Service clubs of Holland will gather in Christian High School Friday noon for their annual Tulip Time luncheon, a popular festival feature since the days of World War II. The event is sponsored by the Inter-Club Council which has representatives from each of the six service clubs and the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Speaker this year will be Ted Malone whose pre-eminence as a performer and producer is based on 25 years in radio and television.

He has done everything from writing two serial shows a day while program director in Kansas City to covering the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II for a network. He has written and produced scores of shows of all kinds for all four major networks. As a roving reporter he has made 27 trips to Europe and has traveled around the world broadcasting everywhere from Iceland to Shanghai. During World War II he served as war correspondent for ABC, returning to do his own show for Westinghouse for six years.

Malone has interviewed champion hog callers and tycoons, as well as interviewing the man who sells out-of-town newspapers in Times Square, the man who is president of United States Steel, and a night watchman at Coney Island. He has broadcast from apple festivals, azalea festivals, cherry festivals, deep sea fishing rodeos, state fairs, Broadway stadiums, Hollywood sound stages and the Mardi Gras.

In his trip around the world, Malone has hit the top and the bottom. He was guest at a birthday party given by Queen Juliana of the Netherlands, was decorated by the President of France, had an audience with the Pope, lunched with General MacArthur in Tokyo, walked, barefooted through the Taj Mahal, carried a candle through the Roman catacombs, rode in Olympic boats, and flew over the wartime Hump between India and Chungking.

Parachutes Failed Again

The launching of "Firebird II" Wednesday evening by Carl Woltman and John Merrill Jr. was about half-way successful.

The nine and a half foot, 32-pound rocket went up well, but the parachute mechanism, designed to lower the rocket and its movie camera cargo gently to the ground, failed again.

The rocket crashed to earth about 500 feet from the launching platform, burying itself about two and a half feet deep in the earth and smashing the camera.

Woltman said the springs in the parachute mechanism may have been too weak to push the two chutes out, but this will be remedied for the next try — with camera. The diaphragm was also a little too thin, Woltman said, burning out and preventing the rocket from reaching the height attained by the March 26 shot.

A large crowd of spectators watched the firing, which took place at 6:20 p.m. from the site of the Old Tulip City Airport.

Hope College Faculty Dames were rather embarrassed Wednesday when the head of a plywood Dutch lady figure fell off. They were smart enough to remedy the situation by providing a cap so that visitors could stand behind the figure, wearing the cap, to have their pictures taken. The idea was so good that they decided to knock the head off the man figure as well. The figures are costumed in authentic Dutch costumes and are standing near Voorbees Hall on the Hope College campus.

A new innovation in parade marching this year was introduced by the E. E. Fell Junior High School band, all wearing wooden shoes with their snappy Navy Blue uniforms. They stepped right along and nobody seemed to have any trouble with blisters.

During the many practice sessions of the klompen dancers, Fred Oldemulders, the wooden shoe carver, was on hand with his tools to "doctor any wooden shoes which gave trouble. A small hollow here or there helps a great deal in avoiding blisters. Of course, those six to eight pairs of sox the dancers wear serve as a good conditioner.

During the klompen dancing Wednesday night at Civic Center, one dancer cast aside a shoe. It wasn't broken, and a spectator handed it back, but the girl declined. It seems that the keys she had put into her sock for safekeeping had slipped down. She finished the dance with one shoe. Dutch costumes do not have copious pockets and dancers have been known to put their billfolds, combs and what-not into their socks.

Gov. G. Mennen Williams rode in a \$50,000 Chrysler Imperial in Wednesday's events. The company maintains four such snappy open numbers for ceremonial occasions. One is kept in Detroit, another in Dallas, Tex., the third on the west coast and the fourth in New York. The car here for Tulip Time is the one kept at Detroit. It came here from Benton Harbor where it was used in Blossom Time activities last week.

A total of 18,700 pieces of mail went through the cancelling machine at Holland post office Wednesday. That's 4,000 to 5,000 more than the general run for a comparable day. We're betting that 99 per cent of the increase was picture postcards for Tulip Time.

Azhar Ali Khan, the journalism student from Karachi, Pakistan, who spent three months at The Sentinel last summer in connection with his journalism studies at the University of Michigan, returned to Holland Wednesday for Tulip Time. He was on assignment to do some Tulip Time stories for the Grand Rapids Press and for the Flint Journal. To get the true atmosphere of Holland's unique festival, he donned a Dutch costume and the wooden shoes which The Sentinel news staff had given him last year and walked Holland streets just like the other burghers.

Everybody likes Dutch food, especially during Tulip Time in Holland, so many church groups and other organizations each year help ease the food problem by serving meals at various locations. This year meals may be obtained at the Woman's Literary Club, The Christian High School gym and at the Youth for Christ Clubhouse.

One of the first-come, first-served parade watchers at Wednesday's Volk Parade was bothered by the heat of the sun beating down in the hours before the parade began. She found the answer to her problem, at least in part, by removing a "No Parking" bag covering parking meters and wearing it as a sun helmet.

Renovation Planned At Christian

Trustees Approve Plans
For New Construction
In Science Laboratory

Holland Christian Board of Trustees took big steps in its science laboratory renovation program at its regular monthly meeting Tuesday night. The board adopted recommendations of the Construction Committee which gives the approval to begin work early in June.

The recommendations approved were to proceed with renovation including work to be done by carpenters, plumbers and electricians at an approximate cost of \$5,500; to purchase equipment for a new chemistry laboratory; to proceed with the conversion of the present chemistry-physics lab into a physics lab only; to proceed with the modernization of the present biology lab and to construct a new biology lab at a cost not to exceed \$30,000.

Action was made possible since the transfer of the 7th and 8th grade pupils from the old high school building effective September 1958 is assured, Supt. Bert P. Bos said. At the last meeting of the school society, the group had authorized the board to proceed with this program at an approximate cost of \$35,000.

Three teachers must still be procured for the school year, 1958-1959, Supt. Bos also reported to the school board. A total of 16 new teachers have already signed contracts to teach in the local Christian schools next school year. Reassignments have filled three other positions.

Two of the vacancies remaining are in the grades, including a principal, while the other is in the high school, the superintendent said. The board confirmed the appointments of five of the new teachers Tuesday night.

Named to teach in the Rose Park Christian School is Miss Cornelia Steenwyk who will receive her degree from Calvin College this June. Another new teacher slated for the Central Avenue and Fifteenth Street School is Vernon Reidsma who has had considerable teaching experience in the Beechwood Public Schools. A transfer of assignment was also confirmed by the board when it was reported that Garrett Keuning, the principal of the South Side School, requested a teaching position only at the Rose Park School.

Two new teachers were appointed to the high school. Named to teach Latin is Norlyn Wolterink of Grand Rapids. He will receive his degree at Calvin College this June. Also slated for an assignment in the high school English department is Phillip Persenaire of Ontario, Canada. He graduated from Calvin in 1956 and is at present serving in the armed forces.



Karsten Busy With Band Day

Big Responsibility
Of Saturday Events
An All-Year Job

When the last strains of "America the Beautiful" fade into the distance in the finale of the Tulip Time Varieties Saturday night, Harold J. Karsten will likely draw a sigh of relief and figure he's done with Tulip Time ... for a few months.

Karsten, a stalwart on the Tulip Time staff for many years, carries tremendous responsibility for the festival's biggest day. On Saturday, he takes charge of the three-hour band review which features intricate maneuvers by 18 competing marching bands, oversees the big massed band spectacle, helps line up bands for the big parade of bands involving an orderly retreat from Riverview Park, and virtually single handedly plans the Variety program Saturday night, long a festival favorite.

To accomplish all these tasks, Karsten starts months ahead of time. Always on the lookout for new talent for the Variety show, Karsten is sometimes called the Ed Sullivan of Tulip Time, and he often has a line on certain acts involving bookings far in advance.

Planning a band review follows more stylized preparation. Months in advance he sends brochures to bandmasters all over Michigan. There's usually a big exchange of correspondence all around and in due time contracts are signed and the program takes shape.

Karsten likes to operate his programs on a split second schedule and bandmasters throughout the state have come to recognize and appreciate this gift. When a director receives final instructions listing perhaps an eight-minute performance at 1:52 p.m., he can almost set his watch at that time. The only threat that can upset this delicately geared schedule is rain. In all the years the band review has been staged, this happened only once and then the review was delayed about an hour.

\$10,000 Fire Destroys Barn

A fire of undetermined origin Wednesday completely destroyed a barn, chicken house and brooder coop, along with 12 head of cattle, 900 chicks, farm machinery, hay and straw at the farm of Clarence Boeve, of 32nd St., route 5, Holland.

Boeve said damages from the fire would be in excess of \$10,000, but said the loss was covered by insurance.

Boeve and his son, Spencer, 13, had just gone to the barn shortly before 5 p.m., he said, when suddenly the barn seemed to "explode" into flame, nearly trapping the two men.

Several head of cattle managed to break free and save themselves, Boeve said, but eight cows, three heifers and a bull perished in the flames.

Holland Township Fire Department No. 1 and 3 battled the fire for over three hours, from 5 p.m. until 8 p.m. Fire Chief Alvin Potter said the buildings were beyond saving when firemen arrived, and the firemen worked mainly to contain the blaze.

Boeve theorized that a sparrow might have carried a lighted cigarette butt into the barn.

Also lost in the fire were a corn harvester, a tractor mower, a garden tractor and a 40-foot elevator.

3,000 Will Take Part In Parade

Gov. Williams Leads
400 Street Scrubbers
In Wednesday's Parade

Holland reveled in another day of ideal weather today as plans went forward for the Children's parade this afternoon, a festival attraction which many people feel is the most appealing spectacle of Holland's famous Tulip Time.

Holland schools are on short schedule during the four days of Tulip Time, and classes this morning probably did not receive the undivided attention of the young fry eager to don their Dutch costumes and march in the parade while admiring parents and visitors view from the sidelines.

Russell Welch, Lincoln school principal, is marshal for today's parade, an assignment he has filled for many years. Children are divided by grades with all kindergartners marching together, followed by first graders, second graders, etc. Younger children keep their lines straight by grasping long poles. This age division keeps the parade well paced.

Parade attractions include tiny floats, one made by each school on a child's wagon, instead of a four-wheeled trailer. Children will carry huge tulips, flower baskets, Dutch plates and many other props dealing with Dutch traditions. All school bands will be out. In all, 3,000 children will participate.

Holland's 29th Tulip festival got off to an auspicious start Wednesday with Gov. G. Mennen Williams joining more than 400 local burghers in the traditional street scrubbing ceremony. The governor and first lady arrived at the local airport at 12:45 p.m. and received National Guard and police escorts into Holland where they were luncheon guests of Dr. and Mrs. I. J. Lubbers on Hope campus.

Ernest C. Brooks of Holland, longtime friend was official host.

Estimates on Wednesday's crowd ranged from 30,000 to 50,000 persons. One thing was certain. With this bad weather in several years, the crowds were larger than the last few years and the visitors seemed to be a happy lot as they watched parades, toured tulip lanes, visited the tulip farm and patronized other Tulip Time attractions such as the flower show in the Armory, Little Netherlands and Netherlands Museum.

Paul Winchester was chairman of Wednesday afternoon's events and did a masterful job in recruiting a larger number of scrubbers than ever before and lining up a parade which some persons said was bigger than usual. There were many floats, several visiting bands in addition to the seven school bands of Holland, and several other interesting features.

At the close of the parade were lines and lines of klompen dancers who took their appointed places and went through their paces of their spirited dance which has become a traditional highlight of Tulip Time. The girls also performed at 7 p.m. in the Civic Center parking lot. They will dance there again tonight at 7 p.m., Friday at 4:30 p.m., and will give two performances Saturday, first at 3 p.m. on the parade route and again at the Tulip Time Varieties at Riverview Park.

Tonight's attractions include klompen dancing at 7 p.m. and the second performance of "The Red Mill," a Victor Herbert musical put on by Hope College music and drama departments in Civic Center. The Dutch Fantasies, an hour-long show in the Woman's Literary Club, is presented three times daily and four times on Saturday.

Friday will not feature a parade, giving residents and visitors something of a rest before launching wholeheartedly into Band Day Saturday which always attracts the biggest crowds. Saturday's highlights are the three-hour band review and the Parade of Bands in the afternoon and the Variety show at night.

Victory String Snapped For Holland High Netters

Kazoo U-High Stops Streak After 66 Wins

Like a broken tennis racket, the string snapped for Holland High's tennis team at the 21st St. courts Thursday as Kalamazoo University High won a 4-3 decision and ended a consecutive Dutch winning streak that had reached 66 straight and spread over nearly five years.

But rackets can be re-strung and Holland's netters will begin its mending job and what it hopes will be the start of a new string today at Grand Haven.

The string that broke Thursday just didn't snap. Rather it wore out after a fierce struggle. The final break came in the No. 3 doubles where a couple of first year Holland netters played as best they could but couldn't provide the polish to take command.

Junior Chuck Ritters and sophomore Larry Johnson, who was bothered with a sore back, lost the deciding match to Bob Tracy and Bill Whitbeck, 6-4, 5-7, 7-9.

After the first two gruelling sets, the Dutch duo came from behind in the third set and tied the score at five games all and then took the lead, 6-5 but they missed on the match point.

Later with the match, 7-6 and Holland leading, the local pair again failed. But the University duo had similar setbacks and before finally winning the match, had match point on two occasions.

Ironically, it was University High, then Western State High, that handed Holland its last defeat, also 4-3 in the final match of the 1953 season. Since that time, the Dutch went through four straight years of dual meets and seven matches this season unbeaten.

Kalamazoo's Dick Colby, nationally ranked in the under 15 bracket, stopped Jack Hulst in the No. 1 singles match, 6-3, 6-4 and Bob Gill of Kalamazoo, son of John Gill, Western Michigan University athletic director, defeated Jack Damson of Holland, 6-2, 6-2 in the No. 2 singles.

Burt Wiersma came through for the Dutch with a 6-2, 6-4 win over Brad Hodgeman of University High in the No. 3 spot but Wayne Overway fell to Tom Wierman of Kalamazoo, 6-0, 6-2.

Bob Teall and Bill Bouman of Holland won over Ed Germrich and Jack Schrier, 6-2, 5-7 and 7-5 in the No. 1 doubles and Harley Hill and Ron Yonker knotted the match at 3-3 all with their 6-3, 6-3 win over George Brown and Kim Sebaly.

University High is coached by Carl Engles. Many of the players on the two teams battle each other in various state summer tournaments. Holland plays at Kalamazoo May 20.

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

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

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THE COMEBACK OF THE SUCKER

Out of Petoskey comes the story of the comeback of the fish known to oldtimers as the "sucker." In that part of the state the sucker is returning to the dinner table of the public. Its low price of eight cents a pound is one of its recommendations, but the people of northern Michigan are also discovering that, when properly prepared, the sucker is worthy of the attention, if not exactly of the gourmet, yet of those who are reasonably catholic in their eating habits.

In the Petoskey area more than 1,000 suckers a day are being netted, but the demand considerably exceeds the supply. Until fairly recently the sucker catch was sold to poultry men and fed to the fowls. Now people are glad to add them to their own diet.

Although in the Holland area fish lovers are familiar with many other types of edible fish, the sucker never fell into such complete disfavor as it seems to have done farther north. At least, a dozen or fifteen miles from the lake, in the older days when transportation was less easy than it is today, and when streams like Black River were the only source of fish supply, people eagerly went after the sucker in the early spring days. And they prized them for the table, not for the poultry house.

Spearfishing was one of the favorite sports of rural fishermen in an older day. Equipped with a gunny sack, a four-lined spear, a kerosene lantern, and a pair of hipboots, the fisherman, in the dark of night, would wade into Black River at points where the sucker beds were known to be.

Carefully directing his light at the sleeping fish, the sportsman would spear his prey and toss it up on the bank for a companion to put into the gunny sack. It was perhaps not as exciting as landing a trout or a black bass or a pike with an expensive lure and line, but it had its points, as oldtimers who engaged in it will agree.

Or in a still older day, there was the fish trap — it was legal in those days, or at least the game wardens did not patrol the river so far from base, and ridding the stream of suckers was a benefit to other game fish. The fish trap had this advantage that it did its job night and day. There was a thrill in coming back to the trap and finding it filled with suckers, and occasionally another type of game fish — which later however were supposed to be tossed back into the water.

Yes, our grandparents knew that the sucker was good to eat. Their chickens didn't get them; the suckers were a welcome relief from a winter's diet of salt beef. Sucker fishing is still a fine way to spend some leisure time.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, May 18
God's People Tested
Numbers 13:30-33; 14:1-3; 14:19-24

We are all tested in life at some time or other. And by these testings we show what kind of people we are. In this lesson there is a story which has application to our times.

I. Faith makes a difference. When the Israelites got near the Promised Land Moses sent out twelve spies to go through the land and report what they found. Moses picked twelve men, each man was a leader in his tribe. They investigated the whole land from the south to the northern border and after thoroughly surveying the country they came back with a report, and with a cluster of grapes which was so large that it had to be carried on a pole by two men and they also brought "some pomegranates and figs." We can readily imagine that their return to the camp was an important event.

The whole group of spies agreed that the land was fertile. They said "We came to the land to which you sent us; it flows with milk and honey, and this is its fruit!" and then they showed what they had brought with them. They had not seen anything like that in the wilderness. The whole committee also stated that the people were strong and the cities well fortified.

The report produced a bad effect upon the people. They got frightened when they heard about the giants and the fortified cities and they were ready to return to Egypt. However two members of the investigating committee, Caleb and Joshua, stilled the people and spoke words of faith saying that they were able to take the country. Faith inspires men to take a risk, it dares to tackle difficult situations. Caleb and Joshua believed the promises of God and that is why they had a different spirit.

II. Unbelief always weakens. The majority report presented by the ten men. The ten brought in an evil report, they began a whispering campaign and frightened the people by their statements. They said, "They are stronger than we" and, "The land that devours its inhabitants" and "all the people are men of great stature" and besides, "we saw giants and we were in our own sight as grasshoppers, and so we were in their sight." These men surely had an inferiority complex. They forgot all about the grapes and fixed their attention upon the giants. They magnified the difficulties to such an extent that they first said the land was fertile and then stated that the land consumed its inhabitants — they had to work so hard to make a living.

There always have been leaders who say, "It cannot be done" and those who say, "With God's help we can do it." Cowardly, weak leadership in a church hurts and keeps the church from going forward. We must not think too much of ourselves but it is also wrong to think too little of ourselves. The report of the split committee discouraged the people and made them long to return to Egypt. The majority in this instance was wrong—the minority right. Often the minority is right.

III. God punishes and pardons people. The people murmured against God who had shown mighty works on their behalf and against Moses, God's appointed leader.

God wanted to destroy the nation but Moses pleaded with him to forgive and he did but God said that all the people from twenty years and up would die in the wilderness. They were unfit to enter the Promised Land. The whole nation would wander in the wilderness for forty years according to the number of days they had spied out the land, a year for every day. The ten men who had made the pessimistic report "died by the plague before the Lord." Some churches have had forty-year wanderings because they listened to weak unbelieving leaders.

ZEELAND (Special) — The Zeeland city council this week authorized a Civil Defense alert to be held in Zeeland on May 21 in conjunction with the federal government's test alert on that day.

A "devastated" area will be designated and isolated to simulate actual conditions of an attack, according to Pete Wolhuis, Civil Defense director for the Zeeland area.

Ambulances will be alerted and station wagons of the community will be used to transport "injured" persons. No one but the helmeted auxiliary police and armed Civil Defense workers will be allowed on the streets during the alert, Wolhuis said, which is expected to last about an hour and a half.





In sales of this type, the individual purchasing receives a certificate which he holds for 12 months. The owner has this 12-month period to redeem his property at the purchasing rate plus 1 per cent per month interest. If owners do not redeem within a 12-month period, the purchaser received a tax deed from the auditor general which he must record in the office of the Register of Deeds and then start legal proceedings for the purpose of clearing title.

Ten parcels reverted to the State of Michigan at the close of business Monday, May 5. These parcels were offered at the 1957 sale with no bids received. With the redemption period expired and no action from the owner to redeem, the property reverts to the State of Michigan.

The Maplewood Area Citizens Committee which has been promoting annexation of that district to the city of Holland today released a letter received from Wilfred F. Clapp of the Michigan Department of Public Instruction, clarifying what appeared to be contradictory statements from the state department in connection with school district reorganization.

The letter (text appears in full on page 10) concerned a story appearing in the Sentinel May 5 in which local representatives said Mr. Clapp and others of the state department pledged their cooperation to a reorganization of southside districts.

But Clapp's letter revealed this cooperation was promised only if the new political annexation proposal or proposals are defeated. "It is obvious that if these proposals are defeated something has to be done about the high school attendance of children. We told this group the same thing we told you about the desirability of a total merger with Holland. We stated that if this could not take place we would have to consider other alternatives, and that we felt that if the total merger should fail the total Holland community area should not have more than three school districts and three high schools, namely, one on the south side, one on the north, and Holland itself. The district on the south side should include the area already approved for consolidation in Allegan county plus the other areas on the south side of Lake Macatawa which do not annex to Holland."

The letter continues: "We feel so strongly that the best solution is a merger with the Holland District that we urge that every effort be made to work cooperatively with the Holland authorities and to study and re-study the whole question of school annexation and political annexation in its relationship to orderly community development and long term community planning."

The letter was addressed to Arthur F. Schwartz, chairman of the Maplewood Area Citizens Committee. It concerned a story on a separate reorganization of seven districts: Maplewood, Apple Ave., Federal, Montello Park, Van Raalte, Lakeview and Harrington. Proponents of this plan revealed at a meeting of the executive committee of Southside Organization and supervisors of Holland and Park township that the program was entirely practical and that the tax structure of the seven districts was sufficient to support its own high school. Representatives of the executive committee reported having met with Clapp, George Schutt and Dr. Bert Thorne in Lansing at which the state department allegedly pledged its cooperation to a reorganization of southside districts.

Clapp's introductory paragraph in his letter pointed out that where there is a difference of opinion regarding the best solutions, it is certainly possible, if not probable, that two perfectly honest and sincere people can listen to the same speaker or discussion and get two different interpretations of what was said.

Meanwhile, the Maplewood Area Citizens Committee is canvassing its district this week, calling on all voters and clarifying annexation issues. The district plans three separate meetings in the school for three different areas in Maplewood district.


Troopers estimated the damage to the left front door at \$35. The accident happened on US 16 in Fruitport.
