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## Allocation Fracas Still Unresolved

GRAND HAVEN — The Ottawa County Tax Allocations Commission and superintendents of Ottawa county schools squared off Wednesday morning in their annual "fracas" over sharing millage with schools, but a 3-3 tie resulted and the matter was referred to Prosecutor James Bussard for an opinion. The board will meet again May 22.

Superintendents and school board members from Holland, West Ottawa, Zeeland, Hudsonville, Spring Lake and Grand Haven were present.

"You seek to damage the schools in the county," Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte of West Ottawa said, "at a most critical time in the history of education." The allocation board has made no decision but the county seeks 4.50 mills to operate the county in 1969, compared with the 4.35 mills allocated for this year.

The school heads again protested the use of operating funds for capital improvements. Several said that the school systems must time and again go to the voters to obtain extra funds with which to finance building funds and to bolster their income. "Taxpayers are forever looking down our throats" to find out where the money goes," one school leader said. "The school men here today would like to see the county and the townships go to the public for extra millage," one educator said.

Chairman Fred Den Herder, county treasurer, said it is the duty of the board to study the budgets of the various units and allocate the millage. It has no other powers, such as to order any units to seek additional tax moneys.

Harvey Butler of Holland, who represents the school districts, urged that the board stabilize the allocations and leave them there; that Kent county has frozen the allocations for five years and has done away with the annual hassle over the division of the 15 mills.

Councilman Virgil Quebbeman of Grand Haven, who represents the cities on the board, again urged that the board of supervisors study its budget for 1969 and cut out many of the "free services" given to the rural townships. "These services should be paid for by the townships," he said.

Superintendents present were Mr. Van Raalte of West Ottawa, Don Ihmann of Holland, R. M. Van Volkinburg of Grand Haven, Richard Fonger of Spring Lake, Fred Schmidt of Coopersville and Ray Lokers of Zeeland. There were also several board members present.

Members of the allocation board are Den Herder, Supt. Jennie Kaufman of the education office, Butler, Quebbeman and Henry Ver Meer. Harris Nieuwma serves as clerk. Wednesday's meeting was the third session this year of the allocation group.

## Deputies Probe Two Breakins

Ottawa county sheriff's deputies are investigating two break-ins including that of a house under construction for Bill Haan on Sycamore Dr. in Park township. The break-in occurred sometime after 10 p.m. Tuesday.

Contractor Brad Witteveen noticed the break-in at 7 a.m. Wednesday. He told deputies several of his tools valued at \$469 were taken. Entry was made by going in the garage through a large open door and forcing a door leading to the house.

Mrs. Ralph Fik reported her house at 1638 South Shore Dr. was broken into sometime between 12:30 and 2:20 p.m. Tuesday when she was gone.

Deputies said entry was made by breaking glass in a rear door and reaching in to unlock the door. Items missing included a pink jewelry box, a 19-inch television set, a table model radio, two rings, a fire-proof vault box and \$17.75 in change.

## Fine Team On Display At Windmill

An added attraction at Windmill Island during Tulip Time this year is the matched team of Belgium draft horses of Ollie Wierenga who is returning to Holland from Sneads Ferry, N. C. Wierenga, a former police officer in Holland, left Holland 20 years ago.

Bob and Pat are the names of the huge horses which are deep red in color with black manes and tails and white feet. Their black leather harnesses have brass buttons and buckles.

Wierenga who owns other horses was a member of the Onslow County Sheriff's Posse, and it took two years to find the team he wanted. He has rebuilt an old hay wagon and painted it a bright yellow and red color combination and used it for wagon rides in Sneads Ferry.

The horses will be placed in the Windmill Island "pasture" area where there is a goat, a cow, two calves and other animals. Birds are in cages in another section.

The Wierengas will be making their home on 138th Ave. West of Graafschap Rd. in Allegan county.

## Fennville Youth Held For Murder

FENNVILLE — A 13-year-old rural Fennville boy is being held in the Allegan county juvenile home after he allegedly murdered his father Saturday afternoon.

South Haven state police said the youth shot his father, George R. Gregory, 72, of route 3, 123rd Ave., Fennville. The shooting took place at the boys home, police said.

Troopers apprehended the boy a short time after the murder at a friend's house. The boy was taken to the Allegan youth home where he is being held pending action from juvenile authorities.

Medical examiner Dr. Kenneth Miller, of Saugatuck, pronounced Gregory dead at the house.

Gregory was born in Dublin county, England and came to the Fennville area from Chicago in 1910. He was a tax searcher and recorder of deeds in Chicago.

Surviving are the wife, Irene; one son, Charles at home; one brother, Harold of London, England; three sisters, Mrs. Victor (Mae) Whittaker and Mrs. Arthur (Queenie) Bates both of Liverpool, England, and Miss Lillie Gregory of England. One son, George, preceded him in death in 1966.

## Petition Hearing In Juvenile Court

ALLEGAN — Petition seeking a hearing in juvenile court for a 13-year-old Fennville boy who allegedly murdered his 72-year-old father Saturday was filed with Allegan County Judge Dwight Cleavers Monday.

The petitions mentions two counts, murder and manslaughter, according to South Haven State Police.

Judge Cleavers appointed Allegan attorney Edward Barton to represent the boy. Barton was present at the preliminary hearing Monday at which time the petition was filed. The boy is being held in Allegan county juvenile home.

## Man Hangs Self In Ottawa Jail

GRAND HAVEN — The first suicide in Ottawa county's new jail occurred Wednesday night when Donald Jenkins, 33, Rochester, Ind., hanged himself by making a noose from a torn blanket. Mouth-to-mouth resuscitation was applied but the man was dead on arrival at Municipal Hospital.

Jenkins was arrested at 9:45 p.m. Wednesday following a hit-run accident on Beacon Blvd. at Pennoyer, and was charged with driving under the influence of liquor. He was doing construction work here.

Surviving are the wife and three children in Rochester, Ind. The body was taken to Kammeraad Funeral home in Grand Haven and will be removed to the Foster-Good funeral home in Rochester.

## Overcast Skies Greet Fete Today

Milliken Represents  
Romney at Opening  
Events Wednesday

Overcast skies and cooler weather, plus a sprinkle of rain, dampened some of the enthusiasm for the Tulip Time children's parade today, but festival leaders said final decision would be made at 1 p.m. today whether the parade would go on.

Friday traditionally is an open day in case earlier parades are rained out and parades are postponed a day. The street scrubbing was postponed on only one occasion but the children's parades have been moved to Friday on two or three occasions.

It was another story weather-wise Wednesday. The day dawned with bright sunshine and rose to a high of 81 in early afternoon.

A record number of more than 600 costumed burghers reported for the annual street scrubbing rite — people of all ages plus a lot of small children carrying their own small brooms.

Gov. George Romney remained in Lansing where the House was engaged in a vote over open housing, and he sent Lt. Gov. William G. Milliken in his place.

Milliken arrived by plane at Park Township Airport at 1:45 p.m. and donned wooden shoes and a Dutch costume to join in the fun.

It was the first visit to Holland's Tulip Time and he expressed the desire to attend others. He was presented with a governor's plaque by Tulip Time Chairman Lou Hallacy at the airport.

Street scrubbing is an informal function and Wednesday's warm temperatures led to more water play than usual — something which is a lot of fun in warm temperatures but not so pleasant when it is cold. Two years ago the street scrubbing was conducted in 40-degree temperatures.

Wednesday's warm temperatures were not conducive to prolonging the tulips, but Holland's favorite blooms still provided plenty of color for the thousands of visitors who descend annually on this Dutch-American city for four days of old country festivities.

Wednesday's folk parade following the scrubbing featured 15 school bands and a like number (or more) of floats. At the rear came Holland's 328 klompen dancers performing on the scrubbed streets.

Co-Chairmen James Vanda Pool and Roger Stroh were well pleased with Wednesday's turnout and reminded persons who had borrowed city-owned Dutch costumes to return them to the Tulip Time office within 10 days.

Wilhelmine Haberland is chairman of the children's parade scheduled at 2:30 p.m. today. There are eight divisions and 15 bands. Famous Clown Emmett Kelly Jr. will be at the rear with the Holland High School band.

Klompen dancers are scheduled to perform at 7:15 p.m. tonight at Centennial Park. Tonight's main attraction is the Shrine Band variety show in Civic Center at 8 p.m.

## Retired Hope Professor Dies at 68

Prof. Garrett Vander Borgh, 68, of 72 Birchwood Ave., who retired in 1964 after 41 years of teaching at Hope College, died unexpectedly in Holland Hospital Wednesday. He has served as head of the education department at the college for many years.

A native of West Sayville, N.Y., he taught in India for a time following graduation from Hope College, and then obtained a master's degree from Columbia University.

He was a member of Third Reformed Church and served as deacon, elder, vice president of the consistory, and Sunday School superintendent. He taught the Gleaners Class for 12 years.

Surviving are the wife, the former Susan Draght; a daughter, Mrs. Maurice (Janice) Ver Helst of Holland; two grandchildren, Jeffrey and Jennifer Ver Helst, and two brothers, Jesse of Holland and Andrew of West Sayville, N.Y.

Funeral services will be held 11 a.m. Saturday at Third Reformed Church with the Rev. Russell W. Vande Bunte and the Rev. Mark Walvoord officiating. Burial will be in Pilgrim Home cemetery.

Friends may meet the family tonight and Friday from 7 to 9 p.m. at the Ver Helst-Langeland chapel.

## Tulip Festival Sidelights

Holland post office is doing a brisk business in five-cent stamps these days for those thousands and thousands of post cards sent everywhere on the globe by Tulip Time visitors.

One measure of success of any festival is the number of post card scenes available. Holland probably tops the list of any small city in the country.

Several members of the Raisin Valley Citizens Band Radio Club of Adrian will arrive in Holland Friday evening in their trailers for a Tulip Time visit.

After Saturday's parade, they have invited members of the Tulip City CB Inc. to join them for a potluck supper at the 40 and 1 club grounds on Greenly St. just west of 160th Ave. Local members are asked to bring their own coffee and sandwiches in addition to a dish for the table.

Those benches along the parade route on Eighth St. and River Ave. have long proved their worth for Tulip Time festivals. The planks on cement blocks have a two-fold purpose. They provide a resting place for foot-weary visitors and also control crowds from spilling into the parade route.

That matched team of Belgium draft horses of Ollie Wierenga is creating a sensation at Windmill Island where they are spending the four days of Tulip Time in the pasture. The huge animals are deep red in color with black manes and tails and white feet. Wierenga, formerly an officer with the Holland police force, is returning to Holland after an absence of 17 years. The Belgium draft horses are descendants of the Great Horse of Flanders.

Among the newer additions to the Windmill Island menagerie this year is a matched pair of geese, white and brown, donated by Mr. and Mrs. J. Franklin Van Alsburg, 573 Elmdale Ct.

Attracting a lot of attention in Wednesday's folk parade was the American Legion Auxiliary float bearing a replica of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, designed and executed by Jim Oudman, returned veteran from Vietnam who also stood as guard on the float. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Oudman of 209 West

11th St. Mrs. Oudman is president of the auxiliary.

It was the first time in costume and wooden shoes at street scrubbing ceremonies for Gary Byker of Hudsonville, the 23rd district's new senator, who joined Lt. Gov. William Milliken's party in the annual cleansing rite. Other local representatives could not be present because of the press of important legislation in the House of Representatives.

Wednesday was one of the warmest Tulip Time opening days in several years. Some people still remember the heat wave early in the 1960's when the mercury hit 90 on four consecutive days.

Wednesday's crowd was lightly clad and generally preferred the shady side of the parade route. Skies were slightly overcast at parade time and the bank thermometer dipped from 81 to 78 during the parade.

It happens every year and it's always cute. Up-and-down-the-parade route small moppets imitate the klompen dancers and some do quite well with the high kicks.

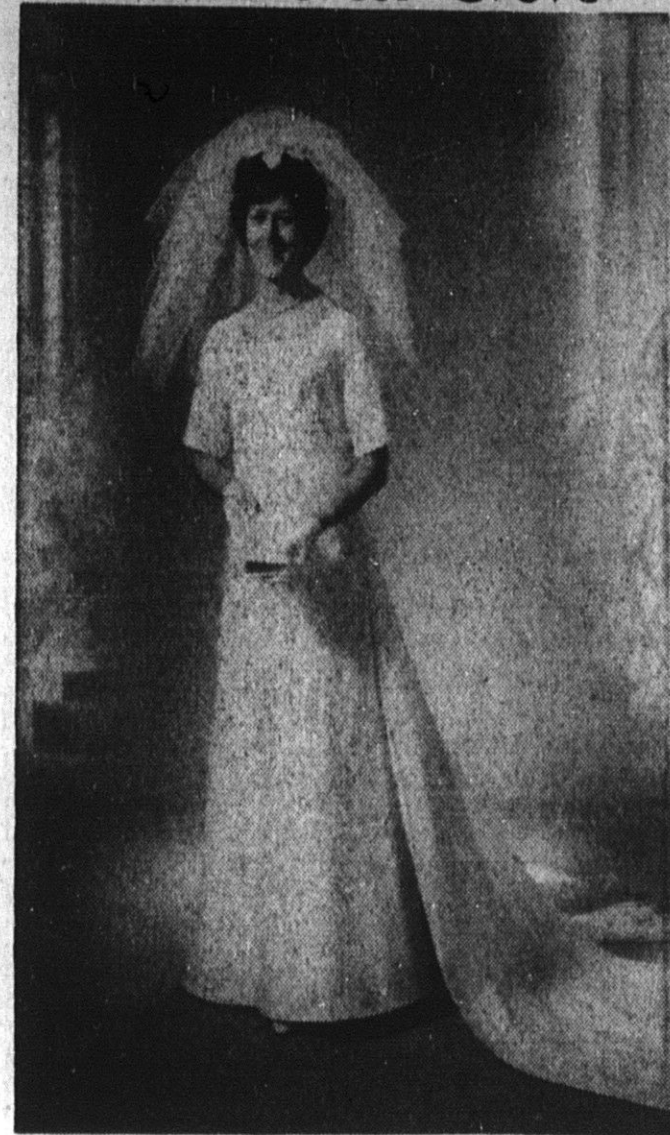

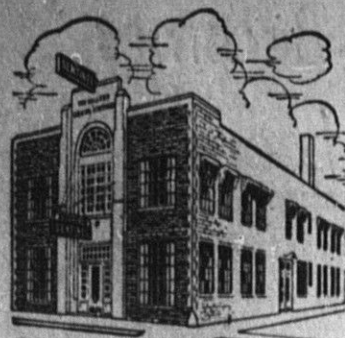

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### JUST THROW IT AWAY

There is no doubt that the federal budget needs considerable cutting. But if we have noted one thing, it is that Congressmen are willing to look everywhere for cuts except the huge military budget. This seems to be one area that is sacred to the members of congress and the attitude seems to cut across party lines.

On several occasions we have called to our readers' attention the warning of former President Eisenhower that a huge defense budget could undermine our democratic way of government. It might be well to do so again, and then to add the words of a realist, Adm. Hyman G. Rickover. He told congress "A great responsibility rests on Congress to see that these large industrial organizations that maintain a partnership between themselves and government...do not become, in effect, a fourth branch of government without corresponding legal responsibilities."

It is time that this advice filtered down to every member of the Congress.

Adm. Rickover called to the attention of Congress an incident in which he had persuaded a shipbuilder to accept a contract at a five per cent profit. A beaurocrat told him he was going against the law and the company should get at least eight per cent. To the credit of the Admiral, he suggested the official write Congress and complain about his saving of government funds.

One can hardly imagine that such a situation should exist but this is exactly what President Eisenhower had in mind when he warned the nation against the government and huge industries getting into partnership.

We picked up this information from a recent report concerning a Utah rancher who returned uncashed Social Security checks amounting to more than \$4,000 to the U.S. Treasury. He is reported to have stated that he was unable to think of any place which needs the money more than the U.S. Treasury in spite of the fact that people in government are mismanaging tax dollars so badly that these dollars may be wasted.

And from the almost total lack of interest by Congress, we seem to be quite a way down that road. It is time, and beyond time, to take the advice of these who have acted as statemen. And the savings would be immense.

Why not keep writing to the people in Congress, tell them that it is time for them at least to try to reduce the deficit and the waste of tax dollars.

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, May 19  
Ecclesiastes 5:1-12  
By C. P. Dame

In our present course of lessons we will study the strange book of Ecclesiastes in one lesson which will give us a good idea of the book. It teaches us practical truths for daily living and these we much need.

I. Let's first take a look at the whole book. The writer calls himself, "the Preacher" (1:2). He says that he was "the son of David, king in Jerusalem." His name was Solomon. The words, "Vanity of Vanities" appear in the second verse of the book. That phrase sounds pessimistic. In verse three the writer asks a question. In the book there are a number of questions. Today many people are pessimistic about life, its purpose and its meaning. The writer reflects the mood of our day.

The writer reveals that he was a student of life. He was an observing man. He searched for life's meaning. He noted and studied how people lived and concluded that the pursuit of pleasure, wealth, and wisdom brought no real satisfaction in life. Many today are learning the same truth—some too late, unfortunately. The writer concluded that man's problems are so great that he can't solve them and that is why he turns our gaze upward to God who hides himself but whom we all ought to obey.

"Fear God and keep his commandments, for this is the whole duty of man." Millions today do not agree with this statement. We do well to look at those words in the light of the New Testament truths. We have more light than Solomon had—we have the gospel.

II. Man has obligations to God. We must be reminded of this. One of them is to worship God. They who fail to do this disobey God. We can worship God rightly and wrongly. "Guard your steps when you go to the house of God" for "to draw near to listen is better than to offer the sacrifice of fools"—that is of disobedient people.

The sacrifice of animals only without a dedicated spirit is meaningless, formal, like reciting a liturgy, going through the forms of service only, with insincerity. Worship should be reverent. The listening mood is commended. This recommendation is good for this talkative age.

"When thou vowest a vow unto God, defer not to pay it. 'Vow - breaking is common to day. What vows do people break? It is much better not to make a vow than to make one and then break it. The words, 'cause thy flesh'—that is your whole self—"to sin," mean that unfulfilled promises made to God hurt.

III. It is best to look at life in a realistic manner. We can expect some crooked, unpleasant things to happen. We do well to remember too that we are all dependent upon the "profit of the earth."

In this day of machinery and science this is still true. And man today is greedy like the ancients were. "He that loveth silver shall not be satisfied with silver"—he wants gold, and the man whose income is \$10,000 a year wants \$15,000. "Sweet is the sleep of a laborer, whether he eats little or much but the surfeit of the rich will not let him sleep."

The driven executive, the wealthy and the industrialists are often troubled by ulcers and subject to heart attacks and worry much and are often unhappy. What is best of all? To fear, that is reverence God who sent His Son into the world to die for our sins and commit life wholly to Him.

## Dutch Humanities Course Begun at Christian High

A new course in the Holland Christian High School curriculum this semester is a Dutch Humanities course conducted under the auspices of FLICS (Foreign Languages Innovative Curricular Studies).

This is a federal government project operated in Michigan through the Ann Arbor Public Schools but servicing the entire state. Its objective is to encourage experimentation and innovation in the teaching of foreign languages, with a special view to relating the study of the language to the cultural milieu of the people. Developments in art, literature, science and industry in a historical setting are correlated with the study of the language.

Holland Christian's course centered around the study of the Dutch language. The course was a team teaching project of the high school with faculty members Marvin Baas, Hero Bratt, and Ronald Pothoven in charge. The latest methods of teaching modern languages were employed with emphasis upon spoken Dutch. Set in a historical framework, the achievements of the Dutch people in various cultural areas are studied.

Emphasis in the class is upon student participation in all

phases of activity, Bratt said. Each student chooses an area of research and is called upon to report his findings. As a climax to course activities, committees have been formed to investigate and report on the historical origins of the various settlements in the "Kolonie." The reports will include Holland, Graafschap, Zeeland, Noordoost, Drenthe, South Olive, New Groningen, East Saugatuck and Pella, Iowa.

Visiting lecturers have been called in to enrich the understanding of the students in various areas. Three visiting professors from Hope College, Dr. R. Ferwerda of Ede, the Netherlands, Dr. Bootsma from Nijmegen and Dr. R. Benesch from the Institute for European studies in Vienna, Austria, assisted in the presentations. Other lecturers included Dr. A. Hyma, emeritus professor of history from the University of Michigan; Dr. Howard Slenk of the Calvin College music department and Henry Melles of the Christian High art staff.

Much assistance in the gathering and presentation of materials was given by Willard Wichers and George Cook of the Netherlands Museum and Information Bureau, Bratt reported.

It was announced that the new swimming pool has been an extremely busy place, serving 11,884 swimmers in April. Plans are being made for a summer swimming program in conjunction with the City Recreation Program.

A recommendation was approved to reinstitute interscholastic wrestling, interscholastic swimming and girls' gymnastic teams. The motion was amended to include girls' swimming teams as soon as possible.

Because of pending litigation in the courts on Ottawa county's new school districts, no changes are being made immediately on school boundaries. Among the plaintiffs in the county case are representatives of both Federal and Harrison boards. These districts were annexed to Holland school district in a vote some months ago.

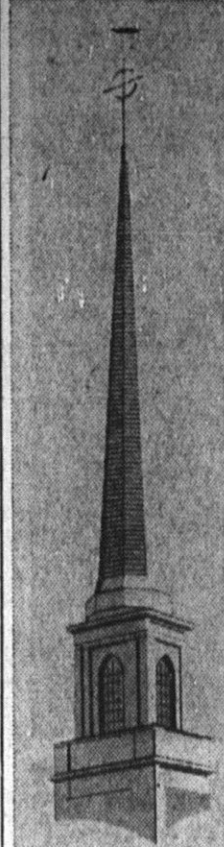

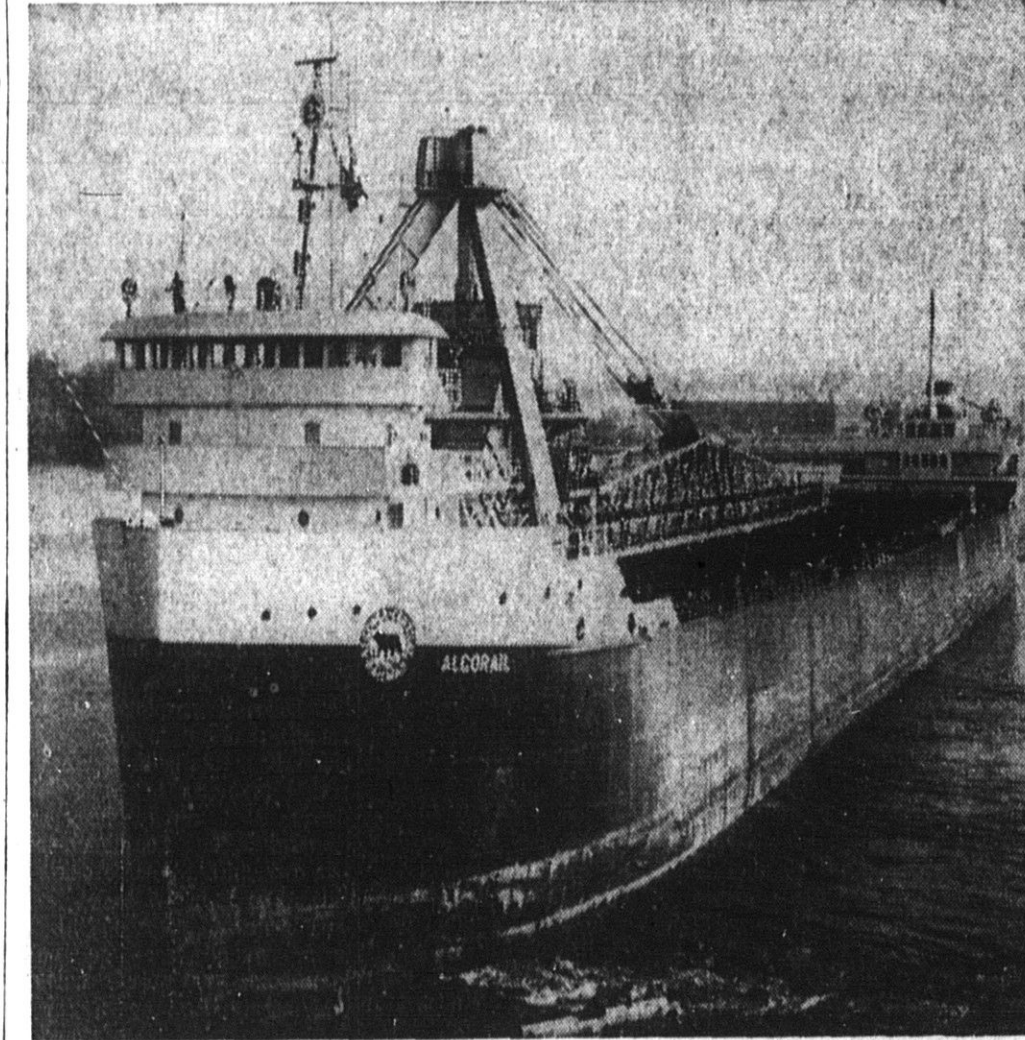

HONOLULU, Hawaii — Dr. Everett Kleinjans, 48, a Michigan-born educator with nearly 20 years experience in Asia, has been named as the new Chancellor of the East-West Center, a federal educational project in cooperation with the University of Hawaii.

He will succeed Howard P. Jones who became director of the Center in 1965 after serving as U.S. Ambassador to Indo-

nesia for more than seven years.

Dr. Kleinjans received his B.A. in mathematics and physics from Hope College in Holland in 1943 and then attended Stanford for a U.S. Army specialized training program in Far Eastern languages. He received his M.A. in linguistics in 1948 from the University of Michigan where he was on the staff of the University's English Language Institute as an instructor.

Born in Zeeland, he is the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Kleinjans, now living in Grand Rapids. Mrs. Kleinjans' parents are the Rev. and Mrs. John A. Klaaren of 90 East 14th St., Holland.

Dr. Kleinjans, who holds M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in linguistics from the University of Michigan, came to East-West Center in June, 1967, as Deputy Chancellor for Academic Affairs. From 1958 to 1967, he was at the International Christian University in Tokyo, Japan, where he served at various times as vice president for academic affairs, dean of the college of liberal arts, chairman of the division of languages and professor of English and linguistics. He was acting president of the institution just before coming to the East-West Center.

In addition, he served from 1965 to 1967 as director of the Inter-University Center for Japanese Studies, a Stanford University-administered graduate center incorporating 10 major American universities, and as a consultant on English language teaching to the Ford Foundation.

From 1948 to 1950 he was an instructor in English at Tamag College, Changchow, China. After Japanese language and area studies at Yale University and the Tokyo School of the Japanese Language, he became principal of the American School in Japan in 1952 and supervised its reorganization when it was returned to civilian control.

He was a professor of English at Meiji Gakuin University until 1965, when he returned to the University of Michigan where he earned his Ph.D. degree in linguistics and education in 1958.

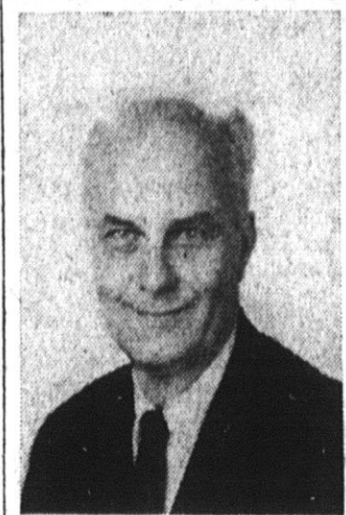

Dinkeloo spent three years in the Navy from 1943 to 1946 and four years with Skidmore, Owings and Merrill in Chicago before joining Eero Saarinen and Associates in 1950. In 1966 after the death of Saarinen, the name of the firm was changed to Kevin Roche John Dinkeloo and Associates.

Among the major technical innovations with which Dinkeloo is credited in architecture are the development of structural neoprene gaskets for curtain walls, the use of laminated metalized glass for reducing heat load in buildings, and the use of weathering exposed steel.

He married the former Thelma Van Dyke of Zeeland in 1943. They have seven children: Carter, 24; Dirk, 18, attending Hope College; Jansje, 20 attending Earlham College in Richmond, Ind.; Tessa, 16; Hanni, 10; Chris, 11, and Kaaren, 3.
