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Award Hope \$2 Million Building Loan

Approval of \$2,026,000 loan toward the construction of a new science building at Hope College was reported today by Sen. Philip A. Hart in a telegram to Hope President C. A. Vander Werf.

The loan was made possible through the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963.

Approval of the loan, coupled with a \$1-million grant by the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, is bringing the start of construction on the \$4-million science hall closer to reality.

Construction will begin when blueprints are approved by the Board of Trustees and necessary permits are received.

The science building will house the departments of chemistry, biology and the new geology department. It will replace the present science building which was constructed in 1941.

The present building will be used as a classroom facility for other departments.

The new science hall is tentatively slated to be located at 12th St. and College Ave. The building will permit an extension of the campus into the sector now occupied by the Physics-Mathematics Building and the Van Zoeren Library.

Tulip Time Featured In Two Magazines

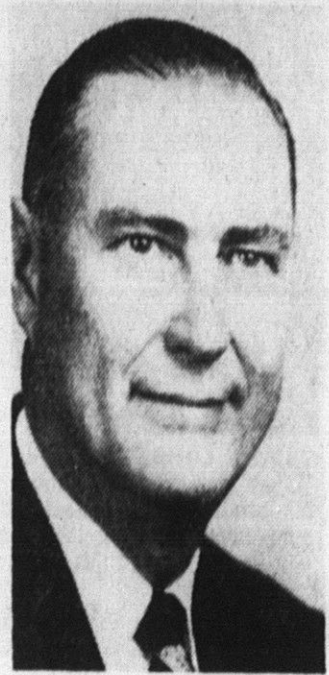
Holland's Tulip Time is featured in two magazines this week.

Board Okays Nine School Teachers

Contracts for three elementary and six secondary teachers were approved by the Board of Education at its monthly meeting at 4 p.m. Monday in the conference room of the administration building. The meeting was called early so that board members could attend the spring banquet of the Holland Educational Association Monday evening.

New elementary teachers will be Mrs. Joyce Bolhuis of Holland, a 1963 graduate of Hope College who has been teaching in Hudsonville; Miss Marla Hooker, a 1966 graduate of Western Michigan University, and Mrs. Lois Gaiowski of Holland, speech therapist who previously served as a speech therapist in public schools. Mrs. Gaiowski left the teaching staff two years ago for graduate study and now is fully accredited.

Secondary teachers will be Mrs. Velma Benes, a 1964 graduate of Central College in Pella, Ia.; Mrs. Jeanette Frisell, a 1942 graduate of Hope College who will teach in Junior High; Daniel Lee Godwin, a 1967 graduate of Western Michigan University, who will teach vocational education in the high school.

Other secondary teachers will be Weyman Helton, a 1960 graduate of the University of Tennessee who will teach social studies at Junior High; Jacquelyn Nyboer, a 1967 graduate of Hope College who will succeed Barbara Ambellas in physical education and Miss Ann Seif of Holland, a 1967 graduate of Michigan State University who will teach English and journalism in the high school.

The board also adopted a recommendation of Supt. Donald L. Irmann to employ a conservation education coordinator to teach half days in the junior high science department and to serve as coordinator for public, private and parochial school children, and to develop a program of conservation leading to a federal grant.

Supt. Irmann also announced that the high school has received accreditation for another year by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

Board President James O. Lamb announced negotiations were continuing and that progress was being made. He said one of the greatest difficulties was the inability to determine at this time what the Michigan tax situation would be.

The treasurer's report revealed receipt of an anonymous gift of \$40,000 for the community swimming pool. This offer had been made last fall.

A progress report on new construction revealed that demolition work of the old building at Van Raalte school is complete with the exception of minor cleanup work and construction of remaining rooms will start shortly.

At Longfellow, the major portion of work is complete and all classroom areas are now occupied by students and teachers. Demolition of the old building has started, and the major portion of the roof structure, windows, etc., has been removed.

At Maplewood school, painting in all areas is approximately complete with the exception of millwork in kindergarten, library and office areas. The terrazzo contractor is working on final polishing of floors. Heating and plumbing work is complete with the exception of some plumbing fixtures and the piping of water in boiler rooms. Sidewalk has been laid around the rear and two sides of the building. The front walk will be completed next week. Work has started on installing the gym floor.

At the swimming pool, rough concrete work for diving well and main pool walls are now complete. The general contractor is working on footings for walls in the northwest corner of the building. Masons are working on the south building wall and on foundations walls. All underground mechanical and electrical work is complete in lobby and locker room area.

The meeting lasted 40 minutes. Dale Mossburg was absent. Harvey Buter gave the invocation.

Allegan Will Study Plans For Investing

ALLEGAN — Allegan's city council met in special session Monday night to discuss possible methods of investing proceeds from the city light plant sale. City Manager Kenneth Bollinger and city attorney E. L. Andrews also attended the meeting.

At a special election last Jan. 18 a charter-required three-fifths majority of Allegan residents approved sale of the municipal power plant to Consumers Power Company for 1 million 750,000 dollars.

Consumers attorneys have since been involved with legalities preliminary to finalizing the sale and turning the proceeds over to the city.

City attorney Andrews proposed Monday that an election be held to amend the city charter so that a trust could be established by the people of Allegan to be administered by a corporate trustee, the interest to be deposited in the city's general fund.

In addition, Andrews suggested that the amount realized from sale of the street lighting facility be withheld and placed in the general fund.

Because of time and work involved in preparation for an election and wording of a charter amendment plus the probability of the sale to Consumers being completed within the next 60 days, council decided the sale money should be invested at first in certificates of deposit.

Bollinger was instructed to contact four different area banks to obtain information on interest rates they would pay for all or a part of the certificates over a period of a year or less.

The city manager's proposed general fund budget for 1967-68 was also discussed at Monday's meeting. Several changes were made in the budget and a committee appointed to report to the council later on possible wage and salary adjustments before final presentation of the budget. Appointed to serve by Mayor James Ralfe were T. E. Malila, C. J. Smith and Donald Forster.

Unique Little Dragster Provides Many Thrills

Take a 327 cubic-inch Chevrolet engine, a 1937 Ford suspension and a 1957 Chevrolet rear end, cover it all up with a pint-sized Anglia (English Ford) body, and you have yourself a Class B-Altered drag racer similar to one built by two Holland brothers, Ron and Butch Paris of 287 Hayes Ave.

The two brothers spent about nine months building their unique little dragster, which they value at more than \$4,000, and they aren't finished yet. According to Butch, work on a dragster is never finished. The brothers will work continually on the little car in an effort to trim fractions of seconds off the car's times.

They have won one trophy in two outings so far this year in a time of 12.18 seconds for the quarter-mile at the Martin Dragway. This, they admit, is not exceptionally fast for the B-Altered class. The record for the class is about 10.4 seconds for the quarter-mile.

But, by constantly working and re-working the car's engine, the brothers hope to boost the horsepower from its present 400 to somewhere near 600 horsepower.

The engine of the little dragster is located amidships and the driver sits strapped in the back seat.

The engine, which has no cooling system, turns upwards of 6,000 rpm's during a drag race. The brothers hope that by reworking the engine they can eventually boost this up to about 8,000 rpm's.

Before a race, the engine is warmed up before the car is brought to the starting lights. It is then shut off and turned on again only when the car is ready to begin racing.

Since a drag race lasts only about 12 seconds, and the engine is turned off immediately after a quarter-mile, overheating is not a real problem.

The car has been painted with a white vinyl paint, which adds to its unusual looks, and has deep blue glass in all windows.

Dubbed "Li'l Home Wrecker," the car offers a real challenge to the brothers in their periodic races against the clock. It is also a real challenge to the person who's driving it—a quarter-mile of driving the little car and you feel like you've had enough, the brothers said.

Ottawa County Farm News

For those who are interested in putting up Haylage we suggest reading the following articles in future issues of the Michigan Farmer: May 6 issue—Hay and Haylage Quality Improvement; Prepare for Haymaking—Robert White, Ag. Engineering; Harvesting and Storage Losses and Investments—R. Hoglund, Ag. Engineer.

May 20 issue: Harvest Early for Top Quality Hay or Haylage—Tal Huber and Don Hillman; Haylage "Absolutes" for Top Quality—Don Hillman; Moisture Check for Haylage or Silage—S.T. Dexter, Crop Science; May 20 (issue of Farm Journal); "Six Ways to Spoil Haylage".

In 122 of 161 experiments in Michigan, a corn population of about 16,000 plants an acre yielded 15 per cent more corn than 12,000 plants an acre. Populations of 20,000 plants had higher yield in 27 of the 135 comparisons but the average increase was only three per cent above 16,000 population.

Farmers who plan to step up the plant population in corn this year should be certain that they are setting their planter right. MSU extension Bulletin 436, gives a complete easy-to-read table that will help farmers determine the rate of planting.

While plant population can be too low it can also be too high. This will result in lower yields when moisture is a limiting factor. Farmers must also remember that fertilizer needs are increased by higher plant population and lodging frequently increases which could make higher harvest losses.

Corn growers will find three Michigan corn production publications—Extension Bulletins 436, 439, and 440 helpful in cultural practices, insect control and weed control.

"Potato Production in Michigan" is a new publication of interest to potato farmers and others considering going into potato production in Michigan.

This publication gives some general ideas regarding soil requirements, recommended seed varieties, preparation of the soil and the seed, planting and fertilizing, disease and insect control, harvesting and storage.

Many farmers are making the transition from small acreage to large-scale, specialized potato production. Potato yields are increasing rapidly due to new technology and specialization.

This publication, Extension Bulletin 46, is available at the County Extension Office in Holland on the corner of James and US 31, or in Grand Haven in the County Building.

Christmas Tree Insect Control Bulletin 353 has been revised. Included in this revision is a discussion on the pine shoot borer, Thrips, mites as well as other Christmas tree problems.

Bulletin 525, "Growing Black Walnuts for Home Use" includes information about Varieties, planting sites, fertilizer requirements, harvesting and susceptible diseases. These publications may be obtained by calling either office.

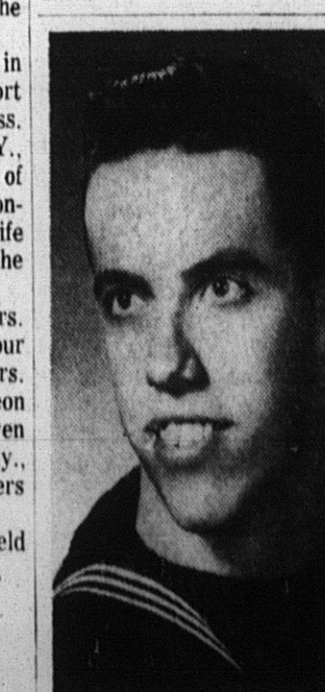
It was reported E. E. Fell Junior High School students are now circulating petitions in an effort to change the Thursday ruling and it was estimated some 600 signatures have already been collected.

Early Harvesting Of Alfalfa Urged

There is at least \$500,000 fleeting from our Allegan County's farmers right before their eyes, according to Marvin Heft, extension Agricultural agent. He says fleeting because it's there today waiting to be captured, but it will be gone tomorrow never to be seen again. This is accomplished by harvesting alfalfa at the bud stage to 1/10 bloom stage of maturity about June 1 instead of waiting until June 15 or later as is common practice in central and southern Michigan.

Research has clearly established that earlier harvesting is the most important single consideration in producing high quality forage. Three different experiments have shown increases of 4.7 pounds, 3.9 pounds and 6.7 pounds per cow daily by feeding hay or haylage harvested at the bud to 1/10 bloom stage compared to hay harvested 15 to 20 days later. One experiment showed 13 pounds more milk per day from cows fed hay harvested June 5 compared to July 20 when no grain was fed. There was far too much hay harvested in July last year.

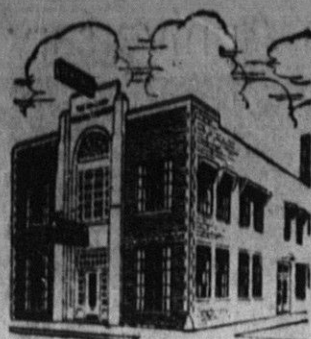

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"I WON'T PAY"

There are a good many citizens who have said some harsh things about lending money overseas. These people often make their judgments on the basis of what happens when one lends money to individuals. And let it be said that their down-to-earth sense often pays off. They are really much more sophisticated in their observations than the nation's sophisticates who tend to strut their brilliance. Maybe the following example says something.

United Arab Republic President Gamal Abdel Nasser, in a tirade against the United States said: "We know how to deal with those who bring economic pressure against them. I am able to exert more economic pressure on them because I borrow money from them. As soon as they bring economic pressure against me, I don't pay them." And he is so right. This is precisely the kind of treatment we have had for a long time. If we could collect some of the debts owed us, we could go a long way toward paying our own bills.

France has been in the forefront making real inroads on our gold hoardings. But she has done little to pay the bills she has owed us for years.

We get a bit tired of those critics of our own country who make Uncle Sam the goat of every bit of trouble in the world. We are always pictured as some Uncle Shylock who ought to be glad for the opportunity to shell out some of his holdings. The truth of the matter is that we have been overly kind to those who owe us large sums, and we are reaping the kind of action that Nasser intends to give us.

Someone has said that the common people, the man in the street, tends to show some good sense. He has always been less than excited about our easy lending policy. And maybe it is beyond the time to give him a hearing. He shows some good sense, a good understanding of the many Nassers.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, May 14
Gamaliel Advises the Council
Acts 5:27-39
By C. P. Dame

On the day of Pentecost we will study a lesson that tells us about the courage of the apostles who had but a short time before received the Holy Spirit. The confused church of our time needs courageous, Spirit-filled leaders who put God first.

I. Christians should put God first in their lives. The apostles were brought before the court, the Sanhedrin. The apostles had healed many people. This made them popular and provoked the religious leaders to jealousy. They locked up the apostles in jail but the angel of God led them out and they began preaching again. And that is why they were hailed in the court room. In the court they heard again that they had been commanded not to teach and yet they "filled Jerusalem with" doctrines to which the leaders objected.

Peter and the apostles had an answer: "We ought to obey God rather than man." These unschooled, courageous men defied the court composed of the most powerful, influential, wealthiest, smartest men in the nation. Today some Christians are called upon to choose—God or ease, or pleasure, or the crowd, or promotion, or popularity. Loyalty to God comes first anywhere and everywhere.

II. Christians are witnesses. And they have a duty. Peter said that they, the apostles, were loyal to the God of their fathers. He also said that the Lord God had raised Jesus whom they had killed and Him God had highly exalted. Note the courage of Peter. He called upon these religious leaders to repent, and to win forgiveness of their sins. The words of the apostle enraged the leaders who were determined to kill the apostles too. The message of Peter is for today. Repentance is essential to forgiveness. Alas, today some voices in the church say that the only mission of the church is to tell people that they are redeemed. Peter's message is still right—the individual must repent and then seek to change society.

III. Some give good counsel. Gamaliel, a doctor of the law, who was held in high repute among people spoke to the council after the apostles had been removed and changed the minds of the court. He referred to the past. It is not popular to do that at the present time but in those days they still valued experience. This wise man said that they should let the apostles alone—time would take its course. He argued saying that if the movement is of God it will succeed, if not, it will fail.

This rabbi knew that God is of eternity. In addition, sin may pay for a short time but in the long run it is costly. Besides, he also believed that time is on the side of righteousness and that God is the fount of all righteousness. Note also that it is not always wise to oppose error. Some who contend for error stiffen their resistance. If error is left alone it often dies of itself. This rabbi missed an opportunity. He was wise in a sense but not wise enough. He should have accepted Peter's message and become a Christian. There are nice, smart people today who fail in one thing—they do not surrender their hearts and minds to Jesus Christ.

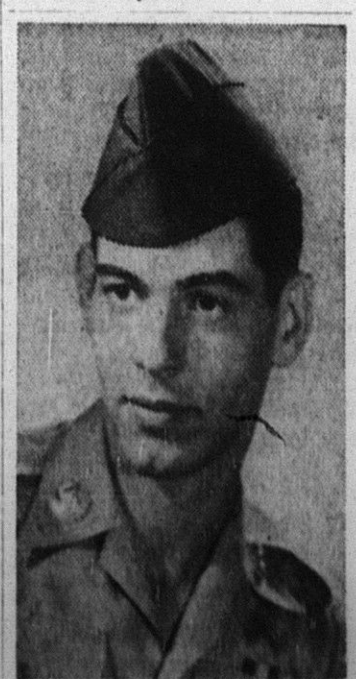

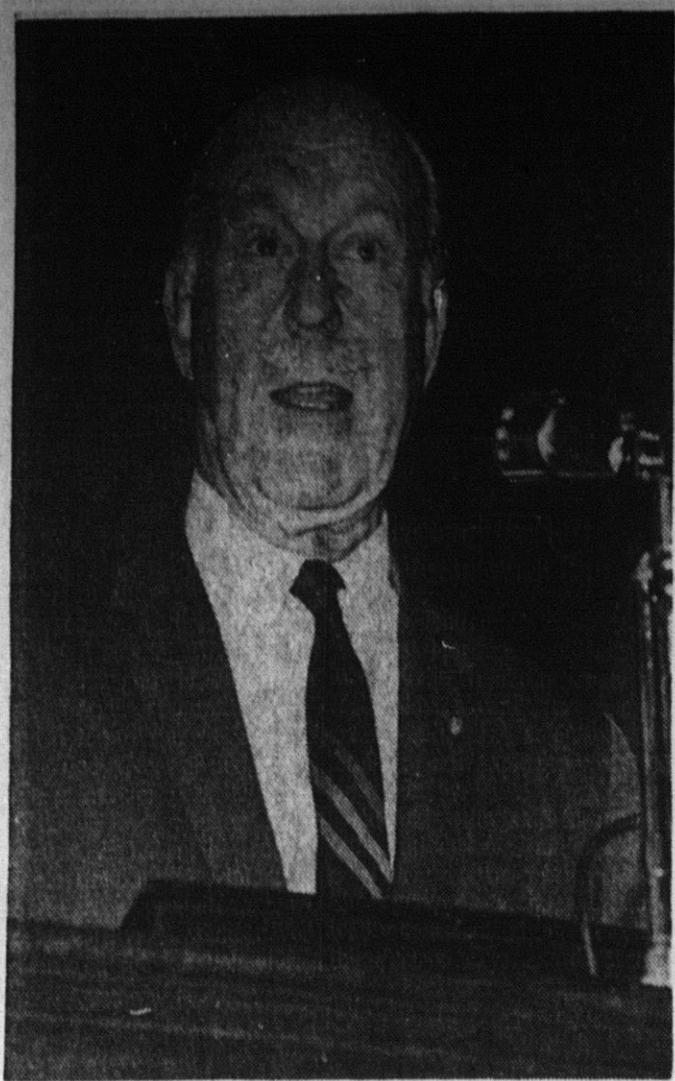

Pearson's talk covered ethics of congress, news management and the issue of peace and war, three "things people worry about."

The war in Vietnam was cited by Pearson as the most important issue facing the United States today. He predicted that the U.S. would be bogged down in a long war although he declined to predict how long it would last.

President Johnson, whom Pearson called one of the most highly skilled men in the United States on domestic problems, has made the situation in Vietnam worse, Pearson said.

The President had an opportunity to negotiate a peace in Vietnam in 1964, Pearson said, but the pressure of political campaigning against Barry Goldwater caused him to delay undertaking peace negotiations. After January of 1965, Hanoi was no longer interested in peace talks.

U.S. involvement in Vietnam goes back to the Eisenhower administration Pearson said, when Cardinal Spellman persuaded Eisenhower to send aid and U.S. military advisors to South Vietnam and built up Diem to become president of South Vietnam.

President Kennedy, failing at the Bay of Pigs and with his proposed Vienna talks with Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev, tried to make up these failures by sending 30,000 American troops to Vietnam in violation of the Geneva treaty.

President Johnson, siding with the military on the conduct of the war, has made the situation worse, Pearson said.

President Johnson, unqualified in foreign affairs when he went into the White House, has done well in trying to improve U.S. - Soviet relations, Pearson said.

He reported that Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko once told President Johnson that there might come a time when the Soviet Union might need the help of the United States to fight China as a result of growing border tensions between the two Communist giants.

The Sino-Soviet split, which Pearson called the most important development in foreign affairs in the last 10 or 20 years, has helped to mold Johnson's foreign policy.

He cited the U.S.-Soviet nuclear treaty, efforts to halt the costly development of anti-missile systems, and the possibility of joint U.S.-Soviet foreign aid as moves to strengthen U.S.-Soviet ties.

In light of recent criticism of congressional ethics, Pearson was highly critical of that body's double standard in dealing with abuses. He cited the ouster of Harlem Democrat Adam Clayton Powell, whose double-dealings cost U.S. taxpayers about \$20,000, compared to Senator Thomas J. Dodd, who was merely censured for applying some \$170,000 to his personal use.

Pearson, in a vitriolic attack on Rep. Mendel Rivers, D.-S.C., Chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, accused Rivers of flagrant abuses. He accused Rivers of taking Air Force planes for personal trips and said Rivers was an alcoholic who should not be trusted with classified military information. Pearson predicted, however, that Rivers would never be censured for his behavior.

Pearson said the Ethics Committee must decide what sort of behavior is reprehensible.

On the issue of news management, Pearson was of the opinion that Americans get more news out of their government than any other people in the world.

The only censorship in Washington involves a few wartime matters, and Pearson said he was not worried about managed news. He said President Johnson attempts to manage news less now than he did while still a senator.

In a brief question-answer period, Pearson predicted that New York Governor Nelson Rockefeller would be the 1968 GOP Presidential nominee. He said Governor George Romney doesn't have the support of old guard Republicans and would probably get less than 50 percent support of the party.

Pearson said he was not sure President Johnson would choose to run again in 1968 for the Presidency. After two operations while in office, Pearson said, the President is not in the best of health. If the President did not run, he said, the Democratic candidate would likely be Robert Kennedy.

Former Alabama Governor George Wallace will run as a third-party Presidential candidate, Pearson said, and will probably draw a large vote in the South although he will receive few votes in the north.

Pearson deplored the "right wingism" typified by Wallace and other factions prevalent in the South and West. Radical right-wingism is dangerous, he said, and can only lead to war and oblivion.

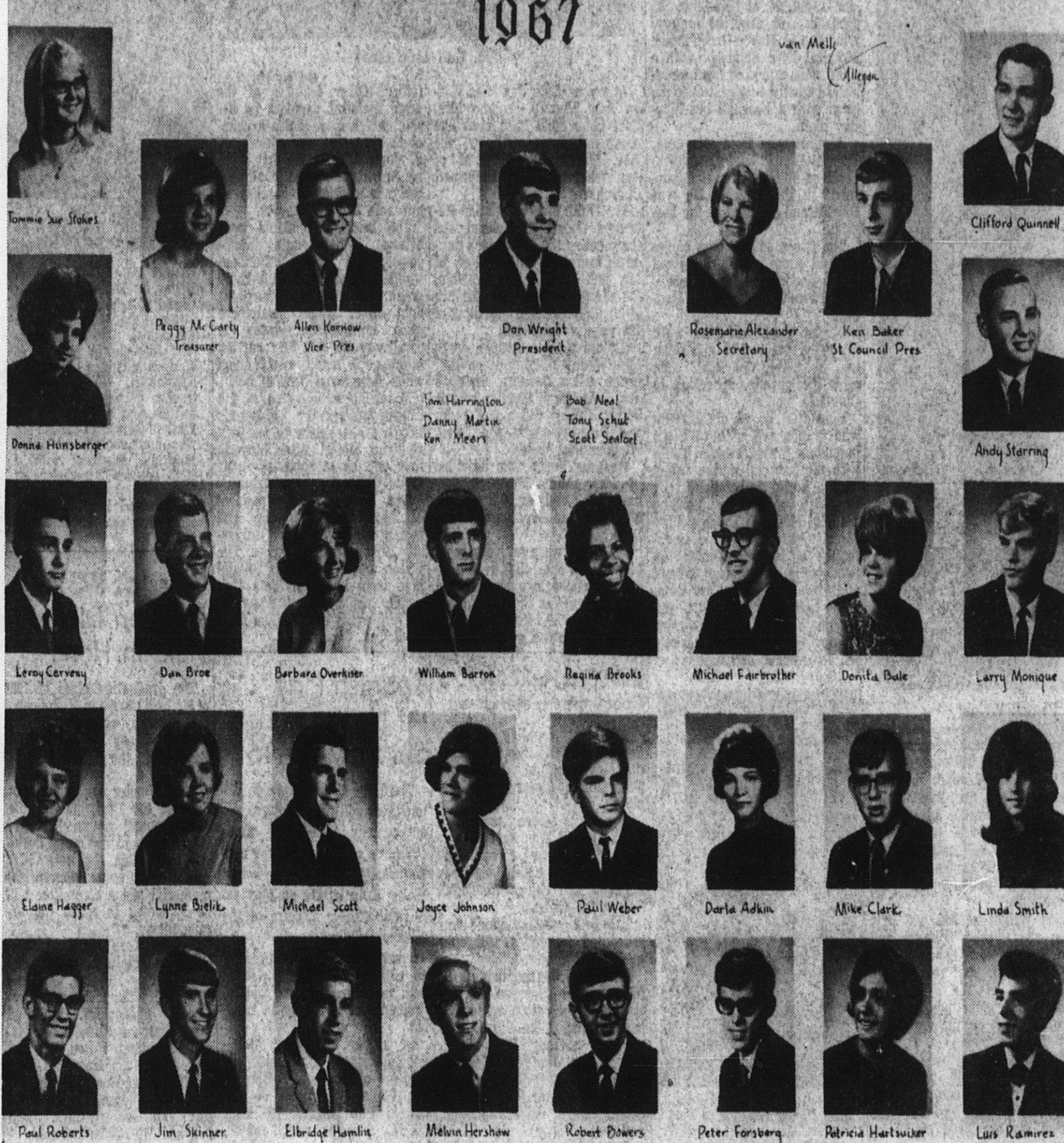

Ambulance Service Still Unresolved

ALLEGAN — Allegan Sheriff Robert Whitcomb, reporting to the Board of Supervisors here Tuesday, said he did not believe it would be feasible for the sheriff's department to operate a county ambulance service on a permanent basis.

Whitcomb also expressed doubts that an ambulance service could be handled successfully as a separate operation out of his office.

Ambulance calls—in extreme emergency only—have been answered by Whitcomb's office since April 30 when four drivers of Action Ambulance Service walked off the job. The company, a subsidiary of Oele Ambulance Service, Grand Rapids, had been operating under an injunction served by the sheriff April 20. The court order had followed notice by Oele manager Peter M. Huttenga that he was closing down Allegan County operations due to financial and operating difficulties.

The injunction was lifted Monday in Allegan Circuit Court and all connections between Oele Ambulance and the county terminated at the request of county prosecutor Ervin Andrews.

Circuit Judge Chester A. Ray has yet to rule on a possible contempt citation against Huttenga who, through his attorney, attempted to prove Monday that his two-year contract with the county, signed in January, was illegally drawn.

According to state law, county boards are obligated only to provide ambulance service to indigent residents or wards of the court.

After conferring with prosecutor Ervin Andrews during a short board recess, the ambulance committee reported the state attorney general's office would be contacted for a more specific interpretation of the county's obligations. Until then, supervisors are "still on dead center" as Watson supervisor Strand so succinctly described the ambulance situation.

She saw her husband seized by the Russians, never to be seen or heard from again. She lived through the ravages of a world war before that and she knows the loneliness that comes when your family has moved to a strange land thousands of miles away.

But Mrs. Wally Rutkowski, 69, never gave up the hope, futile as though it must have seemed at times, of being together once again with her family.

It was a dream 20 years in the making, but it finally happened. On Saturday, April 28, Mrs. Wally Rutkowski stepped out of a Lufthansa jet at O'Hare International Airport in Chicago and into the waiting arms of her loving family.

It was the great grandmother's first airplane flight and she made the trip without a traveling companion. She wasn't sure if her own daughter would even recognize her — after all, it had been 20 years. So she stood among the throngs and waved a scarf, which really wasn't necessary.

"We knew it was Oma," (Grandma) one of her grandchildren said, "because she looked so nice."

There to meet her were her

daughter, Mrs. Walter Tscheuschner, 103 East 40th, and granddaughters, Mrs. Jack Brunzell, the former Helga Tscheuschner, 28 West 17th St.; Rosemary Tscheuschner, and a grandson, Werner Tscheuschner, all of Holland.

Another granddaughter, Mrs. Horst Foerster, the former Renat Tscheuschner, lives in Loveland, Colo.

Mrs. Rutkowski last saw her family in 1947 after they fled communist-held East Berlin and took up residence in West Germany. Only two years before, her husband was seized from their home by the Russians and deported to a Siberian labor camp. Family and friends have heard nothing of his whereabouts to this day.

The Tscheuschners left West Germany in November, 1956, and settled here shortly thereafter, speaking little English. Now they speak excellent English.

Stirring Film Shown at May Fellowship Day

A stirring documentary film which reveals an actual drama of racial and religious tension challenged the thoughts and emotions of the 100 women attending Friday's May Fellowship Day.

"A Time for Burning" shows the actual participants in an agonizing situation as they are forced to look honestly at their beliefs about brotherhood. The people in the movie are members of the Augustana Lutheran Church in Omaha, Neb., and Negroes from several neighboring churches.

The conflicting attitudes about race relations are brought to the surface when the Lutheran pastor suggests visits by 10 couples from his church in the homes of 10 Negro couples. While he gains firm support from some, he also meets with the protests of those who say that such a move will split his church and with the procrastination of one member who repeatedly states that "The time is not right."

Before the visitation plan can even be effected, the crisis within the church grows hotter when a group of Negro teenagers attends a Sunday service as guests of the white youths. Enough people are opposed to the slight movement the church is taking in the direction of interracial communication so that he pastor is forced to resign from his position.

Some of the best moments of the film are those when several teenagers from the Negro church express vividly the hypocrisy of white Christians who preach brotherhood but refuse to take any positive action on the burning issue of integration. Probably the most eloquent person in the conflict is the Negro barber who reveals so articulately and forcefully the bitterness and disgust he feels for the white man's injustice and hypocrisy.

Mrs. West was a member of the Seventh Day Adventist Church and a charter member of the S.D.I. Club in Trowbridge township.

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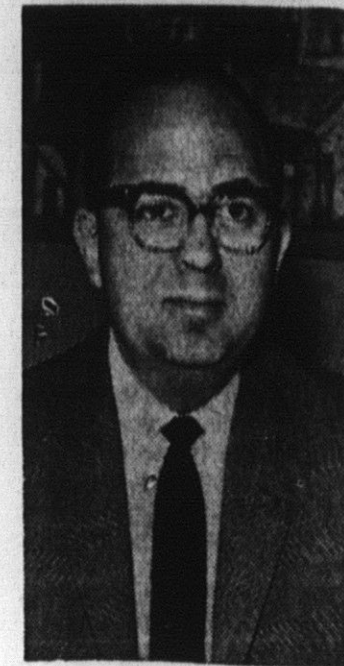
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Dr. Weller Will Head Department

Entire De Haan Family Finds Recorders Fun

The Hope College recorder class for adults held its final session Wednesday from 7 to 9 p.m. in Nykerk Music Hall. Plans are being made to continue bi-weekly practice sessions until mid-summer.

Because of the resurgence of recorder playing with its wealth of available good music, Hope College has for the past two years offered courses in learning to play this flute-like instrument.

Not a tape recorded nor to be confused with it, the recorder is a musical instrument dealing in trebles, descants, and baroque ornamentation of notes and not in hi-fi tweeters and woofers.

The college has also recently formed a chapter of the American Recorder Society, the third ARS chapter in Michigan. Started by Hope faculty members, the chapter will try to provide opportunities for serious study of recorder music and the precise performance of the instrument itself for those in the community who own recorders and now play them or for those who wish to learn to play them.

Although the instrument comes in six ranges of notes from the very high soprano through the soprano, alto, tenor, bass, and great bass, the alto is the most popular with adults and the soprano (because

of its short finger span) with children. The alto lends itself better to solo work but the greater enjoyment is playing two or three or four-part music in families or in small groups.

One of the Hope College families enjoying this musical pastime is that of the Robert De Haan family of 325 West 32nd St. Both parents and all four children play recorders as well as other musical instruments.

Recorder playing is not only well-suited for the home but finds a wealth of tasks and opportunities in the church.

It makes a profound appeal to many people today because its early music has a transparency of texture, a remoteness from petty human concerns, and a "deep-rooted faith in a divinely governed Order."

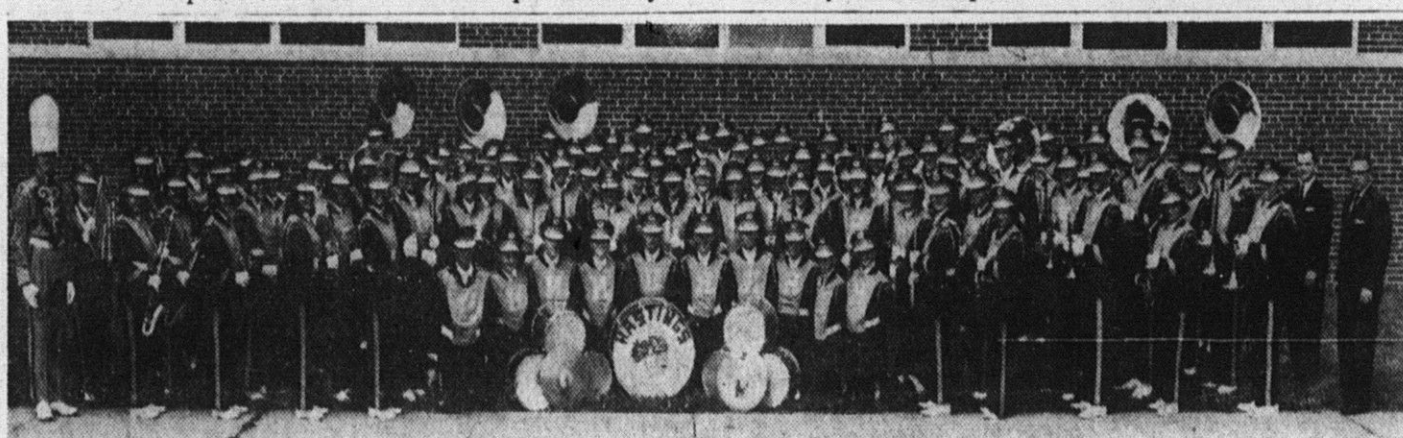

Family Living Classes Provide 'First Step Up'

(Editor's Note: The feature on the Family Living Courses sponsored in conjunction with the Extension Service, the Welfare Department and the Health and Education Departments in Ottawa County was written by Judith Prochnow, Extension Family Living editor. A young mother of seven clutched her certificate. "I should frame it! It's the first I've ever gotten," she said. The mother had just completed a special series of family living classes taught by Mrs. Alfreda McGuire, Cooperative Extension Service Home Economist. The Extension Service, the Welfare Department and the Health and Education Departments in Ottawa County sponsored the eight week series.

April 26 was graduation day. Twelve of the women who had attended every class received their certificates from the Extension Service as a branch of Michigan State University. Usual class attendance topped 20.

The classes have been a course in practical education for women who, in most cases, have not been able to finish their education. They were held in the Ottawa County Building.

Lessons included "How Do I Look to My Children," "Eating for Health and Happiness," "Three Square Meals a Day," "How to Make a House a Home," and "Preparing for the Future." The graduation day lesson for the future stressed the value of education of any kind.

Cornelius Bruggink, consultant of the Area Learning Center, told the women that they can continue to educate themselves just by looking for helpful information in mass media, free publications and talking to other people. He encouraged them to spend a few quiet minutes each day reading.

"If one of your kids in school brings home a school book that you don't understand, ask him to explain it to you," Bruggink said.

He encouraged mothers to stay interested in their children instead of putting off the little stories and requests for help that youngsters have.

After Bruggink concluded, Mrs. McGuire, who teaches the majority of the classes announced that a family camp was being planned for their next summer. Nora Johnson and Gwen Jackim, who both earned class certificates, will serve on a planning committee. Richard Machiele, County Extension Agricultural Agent, Mel Baron, Extension Aide and Mrs. McGuire also will help organize the camp.

When the class expressed unanimous interest in an advanced series of classes, Mrs. McGuire agreed to begin plans for the lessons.

The series just completed is patterned after a series that Mrs. McGuire has been helping teach in Kent County since 1960. She says that over 700 women have attended the classes there, and some have been able to conquer problems caused by limited incomes and limited opportunities for education and employment.

"We're not claiming that the classes are a 'cure-all,'" Mrs. McGuire says, "but they serve to open doors so these women can get some perspective on their problems and find help in solving them."

The classes are directed by an advisory committee. In addition to Mrs. McGuire, Dick Machiele and Mel Baron, the committee includes Willis S. Boss, Extension 4-H Youth Agent; Larry Hildore, director, Ottawa County Department of Social Welfare; Miss Avis Dykstra, nurse, County Health Department; the Rev. Bob Nykamp, Western Seminary of Holland, and Robert Wiersma, Western Seminary.

Other committee members are Ken Heuvelman, special education coordinator; Sgt. Gerald Witteveen and Detective Sgt. J. Hemple, Ottawa County Sheriff's Dept.; Frank Hoogland, Mayor of Zeeland and member of the Board of Supervisors; John Wyman, sanitation, County Health Dept.; and Mrs. Franklin Veldheer, Extension Women's Council; also Tony Wolf, Supervisor, Chairman of the Recreation Committee.

Extension Home Economist the process. Coffee breaks are financed by the Fraternal Order of Police. Women of the Robinson Extension study groups prepared different "goodies" each week from ingredients often on donated foods lists. They provided recipes to the women at the end of each class.

Coffee breaks give the women a chance to get to know each other, and help build rapport among them that carries over the class discussion, Mrs. McGuire said. In many cases, they are able to teach each other through their own ideas and examples.

"Often benefits of the classes cannot be listed in terms of facts participants learned through the classes. It's in their attitudes, and the total assimilation of knowledge... and putting it to use," Mrs. McGuire added.

Members of the Grand Haven Junior Chamber of Commerce Auxiliary provided nursery care, for pre-school children of class members, in a room adjacent to the class room. The mothers indicate that their children looked forward to coming to "class" too.

The family living classes co-sponsored with other county departments are just one of the projects the Extension Service offers in family living education. Mrs. McGuire and Mrs. Margaret Jane Suydam, also an Extension Home Economist, serve the families of Kent, Ottawa and Allegan Counties. They plan programs and helpful materials of particular interest to young homemakers and mothers of preschool children, elderly citizens, and working women. In addition, they work with members of Extension Study Groups and 4-H Clubs.

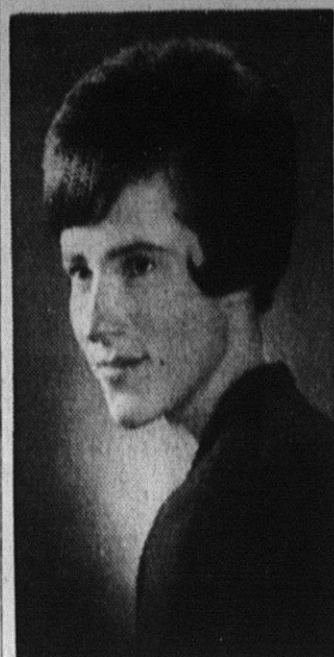
