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Zeeland Cuts Water And Sewer

ZEELAND — The City of Zeeland Wednesday formally notified non-residents of a move to cut off water, sewer and fire protection service to non-residents now receiving these services from the city.

Copies of a City Council resolution calling for the termination of services to non-residents were sent out by certified mail today to persons affected by the move. Copies of the resolution also were sent to the Michigan Inspection Bureau and Michigan State Health Department.

The resolution, adopted by council at a regular meeting April 5, calls for discontinuing all water, sewer and fire protection service to all non-residents after June 2, unless their area is actively engaged in the process of petitioning to annex to the city before June 2.

The resolution affects the area north of McKinley Ave. and west of Colonial St. northwest of the city, the Southeast Heights area which voted against annexation on April 2, and the Brickyard area on West Main Ave.

City officials said some 60 customers in the northwest area would be affected by the termination of water service. Only four persons, living on Colonial St., would be affected by loss of sewer service. There are only eight customers in the Brickyard area.

The northwest area and Brickyard area lie in Holland Township and would receive normal township fire protection independent of the city.

Some 50 residents of the Southeast Heights area would be affected by loss of water and fire protection service. The city provides no sewer service in the Southeast Heights or Brickyard areas.

The city had been supplying fire protection to all of Zeeland Township under contract until termination of the contract last March 21.

Officials said the city has been supplying water to non-residents of the three areas for "10 to 15 years," and has been providing fire protection to Zeeland Township for "just as long."

The resolution stated that the city of Zeeland has for some time been confronted with the problem of furnishing adequate sewer and water service to its own residents, and has been notified by the Michigan Department of Health to find a solution to its sewage treatment plant inadequacies.

City Council, in the resolution, said it could not in good conscience, while these problems exist, continue to see the city furnish these services to non-residents.

Report Cutting Torch Stolen From Alabama

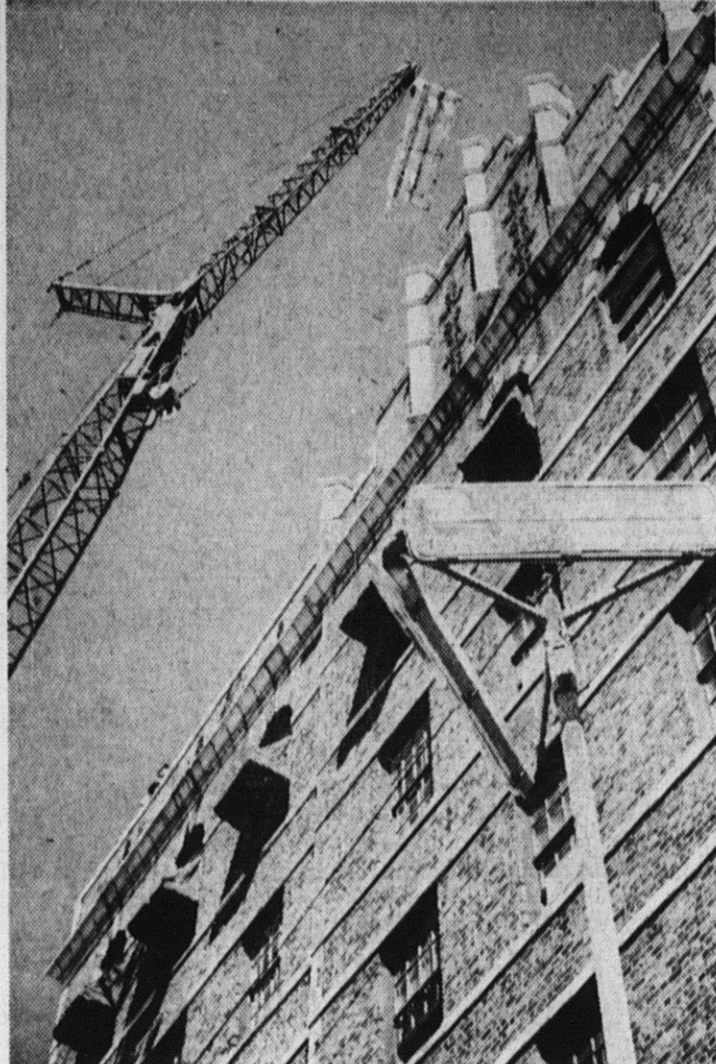

Zeeland Seeks Water From City

Spring Lake Man Victim Of Drowning

GRAND HAVEN — William H. Pellegrom, 84, a former banker who had been staying at Hillcrest Nursing Home in Grand Haven, was a victim of accidental drowning Wednesday afternoon.

Pellegrom was observed walking toward a pier at the foot of Howard St. at 1:20 p.m. and was next seen floating in the water near the pier by a sounding crew of the Corps of Engineers.

The crew, Robert Nielson, Earl Tompkins and Roel Schoyan, working in an outboard motorboat, brought the man ashore at 2 p.m. and called city police who attempted to revive him. He was pronounced dead at 2:35 p.m. by Dr. Peter MacArthur, medical examiner, who ruled accidental drowning.

Pellegrom had had failing eyesight. He was born in Grand Haven and had lived at 319 East Savidge St. in Spring Lake for many years. He had been at the nursing home the past year.

For many years he was vice president and cashier of Peoples Bank and Trust Co. in Grand Haven. He attended Presbyterian Church in Spring Lake and was a member of the Grand Haven Rod and Gun Club.

Surviving are a son, Marshall of Spring Lake; a brother, Henry Arthur Pellegrom of Spring Lake; two sisters, Mrs. Frank Schmidt and Angie Pellegrom, both of Jackson, and a grandson. His wife, Lily, died July 4, 1953.

Funeral services will be held at 1:30 p.m. Saturday from Kinkema Funeral Home with the Rev. Roy Marshall officiating. Burial will be in Spring Lake Cemetery.

W.F. Roser Appointed To BPW

Appointment of Winthrop F. Roser as a member of the Board of Public Works was announced by Mayor Nelson Bosman at a regular meeting of City Council Wednesday night.

He will succeed Donald Vink who resigned some weeks ago for reasons of health and will fill out the Vink term which expires in 1965. The appointment was approved by Council.

Roser, who has been associated with Parke, Davis and Co. since 1933 came to Holland from Detroit in 1950 and is manager of chemical department A at the local plant which covers such products as chloromycetin, benadryl and carbomol. He has been associated with Vink in Parke-Davis operations for more than 20 years.

The new BPW appointee is a member of Hope Church, the Holland Lions Club and the American Chemical Society. He is married and has two daughters, one a junior at Michigan State University majoring in journalism and the other a senior at Holland High School who plans to enter MSU in the fall.

In other business, Council approved purchase of a small triangular piece of property at Lake St. and Cleveland Ave from the C and O Railway Co. for \$2,200. The issue had been tabled from last meeting. City Manager Herb Holt explained the property is needed to round out a curve in a proposed road which is not necessarily a truck route, but a needed improvement in the area.

Ralph Oldenburger, of 309 West 11th St., who had protested a truck route in the area two weeks ago, favored the purchase of the property if it would relieve traffic leaving Kollen Park but objected to a truck route, feeling that Kollen Park should be protected at any cost.

Several gifts for Holland Hospital were acknowledged with thanks. They included a viewer with slides from First Reformed Church Sunday School, two portable television sets from the Junior Welfare League valued at \$285; a high humidity tent from the Christian Reformed unit valued at \$250, an alternating pressure mattress valued at \$191.24, an easel from the Margaret Hummer guild, new plants for lobby planters from the Garden Club, 490 plant saucers from the Rena Boven guild, and three stuffed animals from Mrs. David Crockery.

Councilman Morris Peerbolt moved that the city attorney represent the city at a public hearing called by the Michigan Public Service Commission in which the Michigan Gas and Electric Co. must show cause why rates shall not be lowered. The hearing is scheduled May 15. Townsend said the hearing is a reverse of those usually called since most seek rate increases. Council approved the motion.

Permission was granted both the VFW Post and the American Legion Auxiliary to sell poppies on local streets May 25 and 26, starting at noon on the 25th.

Council granted several moving permits, one to Walter Deitz to move a house and garage from 121 East 13th St. to 273 East 14th St.; one to William Mokma to move a garage from 65 West 16th St. to Butternut Dr. outside the city; another to William Mokma to move a garage from 27th St. and Central Ave to Hamilton; and a fourth to Walter Deitz to move a garage from 113 East 13th St. to 168 East 11th St.

A letter from A. Dykstra, of 244 Maple Ave., requesting that the parking restriction on the north side of 14th St. between Pine and Maple Aves be lifted was referred to the traffic and safety commission.

A letter from Park Township requesting \$1,200 for assistance in maintenance at Park Township Airport was filed for information.

A copy of a letter from the Michigan Liquor Control Commission addressed to Mr. and Mrs. Bastian D. Bouman advised that their application for a new SDM license to be located at 714 Michigan Ave. was denied.

A letter from Tulip Time, Inc., inviting mayor and councilmen to participate in festival parades May 16 and 19 was accepted, as was an invitation from the Chamber of Commerce to attend the annual Chamber dinner May 2 in Civic Center.

A petition for water service in Elm Dr. from South Shore Dr. north to Beach Dr., in Beach Dr. from Lake Dr. east to end, and in Lakeview Dr. from Lake Dr. to Hillcrest Dr., was referred to the city manager.

Council granted a contract to T. Keppel's Sons for low bid of \$15,220.93 in the sale of 9,500 feet of vitrified clay sewer pipe, 1,250 feet of 10-inch pipe and 850 feet of six-inch pipe. The bid was the lowest of five bids.

A contract for approximately 30,000 gallons of road oil to be applied as needed was awarded to Eaton Oil Co. of Grand Ledge in net amount of 10.39 cents per gallon. It was the lowest bid meeting specifications.

Progress reports on this year's Tulip Time festival were made Tuesday at the regular monthly meeting of the board of directors and committee chairman in the Hotel Warm Friend.

Manager Chester Walz reported ticket sales for all events are "coming good" and 500 reservations for housing have been received. The square dance, slated Saturday, May 19 in the Holland High fieldhouse, is "practically sold out."

The Park Theater will be used for the Dutch Treat Show. Featuring Chita and Harry Van Pelt and supported by Joss Wind, the show includes Dutch folk dances, musical novelties and comedy three times daily during the festival.

Harold Karsten reported 45 bands have been signed for the Saturday parade of bands and 16 have been secured for the band review in Riverview Park. Float chairman Ed Schierbeek said several floats have been lined up for the parades.

Park Supt. Jacob De Graaf assured the group the tulips will be blossoming during the festival but said the tulips need more warm weather.

Willard Wichers and George Lumsden were named to write the material for the costume show, slated Wednesday, May 16 in the fieldhouse. They will work with the Opti-Mex club.

Lew Hartzell is working with merchants to secure more scrubbers for Wednesday's Volks parade while Robert Taft reported the antique show will have enough exhibits to fill the Armory.

Three Persons Hurt in Crash

Three persons were injured in a car-truck accident at 3:45 p.m. Monday on M-40 near 144th Ave. in Allegan County.

Helen W. Krueger, 35, of route 1, Hamilton, driver of the car involved in the crash, was listed in fairly good condition today at Holland Hospital with lacerations of the face and scalp and fractures of the collarbone, ribs and pelvis.

Driver of the semi tractor which collided with the Krueger auto, Lee L. Walker, 36, of Cadillac, Mich., and his brother, Donald Walker, 37, of Boyne City, Mich., riding with him in the tractor, were released from the hospital.

State police said the accident occurred when the tilt-cab of Walker's truck slammed forward as he applied his brakes, causing the tractor to veer across the road onto the west shoulder. Mrs. Krueger also took to the shoulder to avoid the crash and the two vehicles collided, troopers said. Walker was headed north and the Krueger auto south on M-40.

Walker was driving behind a semi truck, driven by another brother, Alfred Walker, who had stopped his truck suddenly to avoid striking part of an auto body that had fallen from a junk truck driven by John F. Clemens, 54, of Allegan. Troopers cited Clemens for driving with an insecure load.

City Attorney Submits His Resignation

City Council Wednesday night accepted with regret the resignation of James E. Townsend as city attorney, effective June 30 or as soon thereafter as arrangements can be made for his replacement.

Townsend, who has served as city attorney for almost 10 years, expressed appreciation for the splendid cooperation with Council, the city manager and administrative personnel during the period. City Manager Herb Holt said inasmuch as Townsend will be meeting with Council for another two months or more this was not the time to engage in eulogies but he would be responding in kind for the people who have worked with Townsend as the termination date approaches.

Public hearings were scheduled May 14 (Tuesday instead of Wednesday because of Tulip Time) for four sanitary sewer projects as follows: in 33rd St. from Columbia Ave. east to end of street, \$4,252.59; in 32nd St. from Columbia Ave. to Lincoln Ave., and in Lincoln Ave. for 300 feet south of 32nd St., \$8,816.36; in 39th St., Central Ave. to Pine Ave., \$8,359.11; in 33rd St. from Columbia Ave. to west of College Ave., \$14,103.54.

Arrangements for some 12-minute parking meters and some three-hour meters on Eighth St. between College and Columbia Aves. were approved. Two meters in front of Spiegel's on the south side of the street and two meters in front of Model Laundry on the north side of the street will have 12-minute limitations. Three-hour meters will be placed on the north side from the west driveway of Downtown Service to the driveway of Automotive Replacement, and on the south side from the fire station to the 12-minute meters in front of Spiegel's. This places five three-hour meters on the north side and 10 on the south side.

Council approved an agreement with Charles and Gertrude Rich, Earl and Harriet Ragains and Jay and Janet Lankeet for constructing 150 feet of culvert in the Wildwood subdivision. Property owners will pay one-half of the cost which amounts to \$887.92. The city's share will be chargeable to the Motor Vehicle Fund.

The 22nd annual report of the Ottawa County Department of Social Welfare for 1962 was referred to the city manager for study.

Council okayed several applications for licenses for garbage and rubbish collection, and for the Holland City Bus Lines.

All Councilmen were present with the exception of William De Haan. Mayor Nelson Bosman presided at the meeting which lasted less than an hour. The Rev. William C. Hillegonds of Hope Reformed Church gave the invocation.

Turn Down Annexation

ALLEGAN—A coordinating and zoning committee report recommending refusal of the Douglas village petition to annex some 300 acres of land lying between the village and Lake Michigan was approved by the board of supervisors Monday.

Committee Chairman Robert Westveld, Clyde township, said the village might return to the board with a second petition, reducing the area to be annexed.

The board asked the roads and bridges committee to seek clarification of a proposal adopted last January which would ask county voters to approve a special one mill tax to help townships, villages and cities pay for the cost of removing trees killed by Dutch Elm disease. Some board members questioned the legality of levying a tax at the county level for distribution to townships, villages and cities. If approved, the question would be put on the August 7 primary election ballot.

Another resolution directed the jail committee to bring in its recommendations regarding revision of budgets and operating policies for the jail and sheriff's department. The committee submitted a lengthy report Monday, with comparisons on cost between Allegan operations and those in other nearby counties.

The board adjourned until next Monday to give the finance and equalization committees an opportunity to complete their reports.

Dancers Practice Outdoors

Ship Slated Here Friday

The Ninth Naval District reserve training ship U. S. S. Worland will arrive in Holland at 4 p.m. Friday and will tie up for the weekend at the Penn-Dixie docks.

Lt. William Leird, commanding officer, announced the escort patrol craft will be moored in Holland from Friday through Sunday and visiting will be permitted on board between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

The stop in Holland is being made to facilitate shore liberty and recreation for the crewmembers and the Naval Reservists undergoing their annual two weeks active duty for training.

The Worland is equipped for anti-submarine warfare and has surface, under water and air attack detection devices. Her armament includes a dual purpose three-inch 50 calibre gun, a 40 millimeter mount and rapid firing 20 millimeter mounts.

The 850-ton Worland is powered with two 900 horsepower diesel engines and cruises at an average speed of 12.5 knots. Named after the city of Worland, Wyo., the craft has an overall length of 184½' and a breadth of 33'.

Overall City Budget Up By \$65,000

A city budget listing a cut in the tax rate is under consideration by City Council.

The 150-page budget, presented to Council Wednesday night, calls for a tax levy of \$808,603.30, about \$9,000 less than the 1961 levy of \$817,612.32.

The new figure calls for 17.713 mills on assessed valuation or approximately a quarter mill less (.271) than the 17.984 rate of 1961. This figure is a combined figure for Ottawa and Allegan portions of the city. Specific figures will vary slightly.

The total budget is higher than last year. The general fund lists a total of \$1,333,745.28, or some \$65,000 more than the 1961 total of \$1,268,948.77. The difference between the total budget and the tax levy is accounted for in additional non-profit tax revenues and unappropriated surpluses from previous years. Anticipated surplus June 30 is listed at \$138,000.

In addition, the city is asking an additional \$25,000 from the Board of Public Works this year, for a total of \$125,000. The BPW contribution to the general fund had been \$100,000 for several years.

The total budget for the general fund covers general city, the library and the debt fund. The latter is down this year, listing \$95,000 in principal and interest for Holland Hospital and Civic Center. The library budget is up \$5,000 this year.

Holland Hospital operates on a self-sustaining basis and its budget is not reflected in city budget totals. The proposed budget for the hospital this year is \$1,384,000, compared with \$1,389,000 in 1961. The Board of Public Works budget likewise is not included. This budget, broken down as to departments, lists cost of operations for the electric department at \$1,151,000; water department, \$236,000; sewer, \$70,000.

There are no general wage increases for city employees this year, although a number of adjustments in the over-all compensation plan is anticipated. The city is increasing hospital premium costs for city employees from \$5.70 to \$7.90 per month for the coming year. Should costs vary within the year, the additional cost will be borne by the employee if he desires the coverage offered.

Taxes will be based on a total city assessed valuation of \$45,651,455 which is up \$187,000 from last year.

The budget has been placed in the city clerk's office for public inspection until the public hearing May 2, the date final passage is scheduled.

The budget was drawn up initially by the city auditor. Council had four study sessions on the budget last week and completed its study Tuesday night.

Wednesday's budget figures do not include school taxes. These are entered separately on tax bills.

Acid Burns Three Youths

GRAND HAVEN — Three Grand Haven Junior High baseball players returning home from a game in Zeeland were burned when splashed with sulphuric acid from a jug they broke during an emergency bus stop at US-31 and Crosswell St. at 7 p.m. Wednesday.

Mike Mulder, 15, most seriously burned, was listed in good condition today at Grand Haven Municipal Hospital with burns of the face and body. Walter Grabowski, 14, and Gary Holland, 16, were released from the hospital after treatment. Grabowski suffered burns of the face and Holland was burned on both legs.

The boys discovered two gallon jugs of the acid while walking in a field east of the divided highway after their bus broke down. The driver had left the vehicle to summon another bus for the team.

The three players were splashed with acid when one of the team members smashed a jug against a tree stump. Coach Dale Edgerie attempted to wash the acid off the boys in a creek. Ottawa County deputies drove the trio to the hospital.

Deputies said the property was owned by Leonard H. Balke of Muskegon. Balke told deputies he had used the acid for removing tree stumps. Deputies said the youths apparently thought the jugs contained water.

Calvin E. Lohman of route 2, Hamilton, will begin six months active duty training Friday at Fort Leonard Wood, Mo. After his return, he will resume military training with an Army Reserve unit in Holland.

Holland Takes Track Victory

Holland High's track team notched firsts in 10 events and tied for first in another event as the Dutch romped over Portage, 75½-33½ in the opening home track meet of the season Tuesday at the 22nd St. field.

Co-captain Larry Mannes and Les Cornelissen led the Dutch with 12½ points each. Mannes copped firsts in the high jump and broad jump and ran a leg on the mile relay team while Cornelissen won both dashes and ran on the 380-yard relay team.

Holland swept the 880-yard run while Portage took the three places in the 120-yard high hurdles. Ed Millard won the half mile for Holland while Tom Elzinga copped the 440.

Barry Prins won the 180-yard low hurdles and Ward Rooks tied for first in the pole vault. Coach Bill Hinga said "the times must be brought down and we must develop more depth if we are going to improve this season."

Holland, second place in a triangular last week, competes against Zealand next Tuesday, April 24 under the lights at Wyoming.

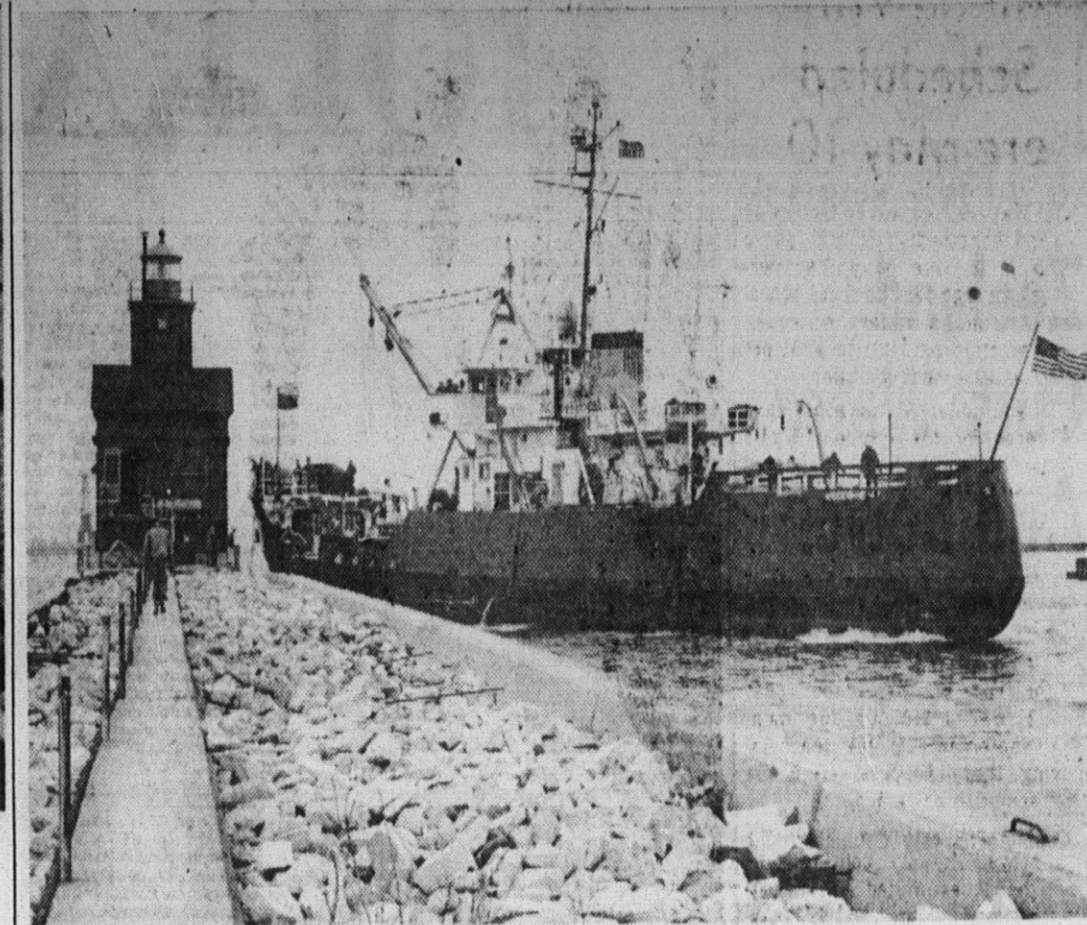

Millage Vote Is Scheduled Here May 10

On May 10, registered voters in Holland school district will go to the polls to vote on a 2.9 operational millage for the local school district. The 2.9 millage on equalized valuation amounts to \$5.31 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation.

An additional 85 persons have registered for the election. This brings Holland's total registered vote to 11,891. Since the school district covers only the original city plus the Apple Ave. and Montello Park areas, the eligible vote in the May 10 election will be 8,050.

It is estimated that the deficit at the end of the school year June 30 will be \$125,000, due mainly to increments in the teachers' schedule and the operations of the new senior high school.

It is expected these conditions will prevail for the coming year with deficit estimated at \$250,000 at the close of the 1962-63 year. Continuing increments plus six new teachers add another \$50,000; supervisory salary increments, \$5,000; additional amount for operating new school, \$25,000; extra amount for instruction supplies (\$2.50 instead of \$2 per pupil), \$2,000; total, \$332,000.

With many area districts already adopting schedules higher than Holland's for the coming year, the Holland board feels it must remain in a competitive position on salaries.

Income for the school year has been slightly under the previous year. Increases in local tax revenue have not offset the loss of tuition. The local school system has very few tuition students.

In calling a vote for extra millage, the board pointed out that Holland has consistently been a pay-as-you-go district, and every effort should be made to adhere to this reputation.

The largest month-to-month expenditures in the system are for instruction, and Holland's expenditures for operation compare favorably with schools not only in this area but with comparable-sized districts throughout the state.

Most school districts have voted special operation millage for years. Holland is one of the very last districts to consider special operating millage.

Ten of Holland's 14 polling precincts will be in use for the May 10 election. Polling places will be as follows: Ward 1-1, Lincoln School; Ward 2-1, Washington School; Ward 2-2, Junior High School; Ward 3-1, Van Raalte School; Ward 3-2, Christian High School; Ward 4-1 and 4-2, Montello Park School; Ward 4-3, West Side Christian School; Ward 5-1, Zion Lutheran Church; Ward 5-3 and 6-2, Apple Avenue School; Ward 6-1, Trinity Church.

A limited number of voters in the former Apple Ave. and Montello Park districts live in other precincts. Hence, those persons in precincts 4-1 and 5-3 who are in the school district may vote in neighboring precincts.

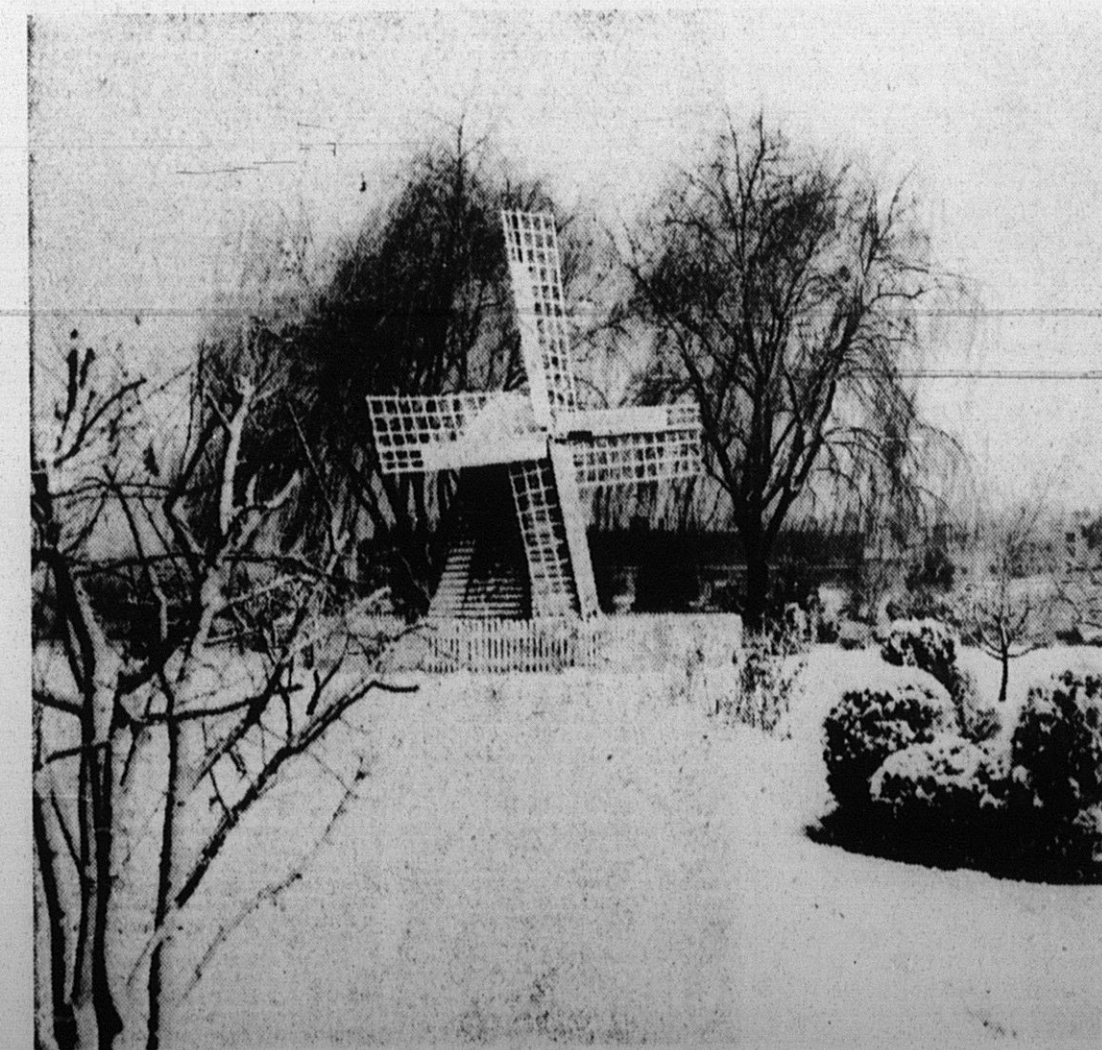

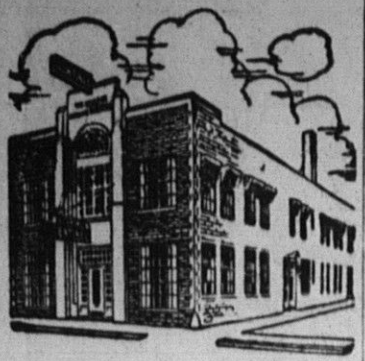

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, April 22
Christ Reigns
Hebrews 1:1-12
By C. P. Dame

We do not know who wrote the Epistle to the Hebrews. The author wrote the epistle with the aim in mind to prove clearly that Christianity is superior to Judaism.

Evidently there were some Jewish Christians who were tempted to return to Judaism. On Easter Day it is especially fitting that we glorify and exalt Jesus Christ who conquered death and the grave.

1. God has revealed Himself. This the Old Testament and the New Testament believers accepted as a fact. The early church had the Old Testament and considered it God's Word. God had spoken to the fathers through the prophets.

The difference between the belief of the conservative Jews of today and that of Christians is that the latter believe in a later revelation. This is told us in the words, "Hath in these last days spoken unto us by His Son," namely Jesus Christ.

God's revelation was completed in Him. It was final. No later revelation has come. The Old Testament was sufficient for the people of those times; the New Testament is also the Word of God and it is sufficient for the people of this new dispensation. We need no more.

We who live in the New Testament times can rejoice in having the complete and final God's revelation. Since we know more we have greater responsibilities.

II. Christ is greater than all the prophets. In the days when the Lord was upon the earth the Jews, whose ancestors had killed the prophets, highly praised them.

The writer states a few interesting facts about Christ. God appointed Him "heir of all things"—the latter two words take in everything. Observe that he also asserts that Christ is described as Creator in the words, "By whom He made the worlds." Again, this note too, the writer speaks of the deity of Christ: "Who being the effulgence of His glory and the very image of His substance and says that He sustains this world—upholding all things by the word of His power."

He who created this world also redeemed it. This truth is expressed in the words, "When He had by Himself purged our sins, sat down on the right hand of the majesty on high." After Christ had solved the sin problem He returned to heaven victoriously.

Christ is now in heaven, our High Priest, interceding for us, and as King ruling His Church.

III. Christ is superior to all. Why does the writer mention angels and compare Christ with them? Here is the reason—the Jews esteemed the angels highly because of their place in the giving of the law—see Acts 7:33 and Galatians 3:19.

In seven quotations from the Old Testament, all of them save one from the Psalms, the author portrays the greatness of Jesus Christ. What does that suggest to us?

We are living in times when there is much disregard for authority. Some church members seem to be but little influenced by the demanding words of Jesus—they do as they please regardless.

The Church and all the members ought to heed the authority of Jesus in every sphere and walk of life—in the home, in school, in business, in the professional life, in politics—always and everywhere recognize the authority of Jesus Christ, who conquered death and the grave and who is Lord of all and who reigns even though the communists deny it.

Ottawa County Farm News

Uncertainty prevails in the market because of pending legislation. Milk production continues to run at least 10 per cent above a year ago. The pattern of utilization with more milk going into other than Class I uses continues to exert downward pressure on prices. However, Class I sales in January were about 3 per cent above a year ago. The number of dairy cows on Jan. 1, 1962, was down 1 per cent, representing the eighth consecutive year dairy cow population has declined. The culling rate may be stepped up in late 1962 or in 1963.

Hog slaughter in April is expected to continue heavier than last year. Barrow and gilt prices will average between \$16.50 and \$17.50 per cwt. for the month. Storage stocks of pork and pork products, which comprise about one-half of all meat in storage, are not excessive so will not depress hog prices this spring.

In recently reported Michigan studies, atrazine and simazine were the other herbicides under test that controlled weeds in corn throughout the entire growing season without cultivation. (On heavy clay, however, one cultivation improved crop yields.) Atrazine is more soluble than simazine—it is more effective than simazine in dry seasons—and it is safe to use either before or after the corn plants emerge. But in the latter case it should not be used after the corn plants have more than 2 leaves. This is important! The recommended dose is 2 lbs. of atrazine per acre (if the corn is to be followed by some other crop the following year). Larger amounts may be applied if corn is to follow corn. Simazine is safe for use only before the corn plants emerge from the ground.

For garden soils that need extra organic matter, the Michigan Experiment Station recommends the following plan for making a compost pile from leaves and lawn rakings: (1) Build the compost pile in layers as the material accumulates; (2) Spread a few handfuls of fertilizer over each new layer (using either 12-6-16, 10-6-4, 10-10-10, 12-12-12 or 8-8-8 fertilizer mixtures); (3) Apply about 10 lbs. of fertilizer (plus 1/4 lb. of powdered limestone) to each cu. ft. of compost material; (4) After applying fertilizer to each new layer of trash, cover it with a thin layer of garden soil; (5) Build the compost pile inside of a circle of fencing — keep the top dish-shaped to catch and hold rain — and add a little water to wet down each new layer after the fertilizer and soil have been added.

It is time to begin spraying for Zimmerman pine moth, European pine shoot moth, and white pine weevil. For best results apply treatments between April 5 and 21. Use the following instructions:

1. Zimmerman Pine Moth: Two 100 gallons of water use 1 gallon of DDT emulsion containing 2 pounds of chemical. Add commercial wetting agent at 2 ounces or at manufacturer's recommendation. If the temperature is 60 degrees F. or above, Dibrom may be added to the DDT spray. Use 1/2 pint of an 8 pounds per gallon emulsion. Dibrom adds a vapor component to the DDT spray. Spray with no less than 250 pounds pressure or enough to wet the bark and main stem thoroughly. At this time, Zimmerman pine moth larvae are normally under bark scales or in crevices, especially where the branches join the main stem. It is not controlled by spraying foliage.

2. European Pine Shoot Moth: Use either of the Zimmerman pine moth sprays, although DDT is adequate for European pine shoot moth. In the case of European pine shoot moth, spray the bud areas, by covering the entire crown of the trees.

3. White Pine Weevil: Use the straight DDT spray suggested for Zimmerman pine moth or to the DDT add 1 gallon of 11 per cent BHC emulsion concentrate. Treat the leaders thoroughly for white pine weevil. Aroclor may be added to this spray.

4. If root-collar weevil is present, spray the lower trunk thoroughly, letting the spray run long enough to puddle momentarily on the soil adjacent to the trunk. The DDT-BHC spray suggested for white pine weevil is the preferred treatment for root-collar weevil.

5. Some control of early sawflies results from European pine shoot moth-type applications but they cannot be depended upon to control outbreaks of the sawfly.

While the same insecticide will reasonably control all the insects listed, application methods differ for each one and are critical. Additional information is in Extension Bulletin 353.

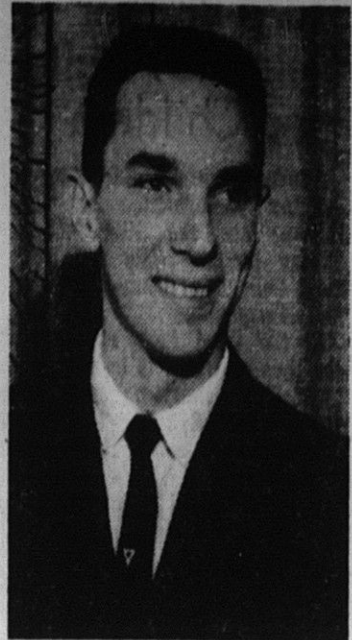

Singapore, once a prosperous lumbering town at the bend of the Kalamazoo River, is now buried under the sand dunes of Lake Michigan. Oshea Wilder and Co. in 1836, established a wildcat bank in this locality. Singapore did a flourishing business and on industrious young men from surrounding communities could always find a good job in the sawmill, the speaker said.

This prosperous little town was a stop off place for shipping vessels. As long as there was lumber in the area business continued but when the forests were depleted the people had no other means of support and one family after another moved away.

After 40 years of prosperity and with the protective trees gone, the drifting sands of Lake Michigan buried the little lumbering town leaving Singapore a town in name only.

Mr. Taft displayed an early map of this locality. He also showed pieces of paper money issued by the Wild Cat bank. Today it is hard to secure this money and its value has increased many times, he said. Mr. Taft has a copy of the only known photograph of the mill along the Kalamazoo River as it appeared in early days.

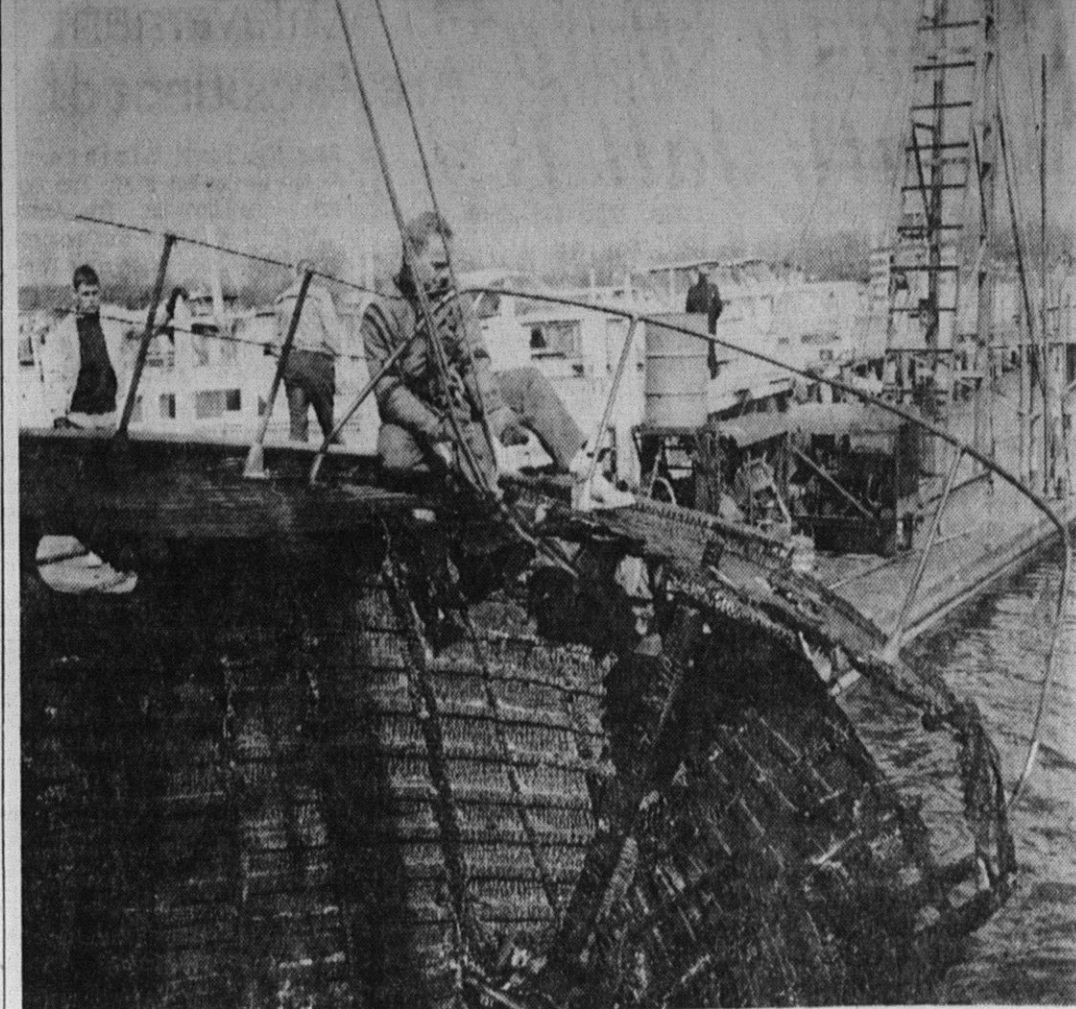

Boeve to Run For Sheriff

Allegan Okays County Jail Bid

ALLEGAN — Supervisors Friday accepted low bids totaling \$393,973 for the new county jail, to bring the overall cost of the project to an estimated \$455,000.

The board then went on record as being opposed to earmarking fees for two years to raise approximately \$120,000 for construction of a juvenile detention home. The home was to have been built from the same \$456,000 sinking fund which will be used for the jail, but rising construction costs made it necessary to use almost all this fund for the jail.

Board members admitted they erred in not foreseeing the effect of inflation on their plans and most indicated they would support a plan to ask voters to continue

the present 1-mill sinking fund levy for one more year to raise funds for the juvenile home.

Contracts approved Friday included \$270,683 for general construction, \$79,055 for heating and plumbing, \$33,755 for electrical work, \$10,480 for an elevator to carry prisoners meals from the second floor kitchen.

Other project costs include \$24,325 for architect's fees, \$10,000 for kitchen equipment including a walk-in cooler for quantity food storage, \$4,121 for moving the Civil War monument and razing the old county building and a \$5,000 contingency fund. The board also has set aside \$10,000 in this year's general fund for jail furnishings and equipment.

Study Douglas Plan to Annex 300 Acres

ALLEGAN — County supervisors voted to refer a petition for adjustment of the village of Douglas' boundaries to include approximately 300 acres of resort and farm property to the coordinating and zoning committee for study.

The action followed a four-hour hearing Wednesday in which attorneys for both sides of the faction directed testimony.

The question was presented to the county board under a seldom-used Michigan statute which gives supervisors "judge and jury" responsibilities in cases of annexation to general law villages which do not fall under the home rule statutes.

The board may either grant or deny the petition of the Douglas village board in full, or it may approve annexation of any portion of the area.

The action was initiated as a result of a petition signed by eleven residents of the area and presented to the board of supervisors in the form of a petition from the village board.

Proponents argued that the village could improve water, fire and police services for the area and that it offered the most suitable direction for expansion of the village.

Those opposed to the annexation claim that they already are obtaining satisfactory water service from the village of Douglas, fire protection from Saugatuck and police protection from state police and the county sheriff's department.

According to testimony presented at the hearing, of the 31 qualified electors in the area, eleven favor annexation and 18 are opposed. There are eighty six property owners in the area, but nearly two thirds are summer residents, it was pointed out. The area lies between the village and Lake Michigan.

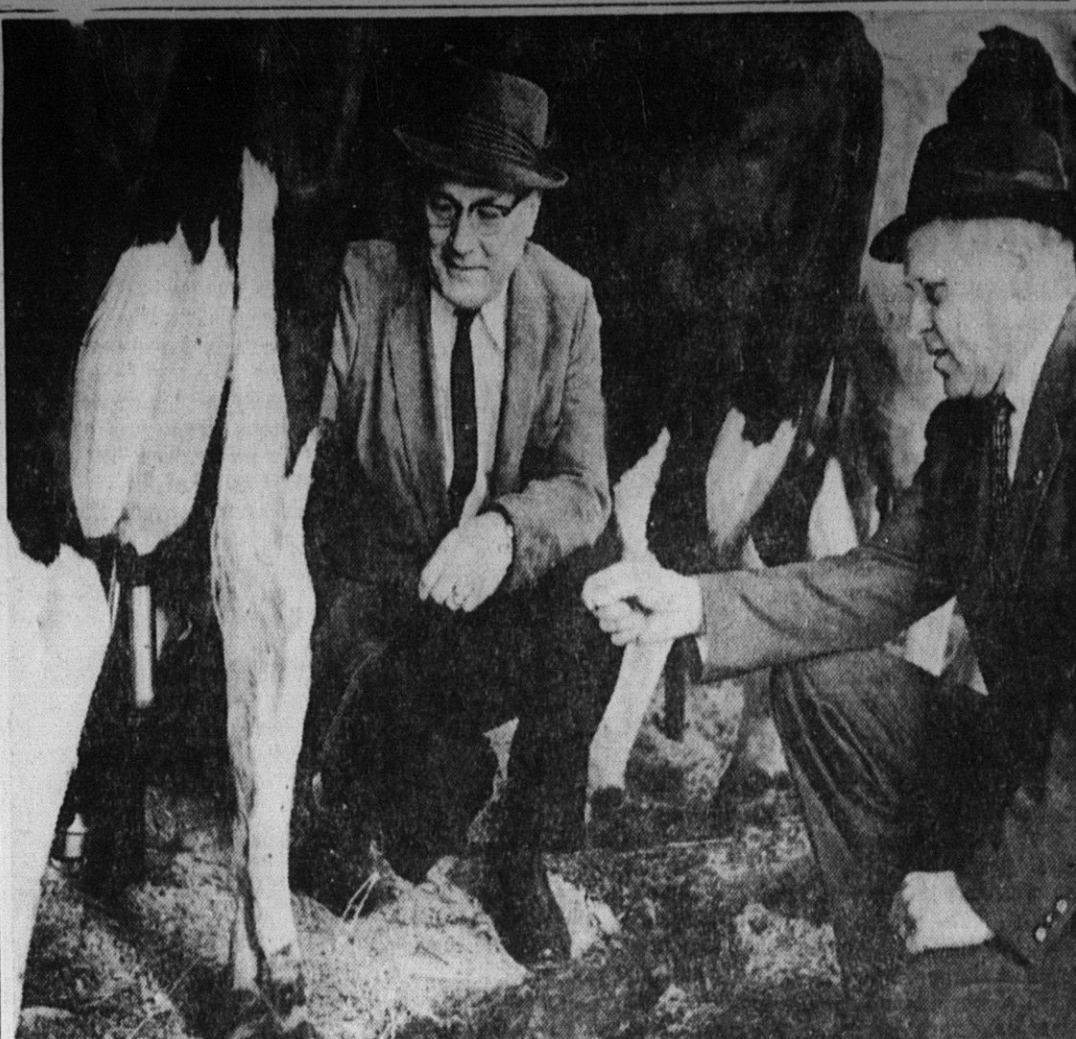
After his wife's death in 1952 he lived in the Warm Friend Hotel until moving to Detroit. He was a member of Hope Reformed Church.

Bid Let for Repairing Section of River Ave.

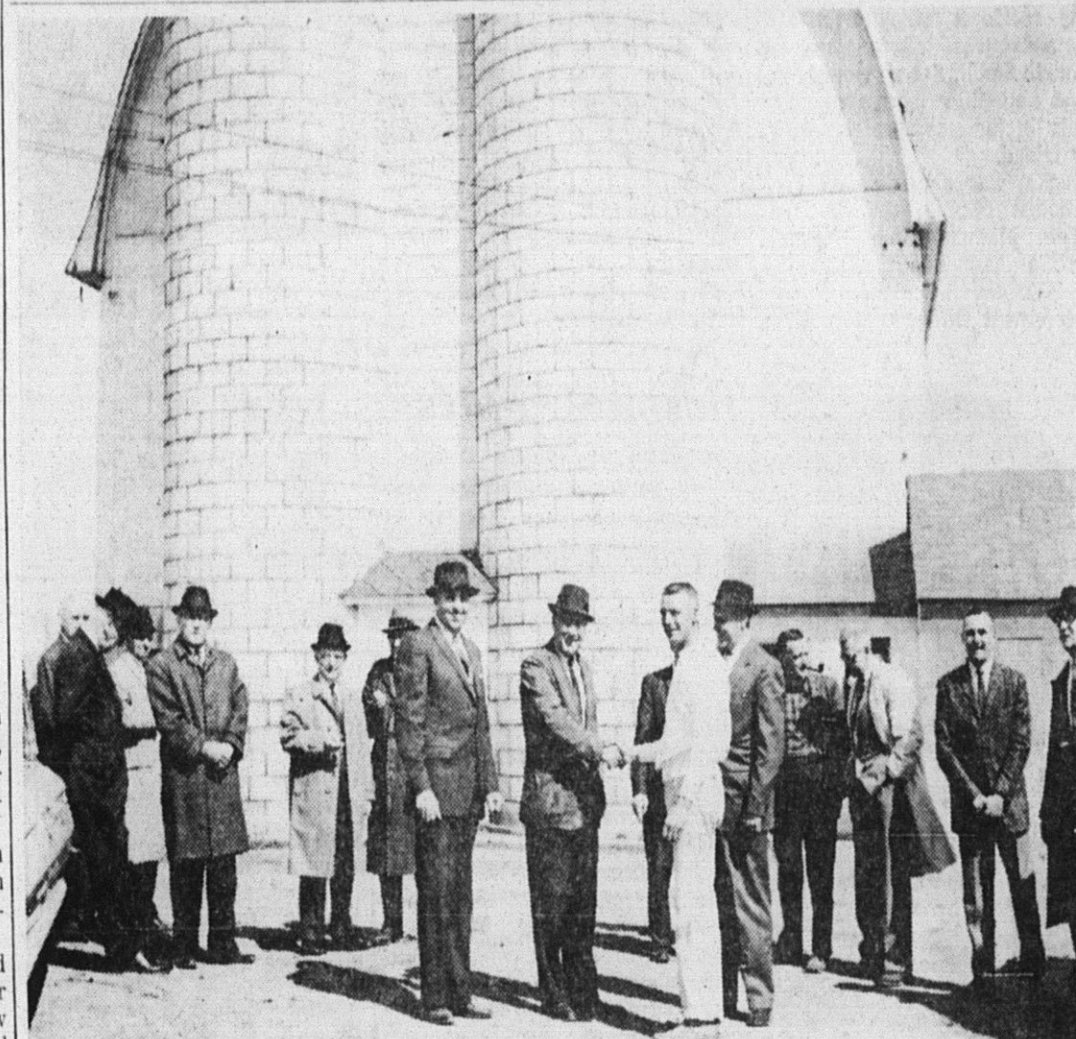

ALLEGAN—Sheriff Walter Runkel, 68, died Saturday night of cancer of the brain in Blodgett Memorial Hospital in Grand Rapids where he had been a patient since March 21. He had been in a coma since Wednesday.

He was appointed sheriff Jan. 1, 1954, following the resignation of Louis A. Johnson who became secretary of the Michigan Sheriff's Association. Before the appointment, Runkel had served 11 years on the department as deputy sheriff and later as undersheriff. In all he had served the sheriff's department for 19 years.

Before his appointment as a deputy he operated a farm near Hopkins and served as a member of the county school board for several years.

He was born in Port Washington, Wis., but the family moved to the Hopkins area in 1911 to operate a large farm. He is a veteran of World War I. He served in the U.S. Navy aboard a destroyer under Capt. (later admiral) "Bull" Halsey.

Shortly after he became sheriff, national attention was focused on his department because of a murder near Saugatuck involving socially prominent Detroit and Chicago residents which culminated in a sensational trial in which Dr. Kenneth Small, Detroit dentist, was found not guilty by reason of insanity in the slaying of his wife's boy friend.

Runkel was a member of First Methodist Church, the American Legion, Michigan and National Sheriff's Associations, Southwestern Michigan Association of Law Enforcement Officers, Lions Club,

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County Board Ends April Session

GRAND HAVEN — The Ottawa County Board of Supervisors wound up its three-day April session Monday afternoon after adopting the equalization report for 1962 and disposing of several other items.

The equalization report, submitted last Friday, calls for a total county equalized value of \$306,539,629 and an assessed valuation of \$161,596,132. The 1961 figures were \$294,645,911 for equalized and \$155,170,136 for assessed.

Holland city's valuation, which comprises 25 per cent of the county total, lists \$41,677,705 for assessed and \$76,639,250 for equalized.

The board spent considerable time on the 51st annual report of the Board of County Road Commissioners in which engineer William Osner explained both the financial report for the fiscal year and the proposed budget for next year.

Included in incidental information was the fact that the county has spent over \$350,000 in snow removal and ice control the past season. This lists \$104,000 for primary roads, \$115,000 for local roads and \$135,000 for highways. It was not known at present just how much the State Highway Commission will pay on snow removal this year.

A high figure for weed control, listed at in excess of \$91,000, also includes removal of elm trees dying or dead of Dutch Elm Disease. Osner explained that regulations have been liberalized to allow people to keep the wood for firewood. Previously, all dead elm trees had to be burned and this involved costly transportation to dumps sometimes five or six miles away.

Grand Haven City Manager R. V. Terrill said Grand Haven was in a spray program for a second year. In general, he said the program is fairly effective, although the Audubon Society and other groups protest the use of DDT in possible danger to birds. He said Lansing has followed a program four or five years. Out of some 2,500 elm trees, Lansing lost 18 last year.

The proposed 1963 road construction program lists 14 items. Among them are 96th Ave. from M-21 to Otis Ave., 2 1/2 miles partial reconstruction and recap, \$40,000; Beeline Rd. from James St. to US-31, 1.35 miles, recap, \$16,000; Butternut Dr. from Riley St. to New Holland St., 3 miles, partial reconstruction and recap, \$45,000.

Considerable time was spent discussing resolutions received from other county board, but each of the 14 resolutions was ordered received and filed. The rules and legislation committee had summarized the 146 resolutions which came mainly from Lapeer, Cheboygan and Grand Traverse Counties.

Two resolutions, lotteries and removal of the 15-mile limitation, evoked considerable discussion, but since both involved the Constitutional Convention and were somewhat outdated Atty. Howard Fant of Grand Haven moved they be filed in view of the fact that the board could spend all its time on such things and become in effect a little Constitutional Convention, something he felt was not the function of the body.

Herman Windemulder of Park Township felt the board should express its opinions on timely legislation. Fant and others agreed as to the right, but Fant pointed out that the resolutions as expressed were not specific and should have more study.

Another discussion ensued on procedures on resolutions, and it was finally decided to wait until the June session when the buildings and grounds committee will report on availability of a ditto or duplicating machine which could reproduce resolutions, or summaries more easily. The board commended the rules and legislation committee for its fine work.

The board granted permission to a new citizens safety group, currently being organized, to use county equipment previously acquired for the county safety program. The new citizens program would involve no expense to the county or city. Avery D. Baker of Holland is seeking to reactivate a safety program for the county on a citizens level. James Townsend of Holland suggested the equipment be stored in the county branch building. Equipment in demand for the purpose are films, projectors and sound equipment. Such equipment currently is in charge of Donald Oosterbaan of Holland.

The board adjourned subject to the call of the chair.

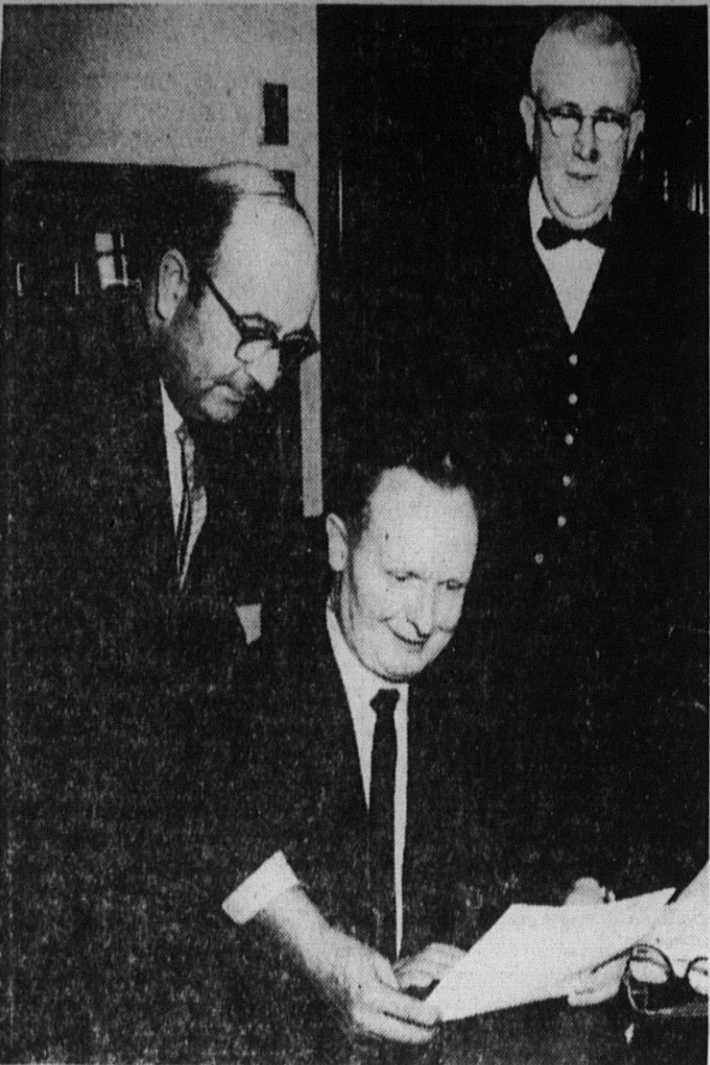
The American Legion Memorial Park will take on a festive appearance Saturday when the first annual Easter Egg Roll is scheduled from 11 a.m. to noon.

City Pays Large Share of Taxes

GRAND HAVEN—Holland city's share in Ottawa county taxes is likely to be 25 per cent, according to figures submitted by the committee on equalization at a meeting of the Ottawa Board of Supervisors Friday afternoon.

According to law, the equalization report must be "on the table" for 24 hours before action is taken.

That part of Holland city which lies in Ottawa county amounts to 5,088 acres and carries an assessed valuation of \$41,677,705. The equalized figure as submitted by the committee is \$76,639,250. Last year's equalized figure was \$76,639,250 or 25.08 per cent.

Ottawa county lists a total assessed valuation of \$161,596,132 and an equalized valuation of \$306,539,629.

Grand Haven city with an equalized valuation of \$45,397,447 represents 14.8 per cent of the county total; Zeeland city with \$13,959,102 is 4.5 per cent; Hudsonville city with \$5,826,544, 1.9 per cent; Holland township with \$30,632,158, 9.99 per cent; Park with \$14,407,783, 4.7 per cent; Robinson has the lowest valuation of \$2,993,082 or .97 per cent.

On recommendation of the ways and means committee, the board voted to limit the 1963 budget to \$1,275,000. The proposed budget as submitted April 10 had called for a total of \$1,380,756.23. Decision on limitation is made at this time of the year for the allocations committee.

On the basis of \$1,275,000 to be raised by taxation, the millage would very nearly remain at the 4.15 mills currently in effect, or might advance to 4.16 mills.

Henry Slaughter, chairman of the ways and means committee, said the board should set an example in holding the line on taxes, and should trim expenses where possible. The committee made no recommendation as to specific cuts.

Hans Suzenaar was reappointed Civil Defense director for Ottawa County for another two years. Richard Cook, chairman of the finance committee, expressed concern over CD expenditures the past year and moved that the board instruct Suzenaar to live within his budget. A discussion ensued in which other members of the finance committee differed with Cook as to direct action, and a substitute motion ensued ordering all board committees to keep departments within budgets, instead of singling out any particular group. Gerrit Bottema and William Kennedy explained that radiological classes last fall had involved additional funds, and some \$2,000 in bills came from the 1962 budget. The CD budget last year was in the neighborhood of \$17,000. A figure of about \$19,000 is listed in the 1963 proposed budget.

Chairman Larry Wade announced a meeting set up by the Holland Garden Club Tuesday, April 24, at 7:30 p.m. on pollution problems of Black River and Lake Macatawa. Representatives of the Water Resources Commission and the Conservation Department will be present. Wade said the meeting should be of particular interest to the conservation committee, and urged all board members to be present.

A communication from Prosecutor James W. Bussard stated he could find no requirement in the law that the county must purchase equipment by accepting bids or that any such bids should be taken in any particular order.

This was in answer to a criticism earlier in the week leveled by a Grand Haven auto dealer who charged the board with discrimination in awarding a bid for seven patrol cars for the sheriff's department.

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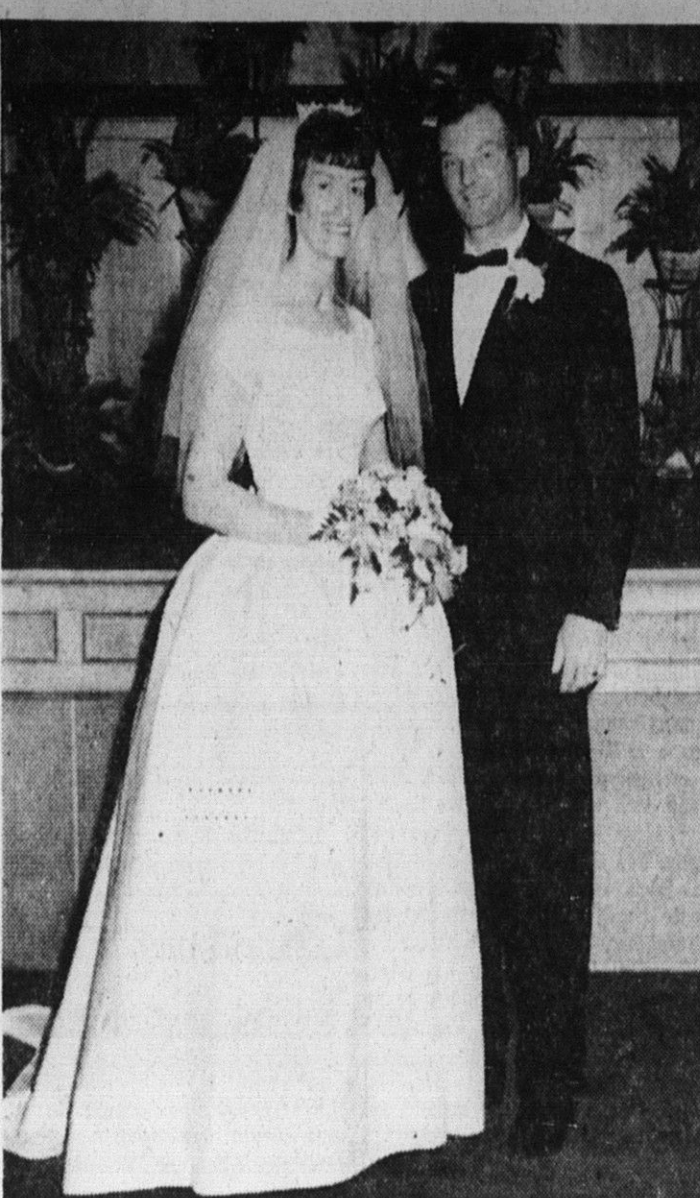
