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

## Ray Smith Hospitalized; \$80 Stolen

Bandits Enter Station On M-21 at 120th Ave. Early Sunday Morning

A local service station owner was beaten and robbed early Sunday by strong-arm bandits who fled with \$75 to \$80 from the cash register of the M-21 One-Stop service station at M-21 and 120th Ave.

Owner Ray N. Smith of 262 College Ave. was taken to Holland Hospital where he was treated for multiple lacerations and contusions about the face and head. Hospital officials said his condition was good.

Holland police said the bandits struck about 4:30 a.m. Sunday. Smith told police he was grabbed from behind by the thieves, who held Smith's hands with his own belt and pushed him face down on the floor. Smith had about \$25 in his wallet which was not touched by the bandits, police said.


Smith told police he failed to see his assailants and heard no talking during the robbery. He said he did not know how many persons were involved in the robbery.

Smith called police as soon as he was able to untie himself. Police alerted area law-enforcement agencies who set up road blocks in the area at 5:20 a.m. Sunday.

The blockades were lifted at 8:44 a.m. after failing to turn up any suspects. Smith was able to give no description of the car used by the bandits, police said.

In addition to the money taken from the cash register, a blue Holland Sentinel subscription card and a British-American credit card were missing. Police said the cards had been in the cash register with the stolen money.

Police said the last armed robbery in Holland occurred April 5, 1950, when bandits held up the office of the Holland Loan Co. The last strong-arm robbery of a filling station occurred at Meegs' service station in 1932, police said.

Plan Survey Of Harbor

A survey of Holland harbor will begin Wednesday or later this week. Robert Sonrall, chief engineer of the Grand Haven branch of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers notified the Holland Chamber of Commerce.

Chamber officials contacted Sonrall Monday after the S. S. Gypsum had difficulty entering Holland Harbor Saturday night because of a sand bar at the harbor entrance.

Sonrall checked with the Army Engineers in Detroit and reported he is taking a crew presently working in the Saugatuck channel and transferring them to the Holland job.

The dredge Hains, presently working in the South Haven harbor, will be sent here for dredging when the survey is completed, Sonrall said.

The harbor and lakes committee of the Holland Chamber will meet Thursday at 4 p.m. to begin the first study in reactivation of a port of authority. Peter Van Dommelen is chairman.

## Dr. Raymond Seeks Con-Con Position

Dr. Bruce M. Raymond of Holland, former professor of history and political science at Hope College, announced today he will be a candidate for delegate to the Constitutional Convention, seeking the Republican nomination for the Ottawa county position.

Dr. Raymond is vice president of Raymac, Inc., an agency for bank advertising operating in the entire eastern section of the United States.

Dr. Raymond has long been interested in constitutional revision. In 1939 he was appointed by Gov. Murray D. Van Wagoner as a member of the Michigan Constitutional Revision Study Commission. The commission worked a year and a half and recommended a Constitutional Convention but World War II intervened. In 1944, Dr. Raymond was appointed by Gov. Harry Kelly as a member of the Michigan Tax Study Commission.

Another local con-con candidate is Alvin W. Vanderbush, associate professor of political science at Hope College, who announced his candidacy last week as delegate on the Democratic ticket for Ottawa County.

Holland Hospital prepared for emergency power, but regular service was restored quickly.

## Tulip Time Traffic Plan Established

Area law enforcement officials, meeting in Holland Tuesday, worked out plans for traffic control in the Holland area during the Tulip Festival, May 17-20.

Holland police will bolster their forces with the addition of approximately 35 to 40 special police during the four-day festival, according to police Lt. Ernest Bear.

For the first three days of the festival, 24 state troopers and two state police command officers will also work city traffic with local police, Bear said.

On Saturday and Sunday, when crowds are expected to hit their peak, there will be 32 troopers in addition to two command officers assigned to the Holland area. Six troopers will work with the Sheriff's Department in areas outside the city, according to Bear.

Sheriff Bernard Grysen said that 20 reserve deputies would be assigned to areas north and east of Holland during the festival weekend. For the first three days of the festival Grysen said eight to ten deputies would patrol M-21 east of Holland and US-31 to the north.

Grysen said six cruisers would be assigned to the Holland area. Four cars were to be dispatched to M-21 to the east and two would patrol US-31 north of the city.

Attending Tuesday's meeting for establishing the Tulip Time traffic plan were Lt. Bear, Sheriff Grysen and Sgt. Gerald Witteveen of the Sheriff's Department, Capt. Leroy Hunt, Lt. K. F. White and Sgt. Edward Lenon of the Michigan State Police.

Centennial Park Lawns 'Repaired'

Park Department workers Tuesday began work on "lawn repairs" at Centennial Park.

Recalling the unfortunate experiences of four years ago when chicken manure was used to fertilize the lawn, Park Supt. Jacob De Graaf says he can accomplish the same result this year through the use of leaf mold and chemical fertilizers without the accompanying odors.

The leaf mold is the result of collecting all those leaves from city streets each fall. This mold, accompanied by commercial fertilizers, provided the humus desirable in a good lawn base.

## Hope to Begin Work on Fields

A \$43,000 bid was awarded today to the De Forest Excavating Co. of Grand Rapids for clearing the grounds for the proposed Hope College athletic plant and work is expected to start soon.

The athletic plant will be located east of Fairbanks Ave., between Ninth and 13th St., with most of the property between Ninth and 12th St. The property was acquired by the college last fall.

College officials were told work would start on clearing the area "as soon as weather conditions permit." It was expected the Grand Rapids firm would start work later this week or next week.

Included in the bid will be clearing, leveling and seeding the area along with the cost of an underground sprinkling system for the baseball and football field and for tiling for drainage from a creek located in the area. This project is expected to take most of the college summer, officials said.

The property forms somewhat of a triangle with the northeast corner cut off by the C and O railroad track. The Van Raalte Homestead, located north of the present Van Raalte Field, will be razed, college officials said.

The No. 1 item will be a baseball field and it will be located at the eastern point of the property, straight east of 11th St., east of the present Van Raalte practice field and beyond the creek. The baseball field will be built first, according to present plans.

The field will face to the northeast and left field and adjacent area to the west of the baseball field will be used for practice football.

A football field and track, running north and south, will be constructed east of the creek and west of the baseball field.

The present Van Raalte Field is expected to be a site of a softball field while another softball field will be located north and west of the football field.

The athletic field project is the second stage in the "Looking Ahead With Hope" campaign. The Van Zoeren Library was the first stage, college officials said.

## Grand Haven Tops Maroons

Grand Haven's baseball squad posted its 28th straight victory at Riverview Park Monday afternoon by blanking Holland Christian, 6-0 for Christian's fourth straight loss, all by shutouts.

The Maroons never threatened as they managed only one base hit and had just three baserunners during the seven inning stint. After shortstop Jim Newhouse had walked in the sixth, third baseman Clare Van Wieren singled sending Newhouse to third for the only uprising. A Buc error permitted another runner in the second inning. Vic Geisler went all the way for the Bucs and struck out 11 while walking one.

Don Klaasen started on the mound for the Maroons and pitched three innings giving up five runs. Gerard Vander Wal came on in the fourth and limited the Bucs to one run and one hit.



## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, April 30  
When God's Wisdom Prevails  
Job 42:1-12

Most people like to read a story that ends well. The story of Job ends in a fine fashion. The main truth to remember about Job is that his faith in God made it possible for him to triumph over all his troubles and trials.

I. A great idea of God is helpful. In chapters 38 to 41 God answers Job. In these chapters God does not explain why Job was afflicted but He speaks to him about His greatness revealed in nature. He asks Job how much he knows about the mysteries in nature. Seeing that Job does not understand creation he ought to realize that he cannot understand God's providence. Mystery faces us in nature and in providence—this fact we too should remember.

Job replied to God and said, "I know that Thou canst do everything, and that no thought can be withheld from Thee. The thought of the greatness of God made Job feel insignificant. In our day we give but little thought to God's greatness. We are discovering the wonders of this universe but these wonders do not turn our minds to God's wisdom. Job confessed that he had spoken in amiss: "I uttered that I understood not; things too wonderful for me, which I knew not." When we consider the greatness of God we ought then to put faith in Him and live by faith. Too many people have a small God.

II. A personal religion is a power. A hearsay religion is not enough. Job said, "I have heard of Thee by the hearing of the ear." He had heard about God but he had not experienced God in his life. Religion must not only be taught but it must also be caught. Some young people have heard their parents talk about God but they have no personal experience of Him. A hearsay religion must become a personal religion. Job learned to say that, "my eye seeth Thee" and as a result he abhorred himself and repented in dust and ashes. The better we see God the more clearly we see ourselves.

III. Intercessory prayer brings blessings. God was not well pleased with the attitude of Job's friends and He told them to make a burnt offering and that Job would pray for them. The three men did what God told them to do. When Job prayed for his friends, God turned his captivity. The prayer of Job was a blessing to him and to his friends. The Christian Church is much in need of intercessors. The Bible speaks to us of a number of great intercessors.

The Lord restored the fortunes of Job. His friends and relatives who had forsaken him returned and brought him gifts. In his old age, Job became a happy man again. The devil has no happy old people. Wealth came again to Job, God gave him another family consisting of seven sons and three daughters and once again he became a man of note in his community. The daughters of Job were the most beautiful women in the community.

It is in place to mention here that God does not always restore lost property to his saints. Not every one who suffered severe financial losses or met with reverses of another kind regains everything. The truth to remember is that he who keeps his faith in the midst of his losses and reverses is the victor.

ALLEGAN — Allegan supervisors Friday approved a preliminary budget totaling \$775,000 for 1962 after the finance committee trimmed nearly \$87,000 from departmental requests which totaled \$861,810.

The preliminary budget represented an increase of \$50,000 over that approved by the board last year.

The report showed that all county real estate and personal property had been assessed at \$38,838,209 — \$68,910,950 in real estate and \$19,927,249 in personal property.

According to the committee report, the city of Allegan will again pay the largest share of county taxes, 9.1 percent, followed by Otsego, with 8 percent, and Plainwell with 7.5 percent.

Before adjourning for the weekend, the board approved a civil defense committee report recommending the appointment of David Weston — who resigned the post in January — to serve as temporary CD director and purchasing agent until the June session.

The board also approved a report from the special parks committee calling for expenditure of not more than \$1,500 for: (1) New fencing and gates at the West Side Park on Lake Michigan in Ganges township, (2) new fencing and tree removal at the Gun Lake Park and (3) establishment of a special boat launching site, with picnic tables and stoves on county farm property on the south shore of Dumont Lake. Parks Committee Chairman Bernard Miller said the Parks Commission probably would issue orders prohibiting use of the present Dumont Lake for boat launching.

He said setting aside the special area for boats would serve a dual purpose: eliminating a hazardous condition which has existed for some time, with swimmers and power boats using the same area, and also allow the park to be closed at night, to help limit vandalism, without complaints from night and early morning fishermen.

## Prof. Italiaander Tells AAUW of Russian Threat

A thought-provoking and stimulating talk on "Soviet Penetration into Africa" was given Thursday evening at the Woman's Literary Club to members of the American Association of University Women by Dr. Rolf Italiaander, visiting professor of African History and Civilization at Hope College.

Dr. Italiaander has traveled widely in Africa and has spent the last 13 years studying the various countries on that continent.

He said that "at the moment it looks like Russia is interested only in Africa, but we must remember that Russia's goal is to bring Communism to the entire world."

"They started in the 1920s with international meetings aimed against Colonialism and imperialism. In 1928 in Hamburg, Germany, the Communists founded a magazine called 'The Negro Worker,' which was sent all over the world and had a great influence on the Negro people."

Prof. Italiaander told the group how the countries in Africa are falling for the Russian line. Ethiopia is making strides toward Communism. Kenya is last to the Western world. In Tanganyika, Madagascar and Rhodesia, there is a strong underground Communist movement," he said. Algeria is leaning toward Communism. If she topples, so go Tunisia and Morocco. This could be the start of another Iron Curtain, he said.

"Angola and Mozambique are having troubles and of course, the Belgian Congo. The real base of the Communist movement in Africa is Guinea, which used to be a French colony," he reported.

"The main reason for leanings

toward the Soviet line is the hate of the colonial peoples for colonial control," he said. "Once the Soviets establish a foothold, they send delegates from Communist countries to offer food, books and scholarships. The U.S. policy keeps us away until too late."

"These are our main faults—we send too little aid and too late," Italiaander said.

Two thousand experts from Red China were sent to Guinea to teach people how to run tea and rice plantations. In fact, Prof. Italiaander thinks there is more of a threat from Red China than from the USSR. One reason for this is that the Chinese peoples and the Negro peoples have a tie because neither is white and this tie could become very strong.

Prof. Italiaander said that another factor against good feelings for the United States is that the people we send over are not experts in the field of African affairs.

"We must send people who are not only business men, but who are humanitarians and understand these people and their situation, as well as know their language, he concluded.



## Women Accountants Hear Talk by U.S. Vice Consul

Governmental services to U. S. citizens abroad through consular offices of the Department of State were outlined by Willard A. De Pree, former U. S. vice consul to Cairo, Egypt, at the 12th annual public relations dinner of the Holland chapter of the American Association of Women Accountants Thursday night in Durfee Hall on Hope College campus.

De Pree, former Zeeland resident, currently studying African languages at Northwestern University in Evanston, Ill., devoted most of his talk to his experiences in Cairo where he served two years and in a lesser degree to Cyprus where he served a year.

In Cairo where the American colony numbered 800 to 1,000, De Pree said there was usually enough trouble to keep the consular office busy, particularly when tensions rose and deportations were ordered in 24 to 48 hours. In the case of some missionaries who had been in the Egyptian colony 30 to 40 years and who needed more time to settle their affairs, the consular office usually got extensions, but seldom learned the real cause of the harassment.

In one case when a heavy tax was levied on all missionary operations covering schools and clinics, the office in working with an elderly judge was able to find a clause in an old treaty which kept such property exempt from taxes. De Pree said the Suez crisis brought its own complications.

"Americans overseas seem to get into a lot of trouble. Some let themselves loose and get drunk and land in jail. Others are out to make a fast buck. Most problems are not serious, dealing with lost or stolen luggage or seized films. No bridges may be photographed in Egypt and the American visitor forever is taking pic-

tures. Some tourists become ill, ranging from dysentery to emergency appendectomies. Others run out of money, and contrary to some belief, the consular office has no drawer full of money to hand out, but we do help send out cables for money," De Pree said.

He said the office often deals with marital problems. Some such cases involve American girls who have married Arab students who had been living in America, thereby becoming Egyptian citizens, something which is rigidly enforced by the Egyptian government. And when trouble develops, the American naturally goes to the American embassy.

The consular office also serves in a quasi-legal status, registering births, witnessing marriages, etc. It helps handle estates of people who die overseas (a fatal plane crash can be complicated), handles pension and social security checks for Americans overseas and takes depositions for U. S. courts. Mainly it is a tourist information center for American flow of miscellaneous mail.

In Cyprus, De Pree's service was different from Cairo since Cyprus was in a state of siege and De Pree was replacing a man who had been shot who previously replaced a man who had been killed. In Cyprus there were few Americans, but De Pree did deal with American seamen in a port city where a good share of sailors manage to get into trouble.





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**Council Approves Budget in Allegan**

**ALLEGAN**—Meeting as a committee of the whole Thursday night, the Allegan city council unofficially approved retiring City Manager P. H. Beauvais' 1961-62 budget proposals without major changes, and local taxpayers could start looking forward to a reduction in the tax rate from 15 to 8 mills.

Only possible changes in Beauvais' budget will be in the wages and salaries area which is still under consideration.

The proposed budget for the fiscal year starting July 1, calls for total expenditures of \$276,704, compared to the current year's \$251,623.

Next year's revenues were estimated at \$159,650—slightly higher than the current year's \$121,530 estimate—leaving a balance of \$117,054 which ordinarily would have to be raised through taxation.

In the next year, however, Beauvais has proposed giving a share of tax relief by transferring \$47,685 from general fund surplus. This leaves only \$69,365 to be raised by taxation and will require an 8-mill levy on the city's present assessed valuation of \$8,670,700.

The presence of Walter Hautzig, world-famous pianist who previously appeared in Holland, and the announcement that Rise Stevens of the Metropolitan Opera Co. would come to Holland next season highlighted a dinner for volunteer workers in the Holland Community Concert Association Monday night in the Woman's Literary Club.

The dinner for nearly 150 workers was in the nature of a progress meeting which brought enthusiastic reports of tickets already signed up for the 1961-62 season which local leaders hope will bring in 2,000 to 3,000 memberships for a five-concert series.

The arrival of Pianist Hautzig was a surprise element. The artist, who is in Holland for a few days on Hope College campus to meet with piano students and to deliver lectures, was introduced by Dr. Morrette Rider of the college music faculty. Rider invited all workers to a Hautzig concert to-night at 8:15 in Dimmet Memorial Chapel as guests of the college before Hautzig leaves on ment of State in the Far East.

The announcement that Rise Stevens will come to Holland next season was the second important announcement on bringing outstanding talent to Holland next year. A previous announcement revealed that the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra, Edouard van Remoortel, conductor, will be the headline for the 1961-62 season.

In a brief talk, Hautzig spoke highly of the St. Louis Orchestra and its talented conductor, stating he had appeared as guest artist with the orchestra three times. He commended volunteers for their work in bringing good music to Holland. "Newspapers are not always kind and in my travels abroad, many people have the idea that Americans are rock-and-roll cultural barbarians. We happen to have the finest symphony orchestras in the world and some of the

best music departments in our colleges and universities," Hautzig said.

Don Witham of the Community Concert Association, who is assisting with the local membership drive, commended Holland for being one of the finest associations in Michigan and informed workers they are now affiliated with one of the largest musical organizations in the world, one that has 900 associations and 752,000 members.

He said every third record sold today is a classical record, and that people in the United States spend twice as much for concerts as for organized baseball. "The Metropolitan Opera plays to standing room only, yet because of its limited seating and high overhead has a deficit of \$900,000 a year. Yet artists all over the world choose the Met first, for America is fast becoming the musical center of the world," Witham said.

He spoke of the new Lincoln Center in New York City scheduled for completion in 1946 housing the Met, top ballet companies, the Julliard School of Music and others.

## Saugatuck Is Registration District

SAUGATUCK — In conformance with legislation adopted by the state legislature last year, Saugatuck public school district has become a registration district.

Previously it had not been necessary for a school elector to be registered in order to vote at any regular or special school district election. At future elections in the Saugatuck district, only those persons who are registered will receive ballots.

The school district will use registration cards now in use by clerks of Saugatuck and Laketown Townships. Mrs. Henry Dorn, Jr., of Laketown Township, is directing the clerical work in the new system and has been working with Saugatuck Township Clerk Charles H. Gilman and Laketown Township Clerk Donald Blaauw to make the transition as smoothly as possible.

The Saugatuck Board of Education also has voted to form the district into one precinct which means the voting will be held in the school gymnasium as in the past. The annual school election is scheduled Monday, June 12. All persons in the Saugatuck district now registered with township clerks are automatically registered for school elections. Residents of the village of Saugatuck, however, are cautioned that registration in the village does not count and they should check to be sure they are registered with the township clerk.

It is not necessary that a voter own property and pay taxes in most issues. In matters involving finances such as special bond elections, only those who pay taxes, and the husbands or wives of such voters may vote.
