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## Solid Waste Disposal Unsettled

# County Seeks Policy on Roads

GRAND HAVEN — Leonard Road and solid waste disposal gave Ottawa County Commissioners about as much trouble as the electrical system in the county building Monday.

Commissioners were left in the dark twice during their regular session when electric power supplies were cut off in the building in the morning and again in the afternoon. Officials said there was trouble in the main electrical system in the building.

Commissioner William L. Kennedy, who conducted a public meeting on Leonard Rd. Thursday attended by 300 citizens, submitted a letter which commissioners agreed to send to the county Road Commission setting policy statements regarding so called scenic corridors in the county.

Residents were protesting attempts by the road commission to buy additional right of way along Leonard Rd.

In the letter, commissioners urged the Road Commission to improve Leonard Rd. within the existing 66-foot right of way and to develop and implement a replanting program and make public a notice of intent not to secure additional right of way.

The policy statements said the commissioners can designate certain transportation corridors as "scenic corridors" on a case-by-case basis and upon the recommendation of the county's development committee, that the commissioners' designation in no way alters existing road commission classification of a particular highway or segment of road and that local governmental units coordinate their development within the "scenic corridors" which will be compatible or enhance the quality of the corridor.

Later in the meeting commissioner Herbert Wybenga of Zeeland said a meeting of the

county development committee and the road commission would be held May 20 to discuss the letter and a report was expected at the May 23 meeting of the commission.

Solid waste disposal problems in the county flared again when the West Michigan Shoreline Regional Planning Commission submitted what was said a final report on a survey of solid waste disposal plans for the county.

The Olive township landfill is scheduled to close June 1 and no plans were revealed to continue solid waste disposal services for other areas of the county as promised in a resolution adopted at the April 9 meeting, commissioner William Kieft charged.

Commissioner Raymond Vander Laan, chairman of the Solid Waste Committee, said additional meetings were planned with township representatives concerning locations for so-called "green boxes" or collection sites. A report was expected at the March 23 commissioner's meeting.

Vander Laan blamed "inaccurate reporting" by the news media for turning residents of Port Sheldon township against a proposed collection site to replace the Olive township site and claimed other townships did not want collection sites in their areas.

Vander Laan said a landfill site in Kent County that serves private haulers in the Georgetown area was being closed June 1 and that posed additional problems for the eastern part of the county that had not been anticipated.

Chairman William Winstrom then tossed another problem for solid waste disposal when he said he was aware that a letter might be coming from citizens in Park township asking that the Park township landfill be closed.

## 8 Candidates Listed For Elections

A total of eight candidates have qualified for local school board elections slated June 10 with four each at West Ottawa and Holland School Districts.

West Ottawa candidates include William J. Lalley, incumbent, Dr. Eli A. Coats, John G. Getz and Mrs. Miriam M. Schroeder. Jack Daniels, member of the board for 16 years, is not seeking re-election this year.

The June 10 ballot at West Ottawa will carry an operating millage issue, but the amount has not yet been determined.

Candidates for the Holland seat include Robert Gosselaar, incumbent, Mrs. Jesse Dalman, Mrs. Deanna De Pree and Eugene Westra. John Weeber, first elected in 1966, will not be seeking re-election.

## In Carousel Development Plan

# Laketown Names Problem Areas

The Laketown township zoning board of appeals in a written decision dated May 1 and released today agreed with the concept of multi-family dwelling units in developing the Carousel Mountain area, but rejected for a second time certain variances requested by the developer, Carousel Recreational Equities.

The zoning board of appeals said development of the property was "compatible in principle" with the present residential district classification but that plans and specifications submitted by the applicant were "unsatisfactory and are accordingly disapproved."

The appeals board detailed certain engineering problems that were to be met before approval could be granted.

The decision of the appeals board followed a public hearing Dec. 20 when developers submitted revised plans after the original plans submitted earlier in the year were rejected in June, 1973.

Grand Rapids attorney Leonard Hoffius, representing the developers, said today the developers were "pleased that the township zoning board found that Carousel met the legal criteria for multi-family dwellings."

He said he believed the developer was confident that the engineering problems listed by

the appeals board could be solved to the satisfaction of the township engineer.

The zoning board hired engineer Thomas Newhof of Prein and Newhof in Grand Rapids to study the plans.

In its May 1 decision the board said the developer could submit revised plans again but that "no further public hearing will be conducted on any new plans until the township's consulting engineer has been satisfied concerning the engineering feasibility of the proposed project and a deposit has been made by the applicant sufficient to cover all accrued expenses of the township in an amount satisfactory to the township board."

The board raised questions concerning finished ground elevations, steepness of road and parking areas, location of parking areas adjacent to roads, size of parking spaces, storm drainage, size of proposed water and sewer mains, setbacks and density of dwelling units.

Carousel Recreational Equities trimmed the number of dwellings in its revised plans submitted at the Dec. 20 hearing. Original plans called for 1,881 units but that was cut to 1,725. The entire 300 acre development south of Macatawa Park and north from Castle Park along Lake Michigan was estimated to cost \$53 million.

## Coast Guard, Tug Maneuver Burning 250-Foot Vessel

# Lake Barge Catches Fire

A 250-foot barge under tow by a tug caught fire in Lake Macatawa off Point West Monday night in full view of diners who watched as the Coast Guard and tug maneuvered the barge to prevent winds from blowing flames over the entire vessel.

Two men were injured when mooring lines to shore let loose.

Park township firemen assisted the Coast Guard in a two-hour battle to control the flames. Damage estimates were not immediately available. The fire

was reported at 8 p.m.

John Selvick of Selvick Marine and Towing, Milwaukee, said the barge, Sea Castle, a converted lakes freighter, was being towed outboard after unloading a cargo of cement at the Penn-Dixie Corp.

A compressor on the stern of the barge apparently overheated, setting fire to a diesel fuel line. Selvick said a quantity of diesel fuel near the compressor did not burn.

Selvick said the barge was maneuvered along side the channel wall at Ottawa Beach so that the stern was facing out-

bound, allowing winds to blow the flames off the stern.

A mooring line to the channel let loose injuring two men. Treated in Holland Hospital and released were Frank Wallace, 53, of Luxemburg, Wis., and Tom Luker, 37, of Milwaukee, employees of Selvick.

Two holes were punched in the side of the barge 2 1/2 feet above the water line in the stern and bow and the barge was towed back to the Penn Dixie docks where repairs were being made before the barge could be towed out of the harbor, Selvick said.

## First Jail Study Report Is Ready

GRAND HAVEN — An initial report on a study of the Ottawa County jail and court facilities was expected the week of June 10, according to a representative of the Community Corrections Resource Program.

Rodney Miller told Ottawa County Commissioners Monday that 300 hours had been spent by his staff on court research as part of a jail rehabilitation study. The study is expected to be completed by Aug. 15.

Ottawa County is to receive \$79,500 for a summer youth program, it was announced by commission chairman William Winstrom but he said the county would try to get additional funds.

Winstrom added that manpower programs and the summer youth program could be combined with a joint total budget of \$600,000. The county then could divide the funds as it saw fit.

The County Development committee recommended the salary of Mrs. Helen Vannoy, named acting Friend of the Court on the retirement of George Demson, be set at \$11,375 even though Circuit Court Judges James E. Townsend and Wendell A. Miles asked she receive the \$13,973 Damson received when he retired.

Commissioner Kenneth Northouse, chairman of the county committee, said it has been traditional for the commissioners to set the salary while the judges make the appointments.

Commissioners decided to seek an opinion from the county prosecuting attorney fearing possible court action.

Dr. Philip Schoo, assistant superintendent of Holland Public Schools, was appointed to a term on the Mental Health Board succeeding Robert Visscher who resigned.

Dr. Schoo, who was recommended by the Mental Health Board, was approved after commissioner James Dressel had nominated Tom De Pree of Holland to fill the vacancy. The resignation of Dr. William Bocks of Grand Haven School was accepted before Dr. Schoo was recommended.

A letter from Dr. William Ball Sr., supervisor of Wright township, requesting 24-hour sheriff's department protection for his township, solid waste disposal aid and mental health services offices in the township was referred to committees.

A contract to supply water in Grand Haven township, Ferrysburg and Spring Lake, under study since 1972, was approved by the commissioners as signed by the Ottawa County Road Commission with Grand Haven.

Commissioners were told a public vote on the water project was expected in Grand Haven township and could affect the size of the 3.7 million bond issue and the project itself but commissioners were told issuance of the bonds would be subject to a favorable public vote in Grand Haven township.

## Condition Described as Better Than Expected

# Eight Men Tour South American

CAMDEN, N. J. — Eight local citizens, including former crew members and members of the Holland Jaycees toured the dry-docked South American here Monday and described the ship's condition as "not as bad as expected," according to Reed Brown, WHTC's news director who was a member of the group.

Brown reported that paint was peeling throughout, doors were sagging, the condition was dirty but the ship was intact.

General consensus of the group is that the ship is restorable but many things were missing that couldn't be easily replaced and the ship is pretty well stripped of all furniture and equipment. However, four life boats still remain aboard.

A. C. Kranitz, Ships Inc., owners of the South American, told the Holland group they would have until Friday to make a commitment and shortly thereafter a deposit of a minimum of \$10,000 would be required. The purchase price of \$200,000 is negotiable depending upon how long the group waits, Brown said.

Members of the group which left Sunday at 2 p.m. by motor home includes Edmund Beauregard, chief steward aboard the South American for 30 years; Virgil Harper, former second purser; Ken Cartier, engineer; Steve Northuis, Bob Chaffee, Terry Wolters, Don Disselkoen, "save the South American" civic chairman and Brown.

## Land Use Offered For South American

A promise of the use of 500 feet of Lake Macatawa frontage spurred efforts to bring the South American, last of the great lakes passenger cruise vessels, to Holland as part of a planned restoration process.

The offer to use the land came from a donor who was not named and officials of the Save the South American committee said the mooring could be used while the vessel, if obtained, is being restored.

The announcement was made at a public meeting Tuesday night attended by 28 persons.

Permanent officers were named for the committee and efforts were said being taken to form a non-profit corporation to handle arrangements to obtain the 321-foot ship now in Camden, N.J.

Committee chairman Donald Disselkoen said no public tax support was being sought as he listed possibilities for financing including private foundation

# Four Injured In Fennville Explosion

FENNVILLE — Four persons were burned, two seriously, in an explosion and fire this morning that destroyed the Brite Metal Finishing Co. along Blue Star Highway north of M-89 west of here.

The cause of the explosion and fire reported at 9:58 a.m. today was under investigation and Allegan County sheriff's deputies said a fire marshal from the Paw Paw State Police was expected to assist in the probe.

Injured and taken to Holland Hospital were Charles Conley, 44, of Hamilton; Melvin Tillery, 44, Pullman; Wynze Lopez, 30,

Fennville and Raymond Hicks, 23, of Pullman.

Lopez and Hicks were treated in the hospital for burns of the face and released. Conley was transferred to Butterworth Hospital in Grand Rapids with burns of the chest, arms and face. Tillery was admitted to Holland Hospital with burns of face, neck, arms and knees and was in "good" condition.

Firemen from Saugatuck and Manlius assisted in battling the blaze.

The firm is owned by Louis Hamm of Fennville and occupies the building that formerly housed a cement block firm.

# Driving Rains Drench Holland

At 11:15 a.m. today, Tulip Time officials decided to postpone today's Children's parade until Friday at 2 p.m.

With rain falling unabated, it was not a hard decision to make, since Friday is always held in abeyance as a rain date for the Children's parade. In some years in the past, the decision was more agonizing. It's intermittent rains that lead to awe-some decisions, if not ulcers. Rainfall the last two days to 11 a.m. today exceeded 1 1/2 inches.

Through years of experience, a succession of Tulip Time leaders have set noon as the deadline on postponement action. A minimum two-hour margin is necessary for parade logistics — moving bands, children's floats, and a host of unseen details.

The postponement meant that the Kleine Dutch Orchestra and the Kleine Klompen Dancers would perform this afternoon at 2 p.m. in Civic Center, instead of Friday. Some type of program by school children of the off-parade day is usually given.

Today's rainy weather followed an auspicious opening day Wednesday with bright sunshine in the morning, but overcast skies for the street scrubbing and volk parade. Sunshine beamed through toward the close of the klompen dance on the parade route.

Rainy days always make indoor attractions extra popular. This was reflected in more visitors at Netherlands Museum and the flower show in the Armory.

Another half-hour Dutch service is slated at 4 p.m. today in the historic Pillar Church at Ninth and College. The Dutch Heritage Show will present its second performance at 5:30 p.m. in Civic Center.

Main attraction tonight is the

Million Dollar Shrine Band at 8 p.m. in Civic Center, featuring stirring marches, soloists and instrumentalists.

Twenty-minute organ recitals are given every hour on the hour in Dimmet Memorial Chapel today and Friday, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Tulip Time President James Vande Poel said if rain continues, decision on the 7:15 Klompen dance at Centennial Park tonight will be made at 6 p.m.

# Hope Will Honor NATO Secretary

Hope College will honor Joseph M. A. H. Luns, Secretary General of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO), by presenting him an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree when he visits the campus, Friday, May 24.

Luns will be honored during a convocation open to the public at 11 a.m. in Dimmet Memorial Chapel.

Luns has a distinguished career of foreign service. He was the Netherlands' ranking diplomat for 19 years before being appointed Secretary General of NATO in 1971.

Luns was Minister of Foreign Affairs for the Netherlands government from 1952-71. His Dutch foreign service career included serving as chief of the Netherlands delegation to the United Nations for three years.

Luns was instrumental in the success of the economic union of Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg. He helped to bring about the Treaty of Rome, which set up the Common Market. He was also an outspoken champion of British admission into the European Economic Community.

He has been cited for his contribution in shaping post-war European policies. Time magazine recently credited him for working "as hard for Western European unity and cooperation with the U.S. as any statesman on the Continent." Newsweek magazine once characterized him as "a diplomat with a reputation for speaking his mind regardless of the consequences."

Luns' visit comes at a time when pressure in Washington

for U.S. withdrawal from NATO grows stronger. At the same time there is increasing concern among Europeans over the improving detente between the U. S. and Russia.

Luns finds himself in a delicate position. Saturday Review recently reported that Luns "embarrasses Americans by being more Yank than the Yanks and tends to envision Soviet hordes poised to swoop across Europe."

Luns will deliver an address during the convocation. A luncheon for invited guests will follow in Phelps Hall.

The visit to Holland by Luns was arranged by Willard C. Wichers, Netherlands Consul for Press and Cultural Affairs and secretary of the Hope College Board of Trustees.

## Horticulture Team Receives 1st Place In State Contest

The West Ottawa Horticulture team consisting of Joe Kamphuis, Dale Zuidema, Dan Brewer and Tom Teisman and coached by Ron Simon, captured first place in the state horticulture contest held at Michigan State University recently.

The West Ottawa Team competed against 26 other high school teams and some 85 participants from the state of Michigan. This is the fifth time West Ottawa has received first place.

The contest consisted of an identification section where approximately 160 different trees, shrubs, vegetables, fruits and flowers were identified; a horticulture judging section where participants were asked to judge the quality of four different classes of vegetables, flowers, fruits and shrubs and a general horticulture information section consisting of 40 questions.

The team will receive a Gold Award and each member will receive a gold rating certificate. Kamphuis was high scorer with 174 points from a possible 200 and will receive a medal. The team will now represent the State of Michigan in the National Competition at Washington, D. C. during November.

Students from the West Ottawa horticulture program have won State contests in 1969, 1970, 1971, 1973 and 1974 and one National contest in 1969. 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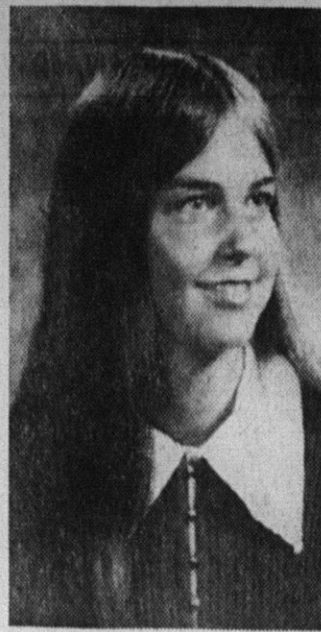

## Examination Procedures Explained by IRS Agent

"The honest taxpayer has nothing to fear if his return is selected for examination," stated Richard Fase, an Internal Revenue agent of the Muskegon branch, at a dinner meeting of the Holland Chapter of the American Society of Women Accountants held Tuesday evening in the Festival Room of the Warm Friend Motor Inn.

In his talk, "The Taxpayer's Right to Appeal," Fase explained why and how an examination is conducted and what steps may be taken if the examinee agrees or disagrees with the examining officer.

"The usual reason for selecting a tax return for examination is to verify the correctness of income, exemptions or deductions that have been reported. About 20 per cent of all returns are audited and most of these are evaluated for potential errors or for insufficient information about some items. In 1973, 80 million returns were filed. Of this 1.8 million were reviewed and audited for deficiencies or refunds.

"The examination may be conducted by correspondence, by an office interview or by a field audit. It normally begins with a notification by mail informing the person what method of examination will be used.

"If the examinee agrees with the IRS officer, he merely signs an agreement form, and whatever the result may be — he either pays the additional tax with interest or he receives a refund with interest.

"If the examinee disagrees with the officer, there are two levels of appeal: The District Conference Staff and the Appeal Division. If an agreement is not reached at either one of these levels, the taxpayer may take his case to the United States Tax Court, the United States District Court. These courts are independent judicial bodies and have no connection with the Internal Revenue Service.

Fase concluded by stating that most cases are handled by the District Conference Staff. An examination does not suggest that a taxpayer is dishonest or that he is a suspected criminal. Many times the cases are closed without a change in reported tax liability. In many cases the taxpayer receives a refund.

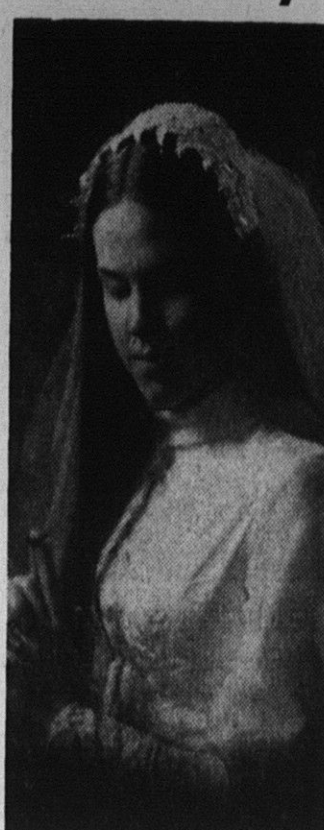

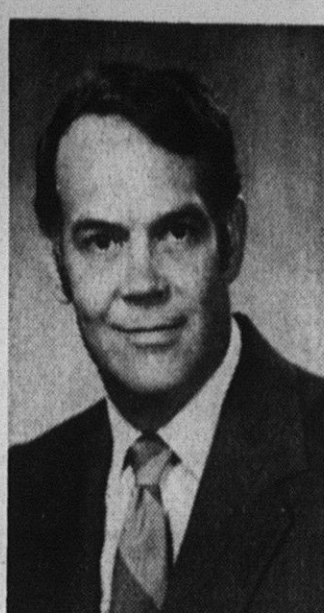

## Sunday School Lesson

Bold Witness Provokes Controversy  
Acts 21:10 - 14; 17-24  
By C. P. Dame

We are living in a time of much travelling. Paul was a great traveller in a day when travelling was marked by hardships but he did it not for pleasure but for the purpose of witnessing for his Saviour and Lord. His zeal is still a great example to all who work for the Lord.

1. A warning came to Paul but he disregarded it. In last week's lesson we noted that Paul was in Ephesus. The setting of this lesson is in Caesarea and in Jerusalem about forty miles from each other. Both cities are known to Bible readers. Luke tells us how Paul came to Caesarea and that he lodged at the home of Philip the evangelist who was the father of four unmarried daughters who preached. While Paul was in that home something took place.

A prophet named Agabus took Paul's girdle and bound his own feet and hands and said, "So shall the Jews at Jerusalem bind the man who owns this girdle and deliver in the hands of the Gentiles." The prophet said that he spoke for the Holy Spirit. When Paul stopped at Tyre he got the same warning. "When we heard this, we and the people there begged him not to go up to Jerusalem." The word "we" shows that Luke was with Paul's party.

Paul refused to yield to the pleading of his friends but insisted upon going to Jerusalem for the sake of Jesus. When the friends noted that Paul would not be persuaded they said, "The will of the Lord be done. Did Paul do the right thing? Every reader can answer that according to his own opinion. Were the words of warning meant to be obeyed or were they meant to foretell what awaited Paul?"

II. A plan that had costly results. Let us take a look. Paul was welcomed in Jerusalem by the brethren. On the next day Paul met with James, the leader of the church in Jerusalem and the elders. Paul told them about the conversion of the Gentiles which made all to praise God. The leaders of the church in Jerusalem suggested that Paul join four men who had taken a vow and purify himself with them and thus show that he was although a Christian still loyal to Moses and the law. Numbers 6 tell about the Nazirite vows. Paul consented. This decision led to the arrest of Paul and other consequences.

Was this step commendable? It was done by Paul for the sake of the gospel - his motive was excellent. The truth we can learn is that God uses the plans and ideas of his people and workers whether they are wise or foolish. This lesson reveals the intense devotion of Paul to the gospel and to his Lord and his willingness to do anything for spreading the good news.

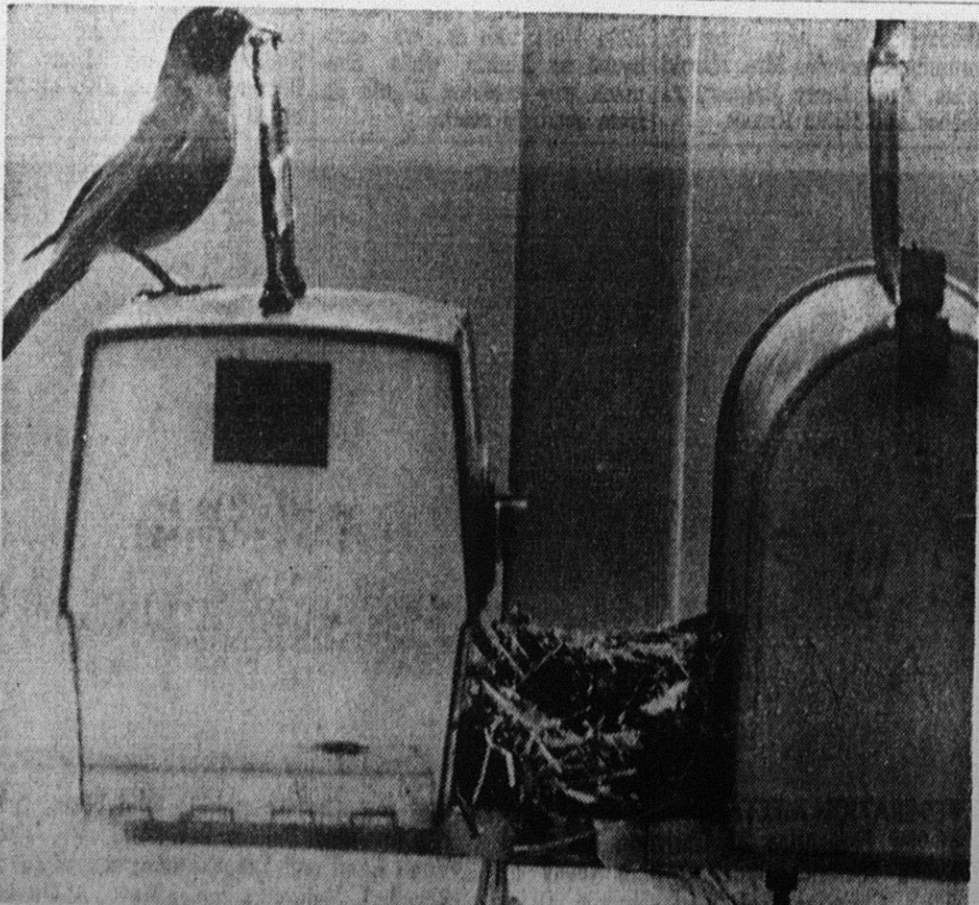
## Three-Car Crash Injures 3 Persons

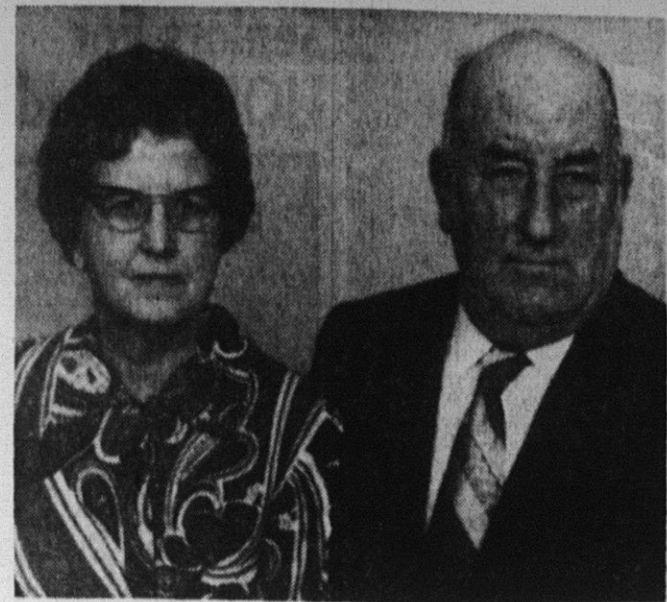


**A MOTHER'S WORK** — Seems that even Mother's Day, a mother's work is never done, not even a robin mother who brings food to her four recently hatched

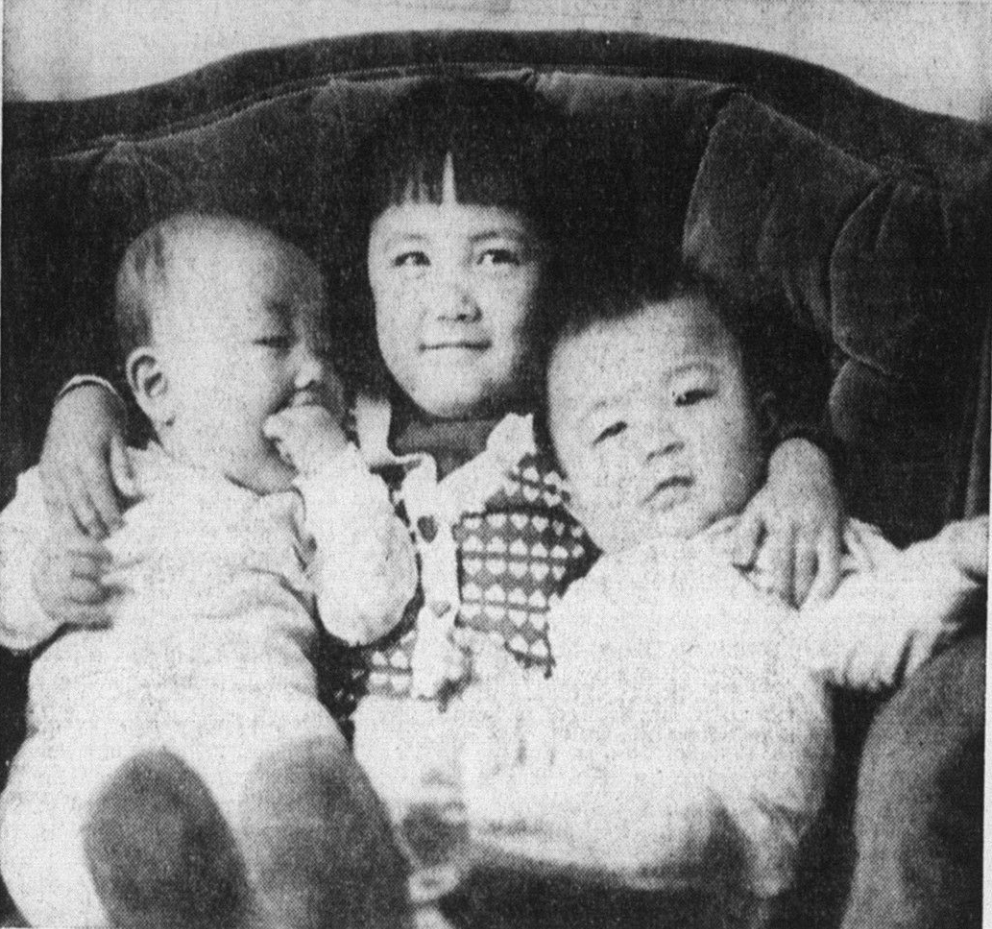
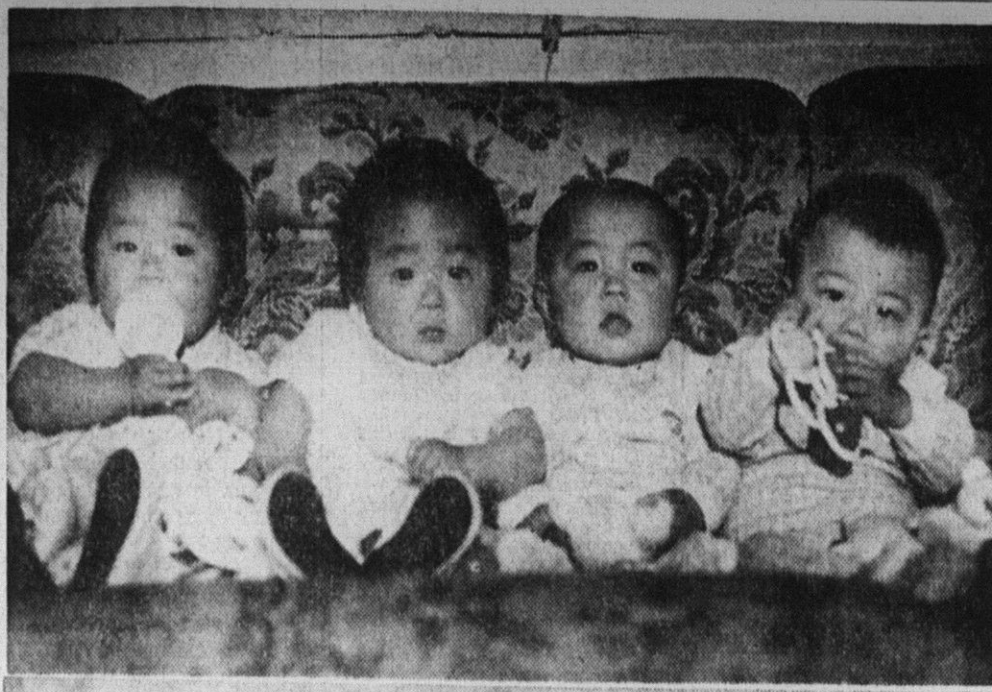

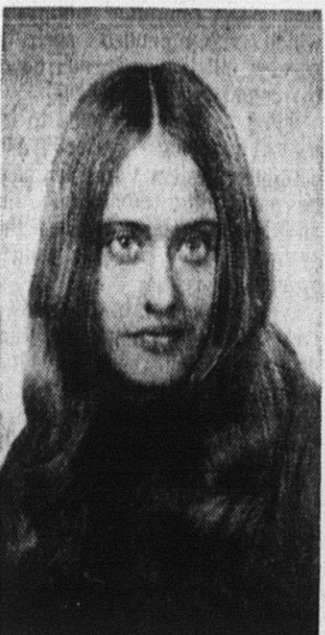

## Hope Graduates Hear Dr. Myers

Commencement speaker David Myers challenged graduates to look beyond the career preparation they received at Hope at graduation exercises Sunday afternoon in Civic Center for 396 seniors.

"The great temptation of academic culture is to believe in a sort of salvation through knowledge," noted Dr. Myers, chairman of the Hope College psychology department whose subject was "On Becoming a Whole Person."

"But the pursuit of knowledge, when not linked with higher purpose, can become very empty and self-serving in its detachment. It has never been more evident that what our nation does not need is more well educated persons who are morally illiterate. For the Biblical man, the chief end of the self is not only intellectual understanding, but also to glorify

God by right action, and our intellect is one means to this end."

Earlier in the day, Dr. Bernard Brunsting, minister of Greenville Community Reformed Church in Scarsdale, N. Y., addressed graduates at baccalaureate services in Dimment Memorial Chapel.

Honorary degrees were presented to Dr. Louis H. Benes, editor of The Church Herald since 1945, honorary Doctor of Divinity degree; Dr. J. Oliver Lampen, director of the Institute of Microbiology at Rutgers University in New Brunswick, N. J., Doctor of Humane Letters; and Dr. William Spoelhof, president since 1952 of Calvin College, Doctor of Humane Letters.

In his commencement address, Dr. Myers reminded graduates that their occupations in time might be quite different from their college major, stressing, however, that their four years at Hope have not been wasted.

"The best education for life is that which is directed at the development of fundamental competencies and personal attributes. So we have tried to educate you toward values and concepts and abilities that will be timeless in usefulness — that will help you in coping and giving leadership in whatever vocational and social situations the unknown future might bring."

Dr. Myers challenged seniors to be like Jesus Christ, "to grapple with life, to love and be loved." He said a person with this type of understanding and involvement is going to be his own person, not easily shaped and molded by circumstances of the moment.

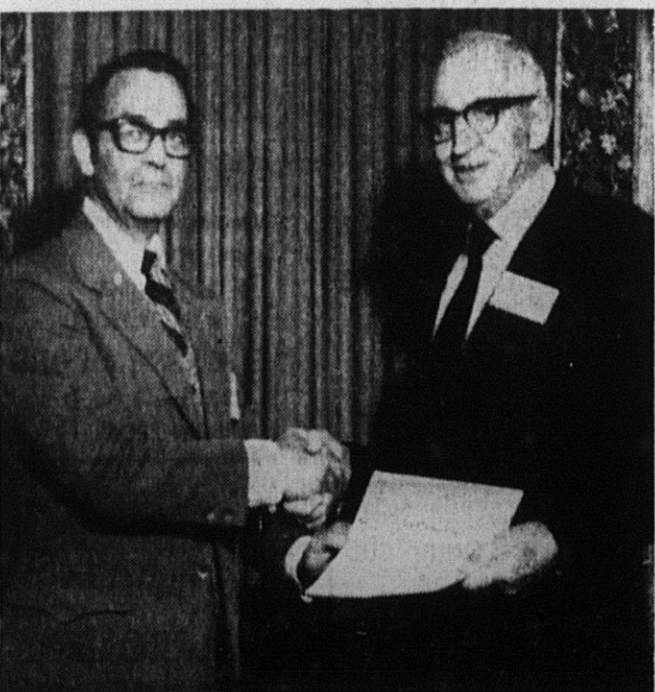

Plans for commencement and baccalaureate services for Holland High School were announced at a monthly meeting of the Board of Education Monday night in Apple Avenue School, the first of a dozen different public schools where monthly meetings will be held the coming year.

Three students will deliver brief commencement addresses at the 91st commencement, June 13. They are Andrew Emmert, Martina Nieto and Anne Feininger. Christopher Prins, class president, will give the class appreciation and the Rev. Gordon Van Oostenburg of Trinity Reformed Church will give the invocation and benediction.

The Rev. Glen C. Peterman, pastor of Hope Reformed Church, will deliver the baccalaureate sermon Sunday, June 9.

Announcement also was made that graduation exercises for 27 adults who qualify for high school diplomas will be held Friday, May 31, at Holiday Inn.

Eight public school teachers are retiring this year, Joan Brive, Grace Dorman, Della Lohman, Lena Lucas, Ann Notier, Eugene Prins, Marjorie Prins and Martha Thomas.

Board President James O. Lamb commented that the eight had spent 163 years in Holland, 56 elsewhere, for a total teaching of 219 years.

Leaves of absences for the 1974-75 school year were granted for Gwen Maatman, Sheryl Eastman and Mary Baron. Two teachers, Helen Brockmeier and Judy Anthop, who have been on leave the past year, have notified the board they are not returning next year.

Two teachers were approved for next year, Mrs. Donna Wehmeyer, a 1974 graduate of Grand Valley State College, teaching special ed in hearing impaired, and John Permisang, a 1974 Grand Valley graduate, teaching in Federal School.

A seven-page report on bilingual/bicultural education in Holland public schools revealed that the committee had met almost weekly and the report was based on the concept that people who have bilingual skills and understandings have assets which are valuable and advantageous. The report reviewed migrant programs at Federal, Lincoln and Washington Schools, and other programs carried on in the elementary, junior high and high school levels.

The committee recommended that the board appoint an advisory committee to meet monthly with the assistant superintendent to review and assess bilingual activities in the school district.

Several new textbooks were approved for the 1974-75 school year in science, health, social studies and foreign languages.

A pilot spelling program was approved for grades 1-5 in Van Raalte School.

With Apple Avenue School being taken over for administrative headquarters next year, the board approved recommended assignment of sixth graders from Holland Heights, Lincoln and Van Raalte Schools. Some will be bused to Montello and Jefferson Schools.

Some 15 persons were in the audience, including candidates for the school board at the June 10 election. Resolutions pertaining to the election were approved.

The board approved a recommendation to employ the firm of William P. De Long and Co. to audit the 1973-74 records of the school district in the areas of general fund, swimming pool, debt retirement, building and education and child accounting.

In comments from the audience, Boyd Berens asked whether some better policy of physical education examinations could be considered.

All members were present except John Weeber, President Lamb presided and John Amaya gave the invocation. The meeting lasted just under one hour.

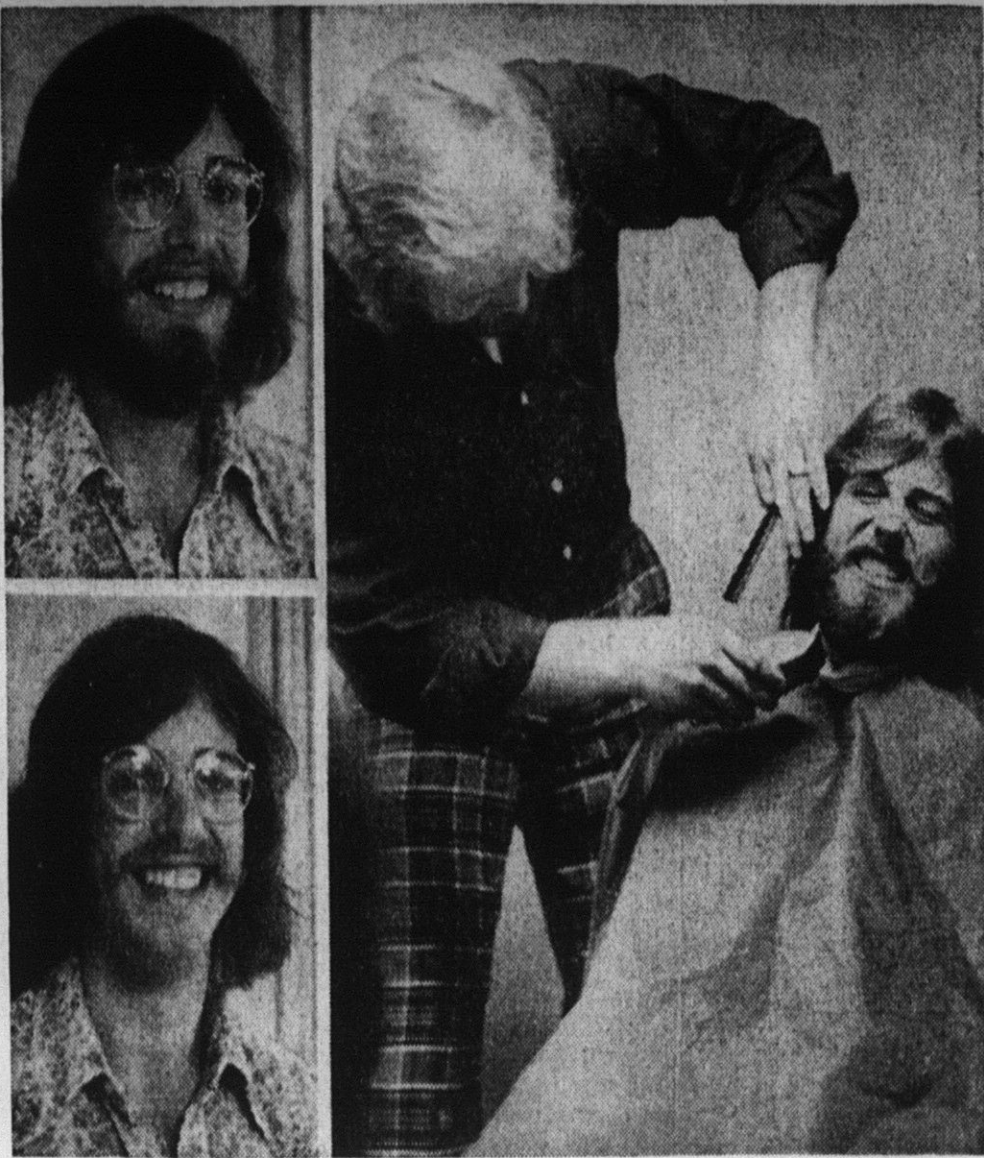

## Proposed County Road Program Set

GRAND HAVEN—A proposed 1975 road program of the Ottawa County Road Commission amounting to \$1,424,850 was accepted by the Ottawa County Board of Commissioners Monday.

Included were several roads in the Holland area. The proposed 1975 road commission budget also included \$170,000 for park improvements, maintenance and operation and \$106,150 for bridge improvement.

The total proposed budget, including federal and state funds, amounts to \$5,432,150. County commissioners are to take final action on the county requested funds during the 1975 budget sessions.

Road programs proposed for 1975 include improvements to Port Sheldon Rd. and 96th Ave. east of 104th Ave. one mile and from Bingham St. to Blair St.; State Rd. from 144th to 136th Ave.; Adams St. from Holland's city limits to 96th Ave. and Ottawa Beach Rd. from 152nd Ave. to 144th Ave.

Proposed park improvements call for lights at Tunnel Park.

Commissioners accepted a proposed plan for an additional building at Hager Hardwood Park and authorized the taking of bids not to exceed \$105,000.

Commissioner James K. Dressel of Holland asked about plans for bike trails in the county.

Road Commission member Franklin Schmidt of Coopersville submitted 19-page report to commissioners in which the road commission asked the county commissioners to have a data report prepared concerning non motorized transportation and that if a deficiency is shown in present facilities a plan be prepared to meet the needs.

The road commission also

Winstrom's suggestion was adopted by commissioners.

## County To Study Needs For Space

GRAND HAVEN — Ottawa County Commissioners decided Monday to take a long-range look at county building needs and priorities after preliminary plans were submitted for new Community Haven facilities at Eastmanville.

Commissioner Donald E. Stoltz made the suggestion after calling attention to county plans for additional office space in Grand Haven.

Drawings were presented for a proposed 60-bed modern facility at Community Haven replacing existing buildings dating as far back as 1886. Estimated cost of the proposed facility was \$700,000. Community Haven, formerly known as the county farm, averages about 55 to 60 residents, mostly older men and women who cannot afford private senior citizen homes.

Commissioners received a cold-shoulder from Zeeland City in a survey sent to governmental units on costs of mapping and computerizing tax records. The county has decided to share in costs of previous work done by the units as the county prepares to offer county-wide mapping and computer services.

Zeeland City Clerk Leon Van Harn said he served on a county tax computer committee which recommended such a service but it was turned down by county commissioners.

Since Zeeland has gone to its own mapping system and computer system Van Harn said he saw little advantage for additional expense to alter the systems to meet county specifications.

He also complained about a lack of information or action on past suggestions to the commissioners regarding mapping and tax computerization before Zeeland went ahead with their programs.

## Preceptor Tau Has Program By Mrs. Centolella

Mrs. Albert Centolella, who recently returned from Ohio where she visited several of the burial mounds and ceremonial enclosures built by the Adena and Hopewell cultures, presented a program for members of Preceptor Tau Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi in her home Monday evening.

These prehistoric burial mounds were built during a span of approximately 2,000 years before the arrival of the Spanish in the Caribbean. Although there is no written record of their achievements, archaeologists have found a high degree of civilization and have been puzzled by their use of materials, artistic pottery and construction of circle, octagon and ellipse embankments, many of which can be seen only from the air.

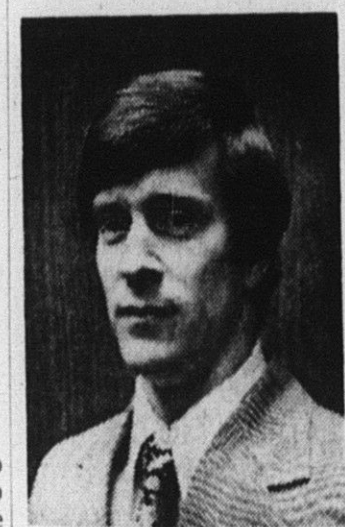
