## Outpatient Surgery Will Start Monday

Beginning Monday Holland Hospital will offer a new service to some of its patients.

If your doctor recommends certain types of minor surgery it may be possible that this can be done under the new arrangements in the outpatient surgery unit. This means a patient can be admitted in the morning, have his surgery and be home in time for supper the same day.

A few of these procedures have been done in the past in the emergency room but the hospital did not have proper facilities for some of the long-

er procedures which require a general anesthetic. Without making any physical changes in the building this is now possible through a rearrangement of existing space.

A four-bed ward on the 1-west nursing unit has been converted to the "outpatient surgery unit". Here the patient will be admitted, get undressed, receive a pre-operative hypo if necessary and then be taken to surgery.

If he has a general anesthetic he will go from the operating room to the regular recovery room until he has partially recovered. He will then be transferred back to the outpatient surgery unit until he has fully recovered from the anesthetic. After that he is ready to leave for home but he must be accompanied by another individual.

If the patient has a minor procedure which does not require a general anesthetic he will be admitted to the outpatient surgery unit, undressed, be taken directly to the surgery suite for surgery. He will then return immediately to the outpatient surgery unit and as soon as his physician feels he is able to leave, he can dress and be on his way so long as he is accompanied by another individual. For the patient's safety it is necessary that these patients be accompanied to their homes. For an individual who might have difficulty arranging someone to accompany him he could utilize "Dial-A-Ride."

The advantage of establishing this unit is to the patient. It saves his time and his money. Currently any of the procedures necessitating a general anesthetic require the patient to be admitted to a hospital bed overnight. Under the new system he will be scheduled to have the necessary laboratory work done a day or two prior to his scheduled surgery.

From the standpoint of cost, the operating room charges will be identical to those in the past. The savings will be for that patient who normally would have been admitted to the hospital as an in-patient and would have had at least a one-day room and service charge of anywhere from \$35 to \$75 depending on the type of room to which he was admitted.

The only room charge under the outpatient arrangement will be a \$20 charge for the outpatient surgery unit for those patients having a general anesthetic. If the patient has only a local anesthetic his outpatient surgery unit charge will be \$10 for that service.

Some of the procedures under the new system are minor skin operation, cystoscopies, simple eye operations, simple ear operations, D & C's, breast biopsies, teeth extractions, vasectomies and many others.

"With hospital costs escalating every year, new ways have to be devised to treat patients more economically wherever possible. This is one step in that direction which the hospital estimates will benefit over a thousand patients each year. Holland Hospital is pleased to be able to offer this service to the community as an indication of its interest in reducing the cost of health care," director Fred Burd said.

## No Speech... Just Lots of Questions

Following a format of questions and answers in preference to a prepared speech, U. S. Rep. Guy Vander Jagt covered a host of subjects before a full house at the annual Chamber of Commerce "Breakfast With Guy" this morning at Point West.

From Watergate to Energy to Impachment to Inflation to Crime came the questions thick and fast, and Rep. Vander Jagt with customary skill had answers for all.

**Energy Crisis** — Government agencies advocating use of coal are in contention with EPA which opposes coal. Congress has 28 subcommittees on energy with almost no correlation and has been struggling with an energy bill for the last four or five months.

**Veto Proof Congress** — George Meany's prediction that the next Congress will be veto proof is entirely possible and is a legitimate cause for concern. Watergate has harmed the Republican party.

**Spongers off Welfare Rolls** — Something must be done to get people off welfare who find it more profitable not to work than to work. Best example is California's new law and Gov. Reagan had to fight the federal government every step of the way. The House has passed such a bill but the Senate voted it down. No further action is expected for a long time.

**Inflation** — Much greater concern than Watergate but it comes under the umbrella of Watergate along with the energy crisis and other problems. Vander Jagt feels that lifting price controls April 30 and allowing free enterprise to find its own levels is an answer. It will have an immediate acceleration of prices but in the long haul will reduce them.

**Impeachment** — Vander Jagt will find himself in the role similar to a juror in the Grand Jury inquiry and would like to know the charges and what constitutes an impeachable offense. He said there have been so many delays that he does not expect real report of the

## Skill Center Vote Again Discussed

GRAND HAVEN — Another discussion on the need for a skill center for Ottawa Area Intermediate School district was held at the monthly meeting of the Board of Education Thursday night, while no decision was reached on a public vote, the consensus pointed toward a December election in preference to the August primary or the general election in November.

Such a skill center would serve all school districts in Ottawa county and several in Allegan county.

In other business, the board approved a six-week summer program for Ottawa Area Center at an estimated cost of \$26,413, and also was informed that the six-room addition at the center is progressing on schedule. Contracts of two psychologists presently on 180-day contracts at the center were extended to full-year contracts. The rationale for such an extension was the demands of Mandatory Special education and the increasing amount of pre-school testing.

**Equity in Special Education** millage across the state was discussed. The new plan which will be effective with the 1975-76 school year calls for an equal levy to yield an equal amount of money. For low valuation districts, the difference would be made up by the state.

The board set May 23 as date for a hearing on a property transfer request for Mr. and Mrs. Fred McCormick who wish to transfer from the Hamilton district to the Saugatuck district.

## Raymond De Witt Bound to Court

GRAND HAVEN — Raymond De Witt, 23, of Zeeland, was bound over to Ottawa Circuit Court Friday following his District Court examination to a charge of manslaughter in connection with a hit-and-run fatal accident March 3.

De Witt was released on \$2,000 personal recognizance bond to appear in Circuit Court May 13.

He was cleared in connection with the death of Terry Linda Potter, 24, of Grand Haven, who was struck by a car while walking south along 144th Ave. near M-45 with her fiancé, Leon Kraai Jr., of Holland. The car fled the scene but De Witt was arrested at his home later.

Board of Control Approves Hike

## GVSC Will Hike Room and Board

ALLEDALE — For the first time in three years, Grand Valley State College will hike its room and board charges. The rate hike and an increase in tuition and fee charges were approved by the GVSC Board of Control Friday.

Tuition will be raised \$1.50 per credit hour beginning this summer and brings tuition and fee charges for a full-time student taking 15 credit hours for three terms to \$385 for the academic year. The current tuition is \$517.50.

Out of state students will pay \$30.50 per credit hour.

Graduate tuition and fee charges will be raised by \$2 an hour beginning in June.

Room rates in the three residence halls will increase from \$170 to \$180 this summer. Ravine apartment charges per person will rise from, \$195 to \$203 for two bedrooms; \$225 to \$266 for one bedroom and from \$225 to \$234 for efficiency apartments.

Board charges for 20 meals a week will increase from \$210 to \$233.

Dr. Harold Kolenbrander, dean of college planning, said GVSC still offers the lowest combined charges for on-campus residence and food service in the state "as far as we know." Residence facilities are near full occupancy.

As for tuition increases, Dr. Kolenbrander said rapidly rising costs of operation, including utilities, equipment and services, supplies and materials were taken into account and in order to maintain the quality of the institution "we have been forced to recommend an increase in tuition and fee charges."

In other action the board approved a tentative general fund budget of \$12.3 million for the 1974-75 academic year including the governor's recommended \$8.5 million.

Spring term enrollment was reported at 5,620.

## Dutch Visitors Share in Mayor's City Hall Coffee

A brief visit to Holland including a cup of coffee with Mayor Lou Hallacy at his open house in City Hall Wednesday afternoon was a happy occasion for two Dutch visitors, Johannes Leydekkers, consul in the commercial division at the Netherlands Consulate General in New York, and Kersen J. De Jong, regional representative for the Netherlands Chamber of Commerce in Chicago.

The two men had come to Holland for a brief visit with Willard C. Wichers who last month was named honorary consul of the Netherlands continuing his work as a Dutch contact official with the Netherlands government through Service. Since then he also has been made honorary representative of the Netherlands Chamber of Commerce.

It was Leydekkers' first visit to Holland, Mich., but Wichers managed to show the pair the Netherlands Museum, Windmill Island and Hope College before going to the mayor's coffee.

Leydekkers currently is awaiting reassignment to a foreign post for the Dutch government.

Ottawa County would pay the initial fee of 50 cents per parcel recorded for the computer. Thereafter the fee to the township would be 30 cents for each parcel and to the villages and cities 50 cents for each parcel.

## Report On Equalization Under Study

\$722,935,130 Listed As Valuation; Report Given by J.K. Dressel

GRAND HAVEN — Ottawa County Commissioners Monday received the 1974 equalization report from the county equalization committee but failed to take immediate action on it, a move that drew strong criticism from one commissioner. Another meeting was scheduled Thursday, the fourth equalization meeting.

The report, submitted by county vice chairman James K. Dressel of Holland, showed a total state equalized valuation in Ottawa County of \$722,935,130 but Dressel cautioned that a dispute involving equalization of Consumers Power Co. in Port Sheldon township could drop the equalization to roughly \$707,810,157 but still above earlier estimates of \$705,000,000.

Two townships unhappy with the so called equalization factor proposed for their areas served notice on commissioners they would appeal the equalization methods used by the county to the state tax commission.

The two are Wright and Tallmadge townships. Wright was given a 1.26 factor while Tallmadge a 1.28 factor. The factor is added by the county in an attempt to raise the valuation of property in the governmental unit to be in line with the rest of the county.

Fritz Guldswag, director of the county equalization department, warned such action could result in increases in the entire county's valuation since the state considers the overall county valuation when investigating an appeal of one unit.

Dressel said a key to the delay in presenting the equalization report was the unequal assessment between the Consumers Power Co. generating plant in Port Sheldon township and the rest of the township. The power plant accounts for about 80 percent of the total township valuation, he added.

But Dressel said the state sets the value of power plants and Consumers most likely would appeal any valuation the county set, hence the total county valuation could be lower than the \$722,935,130 set by the equalization committee. Port Sheldon was given a factor of 1.351.

A lowering in valuation of the power plant could reduce taxes to school districts serving Port Sheldon township, to the township government and the county government, Dressel said.

Dressel recommended the report be placed on the table for local government units to study before final action was taken.

That move drew strong objections from commissioners William Kieft Jr. of Grand Haven who claimed the commissioners were not going to change the factors and equalization figures and by acting immediately could save money for taxpayers.

Kieft claimed commissioners were called to three meetings on the equalization matter "at \$400 a meeting and the report could be adopted immediately "when no change is anticipated" and save some money.

Polkton township supervisor Harold Busman of Coopersville, saying he "may get his neck cut off" criticized other township supervisors not in attendance at the commission meeting for having a lack of interest in their townships.

He claimed some supervisors did not know what equalization factor was being added to their townships and doubted whether they were informed.

At least four townships were represented at the meeting Monday including Park, Wright, Tallmadge and Polkton.

On an eight to one vote, with Herbert Wybenga and Kenneth Northouse absent, commission the equalization report untilers decided to delay action on Thursday morning. Kieft said he would not attend "another meeting on equalization."

## Baby Turkeys Lost In Borculo Fire

BORCULO — About 2,000 baby turkeys were lost in a fire that damaged a portion of a 160-foot long building at the Bil-Mer Turkey Farm at 112th Ave. and Polk St. Tuesday at 8:20 p.m.

Company officials today estimated the loss to the turkeys and damage to the interior of the building at \$2,500. The fire was believed caused by an overheated stove.

Firefighters from the Olive-Blendon department were called and remained on the scene about two hours. Company officials said 6,800 baby turkeys in building were saved. The fire was confined to the north end of the cement block structure.

## Sites For Disposal Discussed

Alternate sites for disposal of polluted materials dredged from the Lake Macatawa shipping channel were discussed Wednesday night by representatives of the Corps of Engineers, concerned environmentalists and conservationists and governmental representatives.

In submitting the alternatives the Corps stressed no site had been selected for the disposal and that additional discussions were planned tonight. The meeting will be at 8 p.m. in the Peale Science Center Library Conference Room.

Alternatives are needed for dredging disposal since a land site on the Padnos Iron & Metal Co. property used since 1964 has been filled and the channel west of the River Ave. bridge to Lake Michigan is in need of dredging.

The Corps is prevented from disposing of the polluted dredgings in the lake and now must use an impoundment method on land. Unpolluted dredgings such as sand at the mouth of the harbor entrance are deposited in Lake Michigan.

The dredge Hains started dredging the harbor entrance Wednesday, the Corps said.

Land disposal sites under study include city owned areas north and south of the river east of the River Ave. bridge; city owned property south of the river near the sewage treatment plant and the former landfill; sections of Hyma's Island in the Black River and portions of Windmill Island.

Much of the alternatives are considered marsh lands and proposed use of those sites drew objections from environmentalists who feared loss of wildlife and water fowl. Conservationists said the marsh area was one of the better spawning grounds for fish in the area.

Land disposal methods require diking to assure containment and retention of the polluted material. The sites must be adequate for ten years use or 500,000 yards of material.

Under the plan the land would be provided to the Corps at no cost, the state would approve use of the land and local governments would pay 25 percent of the construction costs unless a waiver were granted.

Holland has been granted a waiver based on its efforts to improve the quality of Lake Macatawa through improve to its waste water treatment plant.

Should approval for a site be granted this summer, it could be next year before the site would be prepared and dredging could begin, a Corps spokesman said. Holland, then, would become one of the first areas on Lake Michigan to use the impounded land method of disposal for dredgings.

In its report on alternatives, the Corps said it had conducted a lengthy study of the lake area, soil conditions and environmental and social impacts.

## Gosselar Seeks Another Term

Robert W. Gosselar, who operates two grocery stores in Holland, said today that he will seek reelection for another four-year term on the Board of Education at the annual election in June. He was first elected to a one-year term in 1969 and was elected to a full four-year term in 1970.

Gosselar, 51, has been in the grocery business over 30 years, operating the IGA Food Basket and the Economy IGA. He is married and has two children. He is a member of Immanuel Church.

John Weeber, another board member whose term expires this year, has announced no decision about seeking another term.

Mrs. Tom De Pree announced her candidacy for the board a week ago.

## Six Injured In Two-Car Crash

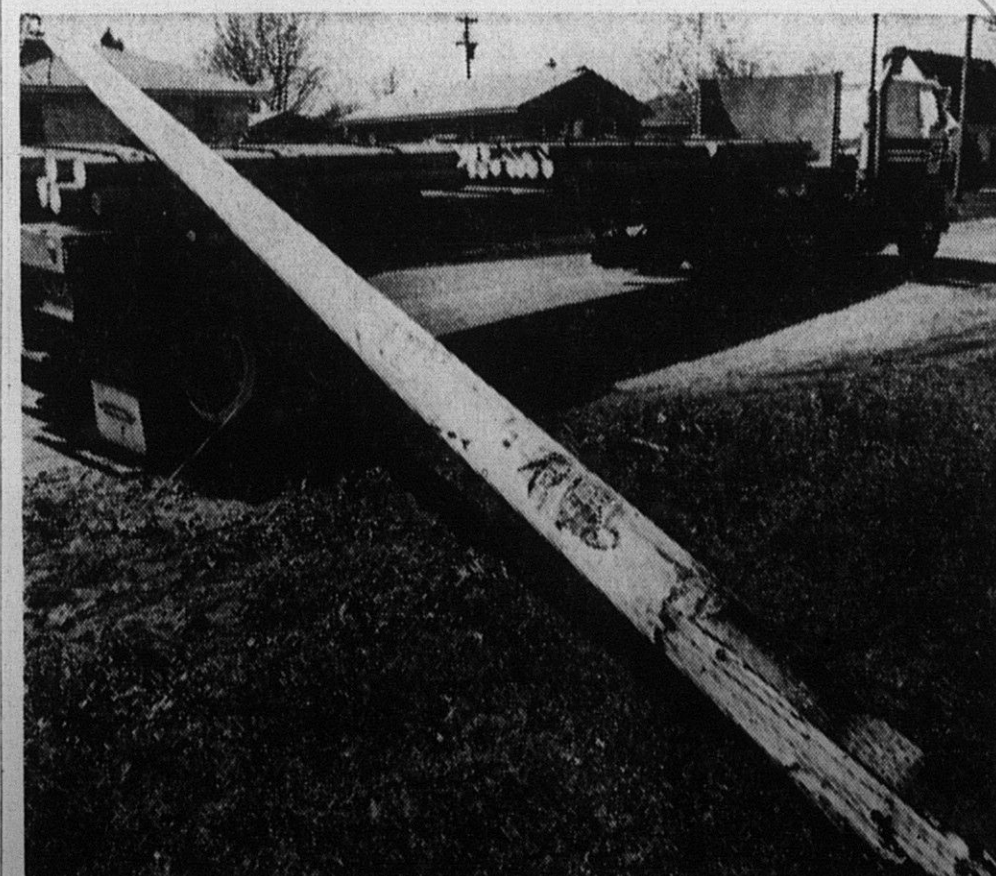

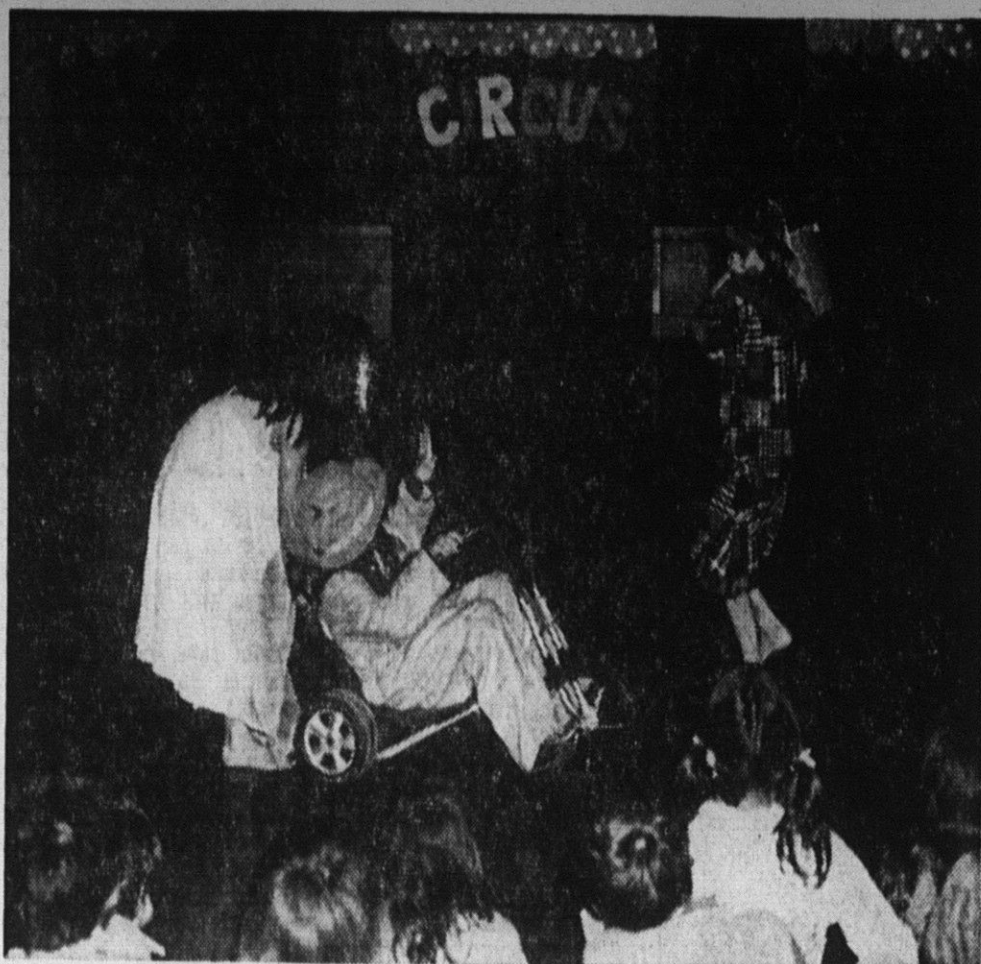

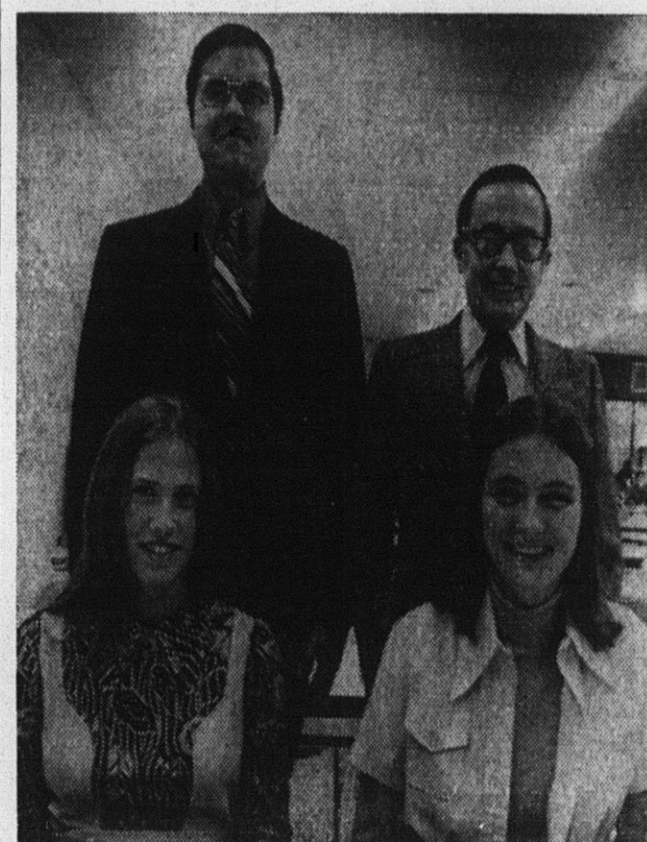

Teachers taking charge of the students were Mrs. Vukin of Holland High School, Eugene Laninga of Holland Christian High School and David Visscher of West Ottawa.

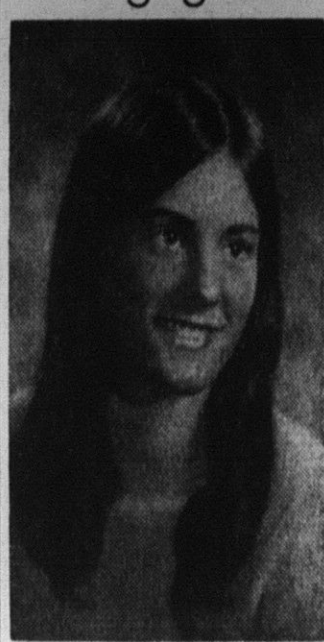

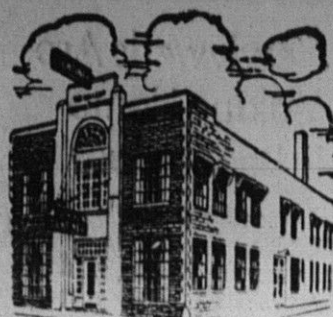

#### Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, April 28  
A Strategy For Mission  
Acts 15: through 16:10  
By C. P. Dame  
People do not always think alike. In families and in congregations there are at times disagreements. This lesson tells how two Christian workers disagreed, not about a doctrine, but about another worker. The disagreement God's Spirit overruled and used for the extension of Christian work.

I. It is human to disagree. After the completion of their first missionary journey, Paul and Barnabas returned to Antioch and after a stay Paul suggested that they visit the converts who had been won and see how they were. It was a good idea and Barnabas agreed. Barnabas suggested that they take Mark along but Paul objected and a sharp contention arose which resulted in a separation. Barnabas, who believed in giving Mark, the quitter, another chance went with him to Cyprus, his home territory, and Paul chose Silas who had come from Jerusalem (15: 27, 32) and they "went through Syria and Cilicia strengthening the churches," by teaching and preaching the word of God.

Who was right in this dispute? In II Timothy 4:11, Paul praises Mark. At times a compromise is in place, but never at the cost of a principle. Let's keep out of disputes if it is at all possible.

II. The Holy Spirit works. At Lystra Paul met Timothy, whose mother was Jewish but whose father was a Greek. He had a fine reputation and heritage and Paul took him along after he had circumcised him not for a religious reason but in order that he might be more acceptable among the Jews—no principle was sacrificed. God forbade the missionaries to go into Asia, and when they wanted to go into Bithynia, they were again forbidden and so they went to Troas where they got directions. Paul in a vision saw a man from Macedonia who prayed, "Come over into Macedonia and help us," and this settled the matter and they went. In verse 10 the word "we" appears which says that Luke the writer joined the missionary party.

III. Obedience is rewarded. The party came to Philippi, a Roman colony and since there was no synagogue in the city the missionaries on the sabbath day went to a prayer meeting and there met several women at the riverside. The preaching touched one of them, Lydia, who was converted and she and her family were baptized. The missionaries, on account of the healing of a slave girl, were jailed. An earthquake shook the jail and led to the conversion of the jailer and his family who were baptized. Converts were won in Philippi. Today converts are still made because the Holy Spirit is at work.

#### Dr. DeCook Shows Slides Of Bangladesh to ABWA

The Holland "Charter" Chapter of the American Business Women's Association held its third annual "Boss' Night" Tuesday at the Spring Lake Country Club. A social hour preceded a buffet style dinner. The invocation was given by Marilyn Bultman, vice president, followed by the pledge of allegiance.

Members and guests were greeted by the president, Gladys Hartgerink, who introduced Lily Geerts, mistress of ceremonies. The welcome was extended by Lillian Knoll and the response was given by her boss, Jack Leenhouts. Miss Bultman gave a brief history of ABWA which was founded in 1949 as an educational organization to help advance women in the business world. It has grown to 1,100 chapters in the United States with a present membership of 74,000. ABWA holds dinner meetings each month with guest speakers, honors employers with a Boss' Night each year and grants scholarships to deserving students. A member is honored by being chosen Woman of the Year. The present Woman of the Year is Dorothy Dyk.

Vocational speaker was Alice Meyer of Chemetron Corp.—Pigments Division. She told of her work in keeping perpetual inventory of raw materials that are used for basic colors for printers ink among other uses. She explained some of the detail in code numbers that indicate type of color to be made and the procedure of schedules.

The speaker for the evening was Dr. Joseph DeCook who too the group on "A Trip Into Antiquity" with his colored slides taken in Bangladesh. He was born in Newberry and received his medical degree from the University of Michigan. He served his internship at Butterworth Hospital and also served with the U. S. Public Health Service in Arizona among the Apache Indians.

After two years of local private practice, he went to the Christian Memorial Hospital in East Pakistan as a medical missionary. After the country had been torn with civil war and strife, the area became known as Bangladesh. It is about the size of the state of Michigan and 85 per cent of its 80 million people still live in a state of antiquity but are slowly making strides toward

more modern living. Bangladesh is a land of disasters as well as contrasts as it is often in the process of recovering from floods, cyclones or the strife of war.

Many pictures showed beautiful landscapes with mountains in the background with almost every picture showing lakes or rivers and many fields of rice which is the main source of food. They also showed the old and new contrasts—of a modern airplane and boats and the ancient sampan sail boat.

Also in contrast to our way of life, men do the marketing as woman's place is in the home and the background, and women still wear black veils in public. The few who are considered wealthy perhaps compare to America's upper middle class.

Homes are built of bamboo or bricks and all paving is done with bricks which are made by natives. The doctor's home is well constructed with eight-inch walls to withstand cyclones and heavy rains.

The Christian Memorial Hospital serves five million people who live in a radius of 150 miles because it is the only hospital. It serves 37,000 outpatients alone each year. There is much disease among the natives due to neglect and ignorance and they pose a real challenge to the doctor's skill and knowledge by the time they seek medical help.

Dr. DeCook said he had never seen a tetanus case until he went to Bangladesh where it is not uncommon. He showed many pictures of the hospital, personnel and patients and told of several amusing incidents.

About 85 per cent of the natives embrace the Moslem faith and only one-tenth of one per cent are Christians. Dr. DeCook and his associates at the hospital seek to give the Christian message of "the way, the truth and the light" to their patients as they serve both the physical and spiritual needs of these people.

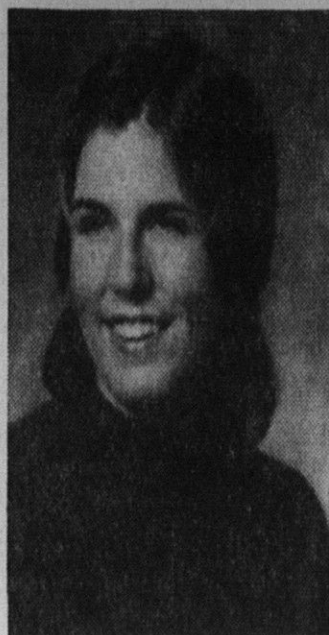

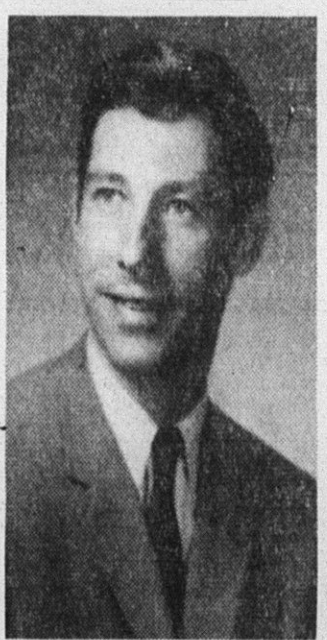

## Chorale Busy Preparing For Tulip Time Concert

Following will be an interesting assortment of oldies, pops, folk songs and ballads, winding up with a group of selections from the popular musical "Oliver."
