\$4.1 Million Budget Set For Ottawa

GRAND HAVEN — A proposed budget for operations of the Ottawa county government in 1973 was presented by the ways and means committee to the board of commissioners at a meeting Monday and will be referred to the tax allocation commission as a guide to the amount of millage, that will be allocated to the county.

The proposed budget lists expenditures totaling \$4,110,519, compared with a 1972 budget of \$3,650,909, but members were informed that the proposed budget may be reduced by a large amount, depending on the revenue from taxes. The final budget will not be decided until the October session of the board.

Marvin De Witt of Borculo, chairman of the equalization committee, presented the committee's annual report, which lists the total equalized value of the county at \$575,905,005, an increase of almost \$45,000,000 over the 1971 total. All cities and townships except Port Sheldon township reported increases in equalized valuation. The cities reported an average of 6.61 per cent in increases and the townships an increase of 9.5 per cent.

The building and grounds committee, William Winstrom of Park township, chairman, reported that the Wink's shoe store building at Allendale is to be abandoned and the board voted to lease this building as a sub-station for the welfare department, at \$3,000 a year, on a temporary basis. The Chamber of Commerce at Allendale is assisting in paying for part of the cost.

Board members from the Georgetown township area urged that that area be considered for branch offices for the welfare department and health department and the planning committee was instructed to investigate the need for these services.

Director Larry Hildore of the social services office at Holland discussed problems in his department and the board voted to ask officials from Lansing and Grand Rapids, including R. Bernard Houston, state director of social services, and Robert Toot, regional field representative, to appear before the board to discuss mutual problems.

The board was to meet again today to approve the report of the equalization committee. Mrs. Gordon Langhead, Sr., who has property at Fifth and Franklin St., across from the county building, informed the board that her property is for sale. She plans to leave the property Oct. 1.

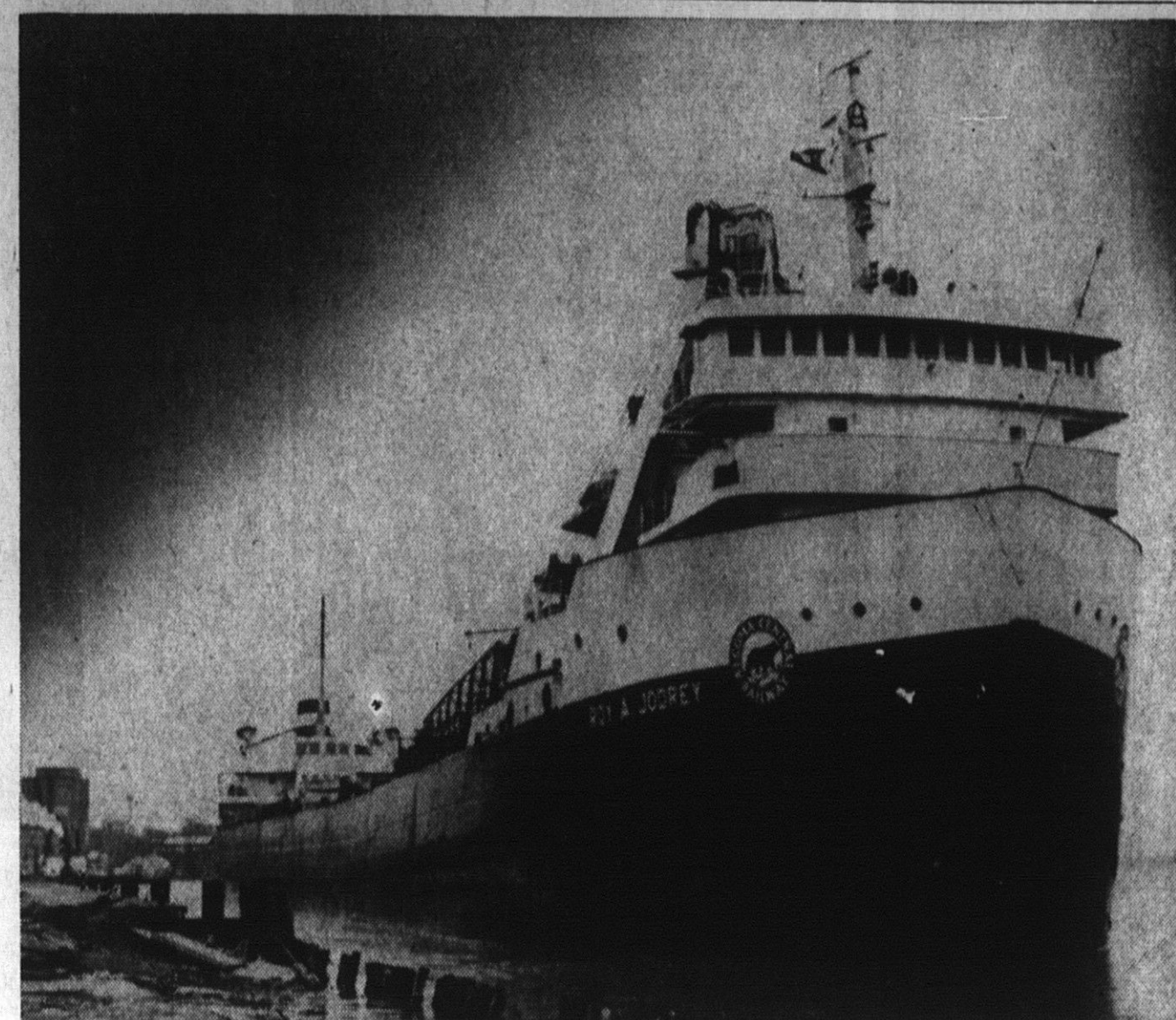
Fire Damages Highway Garage and Grader

New Sign Ordinance Now Ready

Willard C. Wichers, chairman of the Ordinance Study Committee of the Holland Planning Commission, announced today that a new Sign Ordinance for Holland is ready for final consideration.

The proposed law culminates many months of preparation by the committee, supported by city administrative and legal staff.

According to Wichers, the need for a new sign regulation became apparent when the Planning Commission initially established a standing committee to provide ongoing review of planning related ordinances.

Finding sign provisions in a variety of unrelated chapters of the City Ordinance Code, the committee set as a primary goal the unification of all sign laws into a single independent ordinance. It is anticipated that this will facilitate administration of the law and simplify understanding of Holland's sign law by advertising contractors and affected citizens.

In its study, the committee found many elements of the present law outdated by changes in marketing and advertising methods. In reviewing variances granted by the Zoning Board of Appeals, Wichers' committee concluded that requiring signs to observe full building setbacks in Highway Commercial zones has been unduly restrictive. The new ordinance proposes a 50 per cent setback reduction in this zone.

In no zone, however, will signs be permitted to encroach into street rights of way, over public sidewalks, or into other public spaces. In the Central Business District, where buildings are permitted right up to front property lines, this will restrict most signs to flat against the building.

Efforts were made throughout the committee's study to write a sign law tailored to the specific needs of Holland. Staff assistants conceded that it is often tempting to be guided by what other communities have done, and create a "scissors and paste" ordinance.

The proposed law, however, except for standard provisions relating to structural safety, represents a consensus of the committee. Serving with Wichers on the Ordinance Study Committee are Howard Kammeraad, Henry Hekman, Terry Hofmeyer, Frank Zepeda, and L. W. Lamb, Jr.

Prior to forwarding the proposed ordinance to Council for final consideration, the commission has set a public hearing April 26 in the conference room of Herrick Public Library.

Water Bonds Sold, Township to Begin Work on System

GRAND HAVEN — Construction of a \$1,300,000 water system in a Holland township is scheduled to begin within a month following sale of bonds to finance the project, it was announced Friday by Ronald Bakker, engineer-manager of the Ottawa county road commission.

Low bidder on the sale of bonds was Old Kent Bank & Trust Co. of Grand Rapids with an effective interest rate of 4.8969 per cent. The bid was one of 10 received at the bid opening Thursday.

The project is being financed through the water and sanitation division of the road commission.

Last week contracts were awarded for water mains, an elevated storage tank and a metering station. The township is to purchase water from the Wyoming city pipeline to Lake Michigan which runs along New Holland St. at the north border of the township.

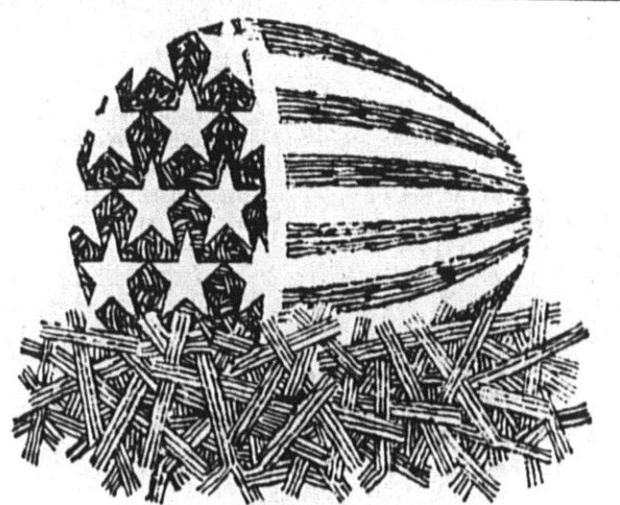

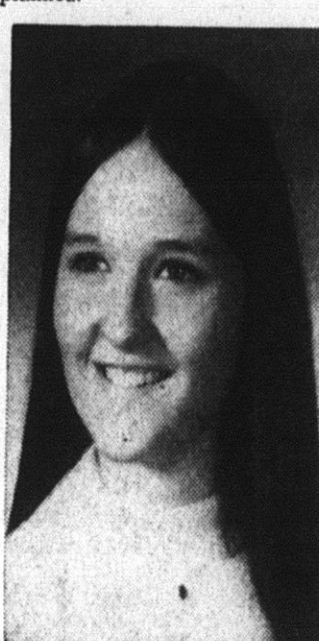

Seven Hope Students Get Study Grant

Seven Hope College students will be afforded an opportunity to do independent biology research next summer under a \$12,000 Undergraduate Research Participation grant from the National Science Foundation.

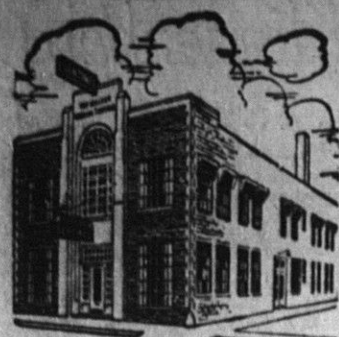
The grant, which will be administered by Dr. Ralph Ockerse, professor of biology at Hope, will be used primarily to aid students and provide for supplies and facilities.

More than 2,600 top college students throughout the country will conduct research this summer in all fields of science under similar grants, and one or two students will be selected from other colleges and universities in the Midwest to participate in the Hope program. The remainder of the participants will be chosen from Hope students majoring in biology.

"During the past four years NSF grants have enabled 30 Hope College students to pursue sophisticated research in biology in collaboration with faculty colleagues," said Dr. Ockerse.

Much of the results has been published in professional scientific journals with students as coauthors of the publications. Other data has been presented at annual state and national meetings such as the Michigan Academy of Science, Arts, and Letters, the American Association of Plant Physiologists and the American Institutes of Biological Sciences.

The Undergraduate Research Participation projects are designed to show faculty members the superior teaching effectiveness resulting from placing major responsibility for learning upon the student. The present grant is the third such grant awarded to the Hope biology department.



Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, April 23
The Church: A Witnessing Community
Mark 5:18-20; Acts 8:4-8;
Acts 18:24-28

If the church is a witnessing community, then its members must be active and not loaf on the job. This lesson in three stories tells about several witnesses from whom we can learn something even though they lived in a different age.

I. A personal testimony can be effective. Mark tells about a demoniac who was a menace to himself, his family and his community. He was a violent man.

Some people are becoming interested in demonology because of the many deeds of violence and even during the Lord's ministry the devils were busy opposing His work. Jesus healed this dangerous man and restored him to his family and community. The man asked to go along with Jesus, who told him to go home and tell his family what the Lord had done for him.

Note the three requests made. The demons asked permission to enter into the swine and got it; the people in the community asked Jesus to leave and He did, and the healed man asked to accompany Jesus but was refused. Instead, he went home and told the people in Decapolis (literally, 'ten cities') what Jesus had done for him and they listened and marvelled. The best way to witness is to say what Jesus has done and what He means to the individual.

II. Some can preach and win converts. Philip, the deacon, went to Samaria and preached there. This was a bold step for Jews and Samaritans did not like each other.

At Samaria, Philip did not preach sociology, about racism which some preachers seem to think is a sin only white people commit, the slums, poverty, hunger, all modern topics which need thought. Philip preached Christ and people responded, conversions took place, lives and homes were changed and "there was great joy in the city." Is the modern church preaching like Philip?

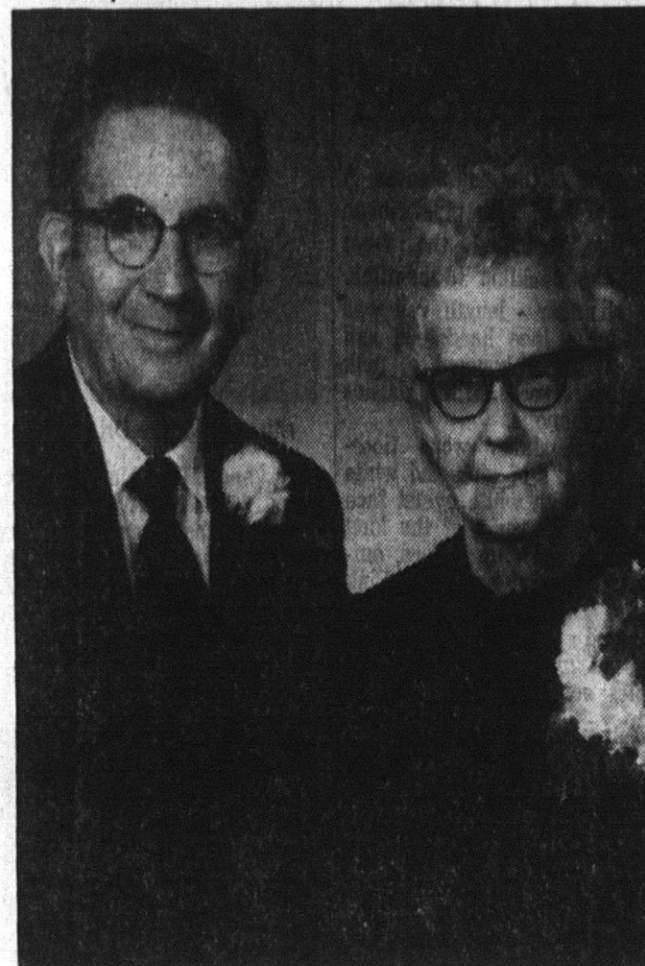

Hope Psychology Department Gets \$12,050 Grant

The Hope College Psychology Department has been awarded a \$12,050 National Science Foundation grant under their Undergraduate Research Participation Program.

The grant will permit six to eight Hope students majoring in psychology to participate this summer in concentrated research experience under the supervision of a psychology department faculty member.

The program, one of only 19 funded nationally in psychology, will be under the direction of Dr. James H. Reynierse, associate professor of psychology.

Typical research projects will include investigating the performance of monkeys in perceptual discrimination tasks, analyses of group interaction measures in human small group behavior situations, examining issues related to anxiety, conflict and fear in animal learning, comparative analyses of the social behavior of rodents and fish, and problems dealing with perceptual illusions and sensory interactions in human perception.

"While some of the selected student participants are already actively investigating these problems as part of their current joint research with a psychology staff member, all students will continue their summer projects during the following academic year," said Dr. Reynierse.

Tillstrom Awarded Honorary Degree

A skillful blend of dignity and informality marked a Hope College convocation Thursday night in which Burr Tillstrom, renowned puppeteer and a pioneer in the field of educational television, was awarded an honorary Doctor of Letters degree.

The convocation was held in the theatre of the new De Witt Student and Cultural Center, and after the ceremonies and a brief address by Tillstrom, the latter doffed his academic gown and hood and performed his now-famous hand ballets before being joined by his good friends, Kukla and Ollie, both wearing mortarboards, and all the other Kuklapolitans.

The event was all the more significant since it marked the 25th anniversary that Kukla and Ollie met Fran Allison who could not be present because she was receiving an honorary degree Thursday night from Coe College in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. Tillstrom, who has been lecturing this week in the theatre department at Hope College, spoke of the need to communicate love and peace on the world's most powerful medium—television.

He said there are times when he feels the television founders have created a monster, "but I love it." He spoke of defining communication as imparting, making known, transmitting, participating and an interchange of thoughts and opinion, and then quoted two verses of favorite Psalms and his feeling for prayer.

"There has never been a performance in 25 years that I haven't turned to God for my ideas and my fulfillment," he said.

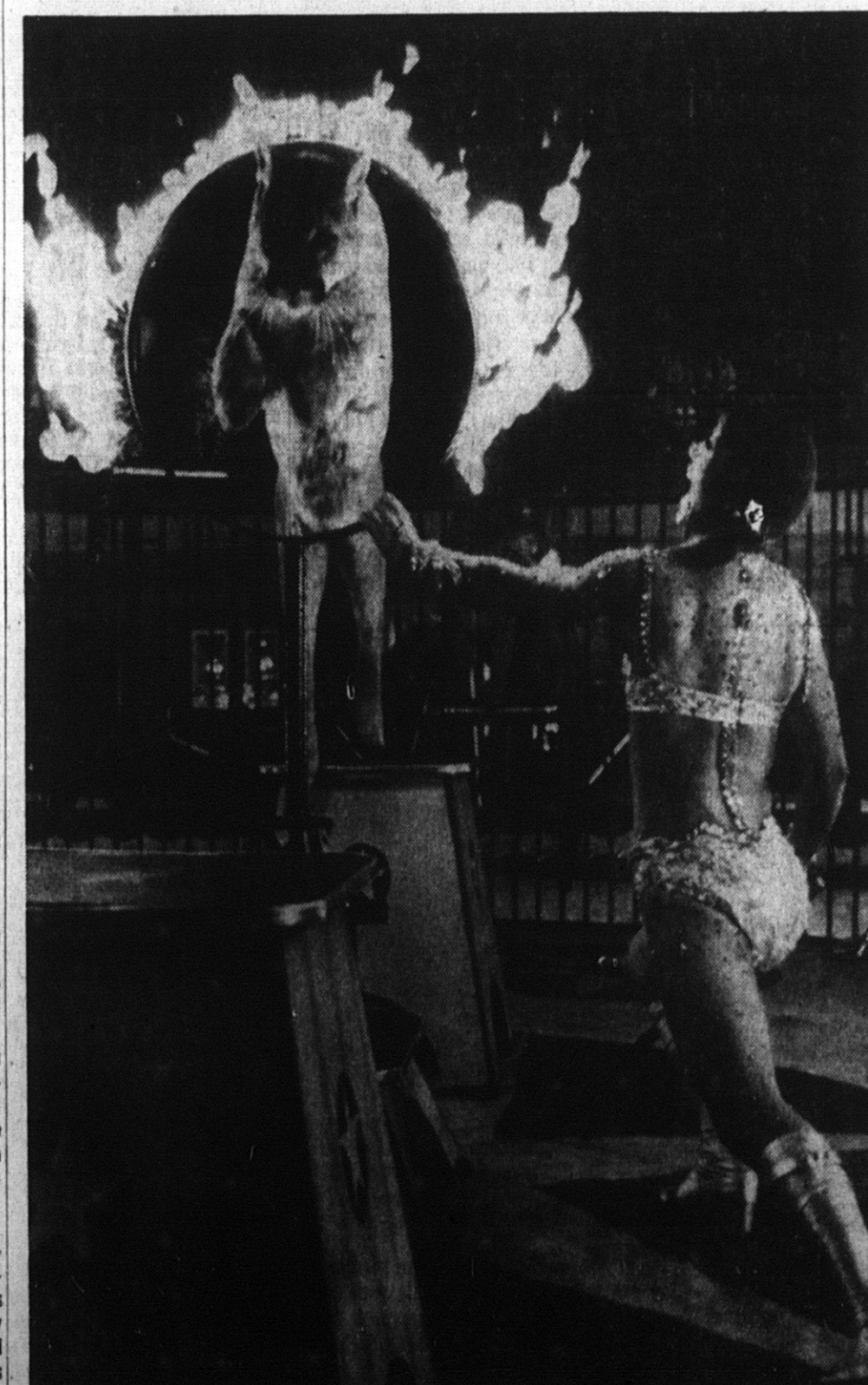

Allegan Jury Finds Carolyn Lacy, 21, Innocent in Death

ALLEGAN — Carolyn Jean Lacy, 21, of Allegan, charged with murder in the fatal shooting March 4 of Mark Johnson at her home, was found innocent by an Allegan County Circuit Court jury Thursday.

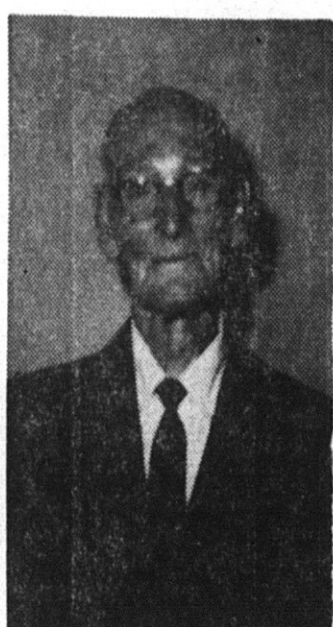

Recommend Police Shifts Of 10 Hours

Continuation of the Holland police department's 10-hour a day, four-day week schedule for officers was being recommended following a six-month trial period which ends this month.

Chief Charles Lindstrom said the recommendation that the schedule be made permanent was being made to the city manager and to council. Last October, council approved a revision in the patrol schedule to allow the 10-hour work plan.

Lindstrom said in a three month period, November to January, police records showed a 41 per cent decline in officer overtime, a 50 per cent cut in sick leaves and a 41 per cent drop in compensatory time off compared with the comparable three-month period a year ago.

During the three months under the 10-hour a day plan, arrests increased 12.7 per cent and reported offenses increased 17 per cent. The number of miles patrolled by officers increased by one per cent.

Lindstrom said the 10-hour schedule allows for overlapping of shifts during critical times of the day and night. He said the trial period resulted in some modifications to the original schedule.

A survey among the 32 officers affected by the 10-hour schedule revealed the concept and its benefits were favored nearly three to one by those responding to the survey.

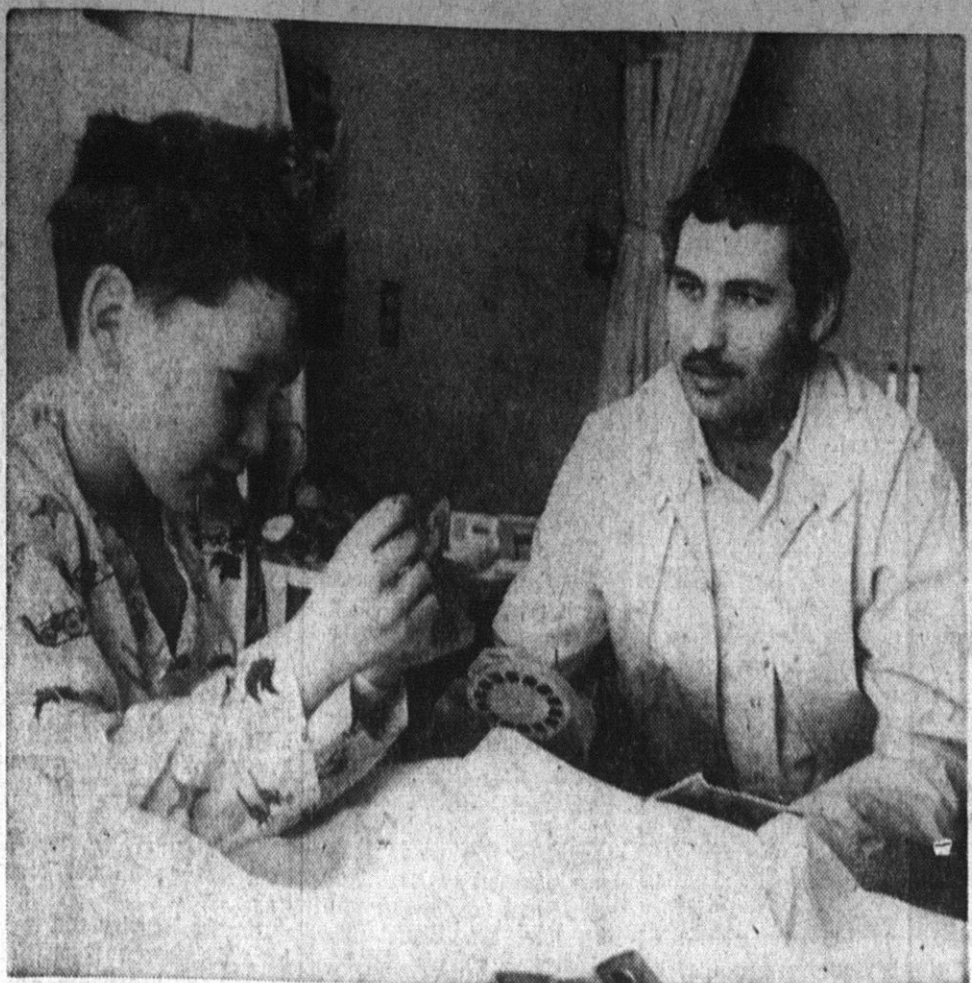

Says South Viets Lost 13,650 Men During Offensive

PARIS (UPI)—Madame Nguyen Thi Binh, Viet Cong foreign minister, said Tuesday South Vietnamese forces have lost 13,650 men in the Communist offensive which, she said, was launched to defeat President Nixon's "Vietnamization" program.

Madame Binh told France-Inter, the government-run French national broadcasting network, that American troops were involved in the fighting and that the Communists did not rule out a new U.S. "military adventure" against North Vietnam.

Another Millage Vote Set June 12

Holland voters will face another school millage issue at the annual school election June 12.

The Board of Education at its monthly meeting Monday night voted unanimously to resubmit the millage issue calling for 4.65 mills for one year. This measure was defeated last week by 379 votes.

Based on total district equalized valuation of \$145 million, the 4.65 mills will raise \$674,250.

Supt. Donald L. Ihrman said the administration is observing a freeze on all new positions, pending outcome of the election. John Amaya asked what the alternatives will be and Ihrman said since 80 per cent of the budget deals in salaries for people, there is no question but that there would be drastic cuts in personnel if the millage does not pass.

"Even if it does pass, we face a year of belt tightening," he said.

James O. Lamb, board president, commended Board Treasurer Charles Bradford and others in holding a tight rein on finances all year, resulting in an expected balance of \$100,000 at the end of the school year June 30. He commended the board for its close concern for watching finances while maintaining a quality program, but said the expected balance is only 2 per cent of the total budget.

He explained the Board of Education had no voice in the city's decision for reappraisals but the board concurred with City Council in adjusting assessments to 50 per cent of market value as required by the state. "Some had not been paying their fair share, and others were paying more than their share," he said. He added that a 20 per cent boost in assessment does not necessarily mean that taxes will be boosted 20 per cent.

He also pointed out that school board members receive no remuneration, nor desire any, but are concerned only with doing a good job for the schools and the public.

Supt. Ihrman said school district valuation had increased from \$132 million to \$145 million and 4.65 mills would produce an additional \$178,750 in local taxes, based on the assumption there will be no change in state aid formulas or county allocations. But he said while local values increase, state aid decreases, reducing Holland's share by \$191,750 for a net loss to the district of \$13,238.

John Weber, another member, said some people were confused in the belief that the 4.65 mills was in addition to 5.75 mills raised last year. That levy was for one year only.

The board approved a half-mill levy for swimming pool operations for three years on

GVSC Okays Slight Increase in Tuition

ALLEDALE — A slight tuition increase of \$8 a term at Grand Valley State College effective this summer was approved by the GVSC Board of Control at its annual meeting Friday.

This increase raises tuition for Michigan residents from \$152 per term to \$160; from \$456 to \$460 per academic year, an increase of \$24. Out-of-state tuition also increases \$24 per academic year from \$1,200 to \$1,224. Extension tuition presently \$20 an hour, is boosted to \$21.

Room and board charges of \$1,140 per academic year were not increased.

Two new deans were appointed. Dr. Adriani Tinsley to William James College and Dr. Robert Jens Toft as dean of College IV, a new unit to open in 1973. Dr. Tinsley, a member of the faculty at the University of Maryland, will succeed Dr. Kenneth R. Vanderbush who will return to his responsibilities as vice president of student affairs.

L. William Seidman was re-elected board chairman.

Based on Gov. William Milliken's recommendations, the board approved a tentative general fund budget of \$9,414,000 for 1972-73, reflecting an increase of \$2,543,532 over 1971-72.

The board named the new art center "The Alexander Calder Fine Arts Center" honoring the artist whose works and contributions have benefited Western Michigan and Grand Valley.

A status report concerning GVSC's new educational television station due to begin broadcasting later this year revealed awards to low bidders as follows: antenna and tower, Radio Corporation of America; transmitter, General Electric; cameras and projectors, Philips; video tape, RCA; switching and monitors, Vital; and audio, Audio Distributors.

Approved was an application with the U.S. Department of Housing for an interest subsidy grant for Living Unit IV,

an apartment-type complex on campus, anticipated for completion in the fall of 1973.

Also approved was the first three-year contract between GVSC and the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees AFL-CIO local 2074, retroactive to Nov. 14, 1971. The contract lists an average 26 cents increase across the board.

Junior High Planning Is Outlined

The Board of Education Monday night was brought up to date on planning for new junior high schools.

Architect Paul Vander Leek explained options are being obtained on two sites, neither of them identified, and that considerable work has been done on planning, particularly on space requirements, following numerous meetings with junior high staff and administrative personnel.

General plans call for two junior high schools to accommodate 900 students each. Current enrollment is between 1,200 and 1,300.

Vander Leek listed the following possibilities:

1. Two junior high school buildings, each calling for academic units, an auditorium accommodating 450, a cafeteria and kitchen, a gymnasium and swimming pool.

2. Same as above except no swimming pool.

3. Same as No. 1 except no swimming pool and a cafeteria in lieu of an auditorium and cafeteria.

4. A central kitchen in the E. E. Fell building to provide food for the entire school system, reducing the need of kitchens in new junior high schools and requiring only storage and serving areas.

President James O. Lamb was concerned with building costs and operational costs, and Charles Bradford asked about projected uses of pools, cafeterias and kitchens. These estimates will be forthcoming later.

Supt. Donald L. Ihrman announced that Dr. Kenneth Weller, president of Central College at Pella, Iowa, will be the commencement speaker this year. He is a Holland High graduate of 1943.

By a vote of 4 to 3, the board rejected a recommendation to eliminate baccalaureate services this year. Casting "no" votes were John Weeber, Robert Gosselaar, John Amaya and President Lamb. The recommendation had come from the senior class which had voted 210 to 87 last January to eliminate the service.

Announcement was made that Holland High School again has received accreditation from the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. Supt. Ihrman said the only flaw in the report approved March 22 was that one teacher has 20 hours as an English major instead of the required 24, and this is being remedied. Holland High has received continuous accreditation since 1908.

A communication from the League of Women Voters outlined its study of the need for a vocational-technical facility for Holland area, highly recommending such a move and pledging cooperation in aiding its promotion. The board expressed appreciation.

Weeber asked the administration to contact all school principals about summer maintenance this year, with a view to accomplishing as much as possible.

On recommendation of treasurer Charles Bradford, the board approved retroactive pay for Holland teachers under phases 1 and 2 affecting pay between Sept. 1 and Nov. 15. This will amount to something over \$50,000 which has been budgeted. Approval for the pay came from the Internal Revenue Service.

The board approved plans for using school facilities for traffic school for chronic traffic violators. The request came from the 58th district court.

All members were present at the meeting which lasted an hour and a quarter. President Lamb gave the invocation.
