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## Bike Routes Given Okay By Council

Two bicycle routes, one east-west and another north-south, were approved by City Council Wednesday night.

As outlined by the city manager, the east-west route begins on South Shore Dr. at Old Orchard Rd., extending east to 16th St. and continuing on 16th St. to Hope Ave., and north to Paw Paw Dr.

The north-south route starts on Central Ave. at the south city limits, extending north on Central to Third St., west on Third to River Ave. and north on River to the city limits.

Both routes are designed to connect with possible bike routes in adjacent communities and will be signed in compliance with the Michigan Manual of Traffic Control Devices.

A gift of \$2,500 was announced from the Holland Optimist Club to finance the program, mainly some 88 signs, two-thirds of them on existing poles. Cost of the signs and additional poles is estimated at \$2,000, excluding labor.

Council vote on approving the plan and acknowledging the Optimist Club's generous gift was unanimous.

In other business, Council approved a 90-day trial period whereby the Department of Environmental Health will conduct plumbing inspections in Zeeland for stated fees. The report stated that Zeeland was informed recently that the state of Michigan no longer will conduct plumbing inspections for Zeeland citizens.

A city manager report stated that after the April 21 Council meeting his office received calls from the Tulip Time office and several businesses requesting permission to erect festival signs earlier than the normal because of early blooming. Council was polled for concurrence, and action was confirmed at the meeting.

Council approved low bid of American Coating Corp. of Rochester of \$8,095.70 for improvements at the Moran tennis courts, the first major improvements since the courts were built with WPA funds many years ago.

A suggestion from Councilman Al Kleis Jr. for a sidewalk on the west side of Fairbanks Ave. from Eighth St. to 16th St. was referred to the city manager for study.

A March of Dimes "Super Walk Day" May 8 in Holland was declared on suggestion of Councilman Donald D. Oosterbaan.

The city assessor presented a special assessment roll on a water main in Brooklane Ave. from Eighth St. to Harvard Dr. at a total cost of \$7,812.86, with \$6,578.14 to be assessed property owners. Public review is scheduled June 2.

A claim against the city from Raymond C. Schumacher was referred to the city's insurance carrier and the city attorney.

Council unanimously approved a change order to the contract of Kamminga and Roodvoets on improvements and resurfacing of 64th St. from Lincoln to Ottawa Ave. The order calls for a 10-foot extension of a metal culvert at the easterly end of the project at an additional cost of \$4,965.

BPW General Manager Frank Whitney introduced Tim Moroski, the department's new engineering supervisor. Earlier in the meeting, Council had placed this position in the unclassified service effective July 1.

## Charge Four Men In Property Theft

Four Lansing area young men demanded examination in Holland District Court Friday to charges of receiving and concealing stolen property. All were held in the Ottawa County jail in lieu of \$2,000 bond each to return May 6.

Ottawa county deputies arrested the four men Thursday for possession of stolen property and recovered 2,000 pounds of brass which had been reported taken from the Lansing area.

Charged were Randall F. Howard and James Warner, both 18, and Donald Swingelhurst all of Lansing, and Steven Eastman, 19, of East Lansing. Swingelhurst's age was not available.

Holland firemen were called to the Alvin Risselada residence, 531 Graafschap Rd. Friday at 10:39 p.m. where a fire in a dryer was reported. Firemen said damage was confined to the dryer.

## Appreciation Day Is Huge Success

"Appreciation Day for a Pair-O-Docs" Thursday brought a warm glow to the entire Holland area.

Outpouring of love and appreciation flowed all day long, at public receptions in Holland Hospital and Hope Reformed Church and climaxed by a dinner in Phelps Hall on Hope College campus honoring two brothers, Dr. William G. Winter and Dr. John K. Winter, who retired April 1 after 40 years of practice in Holland.

Police were on hand to handle traffic jams at Hope Church in the afternoon. The honored guests had no trouble since they had limousine service all day.

A total of 420 persons gathered for the climactic dinner, a light nostalgic event geared to "Thanks for the Memories," a refrain with original words sung often by a quartet in scrub clothes called "The Cut-Ups." A slide presentation on "A Tale of Two Citizens" by "Ain't I the Dickens" paralleled duplicate scrapbooks prepared by Fritz Sennett.

"It was a Winter day in spring" when the Winter twins entered this world in 1909, Mrs. Sennett intoned as a slide of two wide-eyed babies in a twin buggy appeared. Then followed slides of the house where they were born, the house where they grew up, school days, medical school, marriages and an overall look at two dedicated careers of "above and beyond the call" of service.

Mrs. Sennett had scrounged pictures from many sources, but the choice snapshots came from the twins' 91-year-old mother, Mrs. W. G. Winter Sr., an honored guest at the dinner, along with the families which included Dr. Bill's sons, Bill and Paul, and Dr. John's sons, John and Jim.

Vernon D. Ten Cate as master of ceremonies called attention to an avalanche of resolutions and messages of congratulations and best wishes. Mayor Lou Hallacy presented a resolution passed by City Council April 21

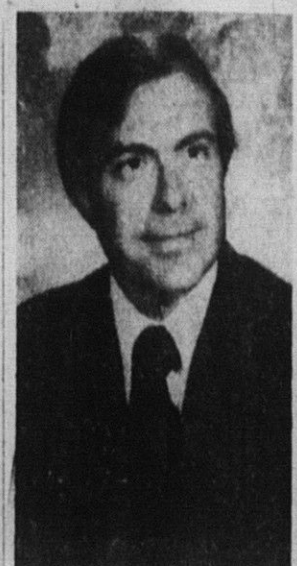
## Lightfoot Named Fell Principal

### Bradford Seeking Another Term On Board of Education

The appointment of David L. Lightfoot, 38, Holland, as principal of E. E. Fell Junior High School succeeding John Noe, was announced at a special meeting of the Board of Education Monday afternoon.

Lightfoot has served as assistant principal at Holland High School for the last three years. Previously, he taught English and social studies at the high school for five years, coming here nine years earlier from Niles where he taught in junior and senior high schools.

The board accepted with regret the resignation of John Noe as junior high principal. Noe had expressed a desire to return to classroom teaching,

and Supt. Donald L. Ihrman said there is an opening in his field in both high school and junior high. Noe has served as principal for 12 years.

Lightfoot attended Marshall High School, received a B.A. degree in history and English at Michigan State University, a master's degree in education from Western Michigan University, an Ed. S. degree in educational administration at Michigan State University, and presently is a candidate for a Ph.D. degree in administration from Michigan State.

He is married and has two children, Sue, a senior at Holland High, and John, a seventh grader at E. E. Fell Junior High. His wife Janet teaches home economics at the high school. Lightfoot is an active member of First United Methodist Church. The family lives at 155 West 35th St.

Announcement also was made that Charles Bradford, president of the Board of Education, has filed petitions for another four-year term at the June 14 election. His is the only term expiring this year on the seven-member board. Other candidates must file not later than 4 p.m. May 14.

The meeting was called primarily to adopt certain resolutions for a new \$4.7 million junior high school which will be on the June 14 ballot. The Holland district lies in Holland city and Holland, Park and Laketown townships.

President Bradford presided at the 20-minute meeting. All members were present.

Rev. Stott is an internationally known pastor, lecturer and writer. He is Rector Emeritus of All Souls with St. Peter's Church in London. He has conducted preaching missions in a number of universities in Britain, North America, Australia, New Zealand, Africa and Asia. He has been chairman of the Church of England Evangelical Council since 1967 and Joint Honorary Secretary of the Evangelical Fellowship in the Anglican Communion since its formation in 1962. He will serve as chairman of the National Evangelical Anglican Congress in the United Kingdom in 1977.

Among his best known books are "Basic Christianity" (1958, 1971), "The Epistles of John" (1964), "Christ the Controversialist" (1970), "Balanced Christianity" (1975) and "Christian Mission in the Modern World" (1975).

Addressing the graduating seniors at commencement will be Dr. James Malcolm, Dean for the Performing and Fine Arts and Professor of Theatre at Hope College. The senior class chose to invite a faculty member to give the commencement address in lieu of the traditional outside speaker.

## Holland Schools Begin Alternative Education Plan

An alternative education program designed for students who have lost interest in school and may get into trouble serious enough for court intervention, is being offered by the Holland Public Schools.

The program is being held at the Youth for Christ clubhouse in downtown Holland and offers classroom instruction in basic fundamentals as well as field trips into the community and work programs in industry, hospital, the schools and service organizations.

Funding for the program comes from the school board, state and federal sources.

The alternative education program has six students and will be expanded to 15. Although it is largely unstructured and allows the pursuit of individual interests and goals it will contain substantial amounts of reading, mathematics and social rehabilitation and will be run by a licensed teacher.

The operational program followed studies two years ago by a committee of teachers and administrators from the school system. Recommendations were made and an alternative education advisory committee was formed and acted on the recommendations to work out details for the program.

## Ordinances Introduced At Council

Four new ordinances were received for first reading at a regular meeting of City Council Wednesday night in City Hall.

Three of them concerned rezoning and were recommended by the Planning Commission. Public hearings are scheduled June 2.

The fourth prohibits anyone from leading an animal, fowl or reptile in any park owned or maintained by the city of Holland. After expected passage two weeks hence, proper signs will be posted at all park entrances.

One rezoning request is on request of Hope College to rezone property in an area bounded by 13th and 14th Sts. running from Columbia Ave. to the C and O tracks from industrial to B-2 Central Apartment. This is in connection with constructing a physical education center.

The other rezoning request came from Reliable Cycle and Ski Haus to rezone the westerly 41½ feet of its site at 254 River Ave. from A-2 residential to C-3 central commercial.

The zoning ordinance text amendment concerns height and sideyard requirements for permitted nonresidential uses in B-1 and B-2 residential zones plus an amendment for parking requirements in connection with marinas or other commercial uses that are conducted predominantly outdoors.

Council acknowledged several gifts. One was \$300 from Donnelly Mirrors and \$35 from Holland Evening Sentinel for the summer camping program for underprivileged youth under the Community Services Unit of the Holland Police Department. Gift books to Herrick Public Library also were acknowledged with thanks.

And Mayor Lou Hallacy reported the gift of \$1 from three conscientious youngsters concerned with air pollution and litter cleanup. They requested that the donation go to the electrostatic precipitator installation at the Board of Public Works power plant for smoke abatement.

Council held a public hearing on the proposed construction of a sanitary sewer in Waverly Rd. from Eighth St. to M-21 and in both sides of M-21 from Waverly Rd. east for a distance of 670 feet. A letter from Hamilton Mfg. and Supply Co. requested that its property be excluded from the project. Donald Thomas, of First National Bank, spoke in favor of such a sewer since the bank has just constructed a branch in that area. Council tabled the subject pending developments on bonding, etc.

Council accepted with regret the resignation of Celestino Reyes from the Police-Community Relations Unit Advisory Committee.

A communication from the Michigan Liquor Control Commission advising that application for a new SDM license has been made by Ward Hansen to be held in conjunction with an existing 1976-77 SDM licensed business at 20 West Eighth St. was referred to the city manager.

No objections were voiced at a public hearing on an application from Trans-Matic Mfg. Co. for an industrial facilities exemption certificate on machinery located at 445 West 22nd St. and Council unanimously approved the application.

A petition from The Beta Group, 603 East 16th St., requesting water service in Old Settlers Rd. between 13th and 16th Sts., was referred to the city manager.

Also referred to the city manager was a petition for sewer service in Grandview Ave. from Eighth St. north to the end.

A letter from Holland Cab Co. advising that it is forced to discontinue passenger service as of May 31 due to federal regulations governing taxi operators was accepted as information.

By a 5-3 vote, council approved a Hospital Board request to purchase property at 177 West 25th St. for \$34,000 to expand its parking facilities. Casting dissenting votes were Hazen Van Kampen, Bea Weststrate and Donald Oosterbaan.

The Hospital Board also informed Council that it will accept the responsibility for promoting an election on a Hospital Authority made up of the city and interested surrounding townships, and asked Council to initiate the proper action to place this question on the Aug. 3 ballot.

Mayor Hallacy welcomed the E. E. Fell Community Affairs class to the meeting.

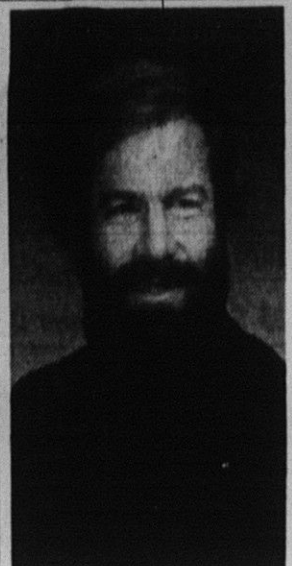

Providing entertainment were the Tulip Town Tuners, a

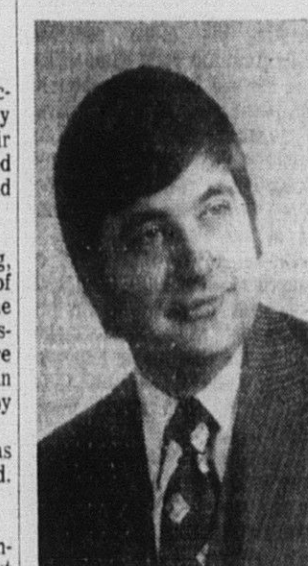
kitchen band of women ages 60-80, who were dressed in delightful costumes and presented a variety of tunes.

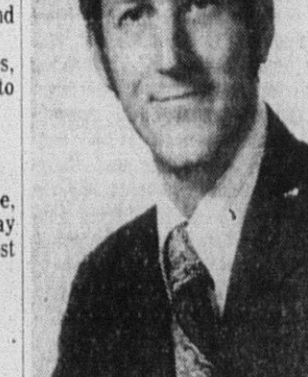

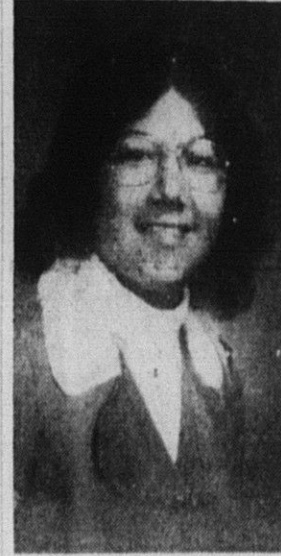

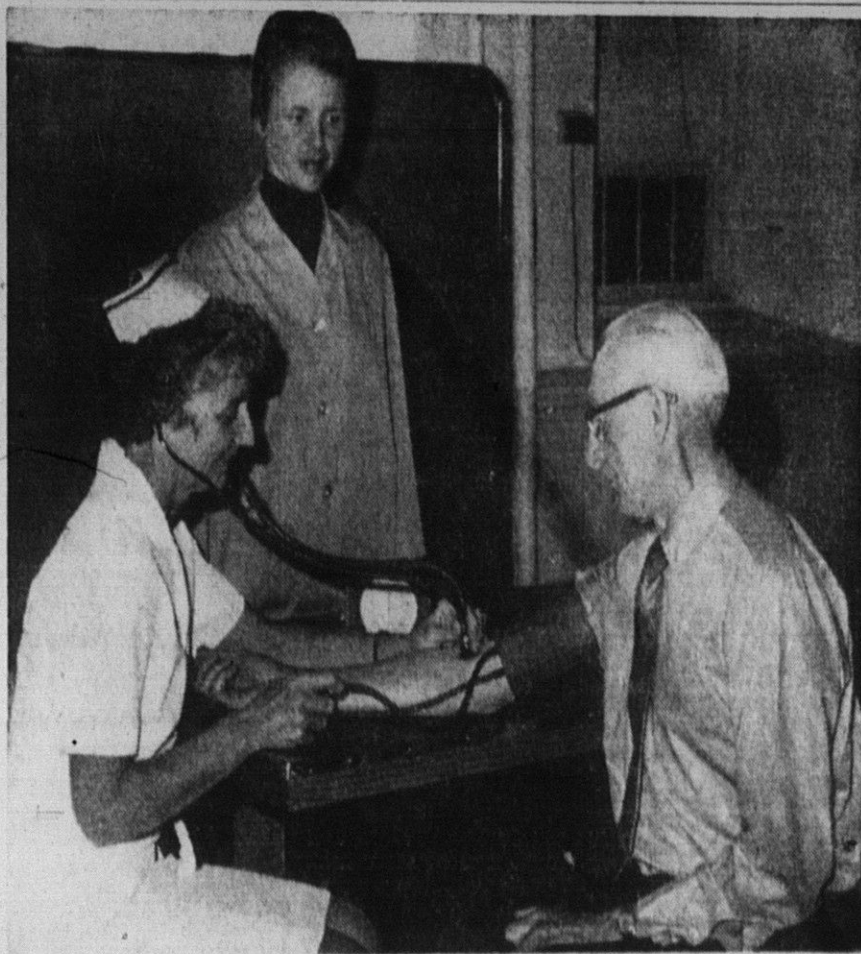

The expanded occupational safety field includes biological, chemical and mechanical safety, noise protection, fire control and safety laws and regulations.



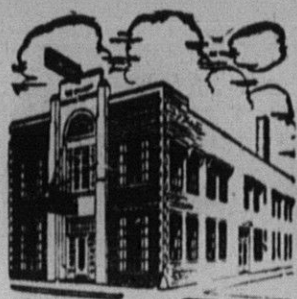

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#### DON'T KID YOURSELF

When a nation allows its bureaucrats to set the rules and regulations under which it will live, it is already far down the road in its loss of freedom. Ask any man in business or industry about the thousands of pages of regulations under which he must operate, regulations that have been instituted by some chaps seated in a Washington office. And these bureaucrats become not only his legislators, but his policemen and judge.

Recently George C. Roche III, President of Hillsdale College, speaking at Wabash College, warned his colleagues that they face total loss of freedom from such bureaucratic control. He said: "A current IRS memorandum now suggests that tax exemption itself should be considered a governmentally granted privilege, to be maintained only by those institutions entirely subservient to government regulation."

We think President Roche III is right. We will soon be dominated by a host of social engineers in Washington who will enlarge their own power through rules over which not even congress has any immediate control. The time for all of us to not what is happening is here. And there is no time to lose. If we want freedom, we will have to fight for it. Keep on writing our elected and appointed government people.

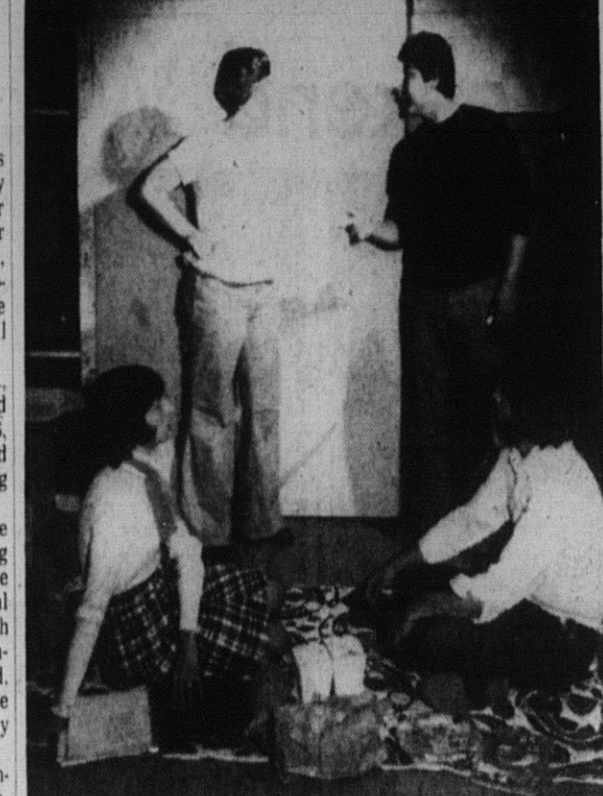

Rob De Hollander and Marie Hamilton are the genuinely likeable Paul Friedman and Anne Miller, who meet and move toward an inevitable relationship with an air of almost-innocence. "I've worked with next year's seniors as freshmen," commented Teusink.

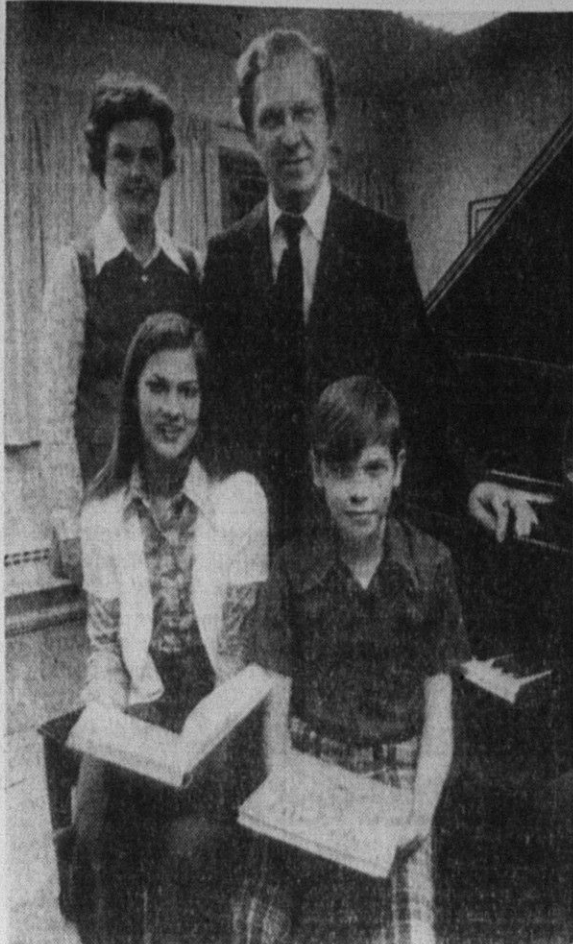

## HHS Shop Sports Special Shirt Stock

The only place in town stocking "Bertsch Shirts" is a unique shop which will soon be completing its second year of operation.

The unusual item which bears a portrait of Holland High School principal Fred Bertsch is available for only \$3.75 at the shop managed by the retailing class. (According to student sources the pictured person himself purchased shirts for his sailing crew.)

Located centrally in the west unit, the "Dutch Hut" features food items: oranges, candy, crackerjack, donuts and beef jerky among others.

The shop is intended to complement, not compete with the items provided in the commercial self-serve machines.

Non food items range from earrings and nail polish to shoe laces and socks.

Under the direction of instructor Joyce Bertran, the students are well-versed in all phases of retailing including purchasing, record keeping, inventory, income statements, restocking, advertising and displaying in the window facing the commons area.

The store utilizes a new electronic cash register valued at \$1500 purchased with state funds. The register has been invaluable, according to Ms. Bertran, in teaching the retailing students a practical operation.

A community advisory committee composed of local merchants assists the students with many aspects of retailing and a few have had first hand experience in designing window displays for businesses including "The Staircase."

Students staff the store which grosses approximately \$175 per week. Profits are returned to the school system. Initially local merchants assisted the project by donating merchandise at wholesale prices.

Though the shop sells jogging suits, buddy shirts in red and white and mesh shirts, the popular apparel is still a "Bertsch shirt."

## Zeeland Council Adopts Budget With Tax Hike

**ZEELAND** — City Council Monday night adopted its 1976-77 budget following a public hearing at which no citizens were present. The budget calls for a 6 mills increase in the tax levy to 13.1 mills.

The budget shows total expenditures of \$809,933, down from the current budget, but a tax increase was necessary to pay for capital improvements such as a new fire station and new fire truck.

The resignation of Hilbert Vanden Bosch from the area land use committee was accepted. The next regular meeting of council was changed to Tuesday, May 18, to avoid a conflict with mayor's exchange day activities planned for Monday.
