## Rainfall Excessive In April

April was a relatively normal month temperature wise in Holland, but the rainfall was far above normal.

According to statistics compiled by Lynn P. Wheaton, the average temperature was 47.4 or .4 degree above normal. But the precipitation measured 7.13 inches, or 4.12 inches above normal. Most of the rainfall fell during a single hour April 21 dumping 2.04 inches during a storm in which tornadoes touched down in Grand Rapids and elsewhere.

There was no snow in Holland during April, so the official 1966-67 total remains at 126 inches.

A maximum of 71 was recorded on April 21, the day of the big storm. This compares with 69 in 1966, 73 in 1965, 78 in 1964 and 76 in 1963.

The minimum was 23 April 25, compared with 24 in 1966, 13 in 1965, 18 in 1964 and 23 in 1963.

Average temperature was 47.4, compared with 43 in 1966, 43.5 in 1965, 49.4 in 1964 and 48.4 in 1963.

Average maximum was 57.4, compared with 53.1 in 1966, 53.9 in 1965, 58.9 in 1964 and 59.5 in 1963. Average minimum was 37.3, compared with 33 in 1966, 33.1 in 1965, 39.9 in 1964 and 37.3 in 1963.

Precipitation measured 7.13 inches, compared with 5.84 inches in 1966, 2.59 inches in 1965, 4.18 inches in 1964 and 4.97 inches in 1963. During the five year-span, precipitation was above normal each year except 1965 when the 2.59-inch total was .52 inch below normal.

Precipitation fell on 20 days, compared with 16 days in 1966 and 1965, 14 days in 1964 and 10 days in 1963.

Greatest precipitation in a 24-hour period was 2.04 inches, compared with 1.01 inches in 1966, .68 inch in 1965, 1.05 inches in 1964 and 2.58 inches in 1963.

Snowfall was nil, compared with 1.2 inches in 1966, 5.5 inches in 1965, 2 inches in 1964 and 1963.

Tornado warnings were given April 21 and a severe weather watch was in effect April 16.

## School Bus Millage Vote Set June 12

A resolution calling for school transportation millage in event of a favorable school merger vote May 8 was adopted by the Holland Board of Education at a special meeting Wednesday afternoon.

The issue calls for 1.5 mills for transportation to be placed on the June 12 ballot. In case the May 8 election loses, the millage issue will not appear on the ballot. The millage would run five years.

The board took the conditional action at this time so that a special election would not be called, thereby saving taxpayers' money.

In case the transportation issue passes, transportation will be provided to all students in Holland school district, public and non-public, who are 1 1/2 miles or more from school. It would provide transportation for children in Harrington and Federal districts as well as the present Holland school district. Relatively few elementary students in public schools would be affected in the program since most live within 1 1/2 miles from the school. More non-public students would be affected.

Since setting up a transportation system admittedly carries unknown factors, the millage was set at 1.5 mills, but the board will levy only that portion necessary in a given year to accomplish the service. It was emphasized that this special millage cannot be used for anything but transportation.

Approximately 2,293 students in the enlarged Holland school district would be involved in the transportation program. This includes public and non-public students.

The Holland Board of Education a year ago went on record that it would call a millage vote for transportation in the event a favorable vote resulted in the reorganization program.

### Allegan Youth Injured In Two-Car Collision

Richard Beery, 17, of Allegan was slightly injured when his car was bumped from behind by another car on 48th St. at the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway tracks at 10:13 a.m. Saturday.

The second car was operated by John Laskowski, 68, of 843 Pine Ave. Holland police ticketed Laskowski for failing to stop in an assured clear distance.

## Scheduled Mass Picket Called Off

A scheduled Saturday mass picket of Bay Casting Co. by members of all Holland area labor unions was called off Wednesday following the issuance of a temporary restraining order in Ottawa Circuit Court Tuesday.

Pat Nordhof, president of United Auto Workers Local 406, said notices had been sent to some 3,000 union members in the Holland area inviting them to take part with Local 406 in the mass picket of the strikebound firm at 8 a.m. Saturday.

Nordhof said union members "intend to obey the law." The restraining order, signed by Circuit Judge Raymond L. Smith, limits pickets to two at each of the plant's entrances.

Meanwhile, Don Robinson, general manager of Bay Casting Co., denied today that the company has refused to meet at the bargaining table with union representatives.

In a letter to Nordhof, Robinson said, "No request for any meeting has been made to us by you, or by anyone else. If you wish a meeting, you are free to call us direct or have a meeting arranged by the Mediation Services."

Nordhof said a union representative had contacted a federal mediator in Grand Rapids Monday and was informed the company had requested no talks and had no new offer to make to the union.

Local 406 has been on strike against Bay Casting Co. since April 18 when the union membership refused to accept the company's latest contract offer. The plant had been closed since March 15, when the present contract expired, and was reopened on April 19.

## Howard Miller Acquires Light Fixture Firm

ZEELAND — Howard Miller Clock Company has acquired the Detroit firm, Grand Prix Lumiere, Division of Tracoco-Detroit, Inc., importers and manufacturers of lighting fixtures.

Joint announcement was released today by John B. Ford III, president of Tracoco-Detroit, Inc., and Howard Miller of the Zeeland firm.

Acquisition of the firm will result in an increased emphasis on lighting fixtures and lamps for the Miller firm and the offering of a more diverse line of fixtures.

Grand Prix Lumiere brings to Howard Miller an award winning line of fixtures of Finnish design and manufacture. The line consists of a series of interchangeable components that can be mixed or matched to fit a broad range of situations.

The purchase also broadens the Howard Miller line to include light bulbs as well as lighting. Miller will handle national distribution for the line of incandescent bulbs manufactured by the Finnish firm, Oy Airam AB.

## Tulips Endure Biting Weather

The tulips are all right and will be in good condition for Tulip Time.

That's the consensus of Park Superintendent Jacob De Graaf and Windmill Island Manager Jaap de Blecourt. Both agree the Hardy tulips are withstanding the biting weather with frost and freezing temperatures.

Both were holding to their statements in spite of the sporadic traces of snow today. While the low on Wednesday was 25, the mercury dipped only to 37 degrees overnight. Wednesday's high was 44 degrees and there was a trace of precipitation.

"Jack Frost" continued his comeback to much of the nation today, spreading an icy cold trail from the Rockies across the Northern Plains and the Great Lakes to New England.

De Graaf, vice president of Tulip Time festival activities officially beginning May 17 and running through May 20, reported the heavy frost of the past several days did not do any material damage to the flowers that are already in bloom, nor to the tulips that are in the budding stage.

De Graaf stated that with average weather conditions, the tulips will be at their height of beauty and size with the opening of the festival on Wednesday, May 17.

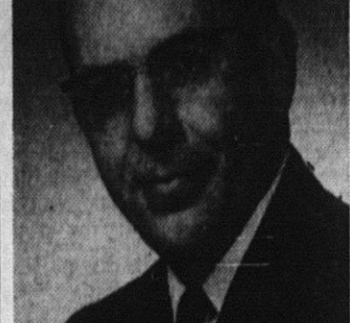

## Stafseth Given Top Highway Job

LANSING (UPI) — Henrik E. Stafseth Wednesday was named acting director of the State Highway Department to replace—at least temporarily—Howard E. Hill who is retiring.

Stafseth, 48, of East Lansing, was named acting director by

the bipartisan highway commission in an unanimous decision. Stafseth is a Republican. Commission Chairman Ardale W. Ferguson of Benton Harbor said Stafseth will fill the department's top job until the commission makes a permanent appointment.

Hill, 60, announced his resignation last month. The department is currently

under investigation by Atty Gen. Frank J. Kelley who was asked by Gov. George Romney to look into allegations of overpayments to highway contractors and conflict of interest on the part of some department personnel. Hill had not been connected directly to any of the allegations.

Stafseth has been the highway department's deputy director for planning and governmental liaison since 1965.

"The highway commission has been impressed by the job he has done as deputy director... and it is confident he will perform equally well in this new assignment," Ferguson said.

Ferguson said Stafseth "has demonstrated that he has the ability to direct the operations of the highway department."

Prior to his appointment as Deputy State Highway Director in September 1965, Stafseth had served as engineer-manager of the Ottawa County Road Commission for 10 years.

During his tenure in Ottawa County, Stafseth was elected a delegate to the Michigan Constitutional Convention and served on the Finance and Taxation Committee and the Public Information Committee of the convention.

Stafseth is a registered professional engineer, past president and life member of the County Road Association of Michigan and past president of the Grand Haven Rotary Club.

## Coast Guard Fete Shaping For August

GRAND HAVEN — The tentative schedule of events for the annual U. S. Coast Guard festival, "beefed up" with the addition of several new features, was announced today by Doug Tjapkes of the festival committee.

The main part of the festival will be held Aug. 3 to 5 but displays and a large carnival will be set up on the previous Monday, July 31. The festival will observe the 177th anniversary of the U. S. Coast Guard, oldest armed force in the United States, on Aug. 4.

Exhibits and displays will be set up inside and outside of Grand Haven's new community center, which will be dedicated in August. The community center and the adjoining Loutit Memorial library, being erected here at a cost of \$1.5 million, will be completed May 15.

The first major event of the 1967 festival will be Grand Haven's famous Water Thrill Show on Grand River at the foot of Washington Street on the night of Wednesday, Aug. 2.

Thursday's program is being changed this year, with the addition of special nationally-known performers. The official

reception will be held for arriving Coast Guard officials and others at 5 p.m. on the lawn of a local residence.

The reception will be followed by a big new feature, a mammoth Community Dinner at the Junior High building. The new program of stars will be held after the dinner in the Junior High auditorium. This is the first big change in the usual schedule in several years.

The tempo of the festival will increase on Friday, Aug. 4, as a pistol match gets underway at 9:30 a.m. At noon, local officials will be guests at the Admiral's luncheon aboard the cutter Mackinaw of the Coast Guard, while the wives will attend a similar luncheon at a local restaurant.

At 2:30 p.m. the memorial service for Coast Guardsmen who have sacrificed their lives will be held at Escanaba Park. At 6 p.m. two parties will get under way, the enlisted men's party for all enlisted Coast Guardsmen in the community for the festival, and the mayor's lawn party for festival officials and guest dignitaries. The highlight of the day will be the Festival of Bands at the Buccaneer stadium at the high school. A public street dance will be held in downtown Grand Haven at 10 p.m.

Saturday will again be the "big day" of the festival, starting with a softball game at 9 a.m. between teams from the cutter Woodbine and the icebreaker Mackinaw. A giant three-hour air show will start at 11 a.m., highlighted by the fifth appearance of the U. S. Air Force "Thunderbirds" demonstration team of six supersonic jets.

The land parade will follow at 4 p.m. followed by another Water Show at 7:30 p.m., a special performance of the "Musical Fountain" at 9 and finally a fireworks display that has been labelled the best in the state of Michigan.

C. K. Bugielski claims that this year's festival will be the biggest and most elaborate event ever planned in the Tri-Cities.

The election calls for redistricting the county into eight high school districts. Deadline for filing applications for absentee ballots is 2 p.m. Saturday.

Applications for absentee ballots in Federal chool district are available from Mrs. Arlene Huxhold, 148 Walnut Ave.

Supt. Jennie Kaufman of the Ottawa Area Intermediate School District said tabulation of votes Monday night would be made in the Grand Haven office.

For convenience in Holland city, results from the city's 14 precincts will be picked up at 9 p.m.

## Ordinances Are Adopted By Council

City Council Wednesday night adopted seven ordinances, one amending the building code, a second amending the gas station ordinance and the third amending fire regulations. Three ordinances repealed existing ordinances, one on LP gas now included in the new fire regulations and two repealing municipal and state ordinances now under state control.

A seventh ordinance dealt with replacement of lost or mutilated municipal bonds. This ordinance was requested in connection with the city's program is issuing revenue bonds for the Beech-Nut Co. in its development of a \$12 1/2 million confections plant.

Deputy City Attorney William Coupe explained that the new ordinance amending the building code took into consideration fire district variances which logically should be placed in the building code. He said the LP gas regulations are now included in the fire regulations code.

The next regular meeting of City Council will be held May 24 instead of May 17 since May 17 marks the opening of the Tulip Time festival.

May 24 was set as date of hearing for four water main projects and one sewer main project. Water main projects list Bay Ave. from South Shore Dr. north to the end; Graafschap Rd. south of 40th St.; 33rd St. from a point 565 feet east of Pine Ave. to Central Ave., and 37th St. from the end of the existing line west to Washington Ave. The sewer project also is in 37th St. the same as the water main proposal.

A petition requesting that the deep ditch on 40th St. between Pine and Columbia Aves. be enclosed for reasons of safety of children who use the street going to and from the new Maplewood School was referred to the city manager for study and report. Later in the evening, the city manager was requested to make a similar study for a ditch at 34th St. and Central Ave.

Oaths of office were filed for Gordon H. Cunningham as city attorney and L. W. Lamb Jr., as member of the Planning Commission. Letters were read from State Sen. Harold Volkema and State Rep. James Farnsworth acknowledging council action on legislation.

Licenses were granted to VFW post to solicit funds in poppy sale; Gerald Meeusen, rubbish collector; Holland Bowling Lanes, bowling establishment, pool hall.

A petition requesting sanitary sewer service in Brooklane Ave. from Eighth St. to 10th St. was referred to the city manager.

Approval was given a change order in the contract of Elzinga and Volkens on the water tank foundation on 48th St. reducing cost to the city of \$917.

The city attorney was instructed to draft an ordinance to rezone a parcel of property at 15th St. and Rive Ave. to C-1 neighborhood commercial to allow replacement of a gas station.

Approval was given low bid of Laverne Schapp to apply liquid chloride on certain streets and alleys in the city at a cost of 6 cents per gallon.

A claim against the city from David Meengs of 15358 Riley was referred to the city insurance carrier.

A communication from the Board of Public Works informed Council that water main projects in 32nd St. from Waver Rd. east a half mile and in Waverly Rd. and Chicago Dr. from Eighth St. north would be delayed until sufficient funds are available.

Mayor Nelson Bosman presided at the meeting which lasted an hour and 20 minutes. Councilman Jack Smith was absent. The invocation was given by the Rev. Menko Ouwinga of Bethel Christian Reformed Church of Zeeland.

## Group Challenges Reorganization Plan of Schools

GRAND HAVEN — In an effort to halt a proposed reorganization of school districts in Ottawa county, 31 residents of the county headed by Dennis and Arlene Huxhold of Federal district at Holland filed suit in Ottawa Circuit Court Monday.

Named as defendants in the suit are the Board of Education of the Ottawa Area Intermediate District and Jennie Kaufman, superintendent of the district.

Lee Boothby, Niles attorney representing the plaintiffs, said there are several bases for the suit which basically seeks to void results of the May 8 election, should the reorganization carry. The simple issue on the ballot reads, "Shall the approved reorganization plan for the Ottawa Area Intermediate District be adopted?"

Plaintiffs claim that the proposed reorganization program is not valid in that no maps were attached to the plan and that guidelines set up by the state were not followed.

A specific illustration, Boothby said, was the case of the Bursley district which calls for splitting and merger with Hudsonville and Jenison districts.

Plaintiffs also claim that the 15-mill limitation is being violated which would result in a crazy-quilt pattern of taxes for the whole county. Also protested are eliminating West Ottawa and Grand Haven districts from voting, and the addition of two

school districts in Allegan county to the Zeeland district.

"The citizens are filing the suit now so that they will be in a position to move immediately should the vote carry," Boothby explained. The school reorganization, as set up by an act of the state legislature, calls for immediate merger. Boothby has represented similar protesting groups in Kent, Allegan, Van Buren and Berrien counties.

In the complaint, plaintiffs claim that a quorum of the 18-member county committee was not present at three meetings held in December, 1965, in Spring Lake, Hudsonville and West Ottawa.

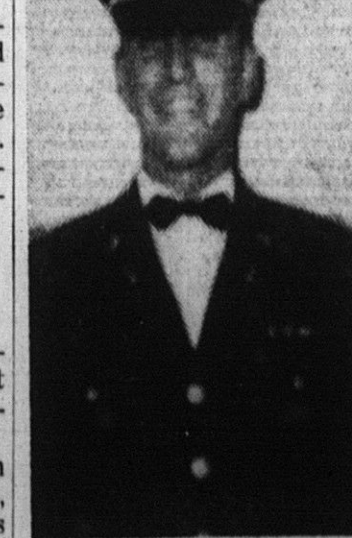
## \$25,000 Sought In Damage Suit

## Council Has Hearing On Alley

City Council met Wednesday night in the City Hall and spent considerable time on a public hearing for paving the north end of an alley between Eighth and Ninth St., just west of River Ave.

Vernon D. Ten Cate, one of the owners in the assessment district, commended Council for its part in the parking development program. Russell Vande Poel asked about a pole in the alley and what could be done about it since it would impede trucks. Later in the meeting, Council took action to move the pole as soon as possible.

Two communications from Donald Kingsley and James T. Bradbury expressed the hope that Council would reconsider and approve Kingsley's application for a package liquor license. Councilmen L. W. (Bill) Lamb said he had talked with Liquor Control Commission representatives in Lansing that morning and had received additional information but that he would prefer to discuss this with Councilmen at a later date, perhaps in a month. On that basis, the communications were filed.

A request of the Willard G. Leenhouts post of the American Legion for a 24-hour license to allow social drinking at a testimonial dinner for the Michigan Department Commander May 13 in Holland Armory was referred to the chief of police with power to act. It was explained that under a relatively new procedure of the state, armories are now included in public buildings where such privileges are allowed. Since no liquor-by-the-glass sales are allowed in Holland, it was assumed Wednesday night that the beverages would be confined to beer and wine. Final action would be taken by the Liquor Control Commission.

On recommendation of Adrian Koert, traffic consultant, Council approved ordinance changes to make a four-way stop at 10th St. and College Ave. and that yield signs at 14th St. and College be changed to stop signs. No recommendation was made on the request for a traffic control at Glendale and Harvard in Holland Heights, since traffic checks prompted no changes. Thus no action was taken.

Council approved transfer of \$6,000 from the capital improvement fund to be matched by the Board of Education for erecting a 150 by 150 foot magic square at Holland Heights School.

## 17th Annual Bethany Home Meeting Is Held

GRANDVILLE — The 17th annual Bethany Christian Home meeting was held Tuesday evening in First Reformed Church here with Dr. Richard S. Wierenga, president of the Board of Directors, in charge.

The budget of \$320,575 for the coming year was approved and four members were elected to the Board of Directors which determines the policies of the agency.

The two new members elected are David Swets, Grand Rapids attorney, and Judge Claude Vander Ploeg of Grand Rapids. Reelected were Benjamin C. Nanninga and Lawrence Vander Ploeg, both also from Grand Rapids.

Director Hudson J. Nyenhuis gave a short talk on the purpose of the home in Grand Rapids likening Bethany Home to a life-saving station. He said the "life-saving station" has maintained its purpose and has not become a "social-type" club.

A new slide program, "A Home Called Bethany," was also shown. The film story is narrated by Ted Andriese, photographed by Dr. Wierenga and produced and directed by Jo Van Houten, public relations and office manager for Bethany Christian Home.

## Bad Switch Cuts Power to Homes

Electric service to approximately 750 Holland homes was interrupted for 10 to 30 minutes early Tuesday following switch failure at the 22nd and Ottawa Ave. substation.

The area affected by the power outage lay south of 22nd St. and included those areas feeding off Ottawa Ave. power lines. The outage occurred about 5 a.m.

Board of Public Works superintendent Guy E. Bell said a switch at the substation was arcing and burning and workmen put a jumper around the switch while repairs were being made.

Power was restored in many cases within 10 minutes. Bell said, and the entire repair took about a half-hour.

## 1,000th Child Placed Through Bethany Home

Thursday at 10 a.m. April 27, was an important time for Mr. and Mrs. George Vander Veen and their son Ricky, who live in Holland, because tiny Rhonda Ann joined their family at that time, though adoption in a short ceremony at Bethany Christian Home.

Nearly three years ago Ricky joined their family in a similar event.

Although seven-week old Rhonda will soon realize how important she is to the Vander Veen family, she doesn't understand now that she's important to Bethany Home in a special way, too. She is the 1,000th child placed for adoption by Bethany Home.

In the short ceremony arranged for this event, Hudson Nyenhuis, executive director of the Home said, "This 1,000th placement is a significant milestone in the course of this agency's work... it is representative of the many that have gone before, and the many future placements we will undoubtedly make. We are grateful to have been granted the privilege of touching and influencing the lives of so many youngsters."

The Bethany Home began as a small children's home in 1945, and expanded to a full scale child welfare agency in 1951, when it was licensed by the State of Michigan to do adoption work and give foster home care. At that time the counseling program for unmarried mothers began also.

The adoption services of this agency are available, on a nationwide basis, to families of the Reformed and Christian Reformed faith. Children have been placed for adoption in 17 states, and Bethany has been licensed to work directly in New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, Iowa and Illinois. Cooperative arrangements are available in other states through their Department of Social Welfare.

Close to 200 children have been placed in the Holland-Zeeland area.

Bethany Christian Home is a private agency with an annual budget of \$320,575.00. Major financial support is through gifts from individuals and churches.

## Court Signs Bay Casting Injunction

GRAND HAVEN — Circuit Court Judge Raymond L. Smith Tuesday afternoon signed a temporary restraining order limiting the number of pickets at the strikebound Bay Casting Co. in Holland.

The temporary order restrains defendants from engaging in threats of violence, acts of physical strength, any attempts to keep persons from entering the plant, and restrains strikers from congregating at the Bay Casting plant on 12th St. or Scott's, Inc., a Crampton division, and forbids defendants from following employees to their homes or calling employees or their families by telephone at their home. It also asked that only two pickets be allowed at various entrances.

The temporary restraining order will remain in effect until a hearing is held May 22 at 10 a.m. in Circuit Court.

Named as defendants are local 406, International Union United Automobile Aerospace and Agricultural Implement Workers, and Owen Bieber, Pat Noordhoff, George Vander Wal, Albert Klinge, Nelson Riemersma, Betty Bronkhorst and other agents of the union.

Plaintiffs claim that on March 15, the agreement between management and the union expired. The plant closed at that time because of lack of a contract, and reopened April 19 at which time the union went on strike status. Since then, management claims there has been continuous picketing as well as several acts of violence and harassment.

In full production, the plant employed over 300 persons. The recent slowdown in automotive production resulted in a layoff of about 40 per cent of the work force. Since the plant reopened two weeks ago, about 30 have been reporting to work.

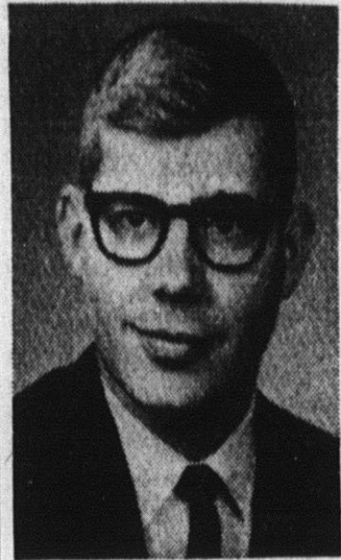
Hope College senior John Kleis and his wife, Betty, have accepted positions to teach elementary education at the International School of Kuwait, Arabia, starting in September.

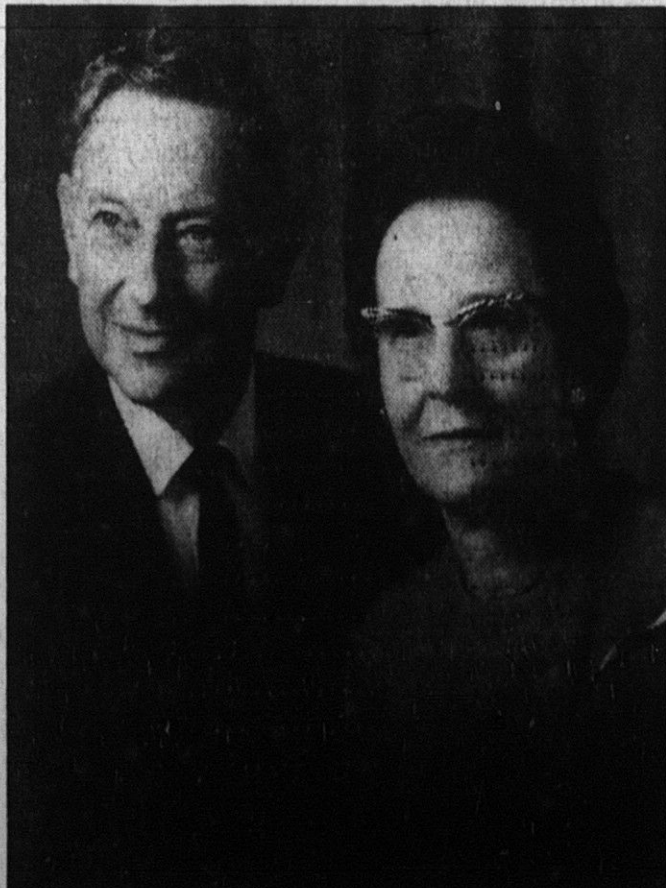

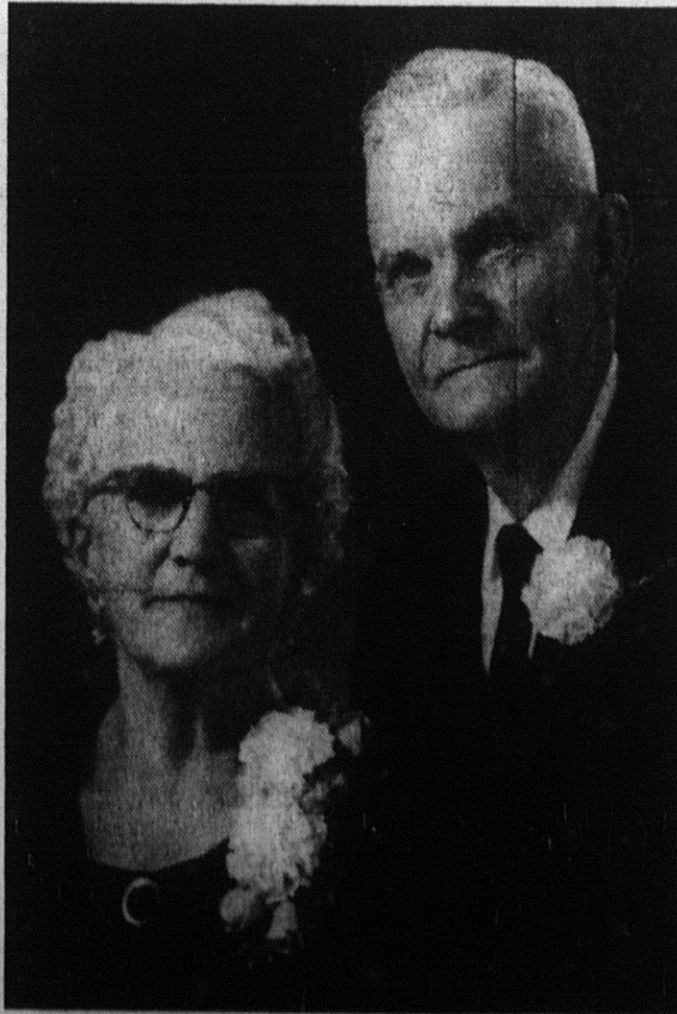

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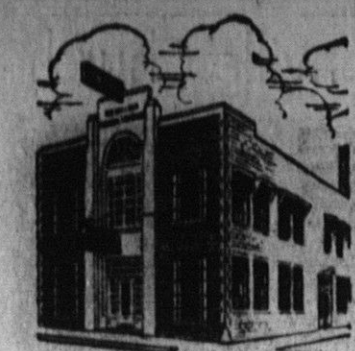
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## WORLD LAW DAY — MAY 1

For many years the Communist world has celebrated May 1 with rallies and parades, seeking to promote its doctrines. Since 1958, the United States has countered by celebrating the same date as one where we are urged to consider more deeply the meaning of our democracy. The World Peace Through Law Center in this country has also selected this date as World Law Day to call attention to its activities in seeking to substitute "the rule of law" for "the rule of force" in international relations, and in publicizing its third world conference of legal talent in Geneva, Switzerland, this summer.

Both causes deserve public support and are "catching on" more and more with each passing year. Certainly the cause of the substitution of the force of law for the law of force in both domestic and international relations is worthy of one's dedication and devotion. Civilized nations in their upward climb from savagery and tribalism have achieved their present state of advancement when groups have substituted the rule of law for the law of the jungle. But in the area of international relations we still cling to the arbitrament of force as the ultimate solutions.

Recently Michigan Attorney General Frank Kelly instituted suit to settle a more than half-century old boundary dispute between Michigan and Ohio. At its inception the governors of both states, if we recall the report correctly, were ready to call out the state militia to enforce their respective claims. Today, we have reached the stage where very few persons could give a rational account of the nature of the dispute, and certainly one would be properly accused of being out of his right mind to advocate that the two states proceed to make war on each other. Whatever the judicial settlement is, the Michiganians and Ohioans are certain to accept it. It may be a long time before we reach a similar situation in disputes among nation-states but it is nevertheless "a consummation devoutly to be wished."

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, May 7  
The Character of the Early Church  
Acts 4:23-33  
By C. P. Dame

The early church had some qualities which we sorely need today. This lesson teaches us that the early church was a praying church. Well, we need praying congregations today.

I. A united prayer inspires. "And being let go, they went to their own company," and there they told what orders they had received from the religious authorities. Peter and John had been released by the court with the command to stop preaching about Jesus. However, they resolved to keep on preaching for they were sure that this was God's will.

"And when they heard that, they lifted up their voice to God with one accord" — they prayed unitedly. Here was spiritual unity. Let's look at their prayer which revealed their beliefs. They addressed God as Lord—the word used here is the word from which the word "despot" comes. These early Christians recognized God as sovereign, absolute ruler, who is able to do as He pleases. Our sovereign God has a purpose. It was God's eternal purpose to send His Son, our Lord, into this world to die for our sins. The world did not receive the Lord. In the Old Testament David foretold this. Kings and rulers, Herod and Pilate, Jews and Gentiles opposed Him. The Holy Spirit had shown this truth to the early believers. They also believed in the inspiration of the scriptures as their reference to Psalm 2:1-2, reveals.

These Christians did not pray for the destruction of their persecutors but they might with all boldness speak God's word. Since they were forbidden to preach they asked for courage and they asked God to stretch forth His hand "that signs and wonders may be done by the name of Thy holy child Jesus." What concern these believers have for the gospel! Do we have it?

II. A united prayer gets results. "And when they had prayed, the place was shaken, where they were assembled together." The believers prayed fervently and expectantly. This is the way we should pray. Luke says that these believers "were all filled with the Holy Ghost"—overlook not the word "all." The Bible teaches that whenever disciples were filled with the Holy Ghost things happened. We can be sure of this—when the Holy Spirit fills a person, sin gets pushed out and good action follows. The text shows this — note the words, "spoke the word of God with all boldness."

III. Praying people share. The early church was spiritually united. Their unity was not based upon organization but upon a spiritual union each one had with Jesus. They felt responsible for each other. The wealthier people sold their property and gave the proceeds to the apostles who distributed it to those in need. Due to this spirit of sharing there was no poverty. From the beginning of the Christian Church giving has been practiced by the members. Today much of the giving is done by Christians.

"And with great power gave before the apostles' witness of the resurrection of the Lord Jesus" which shows that the early church believed strongly in the resurrection of Jesus and proclaimed that He is alive. Social concern is right but the church misses the point when it does not preach the risen, living Christ Jesus, Lord of all.

## City Council Approves New Budget

City Council Wednesday night adopted the 1967-68 budget calling for a general fund appropriation of \$2,030,971.78.

Adoption of the budget followed a public hearing in which only one person made a comment. Ralph Jones, representing the Fire Fighters Association of Holland, protested the 10 per cent differential for police, compared with 5 per cent for firemen. He said brochures would be forthcoming in a short time protesting the one-range boost for firemen.

The one-step for firemen was explained at the April 19 meeting at which time attention was called to the new state law putting firemen on a 56-hour week instead of 63 hours. All other city employees will receive the one-step boost.

The new budget calls for \$1,324,377.29 to be raised by local taxes, an increase of \$195,124.21 over last year. This figure includes debt service of \$276,828 with \$205,000 going for bonds for two sewer programs.

The city tax rate will be \$25.94 per \$1,000 assessed valuation or \$2.77 more than last year's rate of \$23.17.

Hope scored four times after two outs in the first inning. Charlie Langeland started the rally with a single and scored on Tom Pelon's triple. Walks to Don Troost and Bruce Van Huis loaded the bases. Harry Rumohr followed with a single to drive in Pelon and Troost. An infield hit by Denny Farmer sent Van Huis home with the fourth tally.

Alma scored single runs in the second, third and fourth innings to slice the margin to 4-3 before Hope tallied a pair in the sixth.

Back-to-back singles put Van Huis and Rumohr on base. An error sent Van Huis home and an infield ground out drove in Rumohr.

Langeland and Rumohr each collected a pair of hits in the opening game as Hope totaled six.

Alma hurler John Terwilliger mastered the Flying Dutchmen in the second game. The right-hander allowed only one hit—a fourth inning single by Van Huis — and struck out 16 batters. He walked six Flying Dutchmen.

Alma snapped a scoreless deadlock with a tally in the fifth inning and added a pair in the sixth.

Hamilton junior Mark Johnson was charged with the mound loss. The southpaw allowed only three hits while going the distance for the Flying Dutchmen.

Hope notes: Hope co-captain Wayne Cotts missed the Alma doubleheader. The Hudsonville senior fractured his jaw during the second game of the Albion doubleheader when he collided with centerfielder Don Troost. Charlie Langeland leads all Hope hitters in the MIAA with 13 hits in 24 trips to the plate for a .538 average. Hope travels to Olivet Saturday for a crucial MIAA doubleheader.

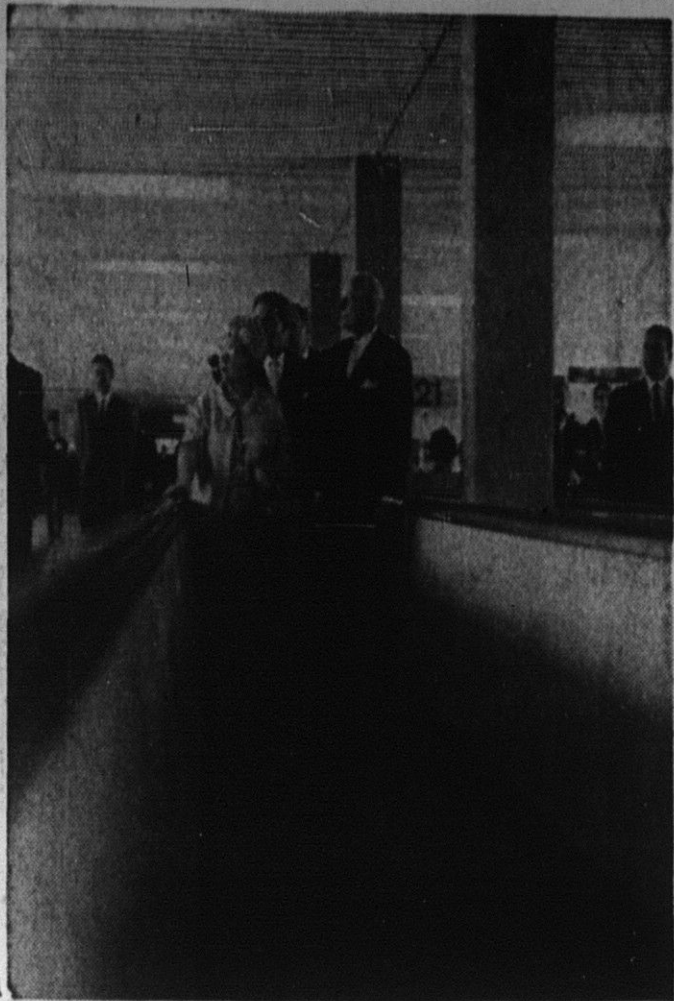

## New Schiphol Is Dedicated In Amsterdam

AMSTERDAM — The new Schiphol is the pride of Holland. It is also the newest No. 1 tourist attraction of Amsterdam.

This gleaming new airport, a \$100 million development opposite the old Schiphol airport, was dedicated Friday in the presence of Her Majesty Queen Juliana and a select audience of under a thousand persons, a good share of whom represented the press from all over the world as well as an officialdom from many countries.

It was an historic moment when the queen clad in a yellow-green suit and a turban entered the huge reception area. The previous day she had cancelled her scheduled appearance to be with her daughter, Crown Princess Beatrix, who gave birth to a son Thursday evening at 8:30 p.m. (Netherlands time), the first male in the House of Orange in 116 years.

At noon Friday, it was made known that Her Majesty would be present for the ceremony, and the press prepared accordingly.

Her Majesty did not deliver a speech. There were four speeches, all in Dutch, with the press provided with proper translations available in four or five languages. Being among 90 journalists and travel editors from 30 different countries of the world was a great thrill and a most delightful experience.

The queen's main duty at the dedication was to pull the cord unveiling a huge panoramic view of the new airport in color. Then she was taken on a tour of the airport with press and well wishers following, tried the new

moving walkways of the airport, posed graciously for informal pictures and departed. The press representatives had toured the huge airport the day before.

The new airport, labeled the air gateway to Europe by the Netherlands, lies only six miles from downtown Amsterdam. Schiphol literally means "ships' hole" or graveyard of ships, harking back four centuries when the area was a lake separating Amsterdam and Haarlem, a distance of 10 miles, split by a very fragile dam. Here in 1572 the Spanish fleet which controlled Amsterdam battled the Dutch. Freakish weather suddenly froze the lake and the hardy Dutch took to ice skates and staged a hand-to-hand battle. Other phases of the battle were equally freakish, and while the Spanish ultimately won, the event still stands as one of the most glorious in Dutch history.

Schiphol lies 13 feet below sea level. The area was drained in the middle of the 19th century by Dutch hydraulic engineers, and the old sea arena because a valuable stretch of countryside with a solid clay bottom right on the doorstep of Amsterdam. Development of the Old Schiphol started in 1917.

Although the new Schiphol was dedicated April 28, it will not be in service until May 8. In the dark hours that day, a carefully scheduled program in the course of five or six hours will transfer all operations from the old Schiphol to the new Schiphol.

The new airport which is expected to handle 5,000,000 passengers by 1975, compared with 2,100,000 this year, is able to handle a stream of passengers for 40 departing flights simultaneously with the aid of a new electronic system. The new Schiphol also boasts of the most up-to-date air cargo handling system in Europe, probably in the world.

The new Schiphol has been under development since 1961. A new network of highways has been developed including a huge tunnel with airport runways overhead. A viaduct apron drive gangways eliminate stairs for boarding or leaving planes.

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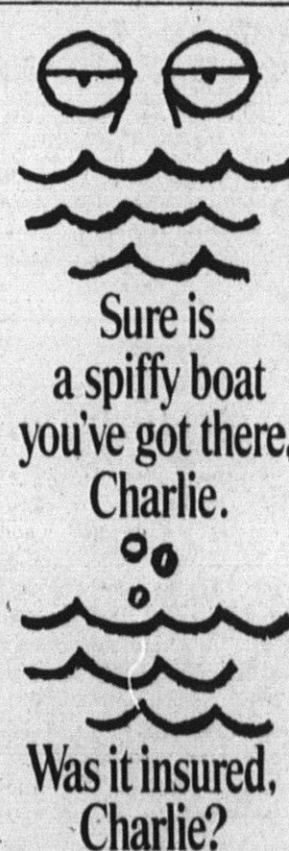

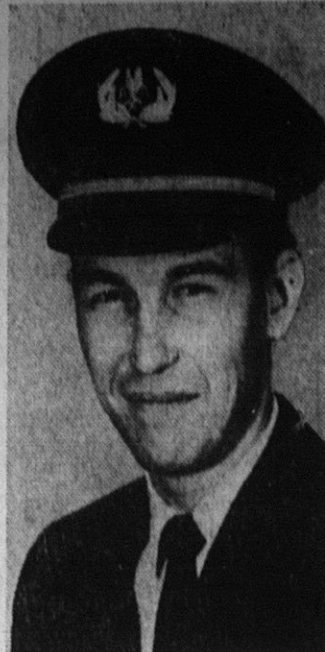

## Ambulance Service Problem Stalemated by Allegan Board

ALLEGAN — Efforts of a three man committee of Allegan County supervisors to provide even a temporary solution to the county's ambulance service problem was stalemated at a special board session here Thursday.

Defeated by a 12 to 22 vote was the motion introduced by ambulance committee chairman Carl Strand of Watson, calling of an agreement with the consent of Circuit Judge Chester Ray, to release from service one of Action Ambulances' three vehicles presently operating in the county under an injunction.

Included in the motion was the request to retain two of the ambulances on a temporary basis until May 10. An injunction was issued last Thursday by Allegan County Prosecutor Ervin L. Andrews to prevent the company from ceasing operations. Action Ambulances had served notice to Allegan County Clerk Esther Hettinger that they were cutting off all service as of noon the following Friday.

Action Ambulance manager Peter M. Huttenga of Grand Rapids, prior to introduction of Thursday's motion had said he would attempt to operate his service in the eastern half of Allegan County with two ambulances. The Wayland base would be discontinued.

Huttenga said he had been forced to take drastic action last week because his financial losses had reached \$5,000 in the first 11 weeks of operation in Allegan County.

Huttenga told the board his company had kept its bargain, but "we bargained wrong." He said he had undertaken the Allegan job after being told that approximately 3,000 ambulance calls were answered in the county per year. It was evident Huttenga did not take into account the fact that ambulance owners in Fennville, Hamilton and Saugatuck had never served notice they were going out of business as did five others in the county.

The Grand Rapids manager said "thus far we have been cut down 50 per cent on estimated potential business. The manager informed the board his average fee per call was \$26 which included mileage and extra services performed. He estimated his labor costs to be around \$760 per week for three cars in operation.

Following defeat of the committee's motion Strand asked to be relieved of his committee chairmanship stating he thought the committee purpose had been "to keep the service on some basis until a solution could be reached." Russell Sill of Ganges, another committee member, also asked to be relieved. A third member, Joseph Bartz of Allegan, although admitting a "stalemate" did not submit his resignation.

Board of Supervisors Chairman Grover Grigsby of Trowbridge, said he did not believe appointing three other men would solve anything. Three new members, he said, would find themselves "on the same merry-go-round as the present committee."

Prosecutor Andrews, on hand for part of the meeting, told the board it should have some proof that two ambulances could provide adequate protection and service before releasing the third car. "Funeral directors of the county who have gone out of the ambulance business no longer carry insurance or have the equipment to resume operations," Andrews reminded the board.

When asked by Supervisor Alger Workman of Allegan just what the board's commitment was to the people of Allegan County, Andrews said the county's obligation extended only to cases where the ambulance company could not collect from persons who receive service as

the result of the county sheriffs being called to the scenes.

One optimistic note was sounded near the close of Thursday's session. Strand announced he had been in consultation with another ambulance service representative who promised to study Allegan County's situation and make recommendations for proposals in the near future.

In another motion unanimously approved the board expressed its thanks to Saugatuck, Hamilton and Fennville funeral

directors "in appreciation of their fine example of public service."

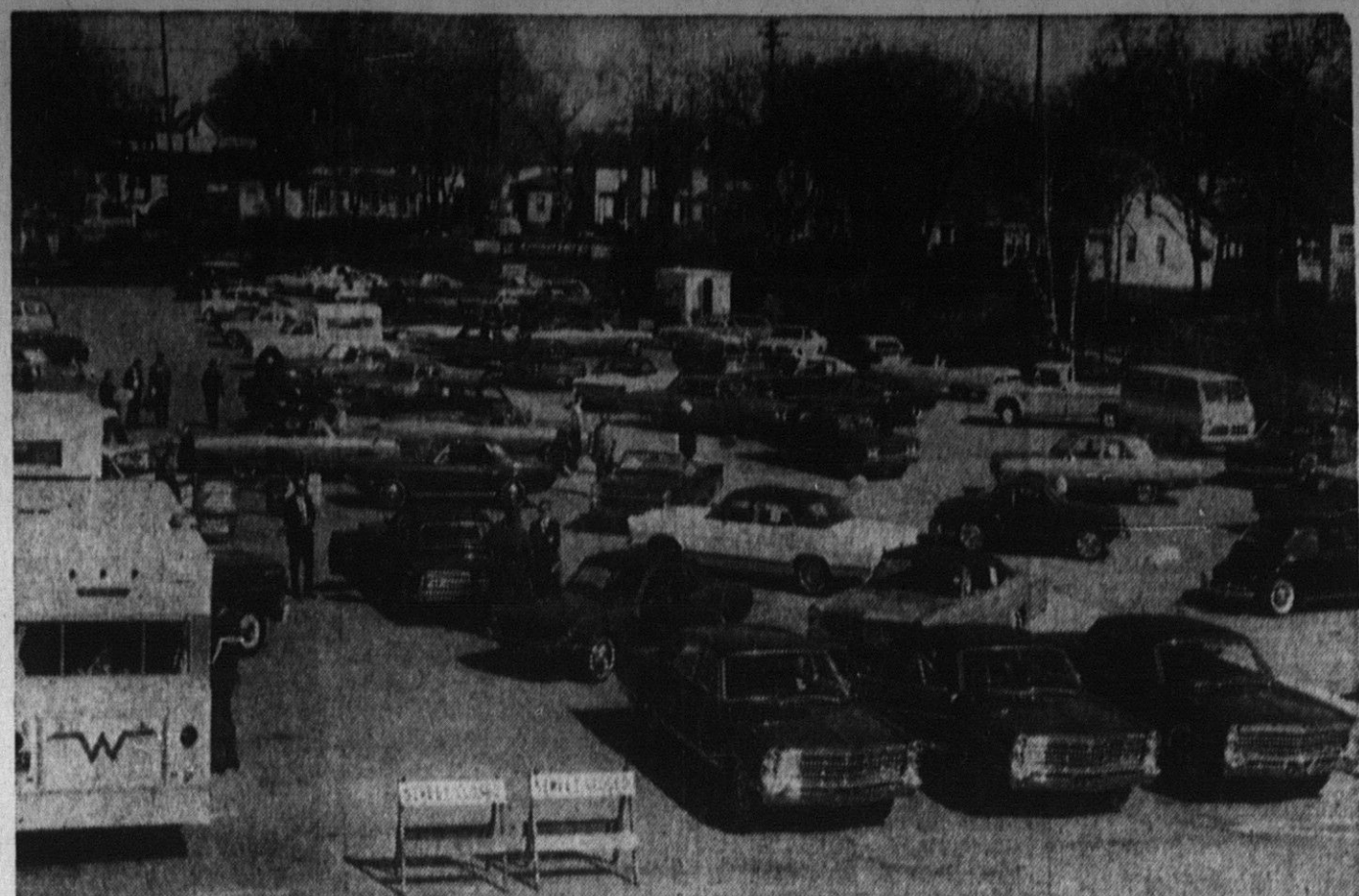

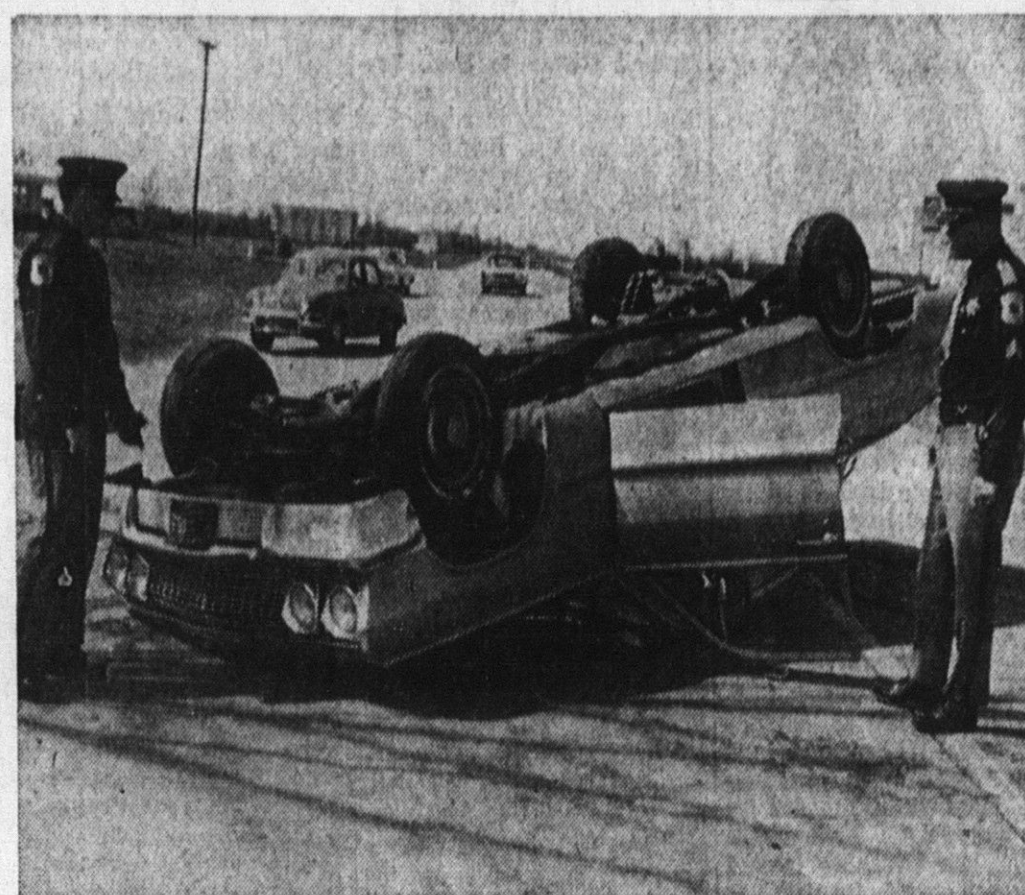

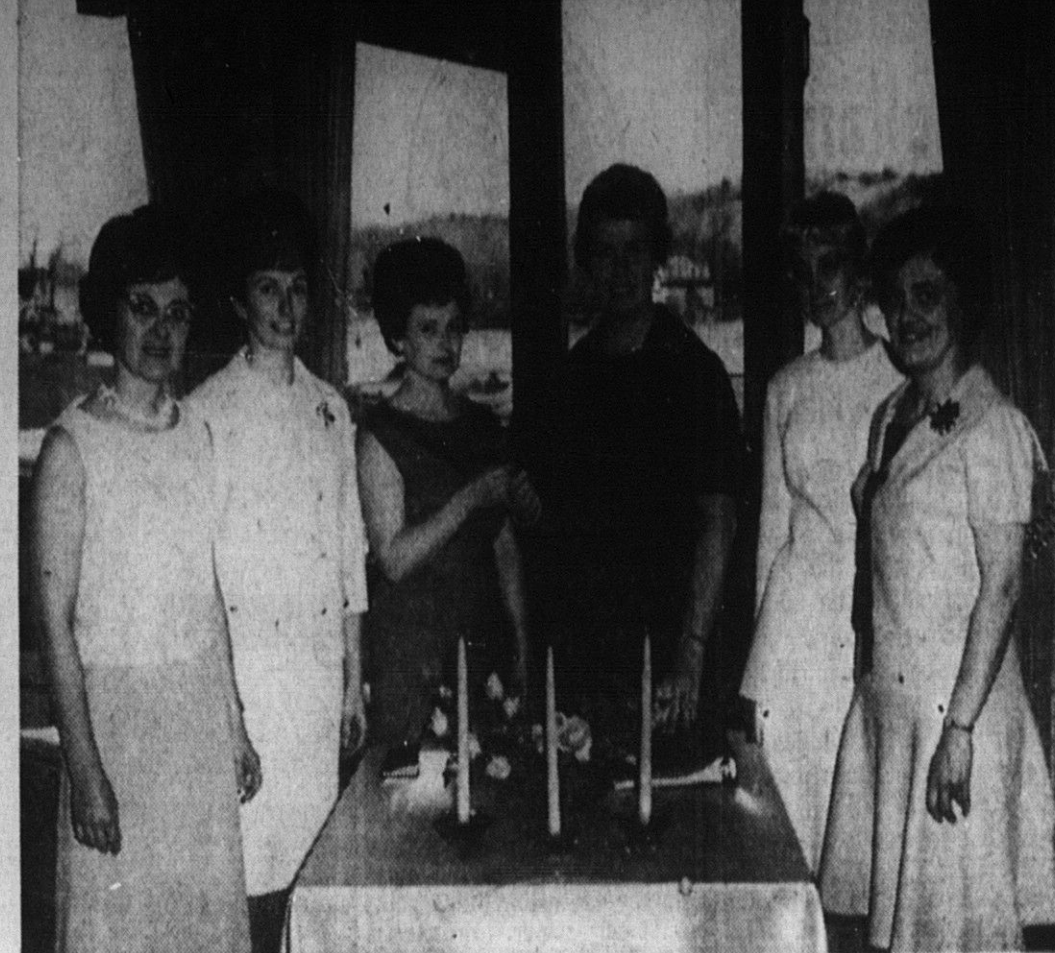
