shore and other bags were used in the Chippewa area.

Water levels began receding Tuesday afternoon and the flood threat to certain properties was lessened, Timmer said.

## Fire Sweeps Old Allegan High School

ALLEGAN — Fire of undetermined cause destroyed the old Allegan high school building atop a hill along M-40 leading into the city. At least two firemen were reported injured Wednesday.

Allegan County deputies said two young men reported the fire at 2:43 a.m. but fire officials believe the fire had started much earlier and smoldered in the building. Persons in the area of the school recalled smelling smoke at 9:30 p.m. Tuesday but saw no flames.

Firemen from Allegan and Otsego responded to the alarm and remained at the scene throughout the morning.

Roads M-40 and M-89 were closed to traffic as were other main streets in the city in the vicinity of the fire to allow firemen to stretch hoses across the streets.

The three-story brick building was constructed in 1921 and had been used as the Allegan high school until 1962 when a new high school was opened. From 1962 until 1971 the building was used as a junior high until a new building was opened.

Since 1971 the old school has been used for storage and was under consideration for use by Allegan county as an annex or for recreational purposes by the city.

Bids submitted for the purpose of the building ranged from \$46,000 to \$57,000.

Allegan deputies said one fireman was treated in the Allegan hospital for injuries and was released while another remained at the hospital for examination.

## Winter Fish Kill Program Reported 'Minimal Results'

A program to rid Lake Macatawa of unwanted carp by use of a chemical killed an estimated 2½ tons of fish, a Department of Natural Resources spokesman said Tuesday.

Fish biologist John Trimmer told a committee of the Holland Fish and Game Club that the carp kill this winter had "minimal results."

The DNR plans to spray spawning areas of Lake Macatawa and the Black River with the chemical in late May in an effort to kill an estimated 100 to 300 tons of the carp as part of a program to restock Lake Macatawa with game fish.

The winter use of the chemical was part of an experimental program by the DNR. Funds for the program were raised through the Fish and Game Club.

Vern Edwards, chairman of the program for the Fish and Game Club, said volunteers will be recruited for a cleanup of the dead fish after the aerial spraying by helicopters.

Edwards said the spraying will be conducted in the marsh areas of Black River near Windmill Island but no further upstream because of the spawning grounds of bass and other game fish.

As part of a restocking program, the DNR plans to provide 150,000 walleye fry for the rearing ponds at the Fish and Game Club where they will be fed for about six weeks before being planted in Lake Macatawa.

## Centennial Honor To Zeeland Farm

ZEELAND — The Floyd Ter Haar farm, 3585 64th Ave., in the possession of the family since 1872, has been designated as a Centennial Farm by the Division of Michigan History of the Department of State.

The farm was originally purchased in 1872 by Roelofs Kroodsmas and wife, relatives of the present owner, from the government.

Certificates are provided by the state and large metal markers are provided by Detroit Edison and Consumers Power Co.

A Centennial Farm is one which has been in the continuous possession of the same family for 100 years or more.

## Holland United Fund To Change Its Name

The Greater Holland United Fund has taken steps to change its name to the Greater Holland United Way. The move would bring the name in line with recent actions by the Michigan United Fund and other United Funds in the state who have changed their name to the United Way.

The United Way has been adopted as the national name and all promotional materials will make use of the United Way symbol of a rainbow over a cupped hand.

## Cleanup Is Extended

City Engineer Gordon Start today extended cleanup week an additional 10 days running through Monday, April 23, giving local residents the benefit of another two weekends to clean their yards.

"We don't feel Holland people should have to rake their yards through the snow," Start said. "Inclement weather caused a week's loss in yard work."

Cleanup week originally was scheduled April 2 through 13.

City trucks have been picking up debris at curbs despite the snowy weather. People are asked to rake the lawn rakings into the curb. Cleanup week is for lawn rakings and wind-blown twigs only, not for trash or heavy branches.

## '74 Ottawa Budget Lists \$4.5 Million

GRAND HAVEN — The Ottawa County Board of Commissioners will meet here Thursday morning in its chambers in the Ottawa County Building, to discuss a property equalized report. The grand total of equalized property was \$574,974,138 in 1972 compared to \$634,547,065 in 1973, an increase of \$59,572,926. Georgetown Township had the largest monetary increase at \$13,200,095, while Allendale Township had the largest percent of increase at over 35 per cent. Tax revenue will increase \$892,250 because of the increased equalization.

A proposed budget for 1974 was presented to the board at \$4,560,784.34. Total anticipated revenue is \$4,404,397, so the budget is short by \$156,387.34. The actual budget will be presented at the October session.

An 11-member committee was appointed by the board Tuesday to be responsible for receiving and handling the \$290,000 that Ottawa County is eligible to receive during fiscal year 1974 under a Department of Labor formula through the Regional Manpower program. Dr. Philip Mummert, James Kirkpatrick, Bruce Ulfax, Paul Helmer, Gary Scholten, Greg Vander Mullen, Mrs. Joyce Vanden Bosch, William Kieft, Avery Baker, Raymond Vander Laan and chairman, Herbert Wybenga, comprise the committee.

Commissioners received and placed on file a report received by Ron Bakker of the Ottawa County Road Commission. Road and bridge construction and maintenance will cost over \$5,000,000 in 1974. Primary road maintenance will cost \$704,850 local road maintenance, \$1,130,000; primary road construction, \$1,290,000; primary bridge construction, \$250,000; local road construction, \$500,000; local bridge construction, \$402,300, and the Michigan Department of State Highways main contract, \$500,000.

Bakker outlined in his report that park maintenance and operation would cost \$120,000, while park improvements will cost \$44,000. It is anticipated that it will cost \$25,000 to construct an arboretum at Hager - Hardwood; \$4,000 for a ball field at Grose; \$7,000 to widen a driveway at Riverside and to seal the entire blacktop surface; and \$8,000 to create tobogganing and sledding areas at Riverside.

Charles D. Corradini, Jenison, presented a petition to the commissioners Monday bearing 56 names of persons living in the Hager - Hardwood Park area, requesting that a fence be erected by the county in the park be taken down. Corradini feels that the fence would not stop vandalism in the park and area residents asked the board to give them a chance to prove that understanding and cooperation are more effective than a steel fence. Commissioners authorized the park department to remove the fence.

The commissioners received a letter from the Ottawa County Democratic Executive Committee supporting the Citizens Advisory Committee on Solid Waste in its recommendation to close the Olive Township landfill. Letters from Egbert Kuylers, clerk of Grand Haven Township, stated that each township had gone on record supporting the county's designation of a landfill operation in the northwest section of the county.

Commissioner William Kieft proposed that the report on solid wastes submitted in March by a citizens committee be returned because it was neither dated nor signed. Heated discussion resulted and the board finally voted to accept the report as received.

Commissioners then voted that all advisory reports from now on will give the date and signatures of the committee.

## Passenger Dies Following Crash

GRAND HAVEN — Mrs. Jennie Moler Sikkenga, 83, of Spring Lake, injured April 6 in a single car accident near Ferrysburg, died in North Ottawa Community Hospital Tuesday of complications from the injuries.

State Police said Mrs. Sikkenga was the 12th traffic fatality in Ottawa County this year compared to the nine reported a year ago.

Mrs. Sikkenga was a passenger in a car driven by her step daughter, Mrs. Casey Edna Wagonmaker of Spring Lake. The car went out of control while attempting a turn from northbound Grand Haven Rd. onto westbound Hickory St. and landed in a ditch. Mrs. Sikkenga suffered a fractured hip and facial lacerations.





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#### IMPROVING DOWNTOWN

Holland's decision to construct some kind of a mall downtown to preserve the inner city shopping district is pretty typical of the solution many communities have elected to solve a very widespread problem. As outlying plazas become more popular the central city downtown sections have a way of deteriorating and becoming a community blight.

In most instances the construction of a mall may have some beneficial effect. We wonder, however, if the beautification of the downtown area is the key to maintaining it as an important part of the city's economy.

We rather think not. Talk to your friends, and what they tell you they expect in a shopping district is not always the beauty of the place but convenience and good buys.

What we need on Eighth Street is not so much imported vegetation as a number of other things. Among these are: Rerouting the truck traffic, a good and varied selection of merchandise, reliable service and easy access. This last means enough parking that is free.

If these conditions were met on Eighth St. there would be little need to use federal funds for temporary beautification of the area. In fact, these federal funds could be used for other more humane needs in the community.

We have nothing against a pretty shopping area downtown, but the beauty of the place is distinctly secondary to the basic economic considerations which will bring in the customers.

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, April 15  
Jesus Christ Is King  
Zechariah 9:9-10;  
Philippians 2:5b-11  
By C. P. Dame

On Palm Sunday it is fitting to think of Jesus the King. Jesus is still King, the strangest King ever portrayed by the pen. It is the function of kings to rule and someday Jesus will be acknowledged the Supreme Ruler.

I. The kingliness of Jesus was foretold. Two passages of Scripture compose the lesson text, one from the Old Testament, one from the New Testament. On the last two Sundays of February we studied about Zechariah the prophet. During the captivity, he was born in Babylon, became a priest and went to Jerusalem where, with Haggai, he stirred up the people to resume building the temple. Zechariah also foretold the coming of the Messiah — some of his prophecies have been fulfilled, others will be. The prophet predicted the coming of the ideal King. Matthew 21:1-7 and John 12:12-16 refer to the prophet's prediction and claim its fulfillment in the triumphant entry of Jesus into Jerusalem. All four gospels tell about this important event.

The prophet said that the King would be "just and having salvation; lowly," that is humble, "riding upon a colt of a donkey," a symbol of peace in contrast to the horse which stood for war. The peace-loving King will do away with the chariot, the horse and the bow and bring peace and blessing to the people and will rule "from sea to sea," even to the ends of the earth. Isaiah 2:2-4, Micah 5:10 and Zechariah 8:2-3 all speak of world peace. It is surely coming.

II. Jesus is portrayed as the Servant. The second passage is from Philippians and tells how the church was troubled by strife and rivalry. Paul prescribed the remedy — humility which manifests itself when "every one esteems himself less than others." Paul points to Jesus as our example. He who occupied the highest position willingly became a man, and not only that, but a slave, and humiliated himself by dying on the cruel and shameful cross, in obedience to the Father, where He paid the penalty of man's sin. Today it is the duty of the church to manifest the servant virtues — obedience, discipline and sacrifice.

III. God highly exalted Jesus. The exaltation followed the Lord's humiliation. Christ did not humiliate Himself to win the Father's praise but to redeem man. Observe that God gave Jesus a supreme name, Lord, (Acts 9:5) and in addition, universal worship — "every knee" will some day bow before Him and the glory of the Father will be His also.

Is Christ supreme in our homes, communities, churches and nation?

Brad Lyons continued his heavy hitting for the Dutchmen with a homer and single.





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

## Psychologist Is Guest on Hope Campus Friday

## Association Day Set By AAUW at Potluck

The American Association of University Women will meet Thursday at 6:30 in Durfee Hall Terrace Room for their Association Day potluck. Each member is to bring a dish to pass and table service.

The program will include a glimpse at what's to come in the AAUW Study - Action Topics for 1973 - 75, and an Art Exhibit by the Sketch Group.

Highlights of the evening will be the presentation of three named Fellowship Grants.

The topics to be presented include "Woman: Searching for Self." There is broad interest and a flurry of scientific inquiry surrounding the topic of the contemporary woman. AAUW has chosen to focus on the individual perspective in its new biennial topic. The purpose of the topic, is to encourage woman to seek out and understand the expanding options for self and to determine her priorities in relation to others, to changing values, and to a variety of life styles. Mrs. Marlin Vander Wilt will be the chairman for this topic.

The second topic to be explored is "Dynamic Learning: Releasing Human Potential." How can AAUW contribute to releasing the vast potential for creative thought, enriching life, and building a truly human society? This is the first question for the new topic. Society appears to be backing away from the task - oriented, industrial framework for schools and learning, and trying to make new decisions based on the quality of life, the humanities, and the affective (emotional) part of being.

Dynamic Learning focuses on the AAUW member as a creative learner - facilitator. The topic will be concerned with "outside" opportunities to learn, not just with the school as a learning setting. Mrs. Robert Elder will explore the possibilities of this topic with the group.

The third topic to be discussed will be "Media: Issues in Communications." The AAUW goals for this topic are to assess the issues of freedom and responsibility of the press being debated in the nation and evaluate the various suggestions that are offered in the name of citizen's rights.

Also to develop support positions on public policy and industry standards, including but not limited to the rights of individuals to have access to information without intimidation or manipulation.

Also to become aware of the impact of mass media on cultural change, with special attention to the lives of children, education and the free flow of information, the arts, and values and life in America.
