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## Traffic Cases Processed In Court

Several persons appeared in Municipal Court the last few days on a variety of traffic charges.

## Hamilton Man Killed Accidentally

HAMILTON — A Hamilton man was accidentally killed Tuesday night when he stepped into the path of a bullet fired by his son during a target practice session near the barn of their rural home.

Bart De Jong, 53, who came here from the Netherlands in 1949, was pronounced dead of a 22 caliber bullet wound in temple by Dr. H. J. Hommer-son who served as Allegan county medical examiner.

Authorities said De Jong's son, Bart Jr., 18, was shooting at a target beside the barn with his brother, Core, 17, when the elder De Jong walked unexpectedly around the end of the barn. Sheriff's officers are continuing the investigation.

De Jong was employed as a baker at the Dog Life Corp. in Hamilton.

Surviving are the wife, Hilda; a daughter, Ann, and a third son, A-2c Marinus De Jong who is with the air force at Forbes AFB in Kansas.

## Mrs. Henry W. Timmer Dies at 75 in Hospital

Mrs. Henry W. Timmer, 75, of 47 West 40th St., died Tuesday evening at Holland Hospital following a lingering illness. She was born in Fillmore Township and lived in this vicinity all her life.

She was a member of the Fourth Reformed Church and the Adult Bible Class. Mr. and Mrs. Timmer celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary on Jan. 21.

Surviving besides the husband are two sisters-in-law, Mrs. Jennie Kleis of Holland; Mrs. Minnie Kleis of Grand Rapids; one nephew, Raymond Kleis of Holland.

Bulldozers started excavating as soon as the ceremony was finished.

## Three Injured In M-50 Crash

GRAND HAVEN — Three persons were injured in a one-car accident at 3:43 p.m. Saturday on M-50 just east of 26th Ave. in Tallmadge township.

Sheriff's officers said the crash occurred when Herman Hammond, 20, Wyoming, lost control of his car on a curve, traveled 436 feet off the pavement before striking two trees and overturning.

Riding with Hammond were Miss Jerry Ruzinski, 18, Petoskey, and Gerald Crantz, 23, Pellston. All three were taken to St. Mary's Hospital by ambulance.

Miss Ruzinski received a fractured arm, lacerations, bruises and possible internal injuries and Crantz received a dislocated hip, bruises and possible internal injuries. The two were admitted in fair condition, but were listed Sunday in poor condition. The driver was released after treatment for lacerations and bruises.

## Liberty Bell Award Under Consideration

Arrangements are being made in Ottawa county for presentation of the Liberty Bell award given by the young lawyers section of the Michigan State Bar Association. The award is to be given to a non-lawyer who has contributed to a better understanding of the democratic form of government, particularly the bill of rights.

Other criteria for awards are encouragement of greater respect for the law and courts, educating the people on the contrast between Communism and freedom under law, and to stimulate a deeper sense of individual responsibility to the end that citizens recognize their duties as well as their rights.

Serving on the Blue Ribbon committee are Howard Fant, Grand Haven attorney; Randall Dekker, Zeeland attorney and trust officer for the First Michigan Bank and Trust Co.; Herb Holt, city manager of Holland, and the Rev. J. Herbert Brink, pastor of Sixteenth Street Christian Reformed Church.

Each committee member will nominate one to four persons. The final selection will be made by the young lawyers group of Ottawa county.

The committee is hopeful that the plaque can be awarded on Law Day May 1.

## Plead Guilty To Charges

Two Zeeland brothers pleaded guilty in Municipal court Monday afternoon to charges stemming from the 70-m. p. h. pursuit of their car by Holland police early Monday.

Chester Creekmore, 21, of 216 West Washington St., pleaded guilty to reckless driving, driving without an operator's license on his person and failure to stop for a police officer's signals. He was sentenced to 90 days, 30 days and 30 days respectively, and fined \$50. Sentences will run concurrently.

His brother Jerry Creekmore, 18, also of 216 West Washington St., pleaded guilty to malicious destruction of property and was released pending the results of a pre-sentence investigation. The charge was lodged against him after he tore up a cot in his cell at the police station following his arrest.

The brothers, traveling at high speed, narrowly missed a police cruiser at the intersection of Eighth and Lake Streets about 3 a.m. Monday. The cruiser turned and went into pursuit.

The two were arrested after a 20-30 minute roadblock-running chase which led police through city streets and county roads to a wooded area near East Saugatuck. The brothers abandoned their car in a farmyard and fled into the woods when police bullets flattened the two rear tires of their car.

## Overisel Firm Seeks Damages

GRAND HAVEN — A \$60,000 damage suit was started in Ottawa Circuit Court Tuesday morning by Overisel Feed Supply Co. against Herman and Margaret De Visser of Holland township who are engaged in the business of maintaining chickens for others.

Also named defendants with the De Vissers were Glenn Bouwens of Zeeland, general contractor; the Automatic Poultry Feeder Co. of Zeeland, and the Central Fabricators, Inc., and Central Pipe and Steel Supply Co., both of Benton Harbor.

Plaintiff claims that the company had chickens housed in the building owned by the De Vissers and that on Dec. 18, 1963, poor construction caused the roof to buckle and collapse, destroying the chickens housed in this building. The Overisel company had 12,096 sexed female chickens in the De Visser building at the time.

## Supervisors Will Spread Only 4 Mills

GRAND HAVEN — The Ottawa county Board of Supervisors will have to do some "close fitting" next October when it works on the final budget for 1965 if the county is going to live within its income.

The board adopted the millage for next year's budget at the final meeting of the April session Wednesday and instead of approving 4.10 or 4.15 mills, as proposed by the ways and means committee at Tuesday's meeting, the committee recommended that only 4 mills be spread. This is an increase over last year, when the allocation board was asked for 3.91.

Next October the board, when it will meet as a committee-of-the-whole to struggle with the budget for 1965, will have to lop about \$40,000 off the preliminary budget total as proposed Tuesday. The equalization table was also approved Wednesday and the total county equalized valuation of the county was set at \$37,901,330. The tentative budget approved Tuesday called for \$1,395,269.

Four mills will net only \$1,351,605.82 so \$44,000 will have to be sliced off the budget next fall. The board adjourned early Wednesday and toured a vast area in the south end of the county, including land which the county may acquire for recreation purposes.

Supervisor Gerritt Bottema reported that the new ruling regarding tax exemptions for war veterans is causing confusion and the board voted to send out notices to veterans with \$10,000 or more valuations as equalized. They no longer will be exempt.

## Pick Malila As Mayor

ALLEGAN — Toivo E. (Ted) Malila was the unanimous choice of fellow councilmen to be Allegan's new mayor at Monday night's annual organizational meeting.

Malila, 50, is president of the Crescent Pipe Co., Allegan and has served on the local school board and is active in civic affairs.

Marvin Hays, mayor for two years under the former council had consented a year ago to serve an additional term under the new regime.

A councilman for the past five years Hays will continue as a member until his term expires next April.

Clarence J. Smith, elected with Malila and Leo Hoffman last year, was chosen as mayor pro-tem.

The council accepted the Allegan County Fair Board's proposal to pay \$4,000 at the rate of \$400 a year for the next 10 years to cover cost of new electrical installations and transformers at the Allegan County Fair Grounds.

The council accepted a committee recommendation that the Kalamazoo firm of Kelloggs and Keiffer be hired as architects to design Allegan's new fire station. Plans are to be ready by July 1 when construction will begin.

As yet unresolved is the problem of supplying fire protection for Allegan and Trowbridge Townships. The council has requested \$600 from each per annum to help defray equipment maintenance and assist with salaries of two regularly employed firemen. They contend the present offer of \$500 apiece is an unequitable arrangement from the city's standpoint.

Both township boards have been asked to appear at next Monday's regular session to discuss the problem.

Two planning commissioners whose terms expire this month, John Young and John Dillingham, were reappointed by the council to serve another three years.

## Allegan Has 1,830 Miles Of Roads

ALLEGAN — The Allegan County Road Commission's annual report for 1963 came under close scrutiny of the county Board of Supervisors Wednesday.

Road Commission Engineer-Manager, Fred O. Neils presented the report and fielded questions from the floor.

Chief objection on expenditures came from Supervisor Carl Strand of Watson, who wanted to know why a \$75,000 appropriation voted by the board for county road maintenance should not be pro-rated equally among the townships. The appropriation is presently absorbed into the total county fund and some townships receive more benefit than others.

Neils explained that the money was spent where "it was most needed" and that segregation of townships was not practical when considering county-wide benefits.

The 1963 state snow removal receipts of \$46,000 for Allegan county were the highest handed out in Michigan among qualifying counties, Neils reported. Added to that, he said, total federal aid in 1963 amounting to \$139,613.94 was the most ever allotted in county history.

Total county highway operation expenditures for 1963 came to \$1,344,384.67. Of this, \$285,274.65 was spent on county primary roads and \$403,451.94, on local roads.

Each township's share of road maintenance costs is figured on a 65 per cent mileage — 35 per cent population basis, the road commission engineer explained.

Outstanding among road construction jobs completed in the county is the one from Pullman west to old US-31, Neils stated. This road was completely rebuilt and will be ready for bituminous surfacing this summer. When finished it will provide a 20-mile hard surfaced highway linking M-40 to the new I-96 freeway. Neils said the state paid 25 per cent of this construction because it was used as a "haul route" for I-96 workmen.

Neils pointed out that the Allegan County Road Commission has become "number three in the state" with 1,830 miles of roads under its jurisdiction, not including streets in incorporated villages, cities, or state trunklines.

Of the 83 counties in Michigan only Oakland and Wayne top Allegan. Allegan, however, Neils said, is 19th in total state funds received, while Wayne and Oakland rank number one and two. The report was adopted with one dissenting vote.

## Allegan Has 1st Merit Scholar

ALLEGAN — Allegan's first National Merit Scholarship winner is Robert Purkey, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert C. Purkey, 645 Marshall St., Allegan.

Robert, 18, has also been awarded an Upjohn Company Merit Scholarship. He plans to major in biochemistry at Kalamazoo College.

Purkey has been active in the Student Council, which he served as vice-president in 1962-63, and as Parliamentarian in '63 and '64. He was a delegate to Boys' State in 1963, is president of the National Honor Society at Allegan High School, a Junior Rotarian, and has won varsity letters in cross-country and tennis.

Ranking No. 1 in his class, "Bob" still finds time for hobbies of golf, tennis, sailing and the piano.

## Fire Destroys Car, Four Escape Injury

ALLEGAN — Four persons escaped injury early today when their car caught fire and burned at the intersection of 64th St. and 143rd Ave. in Allegan county.

Gerhard Nyhus, of route 1, Holland, and three passengers, Sonny Lozano, of 1051 Paw Paw Dr., Richard Van Bragt, of 174 East Fifth St., and Dennis Webb, of 401 Lincoln Ave., escaped unhurt when fire broke out under the hood and spread through the dashboard into the interior of the car after the engine began to misfire.

Allegan county sheriff's deputies said the car was completely destroyed by the fire.


## Three BPW Employees Awarded Certificates




In addition to counseling, Carey was also assistant varsity football coach and head track coach at Holland High the past two years. For three years he was head reserve coach.

## Ottawa Battles Several Fires

Brush and marsh fires continued to plague Michigan Friday, burning over hundreds of acres of land and destroying trees, small buildings and wildlife.

Fire blazed out of control early Friday at the Blendon township dump, ate through a portion of the pine trees that ringed the dump and skipped on for more than a half mile endangering hundreds of acres in a relentless march, fanned by high winds.

The sheriff's department dispatched four cruisers to the site in the vicinity of 48th Ave. and Tyler St. a few miles northwest of Hudsonville. Fire departments of Hudsonville, Georgetown township and Blendon township all converged on the scene, along with two conservation officers and their equipment plus volunteers from the neighborhood.

Unable to control the flames, firemen called in a commercial bulldozer to plow furrows through the tall beach grass as fire breaks. A smaller conservation department dozer did the same. Several residents were placed on standby evacuation notice, but the large fire was finally under control.

The Blendon township cemetery located next to the dump was not threatened.

Sheriff's officers said a large number of pine trees were destroyed in the blaze.

Holland township firemen battled another grass fire for almost two hours before bringing it under control shortly before 1 p.m. in the area between 132nd and 136th Aves. and between Riley and Greenly Sts.

Four pieces of township equipment and one conservation department truck were at the

scene. Fire Chief Andrew Westbroek said a few trees were burned but firemen were able to protect several larger clumps. He said he believed the fire was caused from sparks from a train.



## Zeeland Sets Classes for Drivers' Ed

ZEELAND — Driver education classes will be offered at Zeeland High School in two sessions this summer. Session I, with three classes of 36 students each, will be held from June 8 to June 27. Session II, with three classes of 36 students, each will be from July 20 to Aug. 8. Each student is required to be in class for two hours daily for three weeks and receives behind-the-wheel instruction for a total of six hours and this to be scheduled by the instructor.

Registration blanks for the summer driver education courses can be obtained at the High School Principal's office, 311 East Central Ave., Zeeland, (located on the second floor in Room 23) from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Thursday and Friday. 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## LET'S FACE RESPONSIBILITY

Admiral Rickover, who has a propensity for saying things in a way that leaves no room for doubt as to what he means, has done it again.

This time it was the U.S. Naval Academy. Said the Admiral, the U. S. Naval Academy "remains a childhood shelter from the struggles, uncertainties, and responsibilities of life." As if this wasn't enough, he spelled out what he had in mind by saying that Annapolis is hampered in turning out first rate officers by over organized varsity athletics and such "boyish practices" as hazing.

I suppose the easiest way out of all this would be to describe him as a cantankerous old chap who has forgotten his youth. But that's a little too easy. It may be the Admiral is quite right. After all he has had to work with some of these men. He has also been outspoken about his inability to get men, even those with training, who were topnotch for the work he wanted done. He has had to do considerable training on his own.

The Admiral doesn't believe that we have to keep putting off the time when men must be men. And he believes that the time to get started is at the point where the nation's young men are being educated to take on responsibility.

Maybe the Admiral could broaden his audience. He could say the same thing to the college student on a hundred or more campuses. He could say to them also that it is time to take on some responsibility and to act as mature men and women. The time comes when the boyish and childish behavior must make place for greatness of thought and greatness of action. The world constantly demands more and it is well that we begin to realize this.

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, April 26

The Christian and His Neighbor

1 John 4:16-5:3

By C. P. Dame

Bible readers know that John, the brother of James, is called the apostle whom Jesus loved most. This apostle wrote the gospel that bears his name, and three epistles, and the Book of Revelation. Our lesson text is taken from his first epistle — the text stresses the practical application of love. In this world of much hate we need more love.

I. Love drives out fear. The writers of the New Testament sounded forth the positive note — they said that they knew that God loved them. They were not like some modern Christians who are plagued all the time by doubt. They were sure of God's love. "And we have seen, and do testify, that the Father sent the Son to be the Saviour of the world." God who is love, loved them. It is most heartening to believe that God loves us.

"Herein is our love made perfect"—that is the love that dwells in the heart gradually matures and becomes what it ought to be. This love gives us confidence and makes us lose all fear of the coming judgment. Believers know that God loves them and that is why they have no fear of him. Fear is due to a sense of guilt, this sense leaves when pardon has been granted and received. Love that is complete casts out fear. Since God loves us, we love Him.

II. Love always expresses itself—it can't be bottled up. "If a man say, I love God, and hateth his brother, he is a liar"—not just a prevaricator but a liar. It is unreasonable to assume that a man who says he loves God whom he has not seen should then hate his brother whom he has seen. Love for God is inseparable from love to man.

The word "brother" should be understood in two ways. John was writing to Christians who had been born again into God's redeemed family. Christians are brothers in the spiritual sense. They should love one another. But Christians are also commanded to love all mankind. It is sometimes hard to love our fellow Christians and equally hard to love all kinds of people.

III. Obeying God's commandments is a proof of love. Those who love God, the Father, love all who have become God's children through faith in Christ for all are members of the same family. Love to God expresses itself not in mere words but in deeds. "For this is the love of God, that we keep His commandments."

Recall that Jesus said, "If ye love Me, keep My commandments." "Lovers of God do not keep His commandments merely from a sense of duty but from love. This often involves setting aside the desire of the flesh and the eagerness to do what the world do.

We are taught that God's "commandments are not grievous"—not for those who love God. And lovers of God know that the keeping of the commandments brings a blessing. The more people love God, the more they find delight in the keeping of His commandments.




## Hope Mission Drive For Southern Normal

## 3 From Holland Named For Merit Scholarships

Three Holland young people are included in the 1,625 outstanding students throughout the country today who were named winners of four - year Merit Scholarships to the colleges of their choice.

Holland winners are Marcia L. Koster, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert J. Koster of 26 East 33rd St., and Harry E. Mussman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry W. Mussman of 853 Central Ave., both seniors at Holland High School, and David L. Bouwman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Bouwman of 195 South Division, a senior at West Ottawa High School.

Other Merit winners in the area are Robert M. Purkey of Allegan, Lynn E. Sorensen of Fennville and Joan K. Swartz of Spring Lake.

John M. Stalnaker, president of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation in Evanston, Ill., said the number of winners is the largest in the nine-year history of the nationwide competition.

Approximately 1,100 winners received Merit Scholarships sponsored by some 200 business corporations, foundations, colleges, unions, professional associations, trusts and individuals. These figures represent a 20 per cent increase over 1963 in the number of sponsors.

Miss Koster plans to major in chemistry at Wheaton College, Wheaton, Ill., and plans a career in secondary teaching. She was a delegate to Girls' State in 1963, editor of the school year book this year, member of the exhibition group of Klompen Dancers, a member of the Future Teachers' Club, Chemistry Club and Science Club, recipient of the Robert Poll biology award in 1963, local forensics winner in 1962, class secretary in 1962 and attended a summer workshop for editors of school publications at the University of Michigan in 1963.

Miss Koster's scholarship is given by the International Business Machines Corp. in memory of the late chairman of the Board, and is known as the Thomas J. Watson Memorial Merit Scholarship. The program consists of 50 annual four-year scholarships given on a competitive basis with 25 offered to high school seniors throughout the country and 25 offered to children of IBM employees.

Harry Mussman, recipient of the R. C. Mahon Foundation Merit Scholarship, plans to enter the University of Michigan and will major in electrical engineering. For the past six years he has repaired radios and established a parttime service business. He also worked parttime for two servicemen, building and assembling a number of component high fidelity systems. He belongs to the Lutheran Church in Holland and presently is serving as president of its youth group organization.

An all-A student, Harry is on the staff of the Literary Magazine, is a member of the National Honor Society, the Science Club and the Latin Club. He served on the production staff of the senior play.

David Bouwman of West Ottawa High School plans to major in premedicine at Johns Hopkins University and plans a career in medicine. His scholarship is sponsored by the National Merit Scholarship Corp. which awards scholarships through funds provided in its founding grants. All scholarships are four-year undergraduate awards. Stipends are based on need and may be adjusted if the student's need changes. Minimum award is \$400 (\$100 a year) and the maximum is \$6,000 (\$1,500 a year). The average stipend is about \$800 a year. Most Merit Scholarships include a grant to the college the student attends.

Bouwman is president of the National Honor society, was president of the Junior class and has been a member of the Student Council for three years. He is a member of the National Thespian society and has been active in dramatics with roles in eight productions. He has been a member of the varsity debate team for three years, and is president of the Berean Church Youth Group. He has a parttime job at the library bookbinding shop.

Miss Sorensen, a senior at Fennville High School and valedictorian of her graduating class, plans to major in microbiology at Michigan State Uni-

versity for a career as research scientist. Her scholarship is provided by MSU, the nation's oldest land-grant institution of higher education, one that emphasizes a progress-at-your-own-pace program for its students, many of whom achieve sophomore status after only one or two quarters of study. MSU enrolls more than 27,000 students and is the eighth largest university in the United States, offering nearly 200 different undergraduate academic programs in 79 different departments through 11 colleges.

## Allegan Votes Millage for New Facility

ALLEGAN — By a vote of 34 to 2, Allegan county supervisors Tuesday approved a resolution calling for a 1 mill tax increase for the next six years for a sinking fund to build a new county medical care facility.

On a total equalized valuation of \$176,115,289, this millage would raise some \$900,000 over this period. This would provide a hospital of 100 beds or more, and with interest accrued, would care for maintenance costs after the hospital is erected.

Nursing home care averaged \$72,000 in 1963 for supplementary care outside the hospital. Infirmary costs came to \$27,080 for 26 outpatients who would receive \$60 per month from state grants if in a medical care facility.

Of the total valuation of the county, Allegan city's share is \$15,036,323 or 8.5 per cent of the total. That part of Holland city which lies in Allegan county has an equalized valuation of \$7,575,951.



## West Ottawa Signs 10 New Teachers

Ten new teachers have signed contracts for the coming school year, it was announced at a meeting of the West Ottawa Board of Education Monday night.

Jan Stucky, a 1964 graduate of Bowling Green State University, will teach speech and English and direct the dramatics program in the high school. Elementary positions will be filled by Mildred Van House, Judy Swiering, Charlotte Van Huis, Alfred Smith and Elaine Halbersma. Bruce Ellis will teach industrial arts in Junior High, Marguerite Hakken will teach English and social studies, Bernice Cook reading and Robert Dykstra mathematics. Miss Halbersma is returning to the district after undergoing a kidney transplant at Mayo Clinic last year.

Junior High Principal—Ed Roberts reviewed the Adult Education program the past year, listing 685 adults enrolled in the 1963-64 school year and a spring semester enrollment of 455 adults. Twenty-nine adult classes were offered.

Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte reported on the reader improvement program offered in junior-senior high school, pointing out it is not so much a remedial program as one that develops muscular ability for the eyes to take in more of the printed page at one time.

A report submitted by Mrs. Barbara Boer, reading teacher, stated that out of 126 students enrolled in the advanced level, one-third can now read over 1,000 words per minute with perfect comprehension, and two-thirds can read over 500 words per minute. Of 166 sophomores and freshmen in the program, two-thirds are reading over 700 words per minute and one-third over 500 words.

The board contracted with the Ottawa County Road Commission to install a culvert and bridge over a drainage ditch on Riley St. for a second access to the junior high parking lot off Riley. The cost is \$1,800.

The buildings and grounds committee was authorized to establish a program of maintenance of 16.3 acres of primary school property. The committee also is investigating the upkeep of 16.9 acres of additional school property within the district.

Committee Chairman Louis Van Sloten announced that with the planting of flowering cherry trees next week at the high school, the landscaping project will be complete. Zolenka Nursery of Grand Haven will maintain the plantings.





## Vander Werf Addresses Annual ASWA Banquet

A springtime theme set the stage for the 15th annual public relations dinner of the Holland chapter of the American Society of Women Accountants Tuesday night in the Tulip Room of Hotel Warm Front.

Speaking on the topic, "You—and the Knowledge Explosion," Dr. Calvin A. Vander Werf, president of Hope College, approached this subject from the scientific angle, attempting to find answers to the age-old question, "What is man and why is he here?"

"Ultimately, these answers lie in the realm of human values and since women always show deep concern with human values we look to them to chart the way to some of these answers," he said. "Man is concerned about such weighty subjects as gross national product, Medicare and tax cuts, but women think about their families and their welfare."

Probing scientific advances, Dr. Vander Werf said the subject as such was recognized only 200 years ago and cited some of the tremendous advances in the last 100 years. In his own lifetime he checked off automobiles, telephone, radio and television, nuclear energy and satellites, and said it is only the beginning.

"What we can expect in the next 50 years is staggering to the imagination. If we were to dip a tennis ball into the Pacific Ocean, the water the ball would absorb in relation to the entire ocean is indicative of what we know today. We are only at the threshold of the age of the knowledge explosion."

"These answers are not simple. Science today envisions population control, heredity control, and all the responsibilities that go with these decisions. Many people believe that revolutions downgrade man but I believe revolutions upgrade God. Religion must keep pace with technology and women with their innate sense of the humanities are helping to find the answers," he said.

More than 100 attended the annual event. Wilma Beukema, chapter president, presided, and Cecelia Ver Hage introduced the speaker. The invocation was given by Henry Kleinhessel. Dinner music was provided by Mrs. Isla Kamps.

Greetings were brought by Phyllis Peters of Detroit, state president and president-elect of the national society, who pointed out there are now 76 chapters in 38 states.



**ZEELAND** — Winners began making plans today for a trip to the New York World's Fair following victories Saturday night in the U.S. Olympic regional tryouts in the Zeeland gym before 500 fans.

The eight freestyle winners, along with the second and third place winners, earned the right to try out for the U.S. Olympic wrestling team Aug. 25-28 in New York.

These freestyle wrestlers will be joined by the winners and runnersup in the Greco-Roman wrestling competition last Thursday in the Zeeland gym.

Saturday night's action climaxed three days of competition which saw a total of 77 bouts and some of the best wrestling ever demonstrated in Western Michigan.

Following the bouts, those wrestlers winning the chance to go to New York, were challenged by Marv Smallegan, Zeeland Lions Club president to do their best in trying to gain a spot on the U.S. team. The Zeeland Lions Club sponsored the tryouts in Zeeland.

Tournament manager Tom Pratt introduced each first, second and third place winner in each division and the wrestlers took their respective places on the three pedestals while the Zeeland band played fanfare.

Three trophies were present-

ed by Mel Boonstra, president of Zeeland Chamber of Commerce. Dave Porter of Lansing Sexton High School was given a trophy for the fastest pin (13 seconds) while Fred Stehman of Okemos, second in the 154-pound class, was named the outstanding high school wrestler competing.

Bill Riddle, 138.5 pound champion, received the trophy as the meet's outstanding wrestler. He was a unanimous choice of the seven judges.

Referees for the tryouts were Dean Rockwell of Bloomfield Hills, who will coach the Greco-Roman team in Tokyo, John Zolickoff, Grandville coach and Eggie Conrad, Lansing Sexton coach.



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

## Chamber Banquet Has Dutch Theme

A Dutch theme geared to the Windmill Island development which will be ready for the 1965 Tulip Time festival provided atmosphere for the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet attended by more than 300 persons Thursday night in Civic Center.

In the center of the auditorium was a windmill with sails that turned, banked by ornamental plants. Flags from all provinces in the Netherlands ringed the auditorium. Waitresses wore Dutch costumes.

As main speaker, the Rev. Eugene Slep, pastor of Immanuel Presbyterian Church of Grand Rapids, gave the right kind of Chamber-type talk on "Oh, Say Can You See" liberally sprinkled with humorous anecdotes laced with an underlying message of morality geared to bring out the best in persons to make this a better world.

"Man is judged by the depths of his horizons. Extend yourself and become exclusive, not exclusive. Your world can be large or your world can be small. Live in a large world and see that your expansion exceeds your capacity. The impossible can become the probable if you are willing to work at it. There's much goodness in the world if you only look for it, and not spend all the time gossiping and sharing misinformation over the backyard fence."

Rev. Slep said all these qualities that go into making better people can be applied to the work of the Chamber of Commerce, or for that matter to any church, any business and any organization. He strongly emphasized the need for a solid basis of religion in everything. "Take God out of Good and you have nothing left," he said.

Ross Giles, executive vice president of the Holland Cham-

ber, gave an economic progress report, explaining the HEDCOR program and progress on the new industrial park in the vicinity of M-40 and the US-31 bypass. He announced the new expansion of Home Furnace Co. which has just purchased the warm air heating vision of the Burnham Corp. of Belle Vernon, Pa.

## Views From The Campus



Drama is the oldest expression of man's desire to create and to convey the meanings which he has found for and in life. The reason for the existence of a theatre on the Hope College campus can be summed up in two general areas; esthetic and practical.

A favorite expression of mine is "Science unravels facts, art expresses meanings."

Students in a liberal arts college need the opportunity to find both facts and meanings in their academic work. But they also need to express their feelings and ideas.

Some students find the best outlet for these expressions through the drama. Since Hope College is concerned with the

education of each student as an individual, an opportunity is provided for those students whose interest lies with the drama.

There is no more demanding venture than the production of a play. It is not merely "fun and games" as many people believe. Each production is a carefully and minutely planned conglomeration of facets of the theatrical process, all interdependent upon each other. Each person has a job to perform, from the seating of the audience to bringing up the house lights at the end of a play. All of this has been carefully considered and planned, and should one link in the chain fail, the results could damage the carefully sought-for response from the audience. No matter how minor may be his position in the chain, each person is strongly aware of the need for his work and takes pride in the complete, unified effort.

I know of no other situation which demands the subjugation of each individual to a cooperative effort to the degree that the theatrical experience does. And the satisfaction of contribution to a creative effort is well worth the time consumed. To me, this is as important an aspect of the education of an individual as is a mass of facts. Facts may help a person to know, but unless he has the ability to express these facts, they do little to help him live.

However, the theatre does also present facts, but usually in living terms. We are in a somewhat isolated area in that many of the conflicts and soul-searching ideas are kept from us because of the nature of our community. And yet our students are to be flung into areas of work where they will face problems and ideas that they cannot have known or been acquainted with. Perhaps by showing them graphically some of the ideas and problems which face the characters on our stage they can better themselves for what they may encounter in their futures.

Theatre is often condemned for expressing life the way it is, rather than the way we would like it to be. Our students must learn that there are "people like that" and that they may one day be face to face with them. If they cannot accept their existence, even on the stage, how can they begin to cope with the similar problems which they will meet when they begin to face reality?

It is my contention that the theatre should instill the realization that, not as it often does, "Thank Heavens, I'm not like that!" but rather the idea that, "There, but for the Grace of God, go I!"

Investigators met Wednesday afternoon in an attempt to discover the cause of the fire that struck the DeWitt's Zeeland Hatchery building on 88th Ave., a mile south of M-21, March 31.

At the scene of the fire which destroyed the building, killing 3,000 laying turkey hens, was Ralph Warnstrom fire inspector for the Rockford division of the state fire marshal's office, Andy Westenbroek, Holland Township fire marshal, Detective Sgt. John Hemple, Ottawa county sheriff's and Wes Faber, vice-president of the hatchery. Also present were Les and Dan Wiersma, operators of the hatchery.

Early reports of the fire from area residents indicated it may have started in the center of the 600-foot long structure, however, after an examination of the ruins, Warnstrom said he believed the fire started at the west end of the building.

In making the statement, Warnstrom noted that if the fire had started toward the center of the building, it would have had to burn directly into a westerly wind that was blowing at the time of the fire. He said this would have prohibited the fire from burning as fast as it did. Warnstrom also noted in his statement the extent of the damage to the building and the condition of the steel supports.

Warnstrom said that he may eliminate electrical wiring or faulty heating units as possible causes of the fire. The statement came after Faber noted that the electrical wiring was new and that the water heating units in the building were turned off on the night of the fire because of the comparatively mild weather.

Warnstrom declined to make a definite statement of the probable cause of the fire, however, he said he had not ruled out the possibility that the fire may have been started by thieves or trespassers.

During the investigation, the group toured another hatchery building at the site which had escaped damage in the fire. The building although smaller than the burned structure, was identical to it in construction.


