## Flint Mayor Will Arrive Early Friday

Exchange Set to Allow Visit During Festival; Many Events Planned

Mayor Exchange Day in Holland coincides with Tulip Time this year.

Holland's visiting mayor, George R. Poulos of Flint, decided he would prefer to visit Holland during the Tulip Time festival instead of Mayor Exchange Day next Monday. Consequently, he and his party will arrive here Friday morning and spend Friday and Saturday in Holland.

This will give him the opportunity to greet Mayor Nelson Bos-

man and the Holland party in Flint next Monday, granting each the privilege of welcoming visitors in his own home town.

Mayor Poulos will be accompanied by Mrs. Poulos, by City Clerk Lloyd S. Hendon and Mrs. Hendon, and Police Sgt. Al Haley and Mrs. Haley. The Pouloses and Haleys will arrive in Holland at 10 a.m. Friday and will be greeted in Hotel Warm Friend by a local delegation. Clerk Hendon who is attending a city clerk's convention will arrive separately and will be met at Grand Rapids airport at 11:15 a.m. by Roger MacLeod and his young daughter dressed in Dutch costume.

The Flint party will be escorted about Holland on Friday by City Attorney Gordon Cunningham and Mrs. Cunningham, Mayor and Mrs. Bosman, Councilman and Mrs. Henry Steffens, Chamber of Commerce President and Mrs. Stuart Padnos and City Clerk and Mrs. Donald W. Schipper.

After greeting Mayor Poulos and his party at the hotel, plans call for a visit in City Hall where the men will cut a tape for both radio stations while the wives visit the flower show. After lunch at the hotel, the group will go to the new high school and witness klompen dancing in the oval at the entrance to the campus. A tour of Lake Macatawa and other local waters on a Chris-Craft cruiser is slated later in the afternoon, followed by an informal buffet in the Bosman home. That night, the Flint party will attend the Parade of Barbershop Quartets in Civic Center. The visitors will stay at Hotel Warm Friend.

Visitors will have Saturday morning free and in the afternoon will attend the Festival of Bands at Riverview Park and then view the Parade of Bands from the reviewing stand. Escorts on Saturday will be Roger Stroh, president of the Holland Jaycees, and Mrs. Stroh. On Mayor Exchange Day Monday, Mayor Bosman and Mrs. Bosman will go to Flint, accompanied by City Clerk and Mrs. Schipper and Councilman and Mrs. John Van Eerden.

Then the plane landed and John received a good-natured joshing. It was old stuff. He's chased dogs off runways before.

The housing bureau at the Tulip Time office in Civic Center is operated this year by Mrs. Henry Buursma and Mrs. Gary Kruihof who have processed many more requests for accommodations than in several years past. Some 20 bus groups have been placed by the bureau and many others have made their own arrangements since a good share of travel agencies have worked with Tulip Time tours for several years.

As usual, the greater number ask for hotels and motels. It is expected private homes will be in greater demand for the weekend.

In years past, special bus groups usually were for garden clubs or home economic groups, often from Indiana, Illinois and Ohio. This year, the bus groups had wider variety including athletic clubs, social groups and a growing number of senior citizen groups.

The housing bureau is fairly busy at Tulip Time headquarters these days to provide accommodations for visitors. On Wednesday night a Nevada couple stopped in a local drug store at 9 p.m. inquiring about a place to stay. The housing bureau had closed, but Tulip Time Manager Harold J. Karsten was in the office and knew where to locate Mrs. Henry Buursma of the staff.

In a "beyond the call of duty" service, Mrs. Buursma picked up the couple at the drug store and located a home where they could stay.

The Tulip Time office is remaining open until 9 p.m. tonight, and later on Friday and Saturday nights.

Earl F. Price, Civic Center manager and former Tulip Time manager, has one clump of tulips in his yard at 22 Cherry St. with 40-inch stems. This single clump had grown much taller than others planted nearby.

Persons driving the 1963 Oldsmobile convertibles about town these days are reminded they

must turn them in at the Civic Center parking lot by 5 p.m. Friday and turn in the keys at the Tulip Time office. The Oldsmobile people are checking all cars before the Parade of Bands Saturday.

Drivers may pick up the convertibles again at some time to be announced Saturday morning and then drive the convertibles carrying klompen dancers in the parade. The cars are to be returned to Civic Center immediately after the parade. A good share of them will go to Battle Creek from here.

Mitt Romney, exuberant youngest son of Gov. and Mrs. George Romney, did not accompany his parents to the Tulip Time festival Wednesday. Mitt had had the time of his life throwing water at the 1962 scrubbing ceremonies, splashing a good share of it on his father. This year, he's attending classes at Cranbrook.

Miss Lida Rogers, former Holland High biology teacher who suggested the idea of Tulip Time in 1927, was presented a bouquet of tulips Wednesday from Holland Tulip Time Inc.

Miss Rogers is presently staying at the Beacon Light Nursing Home in Marne. Last fall a bed of tulips, presented by Tulip Time Inc., were planted outside the nursing home and in full view from Miss Rogers' window.

Presentation of the bouquet was made in the bed of red and yellow tulips by Nancy Ann Vande Water, three-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Randall Vande Water of 384 West 31st St.

She is the granddaughter of William H. Vande Water, Executive Secretary of the Holland Chamber of Commerce, who took the tulips to Miss Rogers.

Holland police asked parents today to make sure their youngsters keep their water pistols at home, after they confiscated a number of squirt guns in Wednesday's opening activities. They said there were many complaints of the youthful marksmen annoying visitors with their water barrages, and some people complained that their cameras were getting wet and possibly damaged. Police said

that they will confiscate any squirt guns they see — and the guns will not be returned.

Estimates always differ on Tulip Time crowds, but Tulip Time leaders agreed Wednesday that the opening crowds were bigger than they have been in several years, probably up to 35,000.

Gov. George Romney Thursday sent a telegram to Holland High band director Arthur C. Hills, stating: "The state of Michigan is proud and happy to participate in honoring you as an outstanding musician and teacher. The musical service you have given to your students and community enriches the lives of all the people in our state. I wish for your continued success."

Hills' bands marched in the Tulip Time parade Wednesday and in the Blossom Festival parade in Benton Harbor Saturday. The governor witnessed both parades.

Hills has just accepted a new position to head the music department at the new Grand Valley State College near Allendale which opens next September.

## Mansfield Boy Dies Of Injuries

Charge Against Driver Of Car Is Changed To Negligent Homicide

Holland city's first traffic fatality for 1963 was recorded Friday with the death Thursday night of Gary A. Mansfield, 13, son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard D. Mansfield, of 116 West 32nd St.

The boy died in Butterworth Hospital in Grand Rapids as the result of injuries received when his bicycle was struck headon by a car at 8:25 p.m. Monday on 32nd St. not far from his home.

Later that night he was transferred to Grand Rapids but his condition remained critical. He had received severe head and abdominal injuries.

In Grand Haven today, Ottawa County Prosecutor James W. Bursard said the driver of the car,

Guadalupe Herrera Calvo, 32, of 1541 Harding St., Holland, would be charged with negligent homicide. Calvo previously had been charged with felonious driving, and was awaiting examination in Municipal Court May 15. Arrangements were being made to have him arraigned on the new charge.

Gary, a student at St. Francis De Sales School in Holland, was born with a heart defect, but dramatic surgery at Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit when he was seven years old made him a normally healthy boy. A heart murmur continued but he was able to do nearly everything he wanted.

His death marked the first fatality in Holland since an accident which occurred Sept. 19, 1962, at 15th St. and Van Raalte Ave. in Holland. Donald Hubbard, 69, Miami, Fla., was injured in the crash and spent nine weeks in Holland Hospital before being transferred to Coral Gables Veterans Hospital in Florida where he died Dec. 14, 1962.

The Mansfield boy is survived by his parents; two brothers, Richard D. Jr., and Craig at home; and two grandmothers, Mrs. John Smigel and Mrs. Crystal Mansfield, both of Grand Rapids. The Mansfield family moved to Holland from Grand Rapids four years ago.

## Mrs. Van Putten Succumbs at 81

Mrs. John Van Putten, 81, of 8 East 17th St., died Saturday afternoon at the Beacon Light Christian Rest Home in Marne, following a lingering illness. She was a member of the Prospect Park Christian Reformed Church and a member of its Ladies Aid.

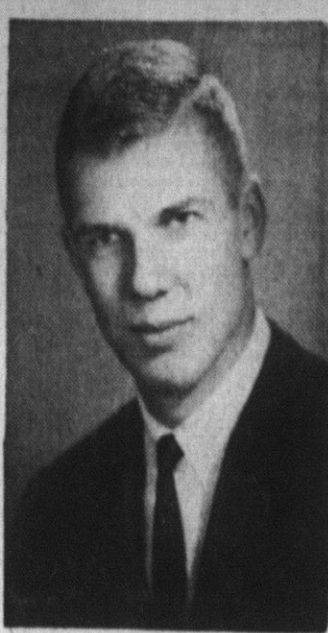

MARNE — Jack Wybenga, 19, Grand Rapids, was admitted to Butterworth Hospital in Grand Rapids Monday morning with injuries received when his car crashed into one driven by Beatrice Brackette, 52, Coopersville, on I-196 near Marne in Wright Township.

Sheriff's officers said Wybenga's attention had strayed as he looked at an exit sign and he swerved his car in an effort to avoid one ahead but hit the Brackette car in the left rear.

The impact caused the Wybenga car to roll over several times. Wybenga was admitted to the hospital with head bruises, arm injuries and a fractured finger on the left hand. The investigation is continued.

Certificates for outstanding service in the community and county were presented by former Mayor Glenn Eaton Jr. to Garbrecht, Hering, Ed Long, retired Soil Conservation Service employee and the directors of the Soil Conservation District.

The national administrator Donald A. Williams of Washington, D.C., was made an honorary citizen of the City of Grand Haven. The certificate was accepted by assistant administrator Norman A. Berg who represented Williams at the party.

Special guest was the State Soil Conservation Committee which included G. S. McIntyre, director of Michigan Department of Agriculture; Dr. T. K. ## Self Reliance Of Area Is Praised

Gov. Romney States Ottawa Sets Example For Entire State

"In Ottawa county one out of every five voters is a worker in the party, and it is this broad participation in politics that we're talking about when we mention a citizens party or a peoples party," Gov. George Romney told more than 700 persons gathered at a luncheon in Civic Center Wednesday noon.

"Of course, people elsewhere think we're talking about a third political party, but that is not the case. A political party exists only so that people may discharge their responsibilities in citizenship," the governor said.

The governor and Mrs. Romney who arrived at Park Township airport aboard a Twin Cessna 310 personally greeted nearly every person in the large crowd at Civic Center. The governor quickly learned a Dutch greeting and welcomed all the guests in Holland's native tongue which probably proved more foreign than native since few people in these parts speak Dutch.

And when Chamber of Commerce President Stuart Padnos presented the governor with a pair of custom-made wooden shoes, the governor told the big crowd he had trouble with a high instep and insisted on trying on the shoes immediately. He had already been informed that Wood Carver Fred Oldemulders (he hesitated over that Dutch name) had made the shoes.

When the governor said the shoes were a bit tight in one place, Fred appeared out of the stage wings in Dutch costume carrying a tool or two and carved out a few hollows on the pressure points. Photographers from the nearby press table leaped to the stage to photograph the operation, and the governor ended up with a pair of well fitted wooden shoes, far more comfortable than the standard variety he had worn last year.

Mrs. Romney also addressed the crowd, speaking generally on the fine example most parents in the area set in exercising some discipline and taking interest in what their children do. She quoted a state trooper who said when youngsters get into trouble in Ottawa county, the parents, the minister and often others immediately descend on the police station and try to work out some solution.

Gov. Romney also praised the self-reliance of the people in this community. He said, "The real significance of what you are doing here in facing your personal responsibilities in dealing with today's problems is setting an example for the entire state. There are a number of people in favor of unlimited governmental programs, taking away decisions from the people and putting everything into Washington. We must stop this increasing concentration of power in Washington and can do so only by forging a strong party opposed to over-subsidization in Washington."

The luncheon, sponsored by local Republicans, had political overtones. Ed Ellis, Ottawa County Republican chairman, said the gathering was a tribute to precinct workers and Gov. Romney acknowledged a great debt to the community beyond the organized effort. He said Michigan again was enjoying favorable publicity throughout the nation and pointed to a \$40 million surplus this year which would apply on the deficit. He admitted that Michigan still has many long range problems which cannot be solved overnight. He recommended a modern application of proven American principles.

Tom De Pree, serving as chairman, paid tribute to Mary McLean, an active party worker who died unexpectedly the previous afternoon.

The simple menu, designed so that anybody who wanted to could have lunch with the governor for \$1, featured Hero sandwiches, also known as submarine sandwiches, made of a variety of cold

## 35,000 See Scrubbers Opening Day

Gov. Romney, Wife Join In Scrubbing Streets; Large Crowds Seen

Sunny and beautiful spring weather greeted Holland on the second day of the 1963 Tulip Time festival today, setting just the right stage for the big Children's Parade at 2:30 p.m., long regarded as one of the most appealing spectacles of Holland's world-famous festival.

Today was turned over to the youngsters and some 5,000 of them donned costumes, uniforms and other outfits to march in their own parade. Don Rohlick, the schools' representative on the Tulip Time board of directors, is grand marshal.

With temperatures in the 60's, it was a well high perfect day for the youthful marchers, certainly far better than the 90-degree heat wave which hit all four days of the 1962 festival.

Wednesday's festival opening, which attracted 35,000, was an auspicious occasion, one again honored by the presence of Michigan's governor, Gov. and Mrs. George Romney arrived at Park Township airport at 11:37 p.m. aboard a Twin Cessna 310 and after a brief talk before a crowd of some 200 persons, the Romneys were taken in an official car to Civic Center for lunch with more than 700 persons present.

The National Guard provided an honor guard at the airport and the West Ottawa Senior High School band provided music under the direction of Calvin Langejans.

After the luncheon, the Romneys donned Dutch costumes and wooden shoes and participated in the scrubbing ceremonies.

Events started promptly with Mayor Nelson Bosman and City Council leaving City Hall at 2:30 p.m. for their annual inspection of the streets. Headed by Town Crier Hans Suzenaar who alerted the populace to the official coming, the mayor as usual found the streets dirty and ordered the burghers to scrub them.

Scrubbing ceremonies are always informal with certain touches of byplay and some water throwing, the latter usually geared to the temperatures of the day. Wednesday's mercury reached 60 degrees during the ceremonies and there was considerably less water play than last year when it was 90.

After the scrubbing, came the folk parade of 12 bands, 13 floats and lots of interesting features. At the close came the famed klompen dancers, 312 strong, who took assigned places on the parade route and performed their celebrated dance.

For the first time, Holland High School band wore wooden shoes, following an example of the Junior High Band which inaugurated this feature several years ago. A new entry this year was the Hamilton High School band, wearing snappy new black and white uniforms. The West Ottawa High School band marched in a "W" formation.

Among the floats were those entered by the Chamber of Commerce, AFL-CIO, Camp Fire, drug stores, downtown merchants, Enchanted Valley, realtors, Christian schools, Dutch twins, South Haven Peach festival, the wooden shoe carver, Hope College, and the plumbers' float drawn by Bert Reimink's steam engine.

Tonight's attractions are a concert by the Hope College Symphony Orchestra in Dimmen Memorial Chapel at 8:15 p.m., and a travelogue on "Water Wonderland" and "Beyond the Mighty Mac" at 8:15 p.m. in Civic Center.

Although not listed as a Tulip Time attractions, drama enthusiasts may attend the opening of "Caligula" tonight at 8 p.m. in Snow auditorium on Hope College campus. The Roman drama is directed by Dave Karsten, son of Tulip Time Director Harold J. Karsten.

## Local PTA Wants New Millage Vote

A communication from the Washington School PTA asking that the Board of Education call another election to increase operating millage at the earliest possible time was read at the monthly meeting of the Board of Education Monday night.

The communication pointed out that the Washington ward was the only one to vote a majority in the last election and was one of the few to favor the previous election. It said it would welcome another opportunity to vote, indicating its willingness to help promote such an election.

The board secretary was instructed to inform the PTA that another vote could not be arranged in time for additional millage to be on the summer tax bills. President Bernard Arendshorst expressed appreciation for the fine work the PTA had done and said the newly organized board following the June election likely would give further consideration to financial problems now confronting the schools.

The board granted several releases of contracts to teachers for a variety of reasons. Previously announced was the news that Arthur C. Hills, head of the music department for 14 years, is leaving to head the music department at the new Grand Valley State College near Allendale which will open in September.

Fred Weiss requested a release of contract since he is moving to Arizona for reasons of health. It was pointed out such a move has been under consideration for several years. Russel Welch, principal at Lincoln School, informed the board he was retiring at the close of the present year. He had taught in local schools for some 40 years.

Mrs. A. W. Williams who has been teaching in Van Raalte School is moving to Nebraska where her husband will teach in Nebraska State College. Joy Muehlenbeck of Lincoln School requested release in order to accept a position with West Ottawa Schools. According to policy, such a release is contingent on finding a satisfactory substitute to take her place. Vern Schipper informed the board he is leaving the school system to take a position with private business, a textbook company.

Ties J. Pruis, principal at Montello School, indicated his willingness to continue as a teaching principal in view of the fact that enrollment in his school was lower than in most others.

A letter from Raymond Kootstra of Federal district requesting answers to two questions was answered in the affirmative. The questions involved Board of Education policy in the event the district does not annex to West Ottawa school district. The board answered it will be willing to take Federal high school students and other Federal students as they reach high school grades.

The Board of Education will have two representatives present at a meeting in Maplewood School to night called for the purpose of discussing questions and answers in connection with a special election May 22 to annex to Holland district.

Secretary Harry Frissel announced four candidates had filed petitions for the two positions on the board at the June 10 election. This election will be staged in one polling place, Junior High School, and will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Four voting machines, the only four not tied up in the Constitutional election recount, will be available on that date.

Supt. Scott explained that using one polling place and one staff of workers would probably cost the board \$300 to \$400, whereas operating all the precincts in the city for that length of time would cost from \$1,200 to \$1,400.

The board voted to accept high bid of \$4,000 for the school owned property at 340 Pine Ave., formerly used as an administration office. On second advertising, this bid was entered by Melvin Dalman.

Secretary Frissel reported notice of \$87,482 in state aid representing 16.6 per cent of the total earmarked for the year.

The board approved hiring two new teachers, Mrs. Thelma Leenhouts of Holland to teach early elementary at Washington school, and Mrs. Ruth Vireling of El Paso, Tex., to teach social studies in the high school. Both are married and have four children. Both are graduates of Hope College and each has had three years' teaching experience.

Myron Van Ark and Paul Klompars of the faculty were approved as driver education teachers for the coming summer. Several candidates had been reviewed.

## \$42 Taken in Breakin During Past Weekend

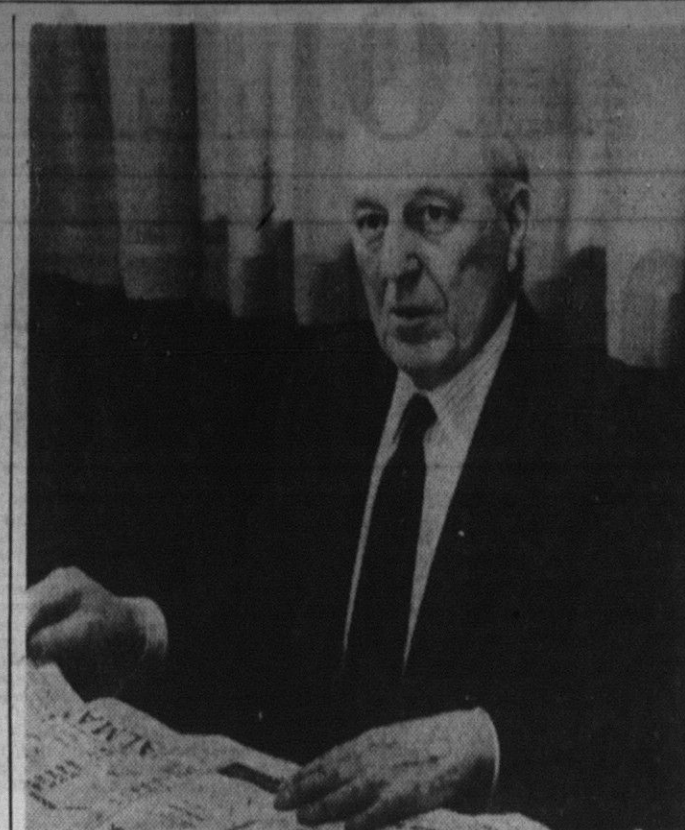

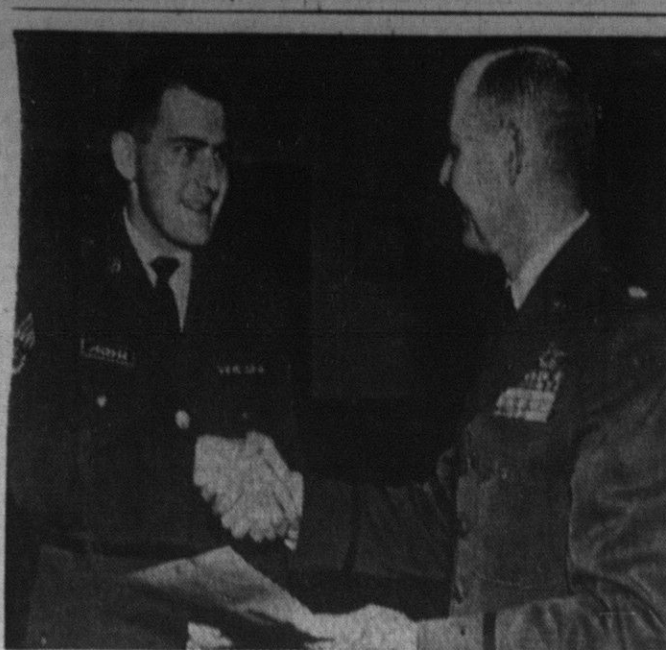

Hope College has been awarded two grants totaling \$21,500 by the United States Steel Foundation, it was announced today by Roger M. Blough, Board Chairman of United States Steel, Inc.

The grants are part of a \$2,400,000 program of aid to education for 766 liberal arts colleges, universities, and institutes, and to 26 organizations dedicated to raising the quality of teaching and learning in America.

Hope College was chosen to receive grants in the first two categories, an operating grant in the amount of \$1,500, and a major purpose or capital grant totaling \$20,000 which will be designated for the construction of the Physics-Mathematics Building.

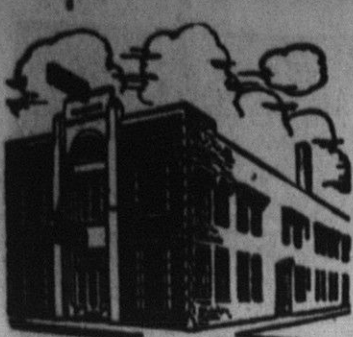

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, May 19  
Deliverance in Trouble  
Psalm 91:1-6, 9-16  
By C. F. Dame

Only God knows how many people have been fortified by the reading of Psalm 91. Most people at some time or other feel the need of divine help and assurance for troubles and trials come to all.

God's people meet difficulties and hardships as well as the godless. The purpose of Psalm 91 is to give courage to people in times of need.

I. God has a people.  
Some people dwell "in the secret place of the most High" and some do not. Believers "abide under the shadow of the Almighty." To the believer God is a shelter, a hiding place, a shadow, shade from the hot sun, a place of refuge, a fortress, giving protection.

The words "dwell" and "abide" speak of permanency. A lot of people call upon God when they are in trouble. To them God is what a spare tire is in a car. When they are in a tight situation they pray.

The true believer lives in constant fellowship with God, ever in touch with Him.

The Psalmist was conscious of a personal relationship to God and therefore he said, "in Him will I trust"—not occasionally but all the time, in dark and in sunny days.

They who do that show they belong to God's people.

II. Faith drives fear away.  
Troubles come to all people—the godly and the godless. The Psalmist, in the language of his times, mentions the woes of life.

Some of life's troubles come about through self-seeking, power-mad men, others are due to natural causes such as plagues, pestilence, cyclones, floods and earthquakes and some we bring upon ourselves.

What we sow, we reap—this law operates in the lives of the religious and irreligious. People who make problems will face problems. Sin has consequences.

What about the promises of safety and deliverance found in the Psalm? Sometimes the worst things happen to the best people.

Stephen died and Paul suffered and many Christians have a rough time of it, but they kept on trusting God. At times God does give deliverance and performs miracles—sometimes openly, at other times behind the scenes.

God has often saved His people from troubles they did not know they were threatening them. Belief in a God who is in control helps much and gives confidence.

III. God keeps His promises.  
He has the power to do so. The keeping power of God is a reality. The power of God is greater than all the forces of evil. Believers know this and besides, they are also sure of God's love.

Just as parents respond to the calls and needs of their children, so likewise God is ready to minister to His children when their needs are the greatest. The believer does not face the troubles of life alone—God is with him and keeps him and prepares him for eternal salvation.

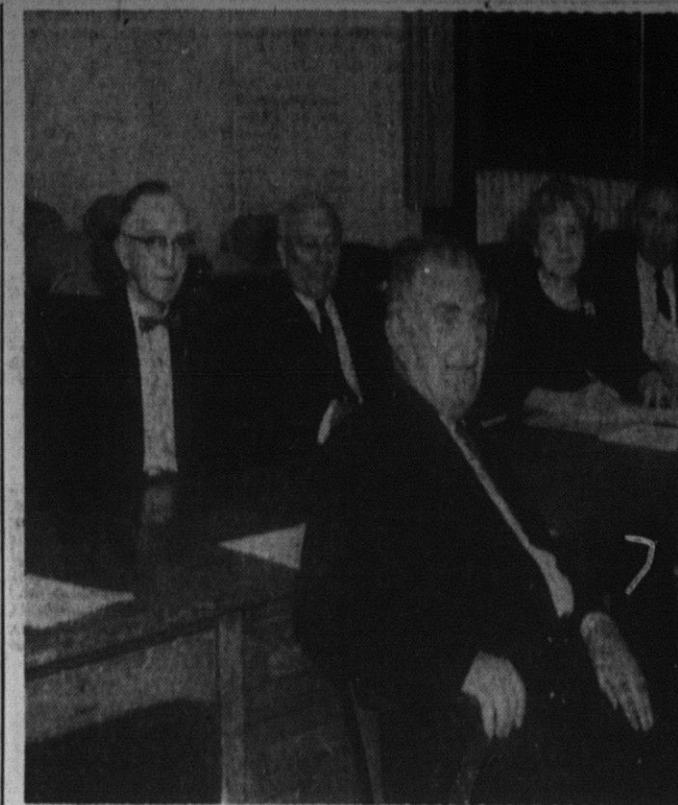

Title to the property is held by the foundation which leases it to the Muskegon Area Guidance Association for \$1 a year. The local center is operated by the Muskegon agency.

Michigan's open door policy for children is not merely an eye catcher, but a meaningful title which describes in every sense the Michigan Department of Mental Health's program for the early treatment of emotional problems of children. These early problems, if allowed to become deeply entrenched, can take all the joy out of childhood and carry over into adulthood to repeat and display the maladjustment cycle in poor parenthood, in unhappy employer and employee relationships and in bad citizenship.

More than 20 years ago the first child guidance clinics, operated on a shared financial and administrative basis between state and community, were opened in 1942 in Kalamazoo, Muskegon and Saginaw. The program has now grown to include 18 child guidance clinics with 12 branches, seven adult clinics and 2 all-purpose mental health clinics.

The Holland Guidance Clinic is one of two branches served in Ottawa County from the parent clinic in Muskegon. The other Ottawa County branch is located in Grand Haven to serve the population living above M-50. The Muskegon clinic now serves 5 counties, Muskegon, Ottawa, Newaygo, Oceana and Lake.

The Holland Branch was established on Feb. 2, 1955, and for three years was located in one room loaned by the Ottawa County Health Department. For the past five years, due to the generosity of Mrs. Kenneth Campbell and the Greater Holland Community Foundation, the children and their parents have enjoyed the attractive, quiet, home-like atmosphere of the building at 363 Van Raalte Ave.

What is a Child Guidance Clinic? It is a clinic that provides Diagnostic Treatment and Consultation Services for all of the psychiatric problems of childhood. The service is provided to both the parents and the child with the child kept always as the center of focus. The program includes: the alleviation and prevention of mental disorders; early treatment of childhood problems such as home, school and community maladjustment; interpretation and mental health education for parents, teachers and other agencies and persons working with children.

The methods used include: (1) direct therapeutic and history-taking interviews with children and parents; (2) cooperation with other agencies which need to understand the problems of children with whom they work in courts, adoptions, boarding placements, etc.; (3) providing active diagnosis and treatment for each child; (4) making referrals to other sources for the most appropriate treatment when the child needs more than the clinic can provide through outpatient treatment.

Who is eligible for the service? Any child from birth to age 18, with parental consent, may be referred for service. No fees are charged for the service.

What are the problems seen by the referring parents?

Habit Disorders — (bedwetting, thumb-sucking, stuttering, tics, blinking, grinning, body contortions, etc.) (Here the child is telling us through a habit what he cannot express verbally or even bring to consciousness, concerning his particular unhappiness.)

Conduct Disorder — (temper tantrums, feeding problems, destructiveness, antisocial acts, cruelty, rebellion against authority, sexual precocity, etc.) (Here the angry child is paying back, or trying to get even with a world he feels has treated him unjustly. Or, he may be a product of a sub-culture in which this behavior is considered normal.)

Personality Problems — (shyness, withdrawal, fears of normal

activities, phobias of any kind, loss of memory, etc.) (These children are burying all of their problems to the extent that the personality becomes distorted and unable to function in normal ways.)

Functional Illness — (body illness like headaches, stomach aches, skin disorders, allergies, loss of body functions, for which the family physician, who is requested to send a report on each child before he is seen at the clinic, can find no organic cause.) (It is respectable to be physically ill so this is a way of expressing trouble that every human uses to some extent. However, if allowed to persist, nature takes her toll in precipitating genuine illness, real pain and hypochondria.)

Intellectual Limitations — (intellectual retardation, dullness, or brain damage are evaluated and recommendations are made for proper school or institutional placement.)

The clinic frequently consults with many other people, with the parents' consent, to gain a better understanding of the child. These might be doctors, nurses, ministers, educators, court personnel, etc.

Who does the work in a Child Guidance Clinic? The basic team represents three disciplines, the Psychiatrist, the Psychiatric Social Worker and the Clinical Psychologist. Each must have at least a master's degree in his specialty so that the combined professional skills can be utilized to understand the whole child, mentally, physically, socially, emotionally and psychiatrically.

Each year the case load in the Ottawa County branch clinics has grown and now we are serving upwards of 350 children and their families each year. This represents about 35 per cent of the total service in the five county area.

The sources of referral are roughly as follows: schools 30 per cent, parents 21 per cent, courts 19 per cent, family physicians 18 per cent, social agencies 9 per cent, clergy 1 per cent and others 2 per cent. We are pleased in Ottawa County to know that we have acceptance not only from the public school but from all of our parochial schools. This has been an earned acceptance as they have tested the service and found it to be trustworthy and helpful to the child.

Each member of the staff is also called upon for educational activities through speeches made to church organizations, PTA groups, professional groups, students in colleges and high schools and radio broadcasts.

It might be emphasized that the primary focus of the entire program is the prevention of adult disturbances and mental disorders. No one becomes disturbed or mentally ill overnight. We learn, within the constellations of our own families how to handle inevitable frustrations, stress and trouble. We are to that extent what our parents make of us, and they in turn are products of the grand-parents' training. We are not all born equal in body, in mind and in psyche. For that reason parents as well as children need to acquire the tools of maturation leading to self respect, tolerance of others and ability to evaluate themselves honestly. This is the goal of child guidance services.

In a study recently completed we discovered what we already knew. We do not know all the answers! We are not always successful. But, we do succeed in about 85 per cent of the cases treated. The future looks hopeful, now that the new medicines have become available for the seriously ill. We are happy that we can work at a preventive level with the children of



## HHS Seniors Plan Own Graduation

Plans for Baccalaureate services and commencement exercises for this year's graduating class of Holland High School were outlined by Supt. Walter W. Scott following a meeting of the Board of Education Monday night.

On request of the graduates, the commencement exercises will be "different" this year with no "big shot" speakers, just a homey arrangement in which a parent, a teacher and a student will give short talks.

For the parent, the committee has selected Dr. D. Ivan Dykstra of Hope College. For teacher, the unanimous choice was Mrs. Edward Donovan, school librarian, who has sparked students to action on other notable occasions, mainly the opening of the new high school more than a year ago. For students, Senior Elaine Yamaoka was selected.

Both ceremonies will be held in the high school fieldhouse, the baccalaureate service at 4 p.m. Sunday, June 2, and commencement at 8 p.m. Thursday, June 6.

Dr. Elton Eeningburg of Western Theological Seminary will be baccalaureate speaker. At the board meeting, Supt. Scott in his administrative report took note of the hundreds of visitors so far this year to the new high school campus and a vast amount of publicity on the new school and its new curriculum.

One of the latest was a page-one story in the Christian Science Monitor citing savings up to \$100,000 on the school's vending program. The November issue of Nations Schools devoted 14 or 15 pages to Holland's new school. The May issue of School Management also carries a story on vending services, and the Trade Journal of the vending trade is preparing a story on food services.

Eastman Kodak Co. some months ago issued a brochure devoting considerable space to functions at Holland High. Catholic Market has carried an insert on a coin-operated lunch hour. Industrial Arts and Vocational Education Journal carried a story on the new HHS machine shop. School Musician in its October issue carried a story written by Arthur C. Hills which also appeared in another national music magazine.

All in all, Scott said hundreds of persons have visited the new school in recent months, sending an avalanche of mail. He said visits and complimentary comment has become so commonplace that little notice often is given, but he felt some collective mention should be made at the end of the year.

On request of the National Honor Society of the high school, the board granted permission to carry on paperback book sales to encourage development of home libraries of good literature. The program has been under study for some months and probably will start toward the end of this semester as a Book Fair in the school library.

Member Wendell Miles looked forward to the day when the book program would branch into a similar program to promote fine classical music, replacing a type of music popular among teenagers which he said was not easy to explain or understand, much less encourage.

A letter from Henry S. Maenz of Holland enclosing a copy of a Detroit newspaper article encouraging a school year of four quarters resulted in considerable discussion. Supt. Scott said the board has studied and discussed the advantages and disadvantages of such a program for several years, and that High School Principal Jay Formosa, principals and teachers have worked on possibilities of a summer program for a long time. He said the greatest deterrent at present is Michigan law which provides state aid only if students are enrolled on the fourth Friday of September.

Further study among faculty members, the professional problems committee, MEA groups and others was encouraged in the general belief that the four-quarter school year has real merit. President Bernard Arendshorst presided at the meeting which lasted just over 1½ hours. All members were present with the exception of Harvey Buter. Wendell A. Miles gave the invocation.

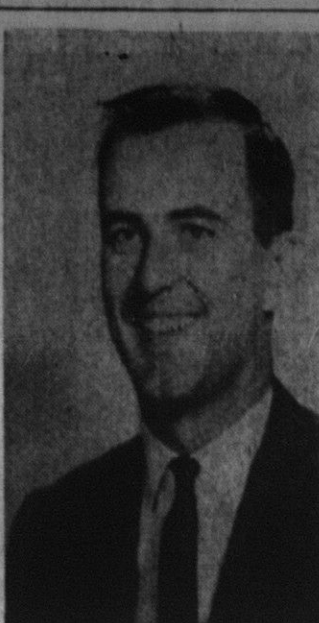

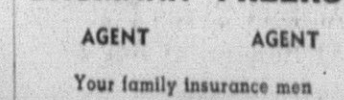

## Ottawa County 4-H News

A committee of leaders met recently and discussed details of the horse project and the type of program that should be carried on in 1963. Many of the things that we discussed and suggested were acted upon and we are going to attempt to put into the 4-H program this year. We hope to have a clinic on the 4-H horse project in June, which will feature various things about conformation of horses; way of grooming of horses; manners; horsemanship; and how the judge will evaluate these phases of the program. We hope also that we can include some of the things a 4-H member will do to have a better program for his horse. Then as we go around to the three fairs, we are attempting to get the same judge for all the fairs; we will be using the same announcer and the same ring master in all the events; so all events will be an equal educational experience for the 4-H members. Details of these various things will be available to the 4-H leaders and members may contact their leaders around the first of June.

The regular meeting of the summer leaders will be held May 14 at the Allendale Townhall. This meeting is being called in the interest of leaders, to explain activities, events and dates in connection with the summer program. The livestock division will be under the direction of Mr. Richard Machiele, Extension County Director. Dates will be discussed as to judging tours, selection, fitting, and other things pertaining to the dairy program, along with beef, sheep and other livestock projects. Mrs. Grace Vander Kolk, the County Home Agent, will be in charge of the projects pertaining to home economics, such as foods, canning, freezing, etc. She will answer questions and find out from the leaders what events and activities should be sponsored during the summer. There will also be a session held for the general projects not included in the above categories, which will be for discussion and questions and answers.

A group of leaders and members met last Saturday, May 4 and put up the 20 x 20 shelter house on the Ten Brink property. There will be more work done on this and we hope to have this property in operation for a tent camping program by the first of June. Our sincere thanks to all of those who helped in the building program. Details of the property availability will be announced at a later date.

Ottawa County has scheduled four weeks of camp. The first one will start June 10, the second week on June 17, the third week on June 24, and the fourth week on July 8. Camp enrollments have been mailed out to 4-H leaders and should be returned to our office in the Courthouse in Grand Haven as soon as possible. 4-H members will be accepted for camp on a "first-come, first-serve basis." We anticipate having 100 boys and girls attending each of the four weeks of camp.

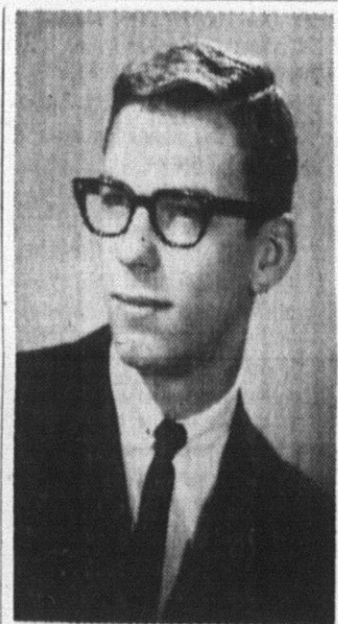
