An air tour from Tulip City Airport is slated at 3:30 p.m. At 4:30 p.m. a tour of Chris Craft Corp. will be made after which the party will board a Roamer boat back to Point West for dinner at 8 p.m. with City Council and invited guests.

Hadden Sr. It is the first time Mrs. Hadden has been in Holland for the festival. They came over the weekend so that Hadden could attend his 35th class reunion at Hope College.

After 32 years in the U. S. Navy, Adm. Hadden is retiring July 1. They plan to continue living in Brunswick, Me., with a winter home in Florida. As Holland's most decorated veteran of World War II, Hadden holds the Silver Star, Legion of Merit, three Distinguished Flying Crosses, three Air Medals, three Purple Hearts, the Navy Commendation Medal, and the Presidential Unit Citation.

Adm. Hadden was in Holland two years ago to address the graduating class of Holland High School.

It's Michigan Week next week all over the state, but Holland celebrates part of it during Tulip Time. While Mayor Exchange Day is observed next Monday, Holland will entertain Midland Mayor Julius Blasy and his wife, City Attorney David De Witt and City Treasurer Frank Hudson and their wives on Friday.

On Monday, Mayor L. W. Lamb Jr., Councilman Donald D. Oosterbaan and City Manager William L. Bopf and their wives will go to Midland.

The visiting mayor has been coming to Holland on the Friday of Tulip Time for a number of years. This allows mayors to serve as each other's host, a privilege not seen elsewhere to any degree.

Besides, everybody loves to visit Holland when the tulips are in bloom.

Newcomers never cease to marvel at tulip lane in Holland. And when one considers the hazards — concrete curbs in the sun drying out the soil to say nothing of the vulnerability to open car doors, salt for ice control, and trampling tender shoots early in the season — it's all the more remarkable.

People living on tulip lane usually tend the flowers with loving care, getting rid of weeds and doing a bit of sprinkling if needed. And they refrain from parking on the street wherever possible to give visitors a good view.

One of the chief beauty spots in Holland is Centennial Park, a double block near downtown which was dedicated for park purposes early in Holland's development. At first, it was Market Square, and was named Centennial Park in 1876, the 100th anniversary of America's independence.

Park Supt. Jacob De Graaf plants his choice tulips in Centennial Park, and here the crowds gather with cameras loaded with color film.

De Graaf supervises the planting of tulip lane in the fall, planting one-third of the total each year. Sometimes, the tulips are pretty ragged the third year, but don't give up. Beautiful tulips usually appear just down the block.

Spring came early this year, and there was the usual speculation whether there would be tulips for Tulip Time.

Alleged Sex Discrimination Admissions

Seminaries Claim No Bias

Western Theological Seminary in Holland and Calvin Seminary in Grand Rapids, allegedly among colleges asked to explain delays in totally eliminating sex discrimination in admissions, have women enrolled in degree granting programs.

Western, a seminary of the Reformed Church in America, has been granting degrees to women since 1963 while Calvin, a seminary of the Christian Reformed Church, is to grant its first degree to a woman now enrolled. Neither denomination has yet ordained women into the ministry.

Western has graduated six women since 1963 in such degrees as Bachelor of Divinity, Master of Christian Education and Master of Divinity.

Calvin has one woman enrolled at present in a program leading to a Bachelor of Divinity degree.

Both seminaries said they have had women taking courses for decades.

Western awarded its first Master of Divinity degree to a woman in 1971 to Mrs. Charlotte Huitink. Another woman, Joyce Borgman, of Fremont, is enrolled in a similar three-year program. Once the denomination ordains women ministers, they could become among the first in the denomination.

Western president Dr. Lester J. Kuypers said the seminary board in May of 1971 adopted a resolution on anti-discrimination covering racial and sex bias. At present six women are enrolled in the seminary.

Calvin president Dr. John Kromminga said three women are enrolled in classes in the seminary at present including a cooperative program with the Presbyterian church.



Vandals Damage Tulips in Lanes

Hundreds of tulips in tulip lanes along Washington, Van Raalte and 12th Sts. were damaged by vandals in what was described as the worst tulip destruction in a concentrated area in recent years.

The damage was reported by Holland Police Monday and was believed to have occurred Thursday and Friday.

Park Superintendent Jacob De Graaf estimated between 1,500 and 2,000 tulips were vandalized along Washington Ave. and Blvd. from 16th to 12th Sts., along 12th St. from Washington to Van Raalte and along Van Raalte from 12th to about 20th St.

De Graaf said it appeared more than a car door was used because in some areas the foliage was cut to within four inches of the ground. He said the number of tulips damaged may not have been as high as in past years but the destruction was more highly concentrated than in recent years.

Tulip Time Inc. and the City of Holland have offered a \$100 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of those responsible for the damage.
