Zeeland native Jim Kaat, pitcher for the Minnesota Twins is the all-time leading active winner in the American League with 142 victories in 11 seasons of major league baseball according to statistics released recently in the 1970 American League Red Book.

Counting the two games that Kaat has won this year gives the former Zeeland High School standout a 144-121 record.

Kaat's best mark has been against the Chicago White Sox whom he has beaten 23 times in 31 decisions in his 11 years of action. Against the Detroit Tigers, Kaat is 10-17.

Another Minnesota pitcher Jim Perry is ranked second in all-time wins for active pitchers with 126 victories and only 94 defeats.

Dean Chance of Cleveland is the leader in career shutouts with 32 while the Tigers' Ed Delmonico is second with 26. Kaat is 15th with 16 whitewashes.

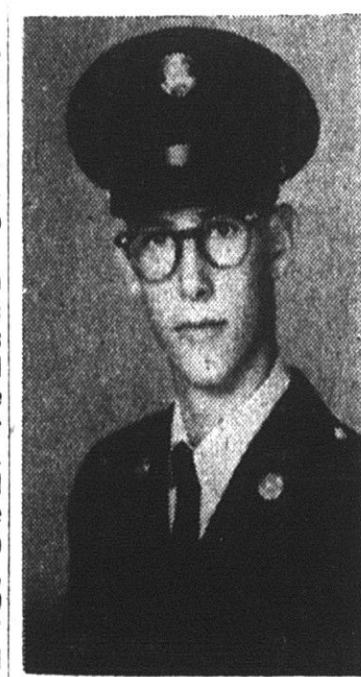

Koeman, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Nelson Koeman, was recently promoted to SP-5 after returning from active duty in Korea for 13 months.

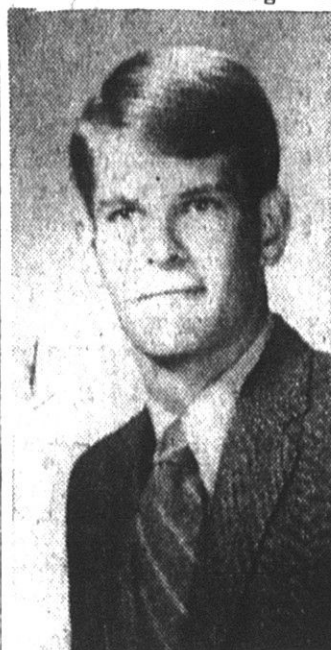

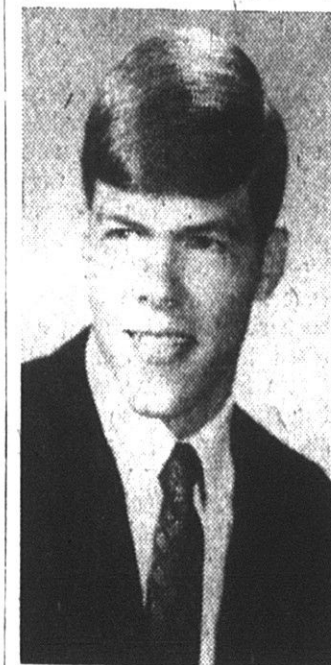

Sentences Are Levied In Court

GRAND HAVEN — One youth was sentenced to Ionia Reformatory when he appeared before Judge Raymond L. Smith in Ottawa Circuit Court Monday and six others were given jail terms.

Terry Robertson, 17, of 6740 144th Ave., Holland, charged with robbery unarmed, was sentenced to serve 18 months to 10 years at Ionia, with minimum recommended. On Dec. 28, 1969, Robertson allegedly robbed Paul Vander Beek at a service station on M-21 in Holland township.

Three Partain brothers from Arkansas, arrested for the larceny of \$20 from a hitchhiker near Grand Valley State College at Allendale last Sept. 22, were sentenced to six months in jail. Township Brings Suit On Airpark

GRAND HAVEN — Grand Haven township started a civil suit in Ottawa Circuit Court Thursday in an attempt to halt annexation of the Memorial Airpark property, located in the township, to the city of Grand Haven.

Supervisor Clarence Reenders and the township board request in the suit that the court issue an injunction prohibiting any action by the City Council in connection with the annexation until a ruling is made by the court.

Plaintiffs claim that on March 23 the Grand Haven City Council, without notifying the township, passed a resolution purporting to annex to the city the airpark property, located on Comstock St. at 168th Ave. a short distance south of the south city limit.

Venhuizen Resigns At Saugatuck

SAUGATUCK — Ron Venhuizen, basketball coach at Saugatuck since 1967 and former standout at Hope College announced his resignation today to accept a position as assistant coach at Iso Thermal Community College, in Spindale, N.C.

Besides being a fine basketball player for the Flying Dutchmen, Venhuizen was one of the leading scorers in the Recreation league this past season. His team, Koww Realty, won the league title.

Venhuizen will be teaching history at the two-year school besides helping out as assistant basketball coach for the five-year-old college.

The basketball team at Iso Thermal had a 21-7 record for the 1969-70 season and according to Venhuizen expects to even better that mark next year. The team features a 6'10" center.

Iso plays such freshmen major college basketball powers as Duke, North Carolina State and Clemson.

Venhuizen will stay on at Saugatuck until the end of the current school year and is planning on moving to North Carolina sometime in June.

Saugatuck's best season under Venhuizen was in 1968-69 when the Indians finished second in the Al-Van League and had an overall mark of 15-7.

During his three years as varsity coach, the Indians won two Class D District crowns.

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Holt Out As Manager In Florida

ST PETERSBURG, Fla. — St. Petersburg City Council has appointed Raymond Harbaugh of Atlanta Ga., as city manager effective May 1, succeeding H. Herbert Holt who left Holland, Mich., last December to serve as interim city manager here.

Holt had served as city manager of Holland for 15 years.

Harbaugh, a regional supervisor for the Public Administration Service in Atlanta, was hired in a 4-3 split April 23, and he deliberated eight hours before notifying Mayor Don Spicer he would take the job. Earlier he had expressed hesitation over a close vote.

Holt also had been named interim manager late in November by a 4-3 vote, but differently distributed. Two months ago he was named city manager until such time as another would be appointed.

Holt said he would assist with as orderly a transition as possible and then recede into the background. "I have learned a great deal since being in St. Petersburg," he said, "and I have no feeling of bitterness or disappointment."

He indicated he might leave the field of city management. "I am tempted to find a method of earning a living a little less hectic than the city management field. I would like something with a little more security for my family. I feel we are involved in a political process that no one knows the answer to. Anyone can be a victim of circumstances."

The action came just as the city budget study was starting. The Holts and the Harbaughs are friends.

During his five months in St. Petersburg, Holt has worked extremely well with city employees whose morale had been at a low ebb when the previous city manager left for a new post in Texas. At 2:30 p.m. Wednesday, city employees will present him with a plaque bearing expressions of appreciation and sentiment.

City Council will meet in special session at 10 a.m. Thursday to release Holt formally from the position. Councilman William Allison, the man who invited Holt to St. Petersburg for the initial interview, will present a resolution calling for two months' severance pay. The resolution is expected to pass.

Holt plans a vacation in Florida before the family returns to Holland for the summer. The Holts own a home in Larkwood subdivision in Holland.

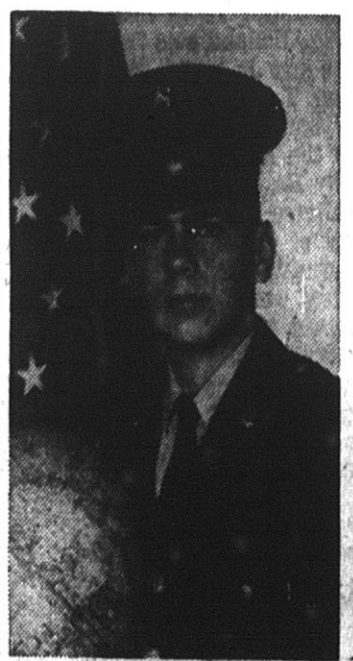

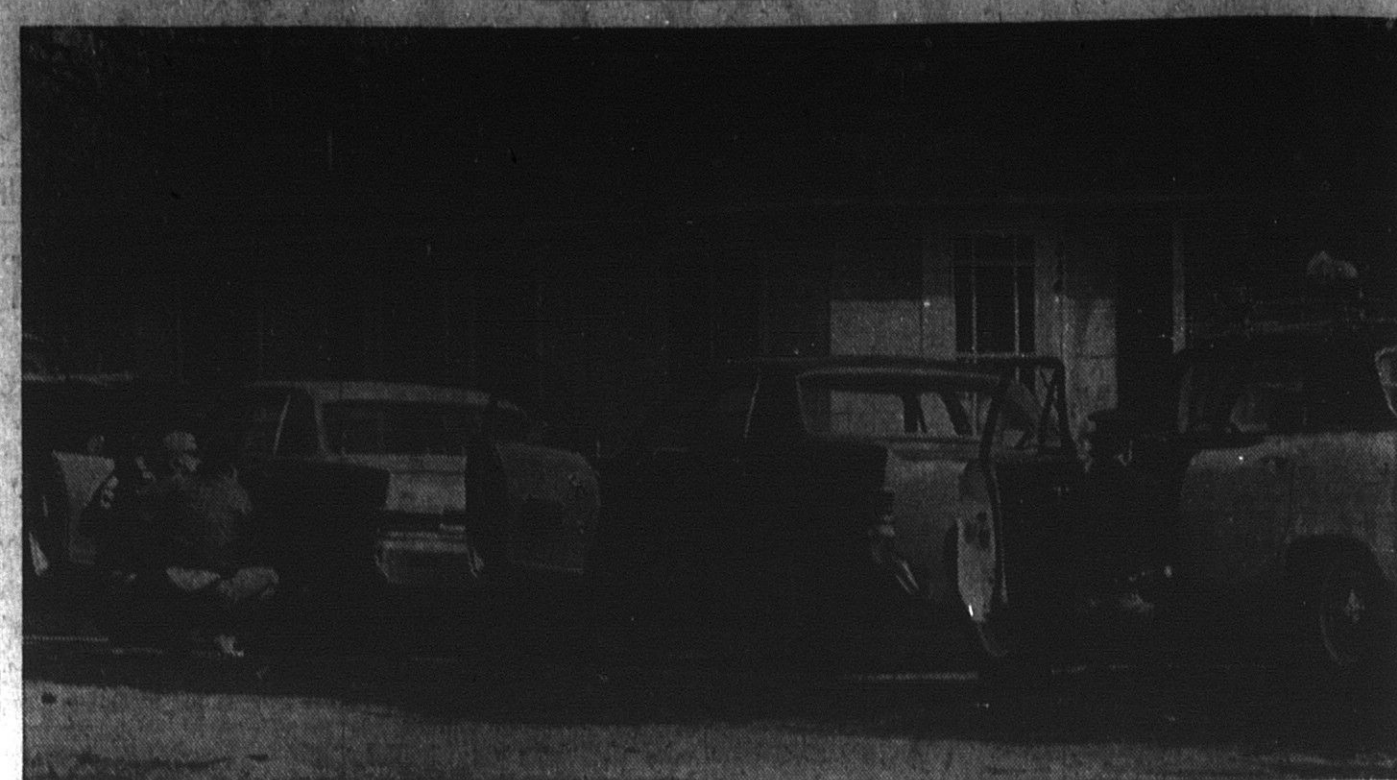

Holland Man Is Charged With Kidnaping Boy, 7

GRAND HAVEN — Kenneth Dale Stengenga, 25, of 12875 James St., Holland, demanded examination on a kidnapping charge at his arraignment in District Court here Monday.

Stengenga had been lodged in Ottawa County Jail since Saturday after he was arrested in a house at 349 West Lakewood Blvd. for allegedly holding a 7-year-old boy at gunpoint.

No date for the examination has been scheduled. Unable to provide \$5,000 bond, Stengenga was remanded to the county jail.

According to Ottawa County Sheriff's Department, they received a call at 9:49 a.m. Saturday that a man was holding

a 7-year-old boy at gunpoint at the home of Karen Raetz at the Lakewood Blvd. address. Investigation revealed that this was the result of a quarrel between Mrs. Raetz and the alleged kidnapper Friday night.

Sheriff's officers reported while Mrs. Raetz was away Saturday, the child was grabbed by the alleged kidnapper who advised a neighbor to notify Mrs. Raetz that if she wasn't home in half an hour, the child would be beaten up.

The neighbor saw Stengenga go into a truck at the Raetz residence and take a gun into the house. Officers returning to the scene today found a load-

ed .32 caliber revolver in the house.

Six units from the Ottawa County Sheriff's Department were dispatched to the scene and while officers were talking to Stengenga, the boy ran out of the back door.

Officers, who did not identify the child, said he was not injured.

Sheriff Bernard Grysen and Det. Sgt. John Hemple were able to talk their way into the house and at about 11:30 a.m. Saturday, upon authorization from Prosecuting Attorney Calvin Bosman, arrested Stengenga for kidnapping.

Stengenga was jailed over the weekend without bond.

Federal Grant Permits Expansion of Kandu Here

A \$56,593 grant from the Social and Rehabilitation Agency of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare has made possible expansion of the Kandu Industries, Inc. activities center in Holland. This center provides activities for adult and young adult handicapped persons in the area. It supplements the work program for the handicapped carried out at the recently expanded facilities in Grand Haven which also serves this area.

The grant will be used to hire additional staff members, purchase equipment and improve services to the handicapped. Kandu received a \$33,514 grant this past summer from the same agency for a remodeling project which has recently been completed.

The program currently offered at Kandu Industries is certified with the federal and state wage and hour programs as a work activity center. The program emphasis is placed upon work and personal adjustment.

Work activities are provided through subcontracts which are obtained from the community and also from prime manufacturing operations. The subcontracts consist primarily of packaging and assembly work while the prime manufacturing encompasses the making of tie-down cords for automobile trunks and also decorative gift bows.

There is, as a part of the agency operations, a retail and wholesale program of manufactured goods.

Kandu Industries, Inc., is a nonprofit organization and was incorporated in 1966 by the Haven Foundation of Ottawa County and the Ottawa-Allegan Cerebral Palsy Association. It is the only multiple-disability workshop and adult activities center in Ottawa County. Initial workshop services began with one staff member and ten clients housed in a building of 1,500 square feet. Since then the average number of clients served on a daily basis has increased to 21, the staff positions numbers four and the building now occupied has approximately 10,000 square feet.

To assist in the social adjustment aspect of the program, social programs are provided which include bowling, field trips and community experiences which expose the client to situations requiring flexibility on his part to adapt to different situations.

A natural element of service derived from serving a severely handicapped population is extended sheltered employment. The experience of Kandu indicates that a significant number of clients served remain in this program as employees and that competitive or sheltered placement in the community is an aspect of service which requires strengthening.

Kandu Industries provides a transportation service to those clients who are in need. The clients, if at all possible, are picked up daily at their home, and transported to and from the workshop. The client is charged a fee for this service providing he has the financial

resource available.

Clients must have a physical or mental handicap which can be certified. They must be at least 18 years of age and reside in the area served by Kandu. No person is denied service because of race, religion, sex or national origin.

Client referrals originate from the public schools, Michigan Employment Securities Commission, Mental Health Clinics, Social Services Department, the Division of Services to the Blind and the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation. A large number of clients are self or family referrals.

Kandu Industries presently has a waiting list of applications. This list can be significantly reduced through the implementation of this grant. Furthermore, those agencies equally concerned with the rehabilitation and habilitation of people will benefit from having available not only the direct use of our services through referral patterns, but will also benefit from the consultation and resources of the augmented staff.

Kandu Industries is a member agency of the Tri-Cities Area United Fund, Greater Holland United Fund, Zeeland United Fund and Coopersville United Fund. In addition to its member agency affiliation, Kandu works cooperatively with both public and private agencies concerned with handicapped people.

Kandu Industries has worked closely with the Michigan Division of Vocational Rehabilitation through the district office in Grand Rapids. DVR has assisted in making recommendations and suggestions regarding program development in Kandu.

The newly acquired staff, equipment and remodeling of our facility will position Kandu to provide specialized services to DVR clients.

An open house will be held at the newly remodeled and expanded workshop in Grand Haven during June.

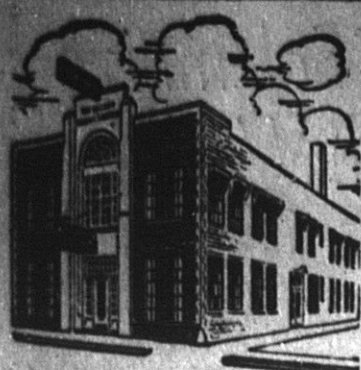

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THE QUESTION OF TIME IN MICHIGAN

There are many persons in this area who would like to have Michigan time moved ahead one hour from late April through the early fall. According to the news reports last Sunday, all of the United States except Michigan, Hawaii and Arizona moved their clocks ahead one hour.

Here in Michigan we almost made it back in 1968 when a statewide referendum was held and 2.2 million votes were cast. There was a margin of only 490 votes that defeated the daylight time, thereby upholding the exemption law passed by the state legislature the same year.

The people who are interested in the change may have another chance if State Sen. Raymond Dziedzic (D-Detroit) can get a new referendum on the ballot yet this year.

Dziedzic is the author of a resolution calling for a public vote on a constitutional amendment—known as Resolution "T"—and if this were successful, it would place Michigan on daylight time.

His hopes were dashed Wednesday, though, as it would take a two-thirds majority of both Senate and House to put the question on the ballot. The vote on the Senate floor was beaten by 16 to 15. Tomorrow, Wednesday, there may be another vote. So, as time passes, time will tell.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, May 3

From Persecutor to Missionary
Galatians 1:11-17; Acts 11:19-26
By C. P. Dame

Some people have unforgettable experiences. This lesson tells about a man who had a religious experience that changed his life and brought blessings to many. A person who has been converted to Christ has a story to tell.

I. A preacher of the gospel should have certainty. Paul founded the churches in Galatia and hence he was concerned about them. False teachers had come to those churches and had upset Paul's converts. The church is troubled today with false teachers. Most of those who disturb the church are preachers who have lost their message or never had one from God.

Paul was called to preach and he had received a message not from men but direct from God. Once he had persecuted the church but God called him—in fact God had set him apart from his birth to preach. After his dramatic conversion on the road to Damascus Paul did not go to Jerusalem to confer with the leaders of the church but went to Arabia to think and ponder and pray. He had a message of this he was sure.

II. Witnessing by laymen gets results. Some persecuted Christians went to Phenice, a narrow tract of coastland north of Palestine where Tyre and Sidon were located, and some went to Cyprus, a large island off the coast of Asia Minor and Palestine, and some to Antioch. Some men from Cyprus and Cyrene took a bold step and preached the gospel to the Greek-speaking Jews and to native Greeks and won converts.

The work in Antioch, which was the third largest city in the Roman Empire, was singularly blessed. The unknown laymen won converts. And the hand of the Lord was with them, and a great number believed, and turned to the Lord. This method still works. Unfortunately it is not practiced enough.

III. It is a blessing when the right man is in the right place. The church in Jerusalem heard about the conversions of Gentiles in Antioch and so their leaders sent Barnabas down there to investigate the work. No better man could have been sent for he was a good man and full of the Spirit. He saw the grace of God at work which gladdened him and inspired him to urge them to stick to the Lord.

When Barnabas saw the opportunities facing him he realized the need of a helper. He knew of a man, Paul, who was then living in Tarsus and brought him to Antioch. The two men worked a year together in Antioch and "taught much people." Recall that it was in the wicked city of Antioch that believers were first called Christians.

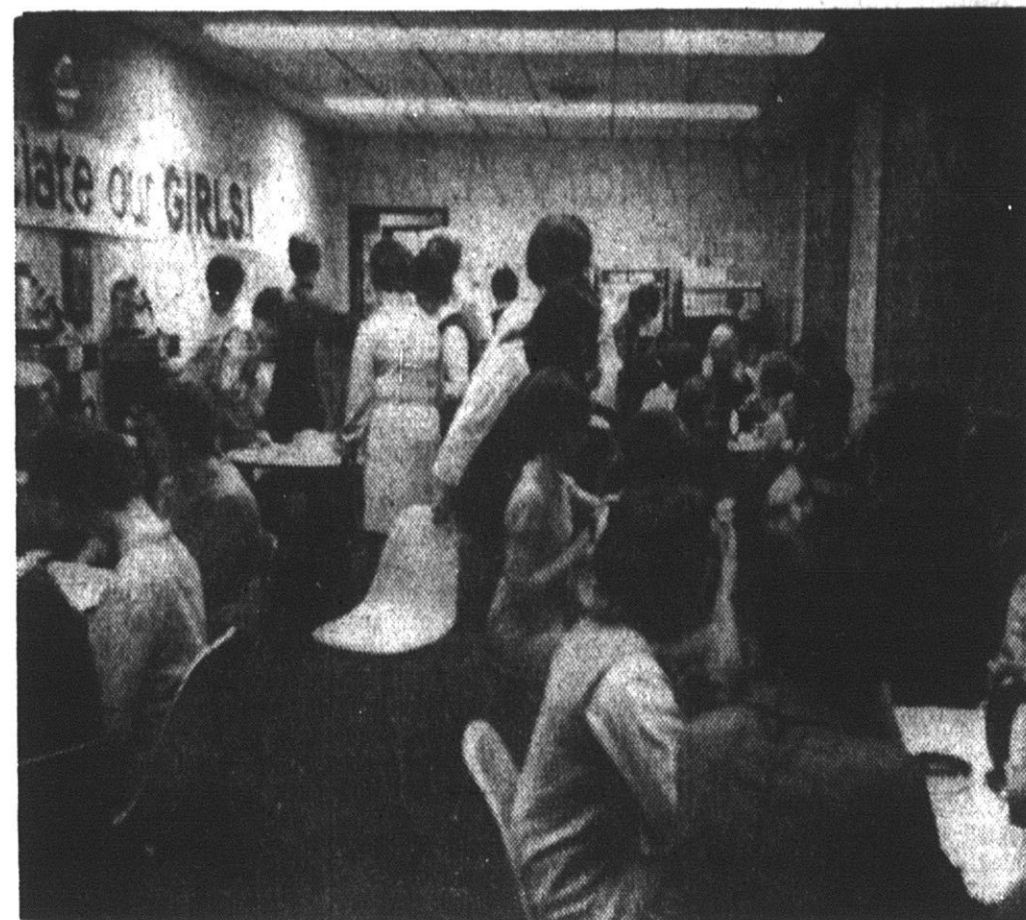

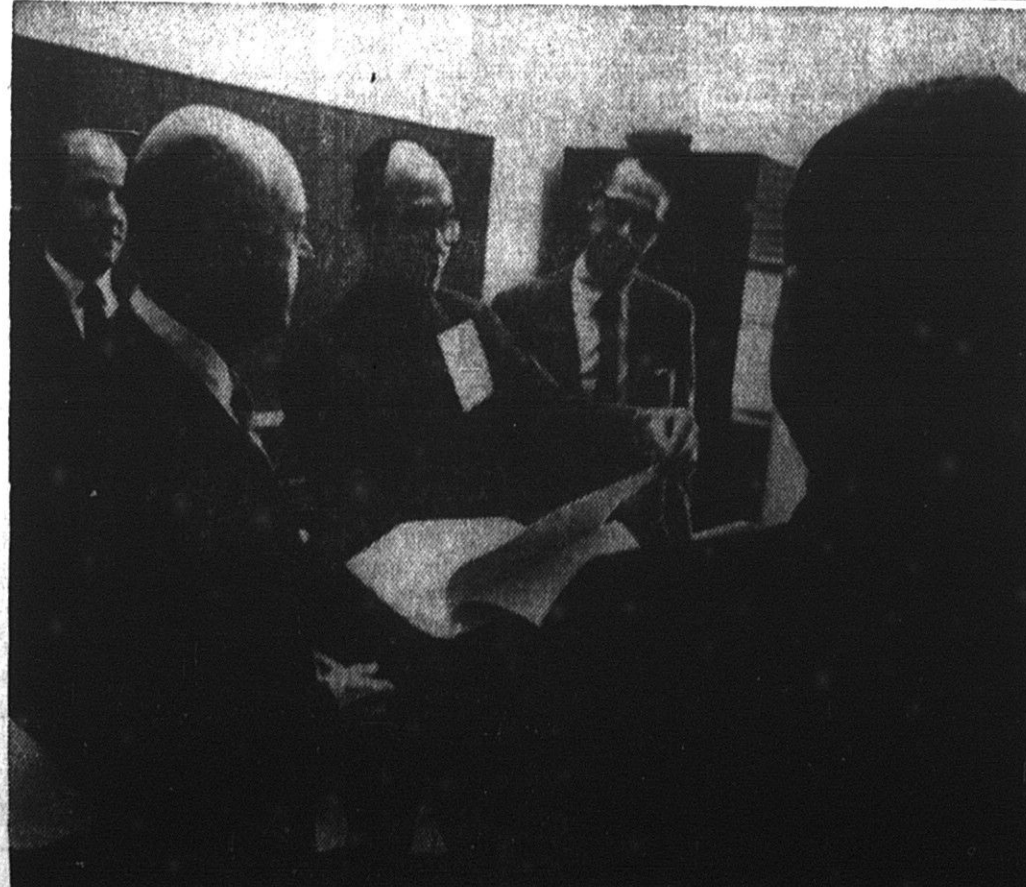
Car Jumps Curb, Hits Pole, Damages Tulips

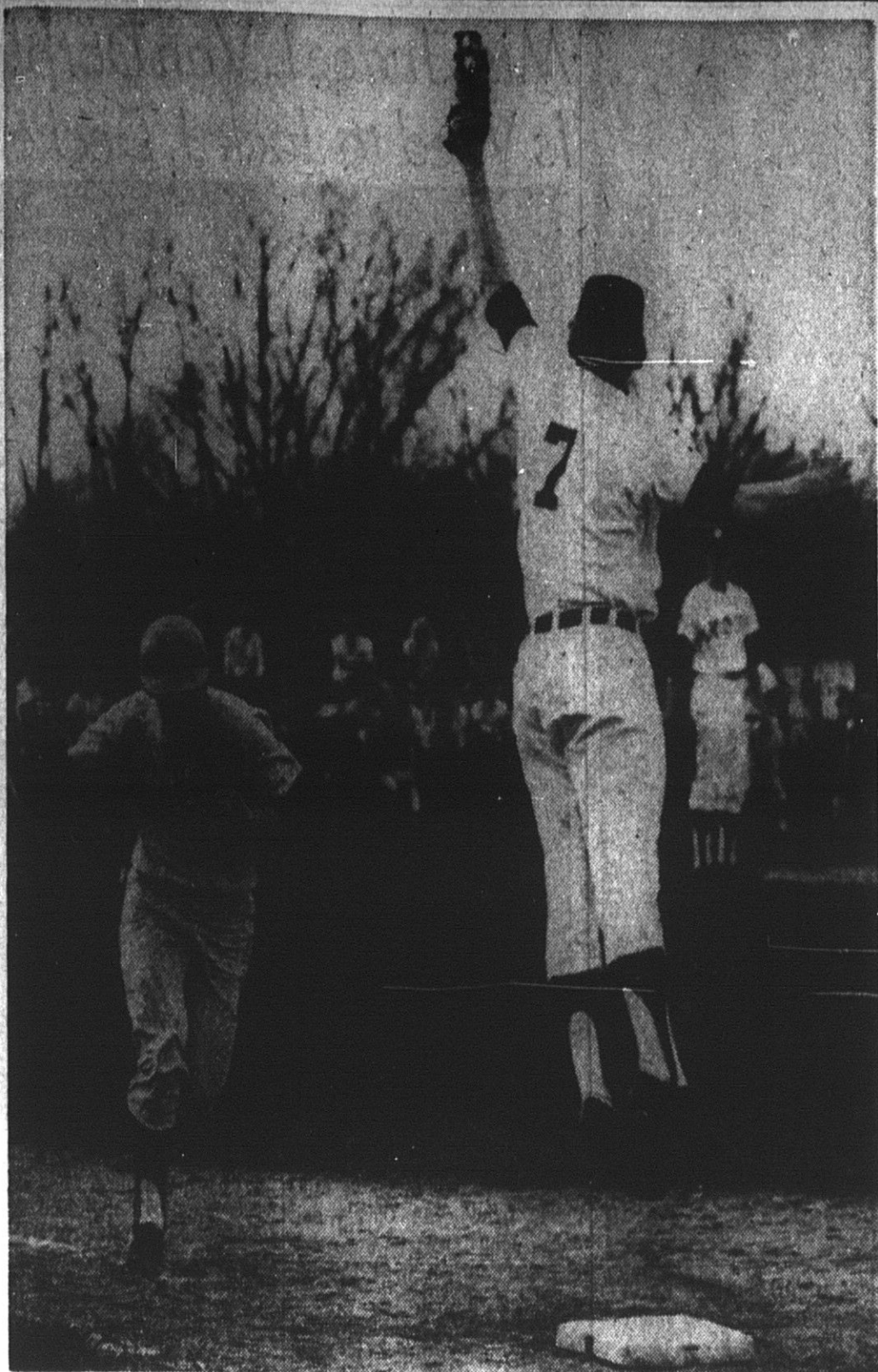

College Plans Two-Day Environmental Meeting

Hope College's Institute for Environmental Quality will present a free public conference, "Environment: Overview to Local View," May 8-9 in Holland Civic Center.

Scientists and environmental experts will define environmental problems during the afternoon and evening on Friday, May 8, then leaders of governmental and private organizations will attempt to arrive at solutions during the all-day session on Saturday, May 9.

Local, state and national leaders, in the effort to save the environment, will speak and participate in panel discussions. Planned topics range from global pollution, population control and waste management to the role of local state and national governments in pollution abatement and prevention.

The audience will have an opportunity to participate in much of the conference. Spectators will be able to offer questions and discussion topics for each of the three scheduled panels.

Dr. Donald Williams, coordinator of the sponsoring Institute of Environmental Quality and associate professor of chemistry at Hope, expects the conference to be of interest to everyone in the Holland area and western Michigan — students and adults, experts and non-experts.

Hope President Dr. Calvin A. VanderWerf will open the conference with a welcoming speech Friday afternoon. He will be followed by three scientists, including Dr. Edward Goldberg of Scripps Institution of Oceanography, who will give Friday afternoon speeches.

A Friday evening panel composed of the speakers plus Dr. David Klein, chairman-elect of Hope's chemistry department, comments from the audience. The mercury level in the Great Lakes is expected to be among the topics suggested.

On Saturday the all-day program includes a panel discussion of the local situation. In addition, Gene Gazlay, assistant director of the Department of Natural Resources, will present the state's role and Rep. Guy VanderJage will

conclude the conference with a speech on the role of the Federal government.

Dr. Goldberg will be joined in Friday afternoon speeches by Dr. Alfred Beeton, professor of biology at the University of Wisconsin, Milwaukee, and Dr. Lloyd Cooke, director of urban affairs for Union Carbide Corp. and chairman of the American Chemical Society's subcommittee on environmental improvement.

Dr. Goldberg, professor of marine chemistry at Scripps, will speak on "Family Planning — Fish" and Dr. Cook will deliver a speech entitled, "The Chemical Society Looks at Pollution Abatement."

Friday's speakers will join Dr. Klein in the evening panel discussion which will attempt to move the conference orientation from "Problems to Solutions."

The Saturday panel on "The Local Situation" will include Gazlay, Dr. John Sheaffer of the University of Chicago, Guy Bell of the Holland Board of Public Works, Roger Stroh of Holland's Department of Environmental Health, William Kennedy, chairman of the Ottawa County Board of Commissioners and militant conservationist Robert Wesley of Muskegon.

Dr. Sheaffer, chairman of the Department of Urban Studies at the University of Chicago, will open Saturday morning's program by speaking on "Community-wide Approaches to Waste Management."

On Saturday afternoon two speakers will present the population problem, then a panel including the speakers and local experts and non-experts will respond to audience questions.

Dr. Clifford Pease Jr. of New York-based Population Council will speak "Family Planning vs. Population Control" and Dr. John Hanlon, deputy administrator of the Department of Health, Education and Wel-

fare's Environmental Health Service, will discuss "Population and Environmental Problems."

They will be joined for the panel discussion by a representative of Planned Parenthood, will respond to questions and a Hope College coed and Dr. Eldon Greij, assistant professor of biology at Hope.

The conference is part of the college's continuing concern for the future of man and his environment. The Institute for Environmental Quality was formed by Hope faculty members in February and already embraces more than 10 academic departments. The institute plans to conduct a detailed investigation of the Black River watershed, including Lake Macatawa. Using the college's 35-foot research vessel, The Infinity H, the Institute will take geological, chemical and biological samplings of Lakes Macatawa and Michigan.

The Institute is staging the May 8-9 conference with the financial assistance of Thermotron Corp., Hope College, the Holland Garden Club, H. J. Heinz Co., Donnelly Mirrors, Inc., and Whirlpool Corp.

In addition to the new Institute, Hope students have formed Students for Environmental Action, an organization instrumental in local participation in the national teach-in on the environment on April 22, Earth Day.

The college recently announced a new course to be offered next fall, "Interdisciplinary Studies 76 — Science and Human Values." A three-faculty team from the biology, chemistry and religion departments will supervise the course which will involve as many as 12 departments.

Hope is a member of the Great Lakes Colleges Association which is also planning environmental programs. The college was instrumental in the formation of the Council of Environmentalists by colleges in and near Holland. Other colleges participating in the pooling of information and expertise are Grand Valley State College, Calvin College, Aquinas College, Grand Rapids Junior College and Ferris State College.

An official is courage in sneakers, spirit in stripes, wisdom with a whistle and despite the fact that they get paid for their work, they have a devotion above and beyond the call of duty to their employer.

When the game is close, the officials are "incompetent, indecisive and stupid" to some people that don't realize all the pressure of being an official.

When the contest is one-sided they are "merciless, whistle-happy and domineering."

An official is a composite. He looks like a gentleman which most of them are, acts like a traffic cop, and is as fussy as a grandmother.

To himself, an official has never missed a play, called a ball, a strike or split a second incorrectly with a stop watch,

He has the eyes of an eagle, the keen mind of an Einstein, the judgment of a Solomon, plus the speed and grace of Mickey Mantle and Bill Toomey all built in one.

To the men who work with him, he seems to be always out of position to make the right call or runs like a truck, steals from under his partner's nose, is as blind as a bat, stupid and awkward as a mule and is utterly incapable of making any correct decisions.

For example an official like Norm Japinga of Holland likes a big schedule, few training sessions, well coached, trained, disciplined teams, considerate coaches, polite players, dry fields, air-conditioned dressing facilities and the quiet satisfaction of having been a part of a perfect game. He cares not for snowy games, tough decisions, screaming coaches, booing fans, waiting for his pay or traveling.

An official is a wonderful creature. You can criticize him any time but you can't intimidate him. You can question his judgment but not his honesty. He is the symbol of fair play, integrity and sportsmanship. He is hard working and alert. He spends long hours studying the rules and takes his work seriously. He is an individual who is making a great contribution to the American way of life, to the boys who play the game and the fans who watch through athletics.

Yes, an official is a wonderful person that we may criticize at times but we would be in bad shape without them and the next time you think he's made a bum call, remember he's calling them like he sees them and this country needs

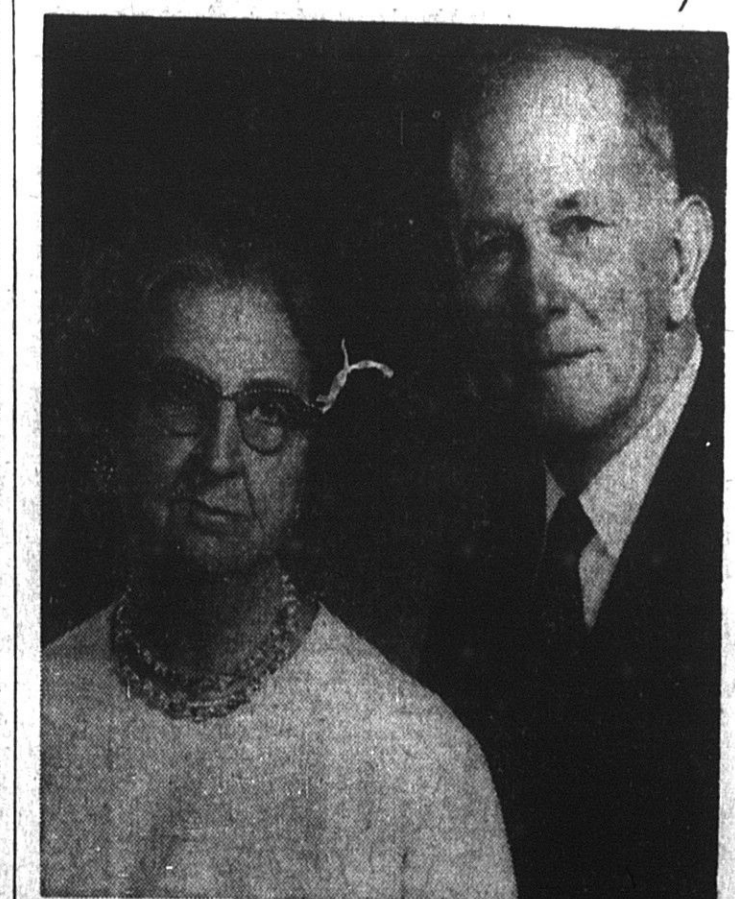

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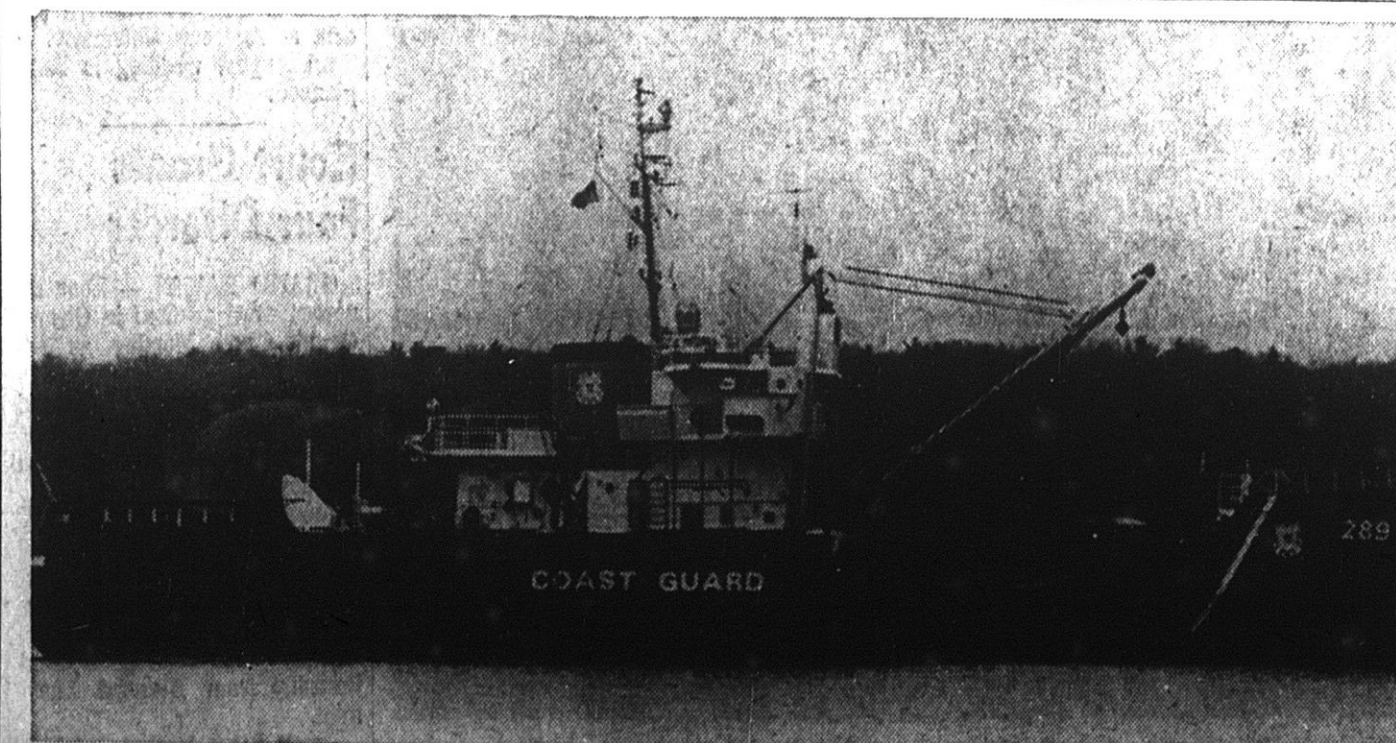

Business Index Shows Increase On Activity Level

ALLENDALE—The composite index of business activity for the Grand Valley area of Western Michigan (Kent, Ottawa, and Muskegon Counties) increased in February to 161.8 from its January level of 158.2, according to statistics released by Marvin G. DeVries and William A. Peterson of the Department of Economics and business at Grand Valley State College.

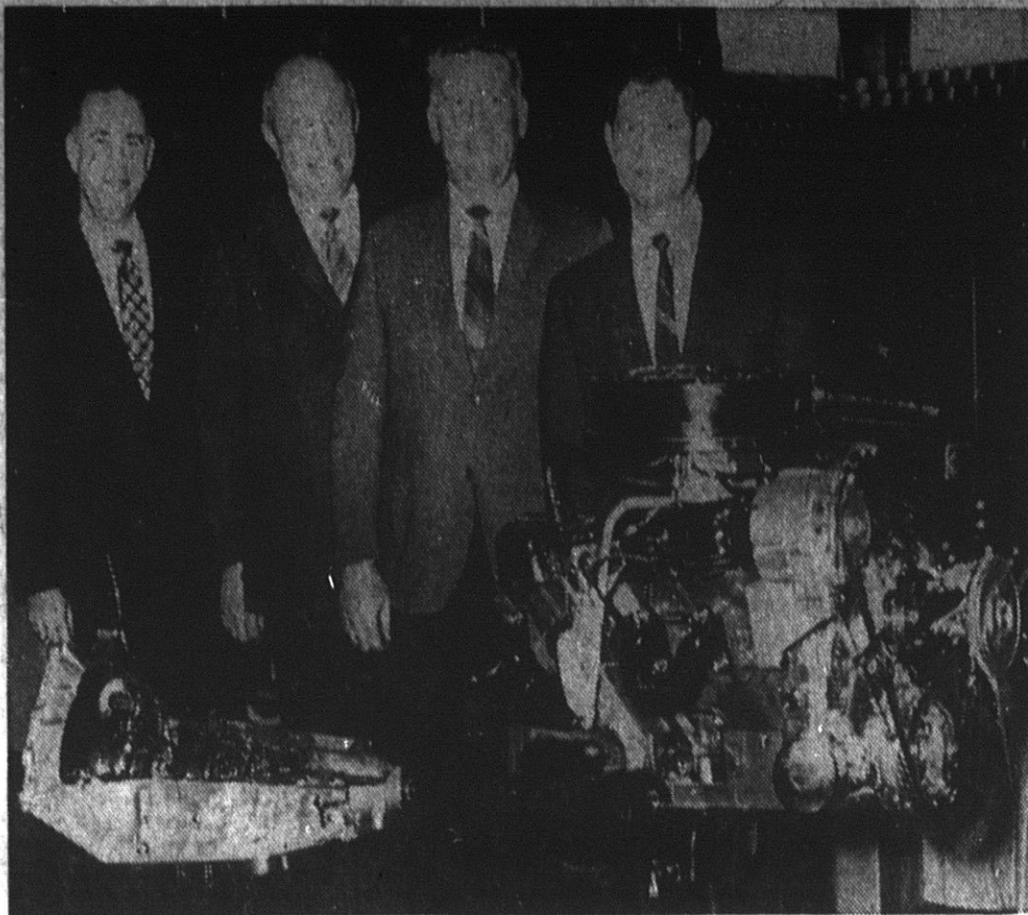
The 2.3 per cent increase in February follows a slight increase in January's value over December's and can be explained primarily by the significant increase in residential construction activity in this area.

Housing starts in February increased 27 per cent over the level of activity in January but are still below the level of

February 1969 by about 30 per cent. Since the housing construction statistics are seasonally adjusted we can conclude that the increase does not result from the time of the year but from economic factors such as high demand and easing conditions.

All the other components of out composite index (bank deposits, retail sales, non-residential construction, industrial power and employment) registered insignificant changes, therefore except for residential construction activity business activity generally is at a relative standstill.

All components of the index are seasonally adjusted, which means that movements are not affected by forces determined to be the result of calendar month features alone. The index also is deflated so the month features alone. The index is deflated so the monthly movements are not affected artificially by increases in the general price level.

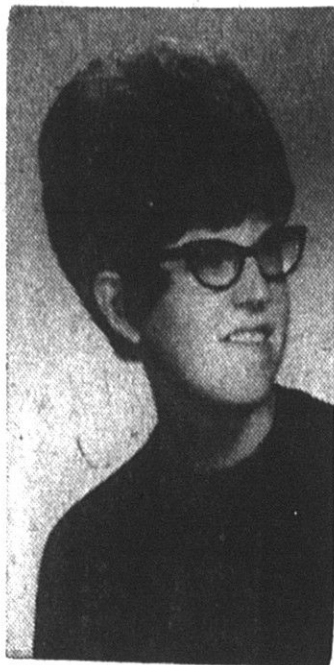

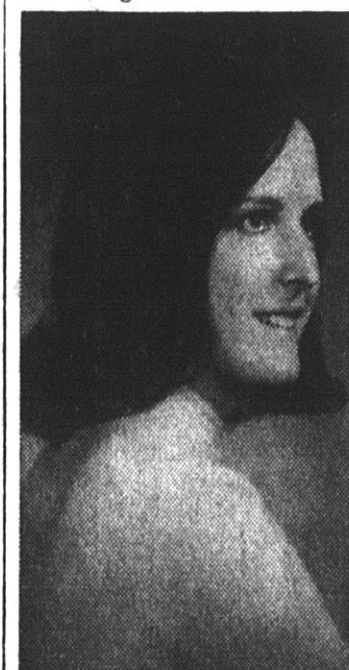

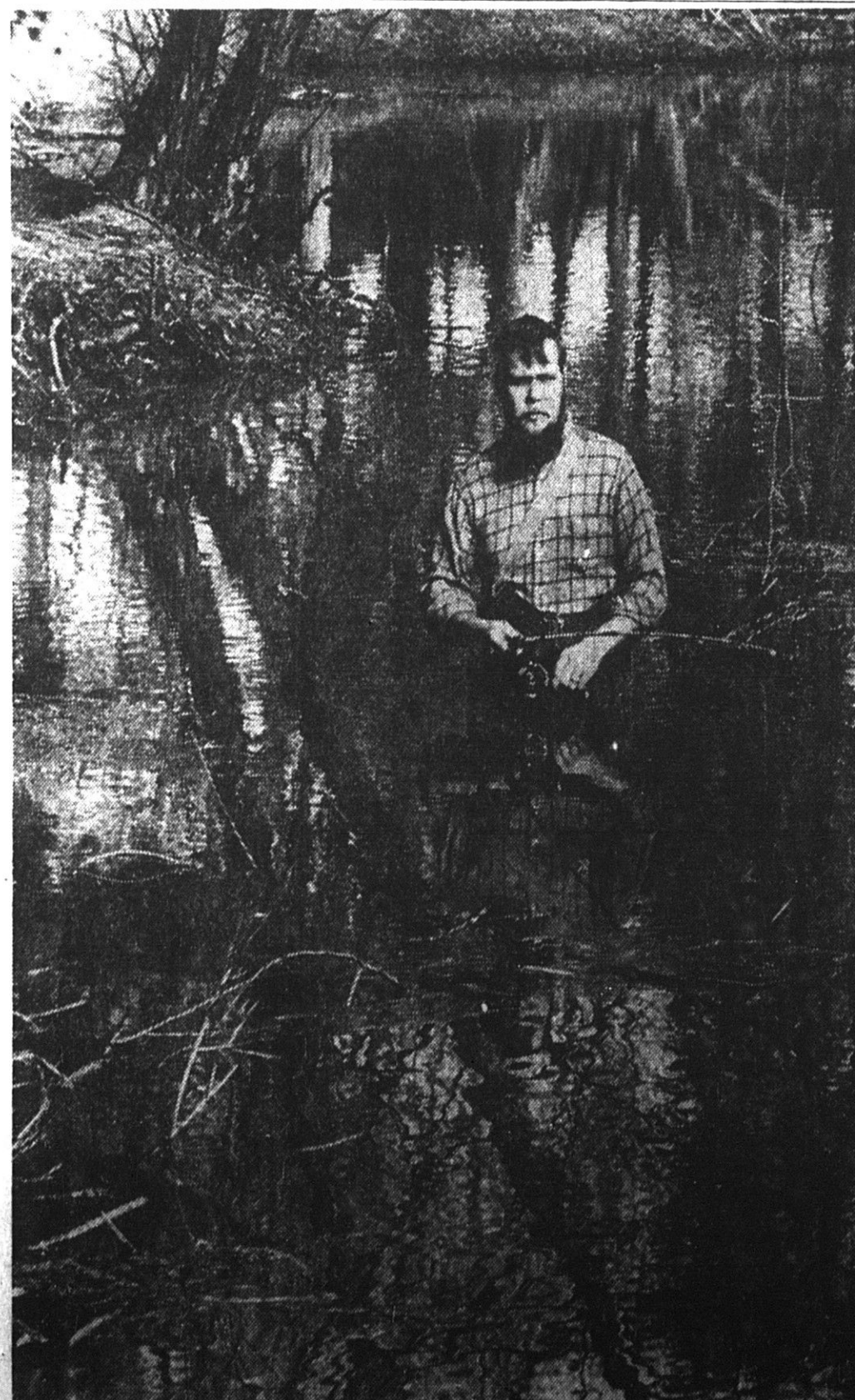

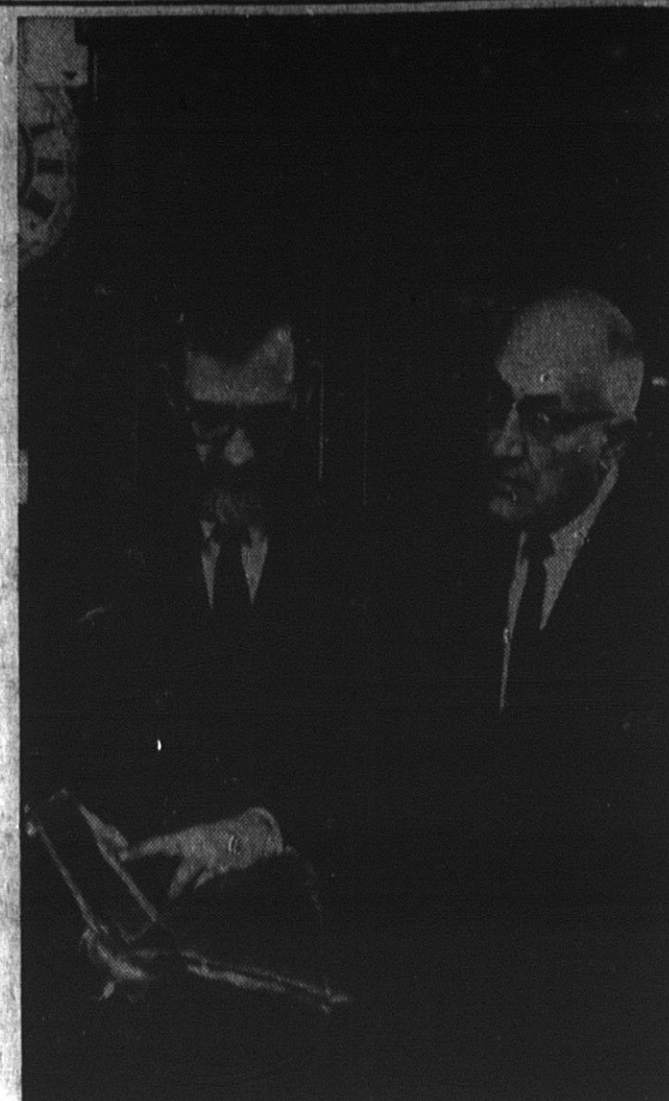
